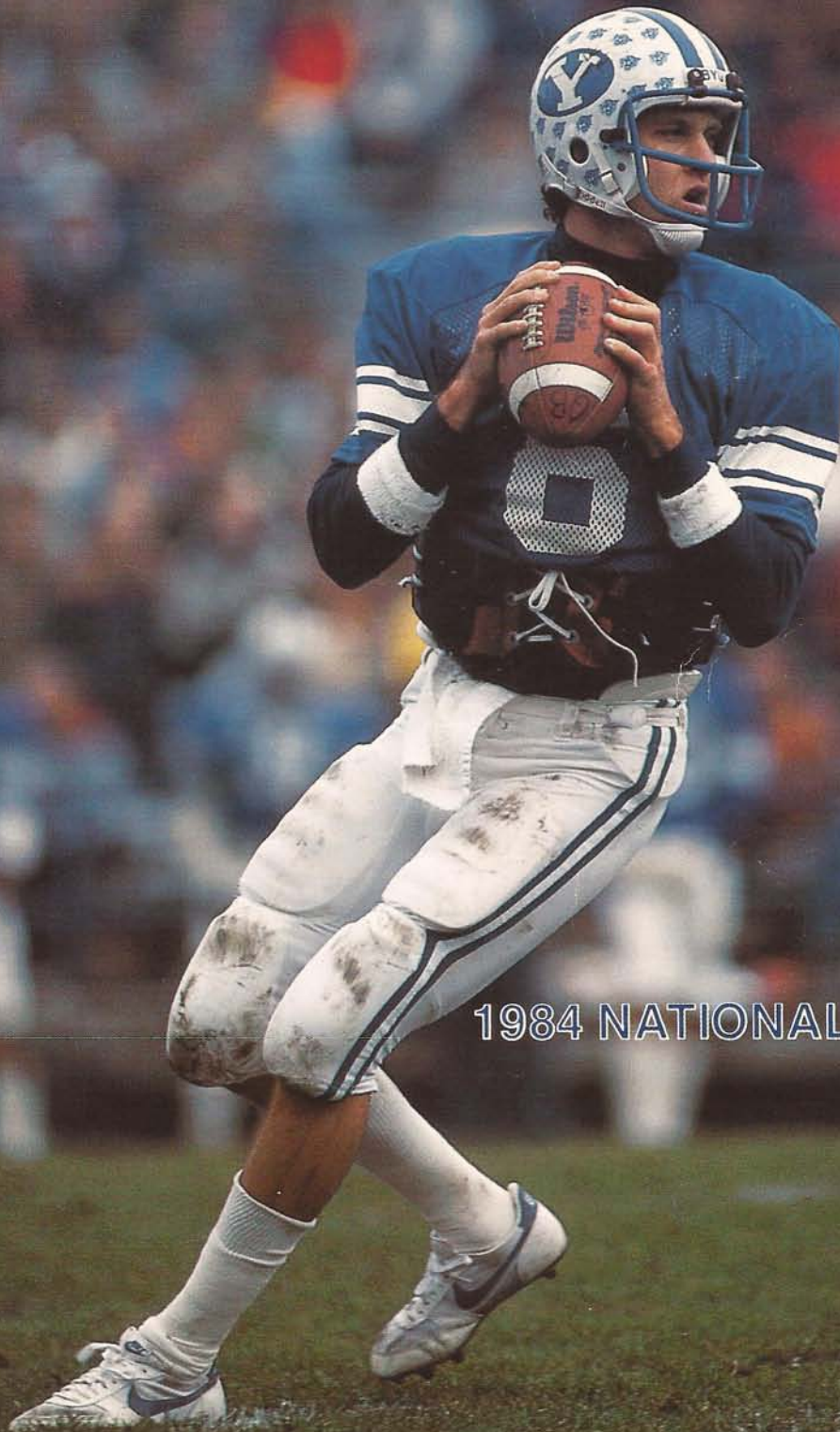

# 1985 Outlook



Once again in 1985, the Cougars' hopes ride on the arm of Robbie Bosco.

Football Observers can't help but wonder—will the 1985 season be just another beginning for Brigham Young University, or will it turn out to be an extension of the year before?

An extension, which would mean a continuation of the Cougar's 24-game win streak, seems almost outside the realm of possibility. It would mean the resumption of the kind of offensive thrust that led BYU to NCAA statistical titles in both passing and total offense.

True, the nine returning starters from last year's offensive and defensive units are anxious to pick up where the Cougars left off last December. But there are enough missing parts from last year's machine to reduce this kind of expectation.

Most obvious among the areas needing immediate attention are the offensive and defensive lines; the people upfront who wage the war of the trenches. Only one offensive lineman, tackle Dave Wright, is returning from a line that contained three first-team All-WAC selections (tight end David Mills, center Trevor Match and guard Craig Garrick).

On defense, the trio of down linemen that helped the Cougars to a 10th place NCAA ranking in "defense against scoring" have all departed, including All-WAC performer Jim Herrmann. In addition, three of the Cougars' four defensive back positions have been vacated.

And if those who follow football care to look close enough, they will note the absence of Lee Johnson, the Cougars' kicking specialist who accounted for 74 of the Cougars' points in 1984. Johnson not only did BYU's punting (an average of 45.5 yards per kick last

season), but also he did the Cougars' place-kicking. And kicking is still a very important part of the game.

Add it all up, and it appears Coach LaVell Edwards and his assistants face some wholesale re-tooling before the '85 kickoff.

However, there are some pluses in the Cougars' favor; like a return of most of the BYU offensive standouts at the skill positions. Quarterback Robbie Bosco, a strong All-America and Heisman candidate even before the season starts, is back with much of last year's receiving corps. Also, the top five rushers from the team of last year are back, along with three of the top four scorers from last fall.

With Bosco back throwing passes to the likes of Glen Kozlowski and Mark Bellini, the passing game should be steady. Both of the starters at running back, Kelly Smith and Lakei Heimuli, are returning, along with Vai Sikahema, who returned 51 punts and 15 kickoffs in '84.

While it is important that the team be adequately manned this fall, it's also imperative that the Cougars be ready *early*. BYU will open the season on national television against Boston College in the Kickoff Classic at Meadowlands, New Jersey. Then the Cougars host UCLA and Washington on the following weekends.

Here's a quick look at the squad by position:

**Hardest Hit Positions:** Offensive line, defensive line and defensive secondary. Of the 13 total starters in these three divisions, only two are returning. Also, BYU will be without the services of its top punter and place-kicker of the last two seasons.

**Strongest Positions:** Of the eight linebackers listed on BYU's first two units, six will be returning, which means the linebacker spots will probably be the Cougars' deepest position. Also returning are the one-two players at fullback, halfback and quarterback.

**About the Same:** Although the squad loses its All-WAC tight end, the BYU receivers will be about the same overall.

## Coach LaVell Edwards Quotes

### Outlook for the Year:

"I think we have a chance to be a good football team this fall, and my number one goal is to win the conference (Western Athletic). In the process, if we can win other games along the way, and some other things happen to us like they did last year and previous years, then fine."

### The Conference Race:

"It will be a tough go-round this year in the WAC. Air Force, Hawaii, Utah, San Diego State and Wyoming look like the contenders. And the key with most of the conference schools will be staying healthy."

### On Length of Schedule (August 29 to December 7)

"One of the reasons I'm opposed to the playoff system is that you end up playing too many games. It makes the season too long. But you don't turn down a chance to play in the Kickoff Classic, because it's an opportunity that may never come around again. If things go right, if we play well and stay whole, then maybe it will help us with the rest of the schedule."

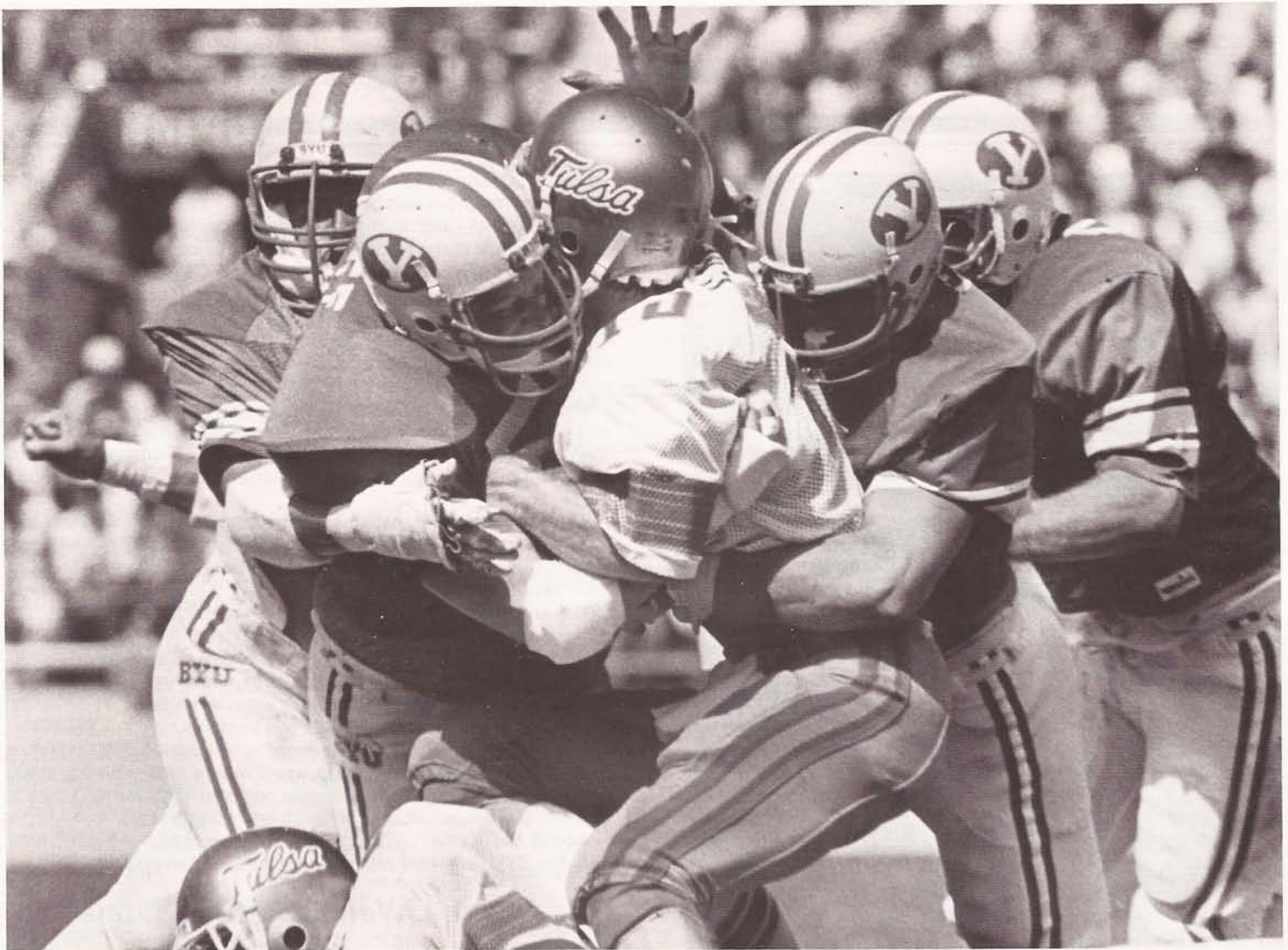
### On College Football in General:

