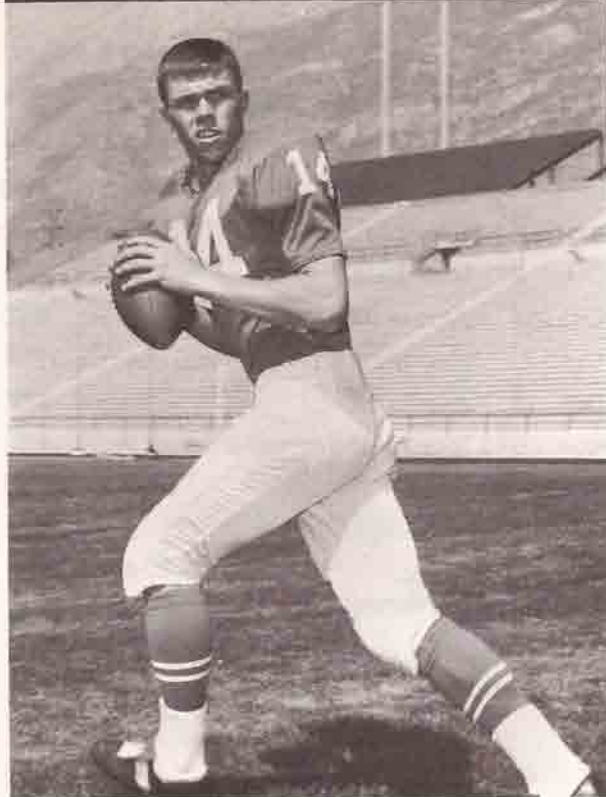
## PRESS NOTES

**PRESS PASSES**—will be provided members of the working press **only**. Women and children are not allowed in the press box. Drivers and others who accompany the press to the game will be asked to sit elsewhere. Comps will be provided, if requested well in advance of the game. Visiting press will be issued their credentials after their arrival in Provo. If requested but not received, they will be at the will call window.

**PRESS BOX**—is located in the West stands. Quickest entry will be through sections G and F or GG and FF. The main press section is on the main level, while radio and scouts will be located on the top level.

**PRESS PARKING**—is located in parking area No. 1, which is immediately south of the West stands. Cars should enter from Canyon Road (the north-south artery) or from 1650 North (east-west artery). These passes will be issued along with the working passes.

**PRESS SERVICES**—will be provided at all games. Complete game statistics—lineups, play-by-play, scoring and yardage reports, team and individual statistics—will be supplied. Post-game interviews with the coaches will be arranged on request.

# TOMMY HUDSPETH



WAC Coach of the Year

Few coaches in the country share the meteoric rise in the ranks which Tommy Hudspeth has experienced in the span of two years. Taking a job that few envied, Hudspeth rejuvenated football activity at BYU, and last year guided the Cougars to their first grid-iron championship.

In all, the 1965 football season was one of the finest hours in the school's history. Tommy won his share of honors, including UPI Coach of the Year in the WAC, WAC Coach of the Year, and **Coach and Athlete Magazine's** Coach of the Year in the Rocky Mountain region. All of these honors came in his second year of college coaching.

The 35-year old native of Cherryvale, Kans., attended high school in Afton, Okla., where he was an all-state quarterback. His next stop was the University of Tulsa, where he captained the freshman team in his first year with the Hurricanes. Playing in a heyday of football at Tulsa, he was a standout quarterback and defensive back. The Hurricanes won football champion-

ships in 1950 and 1951, and Tom was a regular all three seasons with the varsity.

He capped his career with Tulsa as captain of the 1953 team that played in the Gator Bowl. It was during his undergraduate days at Tulsa that Hudspeth was coached by Darrell Royal (Texas) and Jack Mitchell (Kansas), who were then coaches at the Oklahoma school.

Following graduation from college, Tom launched his coaching career at Norman High School. There followed a two-year stint in the U.S. Air Force as a commissioned officer. Discharged as a first lieutenant in 1955, he resumed high school coaching, this time at Tulsa Central. His team at Central posted a 6-2-1 record, and the following year he was appointed freshman coach at Tulsa under Bobby Dobbs. When Dobbs was named head coach of the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian League, Tom, an old-timer at 28, went with him as an assistant. The Stampeders were conference contenders for the three years he was with them.

