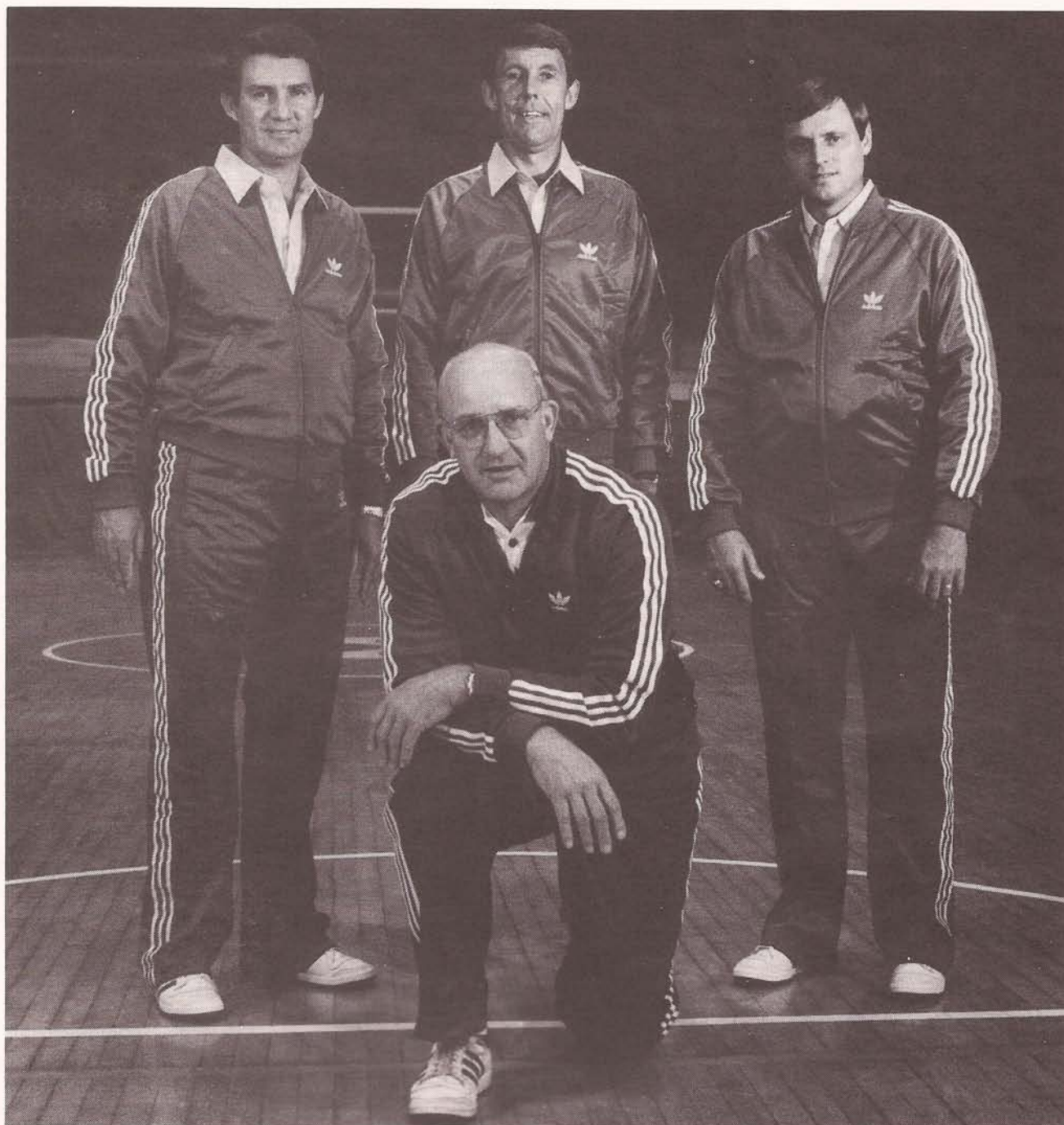

The Marriott Center

This season, more than three million fans will have attended BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center, the nation's second largest on-campus basketball facility.

The Marriott Center's seating capacity is listed as 22,700, but crowds as large as 23,106 have filled the arena to watch the Cougars' run-and-gun style of basketball.

Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball, is larger. The 23,000-seat Rupp Arena is used by Kentucky for its home games, but the facility is owned by the city of Lexington.

Last year was the fourth straight season attendance averaged above 20,000 fans. The largest average per-game attendance for one season was 22,506 during the 1980-81 season. Once again, ticket sales look promising for this, the first year of the Ladell Andersen era.

A new look in the Marriott Center will be a new scoreboard/message center. The four-sided board will have capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd.

In its planning stages, the Marriott Center was to be located as close to the center of campus

as possible; it had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities; and it had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

Founded in 1875 and dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University strives to prepare its students for successful professional careers and personal lives by providing a proper balance between academia and religious instruction.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest privately owned university in the country.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the university's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

Utah Valley, located approximately 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, provides the backdrop for the 646-acre BYU campus. The 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range rises immediately to the east of the campus, and Utah Lake can be seen only a few miles to the west.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements

and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nonmormons come from over 25 other denominations, and around 22 percent of the student body is married. The Provo campus is also very cosmopolitan, with students coming from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a two-year mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

Of the ethnic groups on campus, the American Indians have the largest representation, numbering more than 500 and coming from 61 tribes. There are also Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs, and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The university is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

How would you describe your coaching philosophy?

I have always given a great deal of importance to the teaching of fundamentals, to the point I think practice and preparation are our most important products. Then, adding to that, motivating my players or team towards a winning attitude. I believe in a fundamentally sound team. So a great deal of emphasis will be placed on teaching fundamentals, as we build our attack both defensively and offensively. I believe in the attack type of an offense where we are putting offensive and defensive pressure on our opponents, where we stress changing ends of the court. One of our goals will be to improve steadily. We will motivate ourselves daily towards a success pattern and a commitment to winning. Any success I have had over the years has come about as a direct result of teamwork. Teamwork fosters unselfishness.

