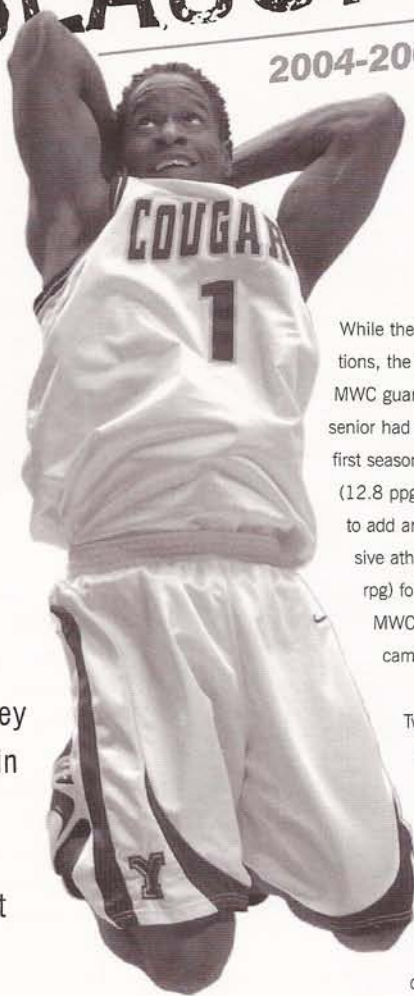
AN INSIDE LOOK AT THE

2004-2005 BYU BASKETBALL SQUAD

The 2004-05 Cougars may be a hard team to predict — having lost seven lettermen, four with significant starting experience, including four-year starter Mark Bigelow and NBA lottery draft pick Rafael Araujo — but with their talent and depth they definitely should not be overlooked in their bid to earn a fourth NCAA Tournament invite in five years and contend for the 2005 Mountain West Conference title.

BYU coach Steve Cleveland lost the services of five of the eight players who played double-digit minutes for him a year ago, including four of his top five scorers, but he returns six lettermen from last year's NCAA Tournament team and adds a top-20 recruiting class to give him significant depth at every position. His young squad, which includes seven sophomores and three freshmen, will be tested by what could prove to be one of the nation's toughest schedules.

"Our nonconference schedule should create great opportunities to prepare for league and postseason play," said Cleveland, whose team will play 16 potential regular-season games against teams that qualified for postseason last year, including four ranked in the top 25 of the final 2004 poll. "The Mountain West Conference is full of veteran teams returning top players. Obviously, we lost a lot of significant contributors from last year, but we plan to be competitive and compete for the conference championship. I want this team to learn to reach its full potential, to focus on being the best it can be. If we do, with this schedule, we'll have a chance to reach our goals in January and February."



While the relative youth of the BYU roster leaves some unanswered questions, the Cougars do have a good idea of what to expect from returning All-MWC guard and MWC Defensive Player of the Year Mike Hall. The 6-foot-3 senior had a knack for having his best outings in BYU's biggest games in his first season in Provo last year while becoming the team's third-leading scorer (12.8 ppg) behind Araujo and Bigelow. During the off-season, he has worked to add an improved outside jumper to his head-turning, get-to-the-hoop offensive athleticism. A versatile defender (1.4 spg) and strong rebounder (3.5 rpg) for his size, Hall should be the Cougars' all-around go-to player as an MWC Player of the Year and All-America candidate in his final college campaign.

Two other players return with starting experience. Senior forward/center Jared Jensen will once again become one of BYU's primary options in the post with the departure of All-American center Araujo. Jensen earned MWC Co-Freshman of the Year honors playing his more natural position of center before playing primarily at the power forward spot the past two seasons with Araujo on the roster. Jensen was an honorable-mention All-MWC pick as a sophomore but saw more limited playing time last season due to injury and the addition of former McDonald's High School All-American Garner Meads. Jensen started eight games in 2003-04 but came off the bench behind Araujo and Meads after missing three contests with a back injury. As a smart defender and good post scorer, Jensen has the potential to have an all-conference season for the Cougars. Meads showed promise in his freshman campaign last year, starting 18 games at power forward. With offseason surgery and a year of experience under his belt, Meads should become a stronger, more consistent force for BYU in 2004-05.

BYU adds six newcomers to the roster who all have the potential to contribute right away. Cleveland signed a recruiting class in November that was rated one of the top-20 classes nationally and the third-best class in the West. BYU received official commitments from top prospects David Burgess (Irvine, Calif.), Chris Miles (Provo, Utah), Trent Plaisted (San Antonio, Texas) and Lee Cummard (Mesa, Ariz.). Cummard, Arizona's 5A Player of the Year who was considered by some experts to be the top prep shooting guard in the West, decided in the spring to serve a two-year mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints before enrolling at

BYU. With Cummond's departure and the loss of starting point guard Luiz Lemes to graduation, the Cougars needed to fill their voids on the perimeter.

BYU added two spring signings in Josh Reisman, a 6-foot-1 junior combo guard from San Jose City College in San Jose, Calif., and Keena Young, a 6-foot-6 sophomore guard/forward from South Plains College in Levelland, Texas. A

third player with junior college experience, 6-foot-3 sophomore guard Sam Burgess, joins the Cougars after returning from a two-year mission. Playing for Snow College (Utah), Burgess led the Scenic West Athletic Conference in three-point accuracy in 2001-02, making 49

percent (95-192) of his long-range attempts.

"I am very excited about this year's recruiting class," Cleveland said. "I believe this group of student-athletes represents a solid foundation for the program's success in the coming years."

Three other lettermen who played on last year's NCAA Tournament team — senior point guard Terry Nashif, sophomore point guard Austin Ainge and sophomore guard Mike Rose — are back along with two additional letterwinners — sophomore center Derek Dawes and sophomore guard Jimmy Balderson — who lettered during the 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons, respectively. Dawes, a 6-foot-11 center, redshirted last season after returning from a two-year mission while Balderson returned from his missionary service in August and is a possible redshirt candidate this season. The roster is filled out by 6-foot-8 junior forward Josh Burgess, who sat out last year after transferring from Irvine Valley College.

POST

BYU will not replace the dominating inside presence of NBA lottery pick Rafael Araujo but with two players returning with starting experience — senior Jared Jensen and sophomore Garner Meads — and the addition of three talented freshman and two players who sat out last season, the Cougar post should be solid in 2004-05. Jensen, the MWC Co-Freshman of the Year in 2002 as the Cougar starter, will get a lot more opportunities to get his hands on

the ball his senior year with the departure of All-American center Araujo. Jensen started only 8 games last year due to injury and the emergence of former McDonald's All-American Meads at power forward. Jensen has started 58 games in three years, playing both post positions. As a good post scorer with soft hands, the 6-foot-9, 250-pounder should be a primary offensive option inside for the first time since his freshman season prior to Araujo's arrival. With his improved shooting range, Jensen will likely see time at both post positions. As an excellent free throw shooter with a total understanding of BYU's defensive system, Jensen will be a valuable component with all-conference capabilities. Another possible starter at center is Derek Dawes. The 6-foot-11 265-pound sophomore center redshirted last year after returning from a mission. His size is a strong plus as a shot blocker and defensive presence. He has a soft shooting touch for a big man with range to the three-point line. Freshman David Burgess, at 6-foot-10 and 265 pounds, is a power post player and strong rebounder. The prized recruit has the talent to be a factor in his first season as he adjusts to the Division I game. Meads returns at power forward after starting 18 games in his freshman campaign. The 6-foot-8 forward has explosive ability and a nice mid-range jumper. He shot 54 percent from the floor and averaged 4.2 points per game while playing through nagging injuries nearly the entire season. He will have good competition for playing time, however, with talented freshman recruits Chris Miles and Plaisted and junior Joshua Burgess pushing for time. Miles and Plaisted both stand 6-foot-11 and have the offensive game to be a threat on the perimeter. Miles is Utah's two-time reigning 4A State MVP out of Timpview High School in Provo. A quick and versatile player, Miles is a tough defender and outstanding shot-blocker. He finished his career at Timpview with nearly 300 blocks, second all-time in the Utah High School record book to former BYU and current NBA center Shawn Bradley. Plaisted is long and athletic and has a nose for making plays.

A good rebounder and shot-blocker, the Texas all-state forward runs the floor well and has a soft south-paw shooting touch to 18 feet. Joshua Burgess practiced with BYU last season after transferring from Irvine Valley College. Older brother of new recruit David Burgess and cousin of Sam Burgess, another Cougar newcomer, Josh is an aggressive rebounder with a nice shooting touch. With his

Bradley. Plaisted is long and athletic and has a nose for making plays.

A good rebounder and shot-blocker, the Texas all-state forward runs the floor well and has a soft south-paw shooting touch to 18 feet. size at 6-foot-8 and 230 pounds, he helps give the Cougars one of the deepest front-courts in the Mountain West Conference.

WINGS

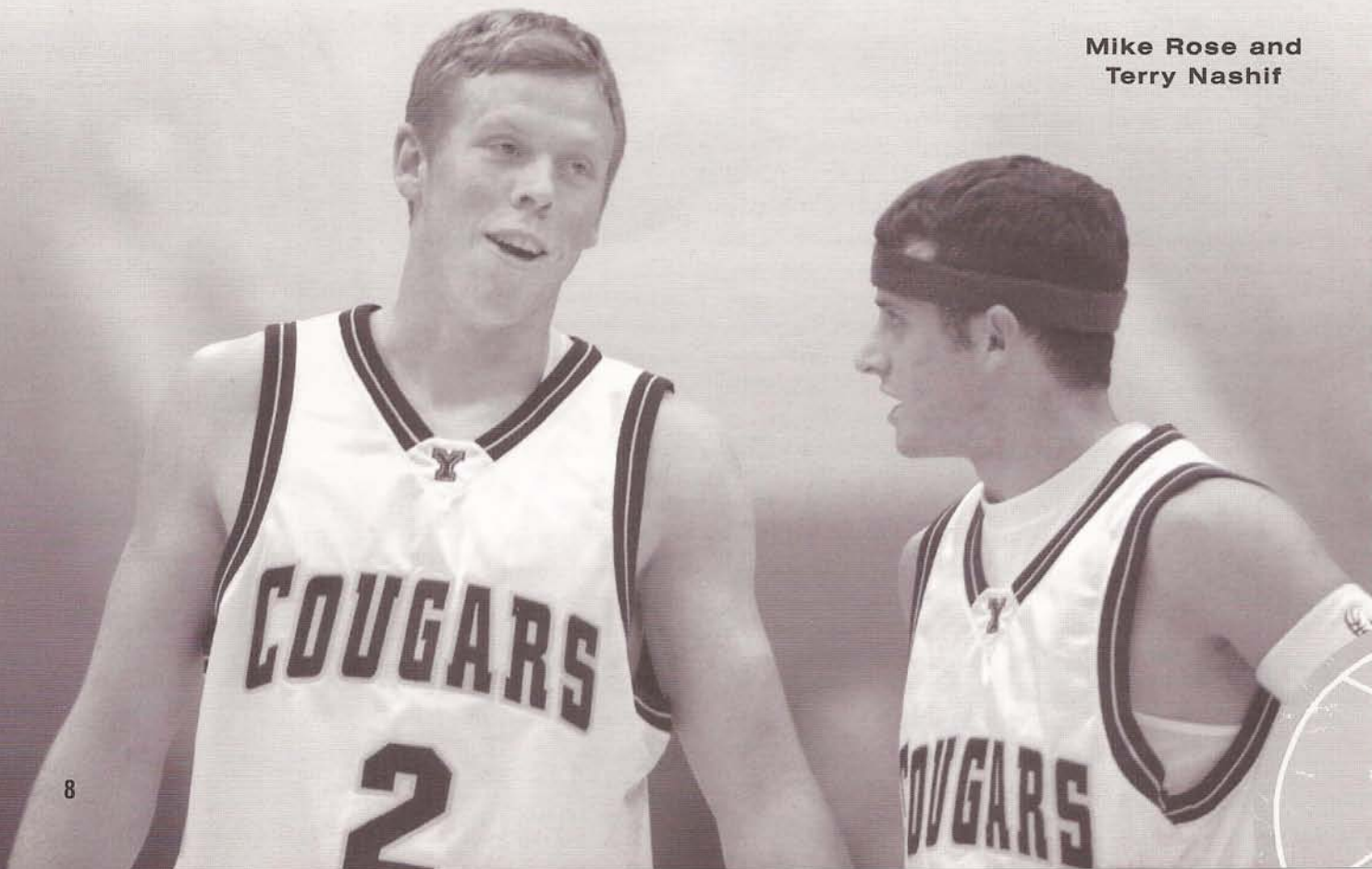
Mike Hall returns for his second season at BYU as the clear-cut starter at one wing position. Sam Burgess is a tough-nosed defender and strong shooter who will likely see some time at the 2-guard position, while sophomore sharpshooter Mike Rose is likely to make a significant impact as an explosive scorer from the perimeter. Getting his shot off is usually not a problem for the 6-foot-2 Rose. A true jump shooter with an exceptional vertical, he has range well behind the three-point arc. Last season in his first game as a college player, he set a BYU record with eight threes. Two other shooters — Reisman and Jimmy Balderson — could factor in at 2-guard. Balderson has good size at 6-foot-6 and averaged 4.0 points per game as a freshman in 2001-02 prior to serving a two-year LDS Church mission. After returning from his mission in August, he could redshirt the season to have time to fully get back into playing condition. The biggest question on the wing for the BYU coaches is determining who will replace four-year starter and career three-point leader Mark Bigelow at the small forward position. Hall could slide over and see time at the 3-position when others are playing shooting guard, especially when the Cougars go with a small lineup. Hall has the strength and quickness to be effective against taller opponents, as he demonstrated last season while guarding everyone from shooting guard to center. Sophomore transfer Keena Young will have the opportunity to earn significant time and could possibly line up opposite Hall as the starter at small forward. While Young does not present as deadly a three-point threat as the departed Bigelow, the 6-foot-6 swingman has Bigelow's size and is a strong rebounder and defender with good mid-range game. Hall and Young have the potential to lock down opponents defensively as perhaps the toughest defensive tandem on the perimeter in the entire conference. Freshman Trent Plaisted, a first-team all-state lefty out of San Antonio, Texas, has the potential at 6-foot-11 to see some time at small forward as he further develops his

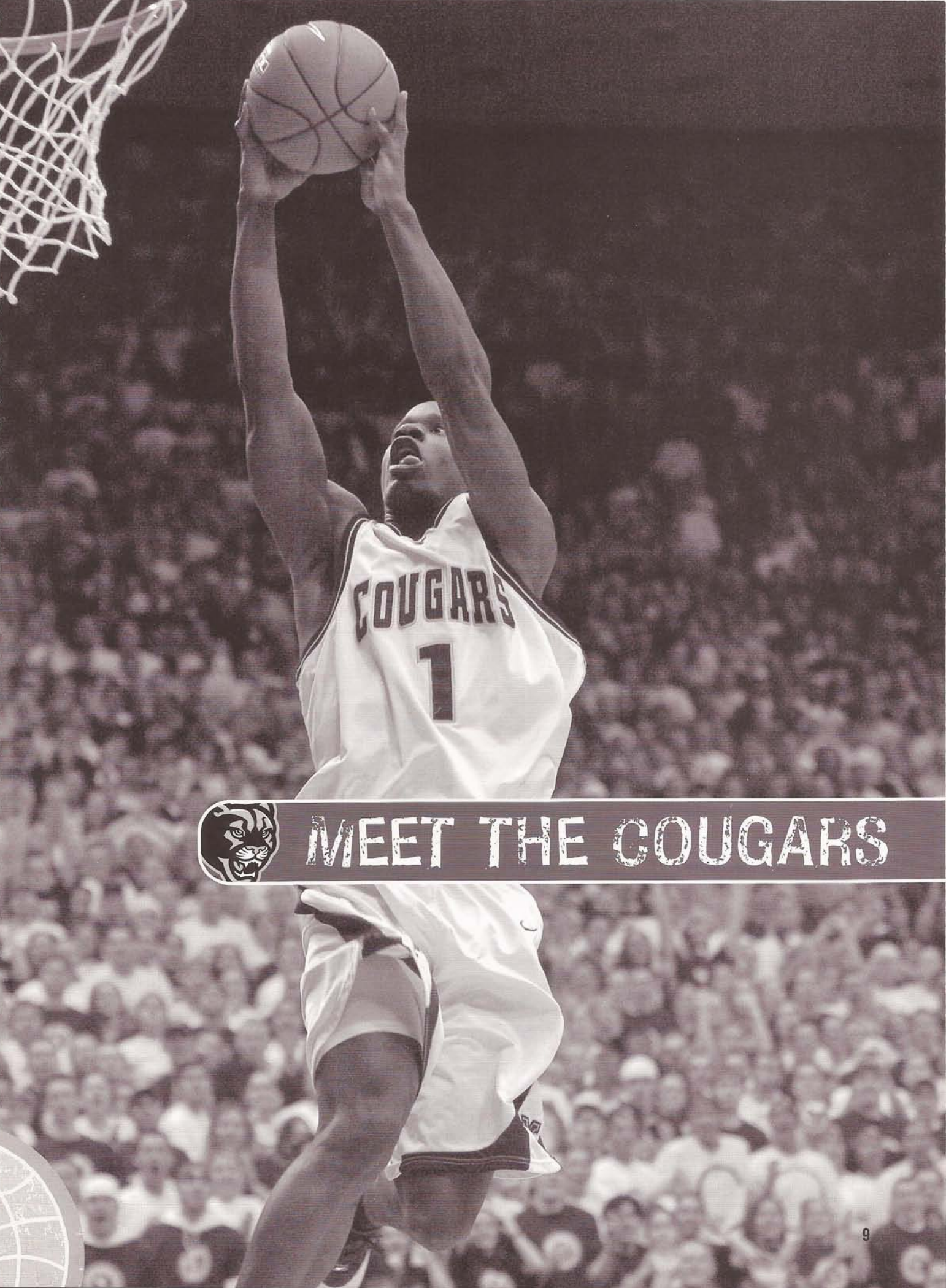
skills on the perimeter, giving Cleveland an option to go with a very big lineup. Balderson could also see some time at small forward.

POINT GUARD

One of the question marks entering the season is who will lead the Cougars with three-year reserve Terry Nashif, sophomore Austin Ainge and junior transfer Josh Reisman likely to compete for starting minutes at point guard. None have the size of departed 6-foot-3 point guard Luiz Lemes, who was the team's unsung hero in many respects last year due to good defensive ability, excellent floor leadership and strong scoring ability when needed, but all three bring solid skills to the floor for coach Cleveland. Nashif is a heady floor leader and excellent ball handler who can knock down the open jumper. What the 5-foot-10 senior lacks in size he will try to offset with good experience as the primary backup behind three different starters in BYU's all-time assist leader Matt Montague, Kevin Woodberry and Lemes. With an outstanding understanding of the game, Ainge possesses a knack for getting his teammates the ball when they can score. With good range on the perimeter, the 6-foot-2 Ainge will make a push to play a significant role in his sophomore season after an injury and limited action last year. Reisman is an excellent shooter who comes to BYU with two years of experience at Gonzaga and most recently San Jose City College. As the 6-foot-1 guard learns the BYU system, he should prove to be a significant addition in 2004-05. Sam Burgess, who returned from a two-year mission in May, joins the Cougars as a sophomore out of Snow College. With his size and shooting ability (49 percent from behind the arc at Snow College), he could also see some opportunities to play the point.

SUMMARY: Jensen is an all-conference candidate who will play a much larger role as a senior with the departure of NBA lottery pick Rafael Araujo. Jensen has played power forward much of the past two years with Araujo in the lineup but Jensen now has the opportunity to return to his more natural position at center. He has made 58 starts during career. Jensen earned All-MWC honorable mention in 2002-03 and MWC Co-Freshman of the Year honors in 2001-02 when he finished first in the Mountain West Conference with a team-leading 59.1 field goal percentage (sixth-best single-season percentage in school history). A talented offensive player in the low-post, he can receive almost any entry pass with exceptionally soft hands. He came to the Cougars as the most prized high school recruit from the state of Utah, earning the 2001 Deseret News Mr. Basketball Award, scoring 25.8 points and pulling down 13 rebounds per game at Fremont High School. A smart player with a total understanding of the BYU's defensive scheme, he also finishes well when given the opportunity, shooting 58 percent from the floor for his career.

JUNIOR (2003-04): Jensen appeared in 27 of 30 games, with 8 starts, and averaged 3.8 points and 2.1 rebounds while shooting .536 from the floor and .724 from the line in 12.1 minutes per game ... After missing three games -- all BYU losses -- due to a back sprain he suffered against Wyoming in Provo, Jensen returned and BYU went on a nine-game winning streak to finish the regular season with a second-place MWC placement ... The depth and defense he provided in the post with contributions not always evident on a stat sheet were demonstrated as BYU went 10-1 in MWC games with Jensen suited up and and 0-3 without him ... He made several big buckets with 6 points and 4 rebounds in only eight minutes at UNLV in the regular season finale ... He had 3 points and 2 rebounds in 9 minutes vs. New Mexico and had 6 points, 2 rebounds and 1 assist while playing solid defense in only 10 minutes at CSU ... He also played only 10 minutes at Wyoming but hit two key free throws to help stave off a Cowboy run, his first free throw attempts since Jan. 17 vs. CSU ... He went 14-17 (.824) from the line in MWC games ... He missed the first game of his career at Air Force after playing in 78 straight games for BYU, including 58 starts ... Recovering from from hand and back injuries, he saw more limited time as a junior, logging more than 20 minutes in a game only three times after averaging 20 minutes or better his first two years ... He played 22 minutes vs. CSU in Provo, scoring 8 points and equaling a career high with a game-high 10 rebounds ... He reached double-digit points at Utah State with 10 points ... He averaged 7.0 ppg, 6.7 rpg in 21.4 minutes during summer trip to Australia.

He utilizes a 37-inch vertical to shoot over taller defenders with a quick release at the top of his leap and can dunk off either foot. He could play a much larger role for the Cougars in 2004-05.

the point (15 games) and shooting guard (20 games) positions at Spring Woods High School in Houston ... being the team's biggest threat, he was moved from the point to the shooting guard spot to keep teams from double-teaming him at midcourt ... shot 52 percent from the floor, including 48 percent from three point range while leading Texas 5-A schools with 108 treys ... a preseason All Greater Houston First Team selection, he was named second-team All-State and first-team All-District 21 and first-team All-Region as a senior ... team MVP his junior and senior seasons, he was a three-time first-team All-District 21 5A selection after being named District 21 Freshman of the Year ... was the District 21 Don Coleman Scholarship winner ... his team finished 20-15 his final season ... helped team to second-place District 21 finishes as a sophomore and junior ... averaged 16.3 points, five rebounds and three assists playing shooting guard as a junior ... lettered in track once and was a four-time letterwinner in golf, earning team MVP honors his senior season.

STEVE CLEVELAND

2003 MWC COACH OF THE YEAR • BYU HEAD COACH (EIGHTH SEASON)



Steve Cleveland is entering his eighth year at the helm of the Cougars in 2004-05. During his tenure at BYU, Cleveland has proven to be a first-rate recruiter, an excellent coach and player developer, and above all, a winner.

Cleveland has guided BYU to five straight postseason appearances and four 20-win seasons in the last five years. Only three other BYU coaches have ever achieved more 20-win seasons. He was recognized as the Mountain West Conference's top strategist in the 2004 *Street & Smith College Basketball Preview*. He was honored as the MWC Coach of the Year in 2002-03, as voted by the league's coaches and media members, after guiding BYU to a share of the MWC regular season title and a 23-9 record.

In 2003-04, Cleveland coached the Cougars to a 76-71 win over then No. 25 and 2004 Final Four team Oklahoma State in the Delta Center. The Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference and advanced to the NCAA Tournament before losing 80-75 to defending national champion Syracuse. In 2002-03, Cleveland's team finished 23-9 and tied for the MWC title before earning an NCAA invite. In 2001-02, Cleveland coached BYU to a win over No. 13 Stanford and advanced to the second round of the NIT despite having lost four starters and six of his top seven players from the prior season. In 2000-01, Cleveland guided BYU to its first NCAA tournament bid since 1995, its first conference regular season title since 1993 and its first conference tournament championship since 1992. While rebuilding a program that finished 1-25 before his arrival, he has posted records of 9-21, 12-16, 22-11, 24-9, 18-12, 23-9 and 21-9. The 1999-2000, 2000-2001 and 2002-03 seasons all rank among the school's best years ever in terms of wins. In fact, since BYU's first season in 1903, only five BYU teams have ever recorded more wins than the 24-9 team in 2000-01.

Cleveland has brought the magic of the Marriott Center back in Provo. BYU averaged 15,300 fans in 2003-04, including the largest crowd (22,718) since 1992. BYU had the nation's largest percentage increase in attendance in 2003. The Cougars owned the nation's longest homecourt victory streak for much of the 2002 and 2003 seasons until it finally ended at 44 games. BYU has won 62 of its last 63 games at home, including back-to-back unbeaten seasons of 15-0 and 16-0 in 2001 and 2002 and again in 2004, going 13-0.

Cleveland's teams have traditionally been prepared to play their best at the end of the season. BYU ended the 2003-04 season on a nine-game winning streak through February and March until losing in the MWC semifinal game, earning its third NCAA bid in the last four years. BYU has been to the postseason five straight years. In 2001-02 BYU won in the first round of the NIT before losing at eventual NIT champion Memphis. In 2000-01, BYU won five straight games on the road to secure a share of the MWC regular season title and earn the automatic NCAA bid by claiming the MWC Tournament in Las Vegas. The Cougars won six of their last eight games the prior season, including two MWC tourna-

ment wins and two NIT victories. In Cleveland's first year, BYU completed a rare sweep of No. 15 New Mexico and UTEP on the road to earn a WAC tournament berth. The road sweep of New Mexico and UTEP was the first for BYU since 1990-91 and the 83-62 upset of nationally ranked New Mexico in the Pit ended the Lobos' 41-game home winning streak. In Cleveland's second season the Cougars had a blowout win over UTEP before a 90-74 conference tournament upset victory over TCU to achieve BYU's first conference tournament win since 1994.

Cleveland's teams have advanced to the finals of the MWC tournament in two of the five seasons the event has been played, winning the title in 2001.

As a recruiter, Cleveland has made a similar impact on BYU's program. Cleveland's recruits have proven they are not only committed to Cleveland's vision but also are the kind of players to help make that vision a reality in Provo. Cleveland and his staff have been able to attract top talent and develop them into better players.

Cleveland's recruits have been honored with a string of conference newcomer or major awards in their first seasons at BYU. Eight players have been honored in Cleveland's seven years as the Cougar coach, including five who have been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year. The last two years Rafael Araujo was named the Newcomer of the Year by the conference media members in a poll conducted by the Las Vegas Review-Journal (the MWC no longer has such an award) and Mike Hall was named MWC Defensive Player of the Year. In 2004, BYU head coach Steve Cleveland led the Cougars to their second straight NCAA Tournament appearance and the third in four years. At 21-9, the Cougars achieved their fourth 20-win season in five campaigns. With the victories, Cleveland surpassed former BYU head coaches Frank Arnold and Ladell Anderson to move into fourth place on BYU's 20-win season list, behind Stan Watts (6), Roger Reid (6) and G. Ott Romney (5). Coach Cleveland has also guided the Cougars to the second-most Marriott Center wins in BYU history with a record of 84-18. He needs just nine victories to move into the top spot. With a 129-87 overall record in his seven seasons in Provo, Cleveland is fifth on BYU's career coaching victories list but is only 24 wins from moving into second. He needs just nine wins to move into fourth.

In October 2001, Cleveland signed a multi-year contract extension with BYU. Before taking the helm with the Cougars on March 11, 1997, Cleveland compiled a 157-77 record at Fresno City College in Fresno, Calif. Cleveland was named coach of the year two times while at FCC and led the Rams to post-season playoffs in each of his seven seasons in Fresno. Cleveland coached 10 years at Fresno's Clovis West High School, compiling a 180-70 record.

PLAYING CAREER

Cleveland played college basketball at UC Irvine and was the Anteaters' MVP and leading scorer his senior season in 1975-76. Prior to attending UC Irvine, Cleveland was Fresno City College's Most Outstanding Player in 1973-74. Cleveland received a B.A. degree in social science from UC Irvine in 1976, and received a Master's in education administration from Fresno Pacific in 1979.

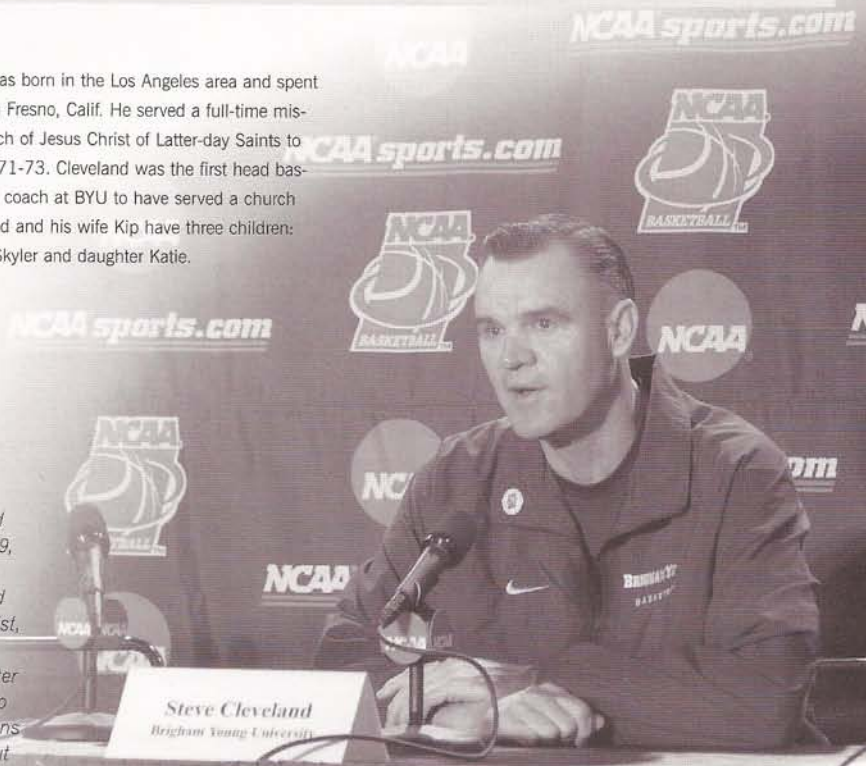

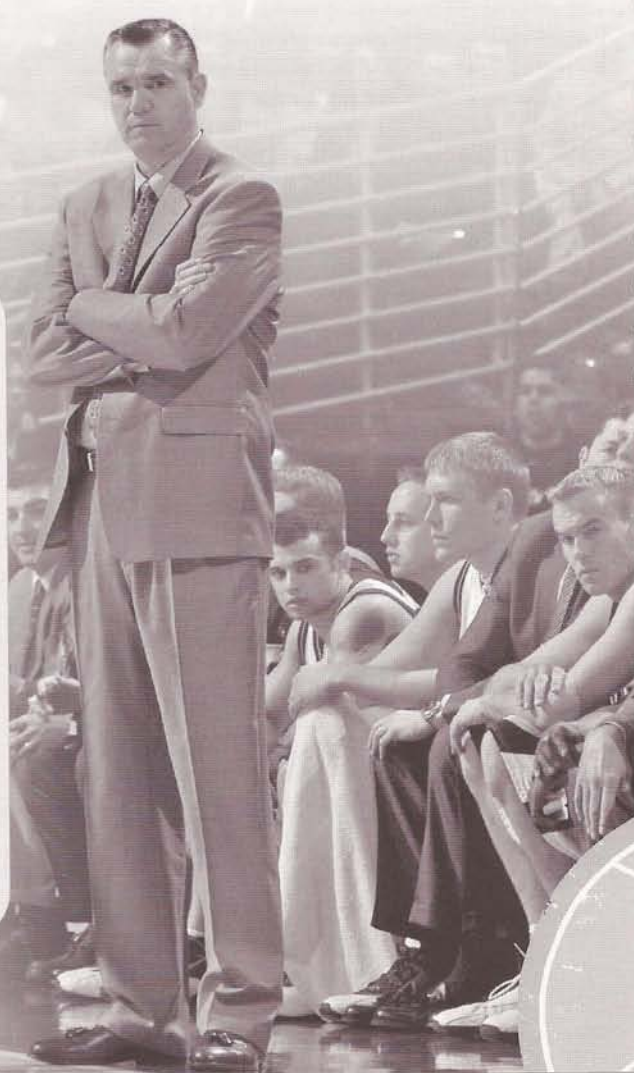

CLEVELAND CREATES SUCCESS

- **NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS** – Cleveland has coached the Cougars to the Mountain West's best overall nonconference record at 56-21 (.727) in the five-year history of the league. BYU owns the MWC's only unbeaten home nonconference record at 40-0. The Cougars have also achieved top nonconference wins with victories over nationally ranked Stanford (2001-02) and NCAA Final Four participant Oklahoma State (2003-04).

- **CONFERENCE SUCCESS** – With a 10-4 record in 2004, Cleveland now has the most MWC wins of any coach in the league with 45 and the second most overall wins with 108. Cleveland's teams have earned a share of the MWC regular-season crown during two of the five seasons (2001, 2003) and have also advanced to the conference tournament finals twice, winning the title in 2001.

- **OVERALL SUCCESS** – After inheriting a 1-25 program in 1997, Steve Cleveland has turned BYU basketball into an annual MWC contender and NCAA participant. He has guided the Cougars to five straight postseason appearances and four 20-win seasons in the last five years. In 2000-01, BYU won five straight games on the road to secure a share of the MWC regular season title and earn an NCAA bid. In 2003-04, Cleveland guided the Cougars to an eight-game win streak to end the regular season and earn the NCAA invite. The 2003 MWC Coach of the Year has averaged more than 19 wins per season while totaling 466 victories in 24 seasons as a head coach at the high school, junior college and Division I levels.



