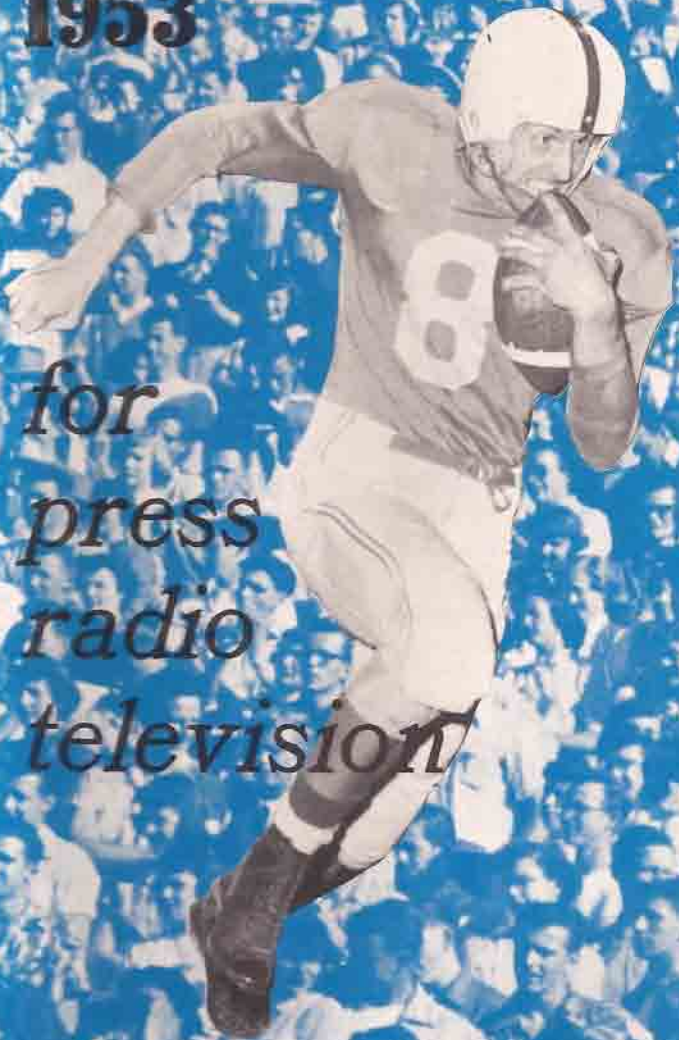

# MEET CHICK AND

## CHARLES "CHICK" ATKINSON

### Head Football Coach

Entering his fifth year at the Cougar helm, amiable Chick Atkinson has certainly faced better seasons as BYU's head football coach. Rather young—35—as fifth-year college mentors go, Chick has been plagued annually with a variety of troubles that proved discouraging. But the likeable mentor is making the most of it.



Chick came to BYU from Pocatello High School where his prep teams won 38 games and lost 11. A graduate of that high school, he was active in football, basketball and track, besides being student body president. He later attended Idaho State College and the University of Idaho at Moscow, graduating from the latter with B.S. and M.S. degrees.

While at Idaho University he was captain of both the baseball and basketball teams. He was selected on the Pacific Coast all-division baseball team and was also president of the Lettermen's club. He served tour of duty in Army during the war.

In the last four years Chick has turned out scores of able football players, including such standouts as Ray Oliverson, Rex Berry, and others. He came to the Y with the aim of building better men and athletes through sound football and is moving in the direction of putting BYU on the football map.

Chick is married and has three children, two boys and a girl.

# HIS HELPERS . . .

## REED NILSEN, Assistant Coach

Each season the task of building a strong BYU line falls on the capable shoulders of rotund Reed Nilsen, a former BYU grid great who has been an inseparable part of Y football for over a decade.

A three-year letterman at center, Reed was twice all-conference selection in his collegiate days. He was one of the few boys from the Mountain States to be awarded a berth on the East-West all-star game in San Francisco in 1947. The following season found Reed playing for the Detroit Lions, but he left the Lions in '49 to take a job on the Y coaching staff.

An outstanding wrestler in college, he also serves as wrestling coach in the winter.

## BOB BUNKER, Assistant Coach

Tabbed as one of the best coaching assistants in the Skyline Conference, Bob Bunker fits nicely into BYU coaching staff. Popular for his sly smile, dry wit and friendliness, Bob came to BYU with Atkinson five years ago.