What are some of the attractions that brought you back into college coaching?

I've always enjoyed coaching and have had a certain degree of success. And, frankly, I have missed it for some time. The opportunity to coach at Brigham Young University gives me the chance to do what I've been trained to do, along with being surrounded by outstanding young men with which to work. Given my background and desire, it would have been foolish to turn this opportunity down.

What is your general evaluation of the Cougar talent for 1983-84?

We have a team that has good shooting talent, led by one of the best basketball players in the country in Devin Durrant. We are only average in overall size, and we need to improve our defense.

What are the strengths and weaknesses for this year's club?

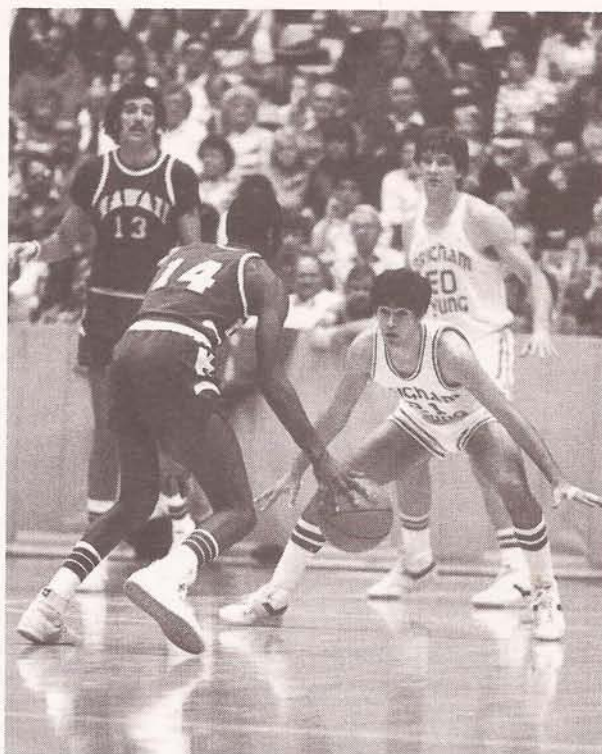
The strengths are our shooting abilities. Our weaknesses would be defense and, in some areas, we lack quickness and speed, as well as experience at the center position.

What is your evaluation of the recruits, and will they figure in this year's overall picture?

Our recruits are outstanding young men. Mike Smith is one of the most touted young players to enter college this year. We are looking forward to working with him to continue his progress. Carl Pollard will be the tallest man I've ever coached, and I'm looking forward to that challenge. Alan Astle and Mike Girardi also have outstanding potential.

Looking at the team by position, what are your greatest concerns?

Our biggest concerns at this point are: from the offensive standpoint, replacing Greg Kite

and Gary Furniss in the power, middle position with a couple of inexperienced players; solidifying our guard situation; sustaining the outstanding play of Devin Durrant and Brett Applegate; and having our entire team adjust to a new coach.

What adjustments will be made at center to compensate for the loss of Greg Kite?

We hope that Jim Usevitch and Carl Pollard will come along quickly so that they can be used effectively to take up the loss of Greg Kite in the center position. There also is a possibility of using more of a three-forward attack offensively. But I'm basically more concerned about the defensive aspect, when it comes to our center position.

How would you compare Devin Durrant with other All-America calibre players you have coached?

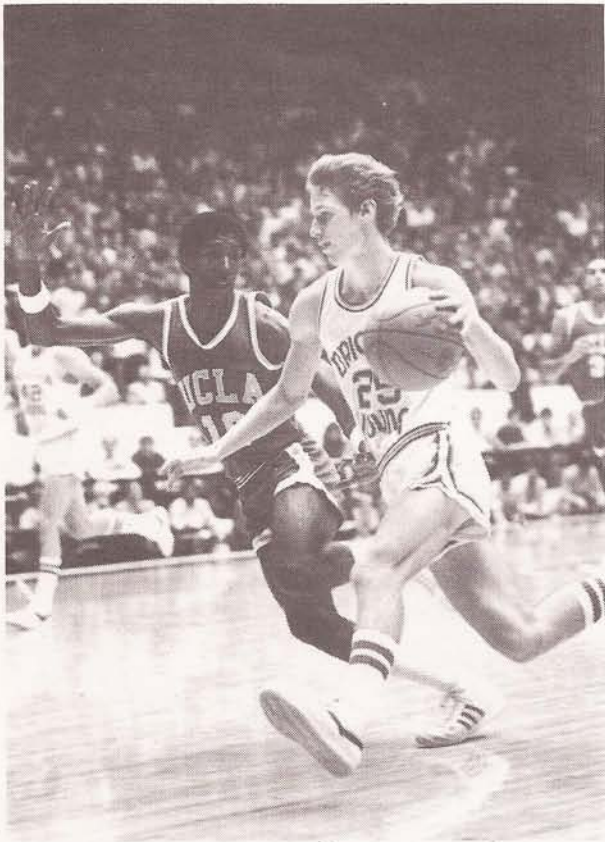
Devin Durrant will be one of the great players I will ever have the opportunity to coach.

What will the Cougars have to do for a successful season?

The Cougars will have to be a well-conditioned team, will have to be fundamentally sound, will have to play great defense, and will have to have a winning attitude.

Looking at the schedule, what is the biggest challenge?

Our schedule is definitely one of the outstanding schedules in the country. We play

many NCAA Tournament teams of last year, starting with Utah State at Logan for our opener on the road. In addition to our WAC schedule, we play several outstanding teams in UCLA, Notre Dame, and Georgetown.

Which teams do you see as the main contenders for the WAC championship?

Based on my limited knowledge of the league at this point, the contenders are UTEP and San Diego State, with most of their outstanding players back. I would also like to think that we will be one of the contenders before the season is over.

What is your assessment of the WAC Post-Season Tournament?

