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# marriott center



*J. Willard Marriott Center*

The home floor for the Cougar basketball team is the J. Willard Marriott Center located on the north side of campus. It is now in its fourth year of BYU activity and has already established many national attendance records.

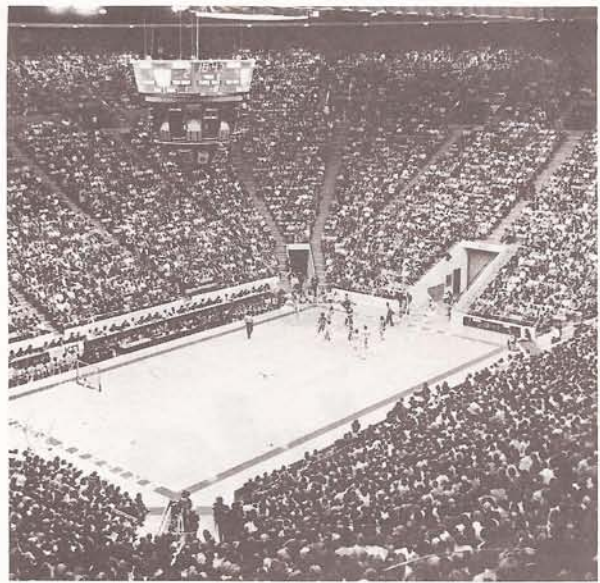
When plans were being drawn up for the center, Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson, then president of the University, said "For the first time in recent years, devotional messages, commencement exercises and all other major campus events, along with basketball, will be held under one roof for all students." Since its completion on December 3, 1971, it has been just such a place.

Total home attendance figures show that over a three-year period 426,033 fans jammed into the Marriott Center to watch the Cougars play their 25 home games—an average of 17,041 fans per game. The single game mark was set against the University of Utah when 22,987 came to see the contest. That game was just 13 short of 23,000 fans.

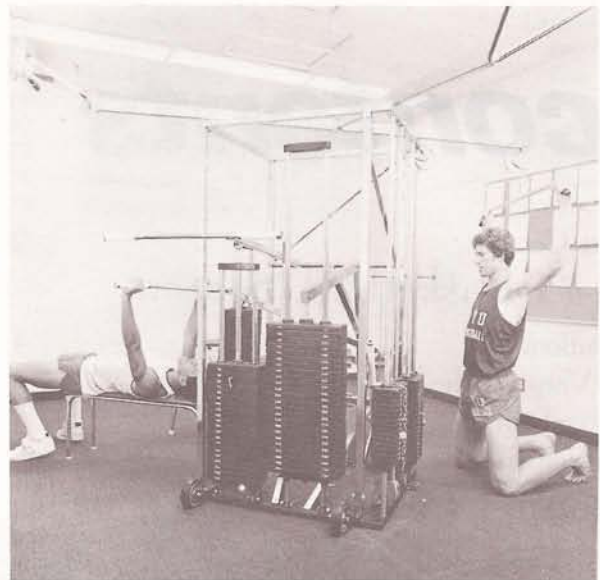
The building is the largest arena of its kind in the United States, covering about three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet, and will enclose 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is some ten stories.

Seating capacity has been set at 22,768. Of that number 10,000 are chair seats with the balance being bleacher seats. About 60% of the seats are below the concourse level.

While the Marriott Center is generally associated with basketball, it should be pointed out that it has been, and will continue to be used for a wide variety of events and purposes. The building includes offices for the coaching staff and ticket personnel, locker rooms, and facilities for pageants, dance festivals, musicals, and other various assemblies at the University.

# outlook

After being in the thick of the conference race three years in a row, last year was a building year for BYU. The Cougars finished 11-15 on the year going 6-8 in the conference for a sixth place finish. This year it appears we could be more competitive in light of the added experience of our front line and a more favorable home schedule.

The problems we are faced with this year seem to be just the opposite of last year's. Last season it was necessary to replace all three front line players. This year we must find replacements for both starting guards while the front line remains intact. Last year's guard duo of Doug Richards and Bill Anderson represented 44 percent of the BYU offense as they were the only players averaging in double figures. Between the two of them they were the top scorers in 22 of our 26 games.

Our team this year has two immediate goals in mind. 1) We must improve our defensive play, and 2) would like to speed up our play and fastbreak more than we did last year. In order to meet these criteria we felt we had to have more speed and quickness in our program and concentrated our efforts along this line in our recruiting last spring. Two new faces, both junior college transfers, Gary Batiste, 6'1" and Brian Frishman, 6'6" appear to have the ingredients we were looking for.

It is also our hope that we can feature a more balanced offensive attack. We want to get a more balanced scoring effort from all positions. We are changing our offensive set and going back to a 2-3 alignment in hopes that this will better accomplish what we want. This will necessitate a full transition to forward for sophomores Mark Handy, 6'8" and Jay Cheesman, 6'8" who played closer to the basket last year in our double post set up.

