




BYU, which has won or tied 11 of the past 15 Western Athletic Conference championships, figures to be in the thick of things for the final season prior to expansion and division play.

But the Cougars will be doing it with some big names missing from a 10-win season. All-time leading rusher Jamal Willis won't be around. John Walsh, who threw for more yards in a game than any BYU player.

decided to forego his senior year.

Three offensive linemen--Evan Pilgrim, Tim Hanshaw and Eli Herring--were National Football League draft picks and a fourth, center Jim Edwards, was a three-year starter.

Two-year starters Bryce Doman and Tim Nowatzke are gone at wide receiver and powerful placekicker David Lauder was a senior.

On the defensive side, linemen Randy Brock and Greg Pitts were four-year starters. Another, Travis Hall, was drafted.

The linebackers return but three of the four defensive backs (five of the top eight) who started in the bowl victory over Oklahoma are gone.

Besides Walsh, the Cougars lost capable backups Steve Clements (CFL) and Tom Young (Europe).

Steve Sarkisian, who passed for 4,297 yards and 41 touchdowns at El Camino Junior College, will be BYU's first quarterback without any redshirt time or junior varsity experience since the Cougars committed to the passing game with Gary Sheide in 1973.

Coach LaVell, who has 207 career victories to enter his 24th season as part of an elite group, says, "We've been very, very satisfied with Steve. He's

going to do well for us."

Top names returning are running back Hema Heimuli, tight ends Chad Lewis and Itula Mili, receiver/return man Mike Johnston, offensive tackle James Johnson, punter Alan Boardman, defensive tackles Mike Ulufale and John Raass, linebackers Stan Raass and Shay Muirbrook, and cornerback Dermmell Reed.

Here's a look at the 1995 Cougars by positions:

Offense

Quarterbacks

The faces are new but no one's complaining. Steve Sarkisian was a big hit with players, coaches and fans in the spring. He was 11 for 17 for three touchdowns playing less than half the spring game. Brian Vye was 17 of 30 for two touchdowns. Back from a church mission is Paul Shoemaker, whose

high school and junior high teams didn't lose a game. "We're inexperienced," Edwards says, "but we have some good players."

Offensive Line

James Johnson is the lone starter back but three seniors who have been part of the program move up. Morris Unutoa, who was the deep snapper last year, takes over at center. Elias Faupula, who started early last season and William Knight, who played some at center last year, are the guards. Three-year letterman Matt Meservey will join Johnson at tackle.

Sophomores Jason Andersen and Matt Cox. and redshirt freshmen Eric Bateman and Curt Cannon will press for playing time as could three junior college transfers--Greg Hoagland, Charlie Jones and Larry Moore. Transfer Rob Rogers is a likely redshirt.

"We have the potential to be good but we have to keep working and stay healthy," says Edwards.

Receivers

The receiving corps is a typical BYU group--not much size or speed but a team effort will produce a lot of yards. With two wide receivers rotating on every play there might not be big numbers again but Mike

Johnston, also a punt returner, and Kaipo McGuire have seen a lot of action over the past couple of years. Lettermen Tyler Bolli and Jason Cooper, also a kickoff return man, are dependable. Transfer K.O. Kealaluhi could make an impact. The top returners from last year are tight ends Itula Mili (503 yards) and Chad Lewis (32 catches). They are so highly regarded that Mili will line up as a running back when he's not at tight end and Lewis will be a wideout at times. "We're about like we've been with wide receivers," says Coach Edwards. "The tight ends are big-time players."

Running Backs

The dominate player is Hema Heimuli, who rushed for 552 yards and caught 40 passes for 456 yards. He'll be joined by Mark Atuaia and, at times, Itula Mili. Tefua Bloomfield, who looked good before being injured midway through last season, is back after missing spring practice. T. D. Biegel had to forego his senior year due to neck surgery which will give Aaron Cupp and Dustin Johnson, who both ran well in the spring, a chance to battle for back-up positions. "We spent a lot of time in the spring on the running game and should be solid there, Edwards says. "Heimuli is versatile and has good speed."

Defense

Defensive Backs

The Cougars feel good about the safeties but there's only one cornerback, **Dermmell Reed**, who played last year. The other corner could be transfer **Tim McTyer** in a position where the losses were the heaviest. Transfer **James Dye**, who was penciled in as a wide receiver, probably will be moved to corner. He has played both positions. **Jamie Cook**, last year's nickel back, and returning starter **Jon Pollock**, give BYU a good duo at strong safety and redshirt freshman **Jason Walker** played will in the spring at weakside safety. **Phil Giordano**, **Eddie Sampson** and **Lane Hale**, who all played a lot at safety last year due to injuries, will be counted on again this season. "We had a lot of competition in the spring and we expect even more in the fall," Edwards says.

Defensive Line

The tackles, Mike Ulufale and John Raass, could be the best pair in the conference and the position will be strengthened in August with transfer Henry Bloomfield. A three-man rotation worked well for the Cougars a year ago. The ends are new but Matt Redden has seen reserve action the past two years. The other starter could be redshirt freshmen Ed Kehl or Daren Yancey. Ed Lamb, a former linebacker, and letterman Larry Harmer, also might join in the rotation. Incoming freshman Byron Frisch has the tools

to contribute soon. "Up front, we feel we'll be good," says Edwards.

Linebackers

This is the most experienced position on the team with second team All-WAC Shay Muirbrook (last year's top tackler) in the middle and honorable mention All-WAC Stan Raass on the outside. Also back on the outside are Dennis Simmons and Jim Freeland, who each started three games a year ago. Redshirt freshman Brad Martin could see action on the outside and will be the nickel back. Spencer Reid, a special teams' player last year, will back up Muirbrook. "We're stronger here than last season," Edwards says.

Summary


As usual, depth and experience are a concern at almost every position and the Cougars must stay healthy. The offense has the ingredients to be very good but could take a while to jell with a new line and new quarterback.

"Execution is a key," says assistant head coach Norm Chow. "We need to have everyone on the same page but that's a challenge with our offense each year."

The defense is not deep anywhere and several backs who played in the spring will not be back this

fall. Coordinator Ken Schmidt is always optimistic but even he will feel better if some of the newcomers are as productive as projected.

Alan Boardman should be one of the nation's top punters. Kicker Bill Hansen has been waiting his turn for the past couple of years. The top kick returners. Mike Johnston with punts and Jason Cooper with kickoffs. return and transfer James Dye was among the nation's leaders two years ago.

LaVell Edwards

207-76-3 (.729) 24th Season (Utah State '52)

Best Time to Call Coach Edwards: 10 a.m.

Since LaVell Edwards became BYU's head coach in 1972, the Cougars have won 207 games, 16 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976-85) and played in 19 bowl games (17 in a row). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence. Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history.

Six times in his 23 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83, '84 and '90), the 64-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach of the Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). The post-season games LaVell has coached include the East-West Shrine game (four times), Hula Bowl (three times), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

Edwards won the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C., after guiding the Cougars to the national championship in 1984.

In 1988, he completed a term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).


Edwards received the Dale Rex Memorial Award in 1974 as the Utahn who has contributed the most to amateur athletics in the state and he has been Utah's Sportsman of the Year. He was named to Utah State's All-Century Team in 1993.

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a husband, father, grandfather, church leader, author, teacher and doctor of education.

