


#### GENERAL INFORMATION

Campus: Brigham Young University, a show-place of Central Utah, is located in Provo, Utah, a city of 29,000 which greatly expands during school term. Growth has resulted in a split campus. The older buildings are on University Avenue and the new development on University Hill. A massive new Physical Sciences Building and a new Fieldhouse, now under construction, will be in use during the 1950-51 term. Summer school classes are also held at Aspen Grove at the foot of majestic Mount Timpanogos.

Founding: Established October 16, 1875, twenty-one years before Utah statehood, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon). This is the 75th anniversary year. Diamond Jubilee convocation week is Oct. 14 to 20.

Administration: Dr. Christen Jensen, acting president; Dr. Wesley F. Lloyd, dean of students. The university is governed by a church board of trustees.

Enrollment: 5904 cumulative total last year. Coeducational.

School Colors: Royal Blue and White.

Uniforms: Blue for traveling, white at home.

Team Nicknames: Cougars, Cats, etc.

Conference: Mountain States Intercollegiate Athletic Association, popularly known as the "Skyline Six." At present the conference includes Wyoming University, Colorado A & M, Denver University, University of Utah, Utah State Agricultural College and Brigham Young University. Two other universities, Montana State University and New Mexico University, have joined and will enter conference competition in 1951 when the loop will become "Skyline Eight." E. L. Romney, conference commissioner, has offices in Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City.

Schools and Colleges: Graduate School, College of Applied
Science College of Arts and Sciences, College of Commerce,
College of Fine Arts, College of Education, Division of
Religion. Extension Division. Credits from the university
are nationally recognized.

School Songs: Official school song is "The College Song," with "The Cougar Song" as the official fight song.

Stadium: "Y" stadium. Seating canacity 12,000. Built of concrete on natural slope facing west. 100,000 watt lighting system for night games.

#### CHARLES "CHICK" ATKINSON Head Football Coach

If the Brigham Young Cougars need inspiration for courage they need look no farther than their head coach, "Chick" At-kinson. He has kept on battling when the chips were down.

Last year he came to Brigham Young for his first year of collegiate coaching after an enviable record of 38 games won, 10 lost and one tied during six years as Pocatello high school mentor. He arrived late for spring practice and was unacquainted with his team until September. Then, with a light squad and the heaviest schedule in BYU history, he kept the Cougars battling, although they wound up in the cellar.

This year, still building his squad, he lost 14 lettermen and 14 other regulars to the armed services and LDS missions.

Undaunted, Atkinson still figures he is in the running and is building a sophomore machine that is likely to make trouble in the conference.

An outstanding athlete himself, he has chalked up a notable record both in high school and college sports. He was captain of the Pocatello high school basketball team and an all-state choice at guard; right halfback on a state championship football team; senior class president and was voted the outstanding athlete of the school for 1935-36.

He attended Idaho State College and was graduated from the University of Idaho with BS and MS degrees. At Idaho State he participated in football, basketball and track, and at Idaho U, took a leading part in football, basketball and baseball.

All told, he copped 12 major athletic awards in four years of college.

#### REED NILSEN Football Line Coach

Hard-working Coach Nilsen is molding the Cougar line again this year, his second with "Chick" Atkinson. And when he tells one of the big boys what to do, he knows what he is talking about, for he was a nationally famous lineman himself. Reed is a product of Brigham Young University. He lettered three years here and was named all-conference center in 1946. He played in the East-West all-star game in San Francisco in 1947. Before his college days, he was an all-state fullback for Provohigh school in his senior year.

After his student days, Recd took a fling at the play-forpay game with the Detroit Lions, but resigned after one year to return to BYU as assistant coach. He moved up after a year as freshman coach to join Atkinson's staff.

Reed also was a star wrestler in college and now serves as wrestling coach when his football duties end in the winter.

#### ROBERT "BOB" BUNKER End Coach

Popular for his sly smile, dry wit and friendliness, Coach Bunker rounds out the triumverate of mentors who took over the Cougars last year. He hails from Preston, Idaho, where he was high school athletic coach from 1945 to 1949. His teams won three out of four district championships in football, held the state championship in basketball in 1946 and were runners-up in 1948.

Utah State Agricultural College is his alma mater. There he earned two letters in basketball and three in football, serving as captain and all-conference end of Dick Romney's championship team of 1936, then became high school coach then doughbo

#### OUTLOOK FOR 1950

Brigham Young University has only one direction to go -- UP!

Last year the Cougars wound up on the bottom of the conference heap, but if determination and spirit have anything to do with it (and they do) they won't be found there at the end of this season.