"We're seeing more parity, more balance on the national level where the 30-95 rule has been a factor. There are more good players now, and, there seems to be a broader distribution of talent. The coaching of young players is also better."

### Evaluation of the Recruiting Year:

"On the surface, it looks like it was a pretty good year, especially for linemen. I've never had a better year for tall prospects with size potential who were also good citizens, good students and whatever else. We got nine or ten of them that we feel good about."





*With only four starters returning, BYU's defense will be hard pressed to equal its 1984 performance.*

"Individually, a player like Troy Long could possibly be another Kyle Morrell. Troy is an outstanding player. Darren Handley could very well be our third tight end this fall. John Fields, a freshman defensive back from Arizona, is a tough, strong player who will be a cornerback. We also got a good quarterback in Kevin Smith (Salem, Oregon).

"Defensively, we recruited two outstanding junior college linemen: Jason Buck from Ricks College (Idaho) and Steve Kaufusi from Dixie College (Utah)."

**On Bosco's Holiday Bowl Injuries:**

"He's been fine. Robbie's ankle has been a little sore periodically, but he's okay."

**On Future Quarterback Situation:**

"Robbie Bosco and Blaine Fowler are clearly one-two at this point, and both are seniors. So whoever takes over after that is going to be a quarterback who has never played much varsity ball for us before. Both Mike Young (a sophomore) and Steve Lindsley (a junior) had good spring practice sessions."

**Specific Area of Concern:**

"When you lose a Lee Johnson, you lose a major part of your kicking game because he could do so many things; punt, pooch punt, field goals, extra points and the kickoff. I don't think there is any phase of football that is more important, and where less is concentrated, than the kicking game. And that is an area of concern for us.

"We do have a place kicker, Gary Webster, who I think will be good. And we feel good about that part of it. Our punting situation is still up in the air. But we did sign a freshman, Pat Thompson, who is a

good punter. We also found a walk-on, Kevin Towle, a transfer, but he has never kicked in a major college game."

**On Replacements on the Line:**

"Our greatest number of personnel losses came in the line, where we lost key players on both sides. Dave Wright, offensive tackle, is the only starting lineman of last season who is returning. At the same time, our greatest improvement last spring was in the offensive and defensive line. We will probably go with Wright and Scott Robinson at tackle, David King and John Borgia as guards, and Keith McCullough at center.

"Defensively, we will draw our probable starters from Shawn Knight, Ken Smith, Ty Mattingly and Dave Futrell, along with transfers Jason Buck and Steve Kaufusi. Our tight ends will be Trevor Molini and Lance Lindley."

**On Linebackers and Secondary:**

"Linebacker is one of our strongest positions. We have three starters returning—Leon White, Kurt Gouveia and Cary Whittingham—plus some good reserves. We'll have three holes to fill in the secondary, since Jeff Sprowls is the only returning starter from '84. Sophomore Rod Thomas will probably be at one corner, and we are looking at Corey Rasmussen and Rob Ledenko (a redshirt) at safety."

**On Cougar Running Backs:**

"Our running backs are probably as good as we have ever had. With Lakei Heimuli, Kelly Smith, Vai Sikahema, Tom Tuipulotu and Robert Parker, we have five capable runners and receivers. The potential is there, and now we will have to keep them healthy."

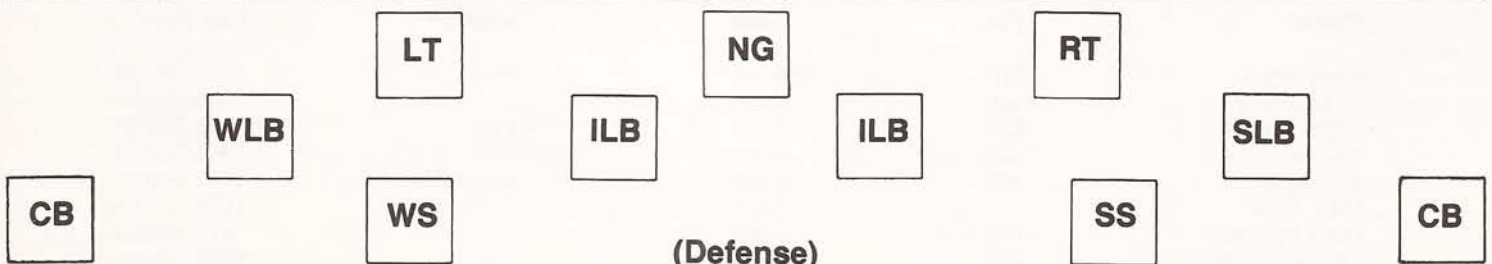
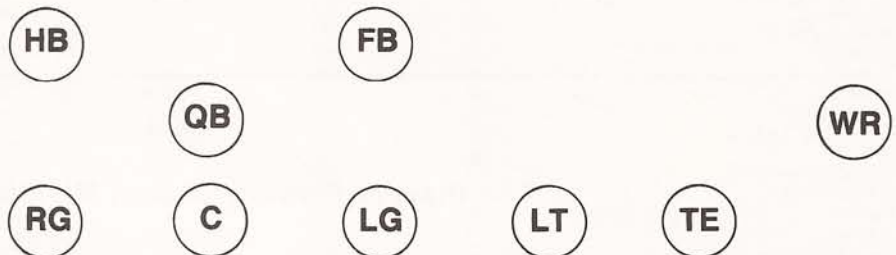

# Robbie Bosco, All-American

It was only a year ago that the main question mark surrounding BYU's football team was the quarterback position.

This year, Robbie Bosco is the Cougars' exclamation point.

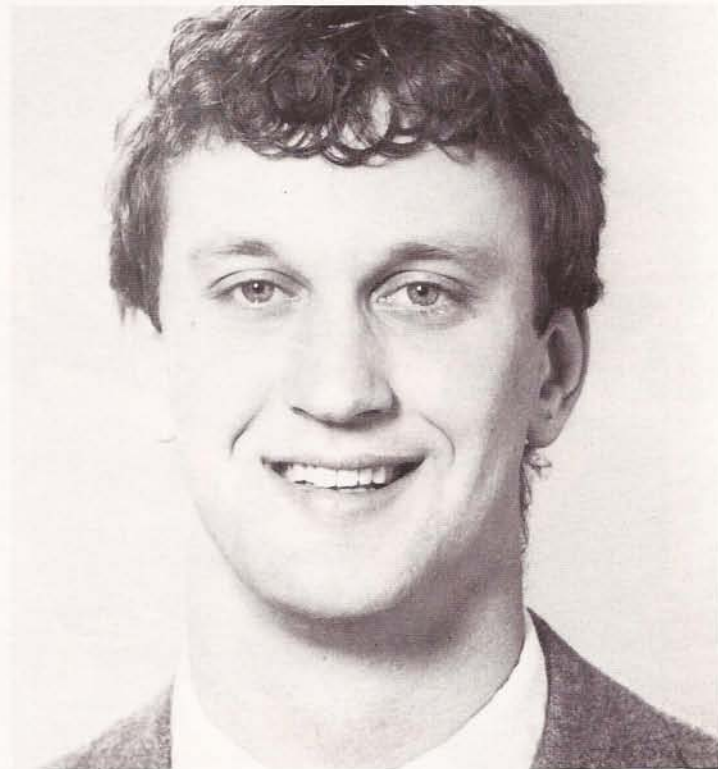
The 6-3 senior proved himself more than capable of filling the shoes left by his famed predecessors Virgil Carter, Gary Sheide, Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young. All he did in 1984 was complete 238 passes in 458 attempts for 3,875 yards and 33 touchdowns and lead his team to the National Championship.

Along the way, he was named second team All-America by UPI, third team All-America by AP and Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Year. He also finished third in the Heisman Trophy race and runnerup behind Doug Flutie in balloting for the Davey O'Brien Award, symbolic of the nation's outstanding quarterback.

Bosco led the nation in total offense with 327.7 yards per game and finished second only to Flutie in pass efficiency with a rating of 151.8. He set NCAA records for most consecutive games gaining 200 yards or more passing in a season (12) and most games gaining 200 yards or more passing in a season (12).

Bosco's value to BYU's team perhaps was best shown in the Holiday Bowl game against Michigan. A recipient of a late hit, Bosco sustained strained ligaments in his knee and a badly sprained ankle. After leaving the game for nearly a quarter, he returned, limping with a heavily taped leg, to lead BYU to victory. He threw for 343 yards and two touchdowns against one of the best pass defenses in the country.

