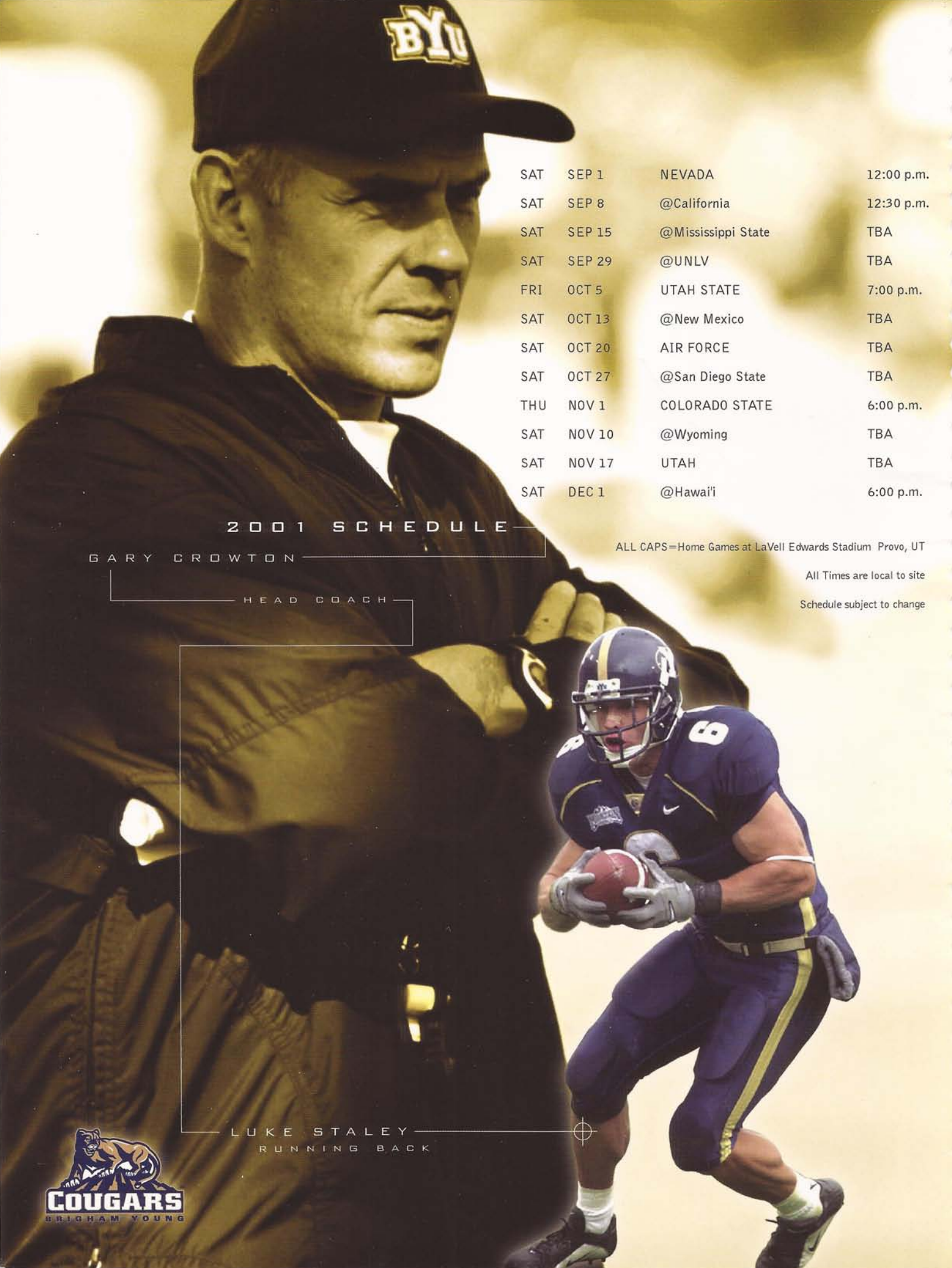

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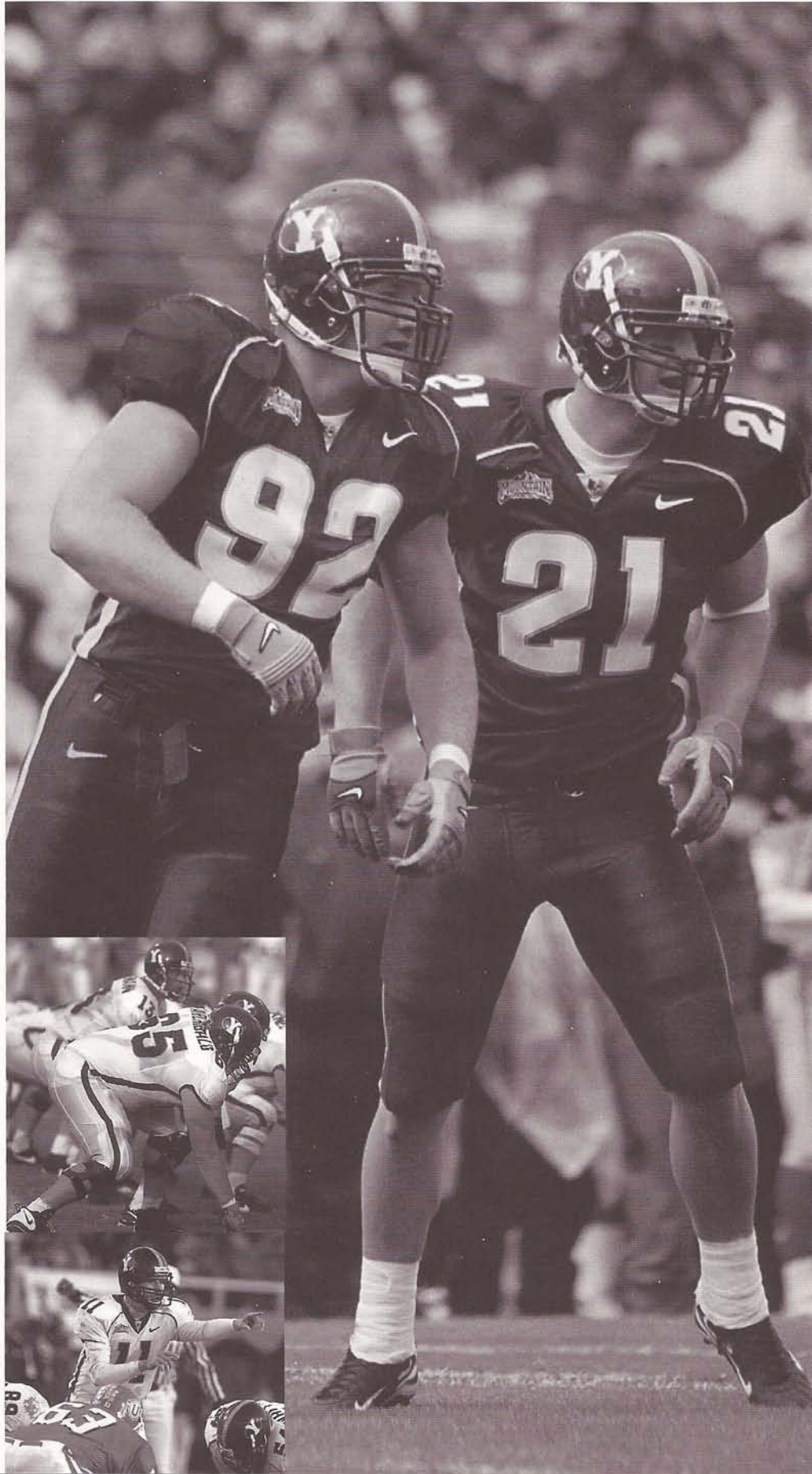

The 2001 BYU Football Media Guide has been designed to provide local, regional and national media with useful information about the BYU football team, its history and tradition. We trust many of your questions will be answered within the pages of this guide.

Should you require additional information, such as pictures, video tapes or additional media guides, please contact the BYU athletic media relations office at (801) 378-4911.

We sincerely appreciate your coverage of BYU football and look forward to working with you.

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

All requests for credentials to cover BYU Football should be sent on company letterhead to: Jeff Reynolds, Associate Director, Athletic Media Relations, 30 Smith Fieldhouse Provo, UT 84602. Fax requests may be sent to (801) 378-3520.

It is recommended all single-game credential requests be received no later than one week prior to the date of the game. Requests received later than noon on the day prior to the game will not be accepted. Credentials for working media, including print and electronic (radio & television only) media outlets are restricted in accordance with BYU, Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules and guidelines. It is our intention to ensure proper, professional use is made of the space available for credentialed media.

Credentials, complete with parking pass, will be mailed to the requesting individual or organization if time permits or sent to the visiting school's sports information director for distribution.

PRESS BOX

Working press box credentials shall be issued only to accredited newspapers, radio and televi-

sion reporters only. Request from other media sources shall be evaluated on a game-by-game basis. Reporters representing papers with next-day editions, daily editions, national magazines, wire services, live television and radio broadcasts and television and radio stations covering for nightly news shall be given priority. Spouses, dates, children and other non-working persons will not be credentialed and are not allowed in the working media areas during the game as dictated by NCAA guidelines.