The Cats have high hopes of upsetting somebody's applecart regardless of these disturbing factors: loss of fifteen lettermen through graduation and church missions, and loss of ten other regulars to the armed services.

Filling those cleated soes will be a flock of promising sophomores, inexperienced but also full of possibilities. In addition, eleven lettermen will return who will give the squad considerable power.

Here's how Coach Atkinson sees it: "We still have a group of fighting, spirited football players, and definitely should not be counted as 'also ran!' This does mean, however, that we must depend largely upon inexperienced sophomores."

Inexperience means mistakes, and that is likely to be the story for B.Y.U. early in the season, but the Cats should improve as they go along. But with the mistakes may also come surprises. You never can tell about a sophomore.

There are 32 zeros in the experience column of the Y string and some of them in vital spots. Where experience counts most is at quarterback and here Atkinson is going with three sophs and a converted junior fullback. The tackle position is loaded with lettermen but the guard positions are weak on both sides, many of the men on whom "Chick" depends tipping the beam in the 180's. (See next page for position analysis)

#### SIZING THEM UP

- Centers: Dick Hill at 200 returns with plenty of ability.

  He should make one of the outstanding pivotmen of the conference. Oriddle, looken and Kimball are a bit light and lacking experience here.
- Guards: Not enough Beel. Paulson, Daly and Flaherty in 180's.
  Lundberg and Kochever heavy but new. Tervort is little but scrappy.
- Tackles: We're loaded here. McWhorter and Jimick, both lettermen, are at left and veterans Alvy Clave, Richard Tooke, 210-pound Stevens and 214-pound Madsen are at right.
- Ends: Just so-so, but bolstered by lettermen Tolbert and Poodry. Also 6-foot-6 Glenn Eupp, transfer Joe Bob Cowser and Paul Menuenhall fair performers.
- Quarterbacks: All brand new. Mortensen, Doney, Matthews and Norton. Mortensen and Doney clever ball handlers. All pretty good flippers.
- Halfbacks: A deep department. Veterans Berry and Oliverson will carry the load, but there's plenty of depth with Paxman, Whitaker, Lance, Hamblin, Villett, Alger and Ferrarro.
- Fullbacks: Ah! Lettermen Benson and Karpowitz should give the fans their money's worth this year, and Jae Ballif is touted as one of the best defensive backs in the conference.
- System: T-formation with variations. Platoons for offense and defense.
- Ground Game: Benson and Ballif will ram the line. Berry, Paxman and Oliverson will try to spear those holes. And Hamblin and Willett will scat.
- Aerial Game: Doney and Norton have strong wings and will have some good targets in Ends Poodry, Tolbert and Cowser. Most of the backs are good receivers.

<u>Kicking</u>: Benson and Karpowitz.

Extra Point: Also Karpowitz. He has an impressive average.

Kickoff: Karpowitz, Dimick.

Safety Man: Ballif and Benson tops. Also Cowser will drop back from end post to safety. He's fleet.

#### THUMENALL SKETCHES

#### Ends:

- George (Wally) Nielsen -- Sophomore, age 22, 193 pounds, 6', Salt Lake City. Was on the EYU freshman team back in 1946 but interrupted his education. He played under Pat Ryan and Jammy Galbert at South high school. Should develop with experience. Married.
- Bruce Burr -- Senior, age 22, 180 pounds, 6'2", Burrville, Utah. Although a senior, Bruce starts with the Cougars with no collegiate experience. He played three years at Branch Agricultural College under Murray Maughn. He loves the game and plays hard. His enthusiasm resulted in a lacerated face and he's been out of scrimmage.
- Paul Mendenhall -- Sophomore, age 19, 184 pounds, 6'2", Stockton, Calif. One of the promising young ends, Paul came up through freshman ball after three years at Stockton high school. He should see a lot of action this year and gain conference attention in years to come. Majoring in animal nusbandry.
- Joe Bob Cowser -- Sophomore, age 20, 195 pounds, 6'42",
  Hemet, Calif. A stranger to Cougar fans, he played three
  years with Hemet high school and a year with San Bernardino Junior College, but will not be a stranger ofter
  the first game. Held carry a heavy load at left end
  and drop back to safety at times. Fleet, lanky, good
  pass snatcher.
- Max Tolbert -- Junior, age 20, weight 180, 6', Chambers-burg, Fa. Although a little light for the task, Max will go long periods at right end. Considerable gridiron experience should help him. He lettered three years in high school, played frosh ball, and won his letter on Y varsity last year.
- Bradley Poodry -- Junior, age 21, 197 pounds, 6'1", Akron, N.Y. Brad lettered on the varsity last year. He'll share the right end spot with Tolbert. A little slow gatting started but good steady performer.
- Glenn Rupp -- Sophomore, age 19, 198 pounds, 6'6", Tooele.

