MEET THE CHIEF AND HIS HELPERS...

CHARLES "CHICK" ATKINSON Head Football Coach

The spirit which has lifted the Cougars back into the football picture can be attributed to amiable Chick Atkinson, head football coach at BYU.



The youthful mentor, 34 years old, is in his fourth year at the Provo school, and the '52 season will be his first promising year since he took over the Cougar helm. Ironically enough, the two services he has been feeding in years past—armed forces and LDS missions—will be feeding him for a change.

Chick came to BYU from Pocatello High School where his teams won 38 games and lost 11. A graduate of that high school, he participated in football, basketball and track, besides being student body president. He later attended Idaho State College and University of Idaho, graduating from the latter with BS and MS degrees.

While at Idaho University he was captain of both the baseball and basketball teams and was selected on the Pacific Coast all-division baseball team. He was also president of the lettermans' club.

Chick came to the Y. with the aim of building better men and athletes through sound football. He has continued to use the T-formation, and moving rapidly in the direction of putting BYU on the football map.

REED NILSEN, Line Coach

The task of building a strong BYU forward wall falls annually into the lap of rotund Reed Nilsen, BYU grid great who has been living and breathing football for over a decade.



Lettering three years at BYU as ball-snapper, Reed was on practically every all-conference selection. He was one of the few boys in this area to be selected for a berth on the East-West all-star game at San Francisco. The following season he joined the Detroit Lions, playing regularly during the season. He resigned, however, to join the coaching staff at BYU.

An outstanding wrestler in college, he also serves as wrestling coach in the winter.



BOB BUNKER, End Coach

Every football team needs a guy to ease the tension, and that's BYU's Bob Bunker. Popular for his sly smile, dry wit and friendliness, Bob rounds out the triumvirate of mentors who took over at BYU four years ago.

A native of Preston, Idaho, where he was high school athletic coach from 1945 to 1949, he presented the Preston fans with three out of four district championships.

A graduate of U.S.A.C., he earned two letters in basketball and three in football. He was all-conference end and captain of Dick Romney's conference champs in 1936.

STAN WATTS, Assistant Coach of Frosh and Varsity

The Y's famed basketball mentor, Stan Watts, will assist Coach Chick Atkinson this year in preparing the players for the 10-game season. Stan is more than familiar with the duties, having worked with the pigskinners when he first came to the Y.

A veteran mentor who worked his way up through the prep ranks of Utah, Watts joined the BYU staff in 1947 and has been skyrocketing Cougar prestige ever since.



DAVE CROWTON, Freshman Coach

Dave Crowton, regular BYU baseball coach, will again handle the junior varsity prospects. This job of breaking in the former high school stars is a tough one that finds Crowton at his best.

He played end for Granite High school for two years and captained Granite's championship football team in 1930, the year he was graduated.

Upon graduation he took over coaching duties at BY High School, 1938 to 1948. His basketball teams won the regional championship in 1941 and the state crown in 1948. The next year he joined the BYU coaching staff.

RODNEY KIMBALL, Trainer

Rod works hardest during the football season trying to keep the Cougars in shape.

Elected outstanding scholar-athlete at Jordan High School in 1929, Rod was junior class president, student body president, and lettered three years in football, baseball, two years in basketball and one year in track. He attended Utah State and BYU, winning his football numeral. He has been trainer since 1937.



WHAT TO EXPECT..

SYSTEM — The man-in-motion T-formation with modifications will be used again by the Cougars. Atkinson will employ split-T, and may even use some variations of a wing formation.

GROUND GAME — The line-plunging assignments will undoubtedly fall to Jae Ballif and Reed Stolworthy, BYU fullbacks, neither of whom is afraid of bruising play. Dave Chadwick, with Gary Paxman will do the end sweeping, and Bob Hamblin and Udell Westover look right for ball-packing through the line.

AERIAL GAME — The quarterbacks, especially Henry West and Darrell Doney, will do most of the flipping with Gary Paxman and Bob Whitaker seeing some aerial duty.

KICKING GAME — The two most logical punters are Udell Westover and Jae Ballif. Don Woods, a fullback, may boot a few. DeRay Eyre, end, and Bob Bills, halfback, will handle the kickoffs.

EXTRA POINTS — With Bob Karpowitz's toe now a thing of the past, the conversion duties will rest with Jae Ballif, who may get some help from Elmo Roundy.

FROM THE CATS...

A BETTER YEAR

Three little words — "plenty of depth" — best describe BYU's chances in the 1952 race.

In years past Coach Charles "Chick" Atkinson has been plagued with various handicaps, the main one being a shortage of experienced manpower with which to operate a two platoon system for 60 minutes of ball.