Credentials must be displayed prominently throughout the game, including pre-and post-game coverage. Credentials must be displayed at all times. Pregame interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstance. Properly credentialed media representatives shall be allowed field access with 4:00 remaining on the game clock. Interviews with players and/or coaches may not be conducted until the NCAA-mandated 10-minute cooling off period has expired. Individuals or organizations violating this policy may be required to surrender their credentials and removed from the stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and television reporters/camera operators on assignment. Television organizations shall be restricted to one camera operator and one reporter on the field at all times, except by prior approval from the BYU athletic media relations office. Freelance and amateur photographers, not on assignment, are not eligible for sideline credentials, except by prior approval from the BYU athletic media relations office.

All Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules shall be enforced regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yardlines. Sideline supervisors will patrol both sidelines to make certain all rules are enforced. Live or taped pregame interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstance. Individuals or organizations violating sideline policies may be required to surrender their credentials and removed from the stadium. The BYU athletic media relations staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs and media guides for both BYU and the visiting team prior to the game. Additional information, such as lineup, roster or jersey changes will be distributed as the information becomes available. An official statistical package complete with individual and team stats, play-by-play, scoring summaries, quotes, end-of-quarter stats and defensive stats will be distributed following the game. "Quickie stats" will be available during timeouts and at the end of each quarter.

With 4:00 remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU head coach Gary Crowton and selected players will be available in the media room following the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period. The BYU locker room is closed to media. The media room is located next to the BYU locker room under the southeast corner of the grandstands. Quotes from both coaches and selected players will be available in the final stats package.

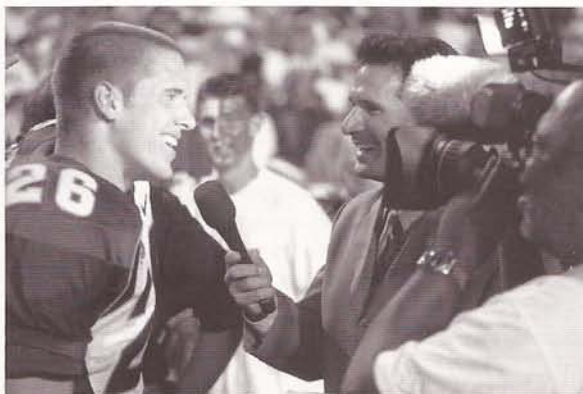
Several courtesy telephones (with campus extensions) will be available in the working area of the press box, while a limited number of phones will be available in the media room. All phones are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Collect or credit card calls can be made from each of these telephones.