Hudspeth also shows marked leadership qualities off the field. He was president of his senior class at Tulsa, and he has completed most of the requirements for his master's degree in counseling. A convert to The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Hudspeth serves on the High Council of the BYU Fifth Stake. His wife, Ruth Ann, is president of the Young Women's Mutual Improvement Association in the same stake.

The Hudspeth's have two sons, Max (11), and Phil (8).

### CHRIS APOSTOL (Utah State '50)

The main force behind BYU's highly improved pass defense last season was the coaching of Chris Apostol, who has been with the Cougars since 1959.

In terms of service at BYU, Apostol is the veteran of the coaching staff, since he was at BYU at least two years ahead of the rest of the staff.

A graduate of Bingham High School, Apostol was an all-state lineman and student body president. From there, he enrolled at Utah State where he played as a lineman.

He graduated from Utah State in 1950 and immediately went into the high school coaching ranks. He was at Ogden High School for nine years. As a head coach at Ogden, his record was 44-13-2. His last team there won the state class A championship with an 11-0 record. To make that achievement even more interesting, seven of the 11 wins recorded that year were shutouts.

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children: Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt, and Kami.

### LAVELL EDWARDS (Utah State '52)

In the final two games of the successful 1965 season, BYU gave up a total of 11 points. The inspired play of the defensive linemen must have been rewarding for assistant coach LaVell Edwards.

Coaching the defensive linemen is not new to Edwards. And, he is regarded as one of the best in his profession.

Edwards grew up in the shadows of BYU, and he attended Orem High School and made the all-state football team. From there, he moved to Utah State University, where he was captain and all-conference for two years.

Following graduation in 1952, he served two years in the Army at Fort Mead, Maryland. In 1954, he returned to Utah to coach at Granite High School in Salt Lake City. He came to BYU in 1961.

Coach Edwards is married to the former Patti Covey and they have three children: Ann (10), John (8), and James (4). Edwards is Bishop of the BYU 36th Ward on campus.

### EARL LINDLEY (Utah State '54)

A former professional football player, Earl Lindley serves as offensive line coach. He is one of the three assistant coaches at BYU that graduated from Utah State University.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Earl was an all-state back for South Cache High School in northern Utah. Coming to Utah State, he was an all-conference half-back in his junior year. That same year, 1953, he was the nation's leading scorer.

After graduation his professional career began with the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League. He played there for four years, but an injury cut short his playing career.

In 1958, he took over as head coach at Idaho Falls High School, where he was very successful. He coached several outstanding football players there who became collegiate standouts.

Lindley is married to the former Marilyn Jensen, and they have four children: Greg (12), Teresa (10), Lance (5), and Corey (2).

### JOHN PAYNE (Oklahoma State '55)

Newest member of the Cougar staff is John Payne, who joined the department this spring as offensive line coach. He launched his playing career at Oklahoma State University, where he was a four-year letterman at guard and center. He won all-Missouri Valley Conference honors in 1955.

John coached the OSU freshman team for one year, then moved to Tulsa Central High School where he assisted Tommy Hudspeth. He remained at Central for three years before moving to McLain High School as athletic director and head football coach, a post he held for five years.

In 1964 he moved to Central State College as defensive line coach. In 1965, his last year there before coming to BYU, his team tied for the conference championship.

He is married to the former Dorothy Robinson, and they have three children: Jenifer, Jeff, and Heather. A fourth addition is expected this summer.

## WAYNE STARTIN (B.Y.U. '59)

A perfect record, a team that averaged 27 points a game, and the most successful offensive team in football history at BYU—that describes some of the accomplishments of frosh coach Wayne Startin in his first year at the helm of the greenies.

Last year was, indeed, Startin's first with frosh, and his debut was outstanding. Not only did BYU defeat Utah twice and Utah State and Air Force Academy once each, but they proved to have the most devastating offense in many years of freshman football.

Startin is a native of Murray, Utah, and was acclaimed as one of the finest quarterbacks ever to come out of the State. Coming to BYU on the basis of two seasons as an all-state player, Startin proceeded to become one of the outstanding signal-callers in BYU history.

He began his coaching career at Olympus High School in Salt Lake City. He took over at Skyline High School for a period before moving to BYU.

Wayne is married to the former Janice Nelson, and they have four children: Bryant (11), Judith (9), Nancy (7), and Jill (2).

## TRAINER ROD KIMBALL

Probably the busiest, most widely-traveled man in the Provo area is BYU trainer Rod Kimball, now in his 28th year as trainer for the athletic teams.