His 207 victories rank fourth among the nation's active college coaches. Under Edwards, BYU averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, he passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Edwards was born Oct. 11, 1930, in Provo. He was all-state at Lincoln High School in Orem in 1946 and 1947. He attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the team as a center

and



linebacker. He earned all-league honors as a center in 1950 and 1951.

At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey from Big Piney, Wyo. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952, and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

Edwards became head coach at Granite High in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining BYU staff in 1962. Ten years later, he was named Tommy Hudspeth's successor.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah ('60) and an Ed.D. from BYU ('78).

His wife, Patti, completed her degree at BYU in 1994 and has written sports columns for the *Provo Daily Herald*. They have three married children: Ann E. Cannon (Salt Lake City), a writer; John (Bountiful, Utah), a doctor; and Jim (Henderson, Nevada), a lawyer. There are 12 grandchildren.

Career Highlights

1976-Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place... Nielsen finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense...Cougars finish first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9)... Nielsen voted first team All-American...BYU ties for WAC title and plays Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977-Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over...by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage...Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense... Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)...BYU's 341.6 yards per game is third highest in history, and 41 TDs second...Cougars top the nation in "takeaways" with a total of 56 defensive takes (fumbles recovered or interceptions)...Cougars tie for first in WAC and make a post-season trip to play two Japanese all-star teams.

1978-Both Marc Wilson and sophomore Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share quarter-back duties... Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries... Cougars win the WAC, play their final regular-season game in Yokohama, Japan, against UNLV, and meet Navy in the first Holiday Bowl.

1979-With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt McMahon in favor of senior Wilson...Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins ...Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)...finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit...Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3)...Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)...BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season...LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award...Cougars win WAC again and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980-The school's first 12-win season...BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)...quarterback Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Eyre...McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)...sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever...also led the nation in total offense (385.6)...after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight ...Cougars win WAC and play SMU in Holiday Bowl III.

1981-Another 11-win season for the Cougars... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas...BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ...Cougars win WAC and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV...LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl...also coaches in the Japan Bowl...Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top 10 in the nation.

1982-BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game...loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and plays Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V...Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-America...BYU finishes third nationally in total offense...Steve Young is named WAC Offensive Player of the Year.

1983-Another 11-win season...Cougars are ranked seventh in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team...quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-America...after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games...BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring...Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game...BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI...Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone.

1984-Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season...win streak is extended to 24 games...quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8)...defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-America...team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)...defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense...another WAC championship and victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII...Edwards named NCAA Coach of the Year by most organizations.

1985-Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic...that game plus a bowl and playing at Hawaii allows BYU to become the only collegiate team to play 14 games in a season...defensive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-America and WAC Defensive Player of the Year...Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors...a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship...quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting...BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall...Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986-Edwards passes Frank Kush as the winningest coach in WAC football history...Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American...Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams...Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards...Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but post an 8-5 record and play in the Freedom Bowl.

1987-BYU defense leads the nation with 50 take-aways (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with Troy Long getting the most defensive points...after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games...young backfield shows promise of things to come in getting within a two-point conversion of another WAC title...Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer...Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)...Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense...Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regular-season game against Colorado State) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All American Bowl.

1988-Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race...punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting...behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 10th in total offense and 13th in scoring...BYU plays second-ranked Miami on even terms for three quarters...Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker...11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989-BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a threeyear absence...offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-America...Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-America teams ...Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America ...sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others...Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.


1990-Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy...finishes with 5,188 yards passing--the most everand increases his NCAA records to 47...Chris Smith also is consensus All-America and has more receptions yards (1,156) than any tight end in history...Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU...Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204...BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon...BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl game.

1991-Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Ty Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)...BYU ties seventhranked lowa, 14-14, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game...Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points...Peter Tuipulotu winds up with the all-time best career rushing average (5.5).

1992-Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense...23rd in rushing defense...among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah...Ryan Hancock finishes third in total offense and passing...BYU wins WAC title and goes to 15th straight bowl.

1993-BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State...Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October...BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season...team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency...freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown passes (29) and yardage (3,066)...BYU's NCAA record of 50 straight games with a touchdown pass ends at Colorado State but Cougars extend the nation's longest streak without being shut out to 236 consecutive games.

1994-It's an historic season with victories over Notre Dame and Oklahoma to finish 10th in the final CNN/USA Today poll...five players are drafted, the most ever... Cougars win their first bowl game since 1988...BYU dedicates Copper Bowl effort to graduate assistant John Farley who was sidelined in August with heart trouble and died in December...Cougars are third nationally in passing with John Walsh fifth in total offense...Jamal Willis becomes the all-time leading rusher and breaks the record for touchdown...David Lauder sets a career record for consecutive PATs with 53.



Assistant Coaches

Robbie Bosco (BYU '86) Quarterbacks, Receivers

Robbie Bosco, 32, is in his sixth year as a full-time assistant after being a graduate assistant in 1989.

The Roseville, Calif., native is best known for leading BYU to the national championship in 1984, when he guided the Cougars to a 13-0 record, led the nation in passing and was second in voting for the Davey O'Brien Award.



In 1985, he finished second in NCAA total offense and was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting for the second straight year. He set 10 NCAA records and was a second team All-America.

Drafted by the Green Bay Packers, Bosco had his pro career cut short by an arm injury. He graduated with a degree in communications and has a master's degree in physical education. He married Karen Holt and they have four children. He was inducted into BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame in June, 1995.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) Asst. Head Coach/QBs, Rec.

Norm Chow, the 1993 Athlon
National Assistant Coach of the Year,
has been an integral part of BYU's
successful offense for the past 17 seasons. He is the assistant head coach,
calls the plays and work with the quarterbacks and receivers.

Prior to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, he spent two years as a graduate assistant. Chow, 49, graduated from Punahou High ('64) in Honolulu, where he was "Athlete of the Year."

He attended the University of Utah (1968), where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard.

After a career in the Canadian Football League was cut short due to a knee injury, he was head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waialua High.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children.

Roger French (Minnesota '58) Off. Coordinator/Off. Line

During the past 14 years of Jim McMahon, Steve Young, Robbie Bosco, Ty Detmer and John Walsh, Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense as the offensive coordinator.

French, 61, joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America

offensive linemen, including 1989 Outland Trophy winner Moe Elewonibi.

Before coming to BYU, French coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included the offensive line and receivers.

Since French came to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set an NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing and total offense three times.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at Minnesota, graduating in 1958. He obtained a master's degree and played with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns.

He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-America linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

French and his wife, Dody, have two daughters.

Barry Lamb (Oregon '78) Safeties

Barry Lamb joined the BYU staff in 1994 and works with the safeties, nickel and dime positions.

He is in his 19th season in coaching and has coached all positions on defense plus the offensive line.

Lamb, 39, has been a defense coordinator twice and special teams coordinator once. He was the line-

backer coach at San Diego State in 1993 after being defensive coordinator for the Aztecs from 1989-92.



Lamb is a native of Santa Barbara, Calif., where he attended San Marcos High and Santa Barbara City College, earning junior college All-America and Academic All-America honors. He received his undergraduate degree at Oregon and master's in History at Arizona State, where he was elected Phi Kappa Phi.


Lamb coached previously at Oregon, Arizona State, UNLV and Idaho before going to SDSU.

Brian was born in Indianapolis and raised in Texas. He and his wife, Carri, have two daughters.