PARKING

LaVell Edwards Stadium is located on the northwest corner of the BYU campus, just off Canyon Road (200 East) and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is in Lot No. 2 immediately west of the stadium. Parking passes are required and must be obtained in advance.

INTERVIEWS

During the season, all player and coaches interviews must be scheduled through Jeff Reynolds in the athletic media relations office at (801) 378-4909. Interview requests must be made 24 hours in advance. Players and coaches are generally available prior to and immediately following practice. (Must be scheduled by Jeff Reynolds) Telephone interviews can be arranged for out-of-town media through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with players on the day prior to the game, as well as game day, are not permitted.



Interviews with Coach Edwards can generally be scheduled daily from 10-11 a.m. In addition, Coach Crowton is available for interviews following practice.

WEEKLY MWC TELECONFERENCE

A weekly teleconference, featuring the head coaches from each Mountain West Conference school, will be conducted beginning the first week of September. For more information, including times and schedules, see the official Mountain West Conference website at www.mountainwest-conf.com or call Bob Burda at the MWC office (719-533-9506) for additional information.

FAX ON DEMAND

Updated rosters, team and individual stats, schedule/results, game notes and other information is available to media via the Mountain West Conference fax-on-demand system. Please contact the athletic media relations office for additional information regarding the fax-on-demand system. Fax-on-demand is a service provided by the Mountain West Conference and is intended for media only.

WEBSITES

Fan-based websites, containing at least one or more of the following: chat rooms, message boards, recruiting information, scouting reports and links to news sites, as well as other fan-based features shall not be issued credentials. Local and national organizations which maintain a news-based website in connection with its regular newspaper or magazine, as well as radio or television broadcast shall be issued credentials on a game-by-game basis. Live, real-time updates will not be permitted.

NATIONAL & REGIONAL TV

On February 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc., signed a seven-year contract with the Mountain West Conference, giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to football and men's basketball beginning with the 1999-2000 academic year. ESPN will also televise the Mountain West Conference Women's Basketball Championship game and one regular season game on the network.

An average of 21 football games will be televised per year, three of which will be broadcast on Thursday nights. Last season, ESPN televised five BYU football games

LOCAL TELEVISION BROADCASTS

KSL has been televising BYU football games since 1984. Now KSL-TV has pioneered a new and unique sports production entity — Bonneville SportsWest Productions. SportsWest broadcasts are produced by an award winning team and serve as the benchmark for the market and beyond.

BYU and SportsWest have an agreement to local market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events that have not been acquired by ESPN.

RADIO

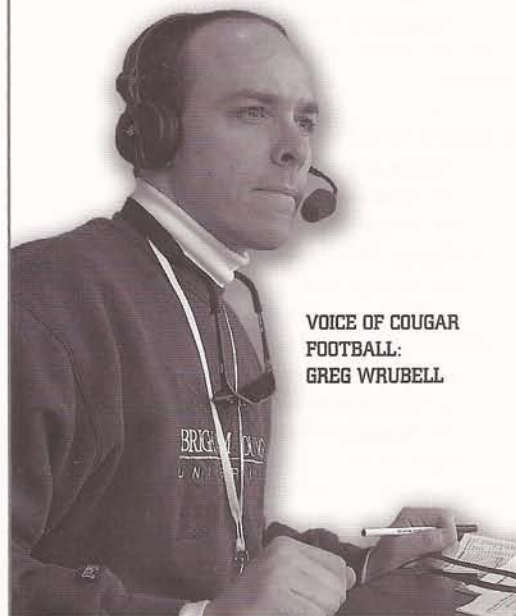
The longtime radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is 50,000-watt KSL Newsradio 1160 in Salt Lake City.

Greg Wrubell enters his first season as the grid-iron "Voice of the Cougars," having served as the play-by-play broadcaster for BYU Basketball since 1996. A BYU graduate in 1991, Wrubell joined the BYU Football broadcast crew in 1992 as the sideline/locker room reporter, and also hosted pre and post-game coverage on KSL.

Former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons begins his 20th season as game analyst, while a new sideline/locker room reporter had yet to be determined at press time. Entering his first season as studio host is Bill Riley, who comes to KSL from Jacksonville, Florida, where he served as a studio host on the NFL Jaguars' broadcasts. Engineering the broadcasts on KSL is Chief Engineer John Dehnel, who enters his 16th season on the BYU

