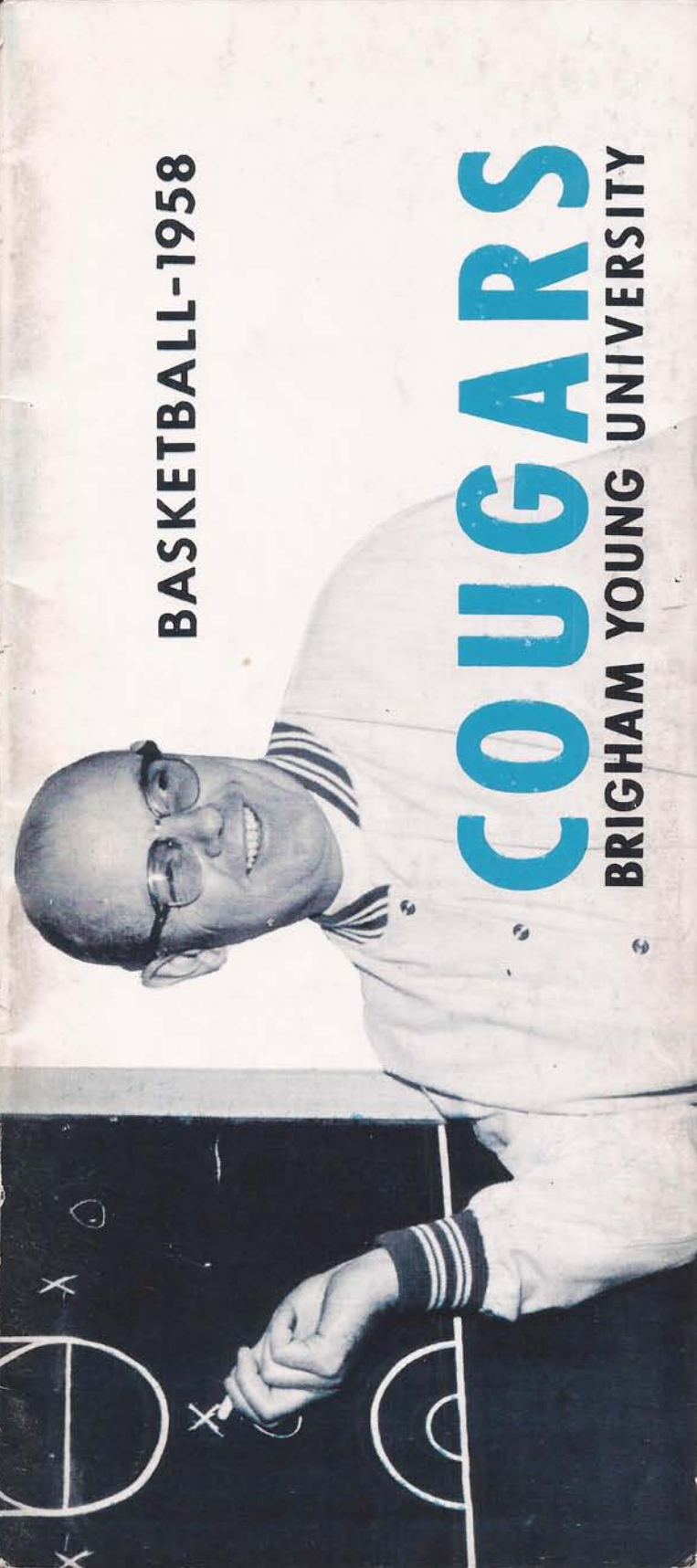

Scorers and Timers: Table located at center of floor on east side of Fieldhouse. If visiting teams need such help, qualified personnel will be made available on request.