The WAC Post-Season Tournament is a very exciting event and a step forward in creating interest for our league. Most leagues in the country have a post-season tournament, and that tournament leading up to the NCAA national event will put a spotlight on the WAC. And I doubt it will detract in any significant way from the league games; in fact, it may prove to attract late-season interest in those teams which have gotten off to a slow start, knowing that they still have the post-season tournament to look towards. I think it will keep the interest high in all of the communities in our league, and we certainly are looking forward to it.

New BYU head coach Ladell Andersen approaches this basketball season the same as any other in his veteran career.

And if Andersen's record is any testament, the Cougars should have another productive year. Andersen says he has never promised any player a starting job, but his work will be cut out quickly because of "the toughest schedule I have ever faced in college or pro basketball," according to the 54-year-old mentor who posted a 176-95 record in 10 seasons at Utah State.

The former USU and Utah Stars coach will have some excellent players from last year's 15-14 Western Athletic Conference tri-championship squad as a nucleus. Seniors Devin Durrant, the WAC player-of-the-year, and Brett Applegate, second-team All-WAC, lead the pack and can fill the hoop in a hurry.

Durrant, the 12th leading returning scorer in the NCAA, played on the U.S. bronze medal team at the World University games in Canada and has drawn accolades from several coaches around the nation for his offensive baseline fitness. He led the WAC in scoring last season even though he had been away from basketball the previous two years while serving an LDS church mission.

Applegate, a former junior college All-American, gained increased confidence as the '82-'83 season progressed. He led the Cougars in WAC rebounding and had several double-figure scoring performances as well.

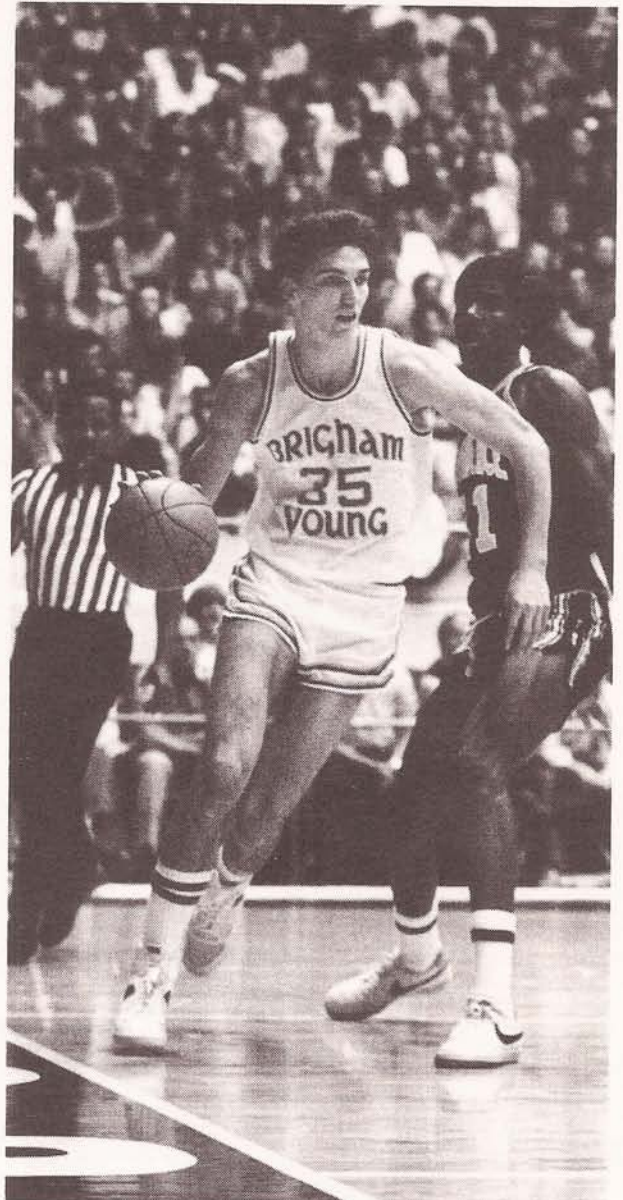
Durrant and Applegate appear to be solid again, so the Cougars will have less worry in the forward slots with backup help from seniors Timo Saarelainen and Kevin Nielsen. Highly-touted freshman Mike Smith, 6-8½ also figures in the picture. Smith was one of the top front court recruits in the country and elected to play basketball rather than quarterback football.

"We are as good a shooting team as I have coached in college," says Andersen. "But this is the toughest schedule I've ever coached against."

In addition to strong conference and in-state opponents, BYU will play Georgetown, UCLA, Notre Dame, and Virginia Commonwealth, all among the top-rated teams in the country. If the December tournament pairings sway a certain way, the Cougars could also play nationally-ranked Kentucky or Lamar.

Kentucky and Georgetown are the top two teams in the NCAA according to *The Sporting News'* pre-season poll. BYU could meet the Wildcats in the Kentucky Invitational and the Cougars will meet Georgetown in a nationally-televised game on CBS in February. Also in February BYU will host Notre Dame for the first time ever in Provo.

Andersen inherits a talent-laden backcourt with underclassmen Scott Sinek, Marty Perry, Chris Nikchevich, and Brian Taylor each of whom had starting time last season. Other

guards vying for time will be sophomores Richie Webb and Paul Drecksel, along with freshmen Allen Astle and Mike Girardi.

The Cougars will be hoping for development in the center position where sophomore Jim Usevitch, 6-9, or Carl Pollard, at 7-2 the tallest Cougar ever, will be competing.

"While we have lots of experience at guard, we have no experience at center," says Andersen. "Our pivot depends on Pollard and Usevitch. If they don't come along, then we will have to develop a forward-type attack."

Andersen told reporters when he was hired last April that he plays an attack-type offense and hard-nosed defense. Among the departed lettermen are center Greg Kite, the top draft of the Boston Celtics; power forward Gary Furniss; and juniors Bob Capener (6-4) and Von Alleman (6-9) who both opted for LDS church missions.

