

1990 BYU Football Outlook

BYU, one of only three schools to win 100 games (102) in a decade, moves into the 1990's with one of college football's most explosive offenses. The Cougars, who produced the Outland Trophy winner two of the last four years, won 10 or more games six times in the past decade and garnered nine victories twice during a span which included an unprecedented national championship for a Rocky Mountain team.

The Cougars were second nationally in total offense (540.4 yards per game) and fourth in scoring (40.3) last season with Outland winner Mohammed Elewonibi and the offensive line providing protection for the country's leader in passing efficiency. Ty Detmer's 175.6 passing efficiency rating was the second highest ever in NCAA history.

However, the highly-poised junior doesn't even hold the school record in that category. The BYU and NCAA record of 176.9 was established in 1980 by Jim McMahon. Detmer did manage to break five other school and NCAA records previously held by McMahon.

Led by Detmer and All-America tight end Chris Smith, the Cougars are the defending Western Athletic Conference champion and could be nationally ranked.

They finished 18th in the UPI top 20 and were 22nd in the AP and USA Today/CNN polls. BYU also got back to the Holiday Bowl for the first time since 1984. During the regular season, Detmer broke 11 NCAA records and tied two others

in addition to throwing for 576 yards against Penn State--the most passing yardage ever in a bowl game.

During the 80's, BYU was first nationally in total offense four times, second twice and third once. Although 1986 brought the Outland Trophy to defensive tackle Jason Buck, it also snapped 10 straight years of WAC titles for the Cougars. Last year meant a return to the top rung of the ladder in addition to a 12th consecutive bowl appearance.

BYU will go into the 1990 season ranked in many preseason polls. Most of the offense and return teams are back along with the defensive secondary. The front seven on defense includes only two starters which makes those positions a concern going into the fall camp.

Some answers will come the first week in September. BYU has its earliest WAC game ever Sept. 1 at Texas-El Paso and opens at home Sept. 8 against defending national champion Miami. The schedule includes WAC rival San Diego State and Pac-10 opponents Washington State and Oregon in September.

There are two byes along with Colorado State and New Mexico in October and four of the final five games are on the road, including consecutive WAC battles at Air Force, Wyoming and Utah. The final home game is Thanksgiving weekend with Utah State and the regular season ends at Hawaii.

There are 46 lettermen back, including 14 starters. Among the 10 starters lost were linebacker Bob Davis, three-year-starter Fred Whittingham at fullback and Elewonibi. School record-holder Jason Chaffetz is gone as the placekicker but Earl Kauffman will be punting again and could handle both chores.


Here's a position-by-position look at the 1990 BYU Cougars:

Quarterbacks

Ty Detmer was ninth in the Heisman Trophy balloting last season as a sophomore and led the nation in passing efficiency (Houston's Andre Ware was fifth). He was second to Ware in total offense but broke NCAA records for yards per attempt and completion as well as for total offense per play. He was MVP of the Freedom Bowl as a freshman in 1988 and co-MVP of the Sea World Holiday Bowl despite playing on the losing team. Detmer should continue his onslaught of school, conference and NCAA records.

The backup situation became the hottest issue of spring practice when redshirt Chris Hoge and former junior varsity signal caller Brett Salisbury transferred to junior colleges. That left the 1987 JV quarterback **Brent Smith** trying to get back in shape in a hurry after an LDS mission.

Another name to consider is **Joe Evans**, a star at nearby Orem High and Snow College. He signed with Idaho State prior to an LDS mission but will transfer to BYU for fall practice. Two freshmen, **Ryan Hancock** and **Brock Spencer**, could move up on the depth chart as the season progresses.

Running Backs

Do-everything halfback **Matt Bellini** returns for his senior season only 38 receptions shy of Phil Odle's career record of 183 (1965-67). He was the leading scorer as a sophomore and second last year. Bellini carried the ball 98 times in 1988 and 90 times last season. He has 2,034 yards receiving (514 short of Odle).

When Bellini isn't in the game, look for senior **Stacey Corley,** who competed in the 1989 WAC track meet as a sprinter. Corley averaged 8.6 yards per carry and scored nine touchdowns, two against Air Force on kickoff returns. Although he caught only two passes, Corley established himself last year as a big-play man on the ground.

The most likely replacement for Whittingham is **Peter Tuipulotu**, the Tongan who showed flashes of brillance in a reserve role a year ago. He rushed 30 times for a 6.5 yard average. Another junior, **Scott Charlton**, saw limited action last year but played well during the spring.

Two other backs could emerge during August drills. Both performed well two years ago but missed last season with serious injuries. **Mike Salido**, a fullback, suffered a broken leg in the 1989 spring game and halfback **Eric Mortensen**, one of the leaders in kickoff returns before knee surgery near the end of the 1988 season, had surgery again after this year's spring practice. Salido averaged 5.5 yards in 1988 and Mortensen averaged 5.1 rushing and 19.5 per kickoff return last year.

Receivers

Chris Smith was nothing short of phenomenal last year with 60 catches for 1,090 yards and five touchdowns. Although he missed spring practice after elbow surgery, he is expected to be one of the country's top tight ends this season.

Smith worked hard on his blocking last year and his speed makes him a prime target for Detmer.

Junior Matt Zundel played with the first unit during the spring and performed well. He starts the season in the backup spot, along with Fotu Katoa, who was sidelined during the spring with an ankle injury.

The only graduate is Jeff Frandsen. Four talented players return who will see a lot of playing time. **Andy Boyce** started last year and was third in receiving despite alternating on almost every play. He had 39 catches for 712 yards. **Brent Nyberg** caught 18 passes for 315 yards.

The two frosh surprises of a year ago, **Micah Matsuzaki** and **Nati Valdez**, return and should see a lot of playing time. Both made the traveling squad with Matsuzaki catching nine passes for 174 yards and Valdez getting six catches for 76 yards.

Offensive Line

The bad news is that Elewonibi has gone to the Washington Redskins. The good news is that everyone else is back and there's more depth this time around.

Suddenly, the inexperienced group of a year ago has four seniors and three big junior college transfers. Leading the way is Media All-WAC center **Robert Stephens** (6-3, 265), starting for the third year. **Neal Fort** (6-6, 295) returns at one tackle and **Bryan May** (6-7, 290) moves to Elewonibi's position at right guard. **Jim Balmforth** (6-4, 270), who started the first eight games at left guard, returns to that spot. The right tackle is **Mike Keim** (6-8, 290), who started there the final month of the season.

Waiting in the wings are guards **Mike Jenkins** (6-8, 370) and **Garett Tujague** (6-4, 270), redshirt transfers from a year ago. Tujague also could be the deep snapper. **Scott Brumfield** (6-9, 325) was a junior college All-America (Dixie) but his spring play was limited by a broken hand.

Returned missionary **Garry Pay** (6-5, 255) or letterman **Kent Griffith** (6-4, 285) could be the backup center. Lettermen **Tom Ladd, Scott VanWoerkom** and **Jon Garber** also are available on the offensive line, as are redshirt **Kyle Harris** and returned missionary **John Ashman.**

Defensive Line

Rich Kaufusi (6-4, 265) returns at right tackle and has put on some weight since last season. He tied for third in hurries with six. **Pete Harston** (6-6, 265) looked good during the spring after being hampered by back problems all last year. He played at Colorado as a freshman and saw a lot of action in 1988 for BYU. Also seeing playing time at the spot held last year by Budd Orr will be two-year letterman **Eddie Green** (6-3, 290). Returned missionary **Brad Hunter** (6-5, 230) also could see action at tackle.

Moving in for Tim Adams at nose guard is senior Mark Smith (6-1, 260). Rick Wilson (6-2, 270), who redshirted last season, will share time with Smith. Returned missionary Scott Moberly (6-3, 240) and freshman Greg Pitts (6-4, 245) could see some playing time at tackle and nose guard Lenny Gomes (6-2, 265) also figures in the Cougars' plans.