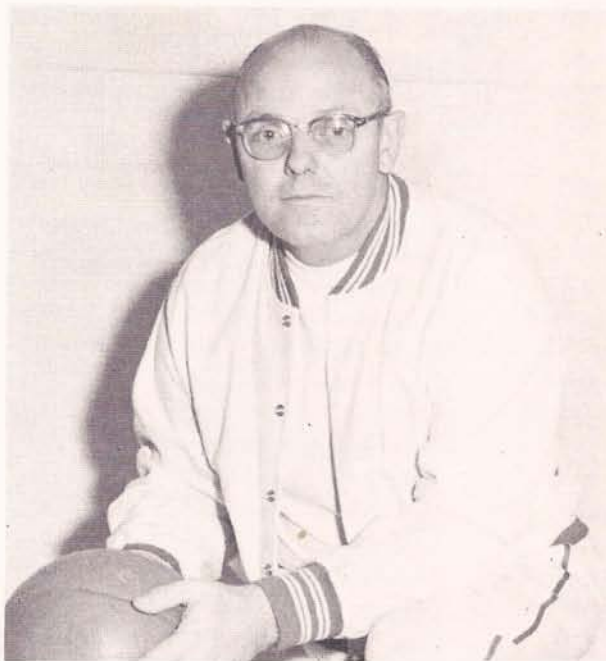

STAN WATTS



STAN WATTS, Head Coach

In the fall of 1949, Stan Watts left his duties as freshman basketball coach at BYU to assume new chores as head man with the Cougar varsity. The past eight seasons with the varsity cagers have been crammed with colorful, winning basketball which has continued to up the school's prestige nationally. And it can be said without fear of contradiction that BYU's successes over this span are due in large measure to Stan Watts.

In eight seasons Stan has (a) won a National Invitation Tournament title (b) produced three Skyline Conference championships and (c) has yet to finish below third place in the Mountain States standings. His BYU teams have never lost more games than were won, which is to say he has never had a losing season. In fact, Watts is one of seven coaches in the country to win over 100 games his first five years of college coaching.

Stan's own athletic career started at Murray High School (Utah) where he was an outstanding high school athlete. At Weber Junior College (Ogden, Utah) Stan won letters in all the major sports. He transferred to BYU in 1936, and before he had graduated two years later, had garnered two letters each in football, basketball, and track. In 1938 he was awarded a trophy going to the outstanding senior athlete at BYU.

Watt's first coaching assignment followed graduation, when he was named to the coaching staff at Millard County High School. A second move took him to Dixie Junior College. Later he was appointed head basketball coach at Jordan High. Stan was with the Beetdiggers only two seasons, but his cage teams tied for the Big Nine championship both years.

He came to BYU as freshman coach of both football and basketball in 1947. A year later he was named assistant basketball coach and assistant director of athletics. In 1949 he succeeded Floyd Millett as varsity basketball coach.

Stan is former District Seven representative on the NCAA basketball rules committee and member of the national basketball board. He has penned several articles on the game, and his penetrating observation has been put to special use at several basketball clinics.

Last season the Cougars, who were picked as a definite also-ran, won the Skyline championship, and Stan was named "Coach of the Year" in the mountain league.

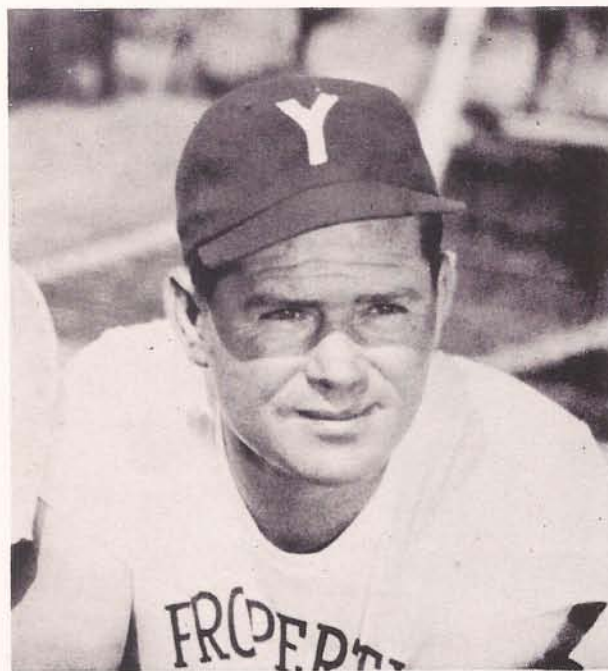

BOB BUNKER, ASSISTANT COACH

Many of BYU's varsity successes were started when the players were freshmen under Bob Bunker, assistant coach. And last year Bunker's young Gatos were undefeated in 12 games, posting one of the best records in the history of the school.

Bob, a graduate of Utah State University (1937), was appointed assistant basketball coach two years ago, although he has been working with freshmen basketball teams for the past five years.

At Utah State Bunker captained the Aggies conference football champions in 1936; also won his share of honors on the USAC basketball court. The same year he was graduated at Logan, he took his first coaching job at South Cache High School.

During World War II he served more than five years in the Army. He was commissioned a captain and served overseas in the European Theatre of Operations.