Chris Pella (Utah State '66) Recruiting, Kickers, TEs

Chris Pella, 52, joined the BYU staff in 1986 after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was the Aggies' head coach from 1983-85.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He went to Utah State as a

fullback, offensive lineman and kicker, booting a school-record nine PATs against New Mexico State.

After graduating in 1965, Pella spent 15 years as an assistant under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills,



He worked with every position on the team and was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl.

He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach. Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) Defensive Line, Special Teams

Tom Ramage, 59, joined the BYU staff 21 years ago after coaching high school, junior college and at a four-year school.

Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in rushing defense.

He came to BYU from Dixie
College in St. George, Utah, where he
was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He
was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State,
winning All-Skyline and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years. He
graduated in 1957.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he was an assistant four years and obtained his M.S. degree (1962).

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Ramage has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona, have six children.

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs

For more than a decade, Lance Reynolds, 41, has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after coaching at Snow College and Ricks College.

A Salt Lake native, Lance was allstate at Granite High. He played both offensive tackle and guard at BYU before serving an LDS mission to Seattle.





When he returned for his final two years, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. After graduating in 1970, he played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles. Lance and his wife. Leslie, have five children.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Def. Coordinator/Linebackers

Ken Schmidt, 53, took over the title of defensive coordinator in 1992 after coaching at BYU since 1982.

A native of Murray, Utah, Schmidt enrolled at Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under Coach Ray Nagel. He graduated in 1964 and obtained an M.S. degree in 1969.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68) and became head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state championships between 1968-79

In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Idaho). The Vikings won the conference championship two years, posting a

17-3 record. Ricks beat Arizona Western in 1981 at the Valley of the Sun Bowl.

KSL-TV

Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of Kansas State University, provides play-by-play for the fans. Blaine Fowler, a former BYU quarterback, provides the color commentary for telecasts.

The KSL sports director is Doug Miller.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar football. All home games are televised on a tape delay basis by Channel 11 with Jay Monsen.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western United States.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by the major cable networks.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals. It has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment.

KSL Radio

For more than 44 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The voice of the Cougars is play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 45 years' experience.

An Ogden High and Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcasted Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been calling BYU games for 30 years.

Marc Lyons, a BYU quarterback from 1967-69 and former coach at Olympus High School in Salt Lake City does the commentary. Assisting with the broadcasts will be Kent Rupe and Greg Wrubell.

KSL and the Cougars

The BYU Athletic Department and KSL Radio and Television have an agreement to market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events.

The agreement is designed to help advertisers reach BYU's large sports audience via electronic media and in-arena promotions.

Under the arrangement, sponsors may contact a single source, KSL/BYU Sports. Advertisers may purchase packages which include television and radio exposure, as well as in-arena exposure.

The agreement between KSL and BYU affects local broadcast rights only. BYU is a member of the Collegiate Football Association and honors all contractual obligations with that organization and the Western Athletic Conference.

Blue & White Network

BYU Football is syndicated by the Blue & White Network on station affiliates located in all 50 states and serving more than 53 million households.

The network, with veteran announcers Jay Monsen and Irv Brown, started syndication in 1989. For affiliate information in your area, call (801) 378-8455.

Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private churchsponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited internationally recognized university with a student body of 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. More than three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. BYU is consistently in the top 15 rankings for National Merit Scholars in attendance.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful land-scaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theaters, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcast Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new Museum of Art was recently completed.

In addition to the Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Jerusalem.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the

character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste--all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, many having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2-) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer being divided into spring and summer terms.

The university traces its roots to Utah's rich pioneer heritage. In establishing the original school on October 16, 1875--first known as Brigham Young Academy--on a little over one acre of land in what is today downtown Provo, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures.


No longer an obscure primary school in a little pioneer town, BYU is a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its namesake.

One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God.

Despite steady growth during those early years, the fledgling institution was nearly overcome by a series of setbacks, including persistent financial problems and the destruction by fire of the school's original building in 1884.

The campus eventually moved to a new location on Provo's University Avenue, where new facilities were completed in 1891.

As its high school and college curriculum improved and strengthened, the academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903.



In 1909, under the administration of George H. Brimhall, work began on the Maeser Memorial Building, the first of many structures on "Temple Hill," the university's present site.

Throughout the administrations of Franklin S. Harris and Howard H. McDonald, the university gradually increased its enrollment and facilities.


President Ernest L. Wilkinson, who began his tenure in 1951, oversaw the university's greatest era of physical growth, greatly increasing both the number of buildings and the size of the student body. He also started the school's doctoral program in 1957.

President Dallin H. Oaks' administration, begun in 1971, saw a deepening and refining of the scholastic mission of BYU, which by then had an enrollment of 26,000. His commitment to academics has continued during the administrations of Presidents Jeffrey R. Holland and Rex E. Lee as the university maintains its quest to provide excellent instruction in a gospel-centered atmosphere.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 92,000 in a valley of 300,000, and is situated 4,560 feet above sea level.

The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos north of the campus and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

Pres. Rex E. Lee



Rex E. Lee, who has been president of BYU since 1989, is in his final year directing the nation's largest private university.

Lee announced on June 16 that he had asked to be released by the end of the calendar year due to health considerations.

The former Solicitor General of the United States has been responsible for the large Provo campus as well as for BYU-Hawai'i in Laie on Oahu.

Lee has been chair of a special NCAA committee to review rules enforcement and the infractions process. Among those serving under him was Warren E. Burger, former Chief Justice.

Prior to being named President of BYU, Rex Lee was a partner in the law firm of Sidley & Austin in Washington, D.C. He joined the firm in 1985, after having served four years as Solicitor General.

President Lee was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU from 1971 through 1975. He served as Assistant Attorney General in the Civil Division of the Department of Justice until 1977.

He has been the holder of the George Sutherland Chair of Law at BYU since returning to the Law School in 1985.

He taught Constitutional Law and maintained a private appellate practice which has

been almost exclusively before the U.S. Supreme Court where he has argued 57 cases.

Lee, 60, is a 1960 graduate of BYU and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963.

He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court and then practiced law in Phoenix for eight years. He also holds five honorary Doctor of Law degrees.

President Lee served a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Mexico from 1955-58. He married Janet Griffin and they are the parents of seven children and have 10 grandchildren. Five of the children are married.

As a youth in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, Calif., on Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee.

His father died before President Lee was born and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway, now deceased, two years later.





R.J. Snow, Rondo Fehlberg

Dr. R.J. Snow moved to the position of Advancement Vice President last year after four years as Student Life Vice President. He continues to be responsible for intercollegiate athletics. Dr. Snow came to BYU in 1990 from Johannesburg, South Africa, where he was the mission president for three years.



Before his mission call, Dr.

Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984-87. He previously had been Vice President of University Relations and Student Affairs at the University of Utah for more than a decade.

He also served as Director of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Dr. Snow moved to Washington, D.C. at age 13 and attended junior high and high school there, returning to Utah to attend Dixie College, receiving an A.S. degree in 1957.

He served a mission in France and then enrolled at Utah, where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and master of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Dr. Snow continued his graduate education at Northwestern, where he completed master of arts (1965) and doctoral degrees (1967) in political science. He also completed post-doctoral work at Oregon and Harvard.

In 1967, Dr. Snow moved to Santa Barbara, Calif., where he was on the political science faculty at UCSB until 1973. During his tenure, he directed the University of California's Education Abroad Program for two years at the University of Bordeaux and the University of Pau in southwest France.