Linebackers

Bob Davis, Chad Robinson and Duane Johnson are gone so, on paper, this is the Cougars' question-mark area. Newcomers should play a big role in determining the success of the BYU defense--although some familiar names will be starting.

The lone returnee is junior **Rocky Biegel** (6-2, 225), who should be one of the league's best. The other inside backer could be **Shad Hansen** (6-1, 240), who played a lot last season. **Dave Porter** (6-1, 255), who started twice when Biegel was hurt, also will be a factor.


On the outside will be three-year letterman Alema Fitisemanu (6-1, 240) and Walla Walla transfer Jared Leavitt (6-4, 240), who had an excellent spring. Two other junior college players, Scott Giles (6-4, 225, Snow) and Kevin Nicoll (6-4, 220, Mesa), might see a lot of action. Providing depth are Bill Bryant (6-2, 220), who had a good spring, and freshman Drayton Martin (6-3, 210), a defensive back in high school. He made great progress at the new position during spring practice.

Lettermen Randy Slayton and redshirt Mike Hoggan are back as is Steve Holmes, who shows potential but has been hampered by back troubles.

Secondary

Brian Mitchell, an All-American sprinter on the track team, leads a defensive backfield unit anxious to prove itself. Also a punt returner, he had four interceptions as a reserve two years ago and five in the first half of last season. On the other corner will be kickoff return man **Tony Crutchfield**, who spelled Eric Bergeson a year ago.

Strong safety **Norm Dixon** returns with a year's experience under his belt. The weak safety could be **Josh Arnold**, replacing Troy Fuller. Arnold hits hard and played well last year in late-game situations. Pushing for playing time will be **Derwin Gray**, who showed great promise as a freshman.

Lettermen Ervin Lee and Dave Kinard are the secondunit corners while letterman David Henderson will play behind Dixon. Others who might see playing time are juniors Tau Harrington and Kapi Sikahema along with sophomores Kyle Roberts and Chris Connors. Roberts played well before a church mission and Connors is trying to bounce back from a broken leg suffered early last season.

Kicking Game

Earl Kauffman begins his third year as the kickoff man, his second as the punter and also could do the placekicking. He kicked five field goals and six extra points as a freshman. Along with Kauffman are punter **Rob Stark** and placekicker **Keith Lever**, who both played on the junior varsity last year. Kauffman was third in the WAC and 15th nationally in punting with a 42-yard average.

With **Tony Crutchfield** and **Stacey Corley**, the Cougars were eighth in the country in kickoff returns--only three-tenths of a yard out of fourth. They return along with **Eric Mortensen** and **Derwin Gray**, so Cougar fans will be excited on each kickoff but they hope there won't be too many opportunities. **Brian Mitchell** and Crutchfield did all the punt returns last year so that area looks good as well.



Honors' Candidates

Ty Detmer, Quarterback, 6-0, 175, Jr., San Antonio, Texas

Finished number one in the NCAA for pass efficiency at 175.6 and second to Andre Ware in total offense at 364.42...his 576 yards passing and 594 yards total offense in last year's Holiday Bowl against Penn State established new records for all-time bowl performances in the NCAA...was co-MVP of the Holiday Bowl and two years



ago was MVP of the Freedom Bowl against Colorado...last year he was 265 of 412 for 4,560 yards and 32 touchdowns in passing...was first team All-WAC by the coaches and writers...WAC offensive player of the week against UTEP, CNN player of the week against San Diego State and Chevrolet player of the game against the Air Force Academy...broke 11 NCAA records...a two-year letterman who redshirted as a freshman...selected BYU the summer before his senior year in high school on his first of five planned stops for a family vacation.

Chris Smith, Tight End, 6-4, 230, Sr., La Canada, California

First team All-America last season by *The Sporting News*, third team All-America by Associated Press, first team All-WAC by both the coaches and writers...touted by *Sports Illustrated* as one of the top returning players in the country...caught 60 passes for 1,090 yards and five touchdowns last season



after being a third string tight end the previous two years after transferring from Arizona...finished statistically in the nation's top 25 receivers...a three-year letterman.

Matt Bellini, Halfback 6-0, 205, Sr., San Leandro, California

Led BYU in scoring the last two seasons...last year he had 12 touch-downs, half of which came by passes...second team All-WAC by the coaches and writers last season...selected as Italian All-America by *Green, Red and White,* he is also half Irish...caught two TD pas-



ses and scored two TDs rushing at Navy...a three-year letterman.

Rocky Biegel, Linebacker, 6-2, 225, Jr., Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin

Started 10 of BYU's 13 games last season at inside linebacker...injured his knee mid-season against Wyoming...best game was 15 tackles against Air Force...a two-year letterman...was the Wisconsin Player of the Year as a prep.



Brian Mitchell, Defensive Back, 5-10, 165, Sr., Waco, Texas

First team All-WAC by the writers and second team by the coaches...was WAC Defensive Player of the Week against New Mexico for a game-breaking, school record 97-yard interception for a touchdown...led team with five interceptions...returned punts last season...a three-year letterman.



Tony Crutchfield, Defensive Back, 5-10, 190, Jr., Pasadena, California

Started the last five games of the season at left corner...best game was against Oregon where he had eight tackles and caused two fumbles...might be the Cougars' most physical hitter...has been a backup safety who also returned punts and kickoffs...a two-year letterman.



Neal Fort, Offensive Tackle, 6-6, 295, Sr., El Centro, California

The leading offensive lineman behind last year's Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi...second team All-WAC by the coaches...a two-year letterman...played part of his prep career in Georgia.






LaVell Edwards, Head Coach

165-56-1 19th Year (Utah State '52)

Best time to call Coach Edwards: 10 a.m.



When LaVell Edwards was named BYU's head football coach in 1972, Cougar football fortunes skyrocketed.

Prior to '72, BYU had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 165 games, 12 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976–85) and played in 14 bowl games (including 12 in a row). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

Five times in his 18 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83 and '84), the 59-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak

District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). The post-season games that LaVell has coached in include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

In 1988, LaVell completed a term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He was the 64th president in the association's history.

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way, picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C.

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a churchman, husband, father, grandfather, author, teacher and doctor.

LaVell's winning percentage (.745) ranks third among the nation's active college coaches. And under Edwards, BYU has averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School and attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.


At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954–61 before joining the BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach, succeeding Tommy Hudspeth.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. His wife, Pat, writes columns for the *Provo Daily Herald*. They have three married children: Ann Edwards Cannon, a writer, Salt Lake City; John, a doctor, New York City; and Jim, a lawyer, Las Vegas.

LaVell's Career Highlights

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars is named head coach in January . . . had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . halfback Pete VanValkenburg wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards-per-game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively . . . quarter-back **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in NCAA passing and No. 3 in total offense . . . teammate **Jay Miller** leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards) . . . Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . Gary Sheide is runnerup in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.

1975 A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games . . . Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-frombehind victory . . . Giff sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . becomes starter . . . Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . Giff finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense . . . Cougars finish first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 passing and 31.9 scoring) . . . Nielsen voted first team All-American . . . Cougars tie for WAC championship and play Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571) . . . he set or tied 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing . . . his pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever . . . he also led the nation in total offense (385.6) . . . after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight . . . Cougars win WAC again and play SMU in Holiday Bowl III.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars . . . have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas . . . BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year . . . McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) . . . LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coaches in the Japan Bowl . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top ten in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game . . . lose home opener to Air Force (39-38) but come back to win seventh straight WAC title and play Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V . . . Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-America . . . BYU finishes third nationally in total offense . . . Steve Young is named WAC offensive player-of-the-year.