Following the war, Bunker returned to coaching, taking over as basketball, football and track coach at Preston High School (Idaho). Between 1945 and 1949, Coach Bunker's teams won a state championship and finished second in the state finals.

In 1949 he came to BYU as assistant football coach to Charles "Chick" Atkinson. He held this post until he was appointed assistant basketball coach two years ago.

THE OUTLOOK

After BYU's surprise finish in first place in the Sky-line standings last March, any forecast as to the Cougars eventual outcome in 1958 is bound to be pure guess work. In 1957 the Cats turned a lean year into an unexpected feast, one the prognosticators are still trying to explain.

Anything nearing a repeat performance this year would be asking too much, even for the gifted Stan Watts and his boys. In fact, at this writing the Cougars will need some breaks to win a few on the road and crack the first division in league play.

The loss of four starters from last year's team will undoubtedly be felt. Gone is the great rebounder and workhorse John Benson (18.4 points a game) and the great outside shot, Tom Steinke (19.7 points a game), and such regulars as Lynn Rowe and Harry Anderson.

Only one of last year's starters, Center Roy Thacker, is returning, and Thacker will not be eligible until the end of fall quarter just before Christmas.

Thus Mr. Watts must use his magic in bringing forth new talent, new stars with which to build the 1958 team. And while the material is promising, it is also green enough to keep the coaching staff in an uncomfortable position, at least until they start clicking with regularity.

True, the Cougars will have five or six lettermen returning, but they played only parts of games last year. Forwards John Gustin, Russ Jones, and Jack Cravens could surprise, as might Mac Madsen, Gary Miles, Russ Peterson and Mel Wilkes.

There isn't a senior on the squad this season, so Coach Watts will have to look to sophomores and juniors for personnel.

Last year Coach Bob Bunker's frosh were undefeated in 12 games, and the sophomores moving up to the varsity include Valoy Eaton, 6-2 guard and highest scorer (14.3 average); Dick Sawyer, 6-6 center (13.3 average); Lynn Gleave, 6-4 forward (8.2 average); Don Helm and Gary Crandall.

Other sophomores include Larry Crowley, a guard transfer from Chaffey Junior College; Bill Treu, a forward who lettered as frosh and returned just recently from mission; the Cats will also have the help of John Nicholl, junior college All-American from Eastern Arizona.

Certainly the Cougars have good cause for calling the season a building year. But with a few breaks and a little time to develop new talent, the Brighams once again might mean trouble for opponents.

(20) DON VOLPI, Guard, 5-10, 165, 24, Junior, Riverside, California — A transfer from Riverside Junior College. Volpi could be the sleeper on Watts' squad this year. He played some ball with Air Force in Europe while in service, won All-Air-Force honors. Don knows his way around the basketball court, scores best on jump shot.

(23) VALOY EATON, Guard, 6-2, 170, 19, Sophomore, Vernal, Utah — Eaton is one of the better prospects up from undefeated freshman team. He was top scorer on frosh hitting for 171 points in 12 games for 14.3 average. Eaton has great natural ability, but it may take him a little time to make adjustment to varsity. Seems destined for promising career, should help the Cats this year.

(21) LARRY CROWLEY, Guard, 6-1, 170, 20, Junior, Onatio, California — Another newcomer to Cougar squad. Crowley is a transfer from Chaffey Junior College. At Chaffey Invntational he hit for 41 points, ran up 120 counters in four games. Larry seems to be fitting into BYU system very well, could be the surprise player this season. An accounting major.

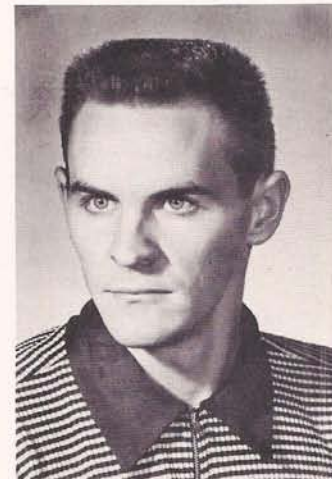


(24) MEL WILKES, Guard, 6-0, 170, 21, Junior, Aurora, Utah — One of returning lettermen from championship squad of last season. Mel has experience the Cougars will need this year. He is very fast, drives very well and his most effective point-getter is the jump shot. Wilkes is also a track star for the Cougars.