Dr. Snow has been very active in civic and community service, having been on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as a board member of the Utah Symphony, LDS Hospital and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service with more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations includes board membership of the Salt Lake and Provo United Way, Provo-Orem Chamber of Commerce and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association.

Dr. Snow currently serves as president of the BYU Ninth Stake. He married Marilyn Melville and they are the parents of four children and have one grandchild.

Former BYU All-American wrestler Rondo Fehlberg was introduced in May as the Cougars' new Director of Athletics, replacing retiring Clayne Jensen.

Fehlberg, 45, has spent 16 years as an attorney and executive in the oil business. For the past three years, he has been vice president of International New Ventures at Pennzoil with



responsibilities for development and maintenance of long-term business relationships in the international business community, especially the former Soviet Union.

A native of Worland, Wyo., Fehlberg received a Bachelor of Arts degree from BYU in 1976. He served an LDS mission in Germany (1974-75) before attending BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School, where he received a Juris Doctor degree in 1979.

While attending law school, he assisted in coaching the wrestling team. He was a three-time WAC champion and had a career record of 74-11-1, including 34 pins.

He compiled a 23-2 record as a senior at 150 pounds and placed fifth at the 1972 NCAA Championships. That earned him All-America status and won BYU's Competitor Award. In 1987, he was inducted into the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Three other brothers--Wayne, Reed and Paulalso wrestled for the Cougars. Reed was a 1994 inductee into BYU's Athletic Hall of Fame.

In 1979, Fehlberg joined the law firm of Davis, Graham & Stubbs in Denver. In 1982 he went to work for Standard Oil in Denver and later in Houston.

In 1988, he began working for British Petroleum Exploration in London, where he lived for three years.

Fehlberg married Mary Bloxham of Pinedale, Wyo., and they have five sons and a daughter.

"Rondo Fehlberg has a great vision for incorporating BYU athletics into the larger mission of the University and the Church," says Pres. Rex E. Lee. "Working together with the existing superb athletic department leadership, I am confident we will see a new and even higher level of excellence, not only in athletics, but also in the accomplishments of our athletes in their academic efforts and the development of their total character."

Athletic Personnel

Pete Witbeck, Associate AD

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU 46 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner.

He acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff.

Three years later, Witbeck began six years as the freshman

basketball coach. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing three times his last three years.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshman teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.



Athletic Department



BYU fans were among leaders in attendance again last season.

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

In 1994, the first annual Sears Director Cup, sponsored by USA Today and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, placed BYU's sports programs at 22nd in the nation.

During the last three decades, the Cougars have won 60 percent of the Western Athletic Conference championships.

During 1994-95, BYU won league titles in cross country, golf, indoor track and outdoor track. The wrestling team had the country's highest academic average and volleyball ranked fifth nationally. Gymnast Darren Elg was second at the NCAA all-around.

Women's titles were won in volleyball (ranked eighth), cross country, swimming, indoor track, tennis and outdoor track. Gymnastics was 10th in the NCAA.

The University's athletic program for men boasts 12 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, indoor and outdoor track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, swimming, wrestling and volleyball. Soccer is being added to the women's program this year to bring its total to 10 sports.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships.

Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981.


BYU's baseball team has won 21 WAC division titles in 22 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium.

Practices are held on the field north of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse.

The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations.

The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse, which contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts and an artificial turf practice area.



Among track events are high school state meets and BYU Invitational.

The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, track and golf teams.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, one of the largest on-campus basketball arenas in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.


BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. The NCAA Championships were held there in 1982 and 1989.

All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated electronic scoreboard, new for the 1995 WAC Championships, entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers can provide for as many as 4,000 people.

Under construction prior to football season is a \$3.5 million addition to the Smith Fieldhouse for expanded locker rooms and equipment rooms as well as for greatly expanded athletic training facilities.

The first phase was due for completion in July with the final phase is to be finished by June of 1996. A beautiful \$1.1 million 14-court tennis complex was

completed for last year's men's and women's WAC Championships.

With 10,000 square feet, the state-of-the-art conditioning facility ranks among the nation's best. It features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophone sound system with 40 speakers.

The BYU facility is both functional and attractive with ample space provided. Athletes can get more done in less time and can work out in large groups.

Cougar Stadium

Since the expansion of Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982, BYU has ranked among the nation's top-25 in attendance every year.

Fan support at home has enabled BYU to schedule home and home contests with the likes of Notre Dame, Penn State and UCLA. Since the expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country.

The third level is reserved for working media and the fourth level is for television coverage and game filming. Three elevators assist quests.

BYU's first stadium was a 10,000-seat hill-side facility where the Richards Building now stands. A 30,000-seat stadium at the present location opened in 1964 but as many as 47,000 crammed into the stands and the grassy hill above the north endzone.

Expansion included lowering the field eight feet, taking out the track (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track

and Field Champion-ships), adding end zone seating and box seats along the west stands.

Each end zone structure contains 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats 15,000 people. Concession and picnic areas are on the ground level under the end zone seats. The playing field has a special sandbased drainage system capable of disposing of two



inches of rain per hour.

Besides fall and spring football, the stadium is used for the July 4th Spectacular--Stadium of Fire--which is part of America's Freedom Festival at Provo.

The stadium houses the Athletic Hall of



He oversaw the MAC's expansion to 10 teams in 1992, when Akron joined the league as a full member, becoming the league's first addition since 1973-74.

The 1994 MAC Basketball Tournament drew sellout crowds for the first time in league history. Benson successfully negotiated an 18-game basketball television package, including both men's and women's games, for the MAC in 1993-94.

Benson initiated the MAC's Corporate Partnership program. Funds generated through those corporate sponsorships supplemented the league's budget.

He was on the NCAA staff four years. Benson held the position of director of NCAA championships when he was selected as MAC commissioner. In that position, he supervised eight assistant directors in their administration of 68 NCAA championships.

A native of Spokane, Wash., Benson received a bachelor of science degree in physical education from Boise State University in 1975. He has completed course work toward his master's degree in athletics administration at the University of Utah.

Prior to joining the NCAA staff, Benson served eight years as baseball coach and five as athletic director at a junior college in Tacoma, Wash.

From 1984-86, he was an assistant baseball coach and an administrative assistant in the Athletic Department at Utah.

Benson and his wife, Sharon Ryan Benson, have a three-year-old daughter, Jessica.

The WAC was founded July 1, 1962, with Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming.

Texas-El Paso and Colorado State were added in 1967 and the Arizona schools went to the Pac-10 in 1978.

The next additions were San Diego State (1978), Hawaii (1979), Air Force (1980) and Fresno State (1992).

Paul Brechler was the WAC Commissioner from 1962-68, Wiles Hallock from 1968-71 and Stan Bates from 1971-80. The WAC office, which moved from Littleton to Englewood in July, has been in the Denver area since the beginning with the exception of two years in Phoenix from 1964-66. The telephone number is (303) 799-WAC1.

The WAC merged with the women's High Country Athletic Conference in 1990 to form a single league.

Women compete in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track, outdoor track, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

Men's sports are baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track, outdoor track, swimming/diving and tennis. Gymnastics, volleyball and wrestling championships are combined on a regional basis (the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation).

For seven consecutive years, the WAC has produced at least three bowl teams. Last year, the

The Expanded Conference

The Western Athletic Conference will expand to 16 teams beginning with the 1996-97 academic year.

