Head Football Coach

Charles "Chick" Atkinson

Coach Atkinson succeeds Edwin R. Kimball, who will devote his full time to the jobs of Athletic Director and Athletic Manager. The youthful mentor, who is 31 years old, steps up from Pocatallo, Idaho, High School where his teams have won 38 games, lost III, and tied one.

He has coached both the single wing and the T-formation types of offensives. In spring football practice last

May, he established himself as a popular coach with both the athletes and townspeople with his likeable personality.

A graduate of Pocatello high school, where he participated in football, basketball, and track, Atkinson attended Idaho State college and the University of Idaho, and graduated from there in 1941 with both his BS and MS degrees.

In high school, he was captain of the basketball team and all state cager at guard. He also played on a state high school championship football team, playing right halfback. He was senior class president at Pocatello and was voted the outstanding athlete of the school for 1935-36.

At Idaho State College, he participated in football, basketball, and track and at Idaho University took major roles in the football, basketball and baseball teams. For the Bengals, he was captain of the basketball team, and voted the outstanding athlete in 1937-38. He also played on the Idaho State college baseball team that won 25 consecutive games.

While at Idaho University, he was captain of both the baseball and basketball teams and selected on the Pacific Coast all-division baseball team. He also was president of the lettermen's club.

In four years of college sports he won 12 major athletic awards.

In his last two seasons as head football coach at Pocatello High school, his teams were Idaho Big Six conference co-champions.

He is married and has two children.

Football Line Coach

Coach Nilson will work with the line this year in molding the football destinies of BYU for the 1949 season. He steps up from a highly successful year as Freshman football coach after playing one season with the Detroit Lions professional football team. He gave up the playfor-pay game, however, when the opportunity came to return to Brigham Young Univ-



ersity as assistant coach. He lettered in football three years at BYU, was named all-conference center in 1946 and played in the East-West all-star game in San Francisco in 1947. He was an all-state fullback for Provo High school his senior year there.

A fine wrestler during his college days, he also serves as wrestling coach in the winter.

He's married and has one child.



Football End Coach Robert "Bob" Bunker

Coach Bunker rounds out the completely-revised coaching staff at BYU for 1949, coming to the university from Preston, Idaho where he has been athletic coach since 1945. While at Preston, his teams have won three out of four district championships in football, held the state championship in basketball in 1946 and was runner-up in 1948.

A graduate of Utah State Agricultural college, he earned two letters in basketball and three in football. He was all-conference end and captain of Dick Romney's conference championship football team in 1936. He coached for three years at South Cache high school, then spent five years in the Army. Upon his release, he began his tenure at Preston and comes to BYU with high recommendations.

He is married and has three children.

OUTLOOK FOR '49 . . .

- A completely-revised coaching staff, with little or no spring practice.
- A great lack of depth in critical positions, and very little experience.
- 3. A lot of sophomores; quite a few juniors; only a few seniors.
- The toughest schedule in many years, a game each week for eleven weeks.

Putting aside all rose-colored glasses, the immediate outlook for the Cougars is not bright! Such a confession from the Provo camp will not be greeted with any great delight by Brigham Young's fighting alumni, but to say anything else would most certainly be hypocritical, as shown by the various reasons outlined above.

To make matters worse, Brigham Young has been picked as the team to beat for a cellar position.

All is not foreboding, however. Seventeen lettermen have returned to the campus, and seven of them were starters last season. The Cats may well boast the best all-around backfield in the conference with such speed merchants as Dave Chadwick, Don Bushore, Lyle Koller, Rex Berry around to give the halfback spot plenty of depth and stamina. The fullback spot will find regular Don Benson in there plunging, with a new sophomore, Reed Stolworthy, around to keep him hopping for a first string berth. At quarter the first two men in that position last year are back, Jim Eccles and Cecil Lloyd, and they should battle down to the wire for starting positions.

Barring injuries, all these men are capable of upsetting any game from anywhere on the field, and should provide plenty of thrills for the crowd every game. With these men the Cats could become a dangerous team. Could that is, not will.

The big reason is the line, or lack of it. The always-important reason of depth will keep the Cougars hopping to find adequate replacements. Only two starters from last year are back, Dick Hill or Francis Magleby at center, and Glen Clark at end. The rest of the line is still a big question mark, with guards Alvin Dalley, Bob Dimick, Frank Rinaldi, and Tony Christopulos fighting to fill the bill. The tackle position, as usual will be a big headache for the coaching staff. The two starters of last year are gone and also their two replacements. Don Latimer, who was expected to play regular this year, was injured in an auto accident the day before practice began and is out for the season. All in all, the position will have to be filled by such men as Tim Kimball, Karol Bills, Delbert Oliver, Sophomore John Paulson, and a Junior College Transfer from California, George McWhorter. This group should have little trouble, but one injury will upset the apple cart.

