



MEMO TO PRESS

PRESS PASSES—Requests for working passes should be made directly to Sports Publicity Office a week prior to the game. Women are not allowed in the press box, and the area is reserved for those actually covering the game. Drivers, and others who may accompany those covering the game will be asked to sit elsewhere. Comp seats will be made available, if the requests are made in advance.

PRESS BOX—The new BYU press box, which is located at the top of the east stands, is just inside the main entrance to the stadium. A parking area just north of the main gates is reserved for working press, and passes will be supplied by request.

BROADCASTING BOOTHS—Four radio booths are available, including one reserved for the visiting station which is designated the official station by the visiting team.

SERVICES—Complete game statistics—lineups, playby-play, scoring and yardage reports—will be supplied at the end of the game.

UNIFORMS—The Cougars will wear royal blue uniforms at home and white uniforms on the road.

HAROLD W. KOPP

STEVENS-DIXON

Less than three years ago a tall, determined-looking New Englander left the head coaching post at Rhode Island and came to the Rockies to take over the slumping football fortunes at BYU. Harold W. Kopp's announced goal was to produce football teams

that were competitive and a recognized force on the gridiron. This year should find Hal and his crew moving a step closer to the big objective.

To a great extent BYU's football teams, reflect the head mentor; they are unrelenting, uncompromising and play the game at full throttle. This is just the way Big Hal coaches football.

If Kopp hates to lose, it's probably because he knows the

fruits of victory. While at Rhode Island his teams won or shared the Yankee Conference crown in 1952, 1953 and 1955. As we near the 1958 Skyline campaign Kopp and his boys find themselves among the contenders. In seven years of head coaching Hal Kopp has been named "coach of the year" four separate times.

Kopp's career began at Western Maryland where he played ball and later graduated in 1933. He started coaching at Northeastern University in 1937 as linecoach. Latter he coached at Brown, then served four years in the Army infantry in England, Scotland and Africa during World War II.

Returning to New England football after the war, he coached the varsity line at Harvard from 1946 to 1948, and then moved to Yale under the late Herman Hickman. Two years later (1950) he accepted the Rhode Island job, and his coaching was interrupted the same year when he was recalled to duty during the Korean conflict.

When he became head man at Rhode Island the Ram football program was in feeble shape. Under his command they bounced back to life, defeating their state rival, Brown, three out of four times in his about these. The Rams were undefeated his last year

stay there. The Rams were undefeated his last year at RI, and his record for his last four seasons was 25-5-2.

He has coached the single wing, T-formation, and split-T.



TALLY STEVENS, SENIOR ASSISTANT

Fans as well as players take pride in members of the coaching staff such as Tally Stevens, senior assist-

ant who was the first coach Hal Kopp added to the new staff in 1956.

Perhaps the most successful high school coach in Utah history, Tally enjoyed phenomenal success as coach at East High School (Salt Lake City). In his last four seasons as head man at East, Tally racked up a 33-3-1 record and three state Class "A" titles. His overall re-



cord with prep teams was glossy 49-11-3.

A native of Evanston, Wyo., he played one year of ball at University of Utah before going into service. He played some ball with the Fourth Air Force, then returned to Utah where he won conference honors as one of the finest ends ever developed at Utah. He graduated from Utah in 1949, is great recruiter and public relations man.

OWEN DIXON, LINE COACH

BYU's line play, which is as rugged as any in the conference, is due in good measure to Owen Dixon,



line coach for the Cougars.
Owen, a former all-conference guard at BYU during post-war years, entered the coaching ranks first at B. Y.
High School and later joined the football staff in 1954.

A native of Provo Coon is regarded as one of the finest guards the school has produced. He won honors before and after a stint in the service, and he was re-

spected throughout the conference for his play.

Owen graduated from BYU in 1946 and the same year joined the coaching staff at B. Y. High. His teams were always in the running, and they won the regional title in 1952. They advanced to the state playoffs, losing the title by one point. He was named freshman coach at BYU in 1954, joined the varsity staff in 1955.