1983 Another 11-win season . . . Cougars are ranked No. 7 in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team . . . quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-Americans . . . after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games . . . once again, BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring . . . Assistant Coaches

Claude Bassett (BYU '78)

Inside Linebackers



Claude Bassett enters his eighth year with the Cougar football program. He was named an assistant coach in 1985 after working as a graduate assistant with the Cougars for two years.

Prior to coming to BYU for graduate work, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Ariz. There he worked under Coach Jess Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and coached at Pleasant Grove High

(1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah County.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School in Redding, Calif., where he participated in football and baseball. He also attended Shasta Junior College in Redding.

Before transferring to BYU (where he graduated in 1978), he served a two-year mission for the LDS Church in Rome, Italy. He is married to the former Leslie Johnson of Orem, and they have four children: Jed, Annette, Camille and Rebecca.

Robbie Bosco (BYU '86) Offensive Assistant



Robbie Bosco begins his first year as a full-time assistant after being a graduate assistant last season. The Roseville, Calif., native is best known for leading BYU to the national championship in 1984, when he guided the Cougars to a 13-0 record and led the nation in passing.

In 1985, he finished second in NCAA total offense and was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting for the second straight year. He set 10

NCAA record at BYU, was a second team All-America, and finished third in voting for the Davey O'Brien Trophy.

Drafted by the Green Bay Packers, Bosco had his pro career cut short by an arm injury. He graduated with a degree in communications and is now working on a master's degree in physical education. He is married to Karen Holt and they have two children, Amber and Karissa.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) Quarterbacks, Receivers



Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for the past 13 seasons. He coaches the receivers and the quarterbacks and is the coach who calls BYU's plays. For several years, Chow coordinated BYU's recruiting efforts.

Prior to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, he coached for two years as a graduate assistant. Chow graduated from Punahou High, Honolulu, Hawaii, ('64) being named "Athlete of the Year."

He then attended the University

of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard. He graduated in 1968.

A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after one year when Chow injured his knee. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children: Carter, Maile, Cameron and Chandler.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) Asst. Head Coach, Def. Coord.

After an outstanding college career at BYU and a seven-



year stint in professional football, Dick Felt returned to his alma mater in 1967 to become a coach. This is his 23rd year on the staff. Felt's current direct responsibilities continue to be with the defensive backs.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He

won all-conference honors as a senior. After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960). He was a first lieutenant.

Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. Felt left pro ball in 1966 and came to BYU in 1967.

Dick is married to Dayleen LaVon Hobson of Boise, Idaho, and they have four children: Karen, Curtis, Kristie and Nancy.

Roger French (Minnesota '58) Offensive Coord., Off. Line

Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past 10 years, during which time the Cougars have tradition-

ally led the nation in passing and total offense.

French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen.

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included coaching the offensive line, tight ends and receivers. He was also defensive coordinator and line coach at Wisconsin and Memphis State.

Since French has come to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984)

and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing and total offense three of the last six years.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played some pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns.

He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

Roger and his wife, Dody, have two daughters, Kathy and Gail.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) Recruiting Coord., Kicking

Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity in 1986 after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was head coach of the Aggies from 1983-85.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies as a fullback, offensive lineman and kicker. He set a school record with nine PATs in a game vs. New Mexico State.



After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger and Bruce Snyder.

Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice

Championship and played in the Rice Bowl.

He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach, replacing Bruce Snyder.

Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children: Brian, Jake and Nicole.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) Defensive Line, Special Teams

Tom Ramage has, perhaps, the most varied football

coaching background in the state of Utah. He joined the BYU staff 17 years ago after coaching in the high school, junior college and major college ranks.

Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in defense against the rush.

Ramage came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Con-

ference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years. He graduated in 1957.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as assistant and obtained his M.S. degree (1962). For the next four years, Tom was line coach of the Aggies under Tony Knap.

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona have six children: John, an assistant coach at Utah State; Lorrie; Rochelle; Sherrie; Dedra; and Cory.



Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs



For more than a decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after a successful coaching job at Snow College (Ephraim, Utah).

A Salt Lake native, Lance was all-state at Granite High School. He played offensive tackle and guard at BYU before leaving on an LDS mission to Seattle, Wash., after his sophomore year.

When he returned, he earned All-

WAC honors at offensive tackle and played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. After graduating in 1970, he played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Lance and his wife, Leslie, have five children: Brittany, Lance Jr., Dallas, Matthew and Houston.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Outside Linebackers



Ken Schmidt's name is well recognized in Utah coaching circles. He joined the Cougars in 1982 after a successful high school and junior college coaching career.

A Murray, Utah, native, Schmidt enrolled in the University of Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under Coach Ray Nagel. He was graduated in 1964 and obtained his M.S. degree from Utah in 1969. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68). Later, he was named

head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state championships during his stay (1968-79).

In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.). The Vikings won the conference champion-ship both his years there and posted a 17-3 record. In 1981, Ricks defeated Arizona Western in the Valley of the Sun Bowl.



President Rex E. Lee

Rex E. Lee, former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989.

Lee, 55, was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981. From 1985–1989 he was the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

He was U.S. Solicitor General was from 1981 to 1985. Previously, from 1975–76, he had served as Assistant U.S. Attorney

General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division. Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the

1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school

at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of its Washington, D.C., office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law Institute. In late April, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court. He is one of only a handful of living lawyers to have reached that milestone.

The university president has served his church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board (1958–1960), and has been a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, California, Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Shumway is the father that Lee has known all his life. Lee married Janet Griffin July 7, 1959, in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple. They have seven children and two grandchildren.

Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 23, compared to the national average of 19. BYU graduated four Rhodes Scholars between 1975 and 1978, a record matched only by Harvard, Yale and Princeton. In 1976, it was one of two schools to place three Danforth fellows in a single year.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School, founded just 15 years ago, is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.


The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

BYU is committed to the idea of educating the whole person and has recently devised a new, rigorous general education program in keeping with that commitment. The GE curriculum consists of requirements in basic reading, writing, mathematics, arts, sciences and religion.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization.

In addition to the Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Israel, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Jerusalem.



Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.



Dean, Athletic Director

Clayne R. Jensen, College Dean

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 17th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen was a Professor and Associate Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for nine years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities, and he is presently under commission to author a book on "Sports and Physical Education in the World Today."

He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical educa-



tion, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 29 countries.

Dean Jensen served as U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece. He has served on numerous committees of the NCAA, and is a former member of the governing council of that organization. Also, he is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, Noteworthy Americans and 2000 Outstanding Americans, 1985.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

A native of Murray, Utah, Glen Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. Following prep school, he went on to play professional baseball for nine seasons and

was selected to the Western International League all-star team in 1954. During this time he received his B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

Tuckett launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City where he was head football and baseball coach as well as assisting in basketball for six years. He also managed the Calgary Dodgers in the Western Canada League in 1957.



In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach and head baseball coach. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978.

Besides winning baseball games, Tuckett had a successful approach to classroom teaching. He was nominated for the "Professor of the Year" award.

A popular speaker, Tuckett also worked as a color commentator for football and basketball with KSL radio for 10 years.

As head baseball coach for 17 years, his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Two of his teams played in the College World Series.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tournament's 27-year history.

In July 1976, Tuckett retired as the ninth winningest baseball coach in the NCAA to become BYU's athletic director. During his tenure at BYU, the Cougars have claimed 11 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

He was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979.

He has served on the NCAA Television Committee, the College Football Association Executive Committee and the College Football Association Television Committee. Tuckett serves on on the NCAA Post Season Football Committee and is on the NCAA Baseball Tournament Committee.

Tuckett has received several honors for the hours of service he has put in to BYU, the community and the nation. In 1983 he was given the Dale Rex Award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1985 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame for his successful coaching career at BYU. He has also been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame.