## The Guard Position

The only proven returning player at guard is Grig Clawson. Grig was a part-time starter in the backcourt early last season when we were running a three-guard offense but was relegated to a reserve role when we felt we needed a better team rebounding effort. Other players vying for a starting guard spot are Veryl Law, 6'2" who is a hard-nosed competitor; Gary Batiste, 6'1" J.C. transfer from Feather River Community College in California; Lyn Dasso, a 6'2" freshman from Sunnyside, Washington; and Reed Noble, 6'5" up from last year's junior varsity team. The major problems at this position appear to be lack of experience and lack of proven leadership under fire. The strongpoint looks to be in quickness compared to last year.

## The Forward Position

This position could be the area where we show the biggest improvement in comparison to last year's team and also is probably the most heated in terms of competition for a starting berth. Mark Handy, 6'8" sophomore, was the team's third leading scorer (9.8) and the top rebounder (8.7) on last year's club but spent considerable time in the post and may be called upon to play that position again some this year. Jay Cheesman, 6'8" sophomore, hopes to get off to a quicker start this year since he was hobbled at the start of last season with a severe ankle sprain. It is also a strong possibility that Jay will spend some time in the post area. Greg Snow, 6'7" part-time starter last year, returns for his senior year. He is one of the better shooters but must improve his board play. Two

other part-time starters, Chris Williams, 6'7" and Gifford Nieson, 6'5", appear to have improved. Gifford is reporting earlier this year since it was decided to redshirt him in football. One other new face is J.C. transfer Brian Frishman. Brian will add needed speed and outside shooting—something which was lacking last year from our front line.

## Centers

Last season Troy Jones averaged 8.1 ppg and 4.9 rebounds. Troy has the size and is very strong physically. He also possesses a good hook shot but needs to improve his rebounding. Stu Walkenhorst, 6'10" is up from the junior varsity squad. Handy and Cheesman could also be called upon to back up this position.

## Conference Race

It appears to be a wide open affair. All of the teams lost outstanding players either due to graduation or to the NBA hardship draft. I also feel that the teams in the lower half of the conference race strengthened themselves with incoming freshmen and junior college transfers. Off hand, it looks like there could be very little difference between the last place team and the first place club.

New Mexico, who won it all last year, lost four starters, but they had more depth than any team in the conference. Based upon this, I feel they should be a contender. Arizona State, who represented our conference in the CCA Tournament, lost their front line but they have Scott Lloyd and a number of red shirts with size waiting to pick up the slack. Arizona suffered due to the hardship draft, but as was the case with New Mexico, they were deep in reserves and had another good recruiting year. Utah, who was the runner-up in the NIT, lost the leading rebounder in the conference and some speed in Medley and Jones, but they appear to have recruited well. UTEP and Colorado State could be sleepers with the addition of a number of junior college transfers. Wyoming should be much improved with a new transfer in the post and some fine freshman guards.

If I were to pick a potential champion today, I would go with Arizona State. I also feel New Mexico and Arizona are in the best position to challenge the Sun Devils. I would have to place UTEP, Utah, Colorado State, Wyoming, and BYU in the dark horse class.

## Non-Conference Opponents

Our schedule is just about opposite of last year's. We have 16 home games which includes an encounter with the Brazilian National Team and 11 games on the road. For the first time in years we will not participate in a Christmas Tournament but instead will play three games in four nights at home between Christmas and New Year's Day.

We open our season up with the University of Texas who was the Southwest Conference champions last year. Weber State feels they may have the best team in the history of their school. Wichita is improved. San Francisco and Seattle finished 1-2 in the WCAC. Utah State is one of the top independent schools in the West. Bradley is a co-favorite in the MVC and Davidson is a pre-season pick in the Southern Conference.

## Summary

In summary, I do feel we have some real question marks. We should be a much quicker team, but we also must find a leader for our backcourt and our front line must increase their scoring and rebounding performances. We are still a young team, and therefore we must hope that all of the pieces fit together by the time the conference starts.

GLENN POTTER

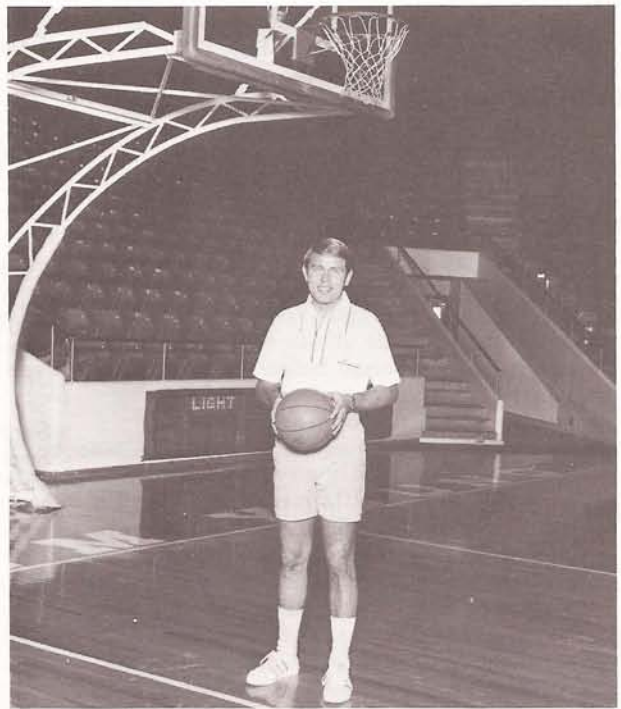
GLENN POTTER begins his third year as head basketball coach at BYU after assuming control of the Cougar program in March of 1972. Previously he was an assistant to Coach Stan Watts from 1970 to 1972. After experiencing two consecutive WAC Championships and a second place finish in his first three seasons at BYU, Coach Potter, last year, was left to rebuild a team which saw only two starters and five players return to the squad. But the 36-year-old head coach has been in similar situations before.