This year, however, the manpower is at full strength, and the prospects of a title-contending club never looked brighter.

In Atkinson's own words: "Barring the unfortunate things that can strike a senior club, we should be 10 per cent better than last year."

Although no world-beater, last year's squad push a few of the Skyline grid powers around. In spite of erratic performances, the Cougars managed to beat Colorado A & M and Utah State, tie Wyoming, and lose a 6-7 decision to the University of Utah, the conference champs.

This blessing of depth can be attributed to an ironical twist in the ever-changing manpower situation at Cougarville. In the past Uncle Sam and LDS Church missions have drawn heavily from the Y. football pool. In 1952, however, the Cats will be receiving more men from these services than they will be giving.

Biggest chunk of talent will be coming from Uncle Sam — the old master of give and take — who hauled off with a lion's share of Chick's squad two years ago. Five boys — Don Moncur (center), Dave Lindstrom (tackle), Karol Bills (guard), Dave Chadwick (halfback), and Elmo Roundy (halfback) — will shed their khaki for the Cougar blue and white.

Two fullbacks, both of whom recently completed missions for the LDS Church, Reed Stolworthy and Don Woods, will join the ranks of backfield men.

In spite of the fact that Atkinson and his followers are wearing their optimism high, Chick will have a hard time filling the shoes of Ray Oliverson, conference scoring champ last year. Bob Karpowitz kicking toe will also be missed when it comes to getting those extra points.

Each position will be as strong, if not stronger, than last year. Some of the slots will be two and three men deep with lettermen; a situation that should keep the first stringers hustling for positions. This keen competition will keep every player on his toes.

Even though the eventual resting place of the Cougars in the Skyline standings is in doubt, fans can look to some better ball in '52.

SKYLINE PREVIEW . .

AND PAST CHAMPS

WYOMING — Although the Cowboy prospectus is a bit more pessimistic than last year, the Bowden Wyatt eleven still looms as the crew to beat for the championship. They have lost important manpower in Dewey McConnell, Doug Reeves, and Selmer Pederson, but Wyatt has yet to field a poor team since taking over at Laramie. The Pokes are the logical favorites.

UTAH — Last year's champions will find it tougher sledding in '52, but 22 lettermen will be back. Even so, much of the offensive punch is missing. Many of the veterans who were lost to the armed forces were in key spots. A tough schedule that includes Santa Clara, Colorado, and Oregon State may not help the Ute's standing, but could keep them well keyed for Skyline play.

UTAH STATE — The surprise team of '51, the Utah Aggies will have 27 lettermen returning for what will probably be the Farmers' best season of recent years. The single wing that Coach John Roning brought to Logan with him two years ago is now the terror of the conference. A lack of talented depth is Big John's chief worry, but there's enough (especially if Babe Dinan's knee mends in time) to put the Ags in first division running.

DENVER — While there are some proven combat veterans in the Pioneer camp, it is pretty hard to determine just where Denver will finish. The line will be tough on both offensive and defensive, as usual, and rushing will be at par with 1951. Just where Johnny Baker's boys finish will depend largely on progress made by passers, signal callers, and linebackers.

NEW MEXICO — The Skyline's southern-most team, the Lobos could well be the dark horse of the conference. Coach Dud DeGroot will have two lettermen for almost every position, losing only six through graduation. The line will be strong, and the backfield will probably be the determining factor. The Lobos expect a .500 season in conference play.

MONTANA — In so many words, the strength of the Grizzlies will be in the line; the weakness of the machine in the backfield. More depth is needed and it may come via the sophomore talent that Coach Eddie Chinske is bringing along. In spite of the "door mat" label given the Grizzlies by most critics, it seems sure that Chinske will stay out of the cellar this year.

COLORADO A & M — A veteran group, weak in the line, but strong in the backfield, the Rams should be stronger than last year. Having lettered more freshmen than any school in the conference, the Rams will definitely lack size and heft in the line. Twenty-two lettermen are returning. Bob Davis, Ram coach, believes speed and experience will be the factors favoring the Aggies this year.