"I have never seen anybody dissect the Syracuse defense like that. I have seen teams score against Syracuse but I have not seen anybody penetrate the zone the way BYU (did). They got the ball inside against it, they hit outside shots, they got to the rim. In all the years I have watched Syracuse play, I have not seen anybody attack the zone like that in so many different ways effectively. (It was) great offensive execution by BYU. 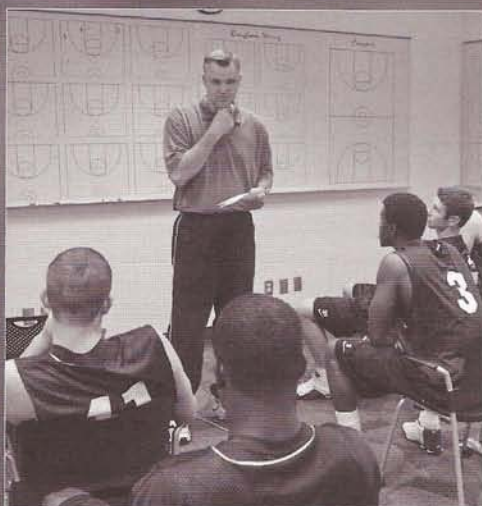

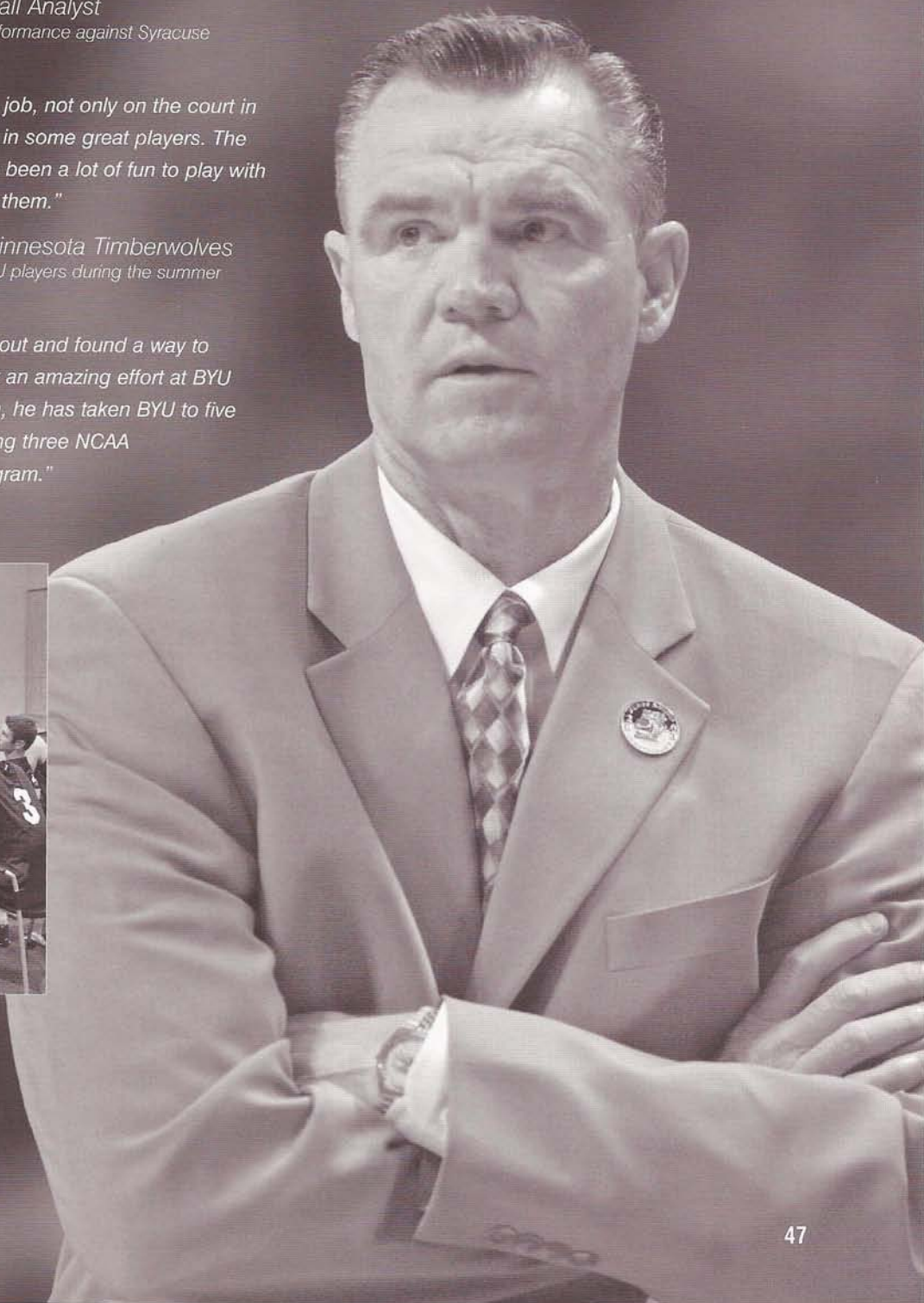

Dave's leadership on and off the floor has been a great asset to our program. Dave is an insightful coach who has a total understanding of the game."

A tireless worker, gifted motivator and strong strategist, David Rose serves as associate head coach for the Cougars. He enters his eighth year working on Steve Cleveland's staff in 2004-05.

With 21 years of experience – 10 as a head coach and 11 as an assistant, Rose has played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. Considered the top assistant in the Mountain West Conference (*Street & Smith 2004-05 College Basketball Preview*), Rose has demonstrated a strong commitment to coach Cleveland and Cougar players since coming to BYU along with Cleveland in the spring of 1997.

As associate head coach, Rose fulfills a variety of responsibilities under coach Cleveland.

On the court, Rose is the defensive coordinator and works with the team's post players. He possesses a complete knowledge of the game and works hard in developing the team's defensive game plans. An outstanding teacher, he coaches defensive skill development and implements the defensive game plan during practices. Since Rose started overseeing the defense, BYU has been the top defensive team in the Mountain West Conference two of the last three seasons.

As the recruiting coordinator, he manages the staff's recruiting efforts. Rose is a strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country. Rose's success as a recruiter is evidenced by his being named one of the top 25 college basketball recruiters in 2004 by Rivals.com. Each year the Cougars have brought in talented newcomers to contribute to and take advantage of the BYU program. This past season's class was rated No. 17 nationally and No. 3 in the West by Rivals.com. The 2000 recruiting class also ranked in the top-20 nationally. Each year's class has brought in talent that has not only improved the Cougars but also proved to be among the best in the Mountain West Conference.

Proving that Rose and the Cougar coaching staff have excelled in recruiting and developing players, BYU has had a string of top conference newcomers. Eight recruits have earned confer-



ence newcomer honors or a major conference award in their first season as a Cougar in the seven years Rose has been in Provo. Including Rafael Araujo being named the league's top newcomer by the MWC media members in 2003 (the MWC discontinued the newcomer award that year), five BYU players been singled out as either the conference newcomer or freshman of the year, and last year's new Cougar, Mike Hall, was named the MWC Defensive Player of the Year. Below is the list of player honors earned by Cougar recruits in their first seasons in Provo.

Rose has also worked closely with scheduling. BYU has played many of the nation's top teams over the past several years, thanks in part to relationships Rose has developed with programs across the country. His efforts have helped the Cougars receive invitations to tournaments like this year's EA SPORTS Maui Invitational.

Prior to coming to BYU, Rose was head coach at Dixie College in St. George, Utah. In seven years, his teams compiled a 167-57 record and won three conference championships. Six of his seven teams were nationally ranked in the top 20 of the NJCAA polls. During his tenure as head coach, 97 percent of his players graduated. He was selected SWAC Coach of the Year in 1993 by the league's coaches. While at Dixie, Rose coached three NJCAA All-Americans as well as longtime NBA player Keon Clark. BYU's Rafael Araujo and Travis Hansen have been NBA draft picks the past two seasons.

Before assuming the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as an assistant coach at Dixie under Ken Wagner. He coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View High Schools before joining the staff at Dixie.

PLAYING CAREER:

Rose was a two-sport athlete at Dixie College before transferring to Houston, where he was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished second in the NCAA tournament. At Houston, Rose played in 1980-81, redshirted in 1981-82, and played his final year in 1982-83.

At Dixie, Rose was first team all-league in both basketball and baseball. Rose was also the Region 18 batting champion hitting .421 as a center fielder. While playing basketball for Houston's Northbrook High School, he led the District 16AAAAA in scoring, was selected first team all district and All-Greater Houston, and was named team MVP.

PERSONAL:

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose, 46, is married to the former Cheryl Lang and they have three children, Chanell, 23; Garrett, 20; and Taylor, 10. Chanell played forward on the BYU women's basketball team from 2000-2003 and is married to Brock Reichner, who is a guard on this year's BYU team. Rose's wife Cheryl is actively involved in helping families who have children with cancer as vice chairperson of the Children with Cancer Christmas Foundation. Rose served an LDS Church mission to Manchester, England, between his two years as a player at Dixie College.

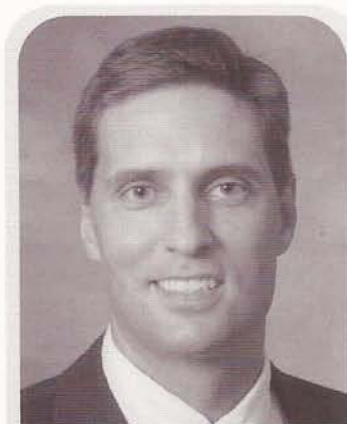

Andy Toolson is in his fourth season as an assistant coach at BYU since joining Steve Cleveland's staff in May 2001. Toolson returned to coach at his alma mater after an 11-year professional career in Europe and the NBA. His primary responsibilities on the coaching staff include recruiting, academics, offensive skill development and game preparation.

The former BYU star began his professional career as a rookie with the Utah Jazz during the 1990-91 season and played part of another season with the Jazz. Overseas he played in Italy, Greece and Spain. Toolson was twice been named to the ULEB All-Star team in Europe.

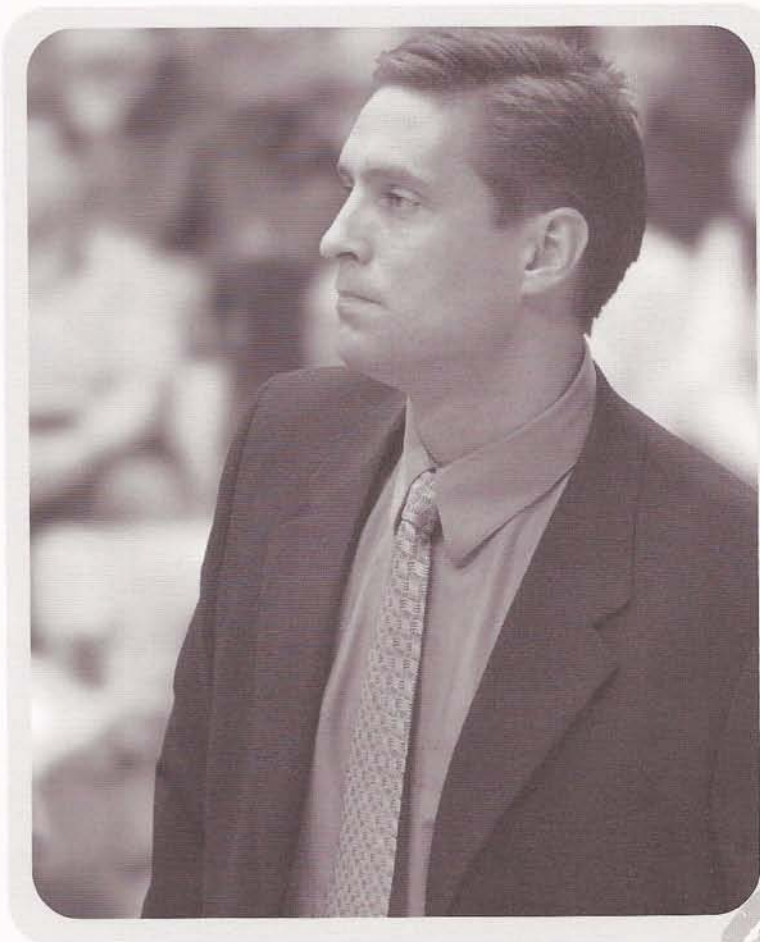
While at BYU the 6-foot-6 guard played three seasons for Ladell Anderson (1984-85, 1987-88, 1988-89) and one year for Roger Reid (1989-90). As a senior,

Toolson became only the fifth Cougar to be named Academic All-American and also earned All-WAC Second Team honors averaging 18.3 points and helping BYU win the 1990 WAC title.

He played on two conference championship teams that advanced to the NCAA tournament, including the 1988 team that won 17 consecutive games and achieved a No. 2 national ranking. He is second in career three-pointers made (141), and still holds BYU records for most threes in a season (74) and best single-game free throw percentage (14-14, 1,000). He ranks second for consec-

utive games with a three-pointer (16), third in career three-point percentage (.437) and 11th in career points scored (1,388).

A native of Twin Falls, Idaho, Toolson, 38, served a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to Concepcion, Chile from 1985-87. He earned a BA in International Relations from BYU in 1990 and an MA in Social Science from Syracuse in 1999. He is married to the former Holly Hill and they have five children.



JOHN WARDENBURG

John Wardenburg is in his fourth season at BYU since joining Steve Cleveland's staff in May 2001. Wardenburg came to BYU with 11 years of coaching experience at the high school and junior college levels. His primary responsibilities on the staff include defensive skill development, game film preparation, summer basketball camp director, recruiting and assisting coach Rose with defensive game plan preparation.

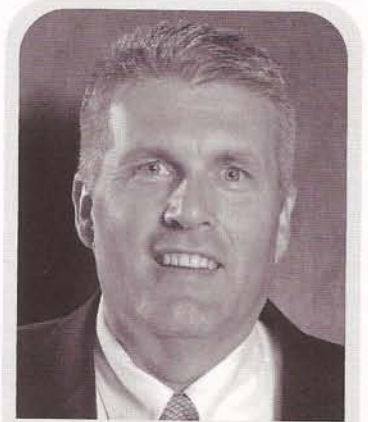
Wardenburg, 46, compiled a 105-62 record in seven years as a head coach at Payson High School (1988-93) and Pine View High School (1999-01) while guiding his teams to five league titles and

seven state tournament berths. In those seven years, his teams earned three fifth-place state tournament finishes, one third-place finish, and his 2001 Pine View team won the 3A Utah State Championship.

After Wardenburg's Payson teams claimed three league titles and posted a 76-43 overall record, he served as an assistant coach from 1993-97 at Dixie College, where he assisted current BYU Associate Head Coach Dave Rose and helped the Rebels to a 95-31 record and a national ranking as high as No. 2. Wardenburg left coaching for two years to become Dixie's Director of Athletics before return-

ing to coaching as the head coach at Pine View. He recorded two highly successful seasons at Pine View before joining BYU's coaching staff. While achieving a 29-19 record and winning the league title both seasons at Pine View, Wardenburg earned 3A Coach of the Year honors in 2000 after coaching his team to a third-place state finish and was named Championship Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding his team to the state title.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Wardenburg was a four-sport athlete at Kiel High School in Kiel, Wis. He served a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to The Netherlands from 1977-79 and earned a BA in Political Science from BYU in 1986 and an MA in Health, Physical Education and Recreation from Utah State in 1992. WALTER ROESE

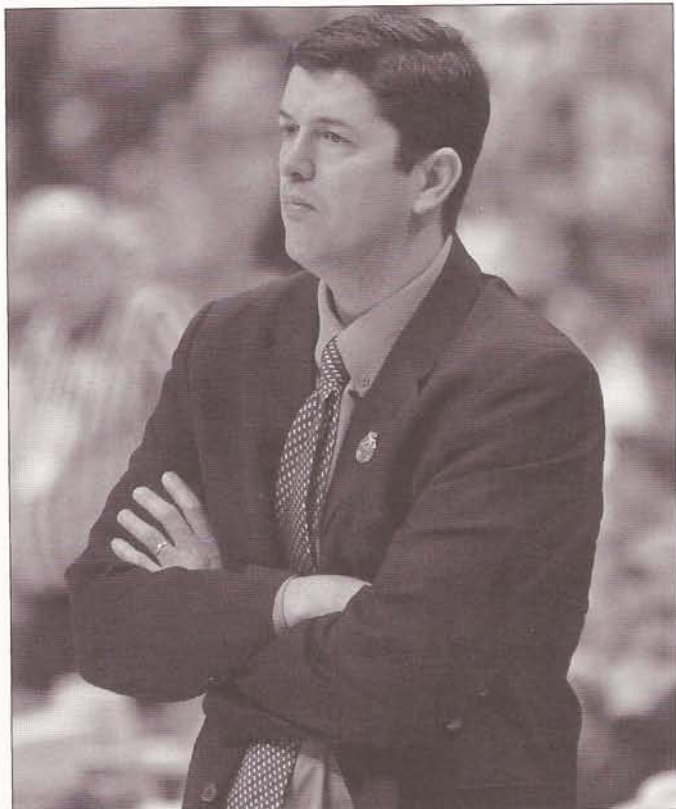
DIRECTOR OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

The 2002 National Survey of Student Engagement places BYU in the 93rd percentile for its level of academic challenge, also ranking it in the 99th percentile in providing a supportive campus environment – one that fosters active and collaborative learning. QUALITY PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION

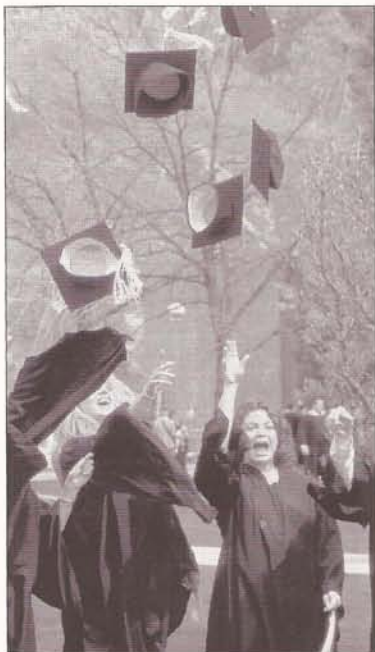
A strong curriculum delivered by outstanding faculty is key to the academic excellence of BYU graduates. From business management to nursing, from the humanities to engineering, the University's 11 colleges—supported by comprehensive offerings from religious education—continue to be internationally recognized for the quality of their education and the professional preparation they provide. In addition to the challenging course work and hands-on research, numerous programs offer academic and service outreach opportunities. Study-abroad centers, distance-learning courses, and worldwide performing-arts tours are a few of the offerings that enrich BYU's academic experience.

A BEAUTIFUL CAMPUS SETTING

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of more than 110,000 situated 4,500 feet above sea level. The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. Surrounded by mountains, Provo is at the heart of Utah Valley with a combined population of more than 377,000. Utah Valley is framed by the 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west and 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the east. BYU also has campuses in La'ie, Hawaii (Brigham Young University-Hawaii) and Rexburg, Idaho (Brigham Young University-Idaho) serving an additional 12,000 students. The main campus sits on approximately 600 acres at the foot of the Wasatch Mountains and includes 333 buildings. Additional facilities include the BYU Jerusalem Center, the BYU Salt Lake Center, LDS Business College, and the Missionary Training Centers around the world.

BYU students arrive with superb preparation. The entering class has an average high school GPA of 3.76 (on a 4.0 scale) and an average ACT score that ranks in the 89th percentile nationally. The University consistently places in the top 20 for enrollment of National Merit Scholars. In addition to their academic excellence, students bring and share high values and ideals. Students come to BYU from all 50 states and more than 130 countries, bringing many international cultures and experiences to the campus.

Nearly half of these scholars have lived outside the United States, and three-fourths are fluent in at least two languages. 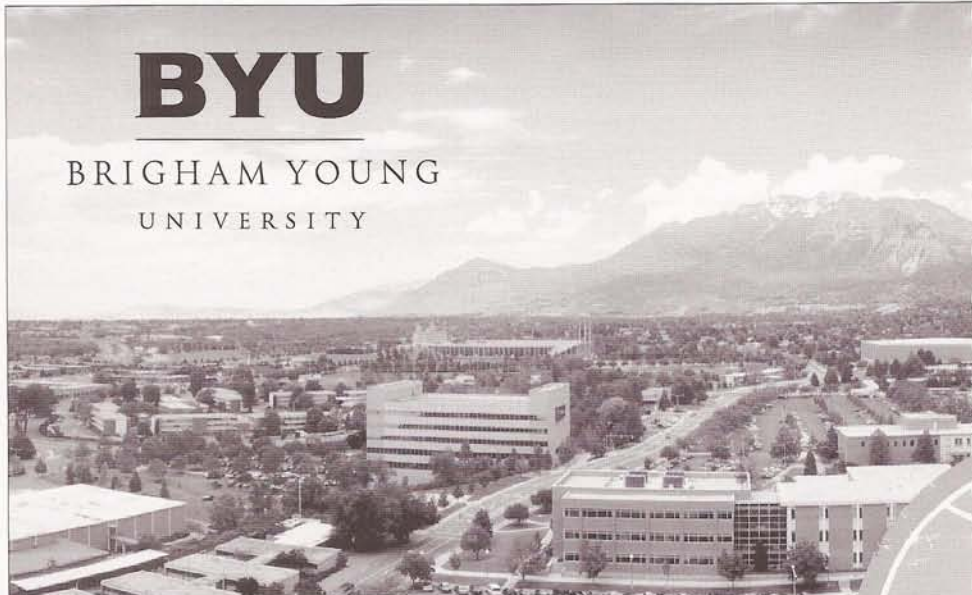
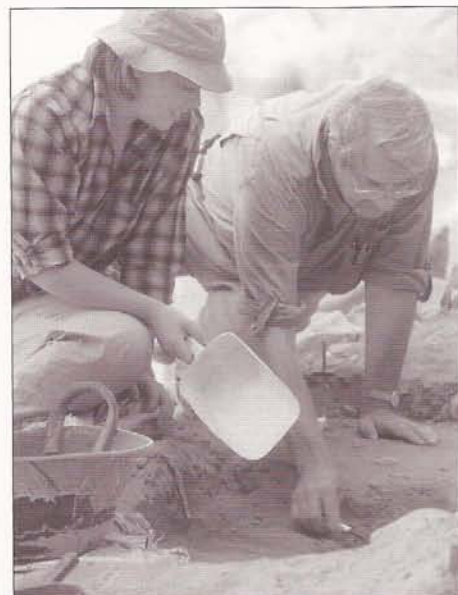
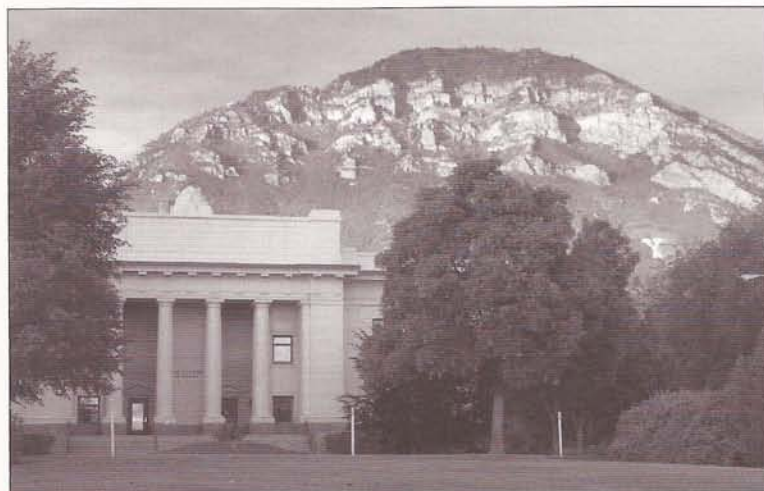
INTERNATIONAL CENTER OF LEARNING

BYU has been selected as a Center for International Business Education Research (CIBER), a program designated to promote the competitiveness of United States business through an integrated international curriculum, faculty and student international research and outreach programs. BYU's David M. Kennedy Center for International Studies provides support to colleges and departments in pursuing their international interests.

BYU runs the largest study abroad program in the United States, with satellite centers in London, Jerusalem, and Paris, as well as more than 20 other sites. The Institute of International Education ranks BYU as the number one university in the US to offer students study abroad opportunities; nearly 2,000 students take advantage of more than 50 BYU study abroad programs yearly. BYU's motto is "The World is Our Campus."

NATIONAL RANKINGS AND RECOGNITION

U.S. News and World Report gave BYU high marks in several categories in its 2002 "America's Best Colleges" issue, ranking BYU in the second tier in the category of "Best National Universities," 30th in the "Great Schools at Great Prices" among national universities with doctoral programs and among the top 10 with the least student-incurred debt.

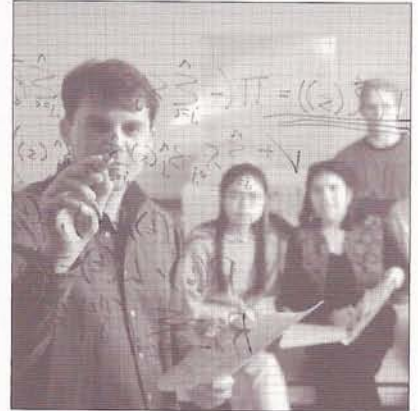
In U.S. News and World Report's "Best Graduate Schools" issue, BYU's Marriott School of Management ranked 29th in the nation, while in the "America's Best Colleges" issue the School's business program ranked 38th. In The Wall Street Journal's 2003 ranking of top business schools worldwide, BYU's business school moved from 38th to 26th. When U. S. News and World Report ranked national graduate programs in March 2002, the J. Reuben Clark Law School was ranked 37th among the top 50 law schools in the nation.

BYU College of Nursing graduates are consistently among the top 10 percent in the country with student pass rate in the National Council Licensure Examination to become registered nurses, according to the NCLEX Report. Six BYU students were recently awarded scholarship money by the National Science Foundation. According to NSF, BYU ranks 29th out of more than 2,000 universities in the number of graduate students who go on to receive science and engineering doctorates.



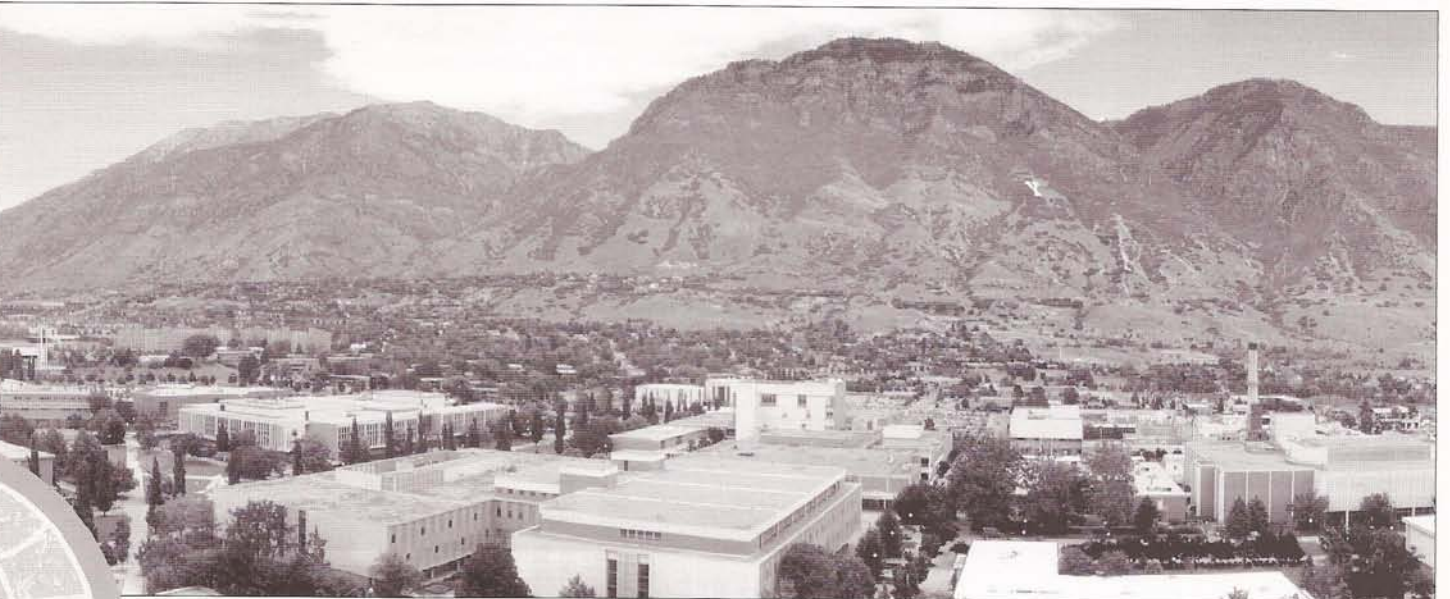
TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANTAGE: BYU'S "WIRED" CAMPUS

Ranked among the top 50 of Yahoo! Internet Life's "America's Most Wired Colleges," BYU has 100 percent of its dorms and 60 percent of its classrooms wired for the Internet. BYU students have access to a wide range of technology products, services and support through the use of on-campus Ethernet connections and Technology Enhanced Classrooms (TEC Rooms). The law and business schools require students to own laptops. Prospective and current students have access to electronic application for admission, on-line transcripts, registration, and course schedules. BYU's supercomputing facility houses four supercomputers with a total of 460 processors, 456 gigabytes of memory and 22 terabytes of hard disk storage space. About 90 faculty members and 250 students using the supercomputers can process in days what would have previously taken a year. Funded by the University and donors, BYU's supercomputers are available at no cost to students and faculty members campus wide for projects such as 3-D visualization, molecular modeling, linguistics modeling, satellite visualization and medical imaging. The University also has a million-dollar virtual reality theater to enhance the output of much of the work done on supercomputers.



HONOR CODE

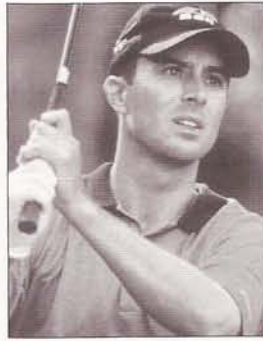
BYU exists to provide a university education in an atmosphere consistent with the principles of the Church of Jesus Christ. This environment is preserved through adherence to a code of conduct called the Honor Code that reflects those ideals. Initiated by students in 1949, the Honor Code emphasizes being honest, living a chaste and virtuous life, abstaining from alcohol and tobacco, using clean language and other values encompassed in the doctrines of the Church. The code is supplemented by additional guidelines on dress, grooming and housing. Students and faculty are attracted by the opportunity to study and work among those who share their faith and standards. In a survey of BYU alumni, 74 percent cited their desire to "obtain a spiritual, religiously based education" as a very important or extremely important factor in their decision to attend BYU.

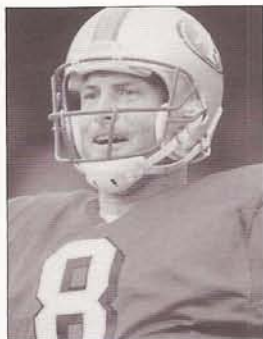

MISSIONARIES

BYU is owned and operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. The program follows the Biblical pattern of sending out missionaries two by two.

Currently, approximately 61,000 Latter-day Saints are serving proselytizing missions around the world. Approximately 75 percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26. Yet substantial numbers of single women (18 percent) and older couples (7 percent) also serve proselytizing missions. These missionaries serve for two years

(men) or 18 months (women and couples), teaching the restored gospel and its ordinances and engaging in community service.

The missionaries or their families donate money to the Church equal to the average cost of a missionary's expenses. After their missions, missionaries return to schooling, vocations or family.

CHURCH BELIEFS

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on April 6, 1830 with six members. Today, congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With more than 11 mil-

lion members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is Christian but is neither Catholic nor Protestant. Rather, it is a restoration of the original church established by Jesus Christ.

The Book of Mormon: Another Testament of Jesus Christ is regarded as divinely inspired scripture, as is the Holy Bible. Both volumes are used by Latter-day Saints side by side. For more information on the beliefs of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, visit www.mormon.org.

BYU's athletic training staff is responsible for the care of student-athletes from the time they arrive on campus, aiding in the prevention of injuries. When student-athletes do get injured, they are treated by one of the nation's most qualified athletic training staff. The staff includes certified athletic trainers, a sports physical therapist, a team physician, team orthopedic surgeons and a wide variety of other medical specialists. BYU athletic trainers are concerned with much more than just improvement in the weight room. They are committed to improving the athletes' overall fitness and health. Thanks to outstanding training facilities, BYU's athletic training staff has helped the Cougars win championship after championship.

BYU's well-structured strength and conditioning program is playing an increasingly vital role in the success of collegiate basketball programs. Success begins with training. BYU recently built a new state-of-the-art strength & conditioning center as part of the BYU's new Student Athlete Building.

The primary goal of the BYU program is to keep athletes healthy and prepared for competition by reducing their susceptibility to injury. BYU's strength and conditioning staff has experienced excellent results through its computer analyzed combination of a strict weight and conditioning program, a carefully planned diet and sufficient rest.

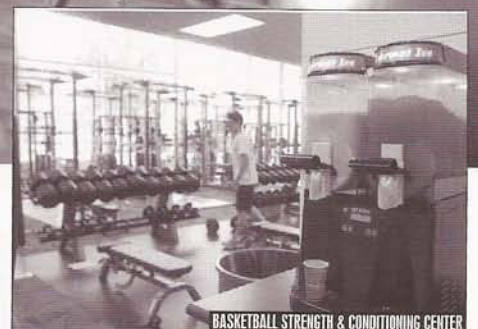

As the head strength and conditioning coach, Jay Omer's wealth of experience and knowledge is helping shape BYU student-athletes into champions.