Upon arrival at the University of Nebraska in 1963 as an assistant to Joe Cipriano, Potter helped shape Nebraska into a winning basketball team. That marked the end of a 13-season losing streak for the Cornhuskers. During the five years Potter was at Nebraska, the team posted a respectable 80-46 won-loss record. But Nebraska was not the first time Potter and Cipriano teamed together in coaching.

Glenn and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as an assistant at Idaho while working on his Master's degree in secondary education.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, and graduated in education in 1960. After completing his eligibility at Idaho, Glenn coached the frosh for one year.

While in school Glenn proved himself an outstanding student. Because of his academic achievement Potter was honored by being asked to become a member of several national honorary societies—Blue Key, Phi Epsilon Kappa, and Phi Delta Kappa.



From November 1961 to August 1963 coach Potter served as an officer in the United States Army. During that time he coached the Ft. Hood (Texas) basketball team to an outstanding 46-10 record.

An avid teacher of defensive fundamentals and team balance, Potter is becoming recognized as one of the strong young coaches in the NCCA today. He is co-author of the book entitled **Nebraska Basketball** and spent two weeks last year in Yugoslavia conducting clinics in Zagreb.

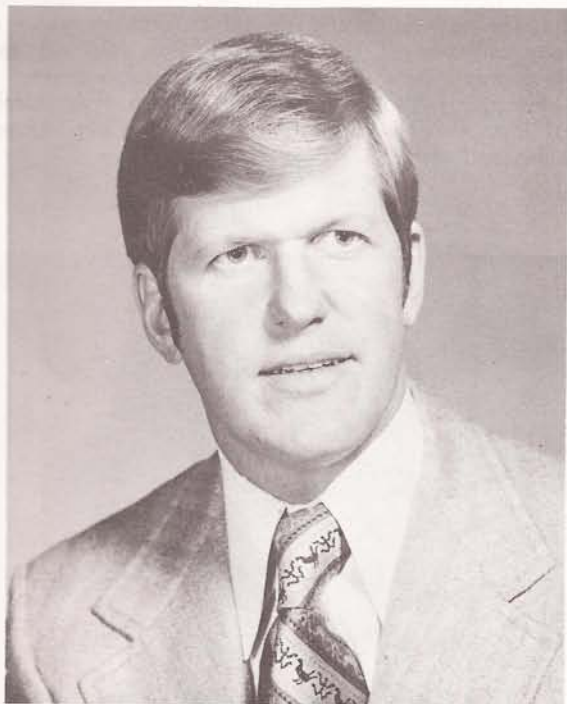
Coach Potter was born March 7, 1938, in Twin Falls, Idaho. He is married to the former Mary Beckstead and they are the parents of five children: Lori (13), Steven (11), Jennifer (8), Cindy (6), and John (2).

BOB FREDERICK

BOB FREDERICK, who enters his third season as a member of the Cougar coaching staff, came to BYU from the University of Kansas, where he was assistant varsity basketball and head golf coach.

Bob was lured away from his alma mater after just one season at Kansas, and along the varsity responsibilities, has directed much of the recruiting and scouting.

Before joining the Kansas staff, Frederick coached at Coffeyville Junior College for the 1970-71 season and compiled an impressive 21-9 win-loss record.

Bob played his college ball at Kansas during the 1960 and 1961 seasons but had to sit out his senior year because of a knee injury.

Bob graduated from Kansas in 1962 with a major in chemistry and two years later received a master's in educational administration.

Starting a coaching career in the prep ranks in 1964, Frederick coached two years at Rich Central in Olympia Fields, Ill., and four years at Russell, Kansas, before stepping up to the Coffeyville job in '70-71.

Frederick's over-all high school coaching record for six years was 71-49.

Bob is a native of Glendale, Missouri, a St. Louis suburb, and he was graduated from Kirkwood High School in 1958.

During his coaching stay at Kansas, Bob met and married Miss Margaret Wallet. They are expecting their first child soon after the season starts.



COURTNEY LEISHMAN

COURTNEY LEISHMAN, as an assistant to head coach Glenn Potter, has duties that go beyond heading the junior varsity program. He assumed the JV position after an impressive record of 35 wins against 16 defeats as head frosh mentor. He also takes charge of the academic eligibility for all players and assists with scouting and recruiting chores.

After graduating from Utah State in 1958, Courtney launched his coaching career at Malad High in Idaho. During his three-year stay in Malad he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1961 he came to BYU where he obtained his master's degree. The next year Leishman accepted the head coaching position at BY High, in Provo, and spent seven seasons there.

While coach of the BY High Wildcats, his basketball teams won or placed second in the region all but one year, even though the school had a relatively small student body. Courtney's over-all basketball record at BY High was 82 wins against 31 defeats.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Leishman graduated from South Cache High in 1950. He is married to the former Virginia "Pat" Humphreys, and they have four children: Kathy Lee (16), Jearlene (14), Mike (7), and Richard (3).