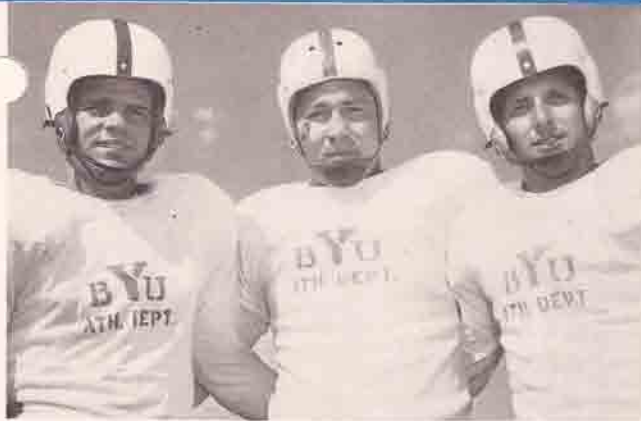

CENTERS

GEORGE BOWMAN — Junior, 205, 6-3, 20, McCammon, Idaho. A big, quiet lad who is coming along as Cougar ball-snapper. His height, 6-3, is used to advantage. Picked up plenty of experience last year and is showing good potential as offensive center. He is also a good line backer. As a junior he should see plenty of action this year.

DON MONCUR — Sophomore, 185, 6-1, 22, Lovell, Wyoming. An army veteran recently returned from Korea, Don is a native of Lovell, where he was an outstanding athlete. Don was called into the national guard in '50, saw some foreign action, and is now ready to continue his education. He is a sound line-backer and will have two years more with the Cougars.

GEORGE FRANKOVICH — Sophomore, 200, 5-11, 20, Provo, Utah. One of two sophomores needing some experience to fit into lineup. A solid 200 pounds, Frankovich will probably see plenty of action with defensive platoon where he can excel at line backing. George is a Provo product to watch in seasons to come.

PAUL KOCHEVAR — Sophomore, 180, 6-1, 19, Los Angeles, California. His brother, Lewis, is a two-year letterman for the Cats. Paul shows promise of becoming a good lineman. There's a good chance he will see some action on defense. Only a sophomore, the younger Kochevar boy needs seasoning and experience.

QUARTERBACKS

LAVON SATTERFIELD — Junior, 164, 5-9, 21, Sterling, Idaho. Satterfield saw plenty of action as safety man on defense. Played one year of varsity basketball and was power hitter for Cats in baseball as left fielder. He plays driving kind of ball and has good speed in open field situation.

DARRELL DONEY — Senior, 176, 6-1, 21, Preston, Idaho. Big for a T quarterback, Doney is a good signal caller who could use more speed. He does much for the Cougars' passing, especially the long, down field flips. His experience will be a big factor in team strength.

KEITH MATTHEWS — Senior, 150, 5-11, age 22, Midvale, Utah. Keith probably holds the honor as the smallest man on the team. A smooth little field general, Matthews is a good passer. He gives the squad plenty of experience and depth at quarter.

HENRY WEST — Sophomore, 145, 5-11, 18, Pocatello, Idaho. The newest addition to quarter. West has good potential for becoming top field general. Is still green, but passes well, and has the thinking abilities of a good quarterback.

HALFBACKS

GARY PAXMAN — Senior, 165, 5-9, 20, Pocatello, Idaho. Pax is a little Gem State speedster that has plenty of drive and fearlessness to go with his natural abilities on the gridiron. Gary loves the game and puts everything he has into the sport. He is a good student with likeable qualities off and on the field.

BOB HAMBLIN, Senior, 170, 5-10, 21, Seattle, Washington. A terrific line hitter, Hamblin can carry the ball — and occasionally a few opposing players — for extra yards. He can take all the punishment the other team can dish out and come back for more. He works hard and keeps team spirits high with natural humor.

BOB WHITAKER — Senior, 162, 6-0, 21, Long Beach, California. Always consistent with his play on the field, Bob has plenty of experience to draw from. With the passing of each year his game has improved. He'll see more action this year.

PLAYER BRIEFS...

HALFBACKS

RICHARD FELT — Sophomore, 172, 6-0, 18, Lehi, Utah. Dick was a sensational back at Lehi where he ran the pants off the opposition. With one season of frosh ball behind him, Felt will need more seasoning before he sees much action.

ROY JONES — Sophomore, 180, 5-9, 20, Murray, Utah. Up until Spring practice the name of Jones was unknown in Cougar football circles. But Roy, who's built close to the ground and runs hard, gave top ball packing performance during scrimmages to stamp himself as one of the backs to watch.

TERRY SMITH — Sophomore, 156, 5-11, 19, Payson, Utah. An all-around athlete of exceptional quality, Terry is small for football, but doesn't pay any attention to differences in size. With more improvement he might figure for regular berth.

BOB BILLS — Junior, 175, 5-10, Monrovia, California. A transfer from Pasadena Junior College, Bob formerly played offensive end, but Chick Atkinson moved him to halfback because of his speed. He's looking better all the time.