Entering his senior year, Bosco no longer must prove to others he can keep the BYU quarterback tradition alive. However, he will be facing the toughest schedule any Cougar signal caller has ever lined up against. Fortunately, most of his receivers and running backs will be returning this season, although the offensive line will be young and relatively inexperienced.

# Honors Candidates

**Glen Kozlowski**  
6-1, 195, Senior  
Wide Receiver  
Carlsbad, California

Glen Kozlowski was one of only a few freshmen at BYU ever to start on the varsity squad. In his three years at BYU, his trademark has been making the difficult catch. As a freshman, he had 29 catches for 376 yards and five touchdowns. He caught another 29 passes as a sophomore for 532 yards and five more touchdowns. Last year, however, he started to come into his own. He was elected co-captain of the team and responded by catching 55 passes for 879 yards and 11 touchdowns. He was second on the team in scoring. Glen earned honorable mention All-America honors last year and was first team All-WAC.

**Leon White**  
6-2, 225, Senior  
Linebacker  
San Diego, California

Leon is a three-year letterman who will likely go into the history books as one of the greatest linebackers ever to play for BYU. He also played on BYU's Western Athletic Conference baseball team last spring. His seven unassisted tackles, two assisted tackles and two sacks in Holiday Bowl VII made him the defensive MVP of the game. He was named Western Athletic Conference defensive player-of-the-week in the win over Utah State and was named to *The Sporting News'* second team All-America squad. On the season, he led the team with 10 pass deflections.

Kurt led the team last season in defensive points (284). His main weapon was his fierce pass rush (seven sacks and 21 hurries). He also was in on 107 tackles (43 unassisted, 64 assisted). Beaver, Utah

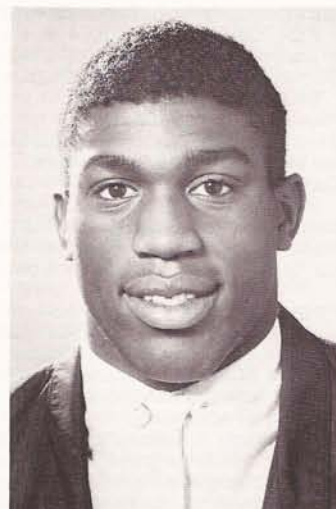

Fact is, the 54-year-old Edwards reached what many would consider the pinnacle of the college coaching profession last year when he led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship. Along the way he picked up NCAA Coach of the Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C. He also was named Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year.

Such honors are justly deserved for the coach, churchman, husband, father, grandfather, author, teacher, doctor, who, in his 13 years with BYU, has led the Cougars to national prominence in the sport of football.

But success is nothing new for Edwards. Since he took over the reins of BYU's football program, the Cougars have won 10 WAC titles, including the last nine in a row. They also have participated in nine bowl games. Those statistics are particularly impressive since BYU had won the WAC championship only once (1965) before Edwards took the helm. In fact, BYU had experienced only 16

winning football seasons since it began playing intercollegiate football in 1922. The Cougars managed only 171 victories in the pre-LaVell era but have won 118 since he took over.

LaVell's winning percentage (.762) ranks seventh among the nation's active college coaches. And BYU has won more games over the last five years than any other Division I school.

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious in that two of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorates.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing seven times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83 and '84), scoring (1979) and total offense ('79, '80, '83 and '84).

In 1979, LaVell was recognized as national Coach-of-the-Year by two organizations: the Bobby Dodd Award Board and the Churchmen's Hall of Fame. Five times ('72, '79, '80, '83 and '84) he has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). Some of the post-season bowl games he has coached include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (twice), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-American Game.

Born in Orem, Utah, LaVell was raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High in Orem and attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.

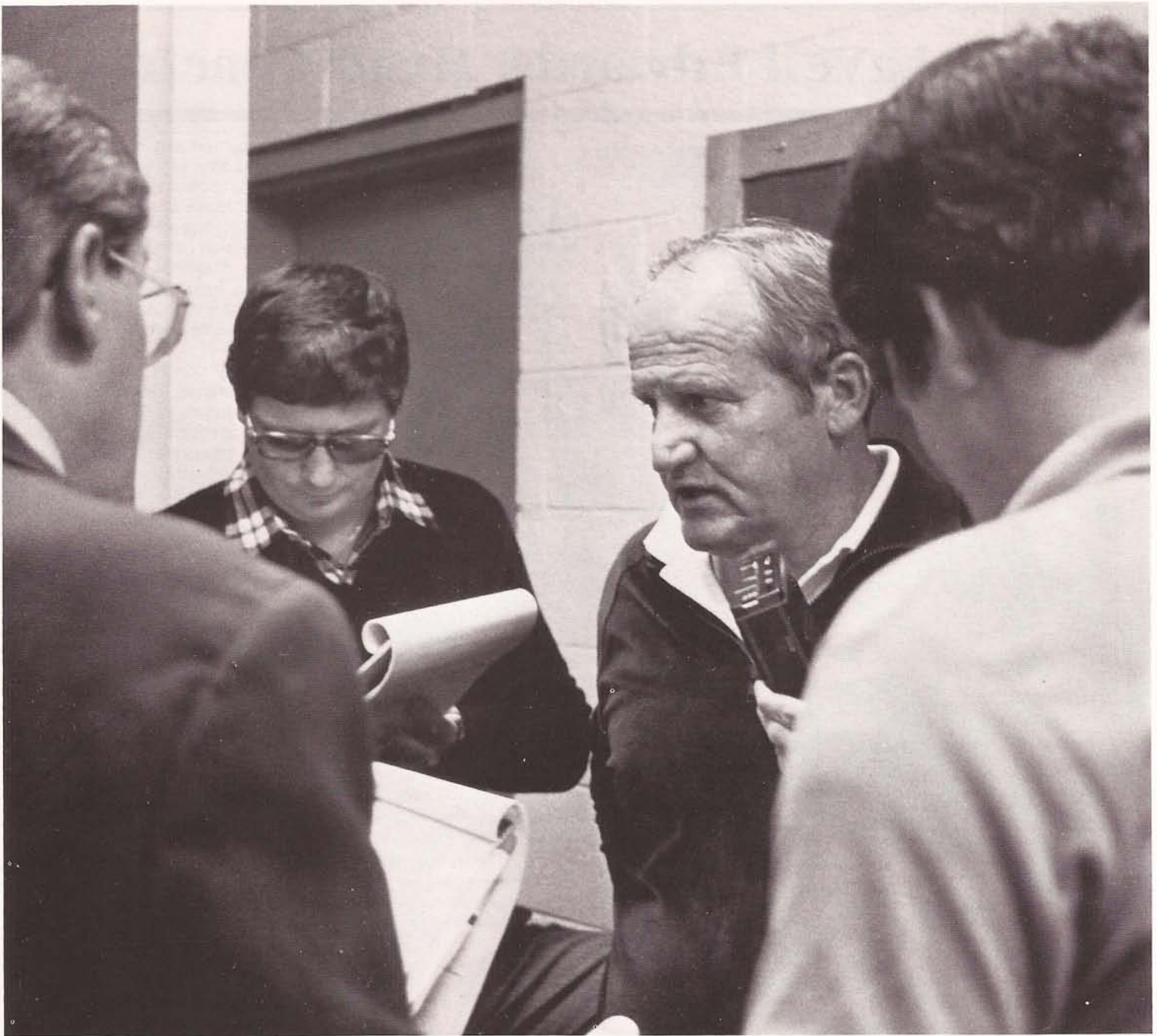
At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams. Fort Lee, VA., in 1952 and Fort Mead, MD., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record. His first coaching job was at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. LaVell succeeded Tommy Hudspeth as head coach in 1982.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. He is an active member of the College Football Association. His wife, Pattie, writes an occasional column for the Provo Daily Herald.

# LaVell's Career Highlights

- 1972** — **LaVell Edwards**, defensive coordinator for the Cougars is named head coach in January . . . a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . halfback **Pete VanValkenburg** wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards-per-game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.
- 1973** — The Cougars begin to move offensively . . . quarterback **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in NCAA passing and No. 3 in total offense . . . teammate **Jay Miller** leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards) . . . Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).
- 1974** — Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in passing for the second year in a row (behind **Steve Barkowski** of California) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list . . . Barkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.
- 1975** — A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games . . . **Gifford Nielsen**, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory . . . ## Claude Bassett (BYU '78) Inside Linebackers, JV Coordinator

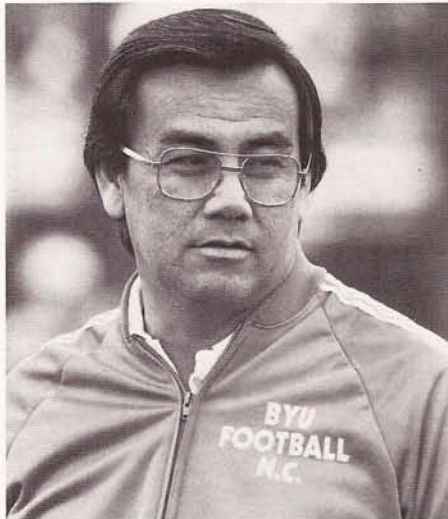
Bassett was named to the BYU coaching staff last March after working as a graduate assistant with the Cougars for two years. He replaced Jim Paronto, who left BYU to take a position at Oregon State. Bassett coaches the inside linebackers and coordinates the junior varsity program.

Prior to coming to BYU for graduate work, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Arizona. There he worked under Coach Jess Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and coached at

Pleasant Grove High (1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah County.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School in Redding, Calif., where he participated in football and baseball. He also attended Shasta Junior College in Redding.

## Norman Chow (Utah '68) Recruiting Coordinator, Receivers

Chow has been a full-time member of the Cougar coaching staff for the past 10 seasons. His main responsibilities include coaching the receivers and coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts. While Chow has been involved with recruiting, BYU has enjoyed some of its finest recruiting campaigns. He is perhaps best known as the man who calls BYU's offensive plays from the press box.