# president



**DR. DALLIN H. OAKS, President**

Brigham Young University's president is 42-year-old Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who assumed office Aug. 1, 1971. President Oaks, former professor of law at University of Chicago, replaced Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who served as president of BYU for a period of 20 years (1951-1971).

President Oaks was born in Provo, Utah (Aug. 12, 1932) a son of the late Dr. Lloyd E. Oaks and Stella H. Oaks. He graduated from BYU in 1954 with high honors, receiving the B.A. degree in accounting and economics. At University of Chicago Law School he received the Doctor of Jurisprudence degree in 1957, graduating cum laude, second in a class of 86, and was named to the Order of the Coif. He was also editor-in-chief of the University's Law Review in 1956-57.

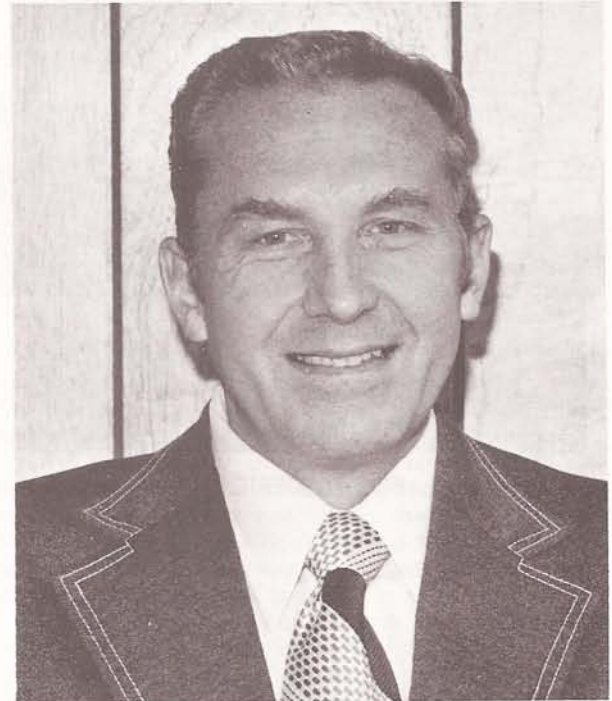
He began an illustrious legal career as law clerk to the Chief Justice of the United States, Earl Warren. A year later he entered private law practice in Chicago (Kirtland, Ellis, Hodson, Chaffetz and Masters). In 1961 he became associate professor of law at Chicago University, and was associate dean from May 1962 to January 1963, serving as dean during the last three months of this period. He was also Assistant United States Attorney of Cook County (1964) and visiting professor of law at University of Michigan Law School (1968).

From January through June 1970 he was on leave of absence to serve as legal and research adviser to the Bill of Rights Committee of the Illinois Constitutional Convention. He became executive director of the American Bar Foundation (1970).

President Oaks has been co-editor, co-author, or author of four books dealing with subjects of church and state, trust laws, operation of criminal courts in Chicago. He has also authored about 30 articles in leading periodicals and other magazines.

An active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he served as first counselor in the presidency of the Chicago Stake (district) and was formerly mission president in Chicago Stake.

He married June Dixon of Spanish Fork, Utah, and they have five children: Sharmon, Cheri, Lloyd, Dallin and TruAnn.