In early 2001 Omer came to BYU after spending eight years at Georgia Tech. Since that time he has revolutionized BYU's strength and condition program and helped student athletes reach higher.

As director of strength and conditioning, Omer is responsible for the development and implementation of training programs for athletes in all of BYU's 21 intercollegiate sports. Conditioning encompasses all facets of physical performance. From speed and quickness, to cardiovascular endurance and brute strength, Omer creates programs designed to increase them all. Training programs are sport-specific and position-specific within each sport, allowing athletes to focus on what they need to succeed in their individual competitive endeavors.

"It's the most excited and committed I've seen my players in the weight room since I've been here," said Cougar basketball coach Steve Cleveland.

Each game, each time down the court can be decided by who tires first. Week in and week out, players give and take a beating and are expected to come back for more of the same the next week. Less than a

year after his arrival, Omer's subjects were seeing huge returns on their investment. Most players had increased their personal lifts 15-25 percent.

Not only does the conditioning program improve each player as an individual, but it also improves the team as a whole.

Working and sweating with each other in the weight room helps bring the players together. Seeing each person sacrifice and succeed in the offseason builds a camaraderie that carries over to the court as players work to make each other and the team better.

The results BYU players have realized have come from dedication and sacrifice. It's a time-consuming and often painful process in which athletes push themselves to higher levels of performance, and Omer

is there to watch over them the whole time.

Arriving at the gym before most people are out of bed and staying until long after most people have gone home for the night, Jay Omer takes those hopes very seriously. It's his job to make sure the players are strong enough to carry those hopes to one more victory, one more title, one more triumph.

"I like to see kids work hard, make something of themselves and improve their abilities. That's the joy of this job. We believe a team can only be successful if it prepares well and has team chemistry. You can have a team of super stars, but I'd rather have a team of less talent that works hard, cares about each other, has team chemistry and will go to war because they believe in each other. That's what it's all about and that's what we're trying to get done here."

In December 2003 BYU Athletics moved into its new home in BYU's new Student Athlete Building. This new complex gives BYU some of the best athletic facilities in the nation

“We have known for a long time that in order to maintain and continue our athletic success, we must provide the very best resources and facilities for our student-athletes. BYU's new athletic complex will achieve that objective,” BYU's former President Merrill J. Bateman said.

Every detail was taken into consideration with this center. For example, the film room is built with a stadium seating structure.

The weight room is two stories and has windows built all around to provide a view of the practice field. The locker room, patterned after the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles' is 75 yards long. There is a rehabilitation room, and three whirlpools adorn the complex. There is a special locker room for former BYU players who want to train in Provo during the off-season and a special office for professional scouts.

Speaking of the new restaurant in the Student Athlete Center, Legends Grill, Former BYU Men's Athletics Director Val Hale said:

“It has the feel of a sports bar with lots of seating and plenty of huge plasma televisions. It's the new hangout in Provo, where fans can come and enjoy the restaurant while enjoying a game on the big screen,” Hale said.

The complex also includes a three-story atrium that houses trophies, plaques and memorabilia from past BYU teams (Athletic Legacy Hall).

“This will be a place where fans can come remember the past,” Hale said.

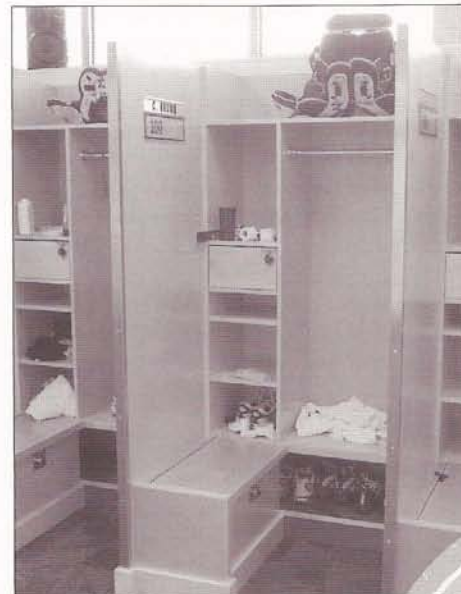

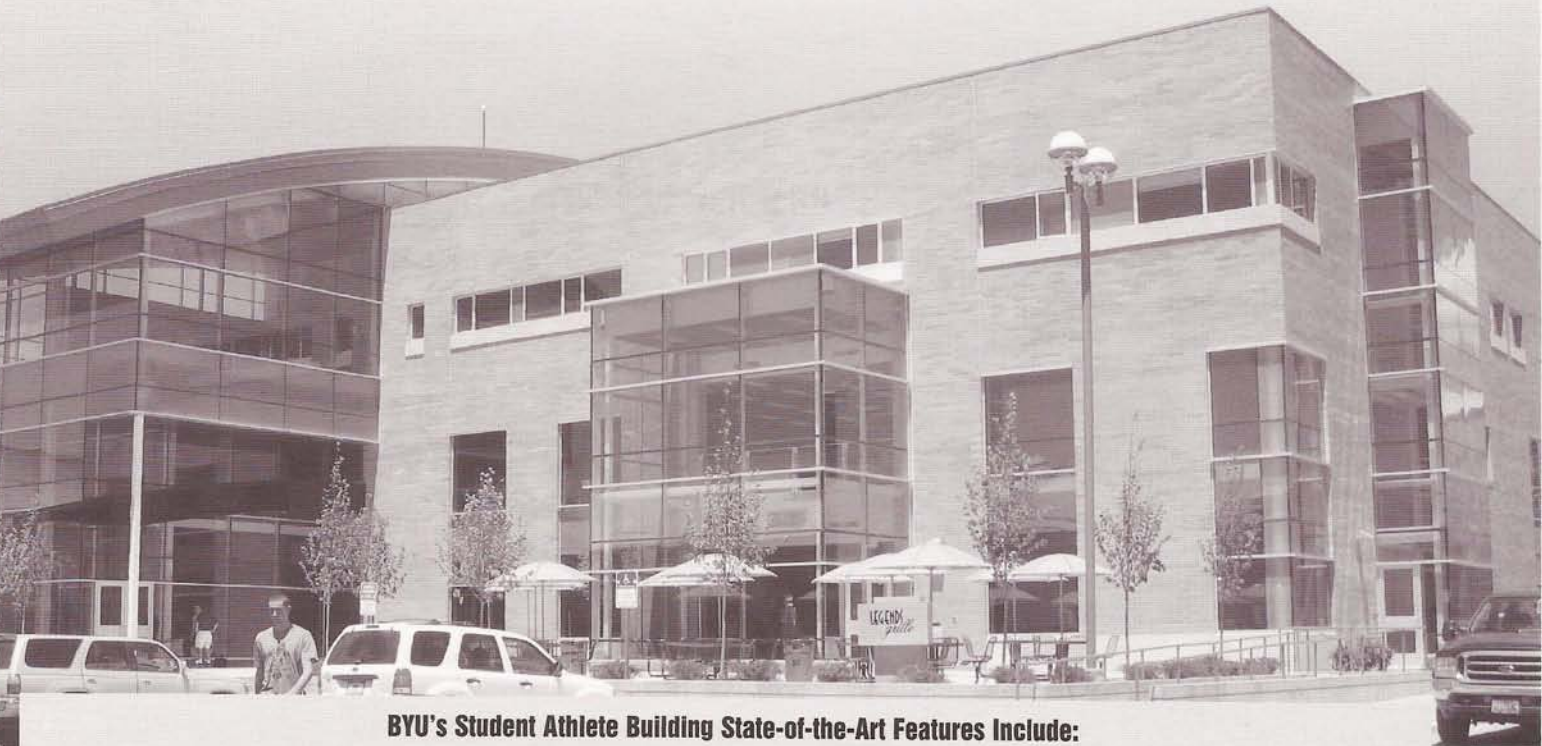
SECOND FLOOR:

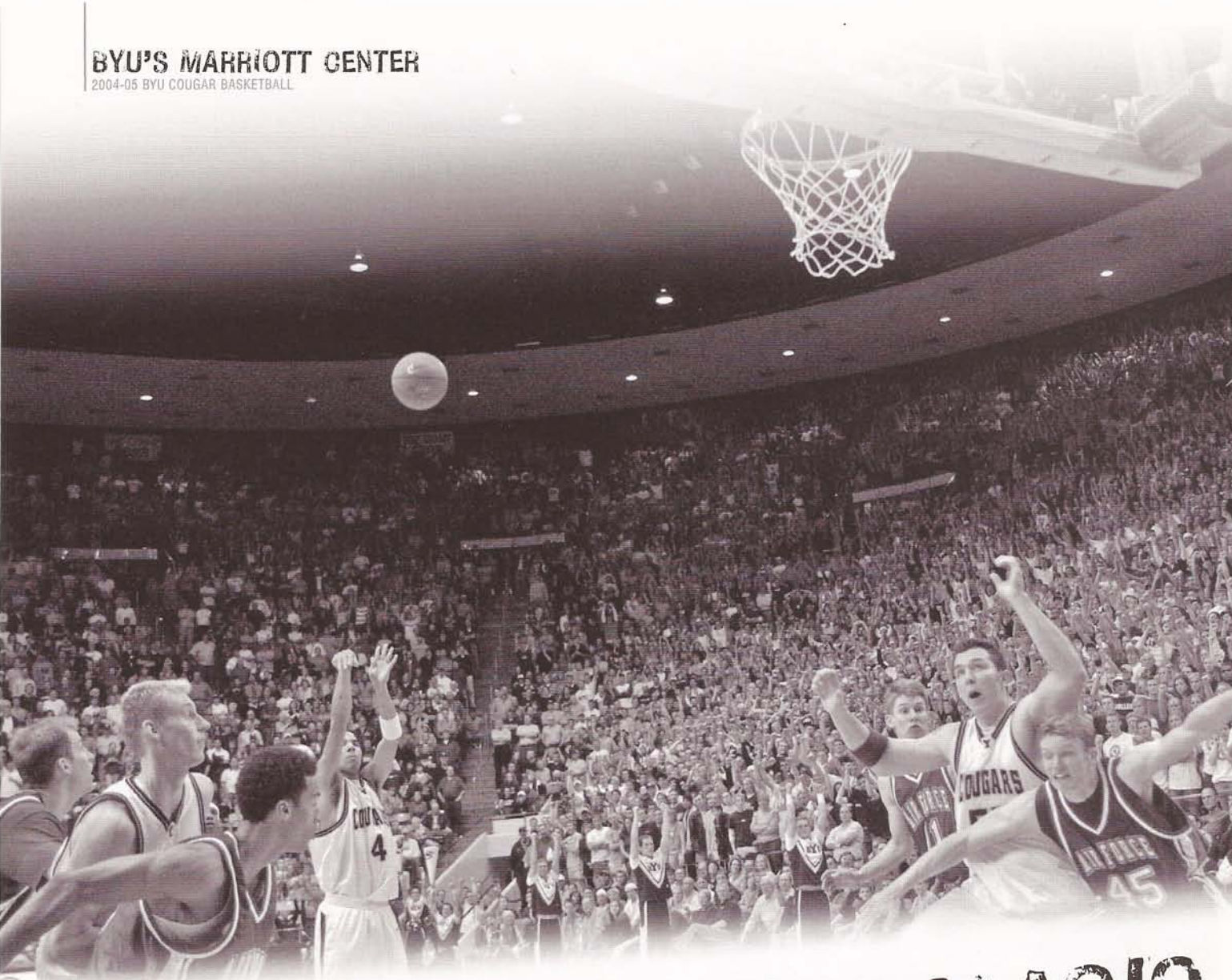

BYU'S HOME COURT IS ONE OF THE NATION'S BEST BASKETBALL ARENAS

BYU's 22,700-seat basketball arena is truly a hoop heaven. There is no place quite like it in college basketball. Over the past 33 years, the Marriott Center has been home to the thrills and cheers of BYU basketball. With a history full of game-winning shots, slam dunks and some of the nation's top attendance marks, the Marriott Center's 22,700 seats have allowed BYU fans to see plenty of excitement since the facility's opening game on December 3, 1971.

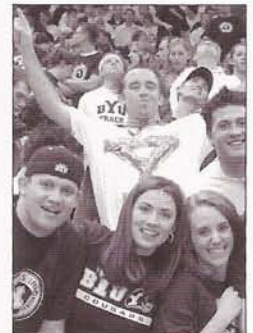
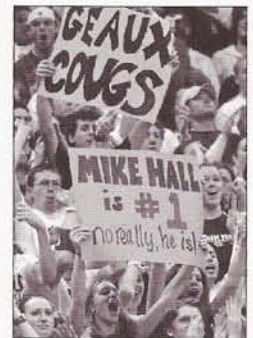
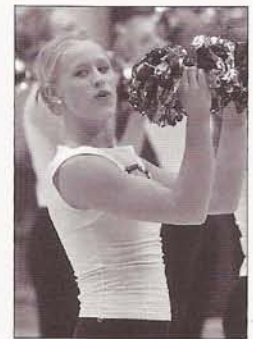
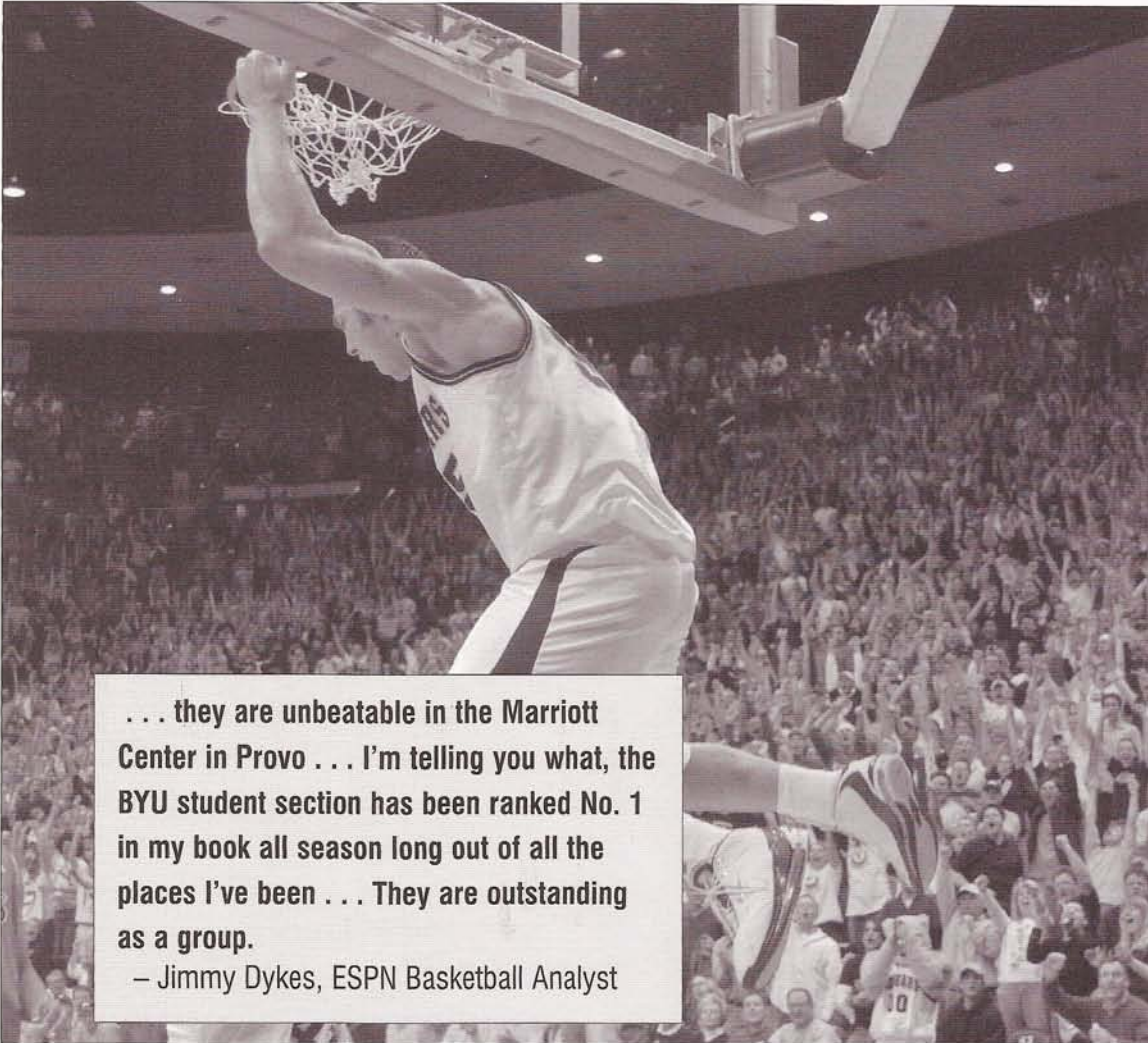
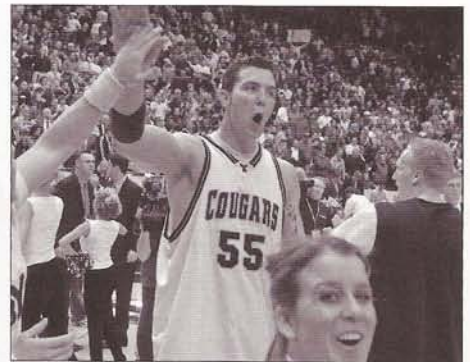
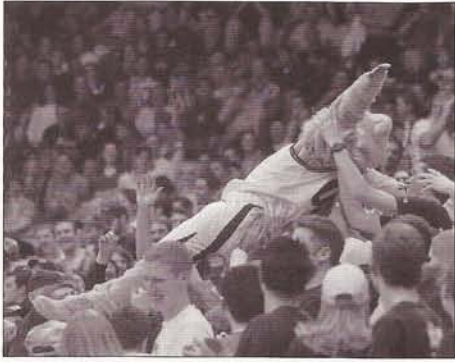
The Marriott Center is named for successful Utah businessman J. Willard Marriott and is the third-largest on-campus arena in the country behind Syracuse's Carrier Dome (33,000) and Tennessee's Thompson-Boling Arena (24,525).

The Cougars have a .774 winning percentage in the Marriott Center over its 33 years. BYU has gone 57-1 in the Marriott Center over the past three years, boasting the nation's longest home victory streak over parts of the 2002 and 2003 seasons. Some great games have been played in the Marriott Center, including Danny Ainge and company's 19-point shellacking of No. 7 Utah in 1981 before the Cougars' run to the Elite Eight in the NCAA Tournament. In 2002, BYU put on an incredible run to erase a 21-point second-half deficit and defeat Utah 63-61, helping preserve a perfect 16-0 home record.

BYU has outscored its opponents 4,360-3,352 while achieving a 57-1 home record over the past three seasons. The Cougars average winning margin over that span is 17 points.

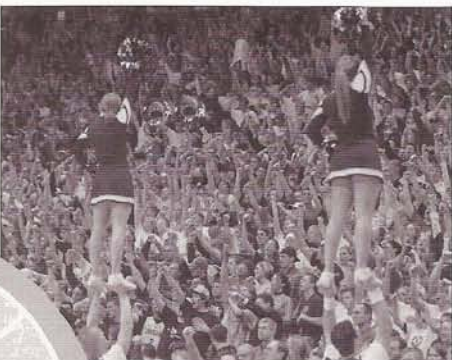
The top three attendance games in the history of the Mountain West Conference have all been played in the Marriott Center. BYU has ranked in the top 25 nationally in paid attendance every year but one since the Marriott Center opened. The Cougars have led the nation three years, finished second four times and been among the top five attendance leaders 19 times over the past 33 years.

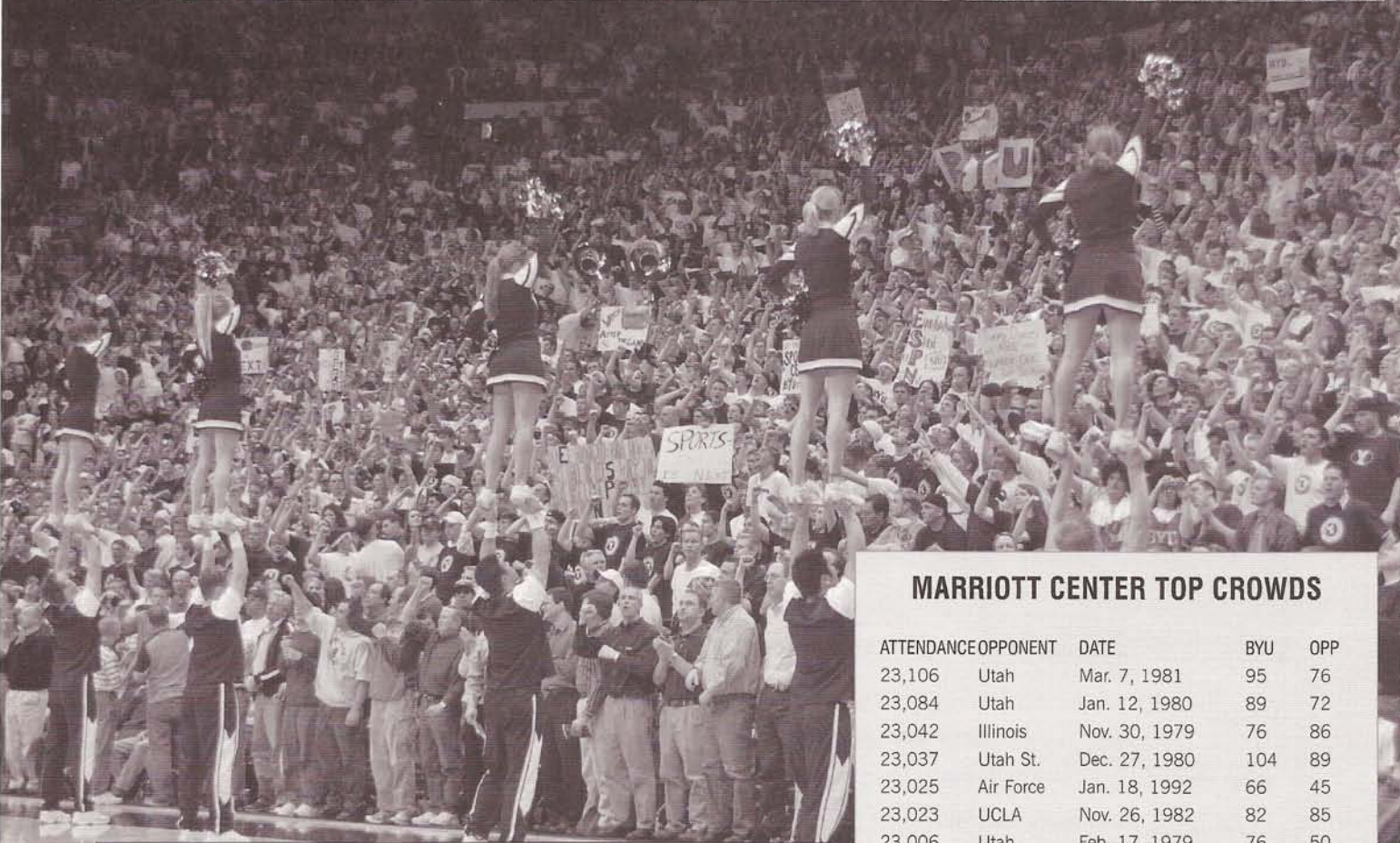
In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, BYU hosted NCAA Regionals and also hosted the 1988 Western Athletic Conference Tournament in the Marriott Center. In addition to the fans it draws for basketball, capacity crowds have filled the arena for devotionals, commencement exercises, concerts and pageants. As a sports venue, it has also accommodated tennis, wrestling and volleyball matches and gymnastics meets.

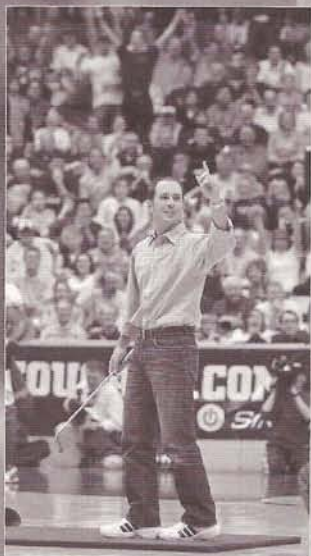

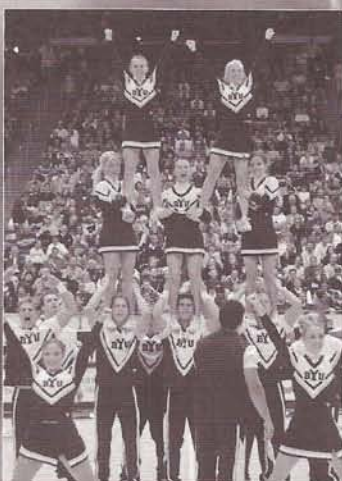

2004-05 BYU COUGAR BASKETBALL



Since the Marriott Center opened 33 years ago, Cougar fans have watched BYU compile a 366-107 record, a .774 winning percentage.

BYU led the Mountain West Conference in attendance and was ranked 11th nationally in home attendance after averaging 15,300 in 13 home games in 2003-04.

BYU was a perfect 13-0 at home last year and has won 18 straight overall in the Marriott Center, which is the sixth longest active home victory streak in the nation entering the 2004-05 season. BYU has won 62 of its last 63 games at home and is 57-1 over the past four seasons. BYU won a school-record 44 straight home games in the Marriott Center before losing to Utah, 79-75, on Jan. 25, 2003. The streak was the longest active streak in the country over parts of the 2001-02 and 2002-03 seasons.

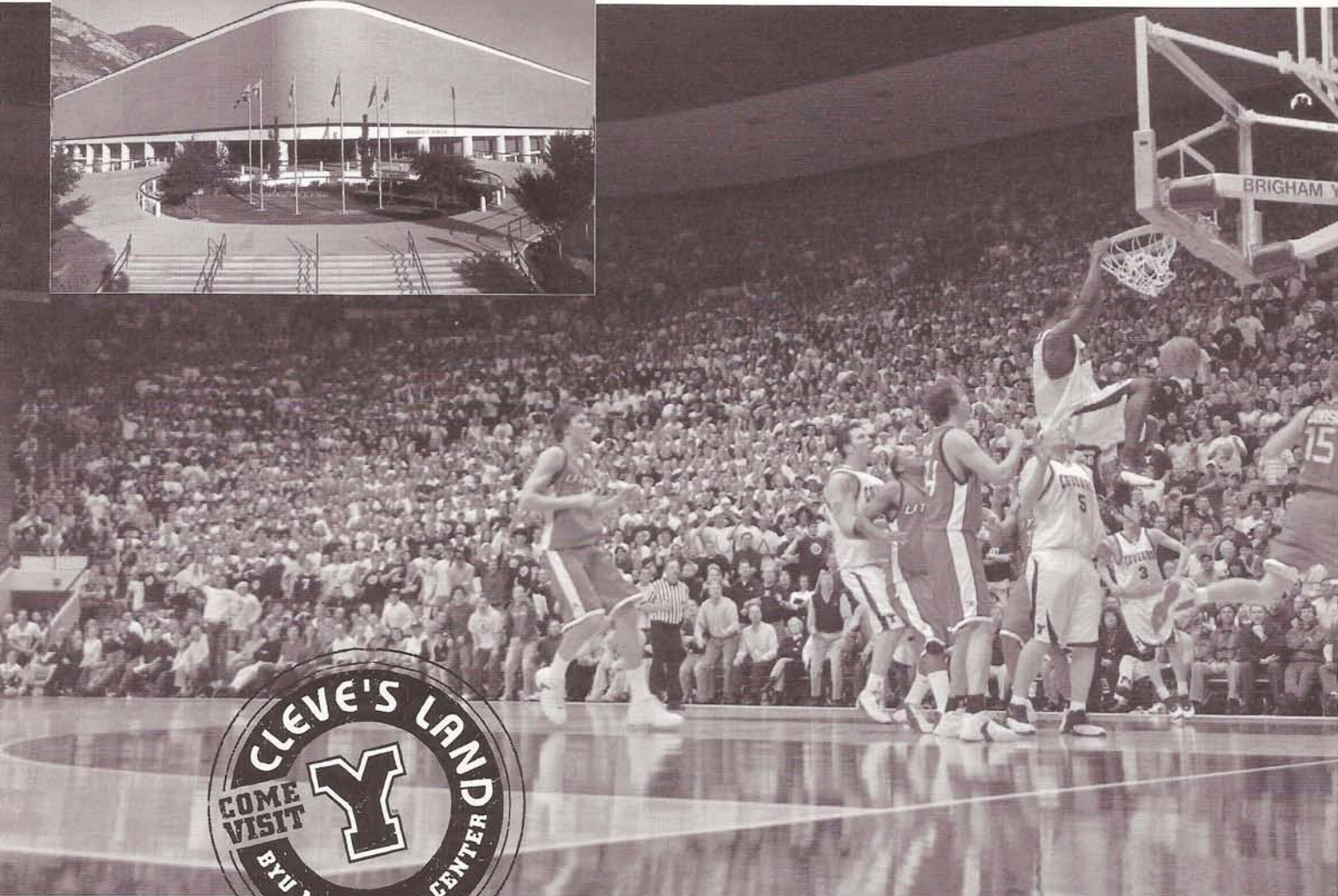
BYU continues its string of nonconference home wins, having defeated 40 straight nonconference opponents in the Marriott Center since starting the streak with a 61-59 win over Utah State on Jan. 2, 1999. The last non-league foe to win in Provo was the California Bears, who edged BYU 71-70 on Dec. 19, 1998. Overall, BYU also has the best non-conference record among MWC teams with a 56-20 (.737) record since the inception of the MWC in 1999. BYU has also achieved top nonconference wins with victories over nationally ranked opponents Oklahoma State (2003-04) and Stanford (2001-02) on neutral courts.

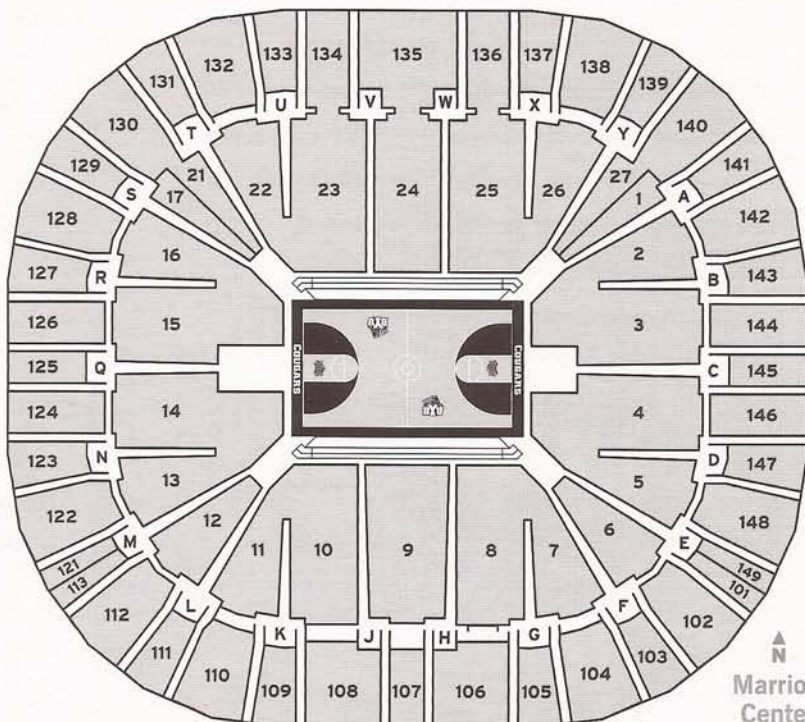


The Marriott Center covers three acres and encloses eight million cubic feet. There are approximately 10,100 chair seats with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse level. The distance around the concourse level is a quarter of a mile.

The roof, which is the size of two football fields placed side-by-side, is 10 stories high and has 50,000 bolts in it. The four-million pound roof was constructed first at ground level, then raised 38 feet.