A native of Preston, Idaho, where he was high school athletic coach from 1945 to 1949, he presented the Preston fans with three district championships in four years.

A graduate of USAC, he earned two letters in basketball and three in football. He was all-conference end and captain of Dick Romney's conference champions in 1936.

## DAVE CROWTON, Assistant Coach

Soft-spoken Dave Crowton works tirelessly with Atkinson in building BYU backfield. A former baseball, basketball, and football player himself, Dave also knows his athletic relations, having been active with frosh clubs and prep players.

In his prep days Dave played end for Granite High School for two years, and he captained Granite's championship football team in 1930, the year he graduated.

From 1938 to 1948 Dave took over the coaching duties at B. Y. High School. His efforts paid off in a regional championship in 1941 and the state crown in 1948. The following year he joined the BYU coaching staff.





## OWEN DIXON, Freshman Coach

The newest addition to the football staff is Owen Dixon, another former coach from B. Y. High School. Owen joined the staff last spring to augment the need for coaches.

A teammate of Reed Nilsen's, Dixon also won all-conference honors as a guard on BYU teams. Small in stature, but very rugged in play, Dixon has a balanced knowledge of the game. Last year Dixon's gridders won a regional title and entered the Class B finals, losing the title by one touchdown.

There's no doubt but what Dixon will play an important role in BYU football in seasons to come.



## RODNEY KIMBALL, Trainer

Rod works hardest during the football season trying to keep the Cougars in shape.



Elected outstanding scholar-athlete at Jordan High School in 1929, Rod was junior class president, student body president, and lettered three years in football, baseball, two years in basketball and one year in track. He attended Utah State and BYU, winning his football numeral. He has been trainer at Brigham Young University since 1937.

**FORWARD PASS DEFENSE** — Fourth in the nation, limiting the opposition to 60.5 yards per game through the air.

**INTERCEPTIONS** — Fifteenth in the nation, intercepting 13 passes or 12.4% of the opposition's attempts.

**KICKOFF RETURNS** — Twelfth in the nation, returning 45 kickoffs for a total of 967 for a 21.5 yard average.

**LEAST PENALIZED** — Eighth in the nation, averaging 39.6 yards for penalties for each of 10 games.

## NATIONAL - INDIVIDUAL

**PUNTING** — Udel Westover — Ranked tenth in the nation with a 40.5 average for 40 punts in 10 games.

**PASS RECEIVING** — Owen Skousen — Ranked 28th in the nation, catching 32 passes for a total of 439 yards.

## SKYLINE MARKS - TEAM

**NET GAIN PASSING** — Second, gaining 1131 yards through the air.

**TOTAL OFFENSIVE YARDAGE** — Third, netting 2677 yards through running, passing for 10 games.

**FEWEST PENALTIES** — First, the Cougars lost only 396 yards through penalties for 10 games during the season.

**PASS DEFENSE** — First, limited opponents to 605 yards for 10 games.

**PUNTING** — Udel Westover — Third, averaging 40.5 yards for 40 punts.

**BALL CARRYING** — Reed Stolworthy — Seventh, gaining 436 yards on 99 ground gaining attempts.

**LEADING PASSERS** — Lavon Satterfield, Henry West, Darrell Doney, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh — All three gained more than 320 yards a piece with passes.

**PASS RECEIVING** — Owen Skousen — First, snagging 32 passes for 439 yards, including three touchdown passes. Teammate Dewey Brundage was fifth, gaining 226 yards on 17 passes.

**LEADING SCORERS** — Dick Felt — Second, scoring 42 points with seven touchdowns his sophomore year.

### GAME BROADCASTS

Brigham Young University proudly announces Phillips Oil as sponsor of all Cougar football broadcasts for 1953.

The four games to be played in Provo, and the six games away from home, will be broadcast to intermountain listeners over Station KSL with sports announcer Dean Bennett reporting.

Phillips, KSL, and BYU will team together in a united effort to insure the best game coverage possible for those who wish to enjoy the Cougar grid season.

