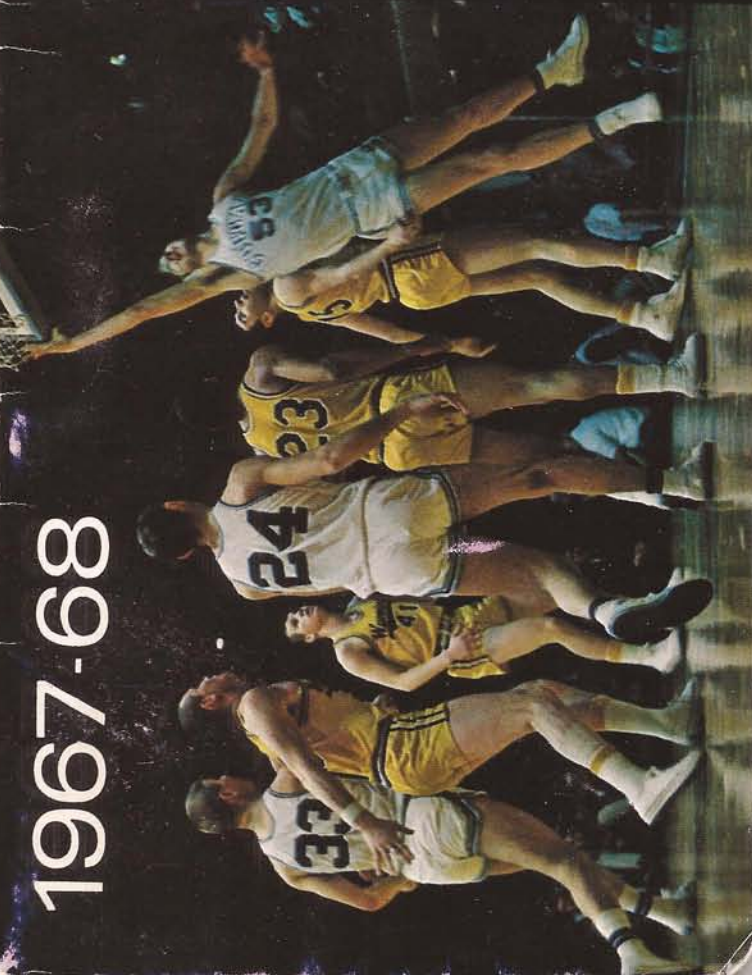

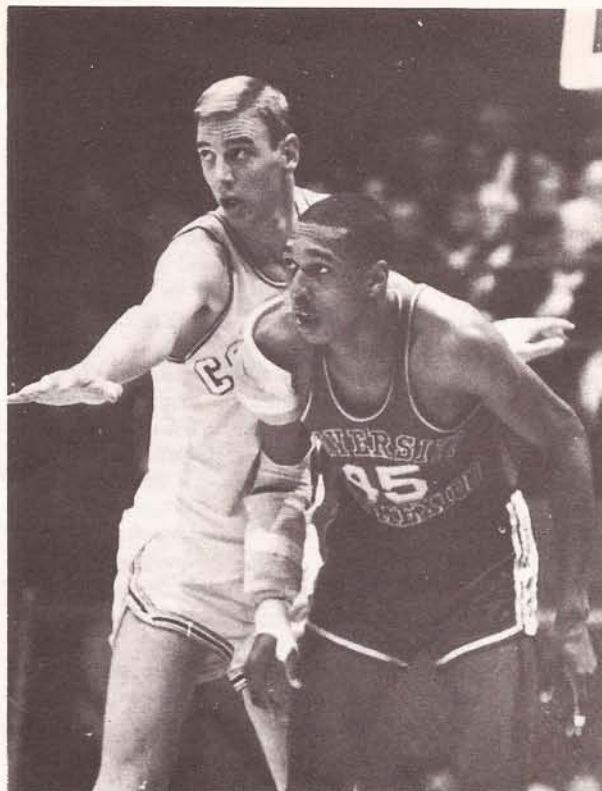
THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the country. Within the University there are 13 colleges, and the graduate school offers the doctoral degree in 14 departments.