Previous to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, Norm coached for two years as a graduate assistant. He graduated from Punahou High, Honolulu, Hawaii, ('64) being named "Athlete of the Year." He then

went to the University of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC honors as an offensive guard (1967-68). He was also honorable mention All-America. A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after one year because of a knee injury. He then was head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waiialua High School.

Chow has received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. Norm and his wife, Diana, have a son, Carter, 11; a daughter, Maile, 9; and a son, Cameron, 5.



## Dick Felt (BYU '58) Assistant Head Coach, Defensive Coordinator

After an outstanding college career at BYU and a seven-year stint in professional football, Dick Felt returned to his alma mater in 1967 to become a coach. He is entering his 19th year on the staff. Felt's current responsibilities include being assistant head coach and defensive coordinator, with emphasis on coaching the defensive backs.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter in a game with San Jose State. He won all-conference honors as a senior. After

graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60) and was all-service and MVP in the Air Force (1960). He was commissioned a first lieutenant. Felt was signed by the New York Titans and played two seasons with them (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. He left pro ball in 1966 and came to BYU in 1967.

## Roger French (Minnesota '56)

Offensive Coordinator, Offensive Line

Roger French is entering his seventh season as an assistant coach for BYU. He serves as offensive coordinator and coach of the offensive line. Roger joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce nine All-WAC offensive linemen and one of the best passing attacks in college football.

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included coaching the offensive line and tight ends. He was also defensive coordinator and line coach. Born in Minneapolis, French played

linebacker, tight end and fullback at the University of Minnesota. He graduated in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played some pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns. He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. ## Mel Jay Olson (BYU '70)

Academic Coordinator, Offensive Line

Mel Olson joined BYU's coaching staff 16 years ago, shortly after he finished his playing career at BYU. He works with the offensive line but mainly concentrates on the centers. Trevor Matich, BYU's center, was chosen third team All-American. He also serves the team as academic coordinator. While coaching the jayvees several years ago, his teams were undefeated three times.

Born Jan. 20, 1945, in Afton, Wyo., Mel was all-state fullback and linebacker at Star Valley High for two years (1962-63). He enrolled at BYU and played center and lineback as a freshman. He was a member of BYU's first WAC championship team

## Mike Holmgren (USC '70)

Quarterbacks

Mike Holmgren, the coach of the quarterbacks, is beginning his fourth season as a member of the BYU staff.

He came to BYU from San Francisco State, where he was quarterback coach and offensive coordinator in 1981. Previously, Holmgren had been a successful high school coach in California (Oak Grove High, 1975-80; Sacred Heart High, 1972-74; and Lincoln High, 1971).

Mike prepped at Lincoln High in San Francisco, where he was all-city, San Francisco Player-of-the-Year and All-Northern California. In a California prep all-star

game, Holmgren was the starting quarterback, while Jim Plunkett had to play defensive end on the same team. He also was all-city in basketball.

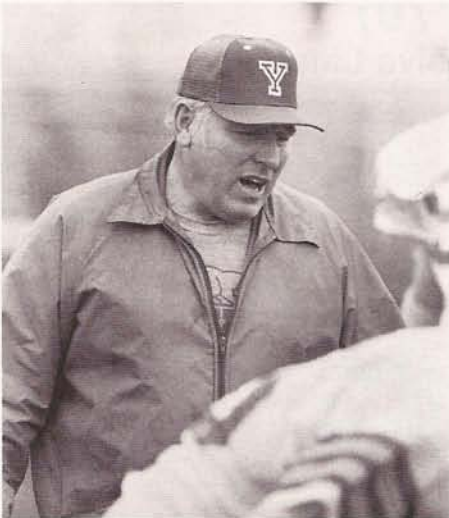
## Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs

Tom came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as as-

## Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Outside Linebackers

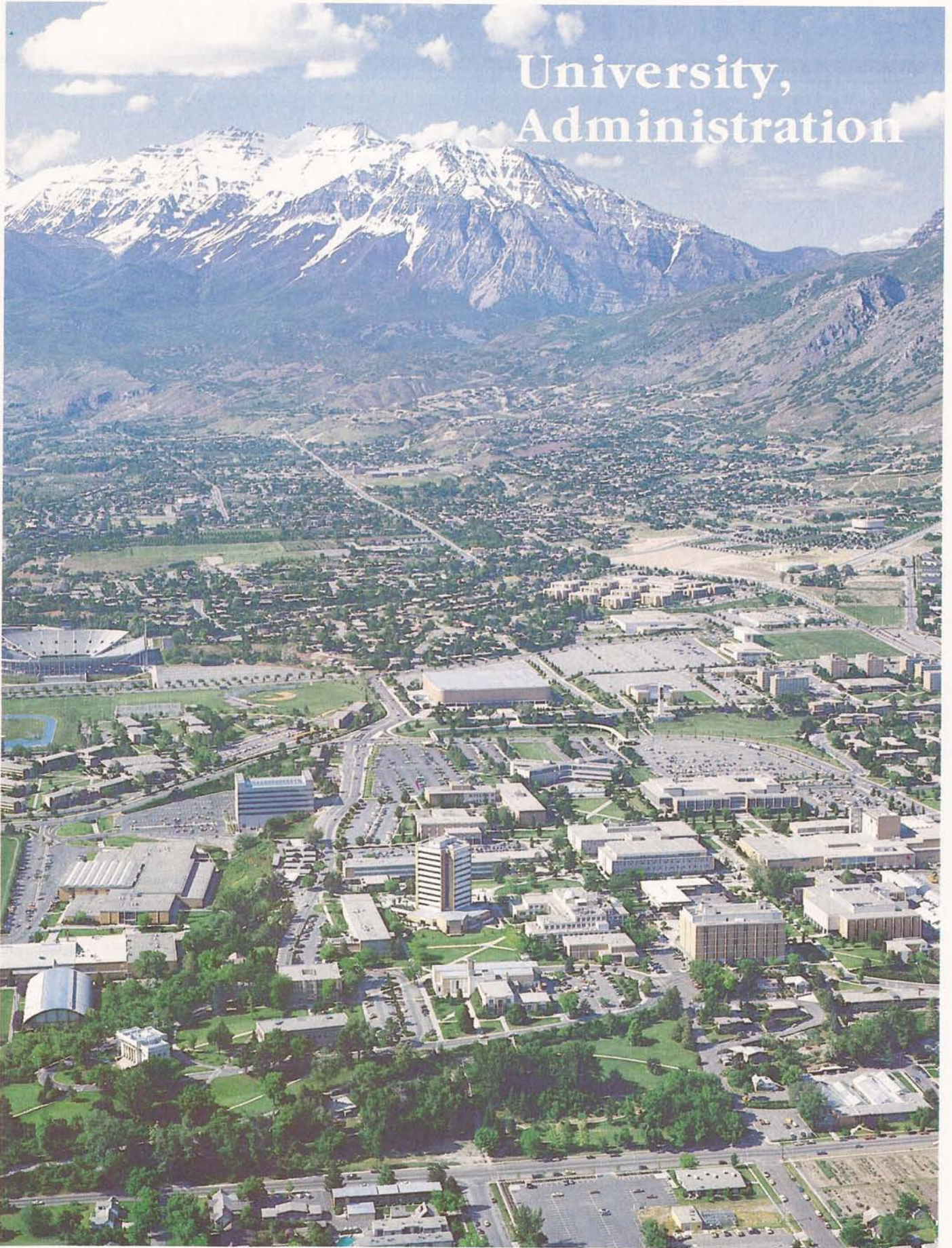
He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68). Later, he was named head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his

# BYU - The School

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1975 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 23, compared to the national average of 19. BYU graduated four Rhodes Scholars between 1975 and 1978, a record matched only by Harvard, Yale and Princeton. In 1976, it was one of two schools to place three Danforth fellows in a single year.

BYU is committed to the idea of educating the whole person and has recently devised a new, rigorous general education program in keeping with that commitment. The GE curriculum consists of requirements in basic reading, writing and mathematics, arts and sciences and religion.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture alongside the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their

The J. Reuben Law School, founded just 12 years ago, is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

BYU's music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with an unusually extensive course offering, and its large number of faculty researching family issues.

commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.





# Athletic Department

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the academic programs and BYU, the Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

A pole published by *The Knoxville Journal* lists the top overall athletic programs in the country each year. BYU has finished in the top-20 11 of the last 15 years. The Cougars finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-five five times. In the Western Athletic Conference, the Cougars have won the all-sports supremacy title eight straight years.

The University's athletic program boasts 11 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, soccer, swimming and wrestling.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have been ranked in the top-20 several times and reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1980. BYU's baseball team has won 19 consecutive WAC Northern Division titles and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful, 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Practices are held on the fields north of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations.

The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse. Plans are currently underway to build one of the finest weight training facilities in the country at BYU.

The Fieldhouse, a multisport complex, contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, three weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, soccer, track and golf teams for indoor practice. Nets can be lowered to protect those running on the track from stray balls.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the second largest on-campus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. It was the site of the 1982 NCAA track and field championships. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated, electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. A batting cage and bullpens border the diamond. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.





# Geographic Location



BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 75,000. It sits on a bench above the city at the Western foot of the Wasatch Mountains in the Rocky Mountain Range. The mountain-trimmed valley provides a beautiful setting, with 12,000-foot Mount Timpanogos on the east and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

No less than eight world-class ski resorts are within an hour's drive of the campus, the closest being only a half hour up Provo Canyon. Mountain lakes, streams and scenic terrain provide limitless opportunities for waterskiing, fishing, hunting and hiking.





# President Jeffrey R. Holland

In his five years as president of Brigham Young University, Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland has made "excellence" his byword for all areas of the university.

Early in his tenure as ninth president of BYU, Dr. Holland initiated a \$100 million, five-year fund-raising campaign entitled "Excellence in the '80s." It is designed to strengthen all areas of the university. After three years of the campaign, nearly 75 percent of the money has been raised.