Head Coach Ladell Andersen

When BYU hired Ladell Andersen it got a proven winner.

The 54-year-old Andersen has been described as likeable, organized, respected and knowledgeable. But perhaps Ladell summed it up best when he said, "Coaching is what I love and do best. It's almost as if I was prepared for this time at BYU."

Andersen brings a rich heritage as a coach, administrator and a player in becoming BYU's 12th basketball coach. The Malad, Ida., native replaced Frank Arnold who resigned after last season.

Andersen served 10 years as Utah State University Athletic Director before coming to BYU, but kept pace with basketball in many ways. From 1977-1982 he served on the prestigious NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee. At USU he championed the Aggies entry into the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

In 1981 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame.

From 1970-72 he guided the Utah Stars of the American Basketball Association to two western division titles and coached the ABA all-stars both years.

His 115-53 (.685) record with the Stars was the winningest two-year mark in league history. Among the many noteables he coached with the Stars were Zelmo Beatty, Ron Boone and Willie Wise.

From 1961-1971 Andersen became the winningest coach in Utah State history with a 176-95 (.649) record. Andersen had six 20-game win seasons at USU, paced by stars like Wayne Estes, Cornell Green, Marv Roberts and Nate Williams.

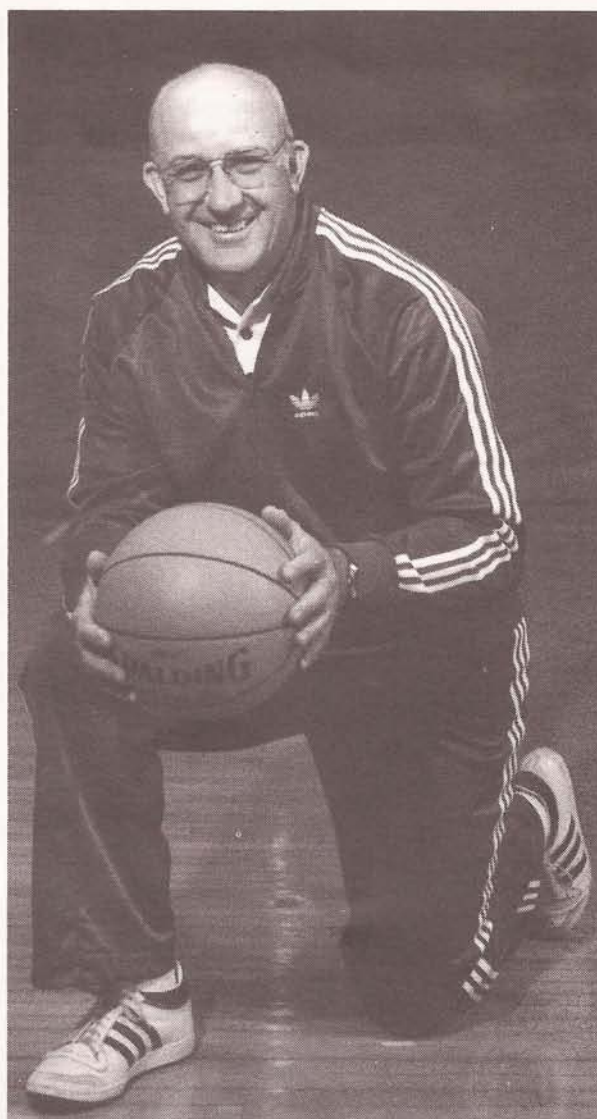
Prior to being named head coach at USU, Andersen was an assistant to Jack Gardner at Utah from 1956-61. At Utah Andersen, a respected golfer, also coached the U of U golf team. Andersen's handicap has been as low as two.

Following his 1952 graduation from Utah State, Andersen played two years of service ball at Sandia, N.M., made the All-fourth Army and All-Service teams and was in the Olympic play-offs at Madison Square Garden. After his service commitment he played with the Denver Bankers in the National Industrial League of the AAU and was all-league.

Ladell entered Utah State on a make-good scholarship basis for the 1947 Aggies. He not only cracked the starting lineup, but became a two-time All-Skyline guard.

Among Andersen's assistants who have gone on to head coaching assignments are Dale Brown, Phil Johnson and Dutch Belnap and many outstanding high school coaches.

Ladell married the former Donna Jensen of Fort Shaw, Mont., in 1951 and they have five sons: Clint (in construction at Mesa, Ariz.), Larry (coaches basketball at Mt. Pleasant), Richie (studies art at BYU), Bob (owns a business mar-

Roger Reid, Assistant Head Coach

Now in his fifth year as a member of the Cougar basketball staff, Roger Reid, a 36-year-old graduate of Weber State ('68) was named assistant coach during the 1978-79 BYU season.

He was a past chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981 he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks. In the five years Reid has been at BYU, the Cougars have won three WAC Championships and averaged 20 wins a year.

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville (Utah) High School where he was student body vice-president and all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South All-Star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU where he was a member of the freshman basketball team and also made the trip to Mexico City with the Cougar baseball team.

Transferring to College of Eastern Utah, Reid was selected as the MVP on the school's baseball team and twice was named to the Junior College All-America team in baseball.

From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years.

