

STADIUM INAUGURAL



Brigham Young University will enter a new football era this year when the Cougars move into a new stadium. Located on the northwest end of the campus, the stadium is on a site just east of Canyon Road, roughly half a mile north of the old stadium site.

One of the finest structures of its kind ever built in the Intermountain West, the all-steel stadium is being built at a cost of \$1,500,000. Initial seating capacity will be 26,812, although ultimately it can be expanded to 45,000 seats as the need arises.

Inaugural game in the new stadium is scheduled for the night of Oct. 2, when the Cougars host New

Mexico, the WAC's defending champions.

The top surface of the giant, steel stadium will be finished like the deck of a battleship. The main stands on the west side of the field will extend 69 rows between the goal posts and seat approximately 16,800 fans. The stands on the west side will extend 51 rows and hold approximately 10,000.

Towering above the west stands will be a 100-seat press box. The enclosed press section will contain two main decks which overhang a special visitors' box. An elevator, which will not be in operation until the 1965 season, will serve the pressbox for the movement of heavy equipment (television cameras, typewriters radio gear, etc.)

A more detailed report on the stadium will be

published prior to the first game, Oct. 2.

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to the sports information director a week prior to the game. Comp seats will be made available, if the requests are made well in advance of the game.

SERVICES — Complete game statistics—lineups, playby-play, scoring and yardage reports—will be supplied at the half and at the end of the game.

UNIFORMS — The Cougars will wear royal blue uniforms at home and white uniforms on the road.



TOM HUDSPETH

One visit with 33-year old Tommy Hudspeth is enough to convince a person BYU's new head coach is one of the fraternity's new breed; young, aggres-

sive, the executive-type dedicated to success. knows what he wants to accomplish and how he wants to accomplish it. Time, he feels, is the one thing needed most to bring all the vital inaredients together.

While he has assumed an enormous task—one that has no end of challenge-Tom has known his share of success in the field of football.



Born Tommy J. Hudspeth in Cherryvale, Kans., on Sept. 14, 1931, he attended high school in Afton, Okla., where he was a member of Oklahoma's all-state team. Enrolling at University of Tulsa, where he was to captain the freshman and varsity teams, Tom emerged as a standout performer in the school's golden era of football. He played quarterback and defensive halfback. Tulsa was the number one team in total offense in 1951, and in 1950 and again in '51 they were conference cham-

A regular during all three years at Tulsa, Tom capped his playing career by captaining the Hurricanes in the 1953 Gator Bowl. It was while he was playing ball at Tulsa that he was coached by Darrell Royal and Jack Mitchell, then coaches at the Okla-

homa school.

Besides his football accomplishments, Hudspeth served as president of his senior class. He graduated from Tulsa in 1953 with a B.A. degree in physical education. He has 36 hours toward his master's

degree in counseling.

The same year he graduated. Tom coached at Norman High School, and was then commissioned in the U.S. Air Force where he was to spend the next two years. Discharged as a first lieutenant in 1955, he coached Tulsa Central to a 6-2-1 record, and the following year was appointed freshman coach at Tulsa under Bobby Dobbs. He was to continue as an assistant to Dobbs until he joined the staff at BYU.

In 1961 Dobbs was named head coach of the Calgary Stampeders, and Tom went with him as a 28year old assistant. The Stampeders were contenders

for the three years Tom was with them.

On Sept. 20, 1953, Tommy married the former Ruth Ann Sandmire. They have two sons; Max (9) and Phil (6).

COACHING STAFF

CHRIS APOSTOL (UTAH STATE '50)

A member of the Cougar staff since 1959, Chris Apostol is in charge of the defensive backs. He started his career at Bingham High (Utah) where he was an all-state tackle and student body president.

A guard in his college days at Utah State, Chris joined the staff at Ogden High, where he was to coach from 1950 to 1959. His coaching record as head coach at Ogden was 44-13-2, and his last team at Ogden won the state championship (11-0 record and seven shutouts).