He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



Athletic Director's Staff

Pete Witbeck, Associate AD



Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for the past 41 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954)

degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. His duties included coordinating the offense and heading up scouting and recruiting efforts. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. He held that position until becoming assistant athletic director in 1972.

Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic Conference

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, an elementary school principal in Highland. They have three two daughters and a married son.

Val Hale, Asst. AD-Public Relations



Val Hale enters his second year as assistant to the athletic director for public and media relations. He has the responsibility of overseeing the Sports Information operation and coordinating public relations and promotional efforts.

Hale has been assistant director of BYU Development, where he supervised and managed fund-raising efforts in several clubs and academic areas. He was promotions and publications coordinator for the Athletic Department from 1982 through 1987.

Athletic Department



BYU fans will enjoy their ninth season at Cougar Stadium this fall.

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

BYU has finished in the top-20 in overall national rankings for 12 of the last 19 years. The Cougars have finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-5 five times. In the Western Athletic Conference, the Cougars have won the all-sports supremacy title 13 straight years.

The University's athletic program boasts 12 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, indoor and outdoor track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, swimming, wrestling, and new last year as an NCAA sport, volleyball.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981. BYU's baseball team won 19 WAC division titles in 20 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 nationally in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Prac-

tices are held on the field north of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations. The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse.

The fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, track and golf teams for indoor practice.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the second largest oncampus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. The NCAA track and field championships were held there in 1989. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.



All-Sports Winner

For the 13th year in a row BYU's men's athletic teams combined to win the Western Athletic Conference All-Sports Trophy during 1989–90.

BYU recorded first place finishes in six of the 11 sports contested—cross country, football, indoor track, basketball, golf and outdoor track. Other finishes for BYU were second places by gymnastics, wrestling and baseball, third place by swimming and sixth place by tennis.

This is the 24th time in 28 years that BYU has won the mythical award. The WAC gives two trophies in basketball and baseball because of post-season tournaments. BYU tied with CSU for the regular season basketball trophy, but UTEP won the tournament. In baseball, San Diego State finished first in the tournament and first by half a game over BYU in the regular season.

BYU was ranked 18th in the final UPI football poll and 22nd by Associated Press. Other national finishes include a pair of sixth place by the indoor and outdoor men's track teams and an 11th place finish by the cross country team.

Individually, 12 Cougars received All-America citations: Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, linebacker Bob Davis and tight end Chris Smith; Per Karlsson and Leif Lundhal, who finished one-two in the indoor 35-pound weight; Frank Fredericks, who finished third in the indoor 200 meters, second in the outdoor 200 meters, third in the 100 meters and ran the anchor leg on the 4x100 meter relay team which finished seventh; Eric Akogyiram, who finished sixth in the

Cougar Stadium

1976

When BYU expanded its football stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982, it marked the beginning of a new era for the Cougar football program.

In each of its first eight seasons the stadium has been sold out with season tickets. Last year 392,252 fans watched the Cougars play at home, an average of 65,375 per game. BYU has ranked near the top 20 in the country in football attendance every year since the expansion. Arizona State is the only Western school that draws larger crowds than the Cougars.

The fan support has helped BYU schedule home-andhome non-league games with teams like Miami, UCLA, Texas, Penn State, Alabama, and Notre Dame.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

Prior to 1982, the stadium seated 35,000 comfortably, but as many as 47,000 crammed into the facility to see a game. Expansion efforts included lowering the field eight feet, adding end zone seating, constructing the press box and adding box seating in the West stands.

More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort. Each end zone contains about 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats about 15,000 people.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing two inches of rainfall per hour.

Perhaps the most impressive feature of the stadium is the press box, which runs the entire length of the west stands and rises over 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels. The third level is reserved for working media, and the fourth level is the TV deck. Three elevators transport guests to the press box.

In 1982 and 1988, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."



Strength and Conditioning Center



BYU's strength and conditioning center is one of the best in the country.

BYU's conditioning facility ranks among the best in the country.

With nearly 10,000 square feet, the state-of-the-art center features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophonic sound system with 40 speakers

In short, it's an addition which looks good, sounds good and provides plenty of room for intercollegiate athletes to work out.

Patterned after the best features of weight rooms at other major football powers, the BYU facility is both functional and attractive. Its biggest advantages over previous conditioning areas for BYU athletes are that variety and ample space are provided.

Athletes no longer have to wait around for a certain piece of equipment. They can get more done in much less time than before and do not have to plan their weight training in early morning or late evening to get it all in.

That is especially helpful for athletes of other sports who have had a struggle finding equipment available during football season.


Another plus for the athletes is the motivational factor of getting caught up in conditioning fever by seeing so many others working out at the same time. Cougar athletes who tried the new facility shortly after it opened during the summer raved about how much more fun it was to work on strength and mobility in large, rather than small, groups.

Athletes also have been quick to point out the recruiting benefits of the new facility. They insist the BYU conditioning setup is far better than any they have encountered during visits to other universities.


Even coaches of sports where athletes traditionally don't look first at weight rooms feel the new facility will be of benefit. For one thing, it shows BYU is serious about conditioning and, once an athlete is here, he or she will improve by being more involved in weight training.







Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference, headquartered in Denver, had three bowl teams in 1989 for the third consecutive year and led the nation in scoring with a 61.9 pointsper-game average.

It had five of the top 19 scoring teams in the country, six of the top 14 teams in total offense, five of the top 18 in passing offense and three of the top 17 in rushing offense.

The WAC also had the national leader in passing efficiency, and the league has finished either first or second nationally in passing offense in 15 of the last 17 years.

The WAC had three national Coaches of the Year during the 80's, 21 bowl teams, five Heisman finishers in the top six, and the Outland Trophy winner three of the past four years.

Founded July 1, 1962, its charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and UTEP were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

The Arizona schools left for the Pac-10 in July 1978, but San Diego State was added to make it a seven-team league. Hawaii joined in 1979 as did Air Force in 1980.

The league is the most diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-plus feet of Laramie and Colorado Springs to sea level in the mid-Pacific.

Dr. Joe Kearney has been the WAC Commissioner since 1980. The associate commissioner is Jeff Hurd, with Mark Hollis and Dee Ann Menzies as assistant commissioners. Mary Hunt is executive assistant. The supervisor of football officials is John Adams; Guy Gibbs is supervisor of basketball officials.



In only 25 years, BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations. Its membership of over 3,700 also makes the Cougar Club one of the nation's largest booster clubs and nearly twice as large as any other booster organization in the Western Athletic Conference.

"Most of our members are avid sports fans and die-hard Cougar supporters," explains Dale R. McCann, Cougar Club executive director. "However, all our members agree that affecting the lives of young male and female athletes in a positive way is our first priority."

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and the "Varsity Preview" basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at the annual Awards Banquet and through the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

With Jay Monsen doing the play-by-play, the Channel 11 broadcasts offer the insightful analysis that viewers have come to expect.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the Western U.S.

Blue and White Network broadcasts are produced for television by KBYU-TV's national production crews. KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by ESPN, TBS Sports, Prime Ticket, the Utah Jazz Network, USA Network, SportsChannel, ABC, KHJ (LA Lakers), TSI Sports, KSL-TV, KHNL Sports and many others.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot, remote production truck, designed by experienced profes-

David Lee enters his second season after a disastrous 2-10 in his first season as one of the nation's youngest (36) Division 1-A head coaches.

The Miners lost their last five games and were outscored 119-17 in the last three. They came up with only 23 quarter-back sacks while allowing 61 (and 363 yards in losses).

Even without much time, Howard Gasser completed 53 percent of his passes for nearly 2,600 yards. His primary target will be Reggie Barrett, who caught 58 passes for 1,042 yards and 10 touchdowns. He also returns punts and kickoffs. Another receiver/return man who was one of the few pleasant surprises was 5-7 Ricki Lopez (32 catches).