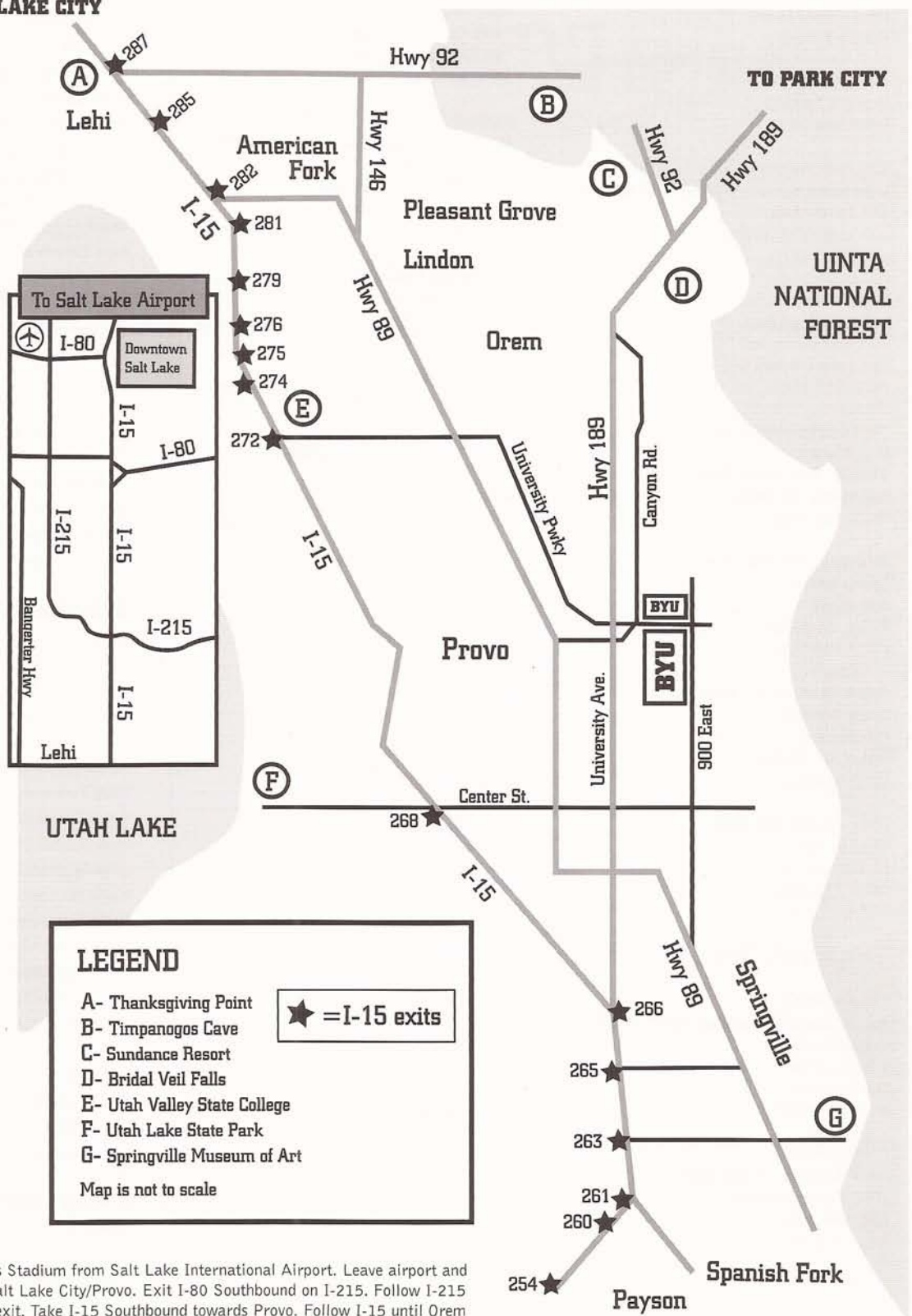
Just 44 miles north of Provo lies the major metropolitan area of Salt Lake City home of the 2002 Olympic Games.