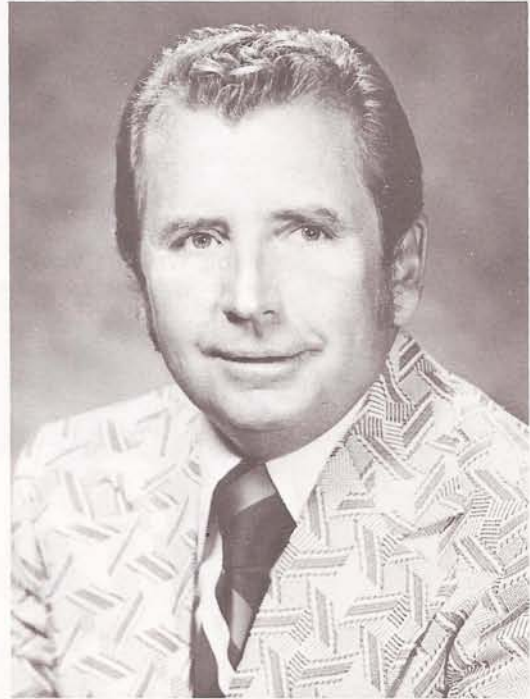
**DR. CLAYNE R. JENSEN, Dean**

A new administrator will be overseeing the Cougars' athletic program when the 1974-75 school year begins this fall . . . Dr. Clayne R. Jensen will be the new dean, replacing Dr. Milton F. 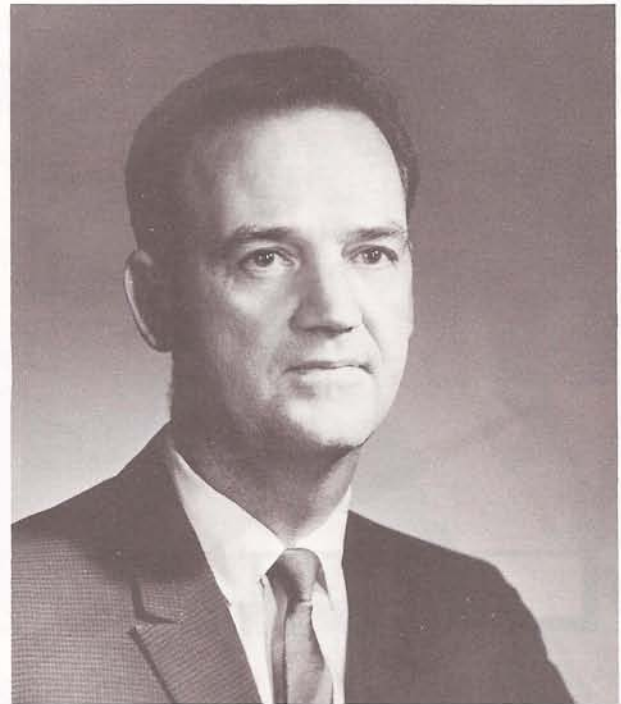


**STAN WATTS, Athletic Chairman**

If anyone on the Provo campus deserves the athletic title of "Mr. BYU," it's Stan Watts, the Cougars' athletic chairman until three years ago when he elected to retire from coaching. Stan was a man wearing two hats . . . his basketball teams won back-to-back WAC championships (1971-72) before Watts decided to spend full time directing Cougar athletic affairs . . . although he has coached football, baseball, track and basketball in his 25 years at BYU, Stan is identified most with the cage game where he coached BYU teams for 23 years . . . he also served as assistant director of athletics and acting director of athletics, taking over the chairman duties in the summer of 1970 . . . born August 30, 1911 in Murray, Utah . . . son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Watts . . . attended Murray High (1928), was an all-around athlete at Weber State (class of '36), and won letters in several sports at BYU (class of '38) . . . began coaching career at Millard High (1938-41) where one of his top players was Clarence Robison, now BYU track coach . . . was A.D. and cage coach at Dixie College (1941-45) . . . coached three sports at Jordan High (1945-47) . . . joined the athletic staff at BYU in 1947, coaching baseball, track, and assisted in football and basketball . . . replaced Floyd Millet as head basketball coach (1949) . . . his teams have won two NIT titles ('51 and '66), eight conference championships . . . his overall basketball record is 431-260 . . . assistant director of athletics (1949) . . . former president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (1969-70) . . . member of NCCA rules committee . . . author of "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball" . . . married Emily Kelly August 21, 1939 . . . four children: Mrs. Dennis (Janice) Jones, Mrs. Richard (Susan) Coon, Judy and Howard Watts . . . phone 373-8156.