Wide receiver Ansel Littlejohn and tight end Marline Mc-Bride, both junior college transfers, could add spark.

Scooter Menifee returns at running back and center Andy Stanton and Jeff Grimes are back along with center Rob Sesich. Help could come from juco recruit Mike Jepsen and Nathan Hollins, acquired when Lamar dropped football.

On defense, the standout is strong safety Emilio Pittman. Cornerback O.T. Thomas also returns as do linemen Dennis Austin, Falaniko lakopo and Lorenzo Constantini. Keith Powe, from Lamar, played well against UTEP last season.

The Miners must find replacements for linebackers Ken Sale and Doug Morgan. They also need more consistency

from punter Lance Brownlee and kicker Dominick Cefalone.

Series Notes

BYU holds a four-game winning streak after last year's 49-24 victory.

The BYU-UTEP series started in 1946 and BYU holds an 21-6-1 advantage in the matchup.

Miner victories came in 1948, 1949, 1967, 1968, 1970 and 1985. The two teams tied in 1964.





Outlook

There ought to be a law that the defending national championship team can't have eight offensive starters and three defensive backs returning.

Last year, Miami finished with wins over Notre Dame and Alabama to win the national title for the third time in seven years. It was the opening season for Dennis Erickson, who had successful stints at Idaho, Wyoming and Washington State.

On offense, the Hurricanes lose two guards and the flanker. That leaves a talented group plus kicker Carlos Huerta, who hit all 91 extra points and 44 of 50 field goals.

Miami is undefeated in the eight games quarterback Craig Erickson has started (he missed three games last year with a broken knuckle). He had 24 touchdown passes last season. With 25 he would become Miami's leader in career TD passes.

Tackle Mike Sullivan and receiver Wesley Carroll are all-everything candidates, as are defensive tackle Russell Maryland and linebacker Maurice Crum.

Miami's second wave of honors' candidates includes tight end Rob Chudzinski, fullbacks Leonard Conley and Steve McGuire, safety Charles Pharms, center Shane Curry, receiver Randal Hill, offensive tackle Leon Searcy, center Darren Handy and defensive end Shane Curry.

Among those lost on the list of abundant talent are strong safety Hurlie Brown and cornerback Roland Smith. The only


weakness might be a lack of humility-can you blame them?

The only transfer is punter Paul Snyder, from Saddleback JC in Mission Viejo, Calif.

Series Notes

This will be the first time the Cougars have played a defending national champion or a team ranked number one.

Miami won the only previous game, 41-17, at the end of the 1988 regular season in the Orange Bowl. BYU had



a chance to take the lead, only to have a field goal attempt blocked and a pass intercepted in the end zone.

Miami then regained the momentum and reeled off 27 unanswered points for a 34-3 halftime lead. The Cougars, playing without several injured regulars, outscored the Hurricanes in the second half but it was too late.

Earlier that day, Miami quarterback Steve Walsh had finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting.

The offensive line and defensive secondary are back along with quarterback Brad Gossen and the nation's top collegiate placekicker, Jason Hansen.

Coach Price figures he's in better shape than a year ago when he was assembling a staff and getting to know personnel. But he did lose the school's top rusher ever, Steve Broussard, along with receiving standout Tim Stallworth and defensive line star Tony Savage.

Even with Gossen hurt (broken thumb) for five games, Washington State won six of its first seven games before losing the last four. Reserve Aaron Garcia played well but a one-point loss to USC and a two-pointer to Arizona dropped the Cougars into a seventh-place tie in the Pac-10 and kept them from a bowl game.

There are a lot of good receivers and the front seven on defense should be more mobile but less physical. Pass catchers back are Calvin Griggs and C.J. Davis. Another factor could be world-class sprinter Augustin Olobia, a Nigerian who transferred from Texas Southern.

Gossen was almost flawless against BYU and Garcia led the league in passing efficiency. Hanson was a consensus All-America pick as a sophomore. Rich Swinton, sensational as a sophomore but hampered by a hamstring injury last year, is the running back.

Up front, the honors' candidates are tackle Bob Garman and guard Steve Cromer. On defense watch for Alvin Dunn (moved from free safety to strong safety), Chris Moton

(moved from strong safety to rover) and cornerback Ron Ricard.

Series Notes

Last year, former Weber State Coach Mike Price made the most of a crack at BYU--bouncing back from a 21-17 halftime deficit for a 46-41 win in BYU's home opener.

WSU actually led, 46-28, with four minutes remaining when Ty Detmer led BYU to two quick touchdowns. BYU recovered on onside kick after the first



Outlook

The Aztecs, in their first season under Al Luginbill, rebounded from two losses and a tie in their first three games to go 6-5-1. The 4-3 WAC record tied for fifth but SDSU could move up behind quarterback Dan McGwire.

The 6-8 transfer from lowa was fifth in the nation in total offense last season (285.3 yards per game) and his 3,651 passing yards was the second best in SDSU history.

His chief target, now that Monty Gilbreath and Robert Claiborne are gone, will be Jimmy Raye, who had 45 catches for 745 yards. Part-time starter Ray Rowe is back at tight end. Curtis Butts returns at running back and there are three offensive line starters, including center Nick Subis.

It was defense where Coach Luginbill coached as an assistant at Wyoming and Arizona State. That is where SDSU must improve to contend again for the WAC title it won in 1986.

Safety John Wesselman is gone but eight starters return, including cornerback Clark Moses and 6-5, 280-pound tackle Pio Sagapolutele. Linebacker Sai Niu is the only starter returning at that position now that Tracey Mao has moved to the defensive line.

The Aztecs must replace punter Joe Santos and get consistency in place kicking for a non-league schedule which includes Oregon, UCLA and Miami. SDSU doesn't have Colorado State on the schedule, leaving the Aztecs with one less game than five other WAC teams.

Others with only seven games are CSU. Air Force and New Mexico.

Series Notes

Last year's 48-27 BYU win clinched the Cougars' first WAC title since 1985 (first outright since the national championship in 1984).

The Cougars rebounded from an early 14-7 deficit to take a 35-14 halftime lead.

Ty Detmer's 327 yards passing, including a 67-yard touchdown to Jeff Frandsen, gave him the second-best NCAA passing efficiency ever (175.6) and the third most yards for a season (4,560).

Stacey Corley rushed for 121 yards on seven carries on a night when Aztec quarterback Dan McGwire missed most of the first half with back pain.

San Diego won the first game of the series in 1947 and took two of the first three. But BYU won nine in a row between 1976 and 1985.

Another name to keep in mind is split end Joe Reitzug. He made one of his three starts against BYU and had seven catches for 136 yards.

It's hard to imagine a game any more exciting than last year's 45-41 BYU victory in Provo. The Cougars trailed, 33-14, midway through the third quarter before a 60-yard



Outlook

Don't look now but the Rams could be tough to deal with in 1990. Of the 43 lettermen, 31 are two or three-year letter winners. Seventeen starters are back from a team which came within three points at Tennessee and scored 168 points in its final four games.

Things are so good, the Rams brought in only two junior college transfers--both tight ends. Punter Tim Luke led the conference and kicker Mike Brown hit all 11 field goal attempts from inside 40 yards.

Admittedly, Coach Earle Bruce inherited a number of starters a year ago but going from 1-10 to 5-5-1 was the second-best turnaround in the country.

And the record could be even better this season--even though the Rams play last year's top three WAC teams, plus Arizona State and Arkansas, on the road.

If CSU gets off to a good start, look out. The offensive team, which rushed for the second highest single season rushing total in school history, is back except for tight end Grega Scott and receiver Sean Willis.

Leading the group are John Laurita at guard, Tony Alford at halfback and Todd Yert at fullback. Alford had 310 yards rushing against Utah. Quarterback Mike Giminez returns, as does Kevin Verdugo, the early-season starter sidelined with a shoulder injury.