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children; Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt, and

Kami.

LAVELL EDWARDS (UTAH STATE '52)

An all-conference lineman and team captain at USU for two years, Edwards was born in Provo. He attended Lincoln High (Orem), then became one of Utah State's outstanding ball players (center and line-backer).

Called into the Army following graduation in 1952, he coached at Fort Mead (Maryland), then came back to Utah in 1954 to coach at Granite High (Salt Lake City). He joined the staff at BYU in 1961, where

he is now defensive line coach.

LaVell is married to the former Patti Covey, and they have three children; Ann (8), John (6), and James (2).

FRANK FABRIS (TULSA '53)

The newest member of the varsity staff, Frank came to BYU this spring as one of Hudspeth's assistant coaches. A teammate of Tom's at Tulsa, Frank was born in Macon, Ga., April 6, 1931.

At Tulsa he was a defensive end, winning all-conference mention. Since joining the coaching ranks he has enjoyed phenominal success; 19-1 record at Vidalia, 8-2 record at Cartersville; and 55-12-3 record at Rossville (all Georgia schools). In 1962 his Rossville team had a 10-0 record and captured the state AA title. Frank was named coach of the year in Georgia.

Frank is married to the former Bettye Jane Hendrix, and they have two sons; Robert (10) and Jon (7).

COACHING STAFF

EARL LINDLEY (UTAH STATE '54)

Offensive backfield coach for the Cougars is Earl Lindley, another Utah State football great, who came to BYU from Idaho Falls High School in 1961.

Born in Wellsville, Utah, Earl was an all-stater at South Cache, before enrolling at USU. Besides winning all-conference honors as a halfback in 1953, Earl was the nation's leading scorer. Following graduation in 1954, Lindley played four years of pro ball with the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian loop. An injury shortened his pro career and in 1958 he was named head coach at Idaho Falls.

Earl is married to the former Marilyn Jensen, and they have four children; Gregory (10), Teresa (8),

Lance (3), and Corey (2 months).

GLEN TUCKETT (UTAH '53)

Resuming duties as freshman coach this fall, Glen Tuckett joined the BYU staff in 1959 as baseball coach, a post he still commands. Glen came to BYU from West High (Salt Lake City) where his teams had an 18-12 record.

A native of Murray, Utah, Glen was an all-state fullback at Murray. He signed a pro baseball contract after graduation, but continued his schooling at Utah, and graduated in 1953.

Glen's baseball teams have been the most successful in BYU history, and his freshman football teams

won titles in '59, '60, and '61.

He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker, and they have two daughters; Alison (4) and Shannon (2).

WAYNE STARTIN (BYU '59)

Joining the staff this year as assistant freshman coach, Wayne Startin was quarterback for the Cougars in 1956-57-58. He quarterbacked the team that defeated Utah in 1958.

Another native of Murray, Utah, Wayne was an all-state quarterback as a junior and senior. He called signals for the Cougars for three years and captained the team his senior year.

Wayne launched his coaching career at Olympus High (1959-1962), then took the reins at the new Skyline High School which opened its doors in 1962.

Startin is married to the former Janice Nelson, and they have three children; Bryant (8), Judith (7), and Nancy (5).

ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

Practically an institution at BYU, Rod Kimball is one of the most popular persons on campus. Rod has spent more than 25 years as the athletic trainer for



the Cougars. You can tape a lot of ankles, patch up a lot of players, and heal countless wounds in a quarter of a century, and that is just what Rod has done.

Besides overseeing the training needs of the teams, Rod dispenses humor, wisdom and other morale-sustaining qualities along with the usual physical therapy.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader. He won letters at Utah State and BYU before joining the Cougars as athletic trainer.

GAME BROADCASTS

Again this year radio station KSL of Salt Lake City will carry live, play-by-play accounts of all Brigham Young University ball games. Linn Rockwood will serve as anchor man with Tom Bradshaw as color man, KSL is located at 1160 on the dial, and is a 50,000-watt clear channel station.