Reid spent four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26, and the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

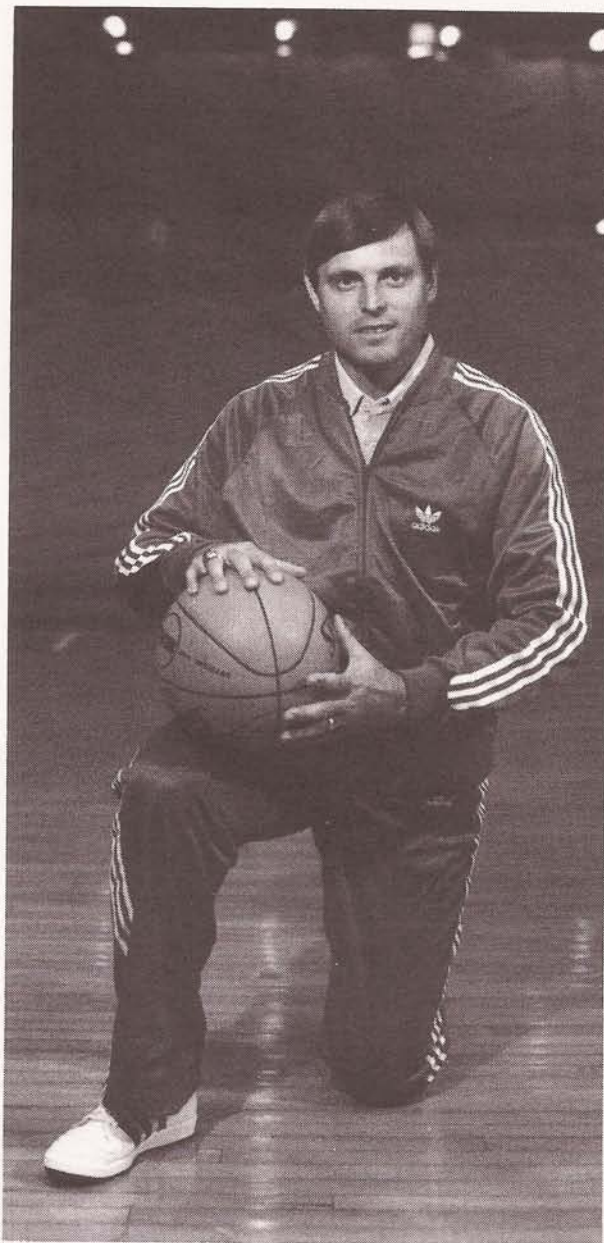
In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years.

Ingersoll graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he was also an assistant football coach for several seasons.

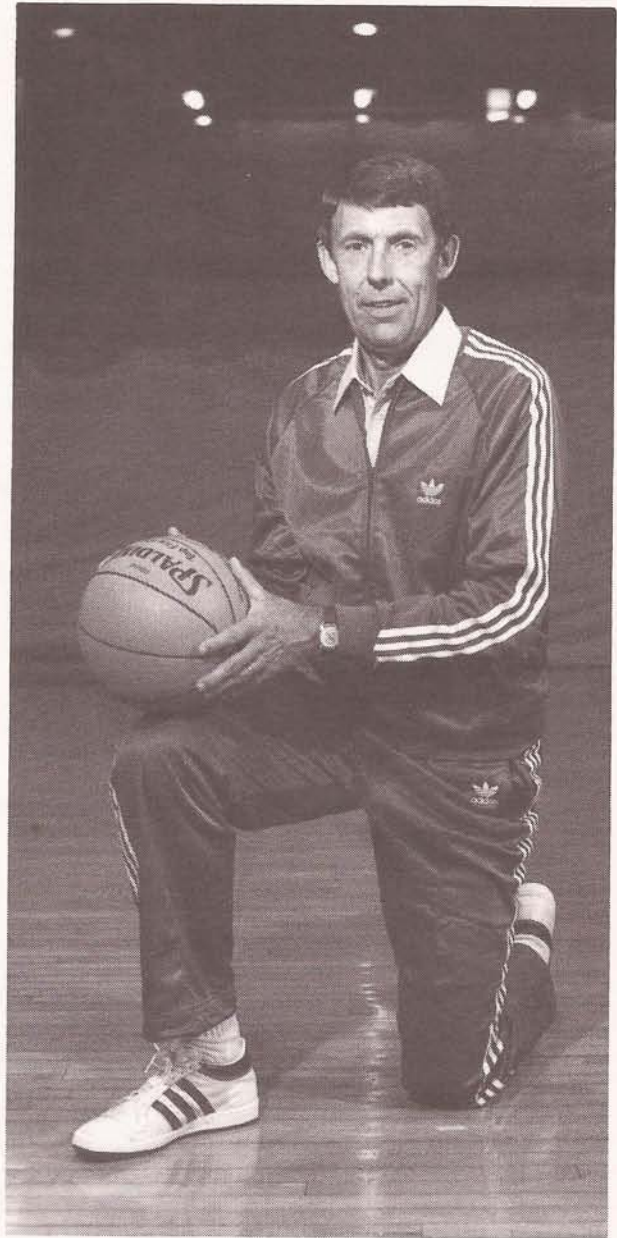

Joel Gardner, former head basketball coach at Mountain View High School in Orem, is BYU's new part-time basketball coach.

Gardner, 40, is a veteran of 15 years coaching in the Utah prep circles with a 225-132 record. He will oversee BYU's junior varsity program as well as helping with the varsity program.

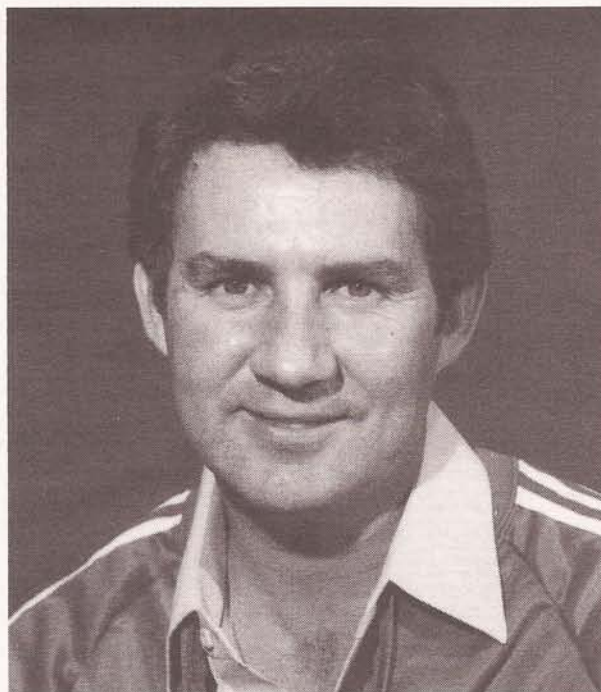
Gardner is on a year's sabbatical leave from Mountain View.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