### A NATIONAL TELECAST

The BYU-Utah game scheduled for the Ute Bowl on Thanksgiving Day will be telecast from coast to coast by the National Broadcasting Company. Sponsored by General Motors, the telecast will be handled by Mel Allen, ace NBC sportscaster.

An estimated 60,000,000 fans are expected to witness the first national televising of a football game in the Intermountain area. The Cougar-Ute battle, which is traditional go in the Beehive State, is one of 12 games selected by the NCAA television committee for viewing this season.



**SYSTEM** — Coach Chick Atkinson will again use the man-in-motion T-formation with some modifications. May also use a few variations of wing formation.

**GROUND GAME** — Fullback Reed Stolworthy will handle most of the heavy duty ball carrying. Halfbacks Dick Felt, Alton Wade, Billy Meadows and Willard Stolworthy have best speed in backfield.

**AERIAL GAME** — Quarterbacks Henry West and Lavon Satterfield will do BYU passing, both long and short. Felt may be used on occasion for some aeriels.

**KICKING GAME** — The two most logical punters are Dick Felt and Don Woods. Kickoffs will be booted by Guard DeRay Eyre, who will also do converting.

## A LEAN YEAR

Any observer objectively viewing BYU's football prospects for 1953 realizes the Cougars are in for some slim pickings. The coming season, at best, is likely to be devoted to replenishing the Y's depleted grid stock.

From last year's club (4-6 record) Atkinson has only eleven lettermen returning, more than a third of the 29 who reported for preseason practice. In all, Atkinson lost 21 lettermen through graduation, and another half dozen are on missions and draft calls. Five of his returning 11 lettermen are ends. Consequently there has been some wholesale juggling in an effort to spread out the experience where it can do the most good. But no matter how thin you spread the talent, there isn't enough experience—even with the one platoon—to make a 60 minute club out of the Cougars.

To make things even worse, a normal amount of injuries during the season could cripple the Y unit almost beyond repair.

Atkinson's major concern is the BYU line, where the guard and tackle slots were completely wiped clean of experienced personnel. To fortify the forward wall, Atkinson moved center George Bowman, all-conference candidate, to tackle. He shifted ends Merrill Hardy and DeRay Eyre to guards. While the ends should hold with boys like Marion Probert and Dewey Brundage, the center of the line looks vulnerable.

The backfield lineup is more encouraging. Two boys who went both ways last year, fullback Reed Stolworthy and quarterback Lavon Satterfield, will be back this year. Another quarterback, letterman Henry West, gives the signal calling spot good depth and experience. Two lettermen will be filling the halfback slots, Don Wood at left and Dick Felt at right. But the talent thereafter is willing but inexperienced. Fullback Stolworthy will have Don James (another end letterman) and Johnny Velasco backing him up.

There is much to be desired in the team's overall size. Three or four linemen scale better than 200 pounds, and the backfield, for the most part, is small and slender.

With most of their experience concentrated at end and quarterback, fans may expect a formidable passing attack from the Cougars; at least, all factors point to such an offensive. Atkinson also plans to use the speed and driving power in his backfield.

Even with all these apparent handicaps, Atkinson is determined to extract something more from the '53 season than rebuilding experience. The fire of young players and new hope in the one platoon system may keep the Cougars in the running.



## SKYLINE PREVIEW . . .

**UTAH** — A unanimous choice to take the Skyline crown for the third straight year. Coach Jack Curtice has an exceptionally strong backfield and 21 lettermen returning with a string of top sophomore prospects up from frosh ranks. Utes may taste defeat outside conference, but appear unbeatable in Skyline circuit.

**COLORADO A&M** — Definitely a first division club, the Aggies also have strong backfield unit, speed. About 15 returning lettermen, but Rams need more power up front where team success could be determined by untested linemen. Should work into new substitution rule without too much trouble.

**WYOMING** — New coach, Phil Dickens, will have 20 returning lettermen, but only half saw any kind of action with 'Pokes last year. Three of these are capable of going both ways. Time is needed by coaching staff to get team to jell. Strength is untried, but Cowboys should have fine spirit and good conditioning to keep them in first division.

**NEW MEXICO** — Last year's runner-up team, the Lobos have new coach in Bob Titchenal, an advocate of hard, fast football. They will not be as big as last year's club, but have prospects of being able to go both ways. About 20 lettermen back in uniform including two all-conference linemen. Fair speed, should be good defensively.