THE OUTLOOK

This year's football team is without doubt one of the thinnest units the Cougars have had in recent years. There are only a dozen or so lettermen returning from last year's club which slumped to a disappointing 2-8 season record in 1963. Indeed, Coach Tom Hudspeth may find himself scrounging for material with which to get his rebuilding program in its initial phase.

Over and above the obvious deficits the Cougars face, the team will be learning its third offensive formation in a period of less than a year. BYU started the '63 campaign with the single-wing, then mid-way through the season changed to a Y-formation. Hudspeth, who took over in January of this year, will fit the squad to a regular T-formation with variations.

Despite the rather sparse pickings, the outlook isn't hopeless. There are a few bright spots that offer encouragement, if not for this season, for the future.

In scanning the roster and depth chart, it is evident the Cougars will be shifting a little of the weight to the sophomores. There's a good chance three or four of the starting positions will be manned by sophomores, all of whom are good prospects.

Another factor that lends a little color to the picture is the team's morale. Spring practice found the club teachable and in high spirits, anxious to get the football machine in motion. Though starting from scratch, they measured up to Hudspeth's expectations.

If any one player can be labeled as the key to this year's club, it has to be sophomore quarterback Virgil Carter. Carter has yet to taste the full force of varsity action, but he is even now shouldering much of the responsibility at this key position. He is a fine all-around signal caller, has a better than average passing arm, and can run with the ball. He set yardage and scoring records as freshman quarterback last fall. Coaches would sooner not start sophomores, but in Carter's case there may not be much choice. Backing Carter is Bob Marshall, a junior who displayed real poise in the spring game.

Even though the talent is spread rather thin (only 45 players are being invited back this fall), several fine ball players should emerge as worthy of special recognition. Center Glenn Shea, for one, should rate with the best in the league or in the area. Tackle Dennis Brewster, all 250 pounds of him, will match any in the league. Besides Carter, sophomores who merit mention are end Bob Allphin, wingback Curg Belcher, center Mel Olson, tailback Kent Oborn, and the Ogden brothers, Steve and John.

"We may not bury anybody this fall," says Hudspeth in summary, "but we'll bruise a few."

TEAM ANALYSIS

- TEAM SIZE: Generally, team size will be very good in 1964. The tackles, especially, will be large, and the other positions will measure well.
- TEAM SPEED: Only average, at best. There will be a few fast backs, but no one with blazing speed of the real scatback variety.
- FORMATION: Variable T-formation with four or five basic series. Will try to get an even 50-50 division with running and passing game.
- WEAKNESS: Plain lack of numbers will hurt Cougars, who are cut very thin this season. Guard positions are particularly thin, and quarterback spot is also a soft spot.
- STRENGTHS: May be hard to find in '64 team, although the club is firm at center, there are an adequate number of ends, and the fullback position may prove adequate.
- CONSENSUS: Quite naturally, Hudspeth's first season will be a building year. Aside from a promise to hit hard and hustle, something they proved they could do in the spring game, the Cougars have little in their favor this season.

BY POSITION

- ENDS: Despite depth (five lettermen) flankers may be on a par with '63. This could be one of better line positions.
- TACKLES: Cougars have two good ones in Dennis Brewster and Monte Jones, but not enough depth. Weaker.
- GUARDS: Judged the weakest spot in the line, will be leaning on Barry Corchnoy and Bill Marriott.
- CENTERS: Could be strongest spot with regular Glenn Shea getting support from Mel Olson, one of better sophomores.
- QUARTERBACKS: Junior Bob Marshall and sophomore Virgil Carter will shoulder 90% of chores here. Inexperienced and unproven.
- TAILBACKS: Good all-around tailback yet to come forth, so may elect to go with newcomers.
- WINGBACKS: Weak enough that Cougars will be using comparative newcomers.
- FULLBACKS: Strongest of backfield positions. Will go with sophomores Austin McNaughton and John Ogden, senior Mike Jacobsen.