(22) MAC MADSEN, Guard, 6-1, 160, 23, Junior, Boise, Idaho—Mac just recently returned from LDS Church mission in Denmark. He lettered on Watts' varsity squad in 1953-54 as a sophomore before accepting mission call. Madsen is as sharp as ever but may find it tough to crack starting five. He is quick, very alert and hits very well from outside.

(25) BILL TREU, Forward, 6-3, 170, 24, Sophomore, Los Angeles, California — Bill joins the Cougars again after three years in Spanish-American mission for LDS church. A great prospect before his mission, Treu now looks like a real comer for the Cougars this year. Bill won all-city honors at Los Angeles High School, lettered as BYU frosh in 1953. Education major.



PLAYER PROFILES

(31) GARY CRANDALL, Forward, 6-3, 174, 20, Sophomore, Springville, Utah — Another member up from frosh, Crandall is working hard to stay in running for spot on varsity. An all-state player from Springville, his best shot is set shot. Gary is also fine tennis player, an engineering major.



(34) DON HELM, Forward, 6-4, 185, 20, Sophomore, Las Vegas, Nevada — Helm is former all-stater from Nevada, won Athlete of Year award at Las Vegas High. A high jumper for track team, Don can use height to good advantage on court. But he needs additional seasoning to stay with varsity competition. Good prospect here.



(32) RUSS PETERSON, Guard 6-0, 175, 22, Junior, Franklin, Nebraska — Likely starter at one of the guard positions this season, Russ is one of the few seasoned players Cougars have returning. He picked up his varsity letter last year although he saw only limited action. Russ was all-stater in Nebraska, played football as well.

(35) ROY THACKER, Center 6-4, 180, 21 Junior, Heber City, Utah — Thacker is only returning member of '57 starting five, which makes him key player on squad. An all-stater from Wasatch High, Thacker won starting assignment as sophomore, did a commendable job. Roy is rugged work horse under the basket, scores and rebounds well. Thack will not be eligible until winter quarter.



(33) JACK CRAVENS, Forward, 6-3, 175, 20 Junior, San Diego, California — Soon after practice started this year, Jack was shifted from guard to forward and the change has been judged a good one. Jack is an outstanding ball handler, has exceptional speed and is one of teams better rebounders. Jack was all-around athlete at La Jolla High School in San Diego, lettered in three sports.



(40) DICK SAWYER, Center, 6-6, 195, 20, Sophomore, Salt Lake City, Utah — Dick was all-state center as East High, averaged 13.3 points a game with undefeated frosh last season. Sawyer has great hands, rebounds well for a big man, and looks like the answer to some of Watts' problems at post. Preseason knee injury may slow Sawyer.

(41) LYNN GLEAVE, Forward, 6-4, 200, 20, Sophomore, Provo, Utah — Another member of '57 frosh, Lynn is likely candidate as starter at one forward position. He averaged 8.2 points with frosh, he is improving steadily and will be hard to keep off starting five. The oldest of brother team coming up.

(42) RUSS JONES, Forward, 6-5, 185, 22, Junior, Provo, Utah — Big Russ is one of returning lettermen shooting for regular berth at forward. Jones saw limited duty last year, looked good in reserve role. He played at Provo High, lettered as frosh and then spent two years in armed service. A marketing major.



(43) JOHN NICOLL, Forward, 6-5, 195, 20, Junior, Mesa, Arizona — A transfer from Eastern Arizona Junior College where he won All-American honors, Nicoll is likened to John Benson the Y's high-scoring forward of last year. John was voted MVP in national J.C. tourney, will likely be the big gun on Cougar forward line this winter. A marketing major.



PLAYER PROFILES



(44) JOHN GUSTIN, Forward, 6-5, 210, 24, Junior, Springville, Utah — Gustin, an all-state player in high school spent a couple of years in the service before coming to BYU two years ago. Won frosh letter, last year notched his first varsity letter. Very fast for a big man, can rebound with the best. Fine passer, ball handler.

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY
Located at Provo, Utah

CAMPUS—Brigham Young University is located in Provo, Utah, a city of nearly 35,000 which increases considerably during the school year. Located in the northeast section of Provo, the campus is split in to two sites. Campus covers some 450 acres. Provo is bordered by Utah Lake on the west, 12,000-ft. Mt. Timpanogos on the north, and the Wasatch mountains to the east.

FOUNDING—Established October 16, 1875, twenty-one years before Utah statehood, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons).

The latter two joined the conference in 1951. E. L. Romney, conference commissioner, has offices in Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah.