"We cannot do everything at BYU," President Holland has said. "Perhaps we will not even continue to pursue all of the things we have tried to do in the past. But what we choose to do, we intend to do superbly well."

That same philosophy carries over to athletics at BYU. "It (athletics) has a legitimate place, and, like everything else in the college experience, if it's going to be done, it should be done well," he says.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a standout performer on the Dixie High School basketball and football teams. He later became captain of the conference-champion Dixie College basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960-62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973, where he was a Yale University Fellow. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years — 1835 to 1883."

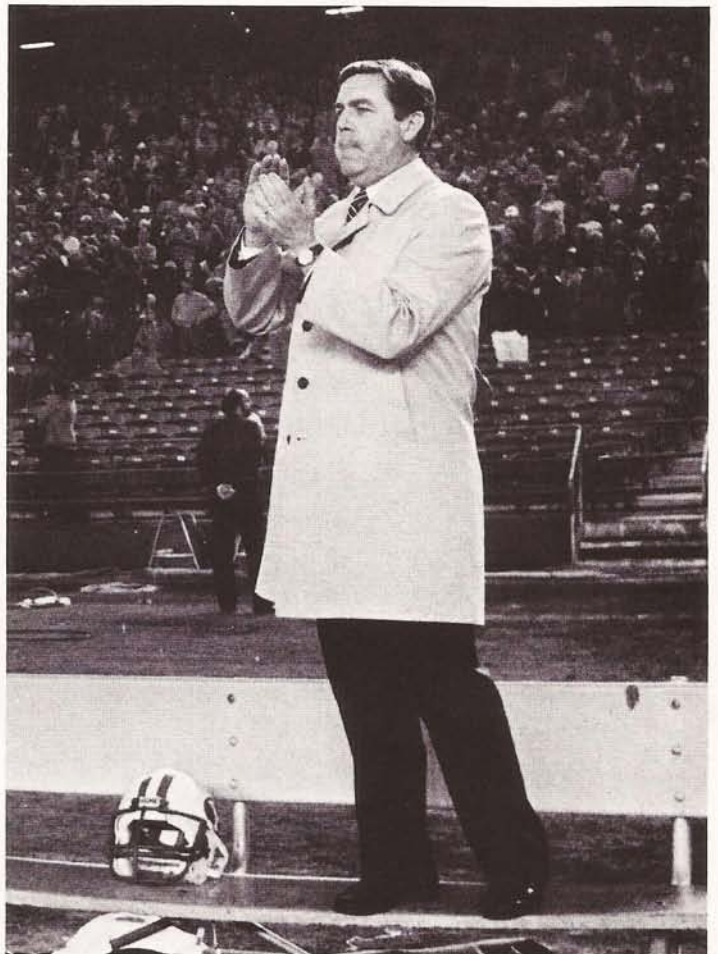
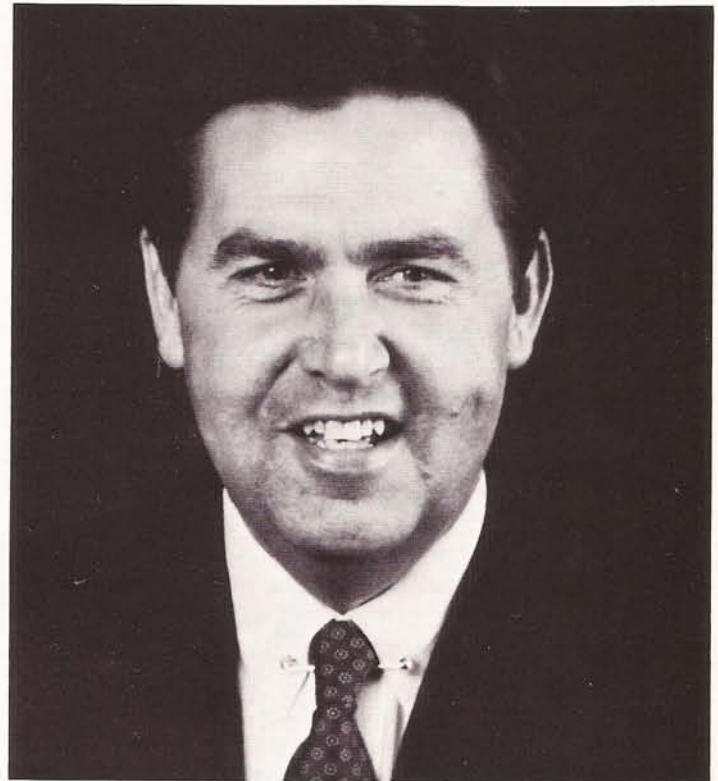
Preceding his appointment as president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reached more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor or director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.

A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

In the LDS Church, he has been a high counselor, a bishop and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He currently serves as a Regional Representative.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bancorporation, Intermountain Health Care, Inc., all in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He also serves as a vice-president of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU) and is a member of the National COLLEGIATE Athletic Association's (NCAA) President's Commission.

He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.







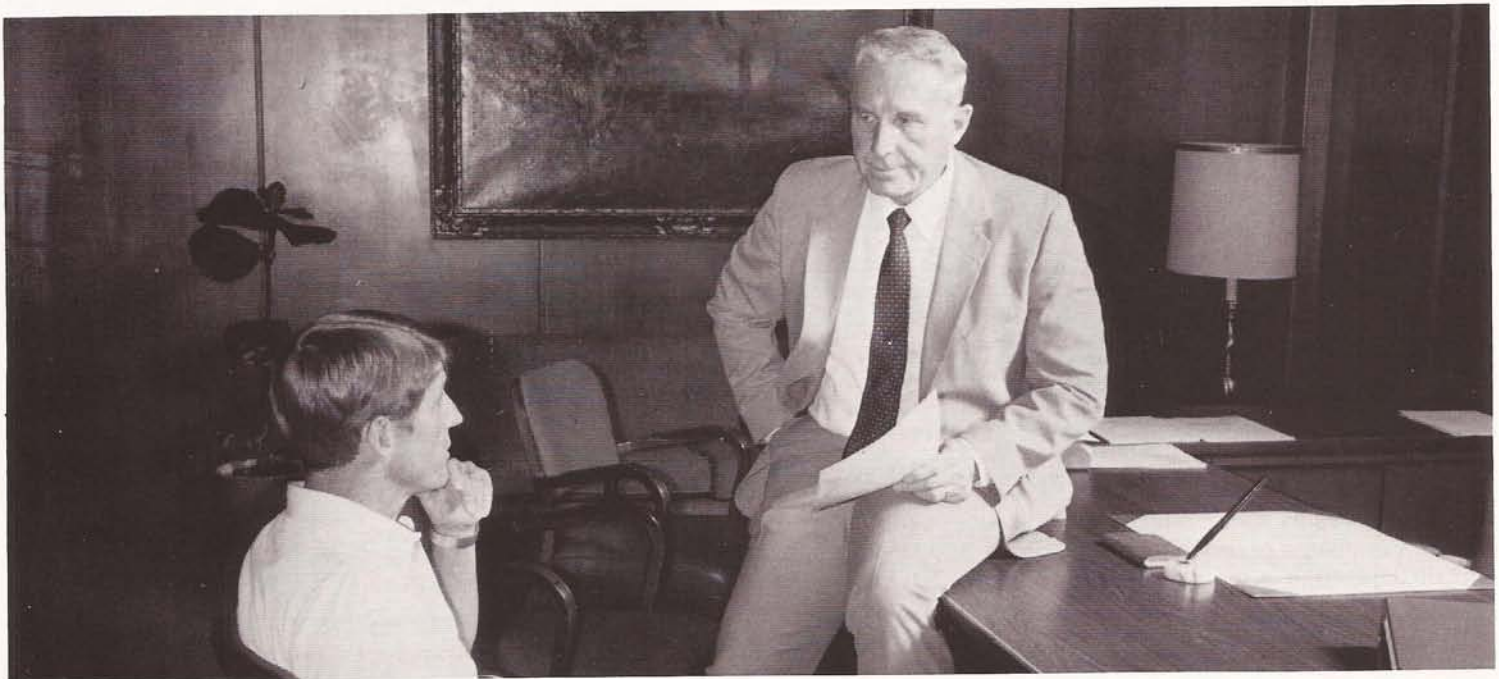
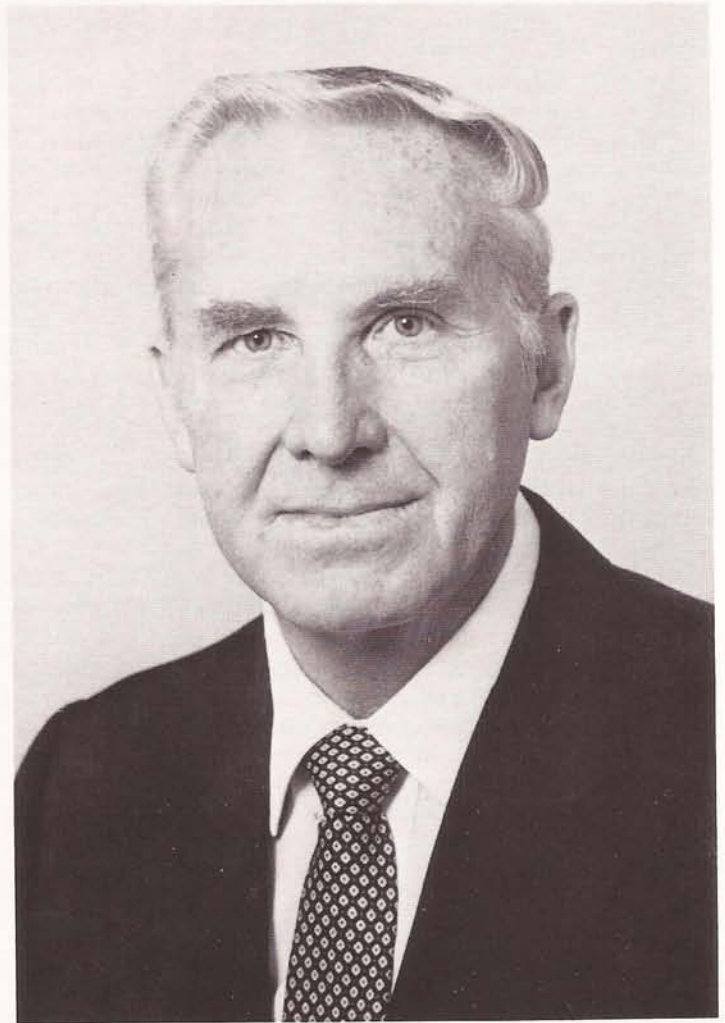
## Dr. Clayne R. Jensen

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 12th year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of professor and assistant dean for six years before becoming dean. He has served as BYU faculty representative since 1976 and is a member of BYU's Special Events and Athletics Advisory Board.