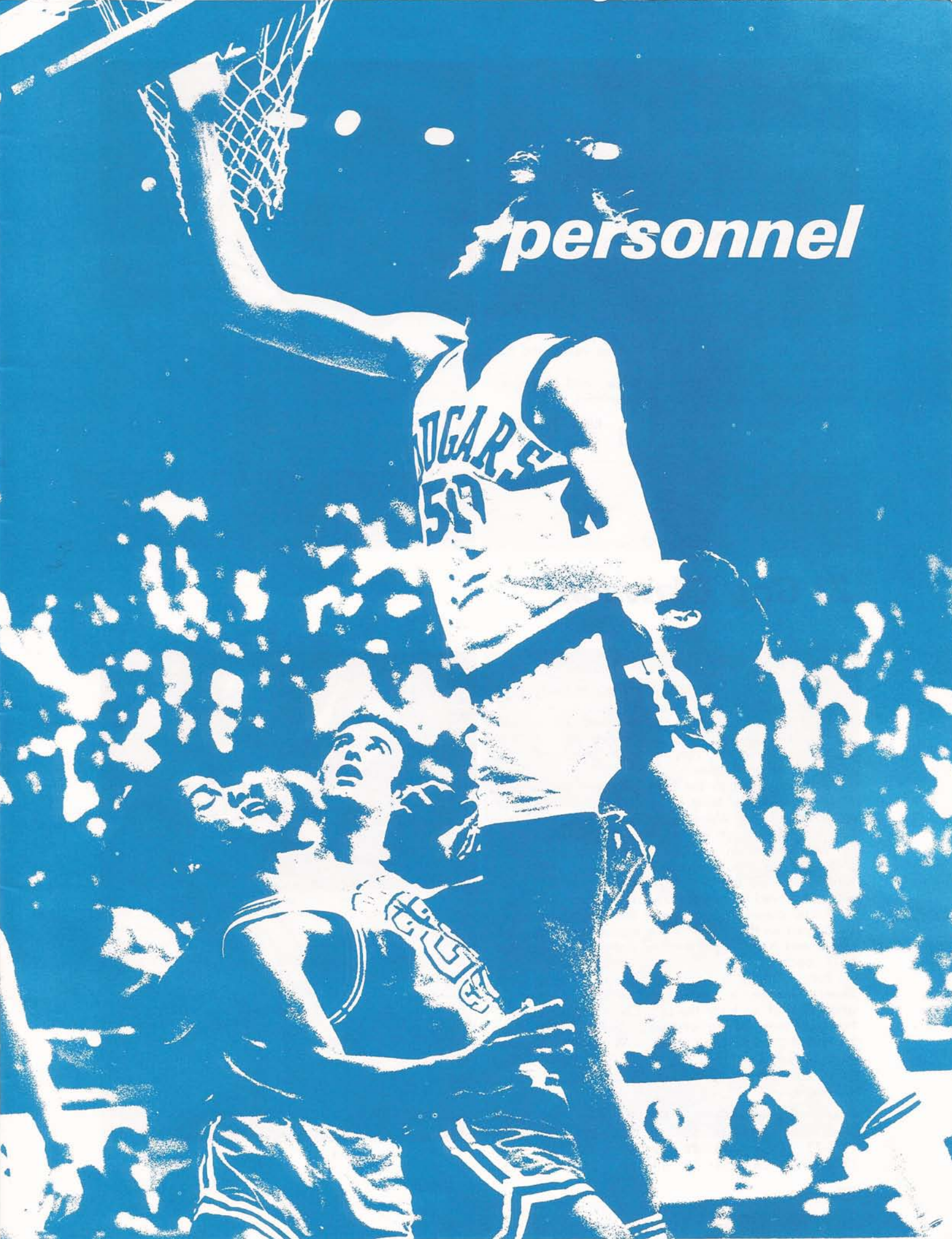

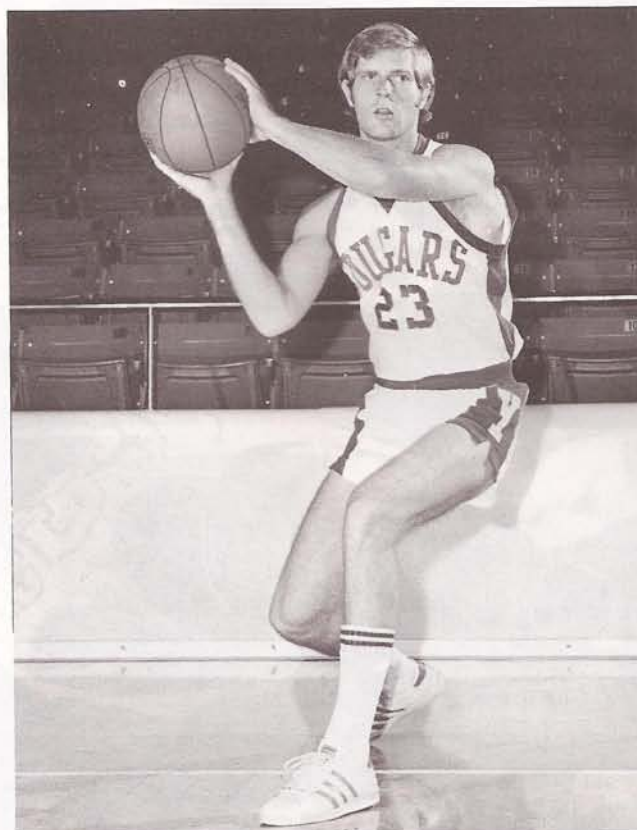

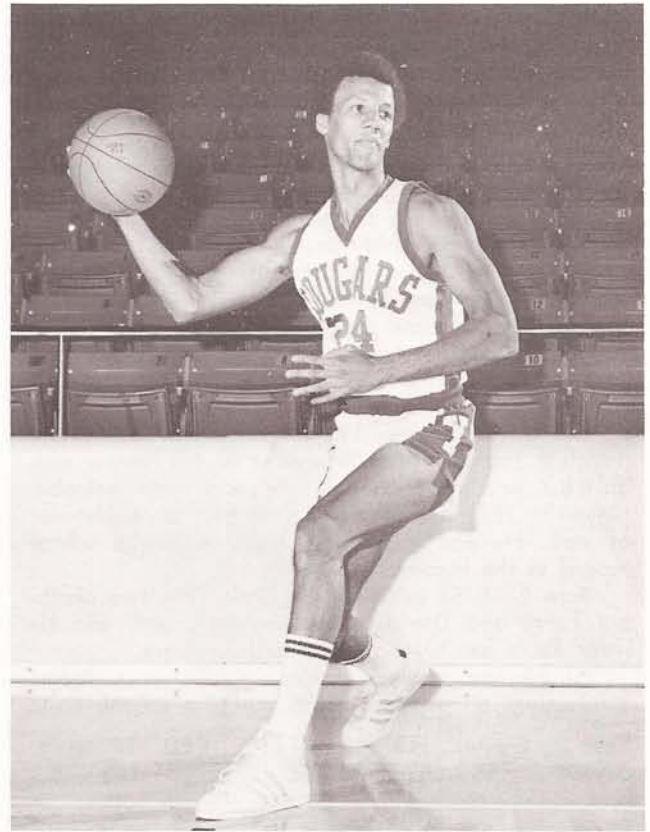

While there are many fine things that could be said about Veryl, one of the finest tributes is that the coaching staff considers him a first-class competitor. And that may say it all.