During his tenure as trainer of BYU teams, his activities have taken him to Europe (four times), Hawaii, and South America (twice), as well as all over the United States.

His job doesn't start and end with bruises, pulled muscles, and rub-downs, however. He is a valuable cog in the morale of the teams he serves.

Rod grew up in Jordan, Utah, where he was an outstanding athlete. In college, he was a student leader as well as steady performer in sports. He has served as an LDS bishop, and he and his wife LaNeve have 12 living children.



## THE STADIUM

Football fans at BYU still refer to their playing field as the "new" football stadium, and this feeling reflects the new gridiron spirit at Cougarville.

Built in 1964 at a cost of over \$1,500,000, the BYU Stadium originally had a capacity of 26,812. When it was inaugurated on Oct. 2, 1964, over 33,000 fans were crammed into every possible corner to watch the Cougars play New Mexico.

The sudden rise in popularity of BYU football, coupled with BYU's first football championship in history, prompted university officials to authorize the addition of 4,080 new seats.

Total seating capacity will now be 30,892. With the addition of temporary bleachers in the north and south ends of the football field, total capacity will be in the neighborhood of 35,000. Parking facilities are more than adequate with space for 2,698 cars on the immediate Stadium grounds and an additional 2,000 within easy walking.

The completion of the stadium is a classic example of community effort. A good part of the \$1,500,000 construction costs were gained from personal donations from students, faculty, staff, interested residents and business houses in Provo, and alumni and friends.

Ground was broken for the stadium in October, 1963. A year later it was in use. Total area involved for the construction was 36.5 acres, over 20 acres of which are being used for parking.

The lighting for the stadium is the best available. The towering light standards are over 16 stories high, and when the lights are turned on, about 576,000 watts of electricity are directed to the playing field.

Surrounding the playing field is a rubberized asphalt track, recognized as one of the best in the nation. It was site of the 1966 WAC track and field championships, and will be used for the 1967 NCAA championships in June, 1967.

## THE OUTLOOK

It was a fundamentally sound, offensively imaginative football team that won the Western Athletic Conference championship last year. This fall's squad which Coach Tommy Hudspeth will have in tow should be on a par with the '65 edition; perhaps a little bit better, if experience means anything. But this doesn't mean that BYU will win more ball games or even repeat as Conference champions.

This line of reasoning stems from the fact that few teams picked by the experts to win the WAC title ever manage to have a grip on the trophy at season's end. There's no trophy for predators of the gridiron like the skin of a former champion. And since the Cougars are looking plump and juicy with all those honors crammed inside, they look like inviting prey to all comers.

If there is a pronounced weakness in the BYU picture, it is found in the offensive line where departing lettermen left a void from tackle to tackle. Gone from the tackle slots alone are the first and second unit tackles who provided the daylight for Cougar runners like fullback John Ogden. Regulars Dennis Brewster and Monte Jones, both three-year lettermen, leave a big hole at tackle. In addition the Cougars will be without the two second unit offensive tackles, Bill Wanosik and Al Sprouse.

But thereafter, both on offense and defense, the losses will be nominal. Certainly some of the slack may be taken up by the transfers and sophomores. BYU's freshman team was 4-0 for the season, which could mean there is some talent to be tapped in the sophomore ranks. One of the better prospects is Marc Lyons, a quarterback from Arvada, Colo., who made a bigger splash—yardage-wise—than did Carter as a freshman. Lyons' main target was end Tom Newsom, which means that Phil Odle may have company in the pass receiving department.

Scanning the list of probable starters for this fall, it appears the Cougars will have a letterman in all but one of 22 positions. The one exception is at middle guard, where Joe Scanlan, a 230-pound transfer from Arizona Western, has taken over that position on the strength of his showing last spring. Nine more lettermen can be found on the second offensive and defensive units, which means that the backup strength may be spotty.

Defensively, with most of the troops back in uniform, the Cougars will be more experienced, a bit more reluctant to give ground. Such standouts as monster Curg Belcher, tackle Glen Gardner, tackle Richard Banky, and linebackers Sid Frazier and Moses Kim are all veterans from last year.

But it was the Cougars' offense that propelled the Cougars to the fore last year. Only three teams topped the Cougars in total offense in '65 as they rolled up 3,687 yards and 229 points.

Calling signals for BYU again this fall will be All-America candidate Virgil Carter, judged the finest back in this section of the country. Carter set 22 school and conference records as a junior, and there's no reason to suppose he won't keep going.