Born March 17, 1930, in Gunnison, Utah, Dr. Jensen graduated from the University of Utah in 1956 and obtained his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963. From 1953-55 he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi and recipient of Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955). He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print, and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 24 countries. Several summers ago he served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including "Who's Who in American Education," "Outstanding Educators of America" and "Noteworthy Americans."

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike and Blake (all former members of BYU's football team) and Chris.







# Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

Most of the large strides in BYU's athletic program have come during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director.

Since he assumed the directorship in July, 1976, the Cougars have claimed nine athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs of the country.

In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU. He also has been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame for his successful coaching of the BYU baseball team for 17 years, during which time his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Twice his teams went to the World Series.

Tuckett was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. At the time of his retirement from coaching, he was the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA.

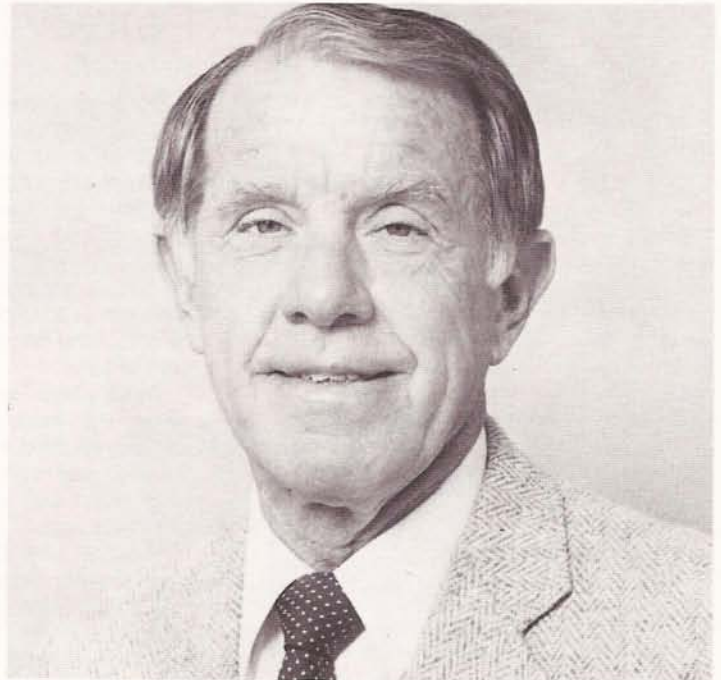
A native of Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball for nine seasons after graduation but returned to the University of Utah, where he obtained a B.S. degree in 1953.

He launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached football, basketball and baseball. In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. In addition to his coaching, Tuckett taught health classes and was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU.

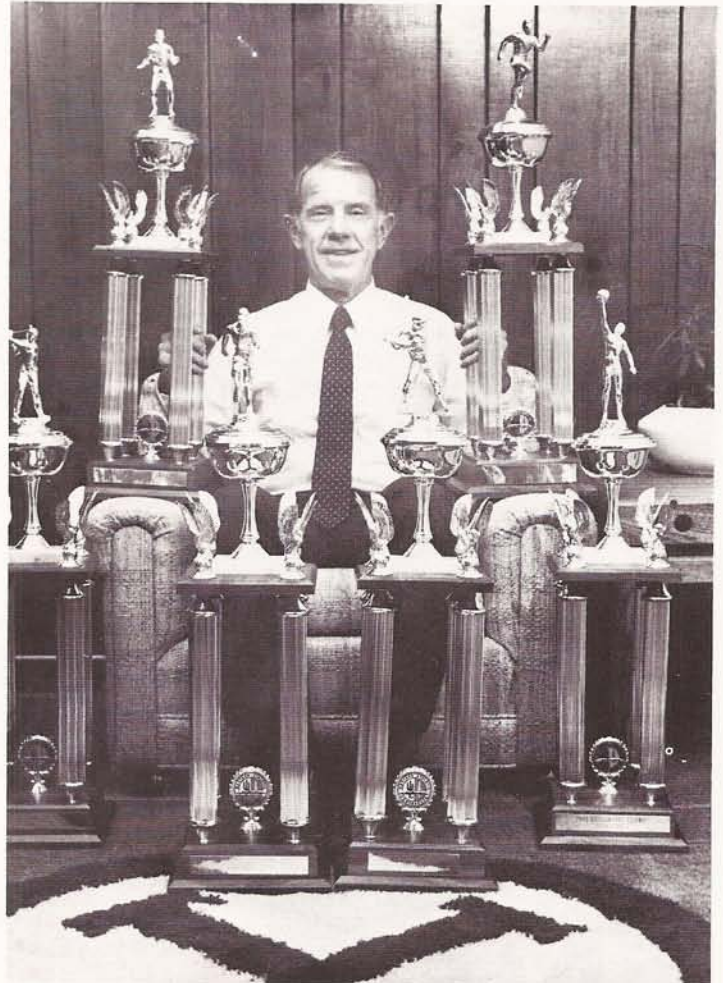
Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tourney's 27-year history. He was a color commentator with KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment.

Glen has served on the following committees: NCAA Committee on Committees, NCAA Television Committee, College Football Association Executive Committee, and College Football Association Television Committee.

## Pete Witbeck

### Assistant Athletic Director

Assistant Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for the past 36 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That same group of players later went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person

who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. His duties included coordinating the offense and heading up scouting and recruiting efforts. He held that position until Watts retired from basketball in 1972 to become athletic director.

Witbeck also decided to leave basketball and try his hand at athletic administration, accepting a new position as Stan Watts' assistant. After Watts' retirement, Pete continued to work under Glen Tuckett.

Witbeck's responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and Western Athletic Conference.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, and they have three children, two daughters and a son.



## Dave Schulthess

### Sports Information Director

The University's first fulltime sports information director came aboard 33 years ago at a time when the size of the student body was relatively small and the school's athletic program very active but modest.

Born in Provo, Utah, he attended school in the Los Angeles suburb of Highland Park where he was drafted into Armed Service during World War II. Schulthess spent three years in the U.S. Army (Infantry), including two years overseas in the South Pacific.

On his return home, he enrolled at BYU, where he was editor of the campus newspaper, the *Daily Universe*. He graduated in 1950, later working for three newspapers in Salt Lake City; the

*Deseret News*, the *Salt Lake Telegram* and the *Salt Lake Tribune*.

In December of 1951 he accepted an appointment to the Public Relations staff at BYU with the specific assignment as sports publicist. Besides sports, his other duties included editing the school's *Alumnus* magazine.

An early member of CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America), Dave served as president of the national organization in 1980. He is also a member of CoSIDA's Hall of Fame.

Dave is married to the former Fran Wood of Salt Lake City, and they have four grown children, three grandchildren.