Two of the four quadrants will be joined to form two divisions for football. A championship game has approved for December, 1996, in Las Vegas.

The divisional alignments for football will be rotated on a bi-annual basis to enable eventual competition involving all 16 members.

In 1996 and 1997, BYU plays teams from Quadrants 1 and 3 plus Hawai'i as a wild-card league game.

This season the Cotton Bowl Classic and Plymouth Holiday Bowl will select their participants from among the Western Athletic Conference champion, the first selection from the Pacific-10 (after the Rose Bowl host has been determined), the first and second selections from the Big 12 after that conference places a team in the Bowl Alliance, and Notre Dame, if it does not qualify for the Bowl Alliance.

The WAC also will continue its bowl ties with the Weiser Lock Copper and Freedom Bowls. The Copper has its choice of WAC teams (other than the champion) and the Freedom Bowl has the next pick.

The Cotton Bowl Classic, televised by CBS, is in Dallas on Jan. 1 (12:30 p.m. MST) and the Plymouth Holiday Bowl, telecast by ESPN, is in San Diego on Dec. 29 (6 p.m. MST). The Copper Bowl is in Tucson on Dec. 27 (ESPN-7 p.m. MST) and the Freedom in Anaheim on Dec. 28 (Raycom-7 p.m. MST).

For the past three years the title sponsor of the Holiday Bowl has been Thrifty Car Rental, a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Chrysler Corporation. Under a new agreement, San Diego's post-season classic will be known as the Plymouth Holiday Bowl.

league was represented by BYU (Cooper), Utah (Freedom) and Colorado State (Holiday).

The WAC champion has been host team in the Holiday Bowl since 1978 except for 1985 when Arizona State and Arkansas played.

Sea World sponsored the bowl from 1988-91 and Thrifty Car Rental from 1992-94.

In 1994, BYU, Colorado State and Utah became the first trio of WAC teams to win at least 10 games.

CSU and New Mexico set single-season attendance marks--the Rams by 1,224 over the listed capacity and the Lobos by 3,000 more than the previous best.

Four players ranked among the nation's top nine in total offense--Stoney Case (UNM), third; John Walsh (BYU), fifth; Mike McCoy (Utah), sixth; and Anthoney Hill (CSU), ninth.

Case became the first player in NCAA history to pass for more than 8,000 yards and rush for more than 1,000 career yards. Six WAC teams ranked among the nation's top 15 in passing offense and total offense.

Three WAC quarterbacks threw for at least 3,000 yards to keep the league's aerial reputation intact. However, the conference also produced five 1,000-yard rushers. Wyoming's Ryan Christopherson led the way with 1,455 yards, 10th best in the country.

The Cowboys' Marcus Harris and Fresno State's David Dunn led the nation in receiving yards per game (119.3) and kickoff return average (28.9). Dunn's 1,013 yards on kickoff returns was a WAC record.

On the WAC career lists, BYU's Jamal Willis moved up to fifth in touchdowns scored (40), 11th in rushing (2,970) and 16th in scoring (240). John Walsh advanced to sixth in touchdown passes (66), seventh in passing (8,390) and eighth in total offense (7,736).

During 1994, BYU's LaVell Edwards reached the 200-win plateau (he now has 207 to tie for ninth place all-time). This season Fresno State's Jim Sweeney could reach that number. He has 194 victories and would become the 15th coach at that level.

ABC-TV will carry UCLA at BYU (Sept. 9) and CSU at AFA (Sept. 16). Three other WAC games-including BYU at AFA and SDSU at BYU--will be televised on ESPN and seven others--including BYU at CSU and Wyoming at BYU--will be on ESPN2.

Historical View

At one time, having a **top program**--not to mention winning a national championship--seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 30 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 207 games and been to 19 bowl games (17 in a row). Sixteen times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-85.

Coach Edwards holds a national championship (1984), has been national coach of the year, served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner and coached two Outland Trophy winners in the past decade.

Things weren't always so rosy, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is among national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU in the late 1890's but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played 69 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. Virgil Carter (1966), Gary Sheide (1974), Gifford Nielsen (1976), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Robbie Bosco (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. And Ty Detmer (1988-91) finished his incredible career by achieving 15,031 yards passing--the first player ever to go over 12,000.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco and Detmer were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson, Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second.

Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the **Davey** O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs.

Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62), a singlewing back, won All-America honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71), led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-America.

Fullback John Ogden (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Jamal Willis (1991-94) became the school's leading rusher last season. Eric Drage (90-93) became the receiving leader two years ago, breaking yardage and touchdown records set by Phil Odle (65-67).

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area.

Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates (1977-82), Trevor Matich (1979-84) and Evan Pilgrim (1992-94).

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83), David Mills (1980-84), Trevor Molini (1985-86) and Chris Smith (1987-90).

Top defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Ieremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Kyle Whittingham (1979-81), Tom Holmoe (1979-82), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84) and Jason Buck (1985-86), the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy.

At various times in the past 25 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns.

Cougar Bowl History

Copper Bowl, 1994 BYU 31, Oklahoma 6 December 29 - Tucson

BYU fans celebrated the New Year early as BYU dominated Oklahoma and ended its five-year non-winning streak in bowl games.

Quarterback John Walsh and the offense provided some dazzle and the Cougars' defense spurred lots of enthusiasm during the ESPN telecast.

Walsh threw a seven-yard TD pass to Bryce Doman in the first quarter and had a 25-yard pass to Mike Johnston in the second quarter.

A four-yard scoring pass to Johnston in the third quarter and a 28-yard touchdown pass to Doman in the fourth quarter vaulted Walsh's stats to 454 yards and four touchdowns on 31 of 45 passes with no interceptions against the Sooner defense which had held national champion Nebraska to 13 points.

BYU's defense was unstoppable as it held Oklahoma to just 72 yards rushing and 163 yards passing with most of those in the last quarter. The Sooners didn't cross midfield until their ninth possession on the second-to-last play of the third quarter.

OU quarterback Garrick McGee was not able to play due to a viral infection so Terence Brown, a receiver with five days' practice in two months, filled in as incoming coach Howard Schellenberger watched from the press box.

The Cougars went 77 yards to score on their first possession. Jamal Willis caught a 43-yard pass on a fake reverse on the first play. David Lauder added a 22-yard field goal early in the second quarter. Walsh then connected with Johnston for another TD with eight minutes remaining in the half.

Willis caught seven passes for 103 yards and was chosen Offensive Player of the Game. Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final BYU game.

Guard Evan Pilgrim earned second-team All-America honors and played in the Hula Bowl along with defensive end Travis Hall. Willis and defensive end Randy Brock played in the East-West Game. BYU finished 10th in the CNN/USA Today poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.

Holiday Bowl XVI, 1993 Ohio State 28, BYU 21 December 30 - San Diego

Just as they did in 1991 against lowa, the Cougars took a favored Big 10 team to the wire at the Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl and came up just short. This time it was the 11th-ranked Ohio State Buckeyes who thwarted a last-minute scoring drive.

The Cougars had four downs and 32 seconds to tie or win the game from the OSU six-yard line, but four straight John Walsh passes into the end zone fell to the ground and OSU snuck away with the win. Two of the passes were dropped and two were underthrown because of the Buckeye pass rush.

BYU got to the Ohio State 14, six, 22 and six-yard lines in the second half without scoring.