The school is located in beautiful Utah Valley on a bench overlooking Provo, Utah, a community of almost 42,000 people. Rugged mountains in the Wasatch range border the valley on three sides, the Utah Lake forms a border on the west.

Forty-five miles to the north is Salt Lake City, capital of Utah and historic center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, (commonly called the Mormon Church).

This is the setting. But the school is more than this. It is a center of higher learning which places special emphasis on spiritual values, on friendly association, and on knowledge. But in any setting, the school would be unique because of its atmosphere.



WELCOME, PRESS

- PRESS PASSES** — Requests for working passes should be made directly to the Sports Information Director a week prior to the game. Women are not allowed in the press box, and the area is reserved for those actually covering the game. Drivers, and others who may accompany those covering the game, will be asked to sit elsewhere.
- PRESS BOX** — The BYU press box is located on the west side of the playing floor, and is reached through entry of sections AA on the north end of the floor. All parking in the immediate vicinity of the fieldhouse is reserved. Parking permits should be requested in advance.
- BROADCASTING BOOTHS** — Three radio booths are available, including one reserved for the visiting station which is designated the official station by the visiting team.
- SERVICES** — Complete game statistics — the box score, shooting percentages, shooting charts, and play-by-play — will be supplied at the half and end of the game.
- UNIFORMS** — The Cougars will wear white uniforms at home and royal blue on the road.

(BYU and Wyoming are WAC co-champions. Wyoming defeated BYU, 70-63 in a playoff to determine the WAC representative in the Far-West NCAA playoffs. Wyoming lost to NCAA champion UCLA, 109-60, and to UTEP, 69-67, in the playoffs.)

SEASON OUTLOOK

About the only safe statement that can be made about this year's BYU team is that it shouldn't be anything like former Cougar squads. The Cougars will continue to break fast and fire away at the basket, but the most noticeable difference will be in the overall makeup of club personnel.

True, seven lettermen from last year's 17-10 team that tied Wyoming for the WAC championship are back. That's half a team, but the players who pumped in 60% of the Cougars' points in '67 have since moved on. This group includes the likes of Craig Raymond (6-11 center), Neil Roberts (6-5 forward), Gary Hill (6-4 guard-forward), and guards Ken James and Jim Jimas.

There is enough talent returning that if Coach Stan Watts were to look to his lettermen only, he could fill the five starting positions without any trouble. But the incoming talent is of such a quality that the best playing combination will probably have to come from both the seasoned and the new.

Looking at the team as a whole, the best fortified positions, in terms of experience and ability, are up front. The post will be manned by Jim Eakins, a 6-11, two-year letterman, who will be hard to dislodge. The two forwards on the front line, All-WAC forwards Kari Liimo (6-8) and Marty Lythgoe (6-6), will be among the region's best, even though they are only juniors. Liimo displays a lot of class as a player, and with his height and with his ability, he will be hard to match anywhere in the country. Lythgoe, too, has a fine combination of court talents.

The reserve strength at center and forward will not be as strong. Orville Fisher (6-11) and Scott Warner (6-7) can spell off Eakins, but neither can claim much in the way of playing experience. The other candidates at forward are all sophomores, though the Cats could get some assistance from Gary Schneider (6-7).

The talent thins out, once Watts has to turn to his bench.

The two guard positions are also something of a question mark, too, but for another reason. The three lettermen (Randy Schouten, Lynn Parsons, and Jon Dresser) saw only reserve action last year, and at this writing none of the three can be labeled a standout comparable to BYU guards of recent years. But they have some experience, and that will mean a lot, at least in the fore part of the season.

A newcomer who could work himself into a starting berth at guard is Doug Howard (6-4), a sophomore who averaged 15.0 points per game on the freshman squad (12-2) of last winter. Howard has excellent moves and shoots well, much in the tradition of former BYU guards. Another new member of the varsity, transfer Gary Foster (6-3), figures on the Cougar's guard line. They are good shooters and have good speed.