DAVIS-TOLBERT

VANNOY-KIMBALL

ALLAN DAVIS, BACKFIELD COACH

In his third year as backfield coach for the Cougars is Allan Davis, very capable young coach who



masterminds much of the BYU attack. A former quarterback under Ike Armstrong at University of Utah, Allan was building prep football champions at Murray High (Utah) when he joined the staff at Catville in 1956.

Davie coached at Murray for seven seasons, and he always had the Spartans ranked among the state's best. In his last three years

at Murray his teams compiled a 27-4 record, and they snared the state crown in 1954. The following year the Spartans were reclassified an "A" school, and they reached the state finals where they were beaten by East High ,a team coached by Tally Stevens.

A native of Salem, Allan played ball for Payson High and was studentbody president there. He capped three years of quarterbacking for the Redskins with all-conference mention, graduated in 1948.

MAX TOLBERT, ASSISTANT COACH

For the past two years the job of coaching BYU's freshman teams has fallen to Max Tolbert, who this

year joins the varsity staff. Max will leave the Gatos with an impressive record of seven victories in eight games in two seasons.

Flamboyant and talkative, Max is a native of Fayette-ville, Pa., where he was letter winner in four sports. He came to BYU in 1948, won three football letters, and in his junior year saw 456 minutes of play with Cougars.

Max was offensive All-Conference end as senior.
Following graduation, Tolbert coached baseball and assisted with football at Murray high for three years. He joined BYU fotball family in 1955, and took over freshman chores in 1956 when Kopp arrived, has done considerable scouting and recruiting since then.

JAY VANNOY, FROSH COACH

Latest addition to the staff is Jay VanNoy, one of the finest athletes Utah has ever produced. Although



Jay's main job is that of baseball coach, he will also assist with the frosh gridders.

A native of Garland, Utah, he was all-conference halfback for the Aggies for four consecutive seasons, and he was Little All-American (1st string) and All-American (2nd and 3rd strings) selection his senior year. He also played varsity basketball for the Aggies.

His baseball team won division, Skyline, and district NCAA crowns last spring.

ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

Veteran member of the staff is Trainer Rod Kimball, who has served all but one of the last 21 years in this

position. Long in experience and know-how. Rod is among the most popular men on campus.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader at Jordan High. He won letters in two sports at Utah State and BYU in his college days, and in 1937 he was chosen as trainer for Cougar teams. Since them he has traveled



countless miles with BYU teams, conditioning athletes and attending their ills.

In the Spring of 1956 when Hal Kopp first set foot on campus as head coach, he had BYU's football program pretty well outlined. The staff, he said, would have to recruit two good freshman teams back to back before the Cougars could be expected to join the Skyline contenders.

This fall the players recruited in '56 will be suiting up as juniors, and the second crop, last year's freshmen, will be joining the varsity as sophomores. And now, to nobody's surprise, the Cougars are ready to at least make a bid for the championship.

Since Brigham Young University has never won a football title in the Skyline, or any other conference for that matter, this must be regarded as a most ambitious undertaking, especially with a team of juniors. Reference to a "team of juniors" stems from the fact that there are only ten seniors on the team, and the sophomores, good as they are, have yet to play in a varsity game.

On paper the squad looks promising, for these

reasons:

Only three regulars from last year's second place team will not be returning for 1958. In all the Cougars lose II lettermen.

A total of 28 lettermen of varying shades of experience and talent are returning, which means that every position will have at least one, perhaps two, lettermen.

There is a large, impressive group of sophomores reporting, plus three or four mission returnees and one transfer.

All this would add up to a real rosy picture for the Cougars, if it were not for the unknown elements that often alter the best laid plans. The fact that there may not be enough experience on the 1958 squad to go the distance is another distinct possibility.

In the key quarterback spot BYU will have the services of Wayne Startin, senior co-captain, who looked very good in the spring game. Gary Dunn, a fine triple-threat, will also fit into the signal-calling with Ron Startin and Bud Belnap, although the three are shy experience.

There are one or two soft spots in the line and backfield, but some shifts in personnel and additional grooming could fortify these positions by the time

the season is underway.

The 1958 schedule, too, should break a little better for the Cougars this year. Where last year's team had to meet Arizona, Kansas State, Utah and Wyoming on the road in the first half of play, the Cats have only to face, Utah, College of Pacific and CSU away from home over the same period.