Raymont Harris, OSU's senior halfback, battered the BYU defense all night long. In the first half, Harris scored two touchdowns and racked up 101 yards on 13 carries. He got another touchdown in the third quarter and set a bowl rushing record with 235 yards.

Despite Harris' outstanding first-half output, the Cougars managed to go to the halftime break tied at 21. Jamal Willis and Bryce Doman each collected 27-yard Walsh offerings and walk-on tight end Chad Lewis made a spectacular one-handed touchdown grab in the corner of the end zone to bail the Cougars out of a fourth-and-eight situation.

After Harris' short touchdown run late in the third, BYU and OSU traded possessions until late into the fourth quarter. Each team was able to penetrate deep into opponent territory, but neither was able to score. After forcing a rare Buckeye punt, BYU got the ball back on its own 42 with 43 seconds left.

On first down, Walsh hooked up with senior cocaptain Eric Drage on a crossing pattern. The Cougars' all-time leader in receiving yards ran away from Buckeye defenders and advanced the ball 52 yards to the OSU six-yard-line.

Walsh had 389 yards and fullback Kalin Hall rushed for 42 yards on 11 carries. Tyler Anderson returned five kicks for 145 yards, including an exciting 45-yarder. Harris and Walsh shared MVP honors.

Aloha Bowl, 1992 Kansas 23, BYU 20 December 25 - Honolulu

Kansas kicker Dan Eichloff booted a 48-yard field goal with 2:57 left to play, giving the Jayhawks a victory over BYU, the WAC tri-champion.

Tom Young, who completed 15 of 31 passes for 262 yards in his first varsity start, was named Most Valuable Player for BYU. Tackle Dana Stubblefield, who had three of the six sacks on Young, won the honor for Kansas.

Young had been pressed into action when Ryan Hancock suffered knee ligament damage against Utah in the final regular-season game. Hancock was the third quarterback to suffer a season-ending injury.

The backup quarterback for the bowl was Chris Gulstad, who had dropped out of football earlier in the season to concentrate on baseball but returned when injuries began to mount.

Special teams play helped the Cougars on the opening kickoff when Hema Heimuli scrambled 94 vards to score.

But the kicking game would prove the downfall as the Cougars missed a 36-yard field goal later in the quarter, missed a 31-yarder and misplayed an extra point attempt in the third quarter.

Kansas, which went 7-1 to start the season, tied the game two plays later when wide receiver Matt Gay threw a 74-yard touchdown pass to tight end Rodney Harris.

Another big play came midway through the quarter when Chris Maumalanga tackled BYU's Jamal Willis in the end zone for a safety. BYU took a 14-9 lead with 10 minutes left in the second quarter when Willis ran 29 yards for a score. Eichloff then cut the halftime score to 14-12 with a 42-yard field goal.

Young threw 10 yards to Otis Sterling for the only score of the third quarter. Kansas quarterback Chip Hilleary then tied the game by directing a 75-yard drive in a minute and a half, scoring the touchdown and then running for a two-point conversion.

After the field goal, Young hit Bryce Doman with a 31-yard strike. But two plays later Charley Bowen intercepted a pass at the Kansas 36 with 1:55 left to play.

Holiday Bowl XIV, 1991 BYU 13, Iowa 13 December 30 - San Diego

A tipped pass that was picked off in the end zone with less than 30 seconds remaining stifled BYU's hopes of knocking off seventh-ranked lowa in a Holiday Bowl that will be remembered for Josh Arnold of BYU earning Defensive MVP honors.

Ty Detmer turned in another great performance in his last appearance as a Cougar, passing for 350 yards and two touchdowns against a team that led the Big 10 in defense and sacks.

lowa quarterback Matt Rodgers led the Hawkeyes on a 74-yards scoring march on the game's opening drive. The score came on a 13-yard rumble by lowa fullback Mike Saunders.

lowa scored after another long drive in the second quarter. Again it was Saunders who scored, this time on a five-yard dive play.

Down 13-0, BYU finally got things rolling. After an lowa punt put the Cougars on their own 22 with 4:43 left to play in the first half, Detmer connected on five of six passes to move the Cougars to the lowa nine. From there, Detmer found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6.

Neither team scored in the third quarter. BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer-to-Tyler Anderson touchdown score from 29 yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13.

Each team threatened to score late in the fourth quarter. Iowa moved the ball to the Cougar 23, but missed on a 40-yard field goal try with 4:19 left.

On the game's final drive, clutch receptions by Eric Drage, Jamal Willis and Tuipulotu helped the Cougars move inside the lowa 20-yard line with 33 seconds left to play.

Then Detmer scrambled left and launched a pass intended for tight end Byron Rex. The ball was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the end zone to preserve the tie.

BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the AP and CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa was 10th in both.

Holiday Bowl XIII, 1990 Texas A&M 65, BYU 14 December 29 - San Diego

Led by quarterback Bucky Richardson and All-America running back Darren Lewis, underdog Texas A&M was out to show it belonged among the nation's elite.

Going into the game, the Cougars were fighting injury problems, especially in the secondary. DBs Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up and Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his non-throwing shoulder that was suffered in the regular season finale.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead.

The Cougars were able to tie the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M's. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter enroute to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter.

After playing valiantly with one separation, this one proved to be too much. Detmer would have surgery a few days later to repair the damage.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. The fact Texas A&M's Lewis was still in the game with eight minutes left and a 58-14 lead caused a slight stir among Cougar fans. A bright spot was backup QB Joe Evans' first touchdown pass as a Cougar.

Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player with six tackles, two sacks and an interception.

BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

Obvious highlights of the year were a win in BYU's first-ever meeting with a top-ranked team (Miami) and the first Heisman Trophy ever by a WAC player.

Holiday Bowl XII, 1989 Penn State 50, BYU 39 December 29 - San Diego

Two very unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from toppling the East's best team, Lambert Trophy winner Penn State. Two stunning defensive plays offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer--the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his heroics, and thanks to excellent blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team.

The other co-MVP was the Nittany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards and picked up some key first downs for Joe Paterno's team.

BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play.

The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards to give the Lions two points.

Down 43-39, the Cougars tried an on-side kick, but Penn State fell on the ball at the BYU 46-yard line. Two tackles behind the line of scrimmage by Bob Davis forced the Lions to punt and the Cougars got the ball back on their own 12 with two minutes left.

Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play.

Then, what most Cougar fans thought was a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown.

The Cougars got one more chance and moved the ball from their own 32 to the Penn State 40, but time ran out. Bellini had 10 catches for 124 yards while Boyce had 127 yards in receptions and Nyberg 117.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

BYU finished the year as WAC champion after three seasons out of the top spot.

Freedom Bowl V, 1988 BYU 20, Colorado 17 December 29 - Anaheim

A tough second-half defense, Ty Detmer coming off the bench to earn Most Valuable Player honors and two fourth-quarter field goals by Jason Chaffetz enabled the Cougars to upset Colorado.

Cool weather (42 degrees) by southern California standards didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns.

But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second. Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) although a big show failed to materialize in a matchup of the nation's top two punters. Colorado's Keith English averaged only 39 yards on two punts and BYU's Pat Thompson had four punts for a 33.5 average.

A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score and then Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter and the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

The Cougars then moved from their own four to the Colorado 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

A key performer for BYU was halfback Matt Bellini, who carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

A sad note for the Buffs came early in 1989 when quarterback Sal Aunese was hospitalized with stomach cancer.