Coach Atkinson, beginning his first year as mentor at Brigham Young, will have a big job on his hands molding these men into a winning aggregation. With a lot of breaks, victory may come to the Cougars when they least expect it. That's the prayer, that's the hope of Provo.

THE COUGAR OFFENSE

System

The man-in-motion T-formation as used by Eddie Kimball the past few seasons. This is the same system used so effectively by the Chicago Bears and Notre Dame, and will be modified slightly by Coach Atkinson.

Ground Game Rapier-like strikes by Bushore, Chadwick, Berry and Koller; line smashes by plunging Don Benson and Reed Stolworthy; and a few end-arounds by quarterbacks Lloyd and Eccles should provide plenty of yardage for the Cougar machine. The Cats are dangerous from anywhere on the field.

Aerial Game
From the signal-caller's post at quarterback, Eccles and Lloyd are both exceptionally fine passers. Ends Glen Clark, Max Tolbert and Rod Long will give them some good receivers to strike at. All halves are also good receivers.

Kicking Game Although the season is still young and a lot of changes may be made, it is expected that Koller, who did most of it last year, will share the load with quarterbacks Lloyd, a really fine punter, and Eccles.

Extra Points

Practice hasn't gotten around as yet to this all-important question, but Bushore will probably handle the bulk of the load in place of last year's Ken Hamblin, who left to fill a Church mission.

Kickoff

The coaching staff is still searching for an adequate replacement for Kimball Merrill, last year's captain and kickoff artist. Shaping up at the present are Bushore and Bob Dimick, a tackle. There may be a change here.

Signal Callers

Two veteran signal callers in Eccles and Lloyd, plus another lad who shows some promise, Verle Duerden. Eccles and Lloyd are ole-timers with two and three years experience behind them and should work in well this year.

Safety Men

The Cougars are knee-deep in this position, with any one of several men capable of playing safety, and playing it good. Don Bushore, who will probably be used here a lot, plus Rex Berry, Dave Chadwick, Jay Hamblin, or Elmo Roundy make this position one of envy by opposing teams.

Line Work

Offensive linemen, good ones, are far and few between. The Cougar backs this year will have to depend on quick openers and a lot of razzle-dazzle to get their backs into the clear. A good first string is shaping up, but it lacks depth in every position.

CENTERS

- Nick Hill—One of last year's letter winners, will be a junior this year. Hails from Price, Utah and was captain of his allstate team. A regular last year, he was a bulwark on defense and one of this year's best line prospects.
- Burnell Lamb—an all-state center from Nevada. Married and a Junior in college, makes up for a slight lack of weight in fight and spirit. Aggressive and agile, he'll be in there fighting down to the last wire.
- Dave Lindstrom—Another Price. Utah lad with a big future in football. His height serves him to good advantage on defense—is potentially a great center. A junior at 20 years of age.
- Francis Magleby—A stellar performer for the Cougars for the past two seasons, this lad will be hard to keep out of a starting position. Friendly, likeable, his size will do a lot toward bolstering the middle of the line. A senior this year.
- Ned Porter—Scrappy center prospect who will be starting his sophomore year this fall. Has a lot to learn but is willing to work overtime to do so. May developinto an asset for the university. Light but willing to learn.

GUARDS

- John Anderson—19-year-old sophomore guard who was an outstanding Freshman last year. He attended Poly high school in Riverside, California and should develop into a letterman if he continues to improve.
- y Christopulos—A stocky guard who was pushing the regulars for a starting berth last season. Attended West high school in Salt Lake City where he was an all-stater for two years. Should do all right this year.
- Ron Daly—Another sophomore who was asked to remain on the squad, Daly hails from South high in Salt Lake City. A good blocker and agressive, was a first-string guard on Frosh team.
- Alvin Dalley—A married man and proud papa—has been a mainstay on the Cougar line for two years. One of the bigger men on the squad, he comes through when the going is toughest. Should be a good all-conference prospect.
- Bob Dimick—A big boy with a lot of personality. Should break into the starting lineup this year as a junior. Lettered last year as a soph and the coaching staff is expecting great things from him. An all-stater from American Fork, Utah
- rtorace Gillespie—Potentially one of the best guards on the squad,
 "Bruno" is another proud daddy. Rated pound for pound
 one of the foughest men in the conference, spends his
 spare time boxing. A letterman.
- Bob L. Hamblin—A good sophomore prospect. Unproven but has a love for the game and should help to provide a lot of good thrills this year. Likeable, ambiable, Bob is wellthought of by coaches and team alike.

- Joe Hapi—A New Zealand lad who used to play a lot of ball for Brigham Young as a backfield man way back when. He'll be shifted to guard this year and will help bolster that position with his weight. Married.
- Bevan Haycock—The favorite of the squad and the best attitude of any. Conscientious, good worker, and very egile. A sension, this should be his year to come through in a big way. Can't be beat pound for pound. All conference in Colorhigh school.
- Art Paulson—Only a sophomore, this Minnesota lad was an allconference man in high school and proved it during Frosh ball last year. Not spectacular but steady and dependable. Should do all right for the Cougars.
- Frank Rinaldi—A fighting guard and a transfer from a J. C. Calls San Francisco home and will add experience and weight to a line which really needs it. Unproven, but likes the game and shows a lot of will-to-win. Likeable and friendly.