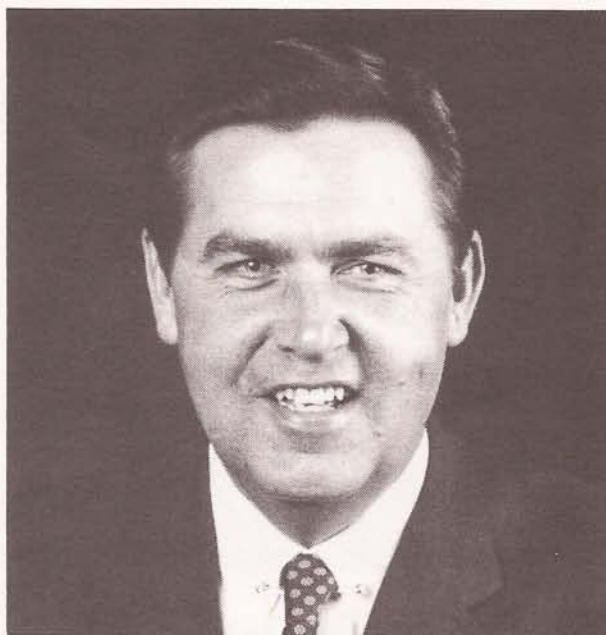
Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland, the ninth president of Brigham Young University, took office Aug. 1, 1980, succeeding Dr. Dallin H. Oaks who now serves as a justice on the Utah Supreme Court.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. He served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain from 1960-62. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion.

The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

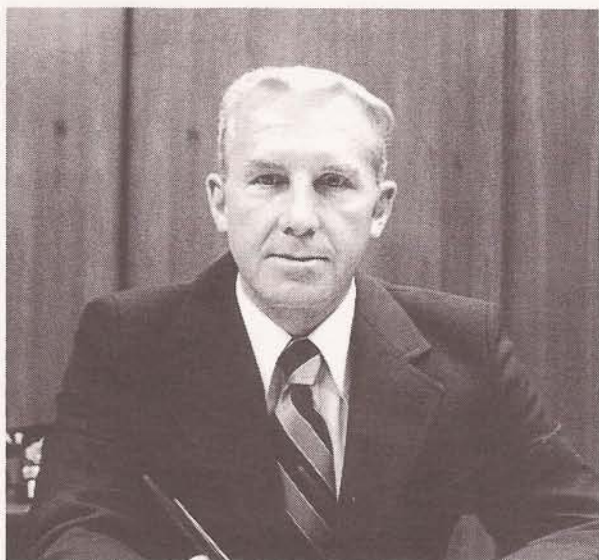


In the LDS Church, he has been a high counselor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Co., the LDS Hospital and Intermountain Health Care, Inc., the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii, Commercial Security Bank Corporation and Commercial Security Bank. He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.





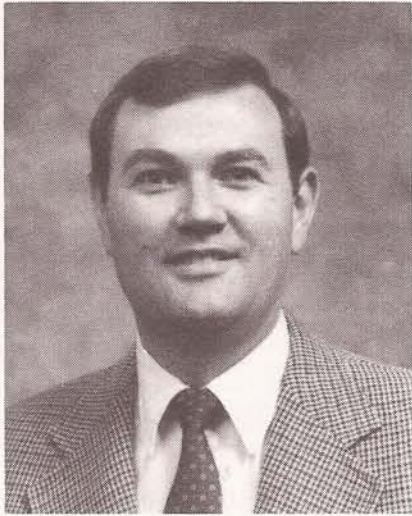
Dr. Clayne R. Jensen **Dean and Faculty** **Representative**

Glen Tuckett **Athletic Director**

There are times when Glen Tuckett makes the task of running a strong, well balanced athletic program look easy . . . whatever his formula for success, the veteran coach and administrator seems to come by his talent naturally . . . in the time he has been Director of Athletics at BYU (July 1, 1976), the Cougars have won the Western Athletic Conference athletic supremacy title six times . . . his latest accolade—the Dale Rex Award—is, in the eyes of Cougar followers, the ultimate athletic honor . . . Tuckett has also been added to BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame . . . Glen has invested himself in the very productive side of athletics . . . as an athlete (amateur and professional), as coach, as a teacher and as an administrator . . . he has brought vigor and vitality to his assignments, and he uses his varied talents to push the wholesome, worthwhile programs in athletics . . . he is acknowledged as one of the foremost leaders in his field . . . Tuckett was the 1977 president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches . . . in January of 1979 he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame . . . at the time of retirement—he was the 9th winningest baseball coach in the NCAA . . . was a color commentator for KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment . . . voted outstanding teacher at BYU . . . obtained his M.S. degree from BYU in 1962, and received his doctorate in 1976 . . . a former Bishop, Tuckett now serves as a counselor in the Edgemont Stake Presidency . . . Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference enters its third decade in 1983 and will attempt to repeat the success of the past 20 years. The league spreads from the 7,000 foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego, Calif. Each of the league's nine members has a distinct personality, and each adds to the flavor of the most geographically diverse conference in the nation.

The biggest change in the league's makeup came in July 1978, when Arizona State and Arizona left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

This year will mark the first time the league will conduct a post-season basketball tournament to decide the conference's participant in the NCAA tournament.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

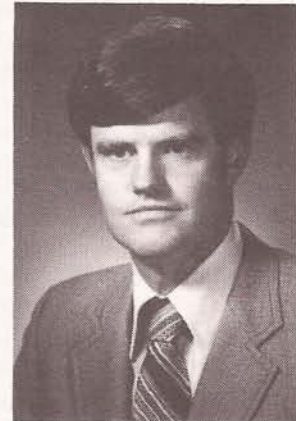
Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his current position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

1982-83 Season Summary

For the first time in the last five years, Brigham Young University wasn't involved in a post-season basketball tournament.