He died during the 1989 season, when Colorado went unbeaten during the regular season and went to the Orange Bowl as the number-one team in the nation.

All American Bowl, 1987 Virginia 22, BYU 16 December 22 - Birmingham

The 11th annual All American Bowl was cool (temperature in the high 40s and two days of rain) and BYU never got warmed up despite taking a 3-0 lead.

BYU's 10th consecutive bowl appearance saw several records set but the Cougars were edged 22-16 in their first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once--all bowl records--but BYU fell short several times.

Covey, who had led the Cougars to five straight wins as a starter, thought he had a first down at the BYU 46 with four minutes remaining but the ball was marked just short on a fourth-down play.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver for the season, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty.

However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed 51 and 47-yarders in the second quarter and Virginia took a 14-3 lead.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped at the last second. Fred Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. BYU then went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

The Cougars were hurt by the absence of running back/returner Mike O'Brien and linebacker Thor Salanoa, who both suffered knee injuries in the Australia game. Salanoa's loss was magnified when linebacker Richard Hobbs was sidelined in the first half of the bowl game.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date (his wedding anniversary), Virginia Coach George Welsh led his Navy team to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Freedom Bowl III, 1986 UCLA 31, BYU 10 December 30 - Anaheim

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green, UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came on four John Lee field goals.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10. He finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was marked by a defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass, Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal.

Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. He also caught six passes for 83 yards.

From then on, it was UCLA most of the way.

Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David

Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU

defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run.

David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage.

Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) hindered the Cougar effort but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

Citrus Bowl, 1985 Ohio State 10, BYU 7 December 28 - Orlando

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play.

The rest of the contest was marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebacker and instead found Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic, who took it in for a touchdown and a 10-7 lead with 13:52 left in the third quarter.

Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and the Cougars had to punt, stopping the two drives.

Then Terry White intercepted two passes in the end zone to stop BYU threats--once with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left.

On the day, Bosco was 26 of 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor.

John Wooldridge led Ohio State with 92 yards rushing and Matt Bellini had 89 yards receiving for BYU. Lakei Heimuli added 77 yards with 10 catches.

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and angineered an 80-yard drive.

engineered an 80-yard drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play.

The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.

David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

Holiday Bowl VI, 1983 BYU 21, Missouri 17 December 23 - San Diego

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17.

The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

For most of the game, the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars.

BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards total offense and 10 points in the first half. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game.

Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15 BYU capitalized on a trick play. After taking the snap, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and lofted the ball back across the field to Young.

The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and ramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell then intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

Mike Eddo led BYU's receivers with 70 yards and Stinnett had 60. Tiumalu was the leading rusher with 57 while Drain had 115 for the Tigers and freshman Jon Redd added 68.

The win over Missouri was part of four bowl victories in five years between 1980-84, the Cougars' most successful post-season stretch ever.

Holiday Bowl V, 1982 Ohio State 47, BYU 17 December 17 - San Diego

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17.

BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap--an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as the Buckeyes won their seventh consecutive game.

Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Buckeyes, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7.

As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45 throws.

The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. The key plays were a 33-yard pass to Kirk Pendleton and a 16-yarder to Scott Collie.

But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime. Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State solidly in control.

BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomczak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground.

Ten different BYU players caught passes, led by Hudson with seven receptions for 81 yards and Balholm with 58 yards receiving.

The Cougars managed only 19 net yards rushing in playing catchup throughout the night. Besides Spencer's big total, Jimmy Gayle rushed for 80 yards and Broadnax for 58.

Holiday Bowl IV, 1981 BYU 38, Washington State 36 December 18 - San Diego

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games.

BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable 31-7 edge.

But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State made it 31-28 and from there, BYU had to hold on to its life.

In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third quarter, BYU's Jim McMahon began completing passes and moved BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28.

The big play was a 45-yard toss to Gordon Hudson on third down. McMahon then hit Hudson for 26 yards to set up the 11-yard touchdown to Scott Pettis.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game--27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most in the game, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a first down.

That came on a third-and-one play at the BYU 29. McMahon not only grabbed the loose ball, he ran for a first down to help time run out on Washington State.

Tight end Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground.

Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79.

Each team scored five touchdowns so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after BYU got to the Washington State three.

Holiday Bowl III, 1980 BYU 46, Southern Methodist 45 December 19 - San Diego

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration.

SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three seconds left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown.

With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33.

Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score.

The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered SMU's kickoff at midfield.

SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left.

McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

Holiday Bowl II, 1979 Indiana 38, BYU 37 December 21 - San Diego

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark.

Those kinds of credentials, along with their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Cougars favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana.

It was BYU's first-ever meeting with the Big-10 school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then had a 21-17 lead after a first half in which Indiana had only four more yards total offense than the Cougars.

BYU spurted ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones.

The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37.

On the first play after the kickoff, Indiana's Evans intercepted a pass to set up a drive to BYU's 11-yard line, where the Hoosiers botched a fake field goal attempt.

With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 with a key play being a 26-vard pass to Scott Phillips.

Then with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense.

Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards and Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

Holiday Bowl, 1978 Navy 23, BYU 16 December 22 - San Diego

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young. Despite chilly temperatures (for San Diego) the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead.

Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

Tangerine Bowl, 1976 Oklahoma State 49, BYU 16 December 18 - Orlando

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys.

BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402.

BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big-8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula.

Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

Fiesta Bowl, 1974 Oklahoma State 16, BYU 6 December 28 - Tempe

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarter-back Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, so the halftime score was 7-6 for Oklahoma State.

OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars outgained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

The Missionary Program

One of the most frequently asked questions from media people reporting about the Cougars regards missionary activity.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has more than 47,000 full-time missionaries around the world. Men are eligible to leave at the age of 19 for a two-year period while women must be 21 and serve for 18 months. There also are retired couples who choose missionary service.

Members of the Church are not obligated to go on missions and are not able to choose the area where they are sent. The church does not pay for mission expenses.

There are 15 Missionary Training Centers around the world with the Provo site, adjacent to BYU, being the only one which offers language training. There are 43 languages currently being taught.

Each missionary must observe certain standards of conduct to be eligible to serve, such as abstaining from alcohol, tobacco, and drugs.

While a missionary, there are a few more standards that are required: missionaries are not allowed to date or watch movies and each missionary has a constant companion.

Missionaries spend long hours proselyting and giving service and do not have much time for exercise outside of the walking and bike riding, which is required for transportation in some areas.

One day a week missionaries spend in preparation, when they clean their apartments, do wash, write letters and occasionally have time for athletic or cultural activities.

Through serving a mission, missionaries learn many important principles which help them for the rest of their lives.

Time-management is crucial for a missionary as many appointments and responsibilities must be kept every day.

Missionaries also learn patience and tolerance as well as becoming confident and poised. Many missionaries find that as they serve the people in their areas their capacity to love increases.



1994 Game Summaries

BYU 13, Hawai'i 12 Sept. 3 - Honolulu

The Cougars ended their three-game losing streak at Aloha Stadium by defeating the Rainbows there for the first time since 1988. Turnovers and the absence of the top returning receiver, Bryce Doman (knee), stifled BYU's normally potent offense, but the Cougars rallied from a 6-0 deficit in the second half.

BYU's offense failed to convert on two field goal attempts. Hawai'i kicked a 37-yard field goal with 3:37 left in the first guarter for a 3-0 halftime lead.