HALFBACKS

- Rex Berry—A smooth, open-field runner with plenty of power, Stood out last year as definitely a man to watch anywhere on the field. A good pass snagger, and is hard to knock off his feet. This should be his year. All-conference material.
- Don Bushore—A regular for the past three seasons, Bushore is the hardest running back in the conference. Deceptive, fast, has shown flashes of greatness. Conference foes know him to be very elusive and hard to tackle. Barring injuries, Bushore should make every all-conference selection. Good team man and likeable.
- Dave Chadwick—An Idaho speedmerchant whose brilliant runs last year highlighted the season. This year on running the ends and helping to play safety. A junior this year, he's also a star sprinter on the track team.
- Jay Hamblin—Good broken field runner and very determined to get where he wants to go. A senior this year. Married. Hails from Murray, is a deadly tackler and a wizard at pass defense. Will play a lot of ball this year. Letterman,
- Bob Karpowitz—another sophomore who has been asked to stay with the squad. A Salt Lake City native, he attended South high there. Elusive, fast, rugged, he should be a standout performer whenever he's on the field.
- Lyle Koller—A regular starter for the past three seasons, Lyle has been handling the major punting duties. The deadliest tackler on the squad and a standout on defense as well as offense. A potential TD from anywhere on the field.
- Ray Oliverson—This Preston, Idaho lad enjoyed a great season last year as a Frosh and was a regular starter. Should go places on the varsity. Picked as one of the outstanding sophs for this season. Deceptive and agile.
- Elmo Roundy—As a reserve last season, Roundy barely missed getting his letter but should have no difficulty this year. Rugged, he was a fullback in his prep days and was picked on several all-state teams in New York. Good defensively.

TACKLES

Ray Aitken—May break into a starting berth this year. Is a senior and has been a stellar reserve for the past two seasons. Another daddy, a fine sportsman, and good defensive man who comes through when needed most.

- Karol Bills—A Brigham Young high school man who lettered last year as a sophomore. Considered by many to be one of the finest and fastest guards at B.Y.U., he'll be switched to tackle this fall. An all-stater, he's fast and rugged.
- Duane Gardner—A sophomore from Idaho, should lend a lot of support to the tackle position and may fool a lot of people in pushing the regulars around. Married, Gardner had a great year as a Frosh last year.
- Heber Kimball—Hails from Mission high in San Francisco. Could be a regular tackle if he keeps developing. Aggressive, agile, he's one of the bigger man on the roster. A great prospect for a tackle slot.
- Tim Kimball—Lettered last year as a sophomore. Made all-state tackle from West high, Salt Lake City. This lad should go places this year and is picked to be one of the best defensive men on the squad. Good blocker and cat-like charge.
- George McWhorter—Another J. C. transfer, hails from Bakersfield, California. Witty, likeable, and very agile for his size. Should break into a starting role his first year at the university. Surprisingly fast. Proud papa.
- Delbert Oliver—Being groomed for a starting tackle position, this Moab, Utah junior has enough football savvy to come up with a good name when the season is over. Big and powerful, one of the most amiable men on the squad. Married.
- John Paulson—One of Brigham Young's outstanding sophomore prospects. Calls Minnesota home and is here with brother Art. A regular Frosh guard last season, he should be a mainstay this year on the varsity. Constantly improving.
- Dick Tooke—Moved around a lot in high school but finally wound up in Nevada as an all-stater his senior year. Now calls Salt Lake City home. He'll be a welcome addition to the squad because of his size. Will be pushing regulars for a post.
- "rnold Weidauer—The tallest man on the squad and agreat defensive man. A Granite high school product from Salt Lake City, he was an all-state tackle before coming to college. A Junior, should have a great season this year.

ENDS

- Bruce Burr—An unproven product from the Branch Agricultural college, but his size is a needed asset for the Cougar eleven. Is said to have been out of school for a year or so, but comes with good recommendations.
- Glen Clark—Great defensive man and a regular performer for the Cougars for the past three seasons. Shifted from halfback to end, this Springville, Utah boy should be one of the best men in the conference. All-conference material.
- Keith Deeds—Another great end prospect for the Cougars. Keith should be pushing all season for a regular starting berth.

 Big and surprisingly fast, he should be outstanding defensively and offensively.

Courses are offered in the College of Applied Science, the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Commerce and Business, the College of Fine Arts, the College of Education, the Division of Religion, the Extension Division, and the Graduate School, Credits from the university are nationally recognized.

The university is a co-educational institution, with approximately 5000 students enrolled.