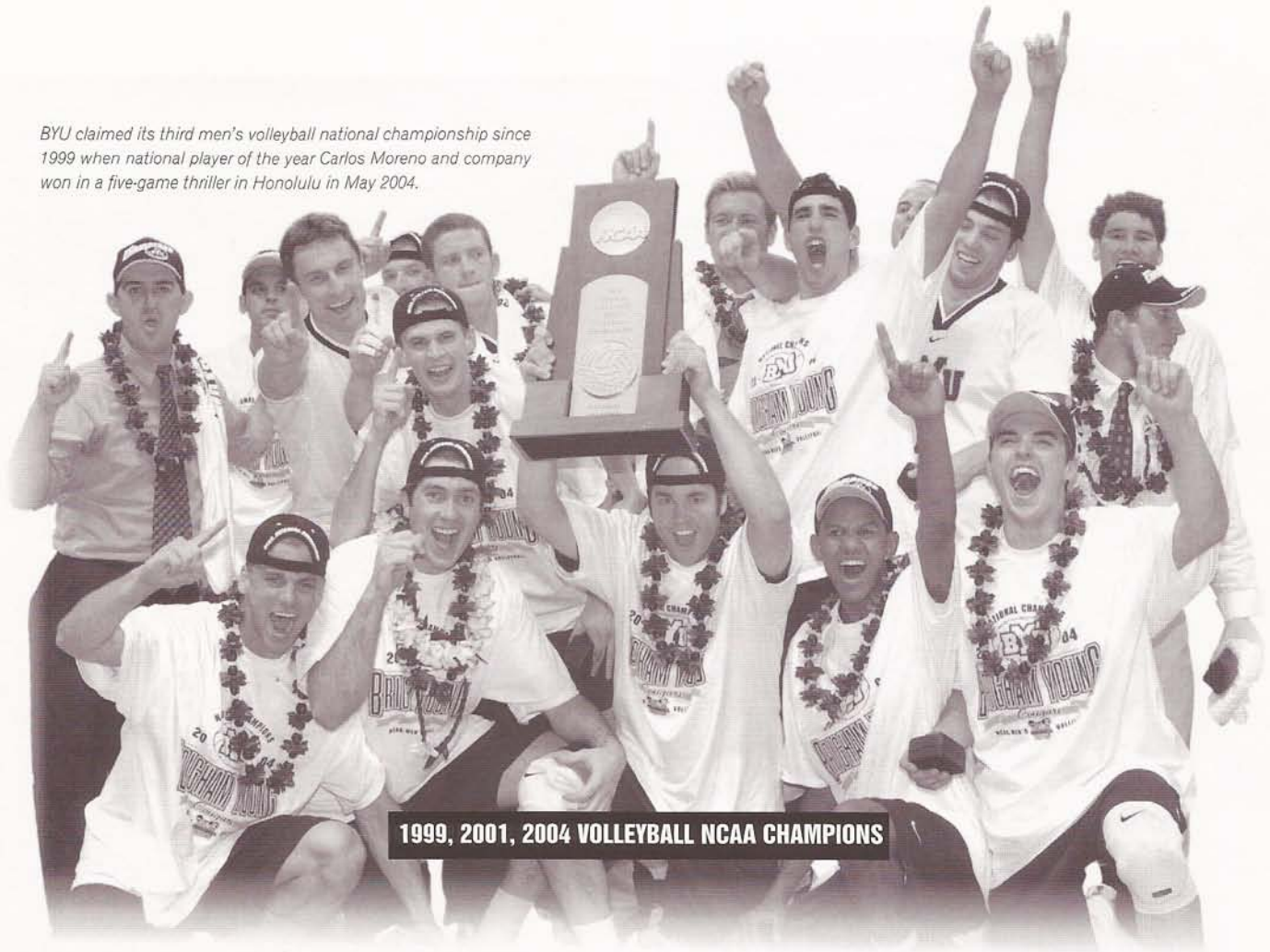
"People are always remarking how new the Marriott Center looks compared to how old it is," said Special Events Director Larry Duffin.

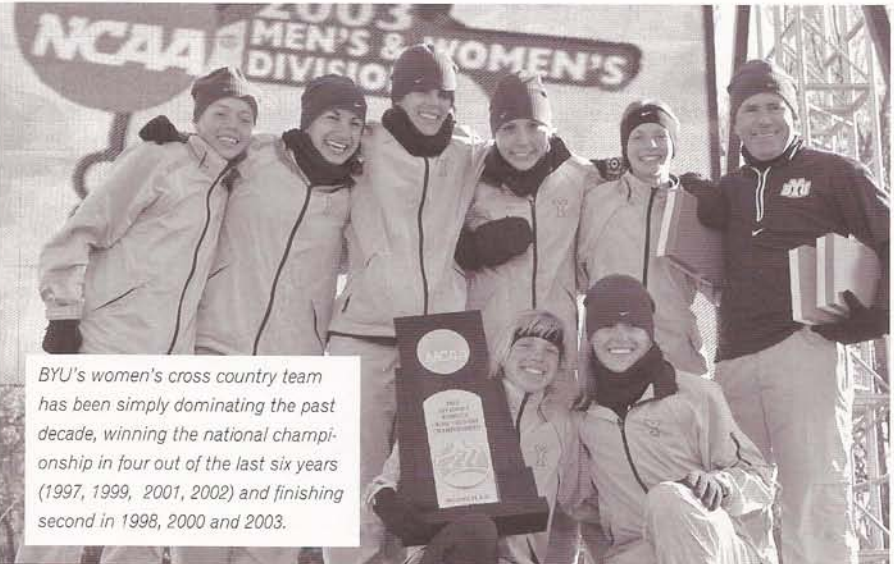

PRIDE OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST

In the five-year history of the MWC, the Cougars have won 53 of 95 conference championships—nearly 60 percent of all championships awarded by the conference. In 2000-2001, BYU won all but three conference championships (16 of 19). From 1962 to 1999, BYU also dominated the Western Athletic Conference, winning more championships than any other WAC School. In fact, during the last three decades in the WAC, the Cougars won 60 percent of the WAC Championships—more than all other conference competitors combined. Included in these team titles, BYU's baseball team won 22 division titles in 23 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983. For the second straight season, BYU teams claimed eight MWC Championships during the 2003-04 season.



BYU's women's cross country team has been simply dominating the past decade, winning the national championship in four out of the last six years (1997, 1999, 2001, 2002) and finishing second in 1998, 2000 and 2003.

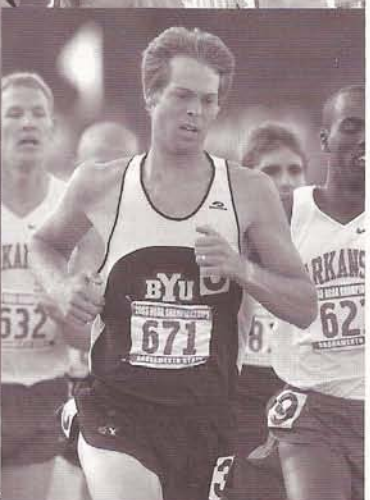

For the fifth consecutive year, BYU's men's and women's swimming and diving teams earned MWC Championships.



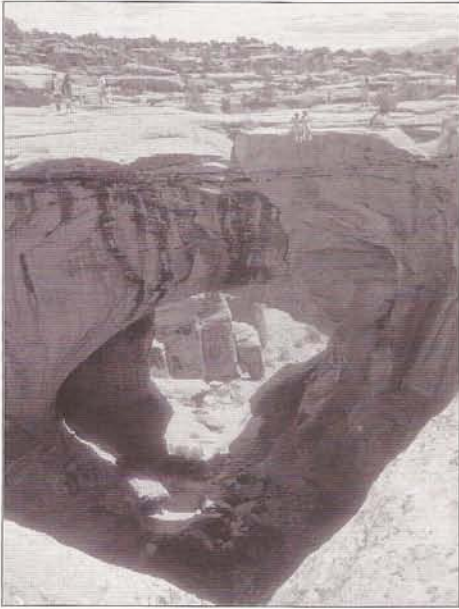
All-American Kari Lords led the Cougar gymnasts to a successful 2004 season. Finishing the regular season ranked No. 6 in the nation, BYU was the top seed at the NCAA Central Regional. Head coach Brad Cattermole was named NCAA Central Region Coach of the Year.



BYU's women's soccer has established itself as a national power after their seventh-straight NCAA Tournament appearance and last year's run into the NCAA's Elite Eight.



All-American Barbora Zahnova led BYU to a Mountain West Conference Championship in 2004. BYU has won 19 women's tennis conference championships in the last 28 years.



Utah's white splendor has been characterized as "The Greatest Snow On Earth." With an average annual snowfall of more than 42 feet, skiing and snowboarding at any of Utah's 14 resorts is truly a winter wonderland. Knee-deep powder and untracked snow are common characteristics of mountain resorts throughout Utah. The Wasatch Mountains provide a backdrop for Utah Valley with high peaks and rugged terrain that give bikers and hikers a taste of wildflower meadows, deep forests and snowcapped mountain peaks. Breathtaking vistas and spectacular views awaken the senses to nature's simple beauties.



A mountain biker's dream come true, Moab is paradise for fat-tire bikers. Just a three-hour drive from Provo, Moab is an old mining town that neighbors Arches National Park, one of six national parks and seven national monuments within a half-day drive from Provo. Ascending to higher elevations, clear mountain streams and rushing rivers wash through green landscapes and deep forests. The numerous canyons surrounding Utah Valley are full of mountain springs, lakes and waterfalls.

With a population over 377,000 people, Utah County offers all the conveniences of a major metropolitan community. Just 40 minutes south of Salt Lake City, host of the 2002 Winter Olympics, Provo also offers various recreational activities. Known for its incredible skiing and central location to 15 national parks and monuments, Utah County attracts visitors from around the world.

The Utah Valley metropolitan communities of Provo and Orem are home to a growing high-tech mecca, including the world headquarters for many computer and technology corporations. The Provo/Orem area boasts one of the highest standards of living in the country and has been rated by several experts as one of the top areas to

live in the United States. In a 2001 FBI report, the Provo/Orem metropolitan area had the second lowest violent crime rate in the nation. Utah Valley is an excellent educational environment with high-quality health care, a below average crime rate and rich cultural and recreational opportunities for its citizens. In fact, in May 2003 *Forbes* rated Provo as the sixth best city in the country for businesses and careers. The Utah Valley area has also been ranked among the top 20 places to live in the nation (according to *Money Magazine*) for the past five years. In September 1991, the magazine rated the area no. 1 on its list of the top 300 places in the nation to live. *Fortune* magazine also considers Provo to be the "third high-tech cluster in the U.S."

The Sundance Institute, located in Provo Canyon, offers locals and visitors an opportunity to experience some of the region's artistic culture. Every year, some 20,000 people attend Robert Redford's Sundance Film Festival. Several films that premiered at the festival have been the recipients of Oscar, Emmy and International Film Festival awards. Sundance offers year-round activities that can be enjoyed by everyone, including its ski resort, summer outdoor theater, fine dining and shopping.

Utah Valley is a major gateway to six national parks, seven National Monuments, two National Recreational areas, six National Forests and 44 State Parks.

THE VICTORY BELL

The original Y bell traveled across the plains with the early pioneers of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was used to call meetings among the saints and to announce any deaths in the community. Donated to the Brigham Young Academy in 1875, it was used to begin and dismiss classes until it was destroyed in a fire in 1884. The Academy went without a bell for the next 28 years, using instead a variety of instruments as a class bell.



Rung after each BYU victory, the bell was quieted in 1949 after a basketball win over rival Utah. Several overzealous students climbed the tower and vigorously beat upon the bell until it cracked. Repaired with a bronze patch in 1954 by Frank Hemingway, the bell was removed from the education building and mounted on a trailer so it could travel with BYU's teams to away games.

Its mobility proved its downfall as it was stolen in 1958 to be found six months later in a Springville field. The theft prompted the construction of a bell tower on BYU's upper-campus overlooking the Smith Fieldhouse.

Dedicated in 1959, the tower served well until 1973 when the bell fell while ringing in the dedication of the Marriott Center. The supporting yoke above the bell was broken and the bell shattered. The bell was soon repaired by Ray Mortenson of the BYU Maintenance shop using electric welding—miraculously maintaining its previous tone—and was remounted in the tower.

In 1978, the bell was moved to its current home on the southwest corner of the Marriott Center. The open arch tower was designed by BYU landscape architect Boyd Dawler and is made of the same cast stone as the exterior pillars of the Marriott Center. Although the old bell tower above the Smith Fieldhouse no longer stands, the massive steel I-beams that supported the tower have now been converted into the strongest park benches in the Intermountain West.

Over the years the ringing of the bell has come to represent honor, achievement and spirit, and has inspired several poems and songs from BYU faculty and alumni. Clyde D. Sandgren, who composed the Cougar Fight Song, penned a verse that was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower. As BYU victories have become more and more commonplace in recent decades, the ringing of the "Y bell" after each win has renamed it the "Victory Bell."

COUGAR FIGHT SONG

Penned in 1932 by Clyde D. Sandgren, "The Cougar Song" is the anthem of BYU sports. The Cougar Fight Song is sung to welcome the basketball team out onto the court as well as being sung after each touchdown and field goal at football games. Traditionally, fans remain seated through the verse and then stand, chant and shout through the chorus. Carried by some 20,000 voices "The Cougar Song" can be an intimidating musical number to an opposing team as the Marriott Center thunders to its tune.

Although written and composed in 1932, the song was not copyrighted and presented to the University until 1947. In addition to "The Cougar Song" Sandgren wrote and composed "The Old 'Y' Bell" which was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower that housed the Victory Bell before it was moved to its current location outside the Marriott Center.

A 1937 graduate of BYU, Sandgren went on to obtain a law degree from St. John's University. He then became a partner of the New York law firm Burroughs and Brown until 1947 when he decided to return to his native Provo to establish his own law practice. Sandgren later served as general counsel and vice president of BYU. Although he passed away in 1989, Sandgren's memory lives on through the voices of Cougar fans across the nation.

And cheer our Cougars of BYU.*

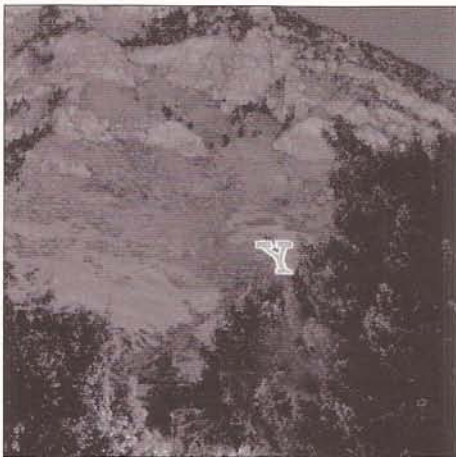


Y MOUNTAIN

Preparations for placing the initials BYU on the mountain-side began in April of 1906 when president George H. Brimhall commissioned surveyors for the letters "B," "Y" and "U." The letter "Y" was first laid out to ensure that the initials were properly centered on the mountain. Beginning in the early morning, students formed a line that zigzagged up the mountain. Standing eight feet apart, each student would carry a load up to the next and then return for another.

The project, which many expected to be completed by 10 a.m., lasted until 4 p.m. and only the "Y" was covered. After such a laborious day of work, plans to fill in the other two letters were scrapped. Covered with a thin layer of lime powder, the letter was in need of constant repair. Hoping to make it more permanent, a layer of rock was added in 1907. The next year, 20,000 pounds of sand and cement were carried up the mountain to form a three-foot high wall around the letter to hold it together. Several years later the letter underwent a facelift as the blocks, or serifs, were added to it to give it its current appearance.

A nationally recognized symbol of BYU, Y Mountain is a featured shot of almost every Cougar game broadcast on television. Located about half a mile east of campus and halfway up the mountain, the "Y" looks out over the valley and is one of its most prominent features.

COSMO

The cougar, chosen as BYU's mascot by former coach Eugene L. Roberts in the early 1920s, has undergone a tremendous evolution since its inception to become what is now known as the feline phenomenon of Cosmo the Cougar. Beginning in 1924 when BYU purchased a pair of cougar cubs for 50 cents each to excite BYU fans at athletic events, live cougars prowled the sidelines of BYU games on a regular basis through the late 40s and on special occasions through the 60s.

The original cubs were housed on the south side of campus until 1929 when they managed to break out of their cage, kill two dogs and begin stalking livestock on nearby farms. Both were recaptured later the same day. Three weeks later, one cougar died and the other was taken to the old Salt Lake Zoo. BYU procured its mascots from nearby zoos and local bounty hunters but never

owned its own cougars again.

Cosmo the Cougar, the brainchild of pep chairman Dwayne Stevenson, made his first official appearance before BYU fans on October 15, 1953. At a cost of 73 dollars for the costume, Daniel T. Gallego, Stevenson's roommate, became the first man under the fur. The name given the big cat was derived from BYU's diverse student body.

"BYU was a very international, cosmopolitan school and that is where we got the name Cosmo," said Gallego.

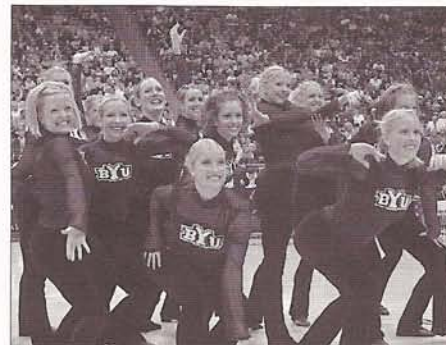
Nearing a half-century of service to the BYU community, Cosmo has become an icon of Cougar sports to fans and foes across the country. Through Cosmo's Kids Club and Cosmo's Corner, he is helping raise another generation of BYU fans. Prowling the sidelines for the Cougars, his antics add to the experience of game day at BYU. Cosmo brings out the best of Cougar spirit in fans at athletic competitions both home and away.

THE COUGARETTES

One of BYU's lesser-known jewels, the Cougarettes are more than a sideline attraction at football games and other athletic events. Named one of the top 25 dance teams in the nation by *Dance Spirit Magazine*, the Cougarettes have earned national respect on the dance floor by claiming the National Collegiate Dance Team title in 1997, 1998, 1999 and again in 2001. They missed a five-year reign as national champions by a mere .02 points, placing them second in 2000. The Cougarettes have been credited with raising the level of competitive collegiate dance to a new and respected level.

Established in 1946, the Cougarettes enhance the overall game-day experience at BYU. Each year, more than 100 girls try out for this elite team of entertainers. Once pared down to 16 dancers, give or take one or two, the Cougarettes tackle a rigorous practice regimen that not only consists of choreographing their routines but also includes strength and flexibility training to prepare them for their performances at games, concerts and other special presentations.

An exciting and talented part of the pageantry that surrounds BYU's athletic success, the Cougarettes have reached an unprecedented level of achievement in their own field and are more than happy to bring their talents to the playing field for the Cougars.



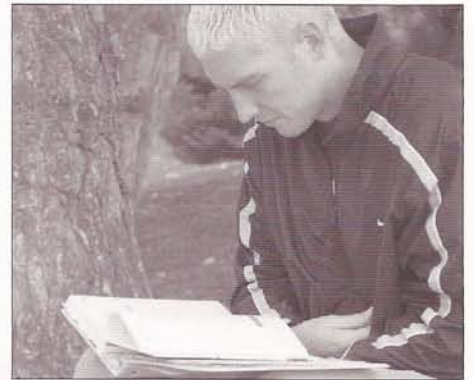
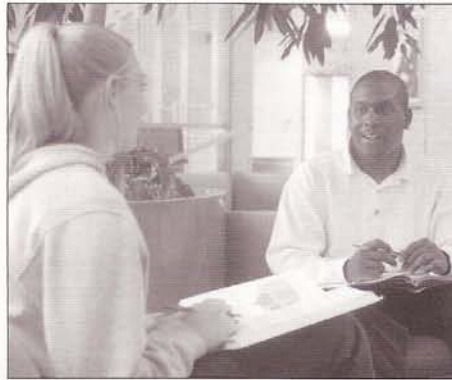
THE OLD OQUIRRH BUCKET

The Old Oquirrh Bucket (named after the Oquirrh Mountains to the west of Salt Lake City) is the symbol of in-state basketball supremacy in Utah. Each year the trophy is awarded to the in-state college team (Utah, BYU, Southern Utah, Utah State and Weber State) which has the best won-loss record against in-state competition. In 2001, BYU posted a 4-1 record against in-state schools and brought home the bucket for the first time since 1994. BYU went 3-2 in 2004 as Utah took the Bucket, thanks to BYU's two-point loss at Utah State. Following are the winners since the trophy was born in the 1974-75 season:

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AT BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY



The toughest challenges any student-athlete will face while in college may not line up across from him in a different color jersey. Splitting their time between the classroom, the weight room, the training room and the field can make academic success a more difficult challenge than any they will face on the field.

The BYU student-athlete is not alone in his or her quest for academic excellence. As a team surrounds him in the field to help him reach another championship, a different team is in place to help him attain his academic goals.

E. J. Caffaro and his staff in the Student Athlete Center are in charge of monitoring players' success in the classroom and their progress toward graduation. The Student Athlete Center staff serve as mentors to the players and are active participants in their academic careers from the time they arrive. Caffaro, who coached football and basketball for the past 15 years at Snow College and Ricks College before coming to BYU, knows well the demands placed on student-athletes.

"We understand what the players are going through day to day. We talk schedules with the freshmen and try to get them into certain classes to help get them acclimated to the workload," said Caffaro. "We want to emphasize good structure and support in their academics."

As mentors, they monitor players' progress from registration through finals. They have access to players' grades and, should signs of problems arise, they try to solve them before they become serious. Tutors are available through the

BYU's name resonates from East to West, thanks in no small part to the efforts of more than 600 student-athletes competing at the highest levels. In 2003-04, Cougar teams won nine league championships, 15 teams advanced to NCAA play, and BYU teams achieved 11 top-25 finishes, the most since the 1993-94 season. This success, however, isn't limited to the field of play. During 2003-04, a conference-high 92 BYU student-athletes were named Mountain West Conference Scholar-Athletes — 19 more than any other institution.

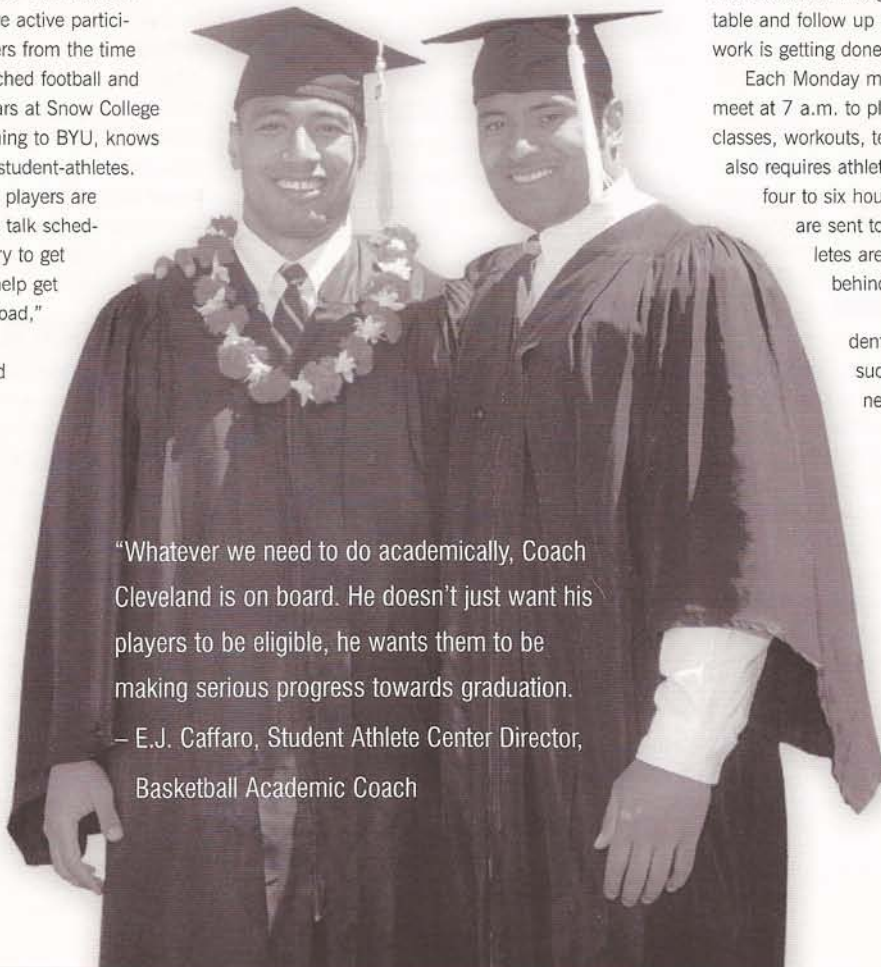
Student Athlete Center at any time yet the athlete must take the initiative to arrange it. Should an athlete's GPA fall below 2.5, Caffaro and the other mentors will take a more active role in that athlete's aca-

demics by placing the athlete on study table.

Once on the study table program, an athlete will be under a rigorous system of checks and balances to insure that they are getting their class work taken care of. Caffaro and the other mentors take it upon themselves to arrange tutors for athletes on study table and follow up with the tutors to make sure the work is getting done.

Each Monday morning, all study table athletes meet at 7 a.m. to plan their week, giving time for classes, workouts, team meetings and homework. It also requires athletes to attend study hall between four to six hours a week. In addition, runners are sent to classes to make sure the athletes are attending so they don't fall behind.

The future will see BYU's student athletes reach new levels of success as work has begun on a new Student Athlete Center.

STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC CENTER (SAAC)

BYU student-athletes are seeking to excel academically, athletically, and are preparing for life after they graduate. The transition into university life can be challenging for any student. This is especially true for student-athletes who are expected to be good students and outstanding athletes. They are also under obligation to understand and comply with a variety of NCAA rules and regulations in order to be eligible to compete. The Student Athlete Academic Center was created to provide a place where student-athletes can receive support and resources as they pursue their goals.

TUTORING

Personal tutors are provided for athletes through the Student Athlete Academic Center with funds made available by the Cougar Club. Tutors are hired to tutor multiple subjects. To obtain a tutor, student-athletes may contact their academic advisor.

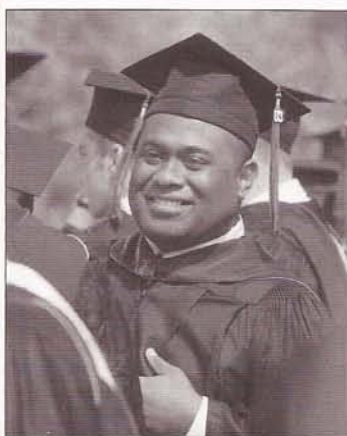
MENTORS

Mentors are available for any student-athlete through the Student Athlete Academic Center. Incoming freshmen will be assigned a mentor for their first semester. Mentors are

equipped with the basic word processing programs: Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. Internet is accessible on some computers. Computers can be checked out before away games and should be checked in upon the athletes return.

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The BYU Athletics Department is an active participant in the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The services provided by the Student Athlete Academic Center target each of the five commitments of the CHAMPS/Life Skills program.



One of the main priorities of the Center is to assist student-athletes as they transition into the BYU culture and the world of college athletics. Student-athletes are assigned an academic advisor to help them register for classes and monitor their progress toward graduation. The advisor is the contact person for student-athletes who have academic or eligibility questions and concerns. The advisor also helps student-athletes make connections with other campus resources such as the Counseling and Career Center, Multicultural Student Services, University Accessibility Center and College Advisement Centers.

ACADEMIC ADVISEMENT

The main focus of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to help student-athletes graduate on time. To achieve this goal, academic advisement is provided to all student-athletes. Advisors are available to help students-athletes register for classes, monitor athletic eligibility, secure tutorial help, and provide on-going support and encouragement. The academic advisors assist student-athletes by having them set weekly and semester goals, teaching them time management and academic success strategies and helping them communicate effectively with their professors. Advisors also assist the coaching staff in monitoring the day-to-day progress of student-athletes who struggle academically.

COMPUTER LABS AND LAPTOP COMPUTERS

The computer lab is located in the Student Athlete Academic Center and is an Access Point Lab available for all students. Athletes can utilize the computers for research and writing papers. E-mailing and surfing the Internet is not considered legitimate study hall time, but is permissible when not in study hall. Laptop computers are available on a first-come first-serve basis. The computers are

COMMITMENT TO ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A primary goal of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to ensure that every student-athlete graduates with a bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study. To achieve this goal, the Center provides a team advisor as part of the comprehensive academic support program. Each athlete has regular visits with his/her team advisor who assists with registration and monitors progress toward graduation. Tutoring is also available for every student-athlete. The Student Athlete Academic Center is conveniently located on the third floor of the new Student Athlete Building.

COMMITMENT TO ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The Student Athlete Academic Center employs a sport psychologist to provide performance enhancement interventions for BYU teams, coaches and student-athletes. These interventions include: increasing awareness for sport performance, goal-setting, arousal regulation through relaxation and energizing techniques, imagery training, confidence building through self-talk strategies, developing pre-competition plans, concentration (focusing) training and team-building interventions. The overall objective of these types of interventions is to assist individual student-athletes and athletic teams to perform at consistently high levels. Personal counseling is also available through the sport psychologist as needed.

COMMITMENT TO PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Student Athlete Academic Center personnel are also active in teaching classes designed to promote leadership, emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills. Student-athletes are taught about



some of the unique issues they face in the world of college athletics and how to thrive in the university setting and beyond.

COMMITMENT TO CAREER DEVELOPMENT

A career specialist is available to assist student-athletes with a variety of career issues. They receive help in choosing a major, building their resume, establishing a career network and preparing for their transition from college athletics into the world of work. These services are available through individual consultation, workshops, computer programs and University courses. Career exploration and career transition classes are highly recommended to all student-athletes. Internship and employment opportunities are also made available through the Career Network, which is made up of Varsity Club and Cougar Club members.

COMMITMENT TO SERVICE

A vital part of Brigham Young University's involvement in the CHAMPS/Life Skills program includes a commitment to service. The CHAMPS program supports the philosophy that all student-athletes have inherent talents that allow them to excel in athletics and in life. Athletes provide valuable role models and have many unique opportunities to serve their campus and surrounding communities. The Student Athlete Academic Center coordinates service opportunities networking with schools, churches and community events. Many requests for service projects are received throughout the year. Student-athletes are expected to be involved in at least three hours of community service per semester. Student-athletes enjoy the opportunity to be involved in serving and find these opportunities fun and rewarding.

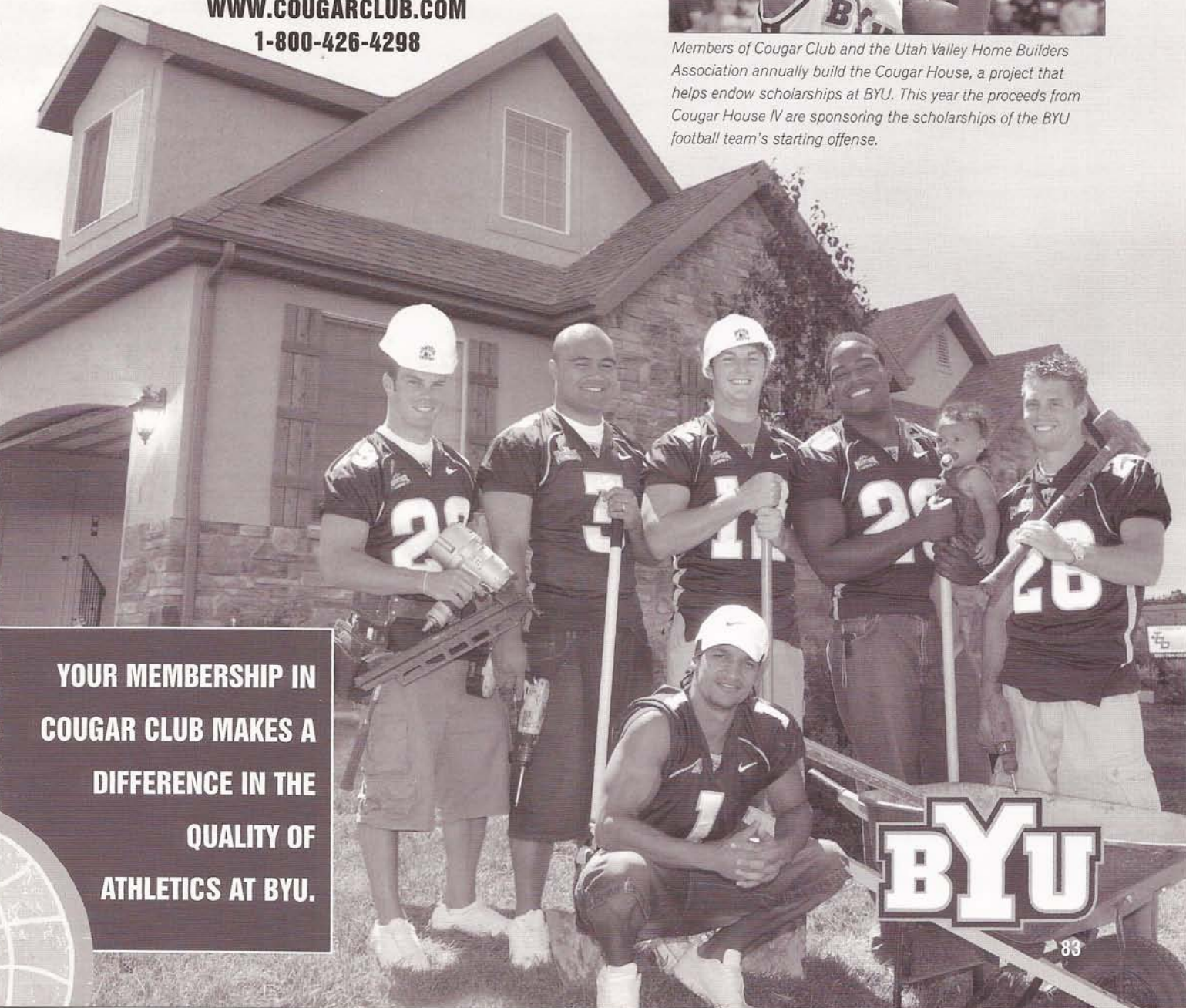

CECIL SAMUELSON

University President

Cecil O. Samuelson began his work as the 14th president of Brigham Young University on May 1, 2003.

Dr. Samuelson is a Salt Lake City native who has served at the University of Utah as professor of medicine, dean of the School of Medicine and vice president of health sciences. Prior to his call as a full-time

General Authority of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he was senior vice president of Intermountain Health Care. He holds a bachelor of science degree, a master's degree in educational psychology and a medical degree from the University of Utah.

He fulfilled his residency and held a fellowship in rheumatic and genetic diseases at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, North Carolina. He has received numerous scholastic honors and is the author or co-author of 48 original publications, eight books or chapters of books and 13 abstracts. He also has served as a director, officer or member of several national medical and hospital organizations.

Dr. Samuelson was called in 1994 to serve the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy. At the time of his assignment to BYU, he was a member of the Presidency of the Seventy. He has served the Church also as a regional representative, stake president, stake high counselor, branch president and missionary. He has served as president of two areas of the Church, the Utah North Area and the Europe North Area.

He and his wife, Sharon Giauque Samuelson, have five children and three grandchildren. Formal investiture of President Samuelson was on September 9, 2003.

Advancement Vice President

LARRY ECHOHAWK

Faculty Representative

Larry EchoHawk is a tenured professor at the J. Reuben Clark School of Law at Brigham Young University. He was appointed the BYU Faculty Representative in May 2004. As the faculty representative he works closely with BYU's administration and athletics administrators in monitoring the athletic program within the BYU community and its relationships outside the university.