On defense, CSU lost two linebackers and a defensive

back. Leading the way are nose tackle Eric Schaller and cornerback Selwin Jones, who has led the team in interceptions for two years.

Series Notes

The Rams' 24-20 come-from-behind victory over BYU in 1986 deadlocked the series but three straight Cougar wins have put BYU back on top at 26-23-3.

Last year, Chris Smith caught nine passes for 149 yards and two touch-

downs and Jason Chaffetz kicked four field goals in a 45-16

BYU led, 19-0, midway through the second guarter but the lead had been cut to 25-16 midway through the third guarter before the Cougars took control again.

Actually, the Cougars have dominated in recent years. In LaVell Edwards' 18 seasons as head coach, the Cougars own a 14-3-1 record against the Rams.

The 1986 BYU loss to CSU was the first in a decade. The teams have met 21 times since CSU joined the WAC in 1967. BYU owns a 16-4-1 lead during that time.

Outlook

There are a lot of lettermen (50) and a lot of starters (14) for a program which has produced only four wins in the last three years. But one of them was a 45-22 upset over nationally ranked Fresno State to end last season.

Has former BYU assistant Mike Sheppard got the program turned around? Will the Lobos be improved even without Terance Mathis? Will seven new assistants mean some adjustment time or can New Mexico win some close ones (it lost five games by a total of 18 points)?

Quarterback Jeremy Leach finished sixth in the nation in total offense and receiver Eric Morgan was the team's bestkept secret with 56 catches for 763 yards. Kurt Jensen earned All-WAC honors after being switched from guard to

Three other starters, plus tight end Jerome Williams, return as does 1988's top rusher, Andre Wooten. He missed last season for academic reasons.

First-team All-WAC end John Bell returns on defense along with all four linebackers. Nate Morris, who led the team in tackles last year after transferring from UCLA, is an honors' candidate. Defensive backs Donald Levingston and Jon Thompson return and there is more depth than last year.

Series Notes

This will be the 40th meeting between the two teams, and BYU holds a large lead in the rivalry.

Last year, BYU trailed, 3-0, at halftime but rebounded for a 24-3 win in the season opener.


A 97-yard interception return by Brian Mitchell gave the Cougars some breathing room.

In 1964, New Mexico ruined BYU's inaugural appearance in Cougar Stadium, winning 26-14.

A year later, BYU clinched its first-

Fisher DeBerry enters his seventh season, the second longest tenure in the conference.

Dee Dowis had the Falcons among the top three teams in rushing yardage nationally during his three years as a starter.

Air Force might turn to speedy Ron Gray, who played quarterback as a freshman but was a running back last year.

The Falcons lost halfback Greg Johnson but second team All-WAC fullback (fifth in rushing) Rodney Lewis is back. He rushed for 1.063 yards. Halfback Chris Howard returns as does center Paul Walski.

But Air Force, whose 9.9 yards per attempt passing was second only to BYU's 10.9, must replace wide receiver Steve Senn and tight end Trent Van Hulzen.

Place kicker Joe Wood, who missed only two of 50 extra points, is back and might be called on as the punter.

The defense is led by All-WAC cornerback Eric Faison and linebackers Brian Hill and J.T. Tokish. Hill led the team in tackles the last two years. Tackle Lane Beene is the only down lineman back and three starters must emerge in the secondary, which was vulnerable to passing attacks.

But the Falcons have rebuilt well enough before to have been to six bowl games in the last decade.

Series Notes



The series began in 1956, skipped to 1974 and stopped from 1976 through 1980. BYU has won all six games played at the Academy.


In 1985, the Falcons were 10-0 and ranked fourth in the nation when they lost to the Cougars, 27-20, in Provo.





Outlook

After two straight league championships, the Cowboys fell to 5-6 last year due to inconsistency on the offensive line and inexperience at quarterback.

This season, Wyoming should be improved. Four of the five offensive line starters are back and quarterback Tom



Once again, the early-season schedule is good with three of the first four and six of the first eight at home. Then again. three of the last four are away so Wyoming won't know about its title chances until November, when it plays Colorado State (road), BYU and Hawaii (away).

Mitch Donahue, the WAC Defensive Player of the Year in 1989, needs only four sacks to become Wyoming's all-time leader. Two other defensive linemen return along with a pair of linebackers and a couple of backs. One of them is Paul Wallace, who redshirted and then started as a freshman last

Tyrone Fittje anchors the offensive line but the Cowboys lost backs Dabby Dawson and DeWaine Jones. So the running game is a question mark. Junior Sean Fleming returns for his third year as the placekicker and his second as the punter.

With seven starters back on each side of the ball, the Cowboys should be more consistent and look for improve-

ment offensively. Two years ago they averaged 478 yards in total offense (sixth nationally) but last season fell to 364.8 (eighth in the WAC).

Series Notes

Last year, Fred Whittingham caught six passes for 127 yards as BYU won, 36-20, to break a two-game losing streak to the Pokes.

Cougar fans will have a hard time forgetting the 29-27 Homecoming loss to the Cowboys three years ago or the

1988 season opening 24-14 defeat in Laramie.

Another bitter loss was in 1976, when Wyoming Coach Fred Akers devised a quarterback draw play which kept the Cougars off balance and resulted in a 34-29 victory, sending the Cowboys to the Fiesta Bowl.

Prior to 1987, BYU had won five in a row and nine of the last 10. A key game in BYU national championship year (1984) was coming from behind to beat Wyoming, 41-38.



Long-time assistant (including two stints at Utah) Ron McBride takes over a program plagued by weak defense and offensive line problems. And quarterback Scott Mitchell decided to leave school after his junior year.

Coach McBride probably won't go with the wide-open offense of recent years and obviously will be trying to shore up the defense.

There are some pluses. Eight starters return on defense and the entire secondary is back.

Free safety Sean Knox has started three seasons and cornerback LaVon Edwards has started the last two years. Also back are the Bonafacio twins (Bob and Frank), tackles James McKenna and Bob Reynolds, linebacker Howard Reeve and safety Derrick Odum.

In addition, the Utes brought in 13 junior college players, most of them on defense. Another newcomer is quarterback Jason Woods (Lamar), who will battle with Richmond and juco All-America Frank Dolce (El Camino).

Also back on offense are running backs Clifton Smith (681 yards, 44 catches for 494 yards) and Mike Abrams (535 yards). Abrams had an excellent freshman year, as did wide receiver Bryan Rowley, who played quarterback at Orem High. He caught 33 passes for 530 yards. Mike Anglesey, a slot back under Jim Fassel's system, also is back.

The big question mark is the offensive line. Center John

Anderson and tackle Mike Murry return and McKenna might be switched from defense. Double-duty kicker Wayne Lammle returns to give Coach McBride once less worry.

Series Notes

Despite a 70-31 BYU victory last season, Utah holds a big lead (40-21-3) in the series.

Last year, Jason Chaffetz set a school record with 10 consecutive PATs

in a game (he holds the school record at 37). Ty Detmer led the Cougars to touchdowns on their first seven possessions and was replaced in the closing minutes of the first half with

After an eighth straight touchdown drive to open the third quarter, Detmer left for good. Mike Richmond, starting at quarterback due to Scott Mitchell's knee injury, ralled the Utes to 21 fourth-quarter points.

The win gave BYU its highest ranking of the season (16th in UPI).





Due, in part to a murderous schedule, Coach Shelton has more losses than wins at Utah State. But he's been in the first division of the Big West all four years.

This should be his best team with an experienced defense (the Aggies lost only five defensive lettermen). Heading the group are linebacker Del Lyles and cornerback Greg Haynes.

There are veterans as linebackers and defensive backs while Rob Van dePol has played well on the line. Punter Rusty Carlsen is back but kicker Russ Moody is not.