There is one thing that should work to the Y's advantage this year—the Cougars' summer tour of the Orient-South Pacific. An 11-man squad from BYU completed a 27-game tour that gave them an opportunity to play a lot of ball together. How much this will mean in the team's overall development remains to be seen.

In summary, one fact is rather evident—Watts will have less to work with than he did in either '66 or '67 campaigns. Even so, BYU will likely win its share of games.

COACH STAN WATTS

After 18 years as head coach of Brigham Young University's Cougars, Stan Watts can look back on some fond memories. Watts, one of the most respected men in the coaching profession, has literally built a basketball empire at BYU.

Now in his 19th season as head coach of the Cougars, Watts is a believer in colorful, fast-break basketball. BYU's great basketball tradition thrives on this type of game, and that may be one reason that the school's cage tradition and Watts are one and the same thing. Stan handpicks his own schedule, and year after year his teams have faced the elite in the college basketball world.

Watts is one of a handful of coaches in the country to win over 100 games in his first five years of coaching college ball. It is also worth noting that the trophy case in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse contains two NIT trophies (1951 and 1966), plus five conference championships. Stan can recall with some satisfaction the fact that BYU is the only team in the history of the WAC not to have at least one losing season of conference play.

Just prior to the 1967-68 school year Watts completed a third BYU basketball tour abroad which was to the Orient and South Pacific. It was successful in every respect and the Cougars won 24 and lost three. Previously Watts had toured South American in 1951 and 1965 with BYU basketball teams. Watts is credited with introducing the jump shot to South American basketball.

An author and lecturer, as well as basketball coach, Stan has written the book, "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball." Over 15,000 copies

of the book have been sold since its publication in 1959. He is also a regular contributor to magazines and periodicals on the subject of basketball.

A native of Murray, Utah, Stan grew up in the little community just south of Salt Lake City. He was an all-around athlete at Murray High and Weber State before moving on to Brigham Young University. Watts won honors in three sports with the Cougars.

He began his coaching career in 1938 at Millard High School, where he was head coach in three sports: football, basketball, and track. In 1941 he moved to Dixie College as athletic director and head basketball coach. He returned to the high school ranks in 1945 as head basketball coach at Jordan High. Two years later he joined the staff at BYU as head baseball coach and assistant basketball coach. The head coaching job in basketball opened in 1949 and his long tenure at the Cougar helm began.

Since that time Watts' teams have rolled up a 353-202 record in 18 seasons of top-flight basketball.

Stan is past member of the National Basketball Board, and he is currently second vice-president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He has also served on the UPI rating board from the Rocky Mountain region. Among other interests, Stan heads BYU's annual coaching clinic and annual youth clinic.

Stan and his wife, the former Emily Kelly, have been married for over 26 years. Their four children are Janice (Mrs. Dennis Jones); Susan, 23, Judy, 19, and Howard, 15.

COACH PETE WITBECK

Now in his fourth year as chief assistant to Stan Watts is Alan "Pete" Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada.

Many Brigham Young University basketball fans will remember Witbeck best as the Cougar freshman coach. During a span of several years, Witbeck and his frosh enjoyed unusual success. His last three years with the frosh, the Kittens were 38-3. His 1963-64 team included such players as Neil Roberts, Ken James, Craig Raymond, Jim Jimas, and Gary Hill, and was undefeated in 14 games. That team averaged over 109 points per game, a record that may stand for many freshman seasons.

In addition to winning regularly, Witbeck was able to orient the new players to the BYU style of play, thus making the job of moving up to the varsity a little easier.

In 1964 he was named assistant varsity coach following five years with the frosh. Hired initially as a scout for Watts, he did so well that he was able to progress rapidly. He is regarded as one of the top recruiters in this part of the country.

Witbeck was a three year letterman for BYU track teams in the early 1950's. He was an outstanding distance runner, competing in the mile and two mile.

Witbeck handles much of the scouting of BYU opponents. That duty takes him thousands of miles each year. In 1965, he traveled about 100,000 miles, including a 25,000 mile chunk in South and Central America with the barnstorming Cougars. Witbeck improved on that mileage in 1967 by traveling over 30,000 miles in the Orient during the summer.