In 1995, he received one of the NCAA's highest honors, the Silver Anniversary Award, which is given to collegiate athletes who graduated 25 years ago and who have gone on to make outstanding contributions in their professional lives. Only five are awarded every year and EchoHawk joins Gifford Nielson as the only BYU student-athletes to receive such an honor.

Professor EchoHawk attended BYU on a football scholarship and competed in every game between the years of 1966 to 1969, where he earned Academic All-Western Athletic Conference honors before he graduated in 1970. Upon graduation, he received a juris doctor degree from the University of Utah in 1973 and completed graduate business courses at Stanford University. A member of the Pawnee Tribe, Dr. EchoHawk served as Attorney General for the State of Idaho from 1990 to 1994 and in 1994 was the Democratic nominee for governor of Idaho. He joined BYU's law faculty in 1995 and was named Professor of the Year by the law students in 1997. In 1999, President Bill Clinton appointed Dr. EchoHawk to the Coordinating Council on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

Dr. EchoHawk married the former Terry Pries. They are the proud parents of six children: Jennifer, Paul, Mark, Matthew, Emily and Michael.

BYU ATHLETIC'S TRANSITION LEADERSHIP TEAM

Following a four-month, comprehensive review of Brigham Young University's athletic program, Advancement Vice President K. Fred Skousen announced in early September the consolidation of Men's and Women's Athletics into one athletic department.

The new department is being led by a transitional leadership team under the direction of Skousen. The members of the leadership team are Peter Pilling, senior associate athletic director; Tom Holmoe, senior associate athletic director; Brian Santiago, associate athletic director; and Janie Penfield, newly appointed associate athletic director and senior woman administrator.

Pilling and Holmoe are acting as co-chairs of the transition team, reporting to Skousen. The consolidation of the two programs is an important step, Skousen explained.

"By having one athletic department, BYU will eliminate any duplication of time and resources, channeling all effort into one cohesive program. This new department will be based on a well-defined strategy, allowing for consistent budget management, consistent treatment of student-athletes and clear accountability."



PETER PILLING

Senior Associate AD

Pilling came to BYU in December of 2001 as senior associate athletics director after spending four years as associate athletic director for external operations at Villanova University. He currently serves as co-chair of the Transition Leadership Team overseeing the consolidation of men's and women's athletics. He is the

administrator responsible for men's and women's basketball and soccer. Pilling also oversees finance, athletic communications, marketing and admissions. At Villanova he managed and oversaw the operations of marketing, promotions, licensing, media relations, ticket operations and the Wildcat radio and television network. His other professional experience includes tenures as associate athletic director at St. Bonaventure and the University of Wyoming. He has also held athletic administrative positions at Morehead State and the University of Kentucky. Pilling has served as an NCAA peer review member and has held positions on the Big East and Atlantic 10 conference committees. Pilling is a former board member and past president of the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators (NACMA). He also served on the board of directors for the National Collegiate Licensing Association (NCLA). In his third year as associate athletics director, Brian Santiago was appointed to serve on the Transition Leadership Team in September. 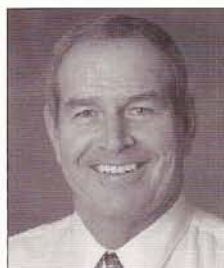


MIKE KING

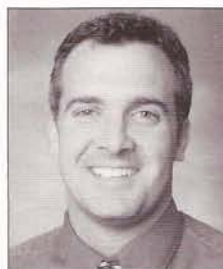


RALPH ZOBELL

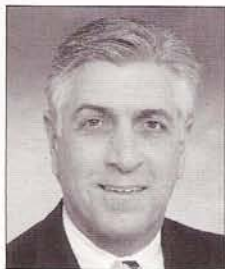


DR. MITCHELL PRATTE

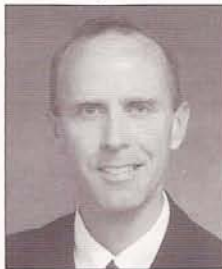

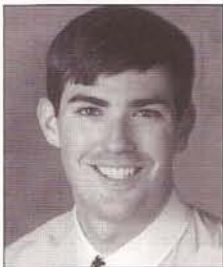

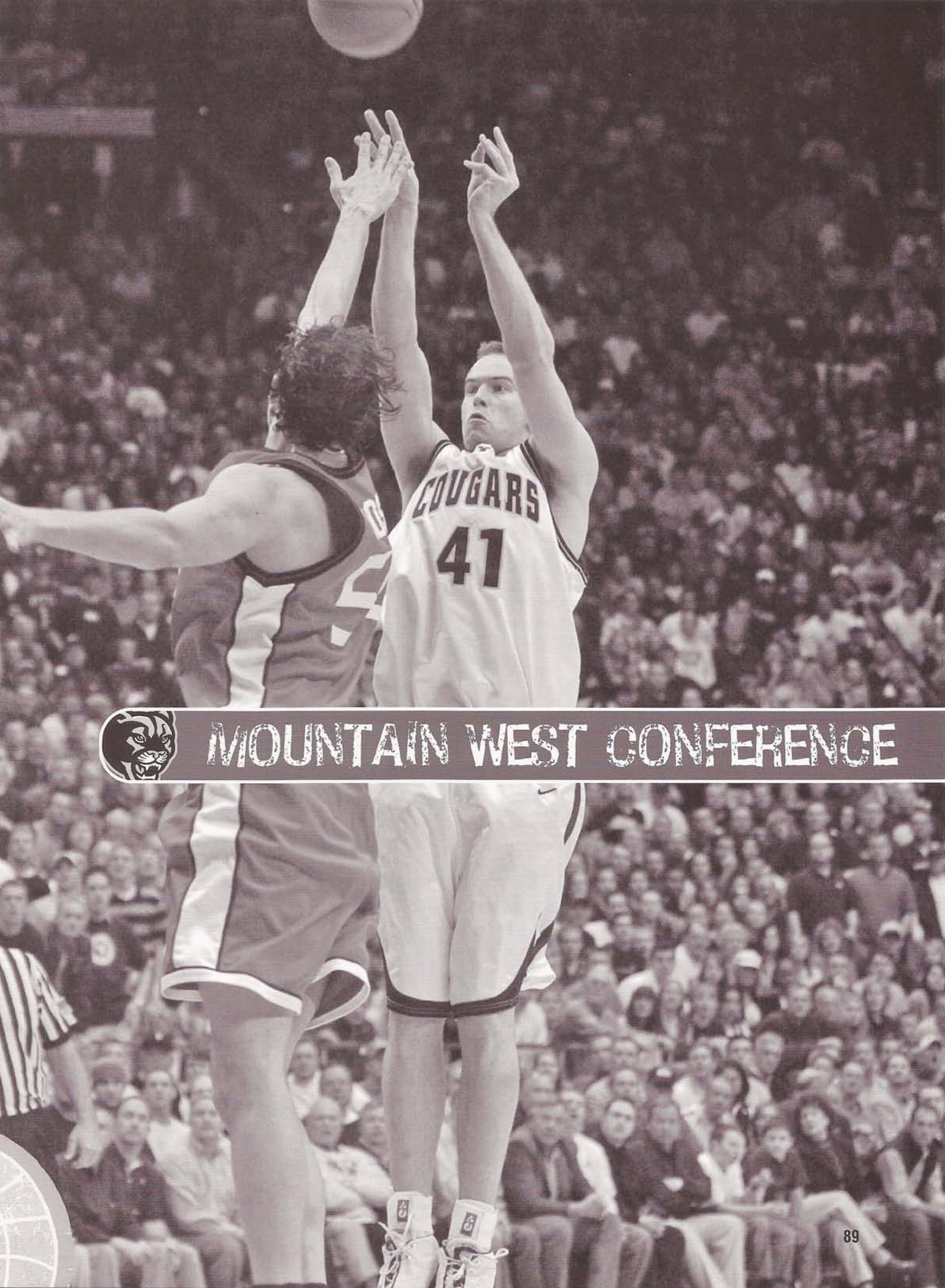

AN ELITE EIGHT-TEAM CONFERENCE THAT STANDS ABOVE THE REST

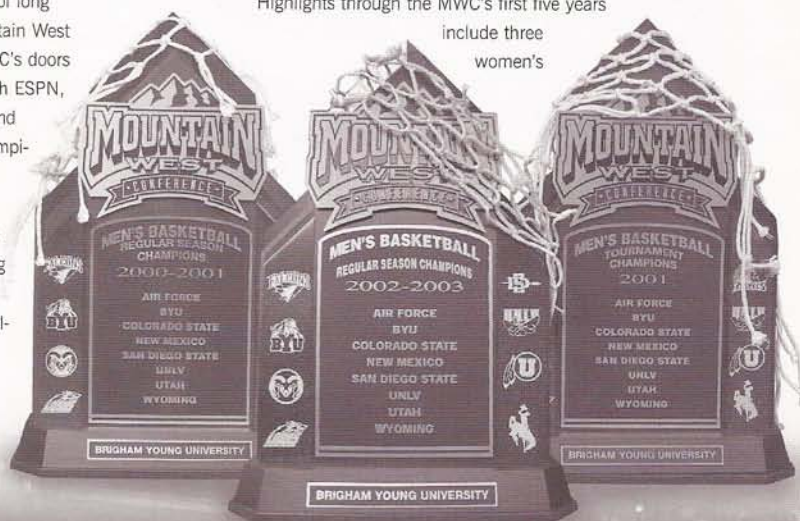
The Mountain West Conference was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions — Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — met in Denver and decided to form the MWC.

The cornerstone of the conference's formation was the maintenance of long standing athletic rivalries among its member institutions. Hence, the Mountain West Conference was formed. Located in Colorado Springs, Colo., when the MWC's doors opened for business the new league had in place a seven-year contract with ESPN, giving the broadcaster exclusive national television rights to MWC football and men's basketball; and three-year agreements to send the league's football champion to the Liberty Bowl and a second team to the Las Vegas Bowl.

The Conference officially began operations on July 1, 1999. Prior to opening its doors an executive committee was established and named Craig Thompson commissioner. Thompson had less than one year to name the new league, settle on a city to serve as the league's headquarters, find a television partner, arrange for bowl tie-ins, hire staff, and develop a logo.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful geography in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the unparalleled Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,000 feet) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West), the balmy weather and Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State and the southwestern flavor of New Mexico.

Highlights through the MWC's first five years include three women's

cross country national championships; participation in 15 bowl games; sending 16 of its men's basketball teams to postseason play in the last three years, including nine NCAA Tournament appearances; 12 berths in the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament, including three "Sweet 16" appearances; sending five of eight men's golf teams to NCAAs each of the last five years; and 14 NCAA Volleyball berths with two teams advancing to the "Sweet 16" three of the last five years.

In addition to the 19 MWC-sponsored sports, programs like BYU, New Mexico and Utah have national titles in non-league sports, including two NCAA titles in 2004. BYU has laid claim to the 2004, 2001 and 1999 NCAA men's volleyball championship. New Mexico captured the '04 national championship in men's skiing. Utah has won a total of 21 national championships in the sports of women's gymnastics and skiing.

The MWC continues to establish itself as one of the best basketball conferences top-to-bottom in the country. For the third consecutive season, the MWC sent three of its eight teams to the NCAA tournament in 2003-04. The MWC has been ranked seventh or higher in the final Collegiate Basketball RPI each of the past three years.



In the five year history of the Mountain West Conference, the Cougars have won 53 of 95 conference championships — nearly 60 percent of all championships awarded in the eight-member conference.

CRAIG THOMPSON MWC Commissioner

In the ever-changing world of intercollegiate athletics, Craig Thompson is poised to make sure the Mountain West Conference assumes its proper place within the Division I-A ranks. As the MWC embarks



on its sixth season of athletic competition, Thompson enters his seventh year as the league's commissioner.

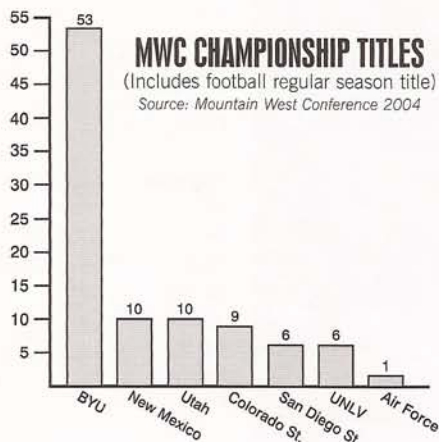
There is no more important issue facing the Mountain West than gaining access to college football's lucrative Bowl Championship Series. Thompson has been instrumental in the ongoing BCS discussions, and is considered a driving force in the negotiations for greater access. Following the expiration of the current BCS contract after the 2005 season, the champion of the Mountain West Conference will have a legitimate chance of playing in a BCS game.

Under his leadership, the Mountain West became a player in the changing landscape of intercollegiate athletics when it announced in January that TCU would become the MWC's ninth member beginning with the 2005-06 athletic season.

As the Mountain West enters its sixth year of a seven-year television contract with ESPN, Thompson has begun the negotiating process for the Conference's next television rights package. He also has taken a proactive approach in shaping the MWC's post-season bowl tie-ins.

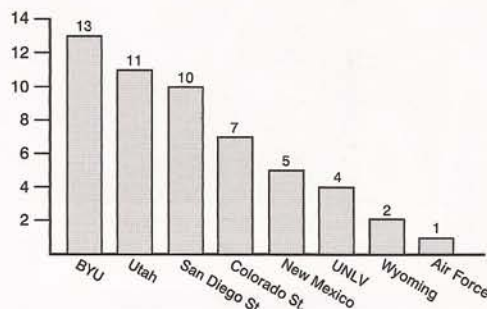
Under Thompson's leadership, the Mountain West Conference continues to gain notoriety. Through the first five years, excluding institutional local packages, 423 football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball games had been televised. Nearly 75 percent of the football games played had aired on television, with 94 games broadcast nationally. Thompson has guaranteed additional television exposure with the advent of MWC Productions and the league's partnership with College Sports Television.

Prior to his current role, Thompson served as the commissioner of the Sun Belt Conference for nearly 12 years and as the only commissioner of the American South Conference prior to the leagues merger in 1991.

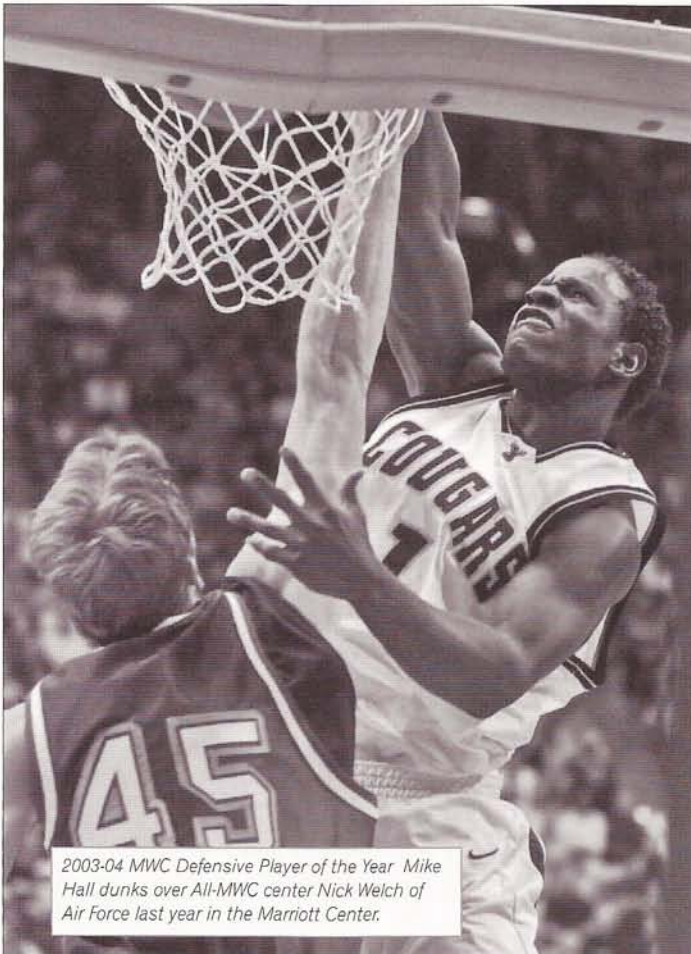

MWC HOME COURT ADVANTAGE

Mountain West arenas have become exceptionally difficult places to play as league teams have posted a combined non-conference home winning percentage above 80 percent each of the last five years. BYU currently owns a 17-game home win streak and has won 40 straight at home vs. non-conference opponents. The Cougars are 61-3 at home since the MWC was formed in 1999-2000. Air Force enters the 2004-05 campaign with a 14-game home win streak, including eight straight home conference victories. Overall, the MWC heads the list of conference only home court winning percentage among the top leagues in the RPI ratings. MWC TOURNAMENT TITLE GOES THROUGH BYU

BYU is one of five different MWC teams to win the MWC Tournament in the first five years of the league championship event. The Cougars won the MWC Tournament title in 2001. The other four seasons the Cougars have lost in the tournament to the eventual champion. BYU lost in the finals to home-team UNLV in 2000 and were defeated by San Diego State in the 2002 quarter-finals, lost in overtime to CSU in the 2003 semifinals and lost in the final seconds last year to Utah in the semifinals.

2004-05 BYU OPPONENTS

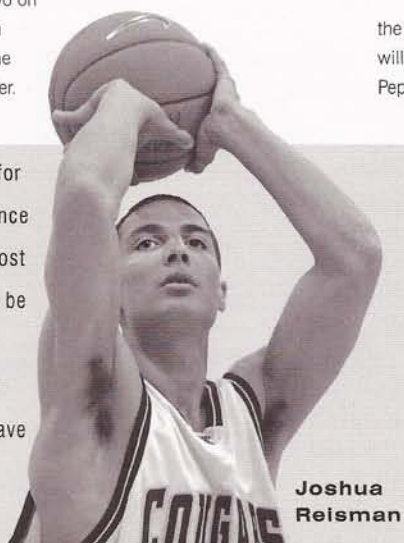
Participating in the EA Sports Maui Invitational, a return trip to the Delta Center and six potential contests against Atlantic Coast Conference and Pac-10 Conference opponents highlights BYU's 2004-05 schedule.

BYU will play 16 potential regular-season games against teams that qualified for postseason last year, including four ranked in the top 25 of the final 2004 poll.

"This is probably as good a schedule as we've had since I've been at BYU," Cleveland said. "I think the community and students will be excited about the quality of opponents we will play. We're committed to playing great teams to help our team reach its full potential."

"Our preseason should create great opportunities to prepare for conference and postseason play. The Mountain West Conference is full of veteran teams returning top players. Obviously, we lost a lot of significant contributors from last year, but we plan to be competitive and compete for the conference championship. I want this team to learn to reach its full potential, to focus on being the best it can be. If we do, with this schedule, we'll have a chance to reach our goals in January and February."

The Cougars will play two teams from the ACC in the same season for the first time in nearly 50 years when they face possible preseason No. 1 North Carolina to open the season at the Maui Invitational on Nov. 22 and host North Carolina State in the Marriott Center on Dec. 21. The last time BYU had a schedule with two ACC teams was the 1955-56 season when the Cougars played at both N.C. State and Wake Forest.

N.C. State's visit to Provo this year also marks the first time an ACC team will face the Cougars on their home floor. Both North Carolina and NC State finished last season ranked in the top 25 and return strong teams. The Tar Heels are one of only two teams in the nation to have three players named to the preseason John R. Wooden Award list, while the ACC runner-up Wolfpack are led by fellow Wooden Award candidate Julius Hodge, the ACC Player of the Year and a first-team All-America selection by ESPN.com.

BYU will also play a minimum of three Pac-10 teams, with a fourth Pac-10 foe, Stanford, a possible second-round opponent at the Maui Invitational. After playing North Carolina in the tournament's primetime

opening-day nationally televised game on ESPN2, the Cougars will meet either the Pac-10 Champion Cardinal (30-2 last year) or the Southeastern Conference's Tennessee Volunteers in the second round. The final day will pit Texas, Louisville, Iowa or host Chaminade against the Cougars.

After a well-received debut last year against Oklahoma State, the Cougars will again play a game at the Delta Center in Salt Lake City. The Cougars of Washington State will join BYU for a Dec. 11 contest on the home floor of the Utah Jazz. BYU's other games against Pac-10 opponents include the regular-season home opener against California on Nov. 27 and a road game at USC on Dec. 4.

The first of four in-state games during December tips off on Dec. 1 when BYU travels to Logan for the second straight season to challenge Big West Champion Utah State. BYU and Utah State will meet twice in the same season for the first time since 1992 when the Aggies return to Provo on Dec. 18 for a rematch in the Marriott Center.

The Cougars will sandwich Christmas around games against Weber State in Ogden on Dec. 23 and versus Southern Utah in Provo on Dec. 28.

Two other tough opponents will grace the Marriott Center court prior to the new year, with Boise State coming to Provo on Dec. 8 and Santa Clara helping BYU close out 2004 with a Dec. 31 contest. The Broncos out of the Western Athletic Conference finished 23-10 last year, including a 2-1 NIT record, while the Broncos of the West Coast Conference finished 16-16 after losing 63-62 to top-5 ranked Gonzaga in their conference tournament semifinals.

BYU travels to California to play Saint Mary's, a 19-12 team and West Coast Conference finalist last year, on Jan. 4 prior to starting MWC action in Provo against San Diego State on Jan. 8. Before resuming its MWC schedule, the Cougars will take one more dip into non-conference play on Jan. 11 when they host Montana State-Billings. The Pacific West Conference team led NCAA Division II teams with 12.4 threes per game last year and was fourth in scoring at 93.1 points per game.

After its MWC opener with SDSU, BYU takes the

Front Range road swing for two television contests. The Cougars face Colorado State on Jan. 15 in the weekly MWC Game of the Week on ESPN+Plus at 1 p.m. The Wyoming Cowboys then host BYU on Jan. 17 in the first of two 10 p.m. (MST) ESPN games featuring the Cougars.

BYU hosts reigning regular-season champion Air Force on Jan. 22 and New Mexico on Jan. 24 before playing in-state rival Utah on Jan. 31 in a 10 p.m. ESPN tip in the Marriott Center. After the three-game home stand, BYU travels to UNLV (Feb. 5) and San Diego State (Feb. 7), with the game in Las Vegas slated for ESPN+Plus.

Return games in Provo against Wyoming (Feb. 12) and Colorado State (Feb. 14) and road contests at New Mexico (Feb. 19) and Air Force (Feb. 21) precede BYU's rematch with Utah in Salt Lake City on Feb. 26. The Cougars and reigning MWC Tournament Champion Utes play at 1 p.m. in the featured Saturday game on ESPN+Plus.

BYU concludes the regular season against UNLV in the Marriott Center on Mar. 5. The MWC Tournament will be conducted for the second straight year at the Pepsi Center in Denver, March 10-12.

As part of preparing for its challenging schedule, BYU should receive some tougher-than-usual tests in its two exhibition games. After the Cougar Preview on Oct. 29, Cleveland will see how his young squad performs against BYU-Hawaii on Nov. 5 and the University of Calgary on Nov. 12.

The Cougars' Division II sister school from Laie, Hawaii, won the Pacific West Conference title last year with a 23-6 record and features two former Cougars in All-American Jake Chrisman and point guard Shawn Oponui. Last year the Seaside defeated three Division I teams with victories over Baylor, Northern Illinois and San Jose State. Calgary, meanwhile, posted a 25-11 record as one of Canada's top four teams,

advancing to the semifinals of the Canadian Interuniversity Sport Championship.

BYU's schedule includes 10 teams that finished in the top three in their respective league standings, with eight finishing as either the league champion or runner-up. Seven teams played in the NCAA Tournament and five were invited to the NIT, while eight opponents achieved 20-win seasons last year. North Carolina, North Carolina State, Stanford and Texas all finished the season in the final top-25 rankings.

Nine non-conference opponents played BYU last season. The Cougars achieved a 6-3 record in those games with home wins over USC (85-61), Weber State (86-65), Saint Mary's (70-55) and Southern Utah (88-54) and road victories over Boise State (75-69) and Santa Clara (68-66). The three setbacks came on the road at California (47-46), Utah State (76-74) and North Carolina State (89-62). BYU will meet Montana State-Billings for the first time and could also have its first-ever game against Chaminade should the two schools meet at the Maui Invitational.

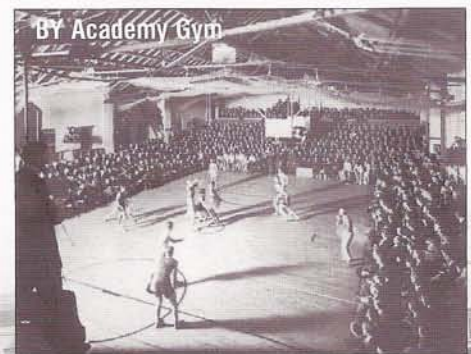
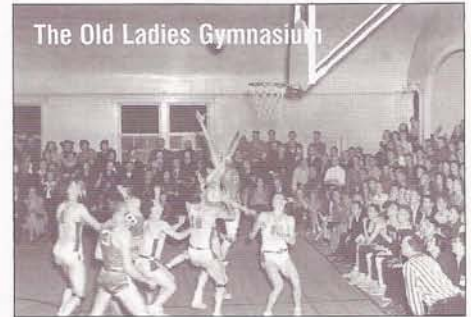


WINNING: A BYU BASKETBALL TRADITION

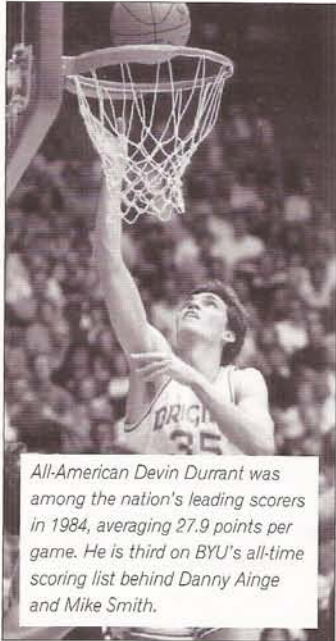
BYU has one of the nation's richest basketball traditions. In fact, 82 of the Cougars' 102 seasons on the hardwoods have been winning campaigns. Since putting its first team on the floor in 1903, BYU has amassed a 1471-940 record to rank No. 19 all-time among NCAA Division I programs in total victories. The Cougars' .610 winning percentage ranks 36th all-time.

But it's not just the sum of victories that has made BYU one of the nation's top hoop programs. Along the way, BYU has claimed 26 conference championships and received 30 postseason invites, including 21 NCAA Tournament appearances. The Cougars won two NIT titles (1951 and 1966) back when the NIT was considered the premier national tournament. BYU players also boast 96 all-conference and 40 All-America citations along with 43 NBA draft selections.

BYU has won conference championships in four different leagues. The first seven came from the Rocky Mountain Conference and continued as BYU won five as a member of the Skyline Conference. During the Cougars' membership in the Western Athletic Conference, BYU teams won 12 conference championships. Tack on two Mountain West Conference titles in the league's first five seasons, including the 2003 title, and BYU has won one-fourth of all possible conference championships.



The Smith Fieldhouse: Home Court 1951-71



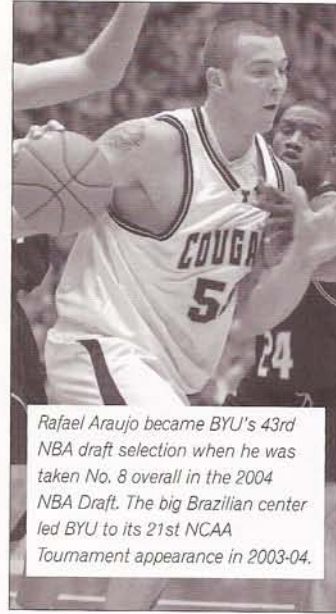

returned home to Yugoslavia to pursue his passion to better-develop basketball in Europe. He earned one gold and two silver medals while playing on four Olympic teams and was the longtime coach of the Yugoslavian national team, mentoring many future NBA players. He ended his playing career as the all-time Croatian scoring leader.

Before Cosic's arrival in Provo, the Cougars already held the distinction of being the first U.S. program to include an international player on its roster in Finland's Timo Lampen in 1958-59. BYU also boasts two of the nation's longest-standing rivalries, having first played Utah State in 1906 and Utah in 1909, with the 237 contests against the Utes being the 10th most games ever played between two teams.

BYU's basketball legacy is filled with many unique achievements. In 1981, the Cougars advanced to the Elite Eight when All-American Danny Ainge made what is still considered one of the NCAA Tournament's most amazing plays. Trailing Notre Dame 50-49 with eight seconds remaining, Ainge took the ball coast-to-coast, dribbling through all five Irish defenders, before lofting the game-winning finger roll just over the reach of Orlando Woolridge. Ainge received the Wooden Award and Eastman Trophy in 1981 as the nation's top player.

The Cougars have called several places "home" throughout their long history. The first radio broadcast in the intermountain area took place on Feb. 17, 1940, when the first radio broadcast in the intermountain area took place on Feb. 17, 1940, when BYU hosted Utah State in the Old Ladies Gymnasium in Provo. BYU broke a ban on broadcasting college sports due to the clamor from fans that only 500 people could fit into the gym. Arch Madsen called the game on KOVO radio in Provo with station manager David Walker providing analysis. Home games have also been played in Springville, the old BY Academy and even on the University of Utah's home court.

Fieldhouse to see Cougar basketball. With BYU's winning tradition, the then 10,000-seat arena grew too small for the increasing interest. In 1971, the Marriott Center was built, giving BYU what is still to this day one of the most intimidating arenas in college basketball.

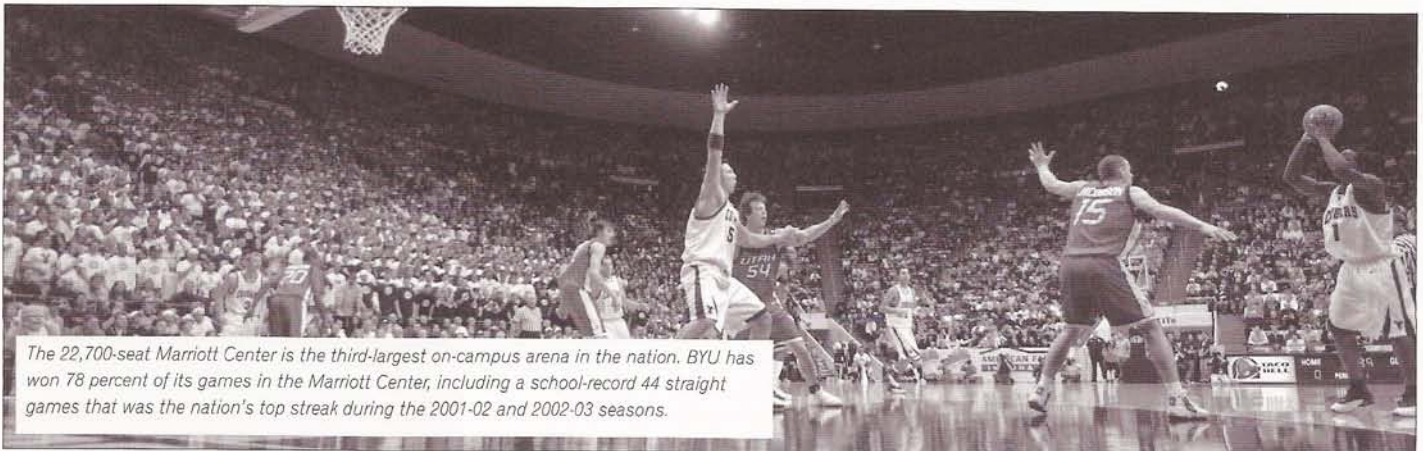
Since opening the 22,700-seat Marriott Center, the Cougars have been among the nation's annual attendance leaders with 19 top-5 rankings, three times finishing No. 1. The Cougars have not disappointed their faithful, winning 78 percent of their games in the Marriott Center, includ-

Had the victory streak not been snapped by a single-game cross-country trip to UAB in Birmingham, the Cougars could have easily found themselves in the No. 1 spot as the top-rated Arizona Wildcats had lost and left the door open for the Cougars to be the only undefeated team in college basketball.

Over the years, 21 coaches have guided the Cougars, 18 with winning records. Taking the helm after a program-worst 1-25 season in 1996-97, current coach Steve Cleveland has restored the BYU program to its tradition with NCAA



The 22,700-seat Marriott Center is the third-largest on-campus arena in the nation. BYU has won 78 percent of its games in the Marriott Center, including a school-record 44 straight games that was the nation's top streak during the 2001-02 and 2002-03 seasons.

Legendary coach Stan Watts, who guided BYU to its NIT titles, was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1986, while All-American center Kresimir Cosic became BYU's second Hall member in 1996.