★ = I-15 exits

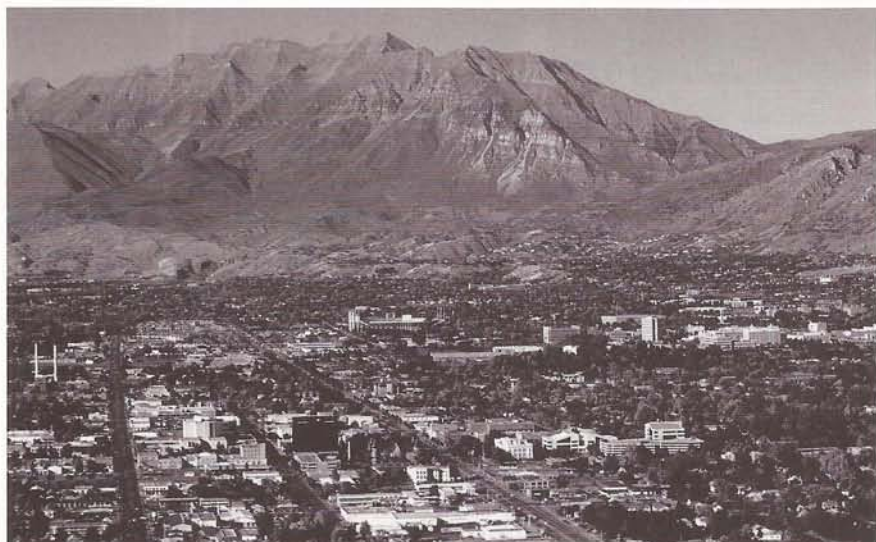

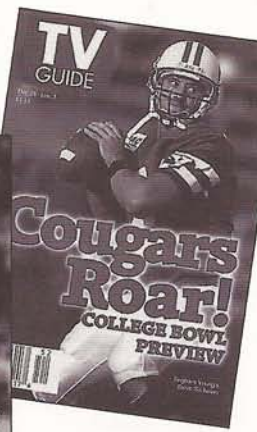

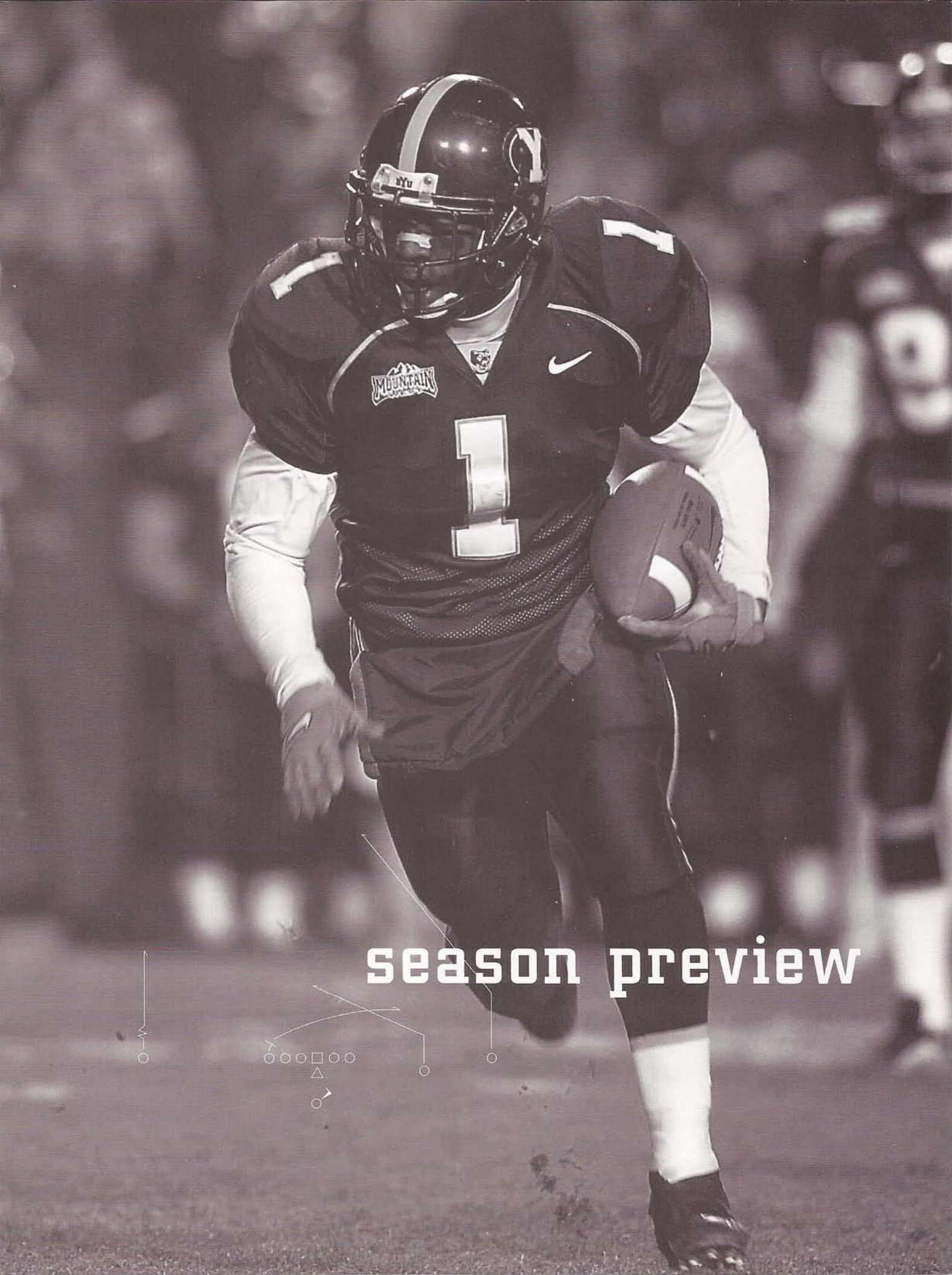
MEDIA ATTENTION

From national publications to live television broadcasts, BYU football is one of the more visible programs in the country. Since its first national television appearance in 1974, BYU has posted a 42-28-2 record while playing in front of a national audience, including a 22-15 mark on ABC and a 26-16-2 mark on ESPN. Dating back to 1980, the Cougars have appeared on national television an average of three times per season. The Cougars have played five games on national T.V. five different seasons, including the 2000, 1998, 1996, 1988 and 1985 seasons. Since 1980, BYU has played in at least one nationally-televised game. On Sept. 1, 1984, Robbie Bosco (right) led BYU to a 20-14 victory over Pitt in the first live ESPN College Football broadcast. Last year BYU played four ESPN games (Mississippi State, Wyoming, Colorado State, Utah), one ESPN2 match-up (Syracuse), and two ABC games (Florida State, Virginia).