**UTAH STATE** — Coach John Roning may have the surprise team of the league at Logan. Good freshman stock coming up, plenty of lettermen to give the Aggies needed strength. Roning will again emphasize speed for his single wing-T formation unit. Strongest spots will be at flanks and fullback.

**MONTANA** — Grizzlies are losing 21 lettermen, leaving Coach Eddie Chinske with a tough rebuilding job. Like most small school mentors, Chinske believes the new substitution rule will help his outfit. More offensive punch needed, more help from line-backers. Could finish high in second division with a few breaks.

**DENVER** — Coach Bob Blackman has been handed tough assignment of rebuilding Pioneer grid team around nucleus of dozen returning lettermen. Fair speed in backfield, but big problem is in the line. Pioneers have no intention of finishing in basement, but they seem definitely aimed for second division berth.

### CENTERS

**PAUL KOCHAYAR**—Junior, 187, 6-2, 20, Los Angeles, California. Although Kochevar failed to letter last year, he is one of Chick's better prospects. Last year he excelled on defense, which should make him the candidate most likely to be picked to go both ways this year. Pliable and willing, Paul is a bit short on experience.

**IVAN MUSE**—Junior, 181, 6-0, 19, Thatcher, Arizona. The only transfer student on the team, Muse came to BYU from Thatcher where he was standout player for the Arizona eleven. A good student and determined worker, Muse looms as one of the Cougars' most promising line prospects. He certainly will help Atkinson's forward wall, even though he is untested in Sky-line action.

**ROBERT FENESEY**—Sophomore, 6-0, 190, 23, Altadena, California. Another line prospect from California, Fenessey first turned out for ball last spring, playing guard. Atkinson moved Bob to center to give some kind of depth to ball-snapping spot.

**CLARK WHITEHEAD**—Sophomore, 165, 6-0, Twin Falls, Idaho. Clark reported late for pre-season practice, but should be ready for opener. Needs experience. An Idaho all-stater, Whitehead will give good depth to center post.

### ENDS

**MARION PROBERT**—Junior, 180, 6-1, 19, Hawthorne, California. One of the finest players to wear the blue and white, Probert won letter as freshman. A sound one platoon flanker, he is rugged for a player his size. Will undoubtedly be considered for Skyline honors this year. Probert is heady scholar too, netting straight A's in classes last spring.

**DEWEY BRUNDAGE**—Senior, 190, 6-3, 20, Pacoima, California. The other half of the Cougar's one-two punch at right and left ends. Big, rugged, a good pass catcher, rating among top five in the conference last year. Knows the game and plays it well. Another lad meriting Skyline honors. Dewey lettered for the Y in '51 and '52.

**TOMMY VERBANATZ**—Sophomore, 180, 5-11, 19, Or-em, Utah. Here's the type of boy coaches like to get. Only a sophomore, Tom shows great promise as a player, having good football sense and plenty of determination to go with it. A good scholar, Verbanatz only needs seasoning to give BYU another great end.

**PAUL MENDENHALL**—Junior, 175, 6-1, 22, Stockton, California. Paul just returned from three year mission to New Zealand for the LDS Church. Was coming along nicely before receiving his call, but is rapidly returning to form this fall. Is good defensive end, giving team depth behind Probert at left end.

**TED MILOVICH**—Senior, 185, 6-1, 25, Price, Utah. A veteran of action in Korea, Ted saw limited amount of play with BYU before going into service. Trim and well conditioned, Milovich will be at right end. His success will depend largely on how well he adjusts to new football situation.

### TACKLES

**GEORGE BOWMAN**—Senior, 205, 6-3, 21, McCammon, Idaho. Here's one bright spot in BYU line. Formerly a two-year letterman at center, Bowman moved over to tackle to try and give the team some sort of balance in the line. Big, rugged on both offense and defense, Bowman is a likely candidate for all-conference honors.

**CALVIN MONSON**—Junior, 190, 6-4, 20, American Fork, Utah. Takes his football seriously and is working hard for regular berth on Y eleven. Monson made great strides during his sophomore year, and is now nearing his goal. Tall and rangy for a lineman, Cal is responding to coaching. With more progress Monson should be ready to go this season.