In addition to his scouting duties, he is responsible for pre-season conditioning.

Witbeck is married to the former Kathy Marshall and they have one daughter, Jill, age 6.

COACH GARY EARNEST

The man who inherited Pete Witbeck's freshman coaching job (and its winning ways) is Gary Earnest, a standout guard on BYU basketball teams in 1959-60-61.

A native of Longview, Washington, Earnest was a three sport letterman in high school, winning monograms in baseball, basketball and football. In basketball, he was an all-state selection.

How he came to BYU is an interesting story. While in the Marines, his base team was playing in a semi-pro tournament in Las Vegas. Also in that tourney was a Salt Lake City team coached by Witbeck. Witbeck was so impressed that he immediately began recruiting Earnest for Stan Watts. The rest is history. Earnest came to BYU and proceeded to become the sixth leading career scorer in BYU history.

For three years he was a regular with the Cougars, and in his senior year, 1961, was an all-Skyline Conference selection. During his three years at BYU, he scored 1,108 points.

Upon graduation from BYU in 1961, Earnest began his coaching career at Rich High School in Randolph, Utah. His team there was 24-3 finishing third in the state playoffs. From there he moved over to Moapa Valley High School in Overton, Nevada. His one year there was equally successful, finishing with a 19-2 record and a second place finish in the state tourney.

After two years of coaching in high school and three years at BYU, his career record is 78-11—not bad for a young coach. His 1964-65 debut in the college coaching ranks was successful as his Kittens finished with a 10-3 mark, then 13-1 in 1966 and 12-2 in 1967.

Earnest is married to the former Ruth Robinson of American Fork. They have two sons, Edward Kent (4), Steven Kyle (3), and a daughter Amy, 2 months.

TRAINERS

The training chores for this year's team will be shared by **Rod Kimball**, veteran of 28 years with Cougar teams, and comparative newcomer **Marv Roberson**.

Rod grew up in Jordan, Utah, where he was an outstanding athlete. He graduated from BYU, and has spent most of his life in service to the school and the Mormon church. He and his wife have 12 living children.

Marv Roberson will be remembered by many BYU fans as a large-size shot putter on Cougar track teams of several years ago. He graduated from BYU in '57, then moved to Stanford where he picked up his M.A. degree and was assistant trainer for the Indians for four years.

Marv became head trainer at Foothill College in 1962. He joined the BYU staff in 1966. He is a native of Long Beach, California, and he and his wife, Doris, have three children.



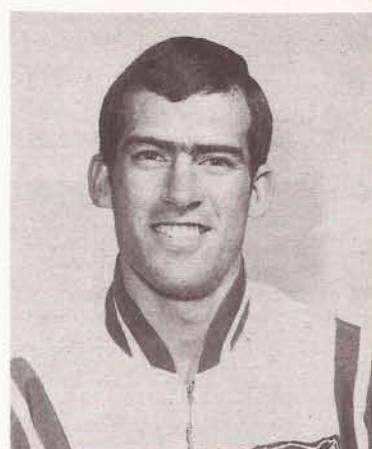

ADMINISTRATION

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON, UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

There is no way to accurately estimate the full impact Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson has had on the University's stature, but it is generally accepted that no other person has played a more significant role in its growth and expansion. Since his appointment in 1950, the school has undergone dramatic expansion that has made it the largest university in the Great Basin region.



A native of Ogden, Dr. Wilkinson attended Weber College before transferring to BYU where he graduated in 1921. He pursued his education at George Washington Law School,

where he graduated summa cum laude, and Harvard, where he received the degree of doctor of juridical science.

Since his appointment in 1951, the enrollment has increased many fold and more than 80 major, permanent buildings have been constructed on campus. In 1965, one of these buildings, the spacious new student activities building was named in his honor.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, COLLEGE DEAN

There is a reason why they call the Cougars' modern athletic complex "Milt's Miracle Mile." The tag put on the Y's extensive facilities alludes to some of the contributions made to the College of Physical Education by Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the college.