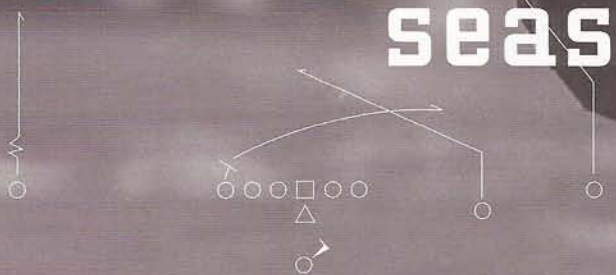


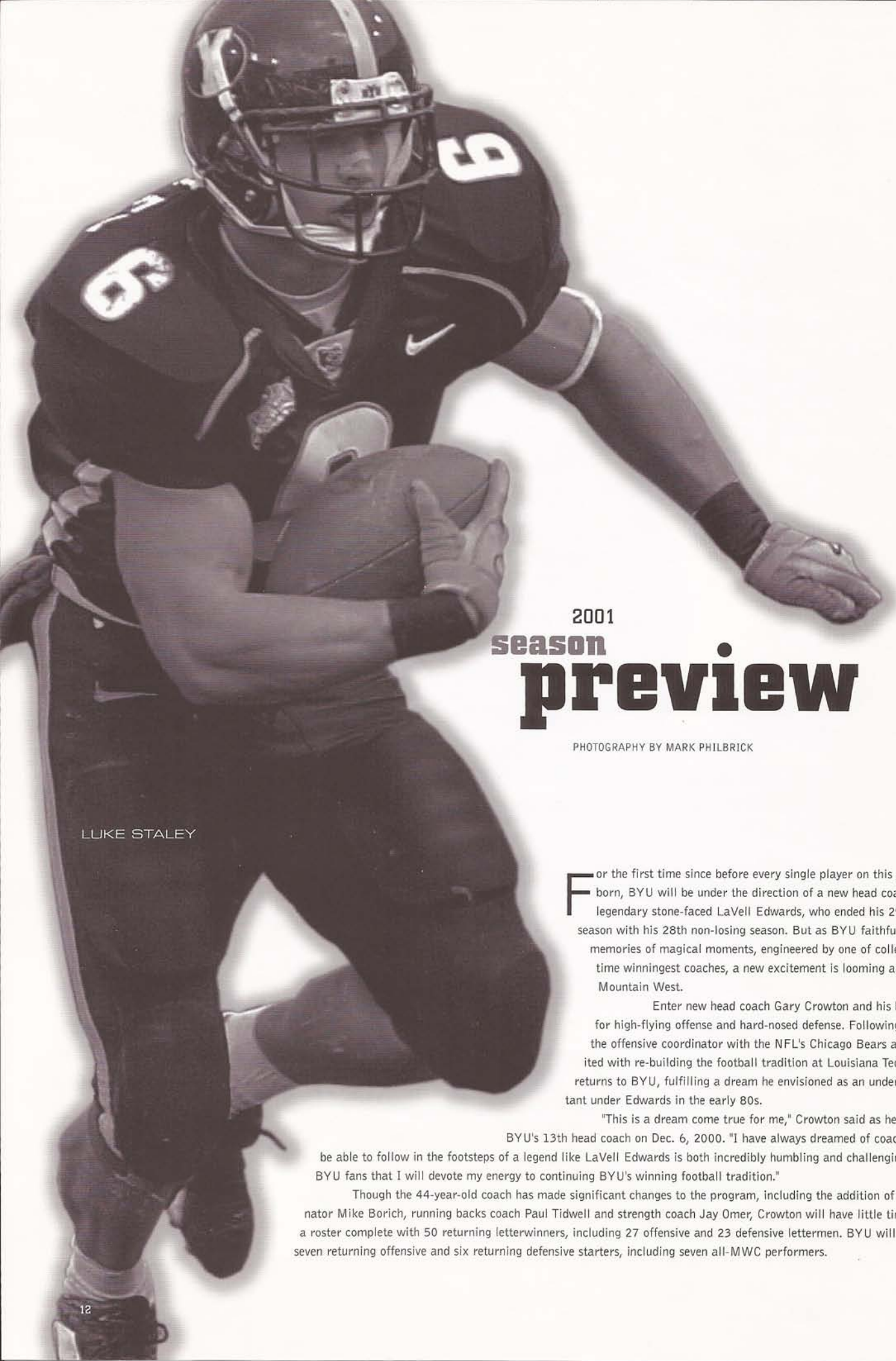

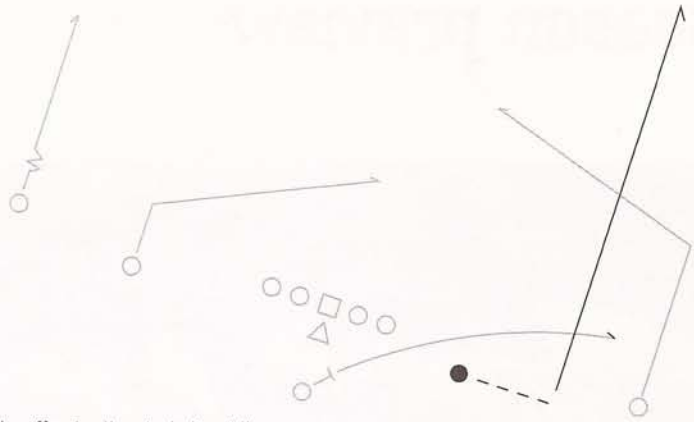
For the first time since before every single player on this year's roster was born, BYU will be under the direction of a new head coach. Gone is the legendary stone-faced LaVell Edwards, who ended his 29-year career last season with his 28th non-losing season. But as BYU faithful stow their many memories of magical moments, engineered by one of college football's all-time winningest coaches, a new excitement is looming around the Mountain West.

Enter new head coach Gary Crowton and his highly-touted flair for high-flying offense and hard-nosed defense. Following two seasons as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears and the man credited with re-building the football tradition at Louisiana Tech, Crowton returns to BYU, fulfilling a dream he envisioned as an undergraduate assistant under Edwards in the early 80s.

"This is a dream come true for me," Crowton said as he was named BYU's 13th head coach on Dec. 6, 2000. "I have always dreamed of coaching at BYU. To be able to follow in the footsteps of a legend like LaVell Edwards is both incredibly humbling and challenging. I pledge to BYU fans that I will devote my energy to continuing BYU's winning football tradition."

Though the 44-year-old coach has made significant changes to the program, including the addition of offensive coordinator Mike Borich, running backs coach Paul Tidwell and strength coach Jay Omer, Crowton will have little tinkering to do with a roster complete with 50 returning letterwinners, including 27 offensive and 23 defensive lettermen. BYU will welcome back seven returning offensive and six returning defensive starters, including seven all-MWC performers.

"We feel like we have a lot to work with in terms of personnel," Crowton said. "We will be using as much time as necessary to evaluate the players we have and identify our strengths. The philosophy won't be all that different. We'll have a few different looks and all new terminology, but the key will be to adapt to the talent we have and go from there."



OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

Offensively, the Cougars will have the luxury of returning all five starters along the offensive line, including All-Conference performers Ben Archibald (RT), Dustin Rykert (LT), Jason Scukanec (C), Aaron McCubbins (RG) and second-year starter Teag Whiting (LG). In addition to five returning starters, who tip the scales at an average 6-foot-4, 296 pounds, BYU will look to returning lettermen and key recruits to add much-needed depth to the offensive line that will be coached this season by veteran assistant Lance Reynolds.