  The tallest man on the squad, Glenn will be able to use his altitude to advantage at times, but at present lacks experience. He should show up well in the future.

  Played two years at Tooele high and on Y frosh eleven.

  Married.
- Frank Janson -- Sophomore, age 25, 192 pounds, 6'l", Frovo. An entirely untried newcomer, Frank played a year with B.T. High under Dave Crowton. He is married and will major in physical education.

#### Tackles

- Bob Dimick -- Senior, 20 years old, 205 pounds, 6', American Fork. Will be one of the mainstays of the young Cougar team. He'll be tops this year with two letters already earned. Has the weight, know-how and fight to be all-conference material.
- George McWhorter -- Senior, age 26, 195 pounds, 6', Bakers-field, Calif. Another pillar in the tackle spot, George is a letterman who will see plenty of action again this year. Played two years at Bakersfield Junior College under Jack Frost. Married and wants to teach.
- Larry Hancock -- Sophomore, 19 years old, 204 pounds, 6', Pocatello, Idaho. Larry followed his old coach, Chick Atkinson, down to the Y from Pocatello high school where he lettered one year. Played frosh ball last season and is rated as an outstanding tackle although a newcomer.
- Alvy Clove -- Junior, age 23, 225 pounds, 6'l", Hurricane, Utah. Now suffering a broken toe, he should be all-conference if he heals well. A letterman with a year of high school and a year of junior college football behind him. Alvy puts a lot of weight on the line and knows how to throw it around. Married.
- Richard Tooke -- Junior, 22 years old, 190 pounds, 6'2", Salt Lake City. Another letterman in tackle spot. Also played frosh year. Hard worker, but not flashy. Wants to be a coach.
- Lowell Madsen -- Sophomore, 18 years old, 218 pounds, 6'2", Provo. Brother of the team physician, but would rather be a lawyer. Already an outstanding lineman, the Doc's "little" brother should be great later on with more experience. Came from Lincoln high and played freshman football.
- Bruce Stevens -- Sophomore, 28 years old, 202 pounds, 5'  $10\frac{1}{2}$ ", Astoria, Ore. Comes to BYU with no experience. Hard worker, but a bit slow and in need of more punch. Married.

#### Guards

- Ron Daly -- Junior, 20 years old, 185 pounds, 5'8", Salt Lake City. Small for a guard but full of fight. A year frosh and a year varsity experience behind him.
  - John Paulson -- Junior, 23 years old, 189 pounds, 5'8", Provo. Another small one for the middle of the line, but is eager to do well and will see plenty of action. Starred as freshman. Married.

#### Guards (Cont'd)

- Walter Smit -- Sophomore, 19 years old, 185 pounds, 6', Madera, California. Also light for guard spot. Will be a stalwart in later years as he adds weight and knowhow. Played high school and freshman football.
- Franklin Tervort -- Junior, age 21, 160 pounds, 5'7", Payson. Played at Payson high and two years at Snow College under Jim Williams. A real featherweight for this conference, he lilely will be pushed around some. But watch his speed. His breakthrough is surprising.
- Bob Flaherty -- Junior, 22 years old, 183 pounds, 5'll", Temple City, Calif. Still another of the light Y guards but he has ample get-up and cuts through either side. Transferred from two years at Pasadena City College under Jack Musik. Plans to study optometry.
- Lewis Kochevar -- Sophomore, 19 years old, 201 pounds, 6'1", Los Angeles. His weight looks better than most of the other guards, but will take a little time to develop skill. Played frosh ball.
- Mel Nielsen -- Sophomore, 19 years old, 195 pounds, 6'1", Vallejo, Calif. Played on freshman team. Untried.
- Jim Lundberg -- Junior, 19 years old, 220 pounds, 6', St. George, Utah. This weight looks more like it. Jim learned rudiments in two years at Dixie high school and 2 years at Dixie Junior College under Walt Brooks and Gareth Belliston. Personable and easy to train. Will show up well. He's married and wants to teach physical sciences.

#### Centers

- Dick Hill -- Senior, 21 years old, 208 pounds, 6', Price, Utah. Definitely all-conference material, he'd be an asset to any team in the area.