Turning down the opportunity to play in the NBA, Cosic

BYU created a new home on campus with the construction of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. The Smith Fieldhouse was home to the Cougars from 1951-1971, with 20 different all-conference players, including seven All-Americans, starring for BYU during that era. Many capacity crowds crammed inside the

In recent history, the highest ranking a Cougar team has received in the media polls was the 1987-88 team. At one point the team was 17-0 and climbed as high as No. 2 and No. 3 in the rankings,

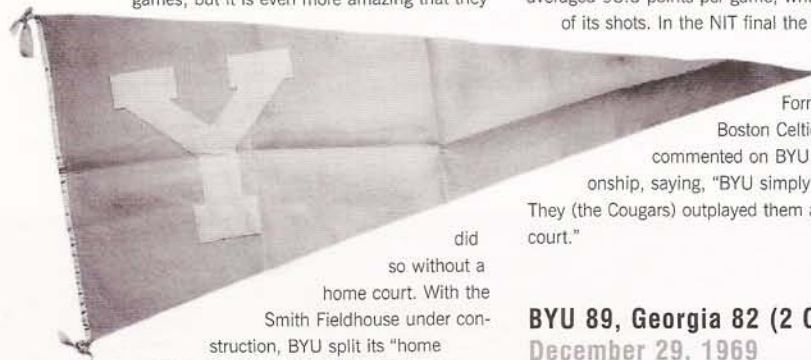

1951 NIT CHAMPIONS

BYU 62, Dayton 43
March 17, 1951

In 1951, the Cougars defeated Dayton in the championship game of the National Invitational Tournament. After the win, BYU accepted an invitation to the NCAA tournament, which at the time was not yet recognized as the decisive tournament for the country's best team. As the nation's champions, the Cougars finished 28-9 with the most wins in BYU basketball history. Not only is it impressive that BYU won the national title and so many games, but it is even more amazing that they



did so without a home court. With the Smith Fieldhouse under construction, BYU split its "home games" in Springville High's gymnasium and at the University of Utah. Head coach Stan Watts guided the Cougars to the national title in only his second year at the helm. Watts had the help of Mel Hutchins, who became the first Cougar to be named a first team All-American and went on to win Rookie of the Year in the NBA in 1952-53 season.

BYU 68, San Francisco 61
December 22, 1953

Stan Watts continued to bring glory to the BYU basketball program in 1953, by bringing prominent basketball programs to play in Provo. At the beginning of the first full season in the Smith Fieldhouse, the highly touted San Francisco program came to face the Cougars in Provo. The game would make memories for any fans present, as two San Francisco players, Bill Russell and K.C. Jones, went on to be stars in the NBA. San Francisco was the first of the big basketball schools to make the trip to

Provo, with Michigan and UCLA playing the Cougars in the Smith Fieldhouse in the season to follow.

BYU 97, NYU 84
March 19, 1966

For the second year in a row, the Cougars finished as a 20-game winner with their final game against NYU in the championship game of the National Invitational Tournament. Playing in a packed Madison Square Garden, the No. 1-ranked Cougars outplayed NYU,

leading 48-43 at halftime and never looking back. With star Dick Nemelka on the bench with four fouls, the Cougars turned to junior center Craig Raymond and junior forward Gary Hill. Hill and Raymond, non-starters going into the tournament, led the high-scoring Cougar offense with 21 points each. Steve Kramer added 20 points to make the third Cougar with 20 or more points and the fifth Cougar to score in the double digits. The win over the Violets marked the second NIT championship for both BYU and head coach Stan Watts. The season was the highest scoring in Cougar history. BYU averaged 95.5 points per game, while hitting 50 percent of its shots. In the NIT final the Cougars shot 59

percent while handling NYU.

Former coach of the Boston Celtics, Red Auerbach, commented on BYU at the championship, saying, "BYU simply overpowered them.

They (the Cougars) outplayed them all over the court."

BYU 89, Georgia 82 (2 OT)
December 29, 1969

In the middle of a forgettable 8-18 season, the Cougars took a memorable thriller from the Georgia Bulldogs in the Quaker City Tournament. Playing in Philadelphia, the Cougars found themselves down 38-25 at the half, but senior center Paul Ruffner led the Cougars charge back in the second half. The All-WAC Honorable Mention performer finished the game with 37 points and 18 rebounds as the Cougars took two overtimes to complete their comeback. Georgia trailed near the end of regulation and the end of the first overtime but managed to tie the game up both times. BYU was finally able to pull away in the second overtime, outscoring the Bulldogs 11-4. Doug Howard finished with 24 points, starting him on his way to his selection as a second team All-WAC member. The game marked the second time the Cougars had gone to double overtime that season. Earlier in the season, BYU lost a heartbreaker to Texas 76-73.

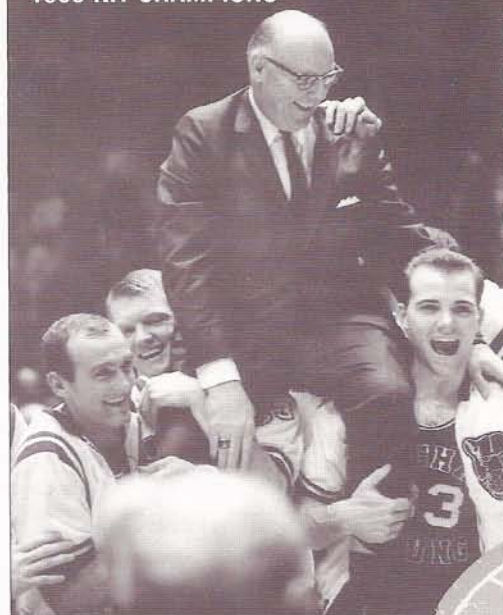
BYU 78, Kansas State 72
December 3, 1971

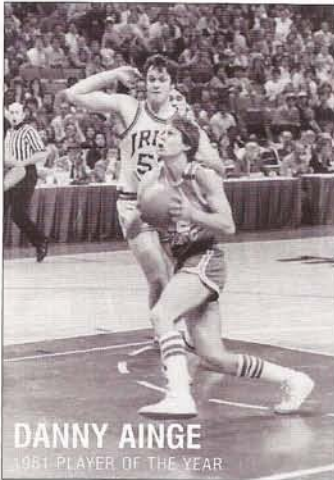
There is a first for everything and the Cougars found a lot of firsts in this, the first game in the Marriott Activities Center. The arena itself was the first of its kind, the largest arena on any campus in the country. With the new arena, Stan Watts and his Cougars hosted the first major basketball tournament for BYU in the first BYU Classic. Nearly every statistic became a record for the Marriott Center that night, but not a single one of them stands today. BYU forward Kresimir Cosic was the high-light reel, scoring 30 points and pulling down 18 rebounds. Cosic's accuracy was impressive, hitting 8-of-11 from the field and 14-of-16 from the free throw line.

BYU 108, LaSalle 106 (3 OT)
December 15, 1979

With nine lead changes in a close game, BYU and LaSalle kept fans in the seats awaiting the outcome of a nail-biter. LaSalle's Michael Brooks set Marriott Center records, which still stand today, scoring 51 points and shooting 24-of-36 from the field. Despite Brooks' efforts the third time truly was a charm for the Cougars. Tied at 98-98 after the end of the second overtime, things looked bleak for the Cougars with Danny Ainge out of the game with fouls. But in the third overtime the career of true freshman Steve Trumbo was born. At 6-7 and 230 pounds, the 18-year-old from Santa Clara, Calif., met the challenge. Trumbo tipped-in a bucket to give BYU a quick lead followed by a Devin Durrant lay-up as the Cougars went up by four. Trumbo went on to score four more points for the Cougars, finishing with six of the 10 points in the final overtime. While the Cougars didn't have a player that scored big like Brooks, BYU won with a team effort as six Cougars finished in double figures.

BYU 95, Utah 76
March 7, 1981

After spotting Utah 10 points to start the game and trailing throughout the first half, BYU turned up the defensive pressure in the second half and spoiled the Utes hopes of claiming an outright conference title with a 95-76 victory in Provo. The Cougars held the Utes to just 29 percent shooting from the field in the second half to win and solidify their place in the NCAA tournament. Danny Ainge led the Cougars in the last home game of his BYU career, scoring 35 points on 14-25 shooting from the field and 7-7 from the free throw line. Utah All-American Danny Vranes was held to only 12 points (4-12 from the field, 4-5 on the line) and was 3-9 in the second half. The win avenged an earlier 56-60 loss to the Utes on their home court at the Special Events Center. Fred Roberts gave the Cougars the lead for good with a jumper from the free throw line at the 14:45 mark in the second half, giving BYU a 55-53 lead. The Cougars outscored the Runnin' Utes 40-23 from that point on, moving Utah into a tie with Wyoming for the WAC championship. BYU had the house packed for the game, setting a Marriott Center attendance record with 23,106.

BYU 51, Notre Dame 50
NCAA East Regional Semifinal
March 19, 1981

With eight seconds left and down by one to Notre Dame, BYU faced elimination in the NCAA East Regional Semifinal. But Danny Ainge refused to allow his senior season end without a fight. Ainge drove the length of the court, dribbling between defenders, and lofted a layup over the outstretched arms of Notre Dame center Orlando Woolridge with only two seconds remaining. His shot gave the Cougars a dramatic one-point victory. Ainge finished the game with only 12 points in the low-scoring affair, but none bigger than the final two. Down by as many as 14 points in the second half, the

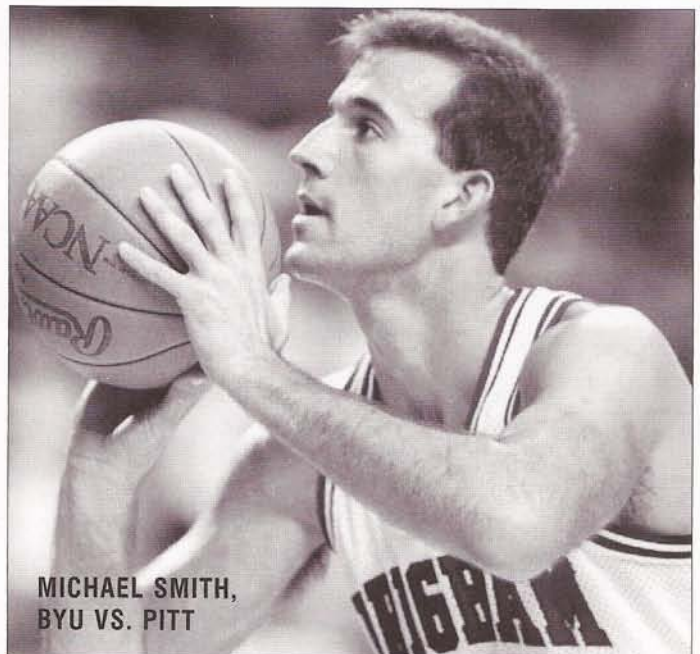
Cougars led only twice during the game. The win moved the Cougars on to the Elite Eight, where BYU lost to Ralph Sampson and Virginia 74-60. BYU finished the season ranked No. 16 in the country and Ainge garnered Eastman and Wooden Award honors.

BYU 80, Notre Dame 76 (OT)
January 13, 1986

National powerhouse Notre Dame and coach Digger Phelps came to Provo and faced a stiff challenge from Jeff Chatman and the BYU Cougars. Chatman nailed a jumper with 1:20 left in regulation to give the Cougars a 63-61 lead. But Notre Dame's Tim Kempton scored with 33 seconds left to tie the score again. Alan Pollard had a chance to win the game, but missed the front end of a 1-and-1 free throw. In overtime, Tom Gneiting scored seven points, including an old-fashion three-point play, to give BYU a 73-69 advantage with 1:33 left. BYU played outstanding defense and made its free throws down the stretch to pull out the 80-76 victory. Notre Dame's All-American guard David Rivers led all scores with 28 points, but it wasn't enough to stop the Cougars who had four players in double-figure scoring. Chatman led BYU with 21 points on 7-of-10 shooting. Gneiting had 14 rebounds to go with his 18 points, while Dixie College transfer Averian Parrish chipped in 12 points and four rebounds. Bob Capener, playing all 45 minutes, had 14 points.

BYU 93, Pitt 73
December 23, 1986

On a year where BYU would find themselves ranked as high as No. 2 in the country, this blowout win vaulted the Cougars into the national spotlight. Pittsburgh was ranked in the top 20 and had one of the nation's top players in 6-10 All-American Charles Smith. It was another Smith, BYU's Michael Smith, who stole the show. Scoring 17 points in the first half and finishing the game with 34 points and 13 rebounds. BYU head coach Ladell Anderson said, "In all my years of coaching - college and professional - I've never been associated with a team that had that kind of first half of play. It was the best half for a team I've coached. BYU held Pitt to 20 percent shooting and caused 22 turnovers. Jeff Chatman had 12 points and Bobby Capener had 18 points on 4-of-7 three-point shooting.

2004-05 BYU COUGAR BASKETBALL

BYU 121, Utah State 112 (OT)

December 19, 1987

BYU almost gave the Utah State Aggies an early Christmas present by blowing an 18-point second half lead, but pulled off the dramatic win in overtime. BYU found itself ahead 61-45 at the half of the high-scoring contest, but couldn't put Utah State away. The Aggies climbed all the way back and might have won the game were it not for poor free throw shooting. Second-team All-American Michael Smith led the Cougars with 39 points and Jeff Chatman chipped in 29. Smith sent the game to overtime by knocking down two free throws with only seven seconds left in the game. Poor free throw shooting doomed the Aggies in overtime, when Utah State managed to hit only 5-13 from the charity stripe. BYU head coach Ladell Andersen praised both teams after the game. "I'm proud of both ball clubs," he said. "It is a game neither club should have lost. It is nice to get a win out of this."

BYU 73, UTEP 71

March 14, 1992

BYU upset UTEP 73-71 in the WAC championship game with a 54-foot prayer by Kevin Nixon as time expired in Fort Collins, Colo. The win advanced BYU to the NCAA Tournament with an automatic bid, where they were defeated by Shaquille O'Neal's LSU Tigers. The Cougars were down by 11 at the half, but fought hard in the second half to rally from as many as 14 points. Jared Miller and Gary Trost led the way for the

Cougars scoring 17 points a piece. Mark Helsop scored 12 for the Cougars. Nixon, a starter, played only 11 minutes in the game due to sluggishness, but came in for the final 2.4 seconds for the final play with a hope to get a good look at the basket. The play was designed to draw a foul on a screen, but no call was made on the collision between the BYU and UTEP players. BYU had no choice but to throw the ball in to Nixon. "It felt good when it left my hands," said Nixon. "I thought it had a chance." The shot was replayed over and over again in the months to come on highlight tapes nationally. ESPN nominated the play to receive an ESPY award for college basketball's Play of the Year. Most BYU fans will remember the shot as one of the greatest in BYU history next to Danny Ainge's miracle drive against Notre Dame in the 1981 NCAA Tournament to send them to the Elite Eight.

BYU 73, Memphis 67 (OT)

December 22, 1992

After defeating Oklahoma 76-75 in the first round of the Maui Invitational, the Cougars took on Penny Hardaway and the Memphis Tigers. Hardaway would score 37 points, but it wasn't enough to stop four Cougars in double figures as BYU pulled out an exciting overtime victory. BYU led 33-28 at the half before Hardaway turned it on helping the Tigers shoot 60 percent in the second half. Kevin Nixon, who scored 14 points on the night, hit a three pointer to tie the game at 63-63 with 1:09 to play. Both Hardaway and BYU's Nick Sanderson had tries to win the game before overtime. In OT Memphis went up 67-63 with 2:57 left to play. Sanderson cut the

lead to 67-66 with a huge three-pointer. After a Hardaway turnover, Nixon nailed another three-pointer with 56 seconds left to go ahead 69-67. Sanderson made a quick steal with 25 seconds to play and took it the length of the court for an easy layin. After a failed Memphis three-point attempt, Russell Larson ended the game with a big dunk to finish off the Tigers 73-67. BYU went on to the finals of the Maui Invitational losing to Duke 89-66. Sanderson had 15 points and four three-pointers, Larson had 11 points and 8 rebounds and Gary Trost led the Cougars with 16 points and 8 rebounds. BYU outrebounded Memphis 42-30.

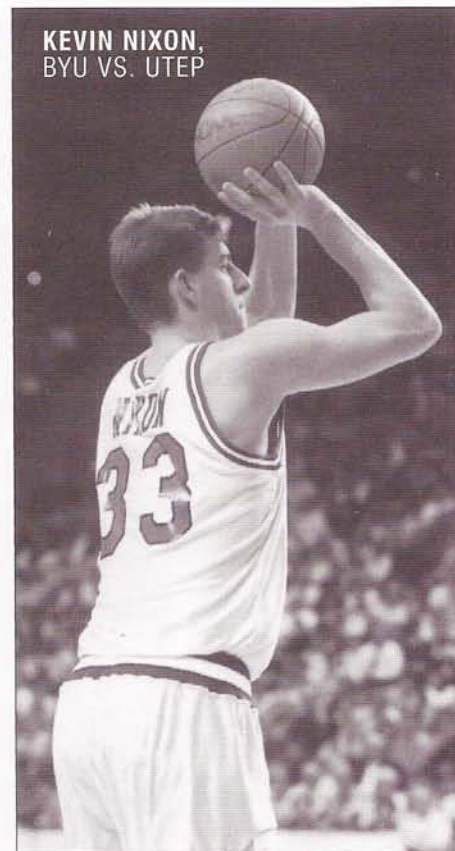
BYU 80, Louisville 62

November 25, 1994

BYU advanced to the finals of the Great Alaskan Shootout after holding Louisville to 24 points in the second half and defeating Denny Crum's Cardinals 75-60. After trailing Louisville 36-32 at halftime, BYU cranked up the defense and jumped to an early second-half 42-39 lead. Behind the clutch shooting of Robbie Reid and Russell Larson, who scored 17 and 14, respectively, the Cougars pulled off the come-from-behind victory. The Cougars owned the glass with 47 rebounds to Louisville's 33, and held the Cardinals to 25 percent shooting in the second half. BYU 83, No. 16 New Mexico 62 February 26, 1998

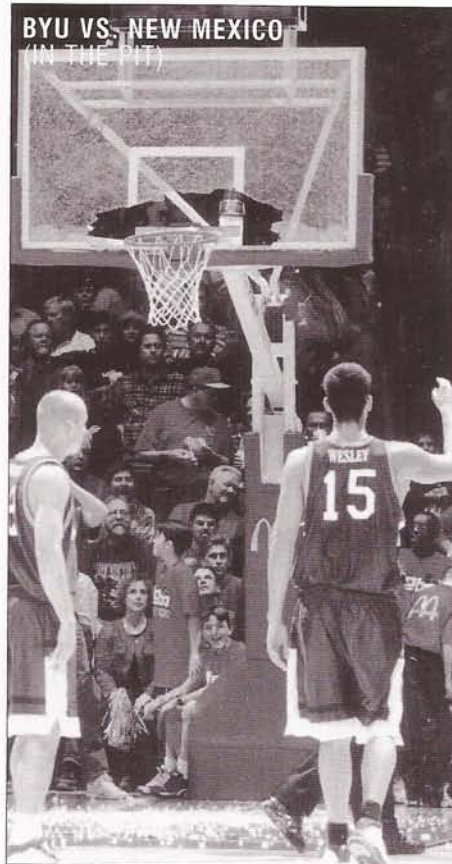
BYU upset No. 16 New Mexico at Pit 83-62 putting a halt to the nation's second longest home winning streak, ending the streak at 41 games with a 21-point blow out. The Pit is well-known throughout the country as one of the most intimidating places to play. The win put hope into Steve Cleveland's first year as a coach to hopefully play in the WAC Tournament. BYU was only 2-10 in the WAC going into the game while the Lobos were 11-1 in conference play. Nobody was expecting a team that had only won one game the season before to beat the mighty Lobos, especially in the Pit. The Cougars came out confident in the first half making 68 percent from the field and 7-10 from three-point land, to give them a 46-28 lead going into the half. Senior Justin Weidauer played the best game of his career, going 9-10 from the field and 4-5 from three point range, to finish with 22 points. Freshman Mekeli Wesley shot 7-13 from the field to finish with 19 points. Junior Danny Bower shot 5-10 from beyond the arc to finish with 17 points.

BYU 76, UTEP 75 (3-OT) February 28, 1998

After upsetting New Mexico in "The Pit," BYU kept up its late season heroics with a road victory over UTEP in triple overtime. BYU claimed a spot in the postseason Western Athletic Conference Tournament by defeating UTEP 76-75. With eight seconds left in triple overtime, Lance Archibald hit a three to tie the game at 75-75. Then with no time left on the clock, freshman Mekeli Wesley hit a free throw to give the Cougars the one-point victory. BYU trailed UTEP by 10 points at the half, but came back behind the strong play of Wesley. Wesley scored 31 points in the triple overtime victory. In the game, Wesley broke a BYU record by hitting 16-of-18 free throw attempts, including the tiebreaker at the end of the game. Wesley's performance helped earn him a spot on the WAC All-Mountain Division Newcomer Team that year. Senior Justin Weidauer chipped in 14 points to help out the Cougars.

Arizona 78, BYU 74 Nov. 28, 1998

The Arizona Wildcats came into Provo undefeated and ranked No. 11 in the nation but nearly lost to the Cougars, coming out with a narrow 78-74 overtime victory. Freshman Mark Bigelow helped keep BYU close with a BYU record nine steals to lead the Cougars, who had 15 steals on the night. Bigelow also paced the Cougar offense, scoring 24 points on 6-16 shooting from the field and 11-11 from the line. With 3:36 left to go in regulation, A.J. Bramlett scored for Arizona to give the Wildcats a 64-55 lead, their biggest of the game. But the Cougars were in no mood to give the game away and ran off 12 consecutive points to take a 67-64 lead with 1:23 left in the game. A three-point field goal by Jason Terry knotted the game at 67 and that is how regulation would end. BYU kept the game close in overtime but a late push from Arizona allowed the Wildcats to steal the victory from the Cougar claws. The low-light of the



game came in the second half when Arizona forward Eugene Edgerson delivered a vicious elbow to the face of BYU center Bret Jepsen, who was forced to leave the game with a concussion.

BYU 60, Hawaii 59 Jan. 16, 1999

A three-point bucket by Mekeli Wesley with just three seconds left gave the Cougars back-to-back road wins and a 60-59 over Hawaii. Wesley's shot capped off a 19-3 BYU run to finish the game and gave BYU its first lead since the 9:21 mark of the first half. Wesley was the second leading scorer on the night with 18, behind teammate Silester Rivers, who finished with 20 points and nine rebounds. The win moved the Cougars to 7-8 on the season and 2-1 in WAC play. BYU fell behind on just 7-of-23 shooting (2-10 three-point) in the first half but rebounded to go 11-23 from the field (3-6 three-point) in the second for the victory. The Cougar defense also turned up the heat on Hawaii, holding the Warrior offense to just 37.5 percent shooting in the second half.

BYU 90, TCU 74 March 2, 1999.

In BYU's final year in the Western Athletic Conference, the Cougars pulled off an impressive upset against Texas Christian University, winning 90-74 in the first round of the conference tournament. Early in the game, the Cougars went on a 16-1 run to take a 16-5 lead. BYU sophomore Nathan Cooper scored eight points in the early run and went on to lead BYU with a career-high

24 points. TCU's Lee Nailon led all scorers with 33 points on the night, but Cooper had a strong supporting cast in WAC Freshman of the Year Mark Bigelow (20 points), sophomore Michael Vranes (19 points), and sophomore Mekeli Wesley (17 points). While the Cougars were bolstered by a team-record 13 three pointers on the night, TCU pulled close to BYU at 62-57 midway through the second half. With the help of three successive technical fouls against the Horned Frogs, the Cougars pulled ahead by 12 on a 12-5 run and never looked back.

BYU 77, UNLV 75 January 10, 2000

The Cougars upset MWC favorite UNLV with a 77-75 win at the Thomas and Mack Center in Las Vegas to open league play. BYU's Terrell Lyday showed his stardom leading the Cougars with 30 points. Lyday hit 10-for-17 from the field, including 5-for-10 on three-point shots. Lyday also led BYU in rebounds, pulling down 11 in his double-double effort. With 10 rebounds on the defensive glass, and six steals, Lyday proved to be a winning force on both ends of the floor. As a team, the Cougars shot 48 percent to UNLV's 39 percent and hit 10-of-19 three pointers. Despite UNLV's comeback to take the lead late in the game, and more than 12,500 fans cheering the Rebels on, BYU kept its composure. The Cougars got a boost from good free throw shooting and a Todd Christensen three-pointer with three minutes left in the game.

BYU 58, Utah 54

March 10, 2000

Perhaps a benchmark for head coach Steve Cleveland and BYU basketball fans at large, the Cougars revitalized the BYU/Utah rivalry, winning 58-54 at the Mountain West Conference Tournament in Las Vegas. "That wasn't for me," Cleveland said. "There's a lot of people in Provo, Utah, that have really struggled with not having it [the rivalry] be competitive. If anything this says this is going to be competitive." BYU ended a 12-game losing streak to the Utes, winning for the first time against Utah since 1995. The victory improved BYU's record to 20-9 (eventually 22-11), the first time the Cougs recorded a 20-win season since 1995. With 40 percent shooting on the night and 59 percent from the free throw line, it is no surprise it was the Cougars' defense that won the game. BYU held Utah to a dismal 30 percent from the floor. With BYU star Mekeli Wesley struggling and hampered with foul trouble, BYU sophomore Eric Nielsen kept the Cougars in the game. Averaging just 5.8 points and 3.8 rebounds per game going into the semifinal game, Nielsen shocked the Utes with a career-high 17 points and nine rebounds. Poor Cougar free throw shooting kept the game close but Utah wasn't able to capitalize. Down 57-54, Utah's Hano Mottola had a chance to tie the game with 14.6 seconds left, but his three-point attempt drew nothing but air. The Utes had one more chance to tie the game, but Phil Cullen sent an inbound pass sailing over the heads of his teammates and out of bounds on the opposite baseline. While the Cougars lost to UNLV in the MWC Championship game, BYU secured an NIT bid and advanced to the quarterfinals of the tournament.

BYU 69, Utah State 67

December 16, 2000

In demonstrating the Cougars' season dominance over Utah teams, BYU defeated Utah State 69-67 in the Marriott Center. The game featured the debut of University of Utah transfer Trent Whiting who had a game-high 22 points to lead his new team in scoring. "I guess if anybody questioned why I started (Whiting) tonight, you probably know now," said BYU coach Steve Cleveland. "He has been the best player in practice for



four months. He is a competitor and he adds a nice dimension to this ball club; something we haven't had." After a quick start and an early 12-point BYU lead, Utah State battled back to take a late first-half lead with 36 seconds left before halftime. Whiting proved his worth hitting an NBA-range three-pointer at the buzzer to give the team a 41-40 lead at the break. The Aggies came out strong in the second half, taking a 42-41 lead and maintaining the lead until late in the game. After BYU's Terrell Lyday hit a three-pointer to bring the Cougs within two, Whiting picked the pocket of USU's Bernard Rock and heading down the court to finish the fast break with a layup, tying the game 63-63. The two teams exchanged buckets, but it was BYU's Mekeli Wesley who made two free throws with eight seconds left to give the Cougars the two-point victory.

BYU 91, UNLV 63,

January 15, 2001

In a nationally televised game on ESPN, BYU came up big against the Rebels winning 91-63 in a late-night thriller. Playing in a Monday night 10 p.m. start, the Cougars were anything but sleepy as four starters scored in double figures. The 28-point margin of victory marked the biggest win over UNLV in BYU history and was sparked by a 26-point performance by Trent Whiting. The game was a measure of success for head coach Steve Cleveland, who inherited a 1-25 team just four years earlier. "It was the best basketball we've played here in four years against a quality team," said Cleveland. "We defended and executed well and I really like the flow in the last seven games. Our defense was the best since we've been here." BYU's defense held UNLV's leading scorer, Kaspars Kambala, to only two points, 16 points below his average. The offense for BYU was blistering, shooting 6-11 behind the three-point line, 56 percent from the field and 85 percent from the charity stripe. The game was never really close, as BYU started the game with a 10-0 run and carried a 19-point lead into the half.

BYU 69, Utah 61

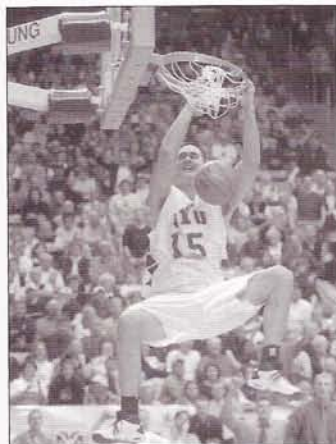
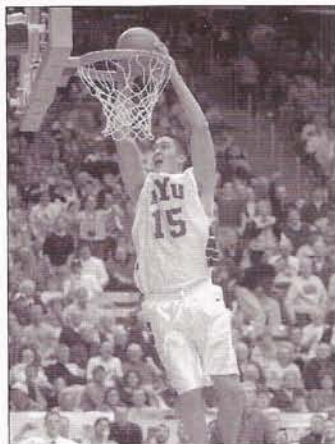
January 29, 2001

BYU's Trent Whiting showed no mercy on his former team, scoring 21 points to lead all players and help the Cougars to a 69-61 win. BYU's defense put the Utah offense to sleep in the 10 p.m. Monday night game, holding the Utes to 39 percent from the floor. "The difference in the ball game was the second half," said BYU coach Steve Cleveland. "We played with much more aggression, especially at the defensive end." BYU's offense supported the defense as the team hit 10 three-pointers on 19 attempts. Whiting's scoring was efficient, hitting 5-for-9 from the field, including 3-for-5 behind the three-point line and a perfect 8-for-8 from the free-throw line. With the win, BYU reclaimed the series lead at 115-114.

BYU 77, Wyoming 66

March 9, 2001

In the semifinal game of the Mountain West Conference Tournament in Las Vegas, the Cougars downed a tenacious Wyoming team 77-66 in the Thomas and Mack Center. Advancing to the MWC championship game wasn't easy despite an early 20-10 lead for BYU. Both teams finished the regular season as conference co-champions along with Utah, and both teams played each other as champions, coming up with big plays from clutch players. While it was a total team effort, MWC Player of the Year Mekeli Wesley and All-MWC guard Terrell Lyday carried the Cougars on their backs, scoring all but four of BYU's 34 second-half points. "Terrell and Mekeli played huge for us

tonight," BYU head coach Steve Cleveland said. "We played a great game tonight and we don't win it unless we have the performances we got from those two guys." The senior duo combined for 55 points on Wesley's 23 points and Lyday's MWC tournament record 32 points. Wesley, amazingly, played the final 11 minutes of the game with four fouls, while teammates Eric Nielsen and Nate Knight left the game with five fouls apiece. The Cowboys tried to mount a comeback with Brett McFall's 5-for-9 shooting and 19 points, but BYU's defense held out until the end of the game.

BYU 69, New Mexico 65
March 10, 2001

After a late-night thriller against Wyoming and a win over Air Force the day before that, the Cougars faced a tough New Mexico team in the championship game of the Mountain West Conference Tournament. After BYU's Trent Whiting hit two free throws with 4.6 seconds left, the Cougars won the MWC Tournament Championship 69-65. Not only did the Cougars win the conference tournament, but they also secured a spot in the NCAA Tournament, BYU's first visit since 1995. League MVP Mekeli Wesley was the outstanding player of game as he hit 11-of-12 shots on his way to a 30-point night. "Mekeli is the best player in the league and he showed that today," said New Mexico forward Brian Smith, who was matched up against Wesley most of the night. Wesley was not without a supporting cast, as senior colleagues Terrell Lyday and Trent Whiting came up big. Whiting's 15 points came at crucial times, one of his three buckets from behind the arc fell at the end of the first half, while another helped the Cougars with two minutes left. Lyday's night was spotlighted with defense. Lyday held New Mexico's leading scorer, Marlon Parmer, to only 12 points and 0-for-4 from the field in the first half. Parmer had a chance to win the game for the Lobos late with a three-pointer, but Lyday's defense stopped Parmer from getting a good look and hitting the shot. "I told Terrell that he wasn't going to score 26 points tonight, but his main responsibility would be to defend," BYU coach Steve Cleveland said. "He made a huge defensive stop on Parmer's last shot."

BYU 81, Stanford 76
December 22, 2001

In perhaps the Cougars' biggest non-conference game of the Steve Cleveland era, BYU defeated No. 13 Stanford, 81-76, in a nationally televised game on ESPN at the Las Vegas Showdown. The win extended BYU's neutral court victory streak at the Thomas and Mack Center to six straight games. With BYU having lost four starters, including three All-MWC players, from its MWC title team the year before, the defending Pac-10 champion Cardinal with All-American Casey Jacobson was a heavy favorite. But senior forward Eric Nielsen delivered the best game of his career. Nielsen finished with 29 points, going 11-16 from the field, 2-2 from the three-point line, and 5-5 on free throws to shatter his previous career high of 19 points. Nielsen just outpaced Jacobson as the Stanford All-American finished with 28 points. With solid BYU

defensive pressure, Jacobsen went cold down the stretch and struggled from the free throw line. BYU entered the game leading the nation in free throw percentage and used it to hold on as senior Matt Montague hit six free throws in the final minute. The Cougars shot a blistering 63.6 percent from behind the three-point line. BYU finished the game 7-11 from behind the arc, while Stanford finished the game 6-25. Trailing 63-61 with just under 10 minutes to play, BYU went on a decisive 13-2 run over the next eight minutes that proved too much for the Cardinal to overcome. BYU made free throws when it mattered most. It was BYU's first win over a ranked opponent since 1998 when the Cougars knocked off No. 15 New Mexico in The Pit during Cleveland's first season

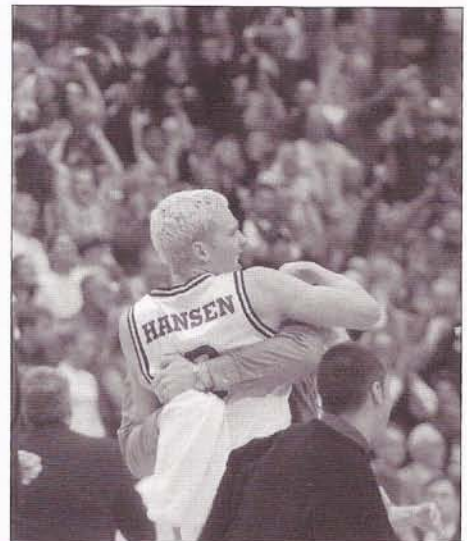
BYU 63, Utah 61
February 23, 2002

With the attention of the world on Utah during the final days of the 2002 Winter Olympics, the BYU-Utah rivalry stole local headlines with an unforgettable 21-point BYU comeback win to protect the nation-leading home winning streak at 35 games. A victory looked very doubtful after BYU played its worst first half of the home-court victory streak, trailing 43-26 at the break. In the second half, two quick Utah buckets pushed the lead to 21 at 47-26, but the Marriott Center magic ignited as BYU went on an amazing 24-5 run. The momentum had completely changed as BYU was back in the game with 7:26 remaining and down by only two points, 52-50. Great defense led to the second-half offensive explosion. After giving up a season-worst 43 points in the first half, BYU held Utah to 29 percent shooting and outscored the Utes 37-18 in the second half. Seniors Matt Montague and Eric Nielsen led the second-half charge. With 1:18 remaining in the game, Montague hit

a rare three-pointer to bring BYU within one, 61-60. On the next possession, Montague made a record-setting assist to Nielsen for an eight-foot jumper that gave the Cougars their first lead of the game, 62-61, with 25 seconds left. That assist tied Montague with BYU legend Danny Ainge for the all-time career record for assists at 539. The Cougars sealed the win with two crucial rebounds, with 7-foot center Dan Howard getting fouled after a key board. Howard added a free throw and the Utes were left to walk off the court in disbelief while the BYU players and fans celebrated at mid-court. Despite being in foul trouble, junior forward Travis Hansen finished with a game-high 17 points and team-high seven rebounds for BYU. "I thought it was most appropriate that our two seniors hit the two big shots of the game," said coach Steve Cleveland. "This was a great college game."