Isaac Herring returns for his senior season with plenty of playing experience, along with sophomore Scott Jackson, who saw limited action last season after suffering a preseason ankle injury. Vince Xanthos, a double transfer from Maryland and Minnesota, will join the offensive line, along with Dixie College All-American Quinn Christensen and Ricks College transfer Ryan Keele. All are listed as legitimate competitors for playing time in 2001 and are expected to see plenty of action. The Cougars will also benefit from a successful recruiting class, signing Travis Bright out of Queen Creek, Ariz. (Highland HS), Michael Nay from West Valley City, Utah (Cypress HS), and Jeff Rhea from South Jordan, Utah (Bingham HS).

"When we got here in December, we felt like the offensive line was a little thin," Crowton said. "We've tried to bulk it up a little and now we have some real depth. The offensive line will be very competitive. Without a solid offensive line, a team is really limited. Our depth and experience along the offensive line will definitely be one of the strengths of this team."

QUARTERBACKS

Prior to the start of the 2000 campaign, BYU coaches maintained it wouldn't matter who was listed as the starting quarterback. It was stated any of the three listed on the depth chart could come in and be successful. In fact, Edwards was quoted as saying, "It doesn't matter who we start, we're going to need all three to get through the season."

His words proved prophetic as the Cougars battled the injury bug early and often, calling upon all three quarterbacks to get the job done. Through it all, Bret Engemann, Charlie Peterson and Brandon Doman led BYU to its 28th straight non-losing season, posting a league-leading 3,295 yards passing, averaging over 274 yards per contest. BYU quarterbacks registered a Conference-best six individual 200-yard performances. In fact, all three quarterbacks recorded at least one 300-yard performance throughout the season, marking the first time three different BYU quarterbacks have posted 300-yard games in the same season.

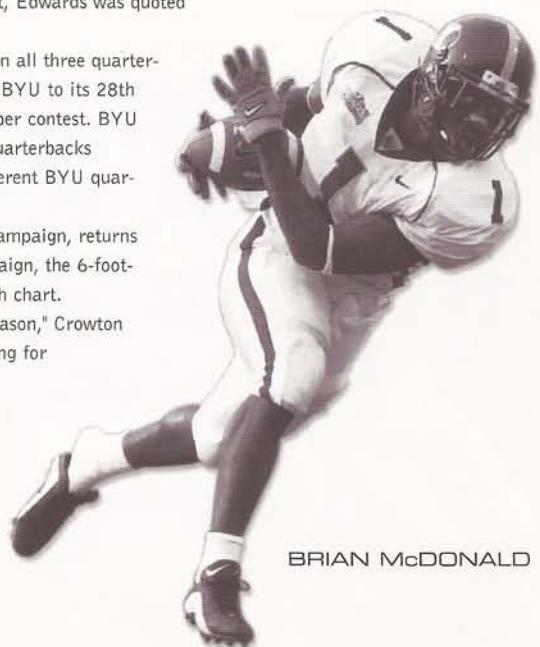
Brandon Doman, who was credited with producing back-to-back wins to conclude the 2000 campaign, returns for his final season in Provo. After earning the starting job in the final two games of the 2000 campaign, the 6-foot-1, 195-pound Salt Lake City native begins the 2001 season as the top quarterback on the BYU depth chart.

"Since Brandon finished last season as the starter, he'll be the number-one guy entering the season," Crowton said. "However, nothing is set in stone. We have four very talented guys who are going to be competing for the starting job, and right now, Brandon is our starter."

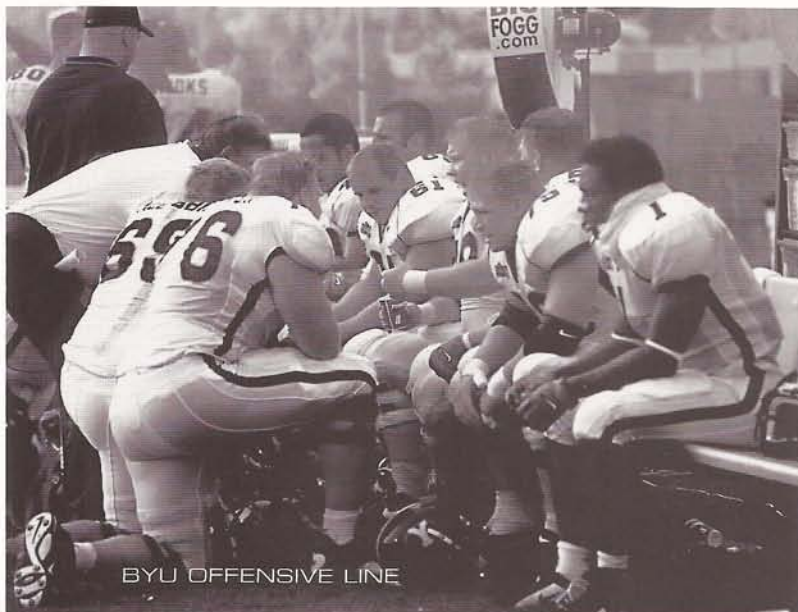

In five appearances as a junior, including two starts, Doman connected on 51-of-92 attempts for 782 yards. In his first-ever collegiate start, Doman led BYU to a 37-13 victory over New Mexico in Edwards' home finale. Doman became the first BYU quarterback to record over 300 yards passing and 50 yards rushing in the