ELMO ROUNDY — Senior, 175, 5-10, 22, Palmyra, New York. Back at Cougarville after two years with the armed service, Roundy will be fighting for a try at left half. Speed and guts, plus good grid judgement, should bring Roundy into the picture.

DAVE CHADWICK — Senior, 180, 5-11, 23, Payette, Idaho. Chad is one of Chick Atkinson's main hopes for a successful season. He just returned from Korea and two years in the armed service. For a husky, Dave has plenty of speed and uses it well on the gridiron. He was capable of :9.8 in the 100-yard dash a few years back and has been showing some of his old form in practice.

FULLBACKS

JAE BALLIF — Senior, 179, 6-1, 21, Provo, Utah. One of the finest defensive players in the Skyline loop, Jae is the pride and joy of the BYU following. He can play rock-hard ball offensively or defensively. He does most of the punting, and will probably do the kicking for extra points. He blasts the line for good gains when called upon to carry the pigskin. Best at defense.

PLAYER BRIEFS...

FULLBACKS

UDELL WESTOVER — Senior, 180, 6-0, 21, Pleasant Grove, Utah. Here's the boy that will bear watching this season. Large, agile, and versatile, Westover runs nicely and can handle a number of positions. Last season he came through with some exceptional play as a junior. Great punter.

REED STOLWORTHY — Junior, 180, 5-10, 21, Orem, Utah. Just back from a mission for the LDS Church, Reed will don the white and blue again after a two-years absence. As a sophomore he was one of the most promising backs in the conference. He smacks the line with steamroller force and can play hard and long.

DON WOODS — Junior, 184, 6-0, 21, Pendleton, Oregon. Wanting a little for experience, Woods will undoubtedly see more action this season. He showed evidences of improvement last year. Good punter.

ENDS

OWEN SKOUSEN — Junior, 170, 6-0, 19, Mesa, Arizona. Better known as "Ole Glue Fingers", Skousen can play either defense or offense with equal ability. If you toss the ball in his general direction, he'll get it.

DEWEY BRUNDAGE — Junior, 185, 6-3, 20, Pacoima, California. Big Dew came to BYU from Pasadena Junior College. He shines offensively, but can double on defensive, if necessary. He's fast for a large flanker.

DERAY EYRE — Senior, 186, 6-0, 24, Las Vegas, Nevada. Spent two years in mission field for LDS church before returning to BYU. His best showings came toward the end of last season. Shines on defense.

MERLE ALLEN — Junior, 175, 6-0, 20, Prescott, Arizona. Showed improvement during sophomore year. Experience and know-how will put Merle in position for action as defensive flanker.

MARION PROBERT — Sophomore, 180, 6-1, 18, Hawthorne, California. Here's one of the most promising players in the intermountain area. One of the most sought-after preps in California, Probert made first string his initial year at the Y. Is a calculating thinker on gridiron and has all the desired qualities for great pigskinner. One year with varsity has given him seasoning.

WENDELL EGBERT — Junior, 171,, 6-1, 19, Preston, Idaho. Playing in the shadow of Brundage, Probert, and Skousen, Egbert is having to hustle to get into action. He will have to work hard during coming season.

ENDS

KAY STEPHENSON — Junior, 176, 5-11, 19, McCammon, Idaho. Kay has had his share of injuries in seasons past. Needs more seasoning, but may not get much with BYU's depth at end.

JERRY LUNDBERG — Sophomore, 193, 6-3, 18, Salt Lake City, Utah. A big flanker with weight to match his height, Jerry was all-state among Utah preps two years ago. He could be worked into good offensive or defensive end, depending upon the greater need.

NORM SLAYMAKER — Sophomore, 168, 6-0, 18, Salt Lake City, Utah. Another Salt Laker that was stand-out prep, Norm is one of the smallest flankers on the team. He plays a hard game, but will have to show more.

CHUCK BUSBY — Sophomore, 201, 6-3, 21, Pekin, Illinois. A player of great potential, Chuck returns to the Y. after a year's absence. He's got all of the physical requisits of top flanker. As a frosh he looked like a real comer. Determination and grit could put him in a regular berth.

GUARDS

DAVE LINDSTROM — Senior, 184, 6-2, 22, Price, Utah. Lindstrom returns to campus after two years with a national guard unit that was called to duty. Used previously as a center, Dave will move to guard. Seems ripe for his greatest year of football.

KAROL BILLS — Senior, 203, 6-1, 22, Provo, Utah. Another war veteran, Bills is back on the Cougar roster as guard. He lettered before being called to arms, and played ball in the service. Bills will give forward wall plenty of strength. Keep your eye on this boy.