On offense, there's a talented group of running backs, including California JC Player of the Year, Roger Grant. The Aggies also brought in JC backs Floyd Foreman and Sean Hampton along with offensive linemen Kip Loy and Charlie Smith.

USU must replace receiver Pat Newman but an even bigger concern is finding a quarterback.

Kirk Johnson was injured part of last year and Kevin White dropped out of football after a spring practice injury. Transfer (Missouri) Brad Fitzmaurice couldn't practice in the spring because of an injury.

The good news on offense is that tight end Ryan Duve, reciver Rod Moore and guards Ed Silva and Greg O'Banion return.

Defensively, the Aggies should be quicker and bettermaybe good enough to make the Aggies a contender in the Big West. Outside the league, Nebraska, USC and Illinois are gone from the schedules of recent years but the Aggies visit Missouri and Oregon.

And there are five home games--one more than a year ago. The opener with Utah should let USU know know how well the new offensive pieces fit in.

Series Notes

Last year, BYU seemed to totally dominate but led only 21-10 at halftime. The Cougars then took the second half kickoff and ran off six-and-a-half minutes to pad the margin.

Outlook

After back-to-back nine-win seasons and the school's first bowl game ever, enthusiasm is high in the Islands. The biggest question mark is whether the Rainbows can win on the road. They have to play four conference games away.

Last year Hawaii finished fifth in the nation in scoring offense, sixth in rushing defense, 10th in rushing offense and

13th in total offense. Jeff Sydner was fourth in punt returns, Walter Briggs fifth in interceptions, Jamal Farmer seventh in scoring and Jason Elam 15th in field goals.

And you could win a trivia contest knowing Garrett Gabriel was second to Ty Detmer in passing efficiency among league quarterbacks. Of that group all except Briggs are back.

The only other big loss was receiver Chris Roscoe but Larry Khan-Smith, a second-team All-America two years ago, is expected to play after missing most of last season with an ankle problem.

Farmer set an NCAA freshman record with 18 touchdowns and the Rainbows also have Travis Sims and Dane McArthur returning. Elam has missed only one extra point in two years and last season hit 20 straight field goals.

Linebackers Mark Odom and Joaquin Barnett lead the defense. A third linebacker, David Maeva, was all-league two years ago. The key on defense is how well the 'Bows replace tackles Dana Directo and Augie Apelu.

Likewise, an offensive question revolves around filling holes left by guard Larry Jones and tackle Leo Goeas.


Series Notes

The frustration of 10 straight losses to BYU was vented

last year when the Rainbows romped to a 56-14 victory. The party was over early as Hawaii scored three quick touchdown with a no-huddle offense and was in front, 35-7, at halftime.

BYU had been 9-0 since Hawaii joined the WAC and the Cougars had claimed eight in a row at Honolulu, where the Rainbows last won in 1974.

The Rainbows took four of the first five games but since then BYU had won, but not by much, in recent years.



In the 1988 game, BYU escaped with a 24-23 victory as the Rainbows were stopped on a two-point conversion.

The Cougars' offense sputtered two years ago but the defense had a tremendous second half to preserve a 16-14 victory. In 1986, the BYU offense didn't complete a pass in the second half but the defense shut down Hawaii with a fourth-quarter goal-line stand for a 10-3 win.

Cougar Bowl History

Sea World Holiday Bowl, 1989

Penn State 50, BYU 39 December 29

San Diego



Two very unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from toppling the East's best team, Lambert Trophy-winner Penn State. Two stunning defensive plays offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer--the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his heroics, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing Most Valuable Player honors despite being on the losing team. The other co-MVP was the Nittany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards and picked up some key first downs for Joe Paterno's team.

BYU, which trailed, 41-26, with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with two and a half minutes left to play. But a two-point conversion pass, which would have tied the game, was intercepted by linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards to give Penn State two points.

The Cougars tried an on-side kick but Penn State fell on the ball at the BYU 46-yard line. Two tackles behind the line of scrimmage by Bob Davis forced the Lions to punt and the Cougars got the ball at their own 12 with two minutes remaining.

Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then what most BYU fans thought was a sack by safety Gary Brown became a score for Penn State. He stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards with 45 seconds left.

The Cougars moved from their own 32 to the Penn State 40 in the final 30 seconds before time ran out.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and USA Today/CNN. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the other two polls.

Freedom Bowl V, 1988

A tough second-half defense, Ty Detmer comming off the bench to earn Most Valuable Player honors and two fourth-

quarter field goals by Jason Chaffetz enabled the Cougars to upset Colorado.

Cool weather (42 degrees) by southern California standards didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns.

But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second. Scott Peterson made a key pass interception to set up the game-winning field goal.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) although a big show failed to materialize in a matchup of the nation's top two punters. Colorado's Keith English averaged only 39 yards on two punts and BYU's Pat Thompson had four punts for a 33.5 average.

A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score and then Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter and the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

The Cougars then moved from their own four to the Colorado 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

A key performer for BYU was halfback Matt Bellini, who carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards. A sad note for the Buffs came early in 1989 when quarterback Sal Aunese was hopisitalized with stomach cancer. He died the the 1989 season, when Colorado went unbeaten during the regular season and went into the Orange Bowl ranked numer-one in the country.

All American Bowl, 1987
Virginia 22, BYU 16

The 11th annual All American Bowl was cool (temperature in the high 40s after two days of rain) and the Cougars never got warmed up despite taking a 3-0 lead.

BYU's 10th consecutive bowl appearance saw several records set but the Cougars were edged, 22-16, in their initial game with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only

had to punt once--all bowl records--but the Cougars fell just short several times.

Covey, who had led the Cougars to five straight wins as a starter, thought he had a first down at the BYU 46 with four minutes remaining but the ball was marked just short on a fourth-down play.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver for the season, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed 51 and 47-yarders in the second quarter as the Cavaliers took a 14-3 halftime lead.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped at the last second. Kyle Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of third quarter.

Virginia, behind quarterback Scott Secules, the game MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead, 22-9, with 11 minutes left. BYU then went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

The Cougars were hurt by the absence of running back/returner Mike O'Brien and linebacker Thor Salanoa, who both suffered knee injuries in the Australia game. Salanoa's loss was magnified when linebacker Richard Hobbs was sidelined in the first half of the bowl game.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date (his wedding anniversary), Virginia Coach George Welsh had led his Navy team to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Freedom Bowl III, 1986 UCLA 31, BYU 10 December 30 Anaheim

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green, UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came as a result of John Lee's four field goals.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10. He finished with 266 yards on carries.

The first half was marked by defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and

after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass, Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell.

From there on out, it was UCLA most of the way. Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run. David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to BYU standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) also hindered the Cougar effort. On the evening, Jensen completed 18 passes in 31 attempts for 124 yards with three interceptions, and Young was on target seven times in 12 attempts for 97 yards.

Florida Citrus Bowl, 1985

Ohio State 10, BYU 7 December 28 Orlando



In what promised to be a offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. The rest of the contest was marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard scoring strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a short pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebackers and instead found Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic who snatched the errant pass and took it in for an OSU touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

On the day, Bosco was 26 for 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story. Ohio State was the benefactor of six

Holiday Bowl VII, 1984 BYU 24, Michigan 17 December 21 San Diego



Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard scoring drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7. The tie was short-lived, however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-vard field goal to make it 17-10 with 14:14 to play in the game. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a sevenyard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17 and clinched a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.



Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game.

The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell then intercepted a Missouri desperation pass. Casey Tiumalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries.

Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7. As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45

accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection, in the final stanza.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge.

But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life.

In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down.

Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD.

Holiday Bowl III, 1980 BYU 46, Southern Methodist 45 December 19



San Diego

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three second left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final two minutes and 33 seconds.