Picked as an also-ran at the start of the season, the Cougars finished the regular season in a three-way tie for the Western Athletic Conference championship. The other two schools to share the WAC title, Utah and UTEP, headed for post-season play, but the season came to an abrupt end for the Cougars.

But BYU's 54-41 win over Wyoming in the season finale pushed the Cougars into the win column where they finished the year with a 15-14 overall record.

Considering the Cougars slow start (0-5), they made an amazing comeback, at one point winning seven-of-nine. In league play the Cougars came on strong to finish with an 11-5 WAC record.

Five of the Cougar losses came against instate rivals; one a double-overtime defeat to Weber, another a triple-overtime to Utah. In two games with Utah, the total point differential with the Utes was five points.

Starting the season with only two seniors aboard, the Cougars experimented with the lineup. All of the candidates on the guard line were either sophomores or freshmen, and that may account for the struggle in the early going.

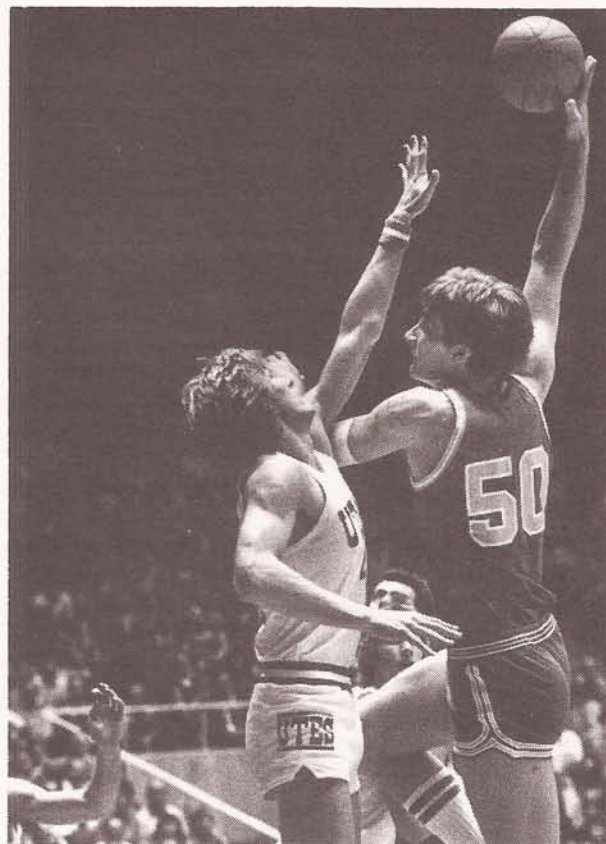
Alo, there is little doubt the Cougars might have fared better with an easier schedule. BYU opened with back-to-back games with UCLA and Iowa, followed later by a number of games against nationally ranked teams. Seven of BYU's opponents were included among the teams invited to the NCAA playoffs; UCLA, Iowa, Utah State, St. John's, Weber State, Princeton and Utah. Another tri-champion, UTEP, was invited to the NIT.

In terms of drawing power, the 1982-83 season was indeed a success. The overall attendance figure, for both home and away, was 437,372, an average of 15,082 fans per game. At home the Cougars fared even better with 303,957 attending 15 home games. BYU's average crowd at home was 20,264 in an arena with a seating capacity of 22,700 seats.

Top draw of the '83 season was the crowd of 23,023 who witnessed the season opener with UCLA.

Individually, junior forward Devin Durrant was clearly the dominant offensive star on the floor and clearly an All-America candidate. Besides leading the WAC in scoring, Durrant shared WAC player-of-the-year honors. In 26 of the Cougars' games, Durrant won or shared highpoint honors for the team. Devin led all vote-getters in the official all-WAC selections, and also received honorable mention All-America. His top effort was 33 points and nine rebounds in the first game with Hawaii.

Senior center Greg Kite was second only to San Diego State's Michael Cage in WAC re-

bounding, but will probably be remembered most by the local fans for his blocked shots. The extended arms of Kite blocked a total of 81 shots by opponents this season, giving him a career high of 208 blocks. His high this past season was eight blocks in one game against New Mexico.

In WAC statistics, junior forward Brett Applegate was third in league scoring (WAC games) with a 15.1 average, and he was .549 from the field. He also averaged 11 rebounds per game in conference play.

Forward Devin Durrant took over the school's free throw records (season), and moved himself up among the school's top career scorers. Devin's 261 free throw attempts and 200 free throws made are both new (season) school records. In addition, his 662 points this past season jumped him into fourth place among career scoring leaders. Devin, who now has 1,419 points, ranks behind Danny Ainge (2,467), Fred Roberts (1,841) and Kresimir Cosic (1,512).

Kite completed his four-year career at BYU with 847 career rebounds, a figure topped by only two players; Alan Taylor and Kresimir Cosic, both of whom hauled down 919 career rebounds. Kite was a first-round draft by the Boston Celtics.

Kite and forward Gary Furniss were the only seniors on the '83 squad. Guard Bob Capener and center Von Alleman accepted church mission calls.