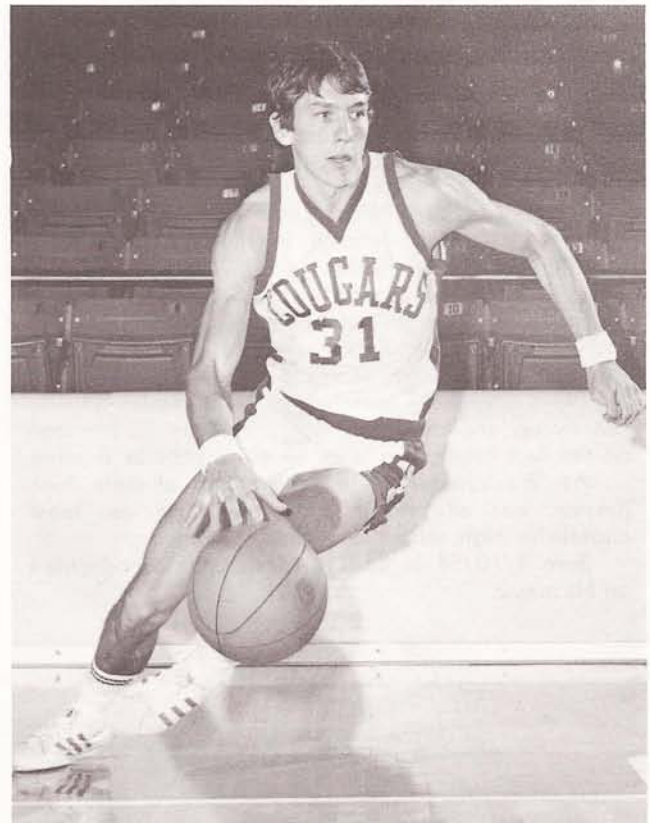

# 1973-74 review

The 1973-74 basketball season at BYU was . . .  
. . . the year BYU won its opening game and final game on a last-second pressure shot by Doug Richards.  
. . . the year half of the varsity squad members were freshmen.

. . . the year senior guards Doug Richards and Belmont Anderson scored over 900 points between them.

. . . the year the Cats won nearly as many games on the road (five) as they did at home (six), and in one stretch played 12 of 13 games on the road.

Of course, the season will probably be remembered for more, but these items are among the first to come to mind in summary of Coach Glenn Potter's second season as head coach of the Cougars.

In retrospect, the Cougars' 11-15 record and sixth-place finish in the WAC was just about where the experts figured BYU would finish this season.

Last-second shots by Doug Richards got the Cougars over the hump in one-point wins over Weber State and Idaho State in the season openers. But the youthful team then dropped six of its next seven games after the opening victories at home.

The low point in the season had to be the Cats' 96-52 loss to nationally-ranked Indiana in the opening round of the Far West Classic. And the high point came shortly after in El Paso, where the Cougars upset Texas-El Paso, 62-58, in the WAC opener.

Offensively, the Cougars' 97 points against Denver was the top scoring effort of the season. Defensively, three teams scored 100 or more points against the Cougars, including a 118 by Arizona in the game at Tucson. And the offensive-defensive spread for the season was a minus 6.4 points.

Individually, veterans Doug Richards and Bill Anderson carried the attack with scoring averages of 20.3 and 14.4 for the season. They were the only players to sport averages in double figures. Richards was high point for BYU in all but ten games.

Freshman Mark Handy (6-9) was the leading rebounder on the team with 8.7 per game. Handy was also third in scoring with 9.8 points per game.

Sophomore Troy Jones had the best field goal average of the regulars (56%), while Richards' free throw percentage (81%) was the best of the year.

Richards' efforts over the past three years boosted him in the record books. His career total of 1,218 points places him among the top five scorers in BYU basketball history, and his scoring average this past season (20.3) places him fourth among top Cougar scorers for one season.

As for attendance, the Cougars played before 272,855 this season. At ten home games, BYU drew 162,510, or an average of 16,251 fans per game; the highest in the conference, and among the highest in the country. BYU also drew record crowds to the games played in the facilities at Logan and Salt Lake City.

## wac basketball: a byu success story

In the 12 years since the formation of the Western Athletic Conference, Brigham Young University has become the foremost basketball power in the league. The 12 year record of the WAC supports this position.

A comparison of the WAC basketball teams and records during this period brings out some interesting points: (a) the ups and downs of some teams, which is a somewhat natural consequence, and (b) the closeness of competition over the long haul, which is indicative of a well balanced basketball program within the conference.

### CHAMPIONSHIPS WON

During the 12 years the WAC has been functioning, Brigham Young University has won or shared the championship five times. Starting in 1965, the Cougars have either won outright or shared the crown every other year; 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971, and 1972. In winning outright titles back to back in 1971 and 1972, the Cougars established a conference first. Arizona State has won two titles outright and shared one. New Mexico has won two and shared one. Wyoming has

shared the title twice, and Utah has one undisputed championship. Texas-El Paso won the title its first year as a member of the league (1970). Arizona and newcomer Colorado State are the only schools in the conference who haven't cracked the winner's circle.

### OVERALL RECORDS

BYU also claims the best win-loss record during this period. Through the ins and outs the Cougars have been able to compile a 84-56 mark. A winning percentage of .600.

## WAC HOME-ROAD RECORD

In the minds of many basketball buffs the real test of any team should be the home-road records over the 12 year pull. Here again the Cougars carry the edge among the six original members of the WAC. BYU has won more home games (59) and more road games (25) than any team in the league. Road wins have been notoriously hard to come by in the WAC, yet the Cougars have won over one-half of their road games in the conference play.