A former teacher, coach, principal and superintendent of schools in Idaho, Dr. Hartvigsen came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed. D. at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State University and obtained his M. Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU, Dr. Hartvigsen has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs, which have won wide-spread commendation, are the result of his own keen planning, careful design, and forceful administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen serves as chairman of the Athletic Advisory Council, and has served on several key NCAA assignments. He was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

FLOYD MILLET, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Nobody—coach, athletic or fan—likes to win more than does Floyd Millet, the University's director of athletics since 1964. And the fact that some of the Cougar's greatest moments in sports have come within the last three years is by no means coincidental.



An all-round athlete and all-conference performer at BYU, Millet won a reputation as one of the hard-nosed set by the time he graduated in 1934. He entered coaching and obtained his M.A. degree from USC in 1939.

He served in a number of coaching capacities—football, track and basketball—and was director of athletics before resigning to enter private business. Even so, he kept a hand in athletics, serving as chairman of the athletic committee of the General Board of the YMMIA. He directed one of the largest athletic programs in the world in that capacity.

1967 REVIEW

It wasn't the kind of ending the Cougars had in mind, but the dramatic, if abrupt, finish of BYU's 1967 basketball season will have to go into the record books as a year that lacked nothing in terms of interest or excitement.

By all standards it was a peculiar season, one in which road trips were beset with bad weather and poor travel conditions, a cancelled game, a playoff, the absence of BYU scorers with 20-point averages, and the unexpected appearance of the control game.

In the final analysis, the Cougars finished higher than most experts figured they would. Moreover, they surprised a number of forecasters by winning a share of the WAC championship.

A pre-season poll of the Conference coaches indicated New Mexico was the number one pick. BYU got only one first place ballot as the team most likely to win the league championship. And Wyoming, the other half of the title tandem, was completely overlooked.

While compiling a 17-10 win-loss record, the Cougars faced a typical schedule of good teams. Eight of the teams they played against wound up in post-season action in either the NCAA or NIT.

Despite the frustration of not reaching the NCAA, the first five seniors on the Cougar squad can look back on some well-earned distinctions for their four years at BYU. As freshmen the five—Craig Raymond, Gary Hill, Neil Roberts, Jim Jimas, and Ken James were undefeated in 14 games. As sophomores they were on the 20-5 team that won the WAC championship in 1965. The following year as juniors they were on the NIT championship team, and this year they were in on a half-share of the conference title.

In addition they did not lose a game to rival Utah in four years at BYU, and their overall record with the varsity was 77 wins against 25 losses.

Stan Watts' 1967 team will probably be remembered as the team that didn't have an individual standout. During the 27-game season no fewer than eight players won team high-point honors and seven others took rebound honors at one time or other during the campaign.

However, in terms of percentage of field goals made, the Cougars were the best shooting team in the school's history. They connected on 49.1% of their shots. Surprisingly, they were 14 points below the offensive average of last year (81.7 to 95.5 in 1966). This was due, in part, to the swing toward the control game by BYU opponents.

For the second straight season BYU remained undefeated on its home floor. As a matter of fact, the Cougars have lost only two games in a string of

46 home games dating back to 1964, and both of these were during the Far West Regionals in Provo in 1965.

A reflection of the team's popularity last year is found in the attendance figures. BYU played before nearly a quarter of a million fans (248,680 to be exact); and this of course, excludes television exposure.

Attendance at home remained at near-capacity level with 124,375 fans witnessing 13 home games for an average of 9,567 fans in the 10,200 George Albert Smith Fieldhouse.

Three other records of note were recorded by the 1967 team and players. Neil Roberts 53% shooting average is a new career record for the school, and Jim Eakin's overall field goal percentage of 55% is the second highest for one season. The only new team mark, other than the 49% field goal average, was the record of 77 rebounds against St. Mary's.

Craig Raymond, the 6-11 center, led the team in scoring and rebounding (14.2 points per game, 183 rebounds in 24 games). Sophomore Kari Liimo was second in scoring and rebounding, just six rebounds behind Raymond. Liimo also led the team in free throw shooting with an even 80%.

As for the future, the Cougars will have to replace the five seniors who have been in on some of the school's greatest basketball moments.