BYU defensive back Jack Damuni had an interception on the Rainbows' first possession of the game but couldn't take advantage of it. He fractured his shoulder on his first tackle of the game and was unable to play in the next six games.

Hawai'i increased its lead by three with 7:31 left in the third quarter by converting on a 47-yard field goal attempt. With 5:22 remaining in the third, defensive end Travis Hall intercepted a pass on Hawai'i's 12-yard line. That set up a six-yard touchdown pass from John Walsh to Itula Mili.

A fumble on BYU's 26-yard line set up Hawai'i for a touchdown run. The Rainbows went for two points, but were unsuccessful.

With 10:39 remaining, Walsh threw a 18-yard pass to Mike Johnston to set up a one-yard touch-down run by Jamal Willis.

A BYU field goal try was blocked with 4:59 left in the game. Hawai'i took over on its 20-yard line and punted after not getting a first down. The decision paid off as BYU fumbled on the Rainbows' 41-yard line with 2:17 left. The defense held and the Cougars ran out the remaining 1:13.

BYU 49, New Mexico 47 Sept. 24 - Provo

On a roller coaster ride that nearly crashed for the Cougars, history was made as LaVell Edwards gained his 200th career win against the New Mexico Lobos.

Running back Jamal Willis, who rushed for 204 yards and two touchdowns, became the first running back since 1975 to rush for 200-plus yards, tying the fourth best single rushing performance in BYU history with 204.

Though the game was a typical high scoring WAC rivalry, with 41 points gained in the fourth quarter, it wasn't a typical BYU football game as the Cougars had more yards rushing than they did passing.

The Cougars led the Lobos for 23 minutes but with 7:02 left in the third quarter, New Mexico scored a touchdown in three quick plays to go on top, 27-21.

BYU answered back with a 17-yard pass from John Walsh to Willis to set up a two-yard Willis touchdown run, giving the Cougars a one-point lead.

Thanks to the arm of Walsh and the maneuvers of running back Hema Heimuli, the Cougars scored two quick touchdowns on their first two possessions of the

quarter to gain a 15-point lead.

On New Mexico's next possession, the Lobos trimmed the Cougars' lead by scoring a quick touchdown, making the score 42-33. With 7:20 left in the game, Jamal Willis ran 39-yards for a touchdown to regain a 16-point lead, minimizing the chances of a Lobo comeback.

But Stoney Case threw two touchdown passes in 65 seconds to bring the Lobos within two points with 3:13 left in the game. New Mexico recovered an onside kick to set up its final score. Though the Lobos tried for another on-sides kick, the Cougars recovered. On fourth down-and-two at UNM's 27-yard line, Willis rushed for 14 yards, putting him past the 200-mark and finishing off the Lobos.

A slow start and a fighting finish characterized this battle as the Cougars got their first taste of Fresno State's famed Doghouse. Before BYU quarterback John Walsh had thrown his first pass of the ball game, the Cougars were behind the Bulldogs, 14-0.

On the first play of the game, Fresno used one of Jim Sweeney's trick plays, throwing a 68-yard reverse pass for a touchdown to put the Bulldogs up quickly. After a BYU punt, FSU scored on another long pass.

But once John Walsh threw his first pass, the Cougars were back in the contest. A 58-yard touchdown connection from Walsh to Nowatzke put the Cougars on the board with 9:41 to play in the first quarter.

The Cougars pushed within two, thanks to a 36-yard field goal by Lauder and a fumble caused by Randy Brock which forced the ball out of the end zone for a safety. The Cougars appeared to take control of the game when they went on top 18-14 early in the second quarter after an 11-yard Willis touchdown run.

But Fresno regained the lead on a one-yard quarterback sneak with 4:51 to play in the half. BYU fought back and went into the locker room with a four-point lead, thanks to a 25-yard touchdown connection from Walsh to Itula Mili.

A silent Cougar third quarter was ended as the the Cougars got a big break with 10:45 left in the game when John Walsh hit Itula Mili again with a 10-yard strike which he turned into a 68-yard touchdown.

The six-point lead was short-lived when a few seconds later, FSU threw a 51-yard bomb to set up a touchdown with 8:19 remaining in the fourth.

At 32-30, and after both teams failed to budge on their next possessions, the Cougars gained three first downs in the final four minutes, thanks to Willis and Heimuli who ran off 10 plays and the clock.

In his 23 years as head coach, LaVell Edwards has never faced a regular season-opponent three times without winning. History still stands as the Cougars beat Notre Dame for the first time ever.

The Irish, in the wake of a defeat against Boston College, scored early in the first quarter with a 41-

After a fumble recovery, Notre Dame had another chance to tie the game. But it opted to try a 32-yard field goal which missed with seven minutes left.

The Cougars pushed to the Irish 22 with 1:46 left to play but another fumble gave the Irish a final chance. Reserve quarterback Tom Krug couldn't get them past midfield, giving BYU its first non-conference win on the road in the last 13 tries.

News Media Information

The BYU Football Media Guide is designed to provide the media with useful information about the 1995 football team. The following information also will help the media in covering the Cougars during the season. Please review it.

Player Interviews

Please schedule all player and coach interviews through the Sports Information Office. To assure a better chance of obtaining the interview, please request the interview at least 24 hours in advance. Coach LaVell Edwards is available to media from 10-11 a.m. Members of the print media requesting interviews should contact Ralph Zobell, Sports Information Director. Requests for broadcast interviews should be made to Jay Monsen, Electronic Media Coordinator. No player interviews will be given the day before or the day of a game.

Big Five Huddle

Coach Edwards and two football players attend the Big Five Huddle at noon each Tuesday at Diamond Lil's (1528 W. North Temple) in Salt Lake City. The coach and players will be available for individual interviews immediately after the luncheon.

Home Game Coverage

Requests for press box and photography credentials should be made no later than one week prior to the game. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only, with preference given to media representatives who regularly cover college football. No requests will be processed later than noon on the day prior to the game. Requests should be written on company letterhead and directed to: BYU Sports Information, 30 SFH, BYU, Provo, UT 84602. Phone (801) 378-4911.

Stadium Location, Media Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium near the ticket booth. Media parking passes must be requested. The press box is accessible via elevators located on the west side of Cougar Stadium.

Press Box Arrangements

The Sports Information staff will provide working media members with official statistics. A press box public address announcer will keep the media

informed of play-by-play information, records broken and other interesting information. A meal will be served before each home game.

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones. In the past, there have been sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own phones.

Please notify the Sports Information Office in advance if FAX transmissions are necessary. The press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics. Score updates are available by calling (801) 378-2609.

The BYU Sports Information staff will accompany the media to the locker room. With two minutes remaining in the game, the media group will take the south elevator to ground level.

Coach LaVell Edwards will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins after the team enters the locker room. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

Photo Credentials

Photo credentials will be issued to newspapers and magazines which regularly cover college football. Mark Philbrick, BYU's photographer, will supervise the distribution of photo vests at the game. Photographers on the sidelines must wear the required vest at all times.

Television photographers and still cameramen are not allowed on the sidelines between the 25-yard lines. Please use north elevator to access press box. Pick up photo vests at the press box and return them after the game.

BYU fans can get up-to-date Cougar sports information each day by calling 378-TEAM. The hotline is sponsored by the BYU Cougar Club and features scores and statistics from previous athletic events and information about upcoming events.