Holiday Bowl II, 1979 Indiana 38, BYU 37 December 21

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark.

Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line.

Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

Holiday Bowl, 1978 Navy 21 BYU 16 December 22

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young. Despite chilly temperatures, (for San Diego that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with a 9-3 record. BYU with a 9-4 mark.

Tangerine Bowl, 1976 Oklahoma State 49, BYU 21 December 18 Orlando



Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 21-28. The crowd of 37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them.

Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

Oklahoma State had tied for the Big Eight title but missed out on the Orange Bowl due to the league's tie-breaking formula.

Fiesta Bowl, 1974 Oklahoma State 16, BYU 6 December 28

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

Sea World Holiday Bowl

The Western Athletic Conference champion plays in the Sea World Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium in San Diego, Calif.

This year's 13th annual Holiday Bowl takes place at 5 p.m. (PST) on a Saturday (Dec. 29) for the first time ever. It is played at the 60,409-seat stadium which hosted the 1988 Super Bowl.

The bowl has been in existence since 1978, when Navy edged BYU, 23-16, in what was then called San Diego Stadium. The name was changed in 1981 to honor the San Diego Union sports editor who had led the campaign to have the stadium constructed in 1967. Murphy died in 1980.

In 1985, the stadium was expanded from 52,675 for football and a \$6.5 million, 300,000 pound Diamond Vision scoreboard was added with a 66 by 100-foot scoreboard and screen for replays.

WAC teams have played in the Holiday Bowl every year except 1985, when Arizona State and Arkansas played. Since then, the bowl has resumed its tie-in with the WAC and the current contract runs through the 1992 season.

The WAC is 4-7 over the past decade with close games generally prevailing. Last year, Penn State scored in the final minutes on a 102-yard interception return and a 53-yard fumble recovery to beat BYU, 50-39.


In 1987 and 1988, Iowa defeated San Diego State (39-38) and Wyoming (20-19).

The second year (1979), BYU lost to Indiana, 38-37. In the Miracle Bowl of 1980, BYU scored three touchdowns in the final two minutes and 33 seconds to edge Southern Methodist, 46-45.

In 1981, BYU beat Washington State, 38-36, but lost to Ohio State, 47-17, the next year in the bowl's only rout. In 1983, it was BYU 21, Missouri 17, and the Cougars defeated Michigan, 24-17, to win the national championship in 1984.

Even the non-WAC game was a squeaker with Arkansas nipping Arizona State, 18-17.


A major change in the Holiday Bowl came in 1988, when Sea World became the sponsor and the bowl name was changed to Sea World Holiday Bowl.

Historical View

Being recognized as one of the country's top programs-not to mention winning a national championship--seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 25 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 165 games and been to 14 bowl games. Twelve times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-85. And the Cougars won the national championship in 1984.

Things weren't always so rosy in BYU's program, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally one of the nation's leaders in scoring and offense.

Football was introduced at BYU near the beginning of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 65 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. Virgil Carter (1966), Gary Sheide (1974), Gifford Nielsen (1976), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Robbie Bosco (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young and Bosco were All-America quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs. **Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie** (1961-62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962. **"Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg** (1970-71), led the nation rushing his senior year and was second-team All-America.

Fullback **John Ogden** (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC for three consecutive years. And fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. **Lakei Heimuli** (1983-86) is the school's career rushing leader.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area.

Mohammed Elewonibi (1988-89) won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates (1977-82) and Trevor Matich (1979-84).

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83) David Mills (1980-84) and Trevor Molini (1985-86).

Top defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Kyle Whittingham (1979-81), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84) and Jason Buck (1985-86). Buck, the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy, was only the third player in the western United States to win the award.

At various times in the last 20 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns and later earned All-Pro status with the Cardinals.





The long bomb was an effective weapon early in the game for WSU, which scored on 64 and 66-yard passes. Although he completed only 14 passes, guarterback Brad Gossen also had two other passes for 45 and 41 yards. Hanson's final field goal left BYU behind, 46-28, with four minutes remaining. November 11, 1989--day game (62 degrees, sunny with little wind) at Cougar Stadium, Provo (66,089-stadium record)

For the first time in six years, Coach LaVell Edwards decided to receive the ball instead of deferring. That decision paid off when reserve Stacey Corley, filling in for Tony Crutchfield (played defense but not on special teams due to a sore ankle), returned the opening kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown. After Air Force went in front, 17-7, Corley got BYU back in the game early in the second quarter (his third return) when he returned a second kickoff 85 yards for a TD, tving an NCAA record for most TDs scored off kickoffs in a game. It was a see-saw battle with Brent Musburger and Kenny Stabler calling the action for a national CBS audience (shared with Pitt-Miami). The 66,089 fans formed the largest crowd to watch a sporting event in Utah, but they helped BYU get several penalties because of excessive noise. Six times, Dee Dowis backed off the ball in the south end zone on drives in the second and fourth quarters, resulting in two BYU timeouts in the first half and then two penalties midway through the fourth quarter. BYU led, 38-20, early in the fourth quarter when the Falcons scored, recovered an onside kick and scored again to cut the margin to 38-35. On a play designed to get a first down, tight end Chris Smith broke several tackles and went 45 yards for a score to clinch the victory. Joining the representatives from the Holiday and Freedom Bowls was Dick Schultz, the executive director of the NCAA. For the first time in three years BYU is in sole possession of first place. The win made BYU only the third team in NCAA history to win 100 victories in a decade. The Cougars improved to 17th in the UPI poll. BYU's record is now 8-2 overall and 5-1 in the WAC.

BYU avenged a 57-28 loss to Utah last year. The Cougar passing combination of Ty Detmer-Chris Smith was hot, while the Utes struggled with starting quarterback Scott Mitchell sidelined because of a knee injury. By the time Mike Richmond got the Utes on the board late in the first half, it was 49-0 for the Cougars. During that span, the defense held the Utes at the one-yard line and Rich Kaufusi blocked a field goal attempt. However, Richmond did have a good second half against the Cougars' second defensive unit. Detmer was

replaced by Sean Covey before halftime and then again after the first drive of the third quarter. Detmer led BYU to touchdowns on all eight of his drives and had a passing efficiency of 278.5 in the game. Kicker Jason Chaffetz set a school record with 10 successful point-after-attempts and broke the school record for consecutive PATs with 36. BYU has a 9-2 overall record (6-1 in the WAC) and ranks 16th in UPI.

BYU 48, San Diego State 27

November 25, 1989--night game (62 degrees, cloudy and calm) at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium (26,868)

BYU rebounded from a 14-7 deficit to take a 35-14 halftime lead in winning the WAC outright for the first time since 1984 (1985 was a tie with Air Force). Ty Detmer threw for 327 yards to end the regular season with 4,560 yards--the second best ever in NCAA, WAC and school to Jim McMahon's 4,571 in 1980. His passing efficiency of 175.6 also is second best ever (to McMahon's 176.9). Jeff Frandsen caught a 67-yarder for BYU's first score and Jason Chaffetz kicked a school record 37th straight PAT. A sore knee caught up with him as he missed after the second TD and punter Earl Kauffman took over, going three for four. SDSU quarterback Dan McGwire left the game with a back injury after the first score and was out until just before halftime. Stacey Corley ran 49 yards to set up Cougars' second touchdown (also had a 57-yarder in the fourth quarter). Byron Beatty downed a punt

at the SDSU one-yard line and the field position led to the third BYU score. A key drive was BYU's 59-yard march in less than a minute to end the first half. After SDSU had scored 10 points in the third quarter, BYU regained momentum on a fumbled fair catch at the Aztecs' 19 and Detmer ran for his second of two touchdowns. The drive had been prolonged by a roughing-the-kicker penalty against SDSU. BYU is now 10-2, the most wins since going 11-3 in 1985. The Cougars rank 15th in UPI and 19th in AP.