## PLAYER BRIEFS . . .

**LONNIE BADGER**—Sophomore, 190, 6-3, 18, Holden, Utah. One of three sophomore tackles graduated up from last year's freshman ranks. Badger is big and willing. Like most of the new boys, however, limited experience will be working against him. Seasoning could find him one of the conference prospects.

**ROYCE ELKINS**—Sophomore, 205, 6-0, 18, Farmington, New Mexico. Tasting his first year of varsity ball, consequently he is yet untried. Lots of promise, however, in a boy Elkins size. This season should pretty well determine the potential of this tackle. Coaching staff looking to him for help.

**RALPH POWERS**—Sophomore, 185, 6-0, Lehi, Utah. Like the three other sophomores at tackle, Powers is yet untested. This may not be his year, depending on how well he responds to mentoring. Another boy to watch.

**JOHN ROBINSON**—Senior, 198, 6-1, 20, Freedom, Wyoming. A veteran heavyweight on BYU wrestling team, Robinson is hard playing tackle who will undoubtedly see action this year, although he didn't letter last year. Appears to be improving in his line play in practice sessions.

**DERAY EYRE**—Senior, 6-1, 190, 25, Las Vegas, Nevada. A two-year letterman at end, Eyre was moved to guard at the start of preseason practice. Rough, heady, and standout on defense, Eyre might click at the new position. However, he is faced with difficulty of learning new position during his senior year.

**MERRILL HARDY**—Senior, 190, 6-0, 23, Chicago, Illinois. Here's another end switched to guard where his experience can be used to good advantage. A returned missionary, Hardy lettered as flanker before receiving his call. Good all-around athlete, he is, like Eyre, having difficulty learning new position.

**CLINTON TAYLOR**—Junior, 5-11, 180, 20, Oakley, Idaho. Although there hasn't been too much said about this non-letterman, Clint figures as promising prospect at guard. Taylor wasn't used much last year because of more experienced players on roster, but what action he did see was helpful.

**LYLE HEINZ**—Sophomore, 168, 5-11, 18, Rexburg, Idaho. Here's one of Atkinson's most promising line prospects. A hard working Idaho boy, Heinz did exceptionally well in last spring practice. Young, inexperienced, Lyle needs more seasoning in varsity ranks before he lands a spot as regular. A boy to watch in future seasons.

## PLAYER BRIEFS . . .

**CLAIR McKEE**—Sophomore, 174, 6-0, 18, Holden, Utah. One of Utah's good line prospects as prep, Clair, like other guards on this year's team, is rather slight for a lineman. He has, however, lots of fight and natural ability as a football player. Another major plank in Chick's rebuilding program.

**DREW SHUMWAY**—Junior, 175, 5-9, 20, Taylor, Arizona. Consistently battles, despite small size as lineman. Shumway's performance during the season may depend largely on how well he responds to coaching before season gets underway. Is coming along.

**NED PORTER**—Junior, 187, 5-10, 22, Susanville, California. A returned Korean veteran. Porter saw some action a few years ago with the Cougars. Coaches consider him a likely prospect in line, but it may take time for the Californian to work into a regular berth.

### QUARTERBACKS

**HENRY WEST**—Junior, 150, 5-11, 19, Pocatello, Idaho. As a sophomore last year Hank came through nicely. A clever ball handler and signal caller, West is a creditable passer. He may have trouble, this year, however, as defensive player. Slight in build, West lettered last year, loves the game.

**LAVON SATTERFIELD**—Senior, 170, 5-9, 23, Sterling, Idaho. Another letter winner at quarterback, Satterfield is one of the finest all-around players on the team. Consequently he should click in one-platoon system. Good signal caller, sound ball handler, hard runner, fine passer, Satterfield should be one of better players in Skyline this year.

**RON BEAN**—Sophomore, 165, 5-11, 17, Seattle, Washington. An excellent prospect for future seasons. Bean apparently has good knowledge of the game and handles himself well as T-quarterback. Bean will add good balance to this vital position, not to mention good potential for future seasons.

### HALFBACKS

**DON WOOD**—Senior, 184, 6-0, 22, Pendleton, Oregon. Wood lettered as fullback last year, but has been moved to halfback where the Cats can utilize his speed. As linebacker last year, he saw both offense and defense play. He may be doing a good deal of the Brigham's punting this year. Is two-year letterman.