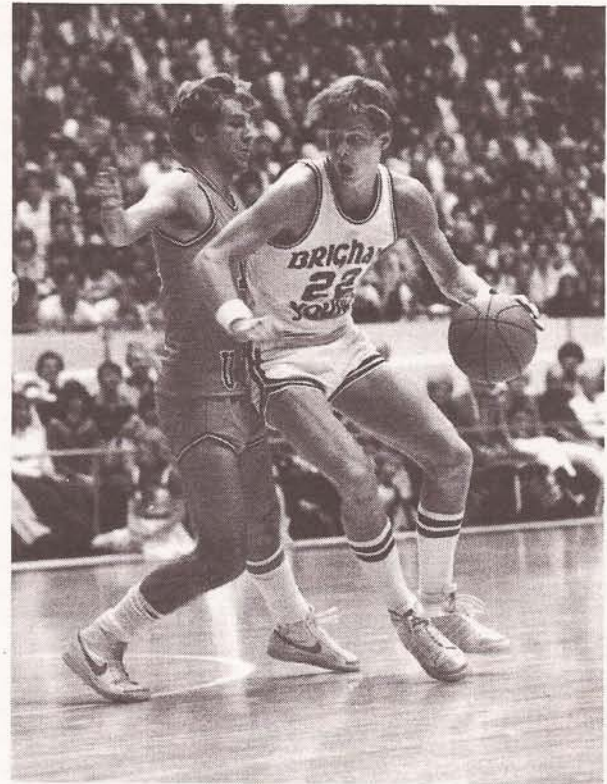

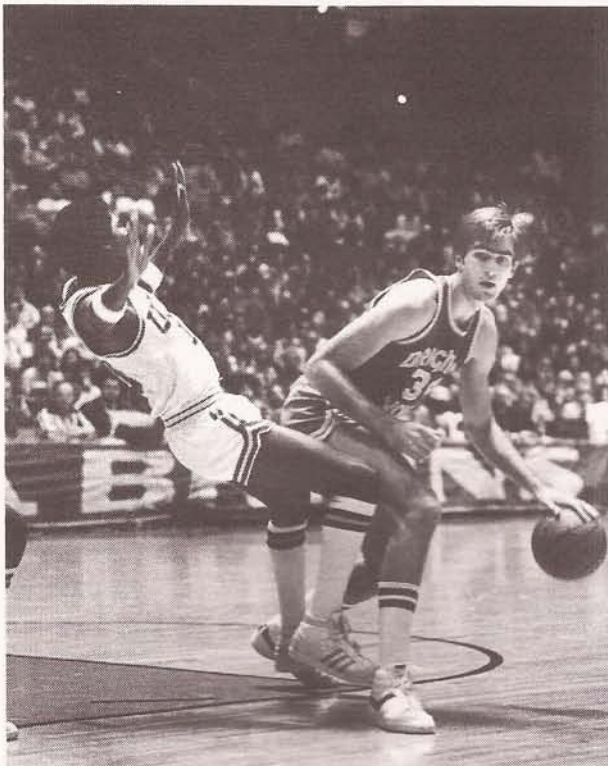

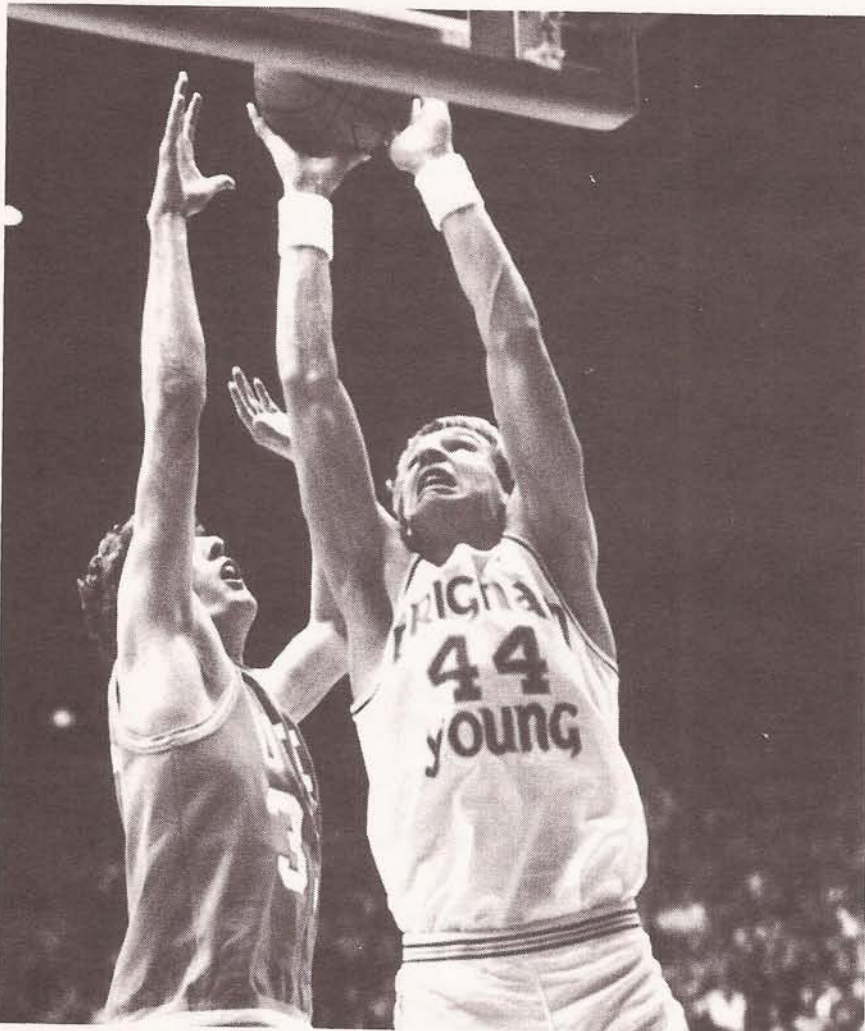

Press row tickets for all home games will be limited to working members of the press, radio, television, visiting information directors, and college scouts.

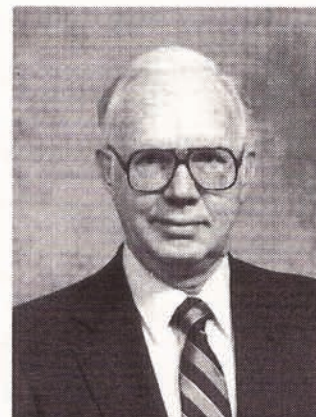
Press passes will be issued on an individual game basis and requests must be received in the Sports Information Office **no later than three days before the game.**