Carter's number one target is Phil Odle, WAC Lineman of the Year, who set career records for the Cougars while still a sophomore. Then, too, there's John Ogden, the power running fullback who led the WAC in rushing as a sophomore and as a junior. John's brother, Steve, will anchor the tailback spot. But Steve will be pushed by junior Wally Hawkins and transfer Perry Rodrigue for that position.

There's ample strength at wingback, too, with lettermen Kent Oborn, speedster Tim Russell, and newcomer Casey Boyette.

At quarterback, the Cougars will have letterman Stewart Simpson and sophomore Lyons backing up that position. At fullback, however, the Cats are a bit thin behind Ogden, but John proved durable in his two previous seasons as a regular.

Depending on how well the Cougars are able to bolster the interior line, the club should be competitive. But bettering last year's record is something else.

## TEAM ANALYSIS

**TEAM SIZE:** Generally, the Cougars will be about the same in size, although the tackle slots on offense will be somewhat smaller.

**TEAM SPEED:** This year's team doesn't have the great scat back or break-away runner, but Hudspeth considers it adequate. Wingback Tim Russell is the fastest of the backs.

**FORMATION:** Much the same as last year: slot-T, wing formation with inside, outside belly series. Cougars would like to have a 50-50 split in running and passing game.

**DEFENSE:** Same as last year; monster defense with squirming secondary. Losses from last year's unit were relative light.

**WEAKNESS:** Will the Cougar attack be as effective this year without the offensive tackles (Brewster, Jones, et al) and guards that opened the holes? This is the source of much concern for BYU staffers.

**STRENGTHS:** Loads of lettermen, plus enough experience to provide the team with poise and balance. Most of the offensive punch is back, and the defense, too, will be wiser for '65 efforts.

This season, coach Harry Anderson will have to go to the air more in order to keep his standing as top independent on the west coast.

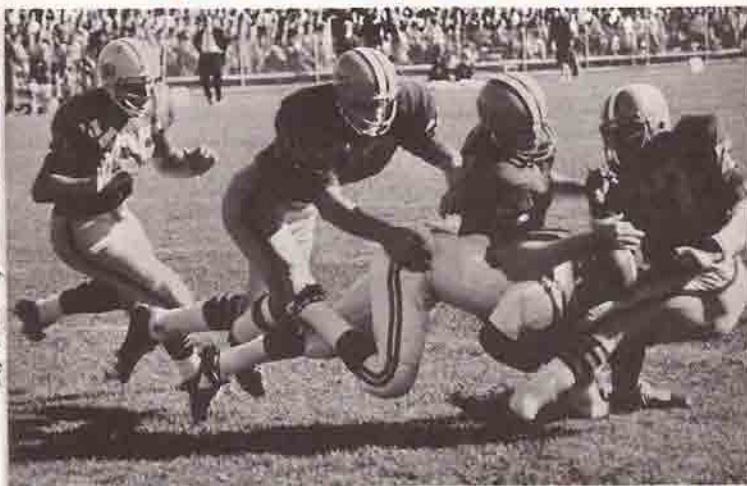

### THE OUTLOOK

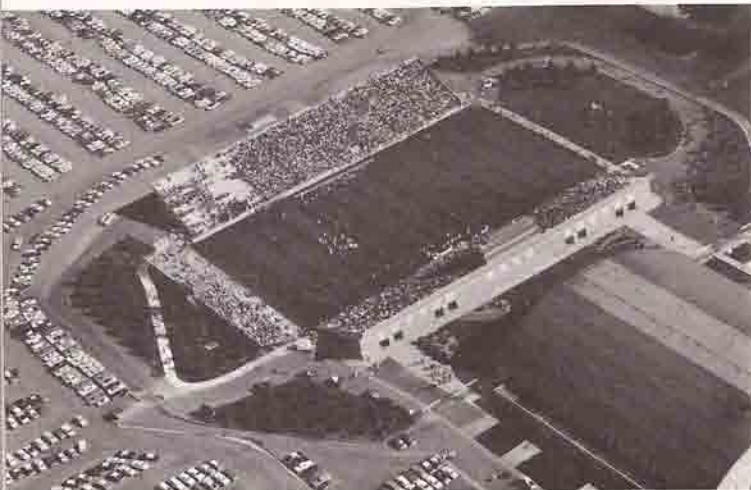
Utah has a new coach, 36 returning lettermen, and a new outlook on their football fortunes—what else does a team need to be a contender.