BYU 64, Arizona State 60
December 4, 2002

After losing 11 straight true road games in 2001-02, BYU proved it would win on the road in 2002-03 by downing the Arizona State Sun Devils, 64-60, in its first road game of the season. The Cougars never trailed after taking a 20-18 lead with 10:36 to go in the first half on a Jared Jensen dunk made possible by a steal by reserve guard Ricky Bower. Jensen carried BYU in the first half scoring 10 of his 12 points to pace the Cougars as they built a 10-point halftime lead at 35-25. The game was tied at 20-20 when BYU went on a 14-2 run to help build its double-digit advantage at the break. BYU's largest advantage was 12 but ASU twice tied the game in the second half and had BYU's lead cut to one-point with just over two minutes to go. A Rafael Araujo free throw stretched BYU's advantage to three points with under a minute to play. BYU's Travis Hansen led all scorers with 23 points on 8-of-11 shooting and took the game over in the second half, hitting big buckets for BYU down the stretch. Araujo added nine points and 11 rebounds, along with three blocks and three assists. Four ASU players scored in double figures led by freshman star Ike Diogu with 15 points and eight rebounds. Tommy Smith

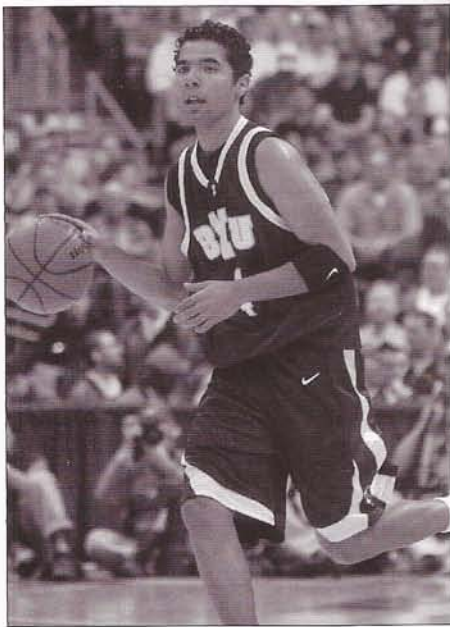
chipped in 13 points. Jamal Hill scored 12 and Curtis Millage added 11. ASU fell to 4-2 with the loss.

BYU 76, Oklahoma State 71 December 6, 2003

Christmas came early for the Cougars as Rafael Araujo's dominating performance against the 25th ranked Oklahoma State Cowboys undoubtedly delivered one of BYU basketball's most thrilling victories ever. In front of the largest crowd (16,285) ever to witness a collegiate basketball game in Salt Lake City, the Cougars defeated the future final four finalist Cowboys 76-71 at the Delta Center. Araujo's phenomenal display of offensive skills and ability to control the boards came through in the second half after a slow first half from the Cougars who trailed the Cowboys 39-36 at halftime. Araujo carried the Cougars to start the second half by scoring 16 of BYU's first 18 second-half points. Former BYU player Daniel Bobik answered back to every Cougar run and kept the Cowboys close, posting a team-high 18 points and 8 assists. In the end, it was Araujo who overpowered the Cowboys, finishing with 32 points and 17 rebounds, one less rebound than the entire Oklahoma State team. "This was the best rebounding effort during my time at BYU," BYU coach Steve Cleveland said. Oklahoma State would go on to finish the season as Big 12 regular season and tournament champions and ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation.

BYU 89, UNLV 88 March 6, 2004

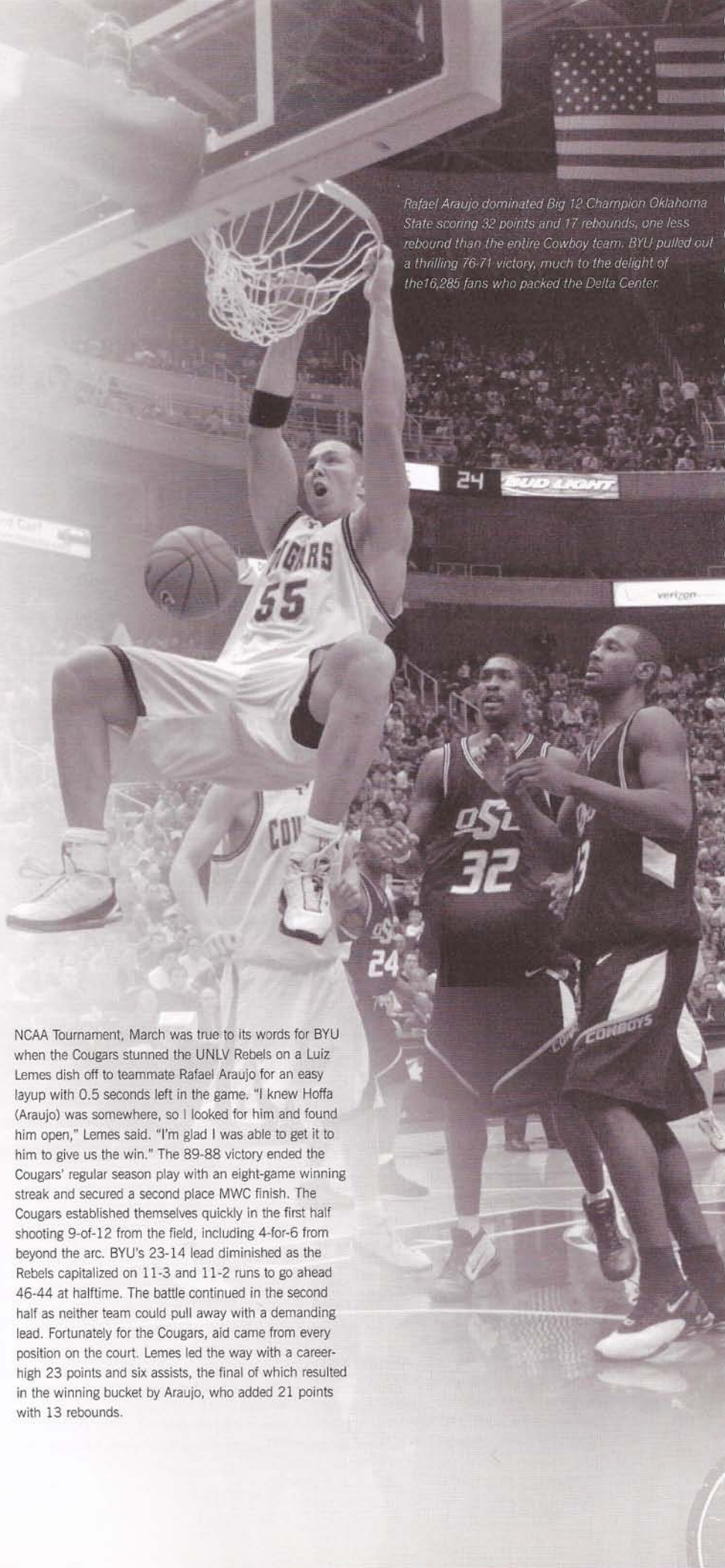
The month of March, a.k.a. March Madness for the college basketball world, is when miracles come about and life long dreams come true. Even prior to the start of the



Luiz Lemes was unstoppable against the Rebels in a game that had 18 lead changes and 16 ties. Lemes had 23 points and an assist on the game-winning bucket.

NCAA Tournament, March was true to its words for BYU when the Cougars stunned the UNLV Rebels on a Luiz Lemes dish off to teammate Rafael Araujo for an easy layup with 0.5 seconds left in the game. "I knew Hoffa (Araujo) was somewhere, so I looked for him and found him open," Lemes said. "I'm glad I was able to get it to him to give us the win." The 89-88 victory ended the Cougars' regular season play with an eight-game winning streak and secured a second place MWC finish. The Cougars established themselves quickly in the first half shooting 9-of-12 from the field, including 4-for-6 from beyond the arc. BYU's 23-14 lead diminished as the Rebels capitalized on 11-3 and 11-2 runs to go ahead 46-44 at halftime. The battle continued in the second half as neither team could pull away with a demanding lead. Fortunately for the Cougars, aid came from every position on the court. Lemes led the way with a career-high 23 points and six assists, the final of which resulted in the winning bucket by Araujo, who added 21 points with 13 rebounds.

Rafael Araujo dominated Big 12 Champion Oklahoma State scoring 32 points and 17 rebounds, one less rebound than the entire Cowboy team. BYU pulled out a thrilling 76-71 victory, much to the delight of the 16,285 fans who packed the Delta Center.

BYU lost its last two games and slipped into a three-way tie for fourth place in the conference. The road was not kind as 10 of the 12 losses came away from home. The Cougars did run into some tough competition playing the likes of Houston (27-0), Oklahoma City (19-6) and New Mexico (23-3). Center Jim Eakins ended his senior season as the WAC's leading rebounder pulling down just over 12 per game. He also scored 14.8 points per game, which was second to Kari Liimo's 17.0 points per contest. The Cougars drew over 100,000 fans for the fifth consecutive season.

Doug Howard, Paul Ruffner and Kari Liimo each scored over 15 points per game. Guard Lynn Parsons added 11.4 per game, while Marty Lythgoe and Scott Warner each chipped in 10 per contest.

1969-70

Social tension and demonstration resulted from the University of Wyoming's "Black 14" protest during the 1969 football season. Schools in the conference claimed that BYU and the church discriminated against blacks, and many teams refused to play the Cougars. The protest efforts continued during the basketball months, and BYU's team found themselves right in the middle of it. The worst incident came against Colorado State in Ft. Collins, Colorado. Angry students stormed the floor and threw objects at the court—including a flaming molotov cocktail. The bottle reached the floor but did not break. The cocktail was extinguished before it could do any damage. This activity followed the Cougars throughout the season but the team continued to play. With preoccupied minds the team managed to go just 8-18 and finished second to last in the conference with a WAC record of 4-10. Coach Stan Watts' teams were known in the past for being tough to beat at home—losing just five games in five seasons in Provo. This year's team went just 6-6 in the Smith Fieldhouse. Senior guard Doug Howard was the top scorer dropping in 18.2 points per game. The Cougars compiled a 12-0 home record and went 10-4 in conference play to win the WAC Championship and qualify for NCAA postseason play. A first-round game against Utah State resulted in a victory but the luck stopped there. BYU ran into eventual NCAA champion UCLA and lost 91-73. A loss to Pacific by three in the next game ended the Cougars' run. The team went 18-11 overall. Many of those wins came without the direction of head coach Stan Watts who underwent surgery during the latter part of the season. Assistants Glenn Potter and Pete Witbeck led the team that won eight of its last 11 games. A big win for the Cougars came against nationally ranked Villanova, 102-93, in the Rainbow Classic in Honolulu. Sixth-man, 6-8 sophomore Jay Bunker, scored 27 points and grabbed 17 rebounds in the upset. Five players averaged double figures in scoring, led by Bernie Fryer (19.2). Steve Kelly (17.9), Kresimir Cosic (15.0), Jim Miller (11.9) and Phil Tollestrup (11.5) were the other four. BYU was 4-1 against in-state rivals.

The Stan Watts era came to a close and new coach Glenn Potter moved his team from the Smith Fieldhouse to the new Marriott Center and posted a 21-5 record and an impressive 12-2 in the WAC. The conference mark was the best by any team in the league's history. The Cougars spent most of the season climbing up the national rankings and found themselves ranked ninth at season's end. BYU shattered the old single-game

attendance record of 16,128 set by Illinois in 1971. The new record was set in the final game, which drew 22,985 fans; the season average was 21,818. The Cougars were led by 6-11 center Kresimir Cosic who was first on the team in scoring with 22.3 per game and rebounding 12.8 per game. Senior guard Bernie Fryer was the floor general and chipped in 18.2 points per game. Both were named to the All-WAC team. The Cougars' season ended when they were knocked out of the NCAA Tournament by Long Beach 95-90 in Pocatello.

The Cougars enjoyed win streaks of six games and nine games during the season on their way to posting a 19-7 overall record and 9-5 in the WAC. BYU tied for second place in the conference and was left out of postseason play. The NCAA committee ruled that had BYU won the conference championship it would still not be invited to the "big dance" citing eligibility issues with All-American Kresimir Cosic. The WAC cleared his eligibility, but NCAA officials did not oblige. Cosic led the team in scoring with a 20.2 average and was named to the All-WAC team. It marked the fourth time in the 11-year history of the WAC that a player was named to the team as a sophomore, junior and senior. The Cougars' balanced attack was key as all five starters averaged in double figures (Cosic 20.2, Doug Richards 15.9, Belmont Anderson 13.0, Moni Sarkalahti 11.7 and Brian Ambrozich 10.7).

This season marked the first time in seven years that the Cougars won 20 games and also claimed the WAC championship. BYU's balanced attack, which enjoyed five players that averaged in double figures, posted a 20-8 record including a perfect 14-0 home stretch. Danny Ainge led the team in scoring with 18.4 points per game. With two seasons remaining Ainge has already scored 1,130 points, which puts him in the top ten in career scoring at BYU. On February 17 the Cougars beat the University of Utah by 26 points in front of 23,006 fans—a new Marriott Center attendance record. The total attendance during the Cougars' impressive 14 home wins was 277,920. This is the highest season mark since the facility opened in 1972. BYU advanced to the NCAA Tournament and was beaten 86-63 by the University of San Francisco in the first round.

With all five starters returning from last season and four of those averaging double figures in scoring its easy to see why the 1979-80 team was so successful. Led by the steady performance of All-American Danny Ainge (19.1 ppg) and his supporting cast of Devin Durrant (13.3 ppg), Fred Roberts (13.1 ppg) and Alan Taylor (12.5 ppg) the Cougars went 24-5 and easily won the WAC championship with a conference record of 13-1. The only loss came against Wyoming in a three-point decision in Provo. Following the Wyoming loss BYU won its next 12 consecutive games, including a streak of winning all seven-conference road games. No WAC team had previously accomplished that feat. The Cougars' potent offense scored over 100 points eight times with a season high coming in a 123-91 win over San Diego State. Ainge led the team in scoring, assists and steals. He along with center Alan Taylor were named to the All-WAC first-team. Taylor set a Marriott Center record for rebounds when he pulled down 23 in the home finale. The Cougars earned an NCAA berth and a first-round date with Clemson, which they lost 71-66.

One of the most memorable seasons in BYU basketball history—highlighted by Danny Ainge's full-court drive and lay-up in the closing seconds to beat Notre Dame during an NCAA Tournament game. The win propelled the Cougars into the "elite eight" where Ralph Sampson and Virginia ended the Cougars' Cinderella run. Ainge was named All-American and was awarded the Eastman and Wooden awards as college basketball's outstanding player. He ranked ninth in the country in scoring, averaging 24.4 points per game. Forward Fred Roberts earned All-WAC honors for his steady play and 18.8 points per game, which was second on the team to Ainge. Steve Trumbo led the Cougars in rebounding, grabbing 10.7 per game. The team finished 25-7 overall, ranked 16th in the country, and among the nation's "elite eight." The Cougars were 12-3 in the WAC and in third place behind co-champions Utah and Wyoming.

1981-82

A solid frontcourt of Greg Kite, Fred Roberts and Steve Trumbo led the Cougars during a 17-14 season, earning an invitation to the NIT postseason. The Cougars began the season in two rematch games. The first came against Virginia who knocked BYU out of the elite-eight the previous year, and the second was against UCLA in Los Angeles. The Cougars fought back from a halftime deficit against Virginia but lost in the closing seconds 63-61. A 79-75 win over UCLA was the most significant accomplishment of the season. The upset was only the 14th loss ever suffered by the Bruins inside Pauley Pavilion in 256 games. The Cougars also became one of only a handful of teams to have beaten the Bruins in back-to-back seasons. Last year's 78-55 win over UCLA, in the NCAA Tournament, was the Bruins worst loss in 17 years. Trumbo and Roberts were unanimous selections to the first-team All-WAC squad. During the four seasons they played together at BYU the Cougars won more games (86 of 119) and had the best winning percentage (.723) of any other four-year span in the school's history.

The Cougars managed to go 11-5 in the WAC and finished in a three-way tie for the conference championship. Other co-champions Utah and UTEP headed for post season tournaments but the Cougars were left off after a season finale win over Wyoming. The victory did give the Cougars an above .500 season finishing at 15-14. Seven of BYU's opponents were invited to the NCAA

Upsetting 15th-ranked New Mexico in "The Pit," winning the Cougar Classic and making the WAC post-season tournament in Las Vegas are some of the accomplishments of Steve Cleveland's 1997-98 team. The Cougars finished 9-21 overall and 4-10 in the WAC, good enough for sixth place in the Mountain Division. Senior Justin Weidauer and newcomers Ron Selleaze and Mekeli Wesley were

the big three for the Cougars. Behind Weidauer's career-high 22 points the Cougars upset New Mexico in Albuquerque snapping the nation's second-longest home winning streak at 41 games. On the same trip the Cougars beat UTEP in El Paso completing the road sweep of those teams for the first time since the 1990-91 season. Selleaze joined the team in mid-December and still managed to lead team in scoring averaging 16.8 points per game. He was selected second team All-WAC and Mountain Division Newcomer of the Year. Wesley was named to the All-Mountain Newcomer Team and was voted MVP of the Cougar Classic, which the Cougars won beating Weber State and Pepperdine. The Cougars set a new school record for three point attempts at 638.

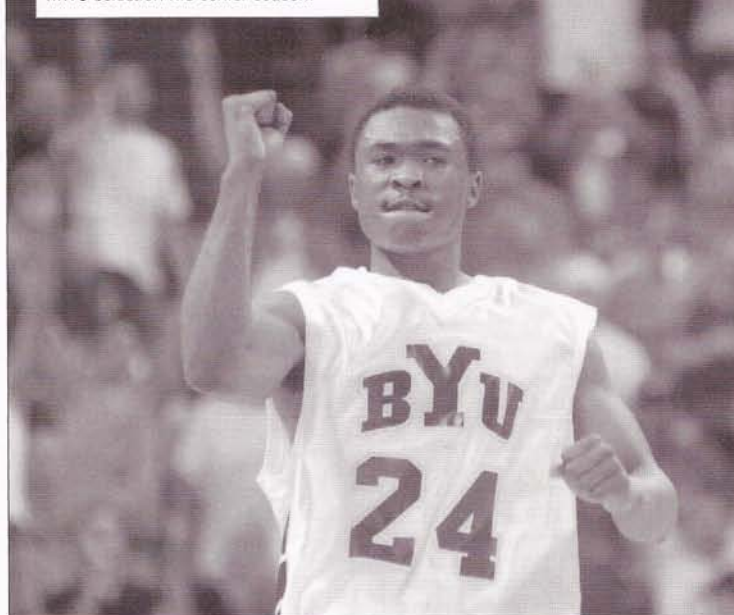

1998-99

BYU continued to improve from last season posting a 12-16 record and was the first Cougar team to win a WAC Tournament contest since 1994. The tournament upset over heavily favored TCU 90-74 was the highlight of the season. The Cougars entertained the toughest schedule in the WAC that featured four Pac-10 teams and 13 games against schools that earned post-season tournament berths. Other non-conference games included NCAA No. 1 seed Auburn, No. 10 ranked Arizona, NIT Champion California, and NIT semifinalist Oregon. The Cougars were led by freshman Mark Bigelow and forward Silester Rivers. Bigelow led the Cougars in scoring averaging 15 points per game, including a 33-point performance in front of his home-state fans at Washington State. The total

was the second highest for a freshman behind Danny Ainge's 36 point game. Bigelow was named WAC Freshman of the Year, WAC Newcomer Team and All-WAC Second Team honors. He also led the team in rebounding (6.7 rpg) and steals (1.4). Other highlights include a second straight Cougar Classic title and Mekeli Wesley's game-winning three-point shot, well beyond the arc, to beat Hawaii—capping a double-digit comeback.

Cleveland enters his eighth year at BYU in 2004-05. Having rebuilt a BYU basketball program that had a 1-25 record prior to his arrival, Cleveland achieved a conference title in his fourth season and has guided BYU to five consecutive postseason tournaments. Coming off his second conference championship in 2003, Cleveland was named the MWC Coach of the Year after his team finished 23-9 and earned an NCAA Tournament berth. With its invitation in 2004, BYU has been to three of the last four NCAA Tournaments. In 2000-01, BYU finished 24-9 while earning its first conference tournament title since 1992, its first regular season championship since 1993 and its first NCAA bid since 1995. Cleveland also guided the 1999-2000 Cougars to 22-11 record and the quarterfinals of the NIT. 1999-2000

In just his third season Head Coach Steve Cleveland brought the magic back to BYU basketball. Cleveland led the Cougars to a 22-11 overall record and a National Invitation Quarterfinal finish, including an appearance in the inaugural Mountain West Tournament Championship game in Las Vegas. It was the most wins recorded by BYU since the 1994-1995 season. Not only was it BYU's first 20-win season in five years but those wins came against the toughest schedule of any MWC team. BYU played 10 schools that qualified for the postseason and went 9-7 overall in those games. Power forward Mekeli Wesley and junior college transfer Terrell Lyday led the Cougars. Wesley finished the year averaging 16.8 points per game and led the Cougars with 5.8 rebounds per game while earning second-team All-MWC honors. Lyday led the conference in steals and led the Cougars in scoring averaging 17.1 points per game. He was named MWC Newcomer of the Year. The renewed magic was not unnoticed. 2000-2001

2001-2002

The Cougars earned their third consecutive postseason appearance and their second NIT berth in the past three seasons going 18-12 overall and tying for 4th at 7-7 in MWC play. The Cougars were spotless at home again for the second year in a row, posting a perfect 16-0 record. 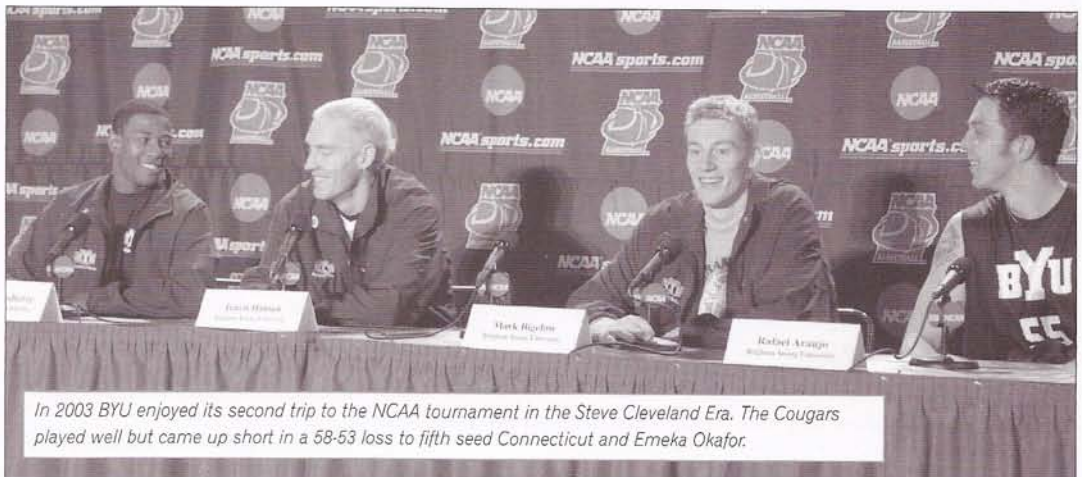

BYU claimed a share of the Mountain West Conference regular season title and an NCAA bid for the second time in the last three years. Playing among the nation's toughest schedules, including 11 different conferences on its non-league slate, the Cougars finished the year 23-9 overall and earned its 26th conference title going 11-3 in MWC games along with Utah. Unfortunately, BYU had its worst shooting game while losing a close game to No. 5-seed Connecticut at the NCAA Tournament in Spokane, Wash. BYU swept the Front Range trip to Wyoming and CSU for the first time since 1993. BYU Coach Steve Cleveland was named the MWC Coach of the Year and senior guard Travis Hansen was one of two consensus first-team All-MWC players and the MWC's Co-Defensive Player of the Year. The Cougars had the MWC's top defense and also won the preseason Paradise Jam title in St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands. Hansen led the team in scoring (16.8) and blocks (20) and was second in assists (2.4) and rebounds (4.8). Mark Bigelow, a third-team All-MWC selection, was second in scoring (13.9), third in rebounding (3.7) and the team's top three-point shooter (63). Rafael Araujo, a third-team All-MWC pick, was the third-leading scorer (12.0) and top rebounder (8.9). Sophomore forward Jared Jensen, who received All-MWC honorable mention, added 7.5 points and 3.3 rebounds while JC transfer Kevin Woodberry averaged 6.3 points and 2.5 assists. BYU's 22,702 attendance vs. CSU in its last home game was the largest crowd since 1992 and the 21st largest crowd in school history. BYU had the nation's No. 1 average season increase in attendance to average 14,468 and

rank 17th nationally for the year. BYU finished the season 13-1 at home.

2003-2004

The BYU Cougars earned their second straight NCAA Tournament berth and the third in four years after finishing in second place in the Mountain West Conference. The Cougars posted a 21-9 overall record and a 10-4 MWC mark, finishing with a nine-game winning streak, their longest string of victories since the 1992-93 campaign. BYU lost to eventual MWC Tournament Champion Utah 51-54 in the final seconds of the MWC semifinal game and was then narrowly defeated in the first round of the NCAA Tournament as a 12 seed by defending national champion and no. 5 seed Syracuse. The Cougars started the season 10-3 in pre-season play with wins over the PAC 10's USC and instate rival Weber State as well as Idaho State and Santa Clara to capture the 2003 Cable Car Classic title. The Cougars also scored big in defeating Oklahoma State 76-71 Dec. 6 in the Delta Center, handing the Final Four contenders one of their only three losses on the season. In conference play, the Cougars started out slow but hit their stride in the middle of February, winning their last eight regular season games. The Cougars extended their nonconference home win streak to 40 games in 2003-04 and were perfect at home for the third time in Steve Cleveland's seven-year BYU career, going 13-0 and extending their overall home win streak to 18 games. Senior Center Rafael Araujo, who led the team and finished second in the MWC with 18.4 points, 10.1 rebounds and 1.43 steals per game, earned MWC Co-Player of the Year honors and was a First Team MWC pick. Araujo was also named to the Basketball Times All-America Second Team and the Associated Press All-America Honorable Mention Team. The Brazilian center was selected as the No. 8 pick overall in the 2004 NBA Draft by the Toronto Raptors. Mark Bigelow, a Second Team MWC selection, led BYU in free throw percentage (.806, 104-129) and was second in points per game with 13.4. Newcomer Mike Hall, the MWC Defensive Player of the Year and Third Team pick, finished the season tied for first on the team in steals with 1.4 per game. True freshman Mike Rose led the MWC in three-point field goal per-

centage at 46 percent (28-61) and set a single-game three-point record with eight against Southern Utah. Senior Luiz Lemes led the team and finished third in the MWC in assists with 4.53 per game. As a team, the Cougars led the MWC in free-throw percentage (.724), assists (14.83 apg) and field goal percentage (.487), a mark that also ranked eighth nationally. BYU also led the league in attendance, averaging 15,300 fans per game including the highest Marriott Center attendance since 1992 with 22,718 fans for BYU's contest against Utah.

BYU'S CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS (26 TITLES)

1918-19

The 1918-19 team won BYU's first Rocky Mountain Conference Western Division title. Despite a season shortened by an influenza epidemic, the Cougars came out on top to set the precedent for BYU Men's Basketball.

1921-22

BYU won its second title in the Western Division with a 3-1 Conference record, beating out rivals from the Univ. of Utah.

Series. This time, BYU emerged victorious, winning 2-1 and thus winning the Conference Championship for the first time since 1924. The Cougars were led by Floyd Millet and Jay Whitman, both First Team All-Conference Selections.

1933-34

The Cougars finished the season 9-3 in Conference and 18-11 Overall to win the Western Division title for the third year in a row. BYU once again met Wyoming in the Championship, but were defeated 2 games to 1.

1950-51

The Cougars repeated as Skyline Conference Champions and won their third title in four years with a 15-5 record in Conference and an amazing 26-10 record overall. Once again led by Roland Minson and Mel Hutchins, the Cougars were ranked as high as third nationally and went on to win the NIT. They also set a then school record with a 91-point offensive showcase against Denver.

1956-57

The Cougars won their last Skyline Conference Championship in this season, finishing 11-3 in Conference and 19-9 overall. Led by Tom Steinke and John Benson, who each averaged almost 20 points per game, BYU went on to finish third in the NCAA West Regionals.

1964-65

The 1964-65 team won the first WAC championship for BYU and first conference title since 1957. The team finished the season with a 21-7 mark and were ranked sixth nationally in the final wire service poll of the season. BYU finished second to Miami (Fla.) in scoring offense. John Fairchild was named WAC Player of the Year and led the team with 21.5 points a game.

1923-24

A 7-1 Conference record gave the Cougars their third Western Division title. They met the Eastern Division winner, Colorado College, in the first playoff series in a decade. BYU won the series 2-1 and was crowned the undisputed Rocky Mountain Conference Champion.

1924-25

BYU repeated its championship run and once again won the Western Division title, finishing 6-2 in Conference and 11-6 overall. The title was the third in four years for the Cougars. BYU once again met Colorado College in the Conference Championship Series but was swept in Colorado Springs.

1931-32

Led by Sophomore Elwood Romney, a First Team All-Conference Selection, BYU tied with Utah for the West title and then defeated the Utes in a one-game playoff, earning the chance to meet Wyoming in the Conference Championship Series. Despite an 8-4 Conference finish, the Cougars were swept by the Cowboys.

1932-33

For the second straight season, the Western Division ended in a tie between BYU and Utah. After going 9-3 in Conference and 18-7 overall, The Cougars once again defeated the Utes and met Wyoming in the Championship

1942-43

After switching to the Skyline Conference in 1937, the 1942-43 Cougars won their first Skyline Conference Western Division title. A 7-1 Conference record earned the team the opportunity to play Wyoming in the Championship Series. However, despite the efforts of First Team All-Conference Selection Brady Walker, the Cougars lost to Wyoming in three straight games.

1947-48

As the Conference consolidated into one Division, the Cougars finished 8-2 and took first place. Joe Nelson and Randy Clark were both named First Team All-Conference players. Nelson led the Skyline Conference in scoring, racking up 203 points in Conference play and averaging 20.3 points per game.

1949-50

After winning the Conference pre-season trophy, the Cougars finished 14-6 in Conference and had their first 20-win season, going 22-12. BYU was led by a talented trio consisting of Joe Nelson, Roland Minson, and Mel Hutchins, each averaging over 10 points per game. All three players earned NCAA honors at season's end.

1968-69

BYU finished the season at 17-12 and had been picked in the preseason polls to finish third or lower. They won a first round berth in the NCAA tournament but lost to New Mexico State. Remarkably, six players ended the season with scoring averages in double figures.

1970-71

The 1970-71 team was picked to finish sixth in the WAC preseason polls. The Cougars finished 18-11 to grab the WAC title. They lost to the eventual NCAA champion UCLA in the NCAA Regionals. The team was led by Bernie Fryar, who averaged 19.2 points and Steve Kelly who scored 17.9 points per game.

1971-72

The 1971-72 season was Coach Stan Watts final year and one of the most exciting in Cougar history. The team finished with a 21-5 record and made it to the NCAA tournament. The year was the first that games were played in the Marriott Center. Kresimir Cosic was the teams leading scorer, averaging 22.3 points per game.

1978-79

One of the most exiting aspects of the 1978-79 season was the expectations that Cougar success would carry over into the next year. The Cougars were 20-8 and were led by Danny Ainge with 18.4 points per game. Ainge moved into the top 10 in BYU scoring history after just two seasons. The Cougars made it to the first round of the NCAA playoffs.

1979-80

A record of 24-5 was the best yet for a BYU team. The Cougars had been ranked as high as sixth by sports writ-

ers. All the starters from the previous year returned to help defend the WAC title. Danny Ainge once again led the team with 19.1 points per game, and moved into first place on the BYU all-time scoring list. The team had four future NBA players; Ainge, Devin Durrant, Fred Roberts, and Greg Kite.

1987-88

Although the 1982-83 team finished in a three way tie for the WAC championship, it was the first time in the previous five years that the Cougars did not advance to post season play. The team's record was 15-14. Devin Durrant led BYU in scoring with 22.8 points per game. Greg Kite led the team in rebounding with 8.8 per game.

