# MEET CHICK AND

# HIS HELPERS . . .

Charles "Chick" Atkinson, the Cougars' head football coach, and his aides will be entering their sixth year together at Brigham Young University as a mentoring unit. It's one of the oldest staffs in length of service in the Skyline conference, and yet one of the youngest in number of years.

The 1954 season will be Coach Atkinson's sixth year at the BYU gridiron helm, and he is still rather young—36—

as college coaches go.

Chick came to BYU from Pocatello High School where his prep teams won 38 games and lost 11. A graduate of that high school, Coach Atkinson was one of the finest all-around athletes to come out of Southern Idaho. With a string of atheletic letters—football, baseball, basketball and track—behind him, Chick attended Idaho State

College and the University of Idaho, graduating from the latter with B.S. and M.S. degrees.

While at Idaho University he captained the baseball and basketball teams, was selected on the Pacific Coast all-division baseball team and was president of the

After a tour of duty with the Army during World War II, Chick returned to Pocatello, where he took over as high school football coach. He came to BYU in 1949 when football coach Eddie Kimball was made BYU athletic director.

Chick and his wife, Ann, have three children, two boys

and a girl.

When Coach Atkinson came to BYU he brought with him two assistant coaches, both of whom have remained with him ever since. Reed Nilsen was playing with the Detroit Lions in 1949 when Chick asked him to join his coaching staff. And Bob Bunker, who was coaching at Preston, Idaho, was Atkinson's choice as assistant.

Reed Nilsen is the amiable "pusher" who concentrates on the Y's forward wall. A BYU grid great himself, rotund Reed was a three-year letterman for the Cougars at center while a college player. Twice he was named all-conference, and in his senior year was picked to play on the West squad in the annual East-West all-star game in San Francisco in 1947. He joined the Lions soon after.

Bunker is tabbed as one of the best coaching assistants in the Skyline Conference, and he concentrates on flankers. Bob, who is known for his dry wit and easy humor, came to BYU after four seasons as head coach at Preston High School, where he presented fans with three district championships. He is a USAC graduate, earning two letters in basketball and three in football. He was all-conference end and captain of Dick Romney's conference champions in 1936.

# COACH, TRAINER . . .

Dave Crowton, assistant football coach, working with the Cougar baseball team. Dave works with the BYU backfield each fall, laboring tirelessly with Coach Atkinson in that capacity. Dave also knows his athletic relations, having been active with frosh clubs and prep players for a number of years.

In his prep days Dave played for Granite High School, where he captained the squad in 1930. From 1938 to 1948 Dave took over the coaching duties at B.Y. High School, winning the state basketball title in 1948. The following year he joined the BYU coaching staff.

Last year another coach joined the BYU football staff. Owen Dixon, who guided the BY High School football team into the state finals two years ago, has taken over the duties as freshman coach at BYU.

An ardent follower and student of the game, Dixon played with Reed Nilsen in the line at BYU, winning all-conference honors as a guard. He joined the staff at B.Y. High School, and two years ago won a regional title. In the Class B finals, his club missed the title by one touchdown. Last year he turned out one of the finest freshman teams BYU has ever produced.

The man whose job it is to keep the football team in sound physical condition is trainer Rod Kimball. Fall is Rod's most difficult season, especially with scores of varsity and freshman footballers to tape and doctor.

Rod started his athletic career at Jordan High School in 1929, where he was president of his junior and senior class, and also student body president. He lettered three years in football, baseball, and two years in basketball and track. He lettered at Utah State and BYU, and was made BYU trainer in 1937. Rod takes a lot of kidding from the athletes and coaches about his balding head and large family, but he is one of the most liked men on the BYU campus.

### YOUNGER BUT DEEPER

The team picked by many Skyline observers to finish in the conference cellar in 1954 just isn't ready to concede a poor season, much less a defeat. Admittedly too young and green as a team to be a threat to the front runners, the Cougars could very well finish high among the also-rans by the end of the season.

Although seven regulars will be missing from last year's club, the Cougars are operating in an atmosphere of optimism. This fall Coach Chick Atkinson had 50 conditioned athletes reporting for practice, as compared with the 29 he had on hand last year at the start of the season. Then, too, each of these players is aware of the fact that he will have to battle for a starting berth.

The 1954 unit is younger in years and experience than last year's team, but Atkinson feels the squad is better balanced and has greater depth than any team he's had in the last three years.

The air of optimism that prevails in the Cougar grid camp may seem incongruous to those who note nearly half the squad is composed of sophomores, practically all of whom have yet to play in a regular college game. But Atkinson and his staff believe these sophomores could be the key to a relatively successful season. "If nine or ten of our sophomores meet expectations, we're going to be tough for a lot of our opponents," Atkinson predicted.

Three of last year's regulars are returning—halfback Dick Felt, end Marion Probert, and center Paul Kochevar. Added to this group will be semi-regulars fullback Don James, ends Paul Mendedhall and Tom Verbanatz, and backs Henry West, Ron Bean, Phil Oyler, Billy Meadows, and Willard Stolworthy.

In Marion Probert the Y coaching staff feels it has the best flanker in the Skyline conference, and one certainly worthy of the title All-American. Probert and allconference candidate Dick Felt will be this year's cocaptains.

The Brighams' backfield is light, but sports plenty of speed. Dick Felt and Phil Oyler loom as the two strongest prospects for the halfback positions, and both Don James and Johnny Velasco look stong at fullback. Atkinson has five or six candidates for the T-quarterback slot, any of whom could get the team rolling.

One factor—the schedule—definitely favors the Cougars in Skyline play. Besides New Mexico and Montana, the BYU eleven wil lcarry the home advantage against Utah and Wyoming.

### DOES BYU HAVE AN ALL-AMERICAN?

Each season the football experts, whose charge it is to select all-Americans, mail out questionnaires asking college publicists and coaches the question: "Which players in your area do you consider outstanding?" And each season we try to answer the question as accurately and candidly as possible.

Not until Marion Probert, Cougar end and co-captain, came to BYU did we ever feel we had a player worthy of the title All-American. But in 1954 Coach Chick Atkinson (who calls Probert the finest boy he has ever coached), along with the other Skyline mentors, sports writers, and fans unequivocally endorsed Marion Probert

as a player of All-American caliber.

"Only once in a life-time does a coach have the opportunity of coaching a footballer like Probert," confesses Atkinson. Even as a freshman he displayed unusual capacities as a player, winning a first string berth over veteran flankers. Last year as a junior he led the Skyline pass receivers by a good margin, and was named on several all-conference selections.

Academically, too, Probert shines. He has twice been named on the Academic All-American team by virtue of high scholastic average as a pre-med student. During the past three years, straight-A quarters have been common

He was an all-Southern California player his senior year as a prep in Hawthorne, California, where he grad-

uated with honors.

In 1954 we place his name in nomination as an All-American candidate at end, and we ask the experts only to see him in action and then judge for themselves.