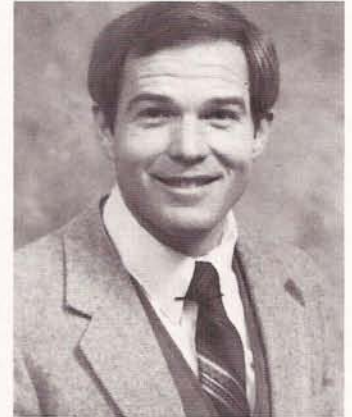

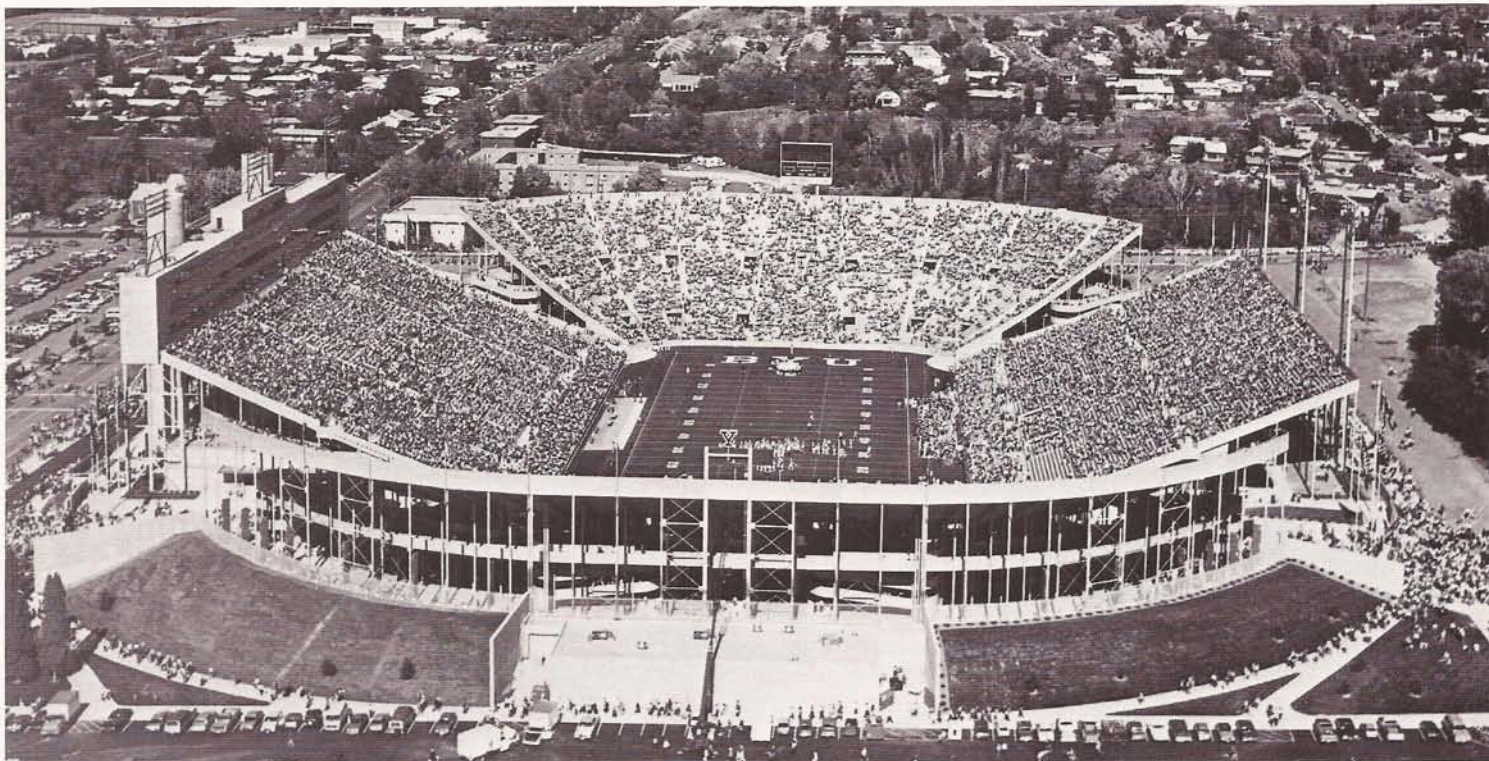

# Cougar Stadium



*Cougar Stadium, capacity 65,000, has been sold out every game since its expansion.*

When BYU expanded its football stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982, it marked the beginning of a new era for the Cougar football program.

In each of its first three seasons, the stadium was sold out for every home game. Last year 384,779 fans watched the Cougars play at home, an average of 64,130 per game. BYU has ranked near the top 20 in the country in football attendance since the expansion.

The fan support has helped BYU schedule home-and-home non-league games with teams like UCLA, Washington, Temple, Pittsburgh, Texas and others.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

Prior to expansion, the stadium seated 35,000 comfortably, but as many as 47,000 crammed into the facility to see a game. Expansion efforts included lowering the field eight feet, adding end zone seating, constructing the press box and adding box seating.

More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort. Each end zone contains about 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats about 15,000 people.

The playing field has a special drainage system capable of draining up to 13 inches of rainfall per hour.

Perhaps the most impressive feature of the stadium is the new press box, which runs the entire length of the west stands and sits over 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels. The third level is reserved for working media, and the fourth level is the TV deck. Three elevators transport guests to the press box.

The Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."

The single-game attendance record is 65,508, set last year against Utah State. Cougar Stadium is the 24th largest on-campus football facility in the country and is the fourth largest university-owned stadium in the West (Stanford, California and ASU).

# Western Athletic Conference

As the Western Athletic Conference enters its 23rd year, people around the country are beginning to sit up and take notice of the league that produced the 1984 national champions. Also, for the second year in a row, two WAC teams were victorious in bowl games. Brigham Young defeated Michigan in the Holiday Bowl and won the National Championship. Air Force defeated Virginia Tech in the Independence Bowl.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds its distinct personality to the overall flavor of the conference.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the rewards of WAC membership in the past has been the league's affiliation with the Holiday Bowl in San Diego. The conference's football champion received an automatic bid to the post-season game against an at-large team. This year, however, is an open bowl, and the WAC champion will not be required to play in the Holiday Bowl.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since formation of the league.

Fassel comes to Utah from the Portland Breakers of the USFL, where he served as offensive coordinator. He was an assistant coach at Utah in charge of quarterbacks and receivers in 1976. That year the team set a school record 2,603 yards passing. A total of 12 returning starters will form the nucleus of the Ute squad this year. 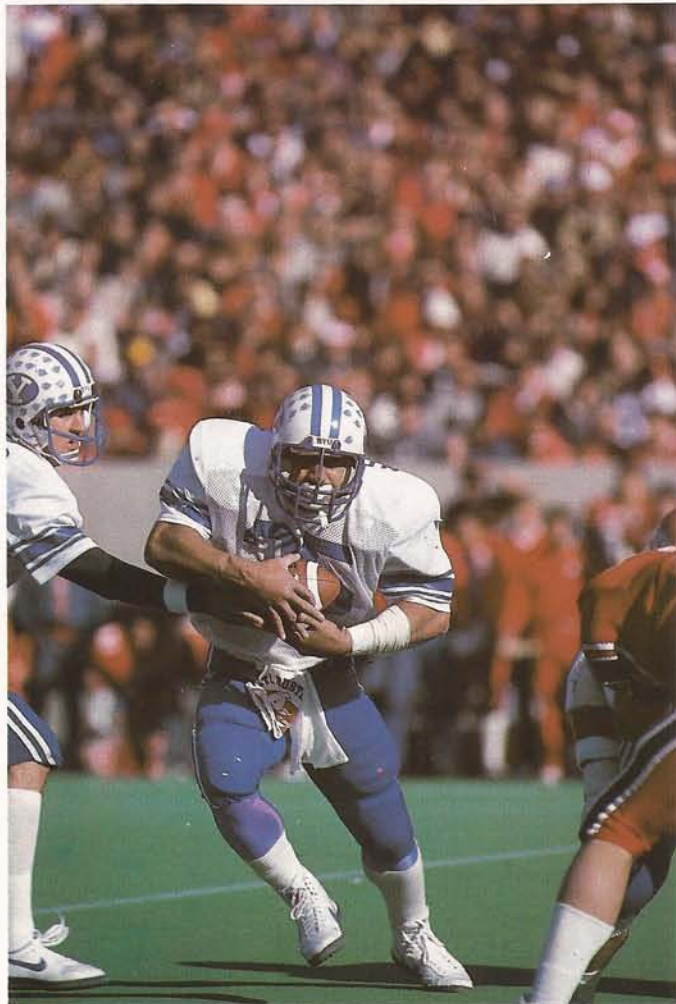

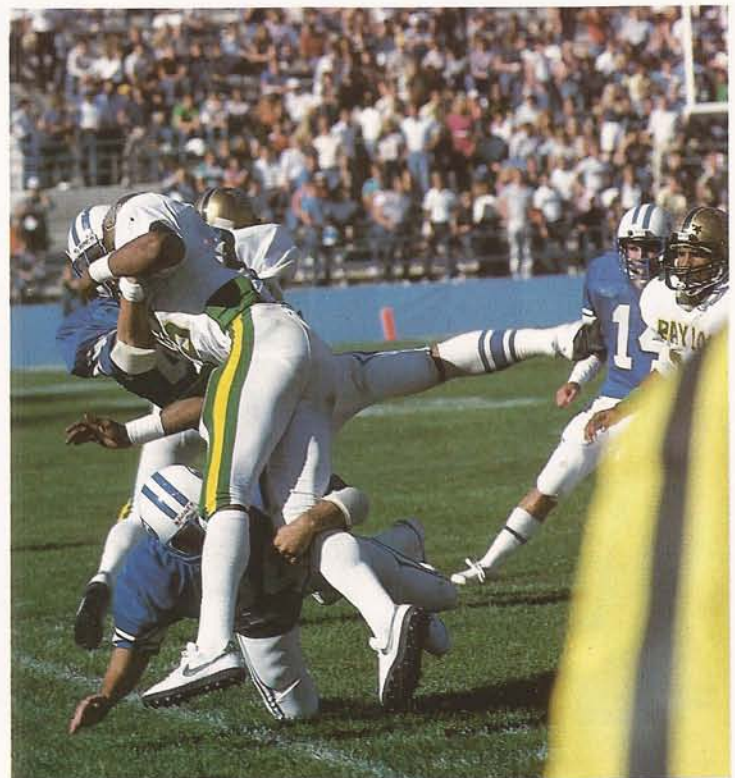

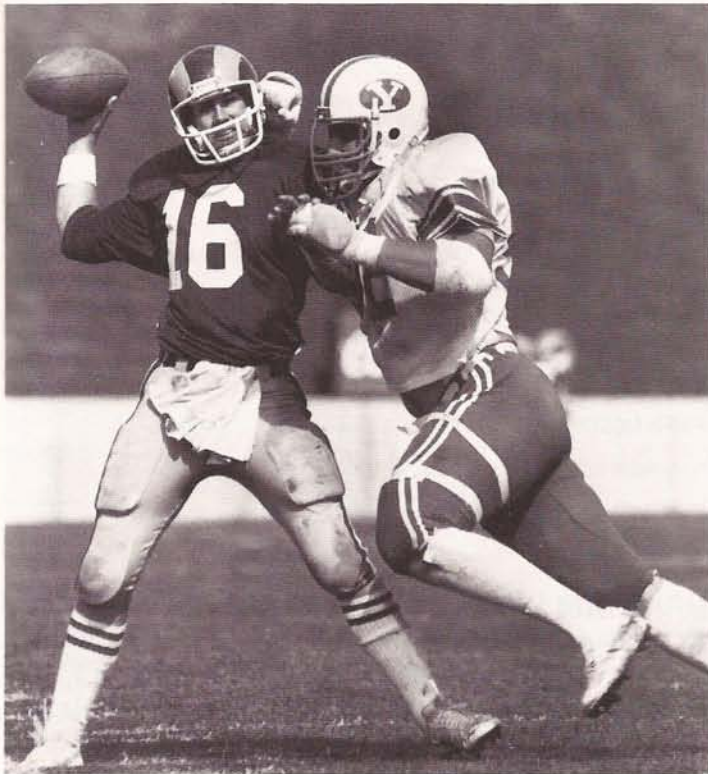

# Season Summary



Opposing quarterbacks usually got to know Jim Herrmann by the end of a game.