1989-90

The 1989-90 team was picked to finish sixth in the WAC preseason polls. The Cougars finished 18-11 to grab the WAC title. They lost to the eventual NCAA champion UCLA in the NCAA Regionals. The team was led by Bernie Fryar, who averaged 19.2 points and Steve Kelly who scored 17.9 points per game.

1992-93

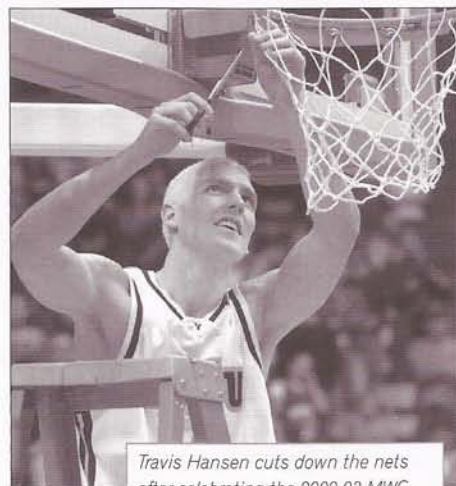

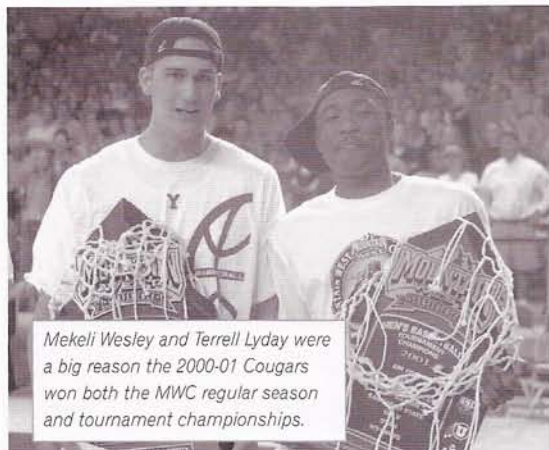

BYU claimed a share of the Mountain West Conference regular season title and an NCAA bid for the second time in the last three years. Playing among the nation's toughest schedules, including 11 different conferences on its non-league slate, the Cougars finished the year 23-9 overall and earned its 26th conference title going 11-3 in MWC games along with Utah. BYU Coach Steve Cleveland was named the MWC Coach of the Year and senior guard Travis Hansen was one of two consensus first-team All-MWC players and the MWC's Co-Defensive Player of the Year. The Cougars had the MWC's top defense and also won the preseason Paradise Jam title in St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands. Hansen led the team in scoring (16.8) and blocks (20) and was second in assists (2.4) and rebounds (4.8). BYU's 22,702 attendance vs. CSU in its last home game was the largest crowd since 1992 and the 21st largest crowd in school history. BYU had the nation's No. 1 average season increase in attendance to average 14,468 and rank 17th nationally for the year. BYU finished the season 13-1 at home.

DANNY AINGE

1981 NCAA Player of the Year

Known for his feisty, hard-nosed playing style, Danny Ainge has become one of the most famous athletes to graduate from BYU.

During his four-year career as a Cougar, Ainge was a Consensus All-American, a two-time First Team Academic All-American, the WAC Player of the Year and a four-time All-WAC selection. He set an NCAA record with 112 consecutive games scoring in double digits and broke the BYU and WAC all-time scoring records with 2,467 points.

As a senior in 1981, Ainge led BYU to the 1981 Eastern Regionals. He concluded his senior season by winning the Eastman Award as well as the John Wooden Award — given annually to the top collegiate basketball player in the nation.

Ainge beat out Isiah Thomas (Indiana), Sam Bowie (Kentucky), Mark Aguirre (DePaul) Ralph Sampson (Virginia) and Steve Johnson (Oregon State) to win the Wooden Award. In doing so, he became the fifth winner of the award, joining Marques Johnson, Larry Bird, Phil Ford and Darrell Griffith.

As a two-sport star, Ainge was drafted by both the Toronto Blue Jays for baseball and the Boston Celtics (31st pick) for basketball. After playing four seasons with the Blue Jays, he chose to pursue an NBA career. Ainge was a member of the Celtics' 1984 and 1986 Championship teams, and played in six NBA finals with three different teams (Boston, Portland and Phoenix). He also played for the Sacramento Kings. He became only the third player in NBA history to make 1,000 three-point field goals, finishing his 14-year career with 1,002.

Ainge played in 193 NBA playoff games, second all-time to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar who played in 237, and ahead of Magic Johnson, Robert Parrish, John Havlicek and Bill Russell to name a few.

After retiring in 1995, Ainge was an NBA basketball television analyst for Turner Broadcasting for one year before the Phoenix Suns brought him back to the organization as an assistant head coach. Just eight games into the season, he was promoted to Head Coach and guided his club to a 40-34 record after the team started the season 0-8. He spent the next two-plus seasons as Head Coach of the Suns and compiled a 136-90 (.602) record before stepping down on December 13, 1999. He then returned for three more seasons with Turner Broadcasting before returning to the Boston Celtics in May 2003 as the Executive Director of Basketball Operations.

He is a member of the BYU Varsity Club. His son Austin is a freshman on the 2003-04 BYU basketball team. Ainge was inducted into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame in May 2000.

DANNY AINGE JERSEY RETIREMENT 2003

With a capacity crowd of 22,702 on hand, Danny Ainge was honored on March 8, 2003, by being the first-ever BYU basketball player to have his jersey retired in the 100 year history of the program. His No. 22 jersey will forever hang from the rafters of the Marriott Center.

"It's just a great honor," Ainge said. "BYU was the greatest time of my life. It's just great to be a part of BYU basketball. I don't know why mine is the first to go up. There were a lot of great players before me. Hopefully this is just the start."

BYU president Merrill J. Bateman said, "The standard has been set very high. We hope there will be more." Ainge's jersey, not his number, was retired, which means future players may still have the option to wear No. 22.

The ceremony, which took place during the half-time of BYU's game against Colorado State, started with a video clip of Ainge's famous coast-to-coast, last-second basket to beat Notre Dame in the 1981 NCAA Tournament. Men's athletics director Val Hale shared some of Ainge's accomplishments, which include being named college basketball player of the year in 1981, playing professional baseball with the Toronto Blue Jays, and winning two basketball championships with the Boston Celtics.

One of Ainge's former teammates, Scott Runia, said they used to call Ainge clout because he brought the team clout. They called him clutch because he made the play when it counted. They called him smooth because Danny won the heart of Michelle Toolson, Ainge's wife. But most importantly, they called him a friend.

STAN WATTS

BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE

When considering the most influential individuals in BYU basketball history, Stan Watts has to be placed at the top of the list. During his 23 years at the helm of the Cougar basketball program, Watts led his teams to two NIT National Championships (1951, 1966) and oversaw the construction of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse and Marriott Center.

His nationally recognized accomplishments led to his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on March 6, 1986, making him the first Cougar to receive the prestigious honor. Watts finished his career after the 1971-72 season with an overall record of 372-254 (.594).

He was a member of the NCAA's Rules Committee, served as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and chaired the U.S. Olympic Basketball Committee in 1976. Watts also served four years as BYU's athletic director and spent time on the Cougar football and baseball coaching staffs.



Even more impressive than his remarkable accomplishments as a coach is his impeccable character as a human being. He is respected by coaches, fans and players alike for his conduct both on and off the court.

"His won-loss record speaks very well for the kind of coach he was," said former player Harold Christensen, who played for Watts on the 1951 championship team. "His reputation among his fellow coaches suggests how much they respected him. He still has that and is still honored in the community in which he coached."

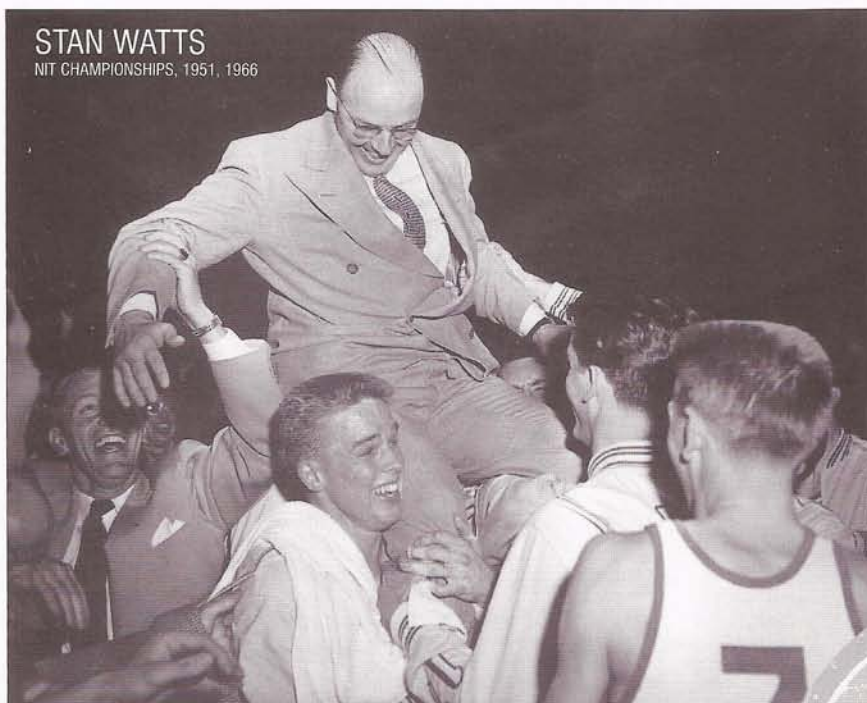
Always a fighter, Watts overcame a rare form of cancer in 1971—only the fourth-known case of this type of cancer in medical history. Despite the fact that the other three individuals died, Watts refused to give up. After 14-hours of surgery and a two-month stay in the hospital, Watts returned to coach his team to a WAC Championship the following year.

Known for his fast-break style of offense, Watts remains an avid Cougar fan. He once said, "It has always been our contention that the average basketball fan likes to see fast-scoring, speedy, exciting basketball."

By looking around the Marriott Center during a Cougar game, there are hints that Watts has been there. The glass-encased exhibit in the halls outside the arena pays tribute to one of the greatest coaches and individuals ever to grace the sidelines of a BYU athletic contest — as do the two NIT Championship banners and the WAC title banners from 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971 and 1972.

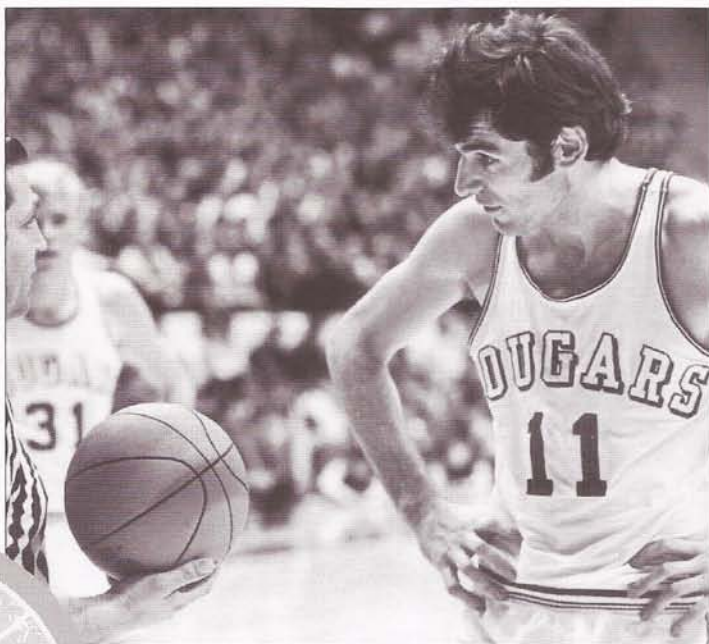
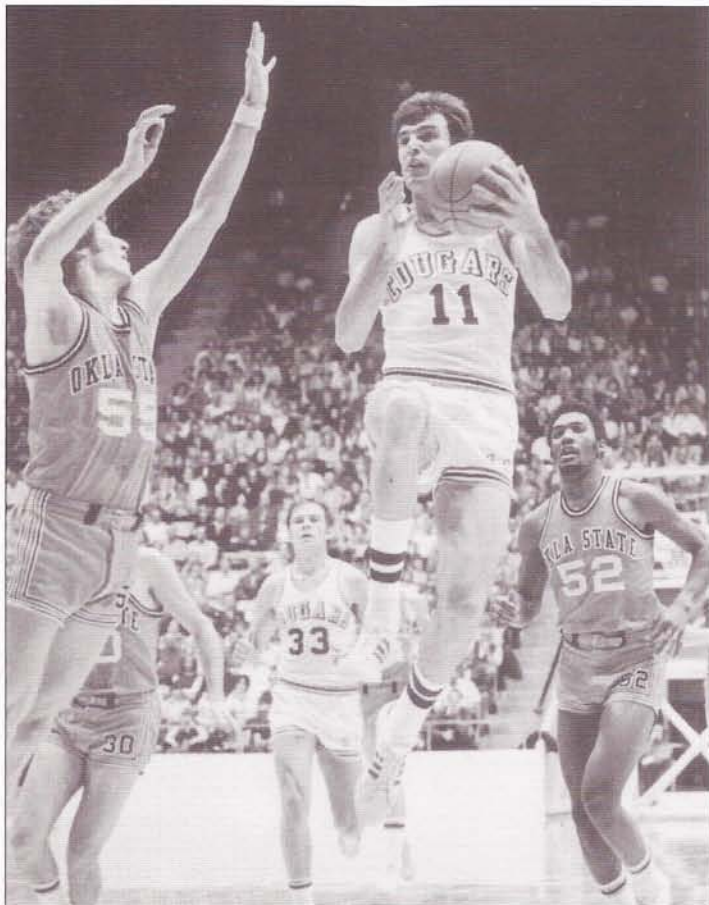
"The greatest tribute I can pay to Stan Watts," said retired Senior Associate Athletic Director Pete Witbeck, who was BYU's NCAA compliance officer and former assistant to Watts for many years, "is he's truly a man of God. He's always been a gentleman and great man. You don't see that very often."

Watts passed away April 6, 2000 at the age of 88.



KRESIMIR COSIC

BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE



When it comes to describing Kresimir Cosic, where do you start?

Few players in BYU history have been able to capture the hearts of Cougar fans like Kresimir Cosic did from 1970-73. The 6-11 center from Zadar, Yugoslavia, entertained fans during his stellar career with his enthusiastic, guard-like play.

Whether it was leading the fastbreak, dribbling between his legs or shooting a sky-hook, Cosic's enthusiasm and on-court antics endeared him to almost everyone who saw him play.

During his career at BYU, Cosic used his versatile inside-outside game to lead the Cougars in scoring (23.3) and rebounding (13.0) as a junior and again as a senior (20.2 points per game). His unselfish attitude helped him to lead his team in assists.

He ranks second on BYU's all-time rebounding list with 919, an average of 11.6 per game. He was a three-time First Team All-WAC selection and an All-American his junior year. Behind the play of Cosic, the Cougars won two WAC titles and reached the NCAA Regional tournament in 1971 and 1972.

Cosic was a three-time first team All-WAC selection and earned All-American accolades following his junior season. He likely would have been a four-year award winner but freshman were allowed to play on varsity.

Upon graduation, Cosic became very much involved with basketball throughout Europe. He played on four Olympic teams with his native land of Yugoslavia, winning a gold medal in 1980 and two silver medals in 1968 and 1976. He ended his career as the all-time Croatian scoring leader, and went on to coach the Yugoslavian national team for many years.

His national and international accomplishments led to his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on May 6, 1996, making Cosic the second Cougar to receive the prestigious honor. He is also a member of the Utah Basketball Hall of Fame, inducted in 2001.

In September of 1992, Cosic was appointed as deputy ambassador for Croatia to the United States. He and his family lived in Washington D.C where he performed his diplomatic duties in the same excellent manner in which he played basketball.

On May 25, 1995, Cosic lost his battle against the toughest opponent of his career – cancer. During his 46 years on earth, Cosic became one of the most influential and well-known of all European basketball players. He left behind the legacy and credit of being the individual that first introduced the American game of basketball to Europe.

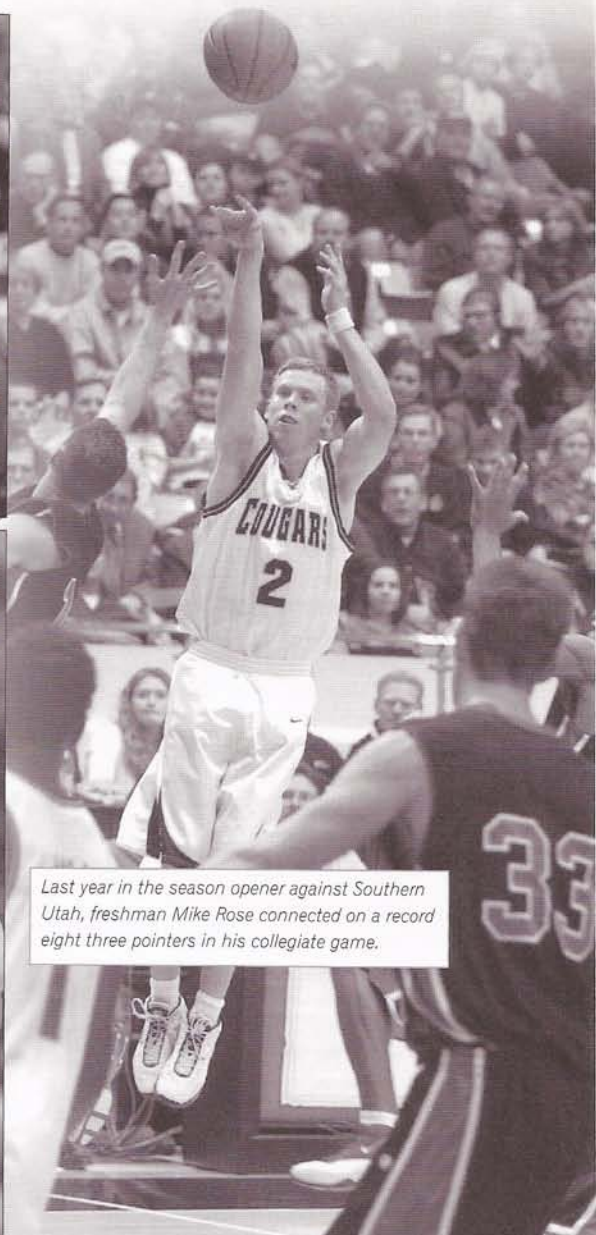

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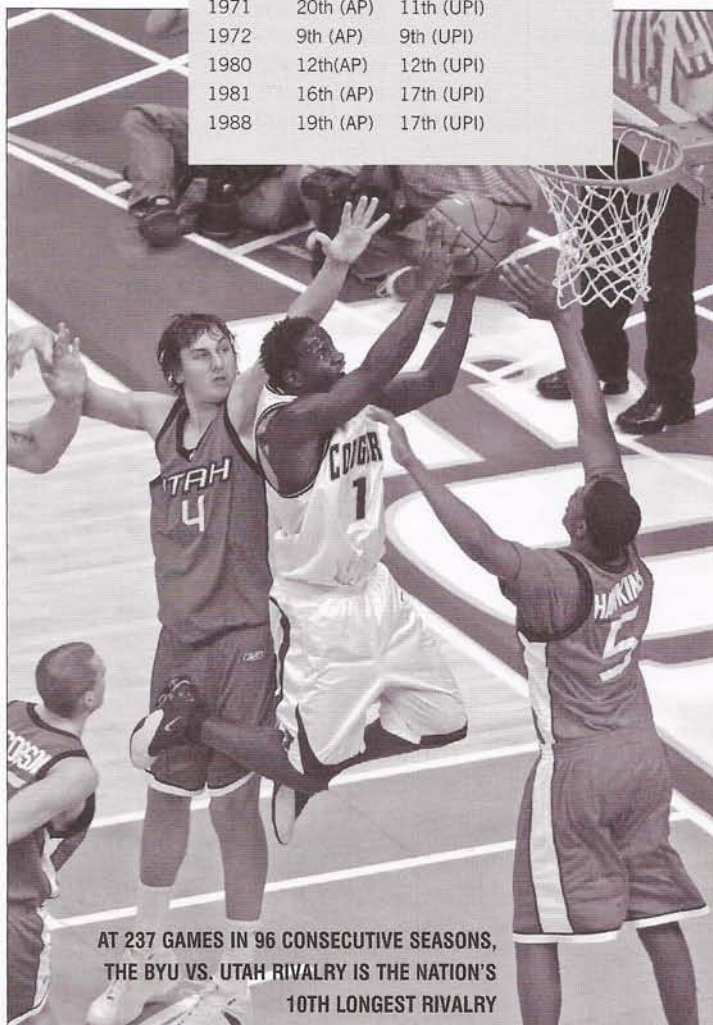

LOOKING BACK AT 03-04

2003-2004 SEASON REVIEW: BYU'S WINNING TRADITION CONTINUES

Highlighted by a victory over NCAA Final Four qualifier Oklahoma State and center Rafael Araujo earning All-America honors, the 2003-04 Cougars compiled a 21-9 record on their way to a fifth straight postseason tournament invitation.

Led by Araujo, the Mountain West Conference Co-Player of the Year, BYU received its second straight NCAA at-large invitation while making its third NCAA appearance in the last four years. The Cougars placed second to MWC Champion Air Force with a 10-4 league record.

In nonconference play, BYU faced No. 25 Oklahoma State at the Delta Center in Salt Lake City. In front of the largest college crowd to see a game in Utah's capital city, BYU downed the eventual No. 3-ranked Cowboys 81-76 to earn its first victory over a top-25 team since defeating No. 13 Stanford on Dec. 22, 2001 at the Las Vegas Showdown. Rafael Araujo had the biggest night of his career in the win,

scoring 32 points and pulling down 17 rebounds, just one less than the entire Oklahoma State team.

The Cougars also claimed the Cable Car Classic title to become the non-Bay Area team with the most Classic championships. With its top three post players fouled out of the game, BYU looked to Mark Bigelow and he delivered a slashing bucket-and-one with 14.9 seconds remaining to lead the Cougars to a 68-66 win over host Santa Clara to claim the Classic title. Araujo was named MVP of the Cable Car Classic after averaging 20.5 points and 11.5 rebounds in wins over Idaho State and host Santa Clara.

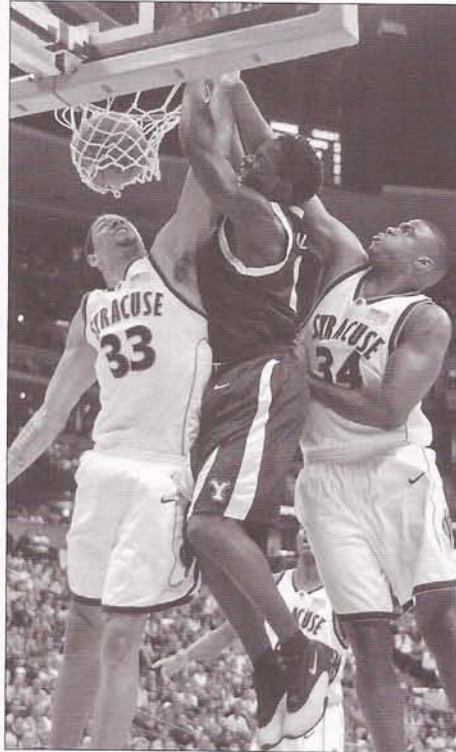
After a 10-3 start, BYU came out slow in conference play, ending the month of January 2-4 in MWC action and at the bottom of the league. The Cougars lost heartbreakers in the conference opener at San Diego State, at New Mexico and at Utah after being up by 15 points at the half. Seven of BYU's nine losses on the season came by eight points or less. However, the Cougars found their stride in February and into March, going 8-0 to end the season. BYU prevailed against UNLV 64-61 as Mike Hall blocked the game-tying shot with 2.7 seconds left and survived an overtime battle with San Diego State at home.

After suffering defeat at Air Force in January, BYU gained redemption in February, beating the league-leading Falcons 67-61 in Provo. The Cougars also avenged their loss to Utah, handing the Utes a 70-57 defeat in front of the largest Marriott Center crowd since 1992. The boys in blue went to Las Vegas for the final game of the season and escaped with an 89-88 victory over UNLV on a last-second Luiz Lemes dish to Araujo for the game-winning bucket. Overall, the Cougars swept Wyoming, Colorado State and UNLV and took home-and-home splits with the other MWC members.

The Cougars defeated Wyoming before suffering a last-second loss to Utah at the MWC Tournament in Denver. BYU returned to the Pepsi Center, site of the MWC Tournament, as the No. 12 seed in the NCAA Tournament to face the defending National Champion Syracuse Orangemen. After shooting lights out in the first half, and having perhaps its best offensive first half of the year, BYU was ultimately upended by one of the NCAA's finest-ever individual performances in falling 80-75 to Syracuse in the first round. Despite Araujo's 24 points and 12 rebounds, it was Orangemen point guard Gerry McNamara that stole the show with a career-high 43 points, including 9-of-13 shooting

from three-point range. McNamara's 43 points was the most scored against BYU since New Mexico's Kenny Page totaled 44 at The Pit in 1981.

Several BYU players earned awards for their outstanding play in 2003-04. Three Cougars received MWC accolades. Senior center Araujo was named MWC Co-Player of the Year and was a first-team pick, junior guard Mike Hall captured Defensive Player of the Year honors and a third-team spot, and senior forward Mark Bigelow was selected to the MWC Second Team. Araujo and Hall also earned MWC Player of the Week recognition during the season, with Araujo taking the honor three times, along with Sporting News and Collegeinsider Player of the Week National Player of the Week recognition. Araujo was named to the Basketball Times All-America Second Team and to the Associated Press All-America Honorable Mention Team. He was also selected as the Chevrolet Player of the Game in the Cougars' NCAA loss to Syracuse.



Center with a 5-7 away record and a 3-2 neutral court mark.

Araujo led the team with 18.4 points, 10.1 rebounds and 1.43 steals per game. Mark Bigelow provided leadership on the court as he found his stride in February and finished averaging 13.4 points per game. Newcomer Mike Hall added a flare to the team with his high-flying dunks, one of which was featured as the national play of the day by ESPN. The MWC Defensive Player of the Year, Hall's block of UNLV's game-tying shot with 2.7 seconds on the clock sealed the victory for BYU and started the Cougars on their 9-0 late-season run. Hall also finished the season tied for first on the team in steals with 1.4 per game.

Redshirt freshman Garner Meads earned more playing time as the season progressed and led the Cougars to victory over San Diego State with a career high 19 points. The 6-8 forward was the only Cougar other than Araujo to post a double-double with his 13 points and 10 rebounds against Wyoming.

Senior Luiz Lemes led the team and finished third in the MWC in assists with 4.53 per game. Lemes was also

second on the team in three-point percentage, hitting 42 percent (36-85) from beyond the arc. He could generally be counted on to lead the offense at the start of each game and score the first bucket. Lemes' 20 points against Idaho State and 23 at UNLV led BYU to victory in both of those games.

As a team, the Cougars led the MWC in free-throw percentage (.724), assists (14.83 apg) and field goal percentage (.487), a mark that also ranked eighth nationally.

TOP ATTENDANCE

BYU averaged 15,300 fans, No. 11 nationally and tops among all MWC teams. BYU had a season-high 22,718 attendance vs. Utah, the largest crowd since 1992 and the 21st largest ever in the Marriott Center.

ALL-AMERICA SEASON

Rafael Araujo was named to the Basketball Times All-America Second Team and was an Associated Press Honorable Mention pick. Regarded as the nation's No. 2 center by Basketball Times, Araujo earned second-team honors while Connecticut center Omeka Okafor received first-team accolades and Duke center Shelden Williams



The Cougars had the MWC's best RPI rating and strength of schedule ranking and also boasted the league's top win with its victory over Big 12 Champion and NCAA Final Four participant Oklahoma State. BYU was one of only three teams to defeat No. 3 and Big 12 Champion Oklahoma State (27-3). Four BYU opponents won either their regular season or conference tournament titles. Two others placed second and two others placed third in their leagues. The seven teams to beat BYU achieved a combined 132-71 record (.650).

BYU was a perfect 13-0 at home to extend its home victory streak to 18 straight overall in the Marriott Center. BYU has won 62 of its last 63 games at home and is 57-1 over the past four seasons. BYU was 8-9 away from the Marriott

was selected to the third team. Okafor was the only center named to the AP teams. Araujo led the Cougars in scoring at 18.4 points per game and pulled down a team-leading 10.1 boards per game, which ranked 11th nationally. He had the fourth-high-



est combined points and rebounds averages in the nation and led all centers 6-foot-11 or taller in scoring and rebounds. Selected on the midseason top-30 Wooden Award list for the nation's top player, Araujo was named the National Player of the Week by The Sporting News and by Collegeinsider.com for the week of Nov. 30-Dec. 6 after recording two double-doubles in victories at Boise State (75-69) and against then 25th-ranked Oklahoma State (76-71). He averaged 31.5 points and 15.5 rebounds, while shooting 71.4 percent from the floor and 76.7 percent from the free throw line, in BYU's two wins. The 290-pound native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, recorded 16 double-double games on the year, the fifth-best single-season total all-time at BYU. He also led BYU in steals (1.4 spg) and blocks (0.8 bpg) and led all MWC players in steals in league action.

BIGELOW JOINS AINGE

Senior Mark Bigelow concluded his stellar career by joining Danny Ainge as the only two Cougars to score 400 or more points in each of their four seasons. Bigelow moved into eighth place on BYU's all-time scoring list with his 21-point effort vs. Air Force. He was the Cougars' second-leading scorer at 13.4 ppg. The Cougars' all-time three-point leader also led the team in free throw percentage, hitting 80 percent from the stripe (104-129). In his senior season, Bigelow reached several milestones. His 118 consecutive starts place him third in BYU history and his 119 total starts put him in a tie for fourth with BYU great Fred Roberts.

RECORD DEBUT

BYU's only true freshman in 2003-04 wasted no time in etching his name in the BYU record book. In his college debut, guard Mike Rose set a new BYU single-game record with eight 3-pointers while scoring a game-high 26 points to lead the Cougars to an 88-54 win over Southern Utah University. His 26 points was the most scored by a BYU freshman since Bigelow totaled 33 points at Washington State in 1998. Rose's eight 3-pointers broke the BYU record of seven treys in a game, previously set by Nick Sanderson (1992) and Danny Bower (1998). Rose's performance behind the arc was just shy of tying the Marriott Center's record of nine 3-pointers in a game held by Utah State's Jay Goodman (1990). Rose also dished out six assists with only one turnover and added two rebounds and one steal in his 22 minutes off the bench. He made 61.5 percent of his 3-point attempts, going 8-of-13 from behind the arc, and finished 9-for-16 (.563) overall from the floor against Southern Utah's match-up zone. Rose led the MWC in three-point field goal percentage at 46 percent (26-28).

MEDIA INTERVIEW POLICY

All player and coaches interview requests must be made at least 24 hours in advance. Special requests regarding breaking news will be accommodated where possible. All interviews must be scheduled through Brett Pyne of BYU Athletic Media Relations Office. He can be reached at 801-422-4912. Local media are encouraged to conduct interviews during the team's weekly media day. Player interviews requested for morning and afternoon hours while school is in session will be avoided except during the team's scheduled media day. No interviews will be given the day of a game until after the game.

WEEKLY MEDIA DAY

Coach Cleveland and BYU players will be available for interviews during a weekly media day each week at the Marriott Center. Interviews take place before practice. Contact the media relations office to know the media day schedule. Special interview requests or extended feature interviews must be arranged in advance through the athletic media relations office.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS

Coach Cleveland will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute post-game cooling off period in the Marriott Center interview room connected to the pressroom. A typed quote sheet with remarks from both

coaches will be provided to the media. Post-game player interviews will also be arranged. BYU player interviews will take place in the interview room after Coach Cleveland. Opponent coach and player interviews generally are conducted outside the visiting locker. Post-game interview schedules and information is posted in the pressroom prior to each game.

MEDIA SERVICES

Game notes with updated statistics are available on BYU's website prior to each game and are also issued to the media in advance via email. Contact Brett Pyne to be added to the media



email list. BYU and opponent game notes and media guides, the Mountain West Conference weekly release and the official game program are provided to the media at each game. Official game statistics are distributed at halftime and at the conclusion of the game. Stats monitors are provided for live radio and television broadcasters next to their broadcast locations. They will also be provided up-to-date paper statistics during timeouts throughout the game. Radio broadcast lines are available (ISDN or analog) for the visiting team. Several telephones are available in the pressroom adjacent to the court on the southwest corner for other members of the media. Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones.

MEDIA CREDENTIAL POLICY

Working media wishing to cover BYU must submit a request for credentials to Brett Pyne in the media relations office. Season media and photography credentials will be provided at the discretion of the media relations office to media members who regularly cover BYU. Single-game credential requests by working media should be made no later than three days prior to the game. Requests received later than noon the day before the game will not be accepted. Credentials are for working members of the media only. Daily and next-day newspapers, national magazines, wire services, live television and radio broadcasts, television and radio stations reporting for nightly news and those who regularly cover college basketball will be given priority. Media credentials are property of BYU and can be denied or revoked at any time at the discretion of BYU. Credentials must be surrendered upon request.

LOCATION AND PARKING

The Marriott Center is located on the BYU campus at the corner of 450 East and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is available in Lot #1, immediately north of the Marriott Center. Media parking passes must be requested with credentials in advance. To reach the pressroom, use the north entrance (ticket office) of the Marriott Center. Take the elevator down to the first level and follow the hallway to the right. The pressroom is located at the second portal on the southwest corner.

TELEVISION BROADCASTS

On Feb. 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc., signed a seven-year contract with the Mountain West Conference, giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to men's basketball and football beginning with the 1999-2000 academic