JOE MARTINEZ — Junior, 178, 6-0, 19, Midway, Utah. Should be ready for more action this year. Has been improving with time, but inexperience has been big handicap. Came along nicely towards the end of the season. One of Chick's better hopes.

LEWIS KOICHEVAR — Senior, 188, 6-1, 21, Los Angeles, California. This should be Koichevar's greatest year. He's plenty wise to the sport and a veteran in every sense. Plays rugged defensive game and can handle his own on the offense, too. Could be all-conference.

ROBERT EARP — Senior, 191, 5-11, 20, El Monte, California. A transfer student, Earp has shown great possibilities in past seasons. He does a good job of plugging up the holes in the line. Should give the guard slot plenty of depth.

PLAYER BRIEFS...

GUARDS

JOHN ROBINSON — Sophomore, 195, 6-1, 19, Freedom, Wyoming. Large and formidable, Robinson will add plenty of good beef to the line. Needs more seasoning and grid know-how before he threatens any of the first stringers.

DREW SHUMWAY — Sophomore, 174, 5-10, 19, Taylor, Arizona. A little small for the line, but seems to have the fight and drive of good player. May not see too much action this season.

WALT SMIT — 185, 6-0, 21, Sr., Modera, Cal. The quiet type, Walt is one of the boys Atkinson and Nilsen count on in the line. Determined fighter, he has grid savvy and can play either platoon well.

TACKLES

MELVIN NIELSEN — Senior, 186, 6-1, 20, Vallejo, California. A two-year letterman, Nielsen has all the attributes of a fighting lineman. He's big and rough, but needs a bit more speed to be ideal offensive player. Good man to have back; experience is his biggest asset.

LARRY HANCOCK — Senior, 191, 6-1, 21, Pocatello, Idaho. One of five senior lettermen at tackle, Larry is going to be hard to beat for a tackle berth. The year 1952 will find Larry climaxing a colorful career with the Cougars. A valuable player.

HAROLD CUNNINGHAM — Senior, 186, 6-1, 21, Helper, Utah. A transfer from Carbon Junior College, Cunningham is capable of the best at tackle. Did a great job of defensive work and will probably start at left tackle.

LOWELL MADSEN — Senior, 205, 6-2, 20, Provo, Utah. A quiet, likeable guy, Madsen is a two-year letterman with plenty of pikskin savvy. Will start at defensive right tackle. Could be all-conference this year. One of school's top players.

HARRY BRAY — Senior, 230, 6-1, 26, Hilo, Hawaii. The big Hawaiian lad rounds out a quint of good tackles. He blocks with the power of a truck, and really loves the game. He will be used both offensively and defensively.

CALVIN MONSON — Sophomore, 190, 6-4, 18, American Fork, Utah. The tallest man on the squad, Cal will probably see little action this year. Even so, he has the kind of stuff that will pay off for the Cougars in seasons to come.

MORE ABOUT...

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY

Located at Provo, Utah

CAMPUS: Brigham Young University is located in Provo, Utah, a city of nearly 30,000 which increases considerably during the school year. Located in the northeast section of Provo, the campus is split into two campuses. The older buildings (the lower campus) are on University Avenue, and the newer buildings are on University Hill. Campus property covers nearly 200 acres. Provo is bordered by Utah Lake on the west, 12,000-ft. Mt. Timpanogos on the north, and the Wasatch mountains in the east.

FOUNDING: Established October 16, 1875, twenty-one years before Utah statehood, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon).

ADMINISTRATION: Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson, president; Dr. Antone K. Romney, acting dean of students. The university is governed by a church board of trustees.

ENROLLMENT: Over 6,500 total last year. Co-educational.

STADIUM: The Y. Stadium is located north of the campus proper. It is built on the side of University Hill, facing west. Seating capacity, including the temporary bleachers on the west side of the field, is around 10,000.

SCHOOL COLORS: Royal Blue and White.

TEAM NICKNAMES: Cougars, Cats, etc.

CONFERENCE: Mountain States Intercollegiate Athletic Association, better known as the "Skyline Conference." The conference includes Wyoming University, Colorado A & M, Denver University, University of Utah, Utah State Agricultural College, Montana State University, and New Mexico University. The latter two joined the conference in 1951. E. L. Romney, conference commissioner, has offices in Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah.

SCHOOLS and COLLEGES: Graduate School, College of Applied Science, College of Arts and Sciences, College of Commerce, College of Fine Arts, College of Education, Division of Religion, Extension Division, School of Nursing, School of Engineering. Credits from the university are nationally recognized.

SCHOOL SONG: "The Cougar Song" is the official fight song.