As recently as last summer, the 1984 season had all the markings of an "off year" for the Cougars, a time for recouping and reloading.

As it turned out, the Cougars packed more wins, more wallop and more upward mobility into one season than any club in the school's history. Not content to level off with another Western Athletic Conference championship the Cougars soared all the way to the National Championship with a victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII.

Coach LaVell Edwards turned his "lucky 13" season into an undefeated, untied campaign and was named NCAA Coach-of-the-Year by several organizations. Working on a string of 11 wins from last season, the Cougars extended the streak to 24.

Again, the Mountain Cats ended the year with the NCCA lead in two important statistical categories: passing (346.2 yards per game) and total offense (486.5 yards per game). The Cougar defense did its part to help the cause by ranking 10th nationally in scoring defense (13.8 points per game).

Individually, Robbie Bosco surpassed all expectations by leading the nation in total offense (327.7 yards per game) and finishing second in pass efficiency (151.8). He was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting and runnerup for the Davey O'Brien Award.

Safety Kyle Morrell, best remembered by BYU fans for his game-saving, goal-line tackle at Hawaii, earned first team All-America honors from the Associated Press.

The attention given the Cougars on their march to the National Championship was unprecedented for a BYU team. All across the nation, people wondered if the team from Provo, Utah, was for real. Columnists and TV commentators debated the No. 1 issue like never before. Even a major network conducted a telephone poll to see if BYU should be ranked No. 1.

But when all was said and done, the Cougars were the only undefeated, untied team in the country and were crowned National Champions by all the major polls.

Following is a game-by-game summary of the Cougars' dream season:

## BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY 20, PITTSBURGH 14

Sept. 1, 1984—afternoon game (73 degrees, overcast) in Pitt Stadium (40,263)

Among the significant plays for BYU against then third-ranked Pitt (AP Poll) was a successful goal-line stand in the second quarter which gave the Cougars the momentum and a 3-0 halftime lead thanks to Lee Johnson's 37-yard field goal. In the third quarter, BYU surrendered two interceptions which led to back-to-back Panther TD's including a 78-yard score by safety Bill Callahan. In his first starting nod, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco bounced back after teammate Mark Allen intercepted his second Pitt pass. Following a 12-yard TD run by BYU's Lakei Heimuli, Bosco connected to Adam Haysbert for a 50-yard strike with 1:30 remaining to take the lead. The ever-present Cougar defense then snuffed out Pitt's final drive when Jim Herrmann and Leon White dropped the reserve Panther QB on a fourth down at the BYU 30. Following this game, which was televised live on ESPN, BYU moved into the wire service rankings for the first time: 12th in UPI and 11th in AP, while Pitt fell to 17th and 20th, respectively. Six touchdown passes were thrown by Robbie Bosco to a trio of receivers, Glen Kozlowski, David Mills and Kelly Smith. Kicker Lee Johnson had a streak of 23 consecutive PATs broken by two blocked kicks and one miss. Reserve running back Robert Parker netted 131 yards rushing, mainly in the second half due to sweeps. In all, BYU completed passes to 12 different receivers and picked off four interceptions. QB Blaine Fowler played half of the fourth quarter. BYU ascended to its highest ranking ever following this game with a sixth-place polling by Associated Press (BYU was eighth in UPI). The Cougars assumed the nation's longest current winning streak with a string of 13 wins. BYU's record is now 2-0.

## Holiday Bowl VII



Kelly Smith and his teammates barely escaped from Michigan's grasp to win Holiday Bowl VII.

With a record crowd of 61,243 watching from the stands of Jack Murphy Stadium and a huge television audience tuning in at home, BYU and Michigan squared off in what turned out to be a typical, thrilling Holiday Bowl with BYU scoring in the closing minutes to preserve a 24-17 victory.

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension — national championship luster — thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. It was the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship. And the national media was there to tell the story to millions of Americans.

What they described was vintage Holiday Bowl. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up after a limping Bosco returned to the lineup with his knee heavily taped and engineered an 80-yard drive.

On the next series, BYU had a chance to blow the game open after stopping Michigan on its own five yard line. But instead of taking advantage of the Wolverine misfortune, Bosco fumbled the ball into the end zone and Michigan recovered.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, which culminated on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7.

BYU marched the length of the field in the final minute of the half but had to settle for a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson and a 10-7 lead as time ran out.

Play was ragged in the third quarter, with neither team scoring until Michigan scored on a 10-yard pass from Chris Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The PAT gave Michigan a 14-10 lead.

The fourth quarter started on a sour note for BYU, with Lakei Heimuli fumbling the ball on the Cougars' 11 yard line. A tough defensive stand by BYU stopped a touchdown, but Bob Bergeron gave Michigan a 17-10 lead with a 32-yard field goal with 14:14 left in the game.

Enter Bosco and Co.

The Cougar offense, stifled for the most part by its own turnovers, finally got untracked. An 80-yard drive was culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Kozlowski touchdown pass in which Kozlowski jumped high in the air at the back of the end zone to make the grab. Lee Johnson's PAT tied the score at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

After both teams traded possessions, BYU got the ball on its own 17 yard line with 4:36 to go in the game. Bosco scrambled for nine yards. Heimuli ran for another eight. Following a Kelly Smith run for one yard, Bosco hit Mark Bellini for 20 yards. A 15-yard facemask penalty against Michigan moved the ball to the Wolverine 30. Bosco then hit Heimuli for eight, Smith for five and Haysbert for six. An incomplete pass made it third and four from the Michigan 13 yard line with 1:30 to play. Bosco dropped back, stepped up under a heavy rush and rifled the ball to Smith in the end zone. The touchdown with 1:23 left gave BYU the lead, 24-17.

Michigan's attempt to provide a miracle of its own failed when Marv Allen picked off the second pass of the drive. For BYU it was another Holiday Bowl victory and its first-ever national championship.

For the game, BYU passed for 371 yards and rushed for another 112. The Cougar defense, meanwhile, held Michigan to 120 yards rushing and 80 yards passing.

## Holiday Bowl VI BYU 21, Missouri 17 December 23, 1983 San Diego, California

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

For most of the game the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars. BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards of offense and 10 points in the first half.

Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt. BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game. The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted Missouri's desperation pass. Young finished the game 24 of 36 passing for 314 yards and three interceptions. Casey Tiumalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries. Attendance: 51,480.

## Holiday Bowl V Ohio State 47, BYU 17 December 17, 1982 San Diego, California

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17, in a game that took the fun out of the usually raucous affair in San Diego. The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap . . . an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as Buckeye runners rolled up 329 yards en route to their seventh consecutive win. Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7. As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection, in the final stanza. Attendance: 52,533.

## Holiday Bowl IV BYU 38, Washington State 36 December 18, 1981 San Diego, California

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge. But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victims in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life. In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down. Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD.

## Holiday Bowl III BYU 46, Southern Methodist 45 December 19, 1980 San Diego, California

One pundit said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games — the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the



Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, the score was 45-25, SMU. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an onside kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three seconds left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark. Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season. The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line. Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, (for San Diego that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field

goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with a 9-3 record, BYU with a 9-4 mark.

Competing in their first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

# A Historical View

Before last season, there were always those who claimed BYU could never win a national championship in football. They cited drawbacks such as geographic location, lack of television exposure, weak schedules, lack of media coverage, etc.

Indeed, a national championship seemed out of the realm of possibility for the Provo, Utah, school. It was only 20 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program took a drastic turn for the better. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things began to happen. Since then, BYU has won 118 games and been to nine bowl games. Ten times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, the last nine in a row.

Things weren't always so rose in BYU's program, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally one of the nation's leaders in scoring and offense.

It was near the turn of the century when football was introduced at BYU, but a fatality near the turn of the century prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 58 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. **Virgil Carter** (1966), **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Gifford Nielsen** (1976), **Marc Wilson** (1979), **Jim McMahon** (1981), **Steve Young** (1983) and **Robbie Bosco** (1984) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young and Bosco were named All-American quarterbacks, and each seemed to erase marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs. **Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie** (1961-62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962. **"Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg** (1970-71), led the nation rushing his senior year and was second-team All-America. Fullback **John Ogden** (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC for three consecutive years. And Fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. **Gordon Gravelle** (1970), **Paul Howard** (1972), **Brad Oates** (1973-75), **Orrin Olsen** (1972-75), **Tom Bell** (1974-79), **Bart Oates** (1977-82) and **Trevor Matich** (1979-84) are just a few standouts.

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently **Clay Brown** (1978-80), **Gordon Hudson** (1979-83) and **David Mills** (1980-84).

Top defensive players include **Wayne Baker** (1972-74), **Paul Linford** (1972-74), **Mekeli Ieremia** (1975-77), **Glen Titensor** (1978-80), **Glen Redd** (1976-80), **Kyle Whittingham** (1979-81), **Todd Shell** (1980-83) and **Kyle Morrell** (1980-84).

At various times in the last 15 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. **Golden Richards** (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records.

Using this system, KBYU is accustomed to providing tailor-made television for as many as six different clients at one time.

### For Home Game Coverage

Requests for press box and photographers credentials should be made no later than a week prior to the game. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only. Requests should be directed to the SID office, 30 SFH, Brigham Young University, Provo, UT 84602.

### Stadium Location, Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1430 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking for the media will also be issued on request.

### Press Box

Two elevators (south tower) on the press box side (west) of the stadium are available for those with press credentials. The main press deck (radio, press, etc.) is on the third level, while television and game film crews will be located on level four.

### Press Box Services

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. In the past we have had sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own telephones. One or two telecopiers will also be available on a first-come-first-serve basis, and the press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics.

### Post-Game and Locker Room Interviews

With three minutes remaining on the game clock, press box representatives from both teams will take the media by elevator to the ground level for post-game interviews with the coaches and players. Locker room passes will be issued before leaving the press box, and there will be the usual mandatory 10-minute cooling off period before entering the dressing room. For those unable to get to the locker room, quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible.