**DICK FELT**—Junior, 165, 6-0, 19, Lehi, Utah. Felt came to the foreground late last year as promising halfback. He scored four touchdowns against San Jose State, and ended the season as the Skyline's second highest scorer. He is slender in build, but handles himself nicely. Dick will do most of BYU's punting.



## PLAYER BRIEFS . . .

**ALTON WADE**—Sophomore, 171, 5-11, 18, Fillmore, Utah. If Wade can just get over the injuries hump, he should be one of the finest backs the school has had in recent years. A fast, hard runner, Wade was all-state two seasons ago. A leg operation sidelined him during spring practice.

**WILLARD STOLWORTHY**—Sophomore, 168, 5-11, 18, Orem, Utah. Another frosh prospect with plenty of promise. Here again the main handicap is lack of experience. A good runner with both-way abilities, Willy is brother to Fullback Reed. With seasoning could be a regular.

**BILLY MEADOWS**—Junior, 170, 5-10, 19, Columbus, Georgia. Is shaping up nicely as a halfback, has good speed and fine bally-carrying abilities. He will work behind Felt at right halfback. There is a good chance Meadows will see good share of action.

**PHIL OYLER**—Sophomore, 170, 5-10, 19, Brigham City, Utah. Phil has had to undergo several adjustments in football during the last two seasons. He was twice all-stater as tailback at Box Elder. As freshman at Y he took over the T quarterback slot, and then this fall was moved to halfback. Determined and willing.

**JERRY COWLEY**—Sophomore, 155, 5-10, 20, Davis, Utah. Jerry didn't letter last year, but is showing improvement in practice sessions. Is rather light for halfback, but can move with the ball. Will see some action.

### FULLBACKS

**REED STOLWORTHY**—Senior, 180, 5-10, 22, Orem, Utah. Another bright spot in the Cougar picture. Reed, who plays both offense and defense, is two-year letterman. Last year he returned to the lineup after an LDS mission. Is as hard hitting a fullback as there is in the conference. Should shine this year.

**JOHNNY VELASCO**—Sophomore, 185, 5-8, 18, Honolulu, Hawaii. A lightning-like halfback during spring practice, John put on too much weight during the summer, had to be shifted to fullback. Is rounding into shape now, and should see action regularly throughout the season. Good all-around player.

**DON JAMES**—Senior, 185, 6-1, 21, Las Vegas, Nevada. A returning letterman at end, Don was moved to the fullback spot to give the team more depth. Is big and rugged, but may have some difficulty moving into a backfield spot. Will come in handy as lineback on defense, too.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY

Located at Provo, Utah

**CAMPUS:** Brigham Young University is located in Provo, Utah, a city of nearly 30,000 which increases considerably during the school year. Located in the northeast section of Provo, the campus is split into two campuses. Campus property covers nearly 200 acres. Provo is bordered by Utah Lake on the west, 12,000-ft. Mt. Timpanogos on the north, and the Wasatch mountains in the east.

**FOUNDING:** Established October 16, 1875, twenty-one years before Utah statehood, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon).

**ADMINISTRATION:** Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson president; Dr. Wesley P. Lloyd, dean of students. The university is governed by a Church Board of Trustees.

**ENROLLMENT:** Over 6,500 total last year. Co-educational.

**STADIUM:** The Y Stadium is located north of the campus proper. It is built on the side of University Hill, facing west. Seating capacity, including the temporary bleachers on the west side of the field, is around 10,000.

**CONFERENCE:** Mountain States Intercollegiate Athletic Association, better known as the "Skyline Conference." The conference includes Wyoming University, Colorado A&M, Denver University, University of Utah, Utah State Agricultural College, Montana State University, and New Mexico University. The latter two joined the conference in 1951. E. L. Romney, conference commissioner, has offices in Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah.

**SCHOOLS and COLLEGES:** Graduate School, College of Applied Science, College of Arts and Sciences, College of Commerce, College of Fine Arts, College of Education, Division of Religion, Extension Division, School of Nursing, School of Engineering. Credits from the university are recognized nationally.

**SCHOOL SONG:** "The Cougar Song" is the official fight song.