## OFFENSE, SCORING MARGIN

The Cougars have also established themselves in the area of offense. BYU has led the WAC in scoring five different years (1963, 1964, 1965, 1967, and 1972). They also hold the WAC season scoring average at 92.4 in 1967. The single game records include BYU's 62 points in one half (against Utah in 1966) and the .956 free throw percentage (22-23) against Wyoming last year.

## A BACK TO BACK SEASON

In winning the 1972 Western Athletic Conference championship the Cougars turned in one of the best balanced performances in the history of the league. BYU led the conference in field goal percentage (.489), offensive average (81.0), free throw percentage (.723) and scoring margin (+9.3 per game). The Cougars also finished third in rebound percentage (.523) and third in team defense (71.7).

The Cougars' 12-2 league record in 1972 was also the most wins ever by a team in WAC play. They set additional record for most road wins in one season (5), most consecutive wins in one season (8) and most consecutive road wins over a two-year period (6).

## COUGAR BASKETBALL POPULAR

1972 was the opening season for Cougar basketball in the mammoth Marriott Center (capacity approximately 22,700) and more people turned out to watch BYU play than ever before. In 12 home games the Cougars attracted a total of 261,815 fans for an average of 21,818 per game. In all, BYU played before a total of 357,287 spectators for an average of 14,434 per contest.

The main press area is located on the playing floor while the radio and scouting booths are on the concourse level.

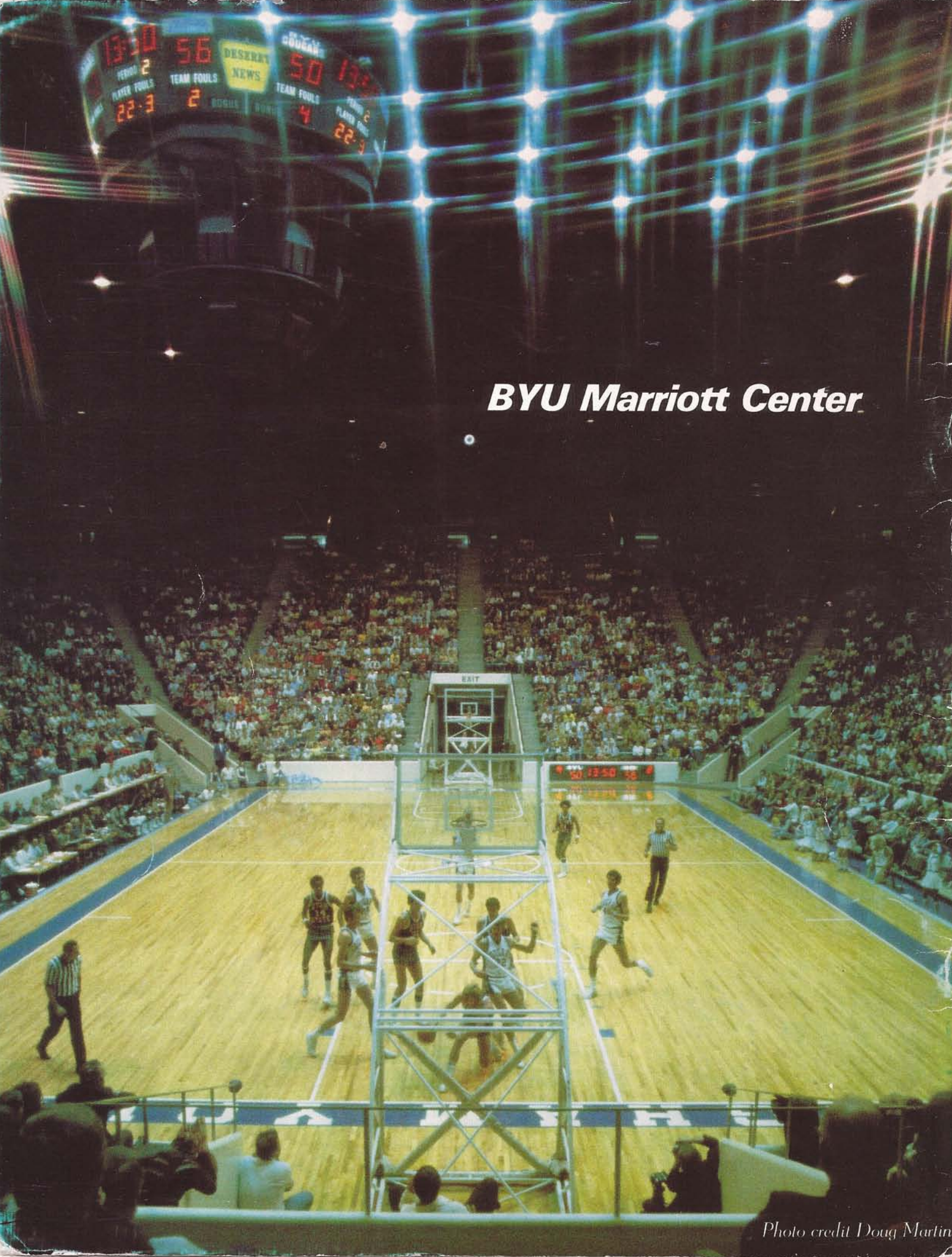