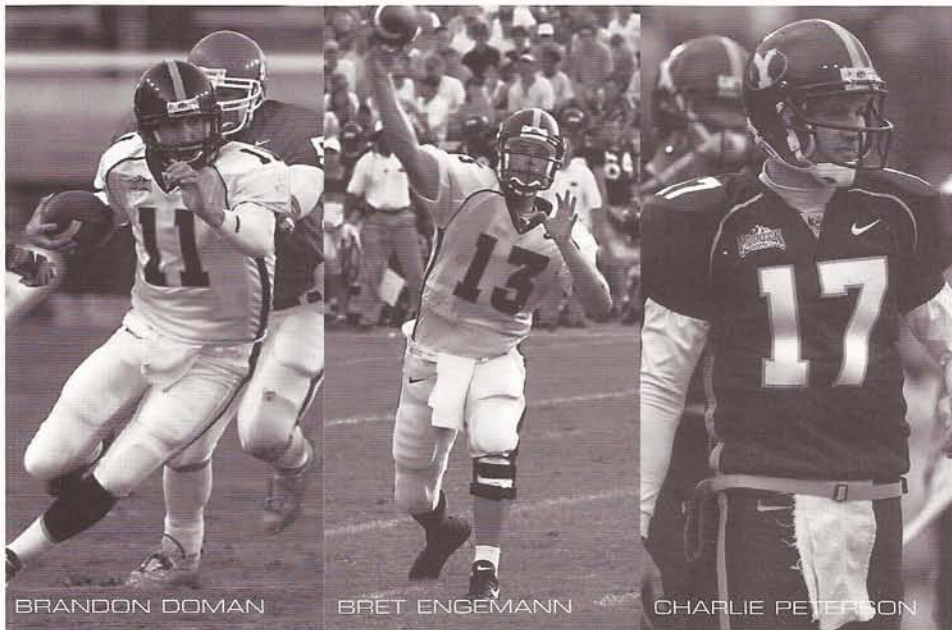


BYU OFFENSIVE LINE

Just prior to the half, Peterson drove the Cougars on a no-huddle, three-play, 69 yard drive that concluded on a 21-yard touchdown completion to Mike Rigell. Against San Diego State, Peterson recorded his second straight 300-yard performance, connecting on 34-of-58 for 376 yards and one touchdown. In the Cougars' 19-7 win over Wyoming, Peterson racked up 225 yards on 22-of-34 attempts. Prior to his second-quarter interception against Wyoming, Peterson had made 164 pass attempts without an interception, passing Jim McMahon for the longest streak without an interception in BYU history. Peterson suffered a separated shoulder during spring drills, but has made strong recovery and is slated to compete at 100 percent.

Engemann, who was listed as the starter in the Cougars' season-opener last season against defending National Champion Florida State, will return for his junior season. Engemann started five games last season, but was sidelined after suffering a season-ending shoulder injury at Syracuse. Engemann underwent surgery to repair his shoulder and has been involved in a successful rehabilitation program throughout the off-season. The 6-foot-4, 225-pound junior completed 72-of-134 attempts for 896 yards and three touchdowns. After suffering a sprained knee against Florida State, Engemann quickly recovered to lead BYU to a 38-35 overtime win at Virginia the following week. For his efforts, Engemann was named the Chevrolet Player of the Game and garnered MWC Offensive Player-of-the-Week honors after connecting on 34-of-41 attempts for a career-high 447 yards and two touchdowns. In only his second start since his final game in high school some four years prior, Engemann completed 12 straight passes at the end of the game to cap the come-from-behind victory.

"Bret has been recovering nicely and working hard to get back," Crowton said. "Not being able to work out during the spring will put him a little behind everyone else in the fall, but with his skills and ability, I'm sure it won't be long before he is right back in the mix."

same game since Steve Young achieved the same feat against UTEP in 1983. An academic all-Conference performer, Doman picked up his second straight victory in the Cougars' final game of the season, defeating Utah, 34-27, in a dramatic come-from-behind performance. Trailing, 26-27, with 1:04 remaining, Doman connected with senior receiver Jonathan Pittman for a 34-yard pickup on fourth-and-13. On the very next play, Doman hooked up with Pittman again for a 36-yard completion. Following a Luke Staley nine-yard carry, Doman scrambled and found his way into the endzone with only :23 seconds remaining. The four-yard touchdown run and following two-point conversion gave BYU the seven-point victory.

Like Doman, Peterson returns for his final season at BYU. After Engemann went down at Air Force, Peterson came on and saw action in eight of BYU's 12 games, including five starts on the season. Peterson, a 6-foot-1, 198-pound senior tallied a team-leading 1,617 yards on the season, completing 149-of-260 attempts. In the Cougars' 38-14 win over Utah State, Peterson completed a game high 24-of-37 (.649) attempts for a career-high 324 yards and one touchdown. Peterson guided the Cougars on six scoring drives, including a touchdown-scoring drive in the third quarter that covered 90 yards on 16 plays and took nearly eight minutes off the clock.

Todd Mortensen will be the fourth quarterback on the BYU roster to compete for playing time this season. Mortensen, a 6-foot-4, 215-pound redshirt freshman recently returned from a Church mission in Venezuela. Mortensen was a first-team All-Arizona and All-East Valley Conference performer as a senior at Tempe High School, where he graduated in 1997 as valedictorian. While at Tempe High School, he held the school record for most career touchdown passes (60), career passing yards (4,950), career victories (28), season touchdown passes (32), season passing yards (2,440) and season victories (14 straight).

RUNNING BACKS

Though BYU has as many as 10 running backs listed on its roster, the running game will hinge largely on two players -- Luke Staley and Brian McDonald.

"Both are very good players," Crowton said. "Luke has good speed and good hands, while Brian has good balance and quickness. Both are strong and have good size and bring a great deal of experience. We just need to keep them healthy. There is no question Luke and Brian will play a very important role in our offense."

Staley returns for his junior season after having recorded a team-leading 806 all-purpose yards as a sophomore. The all-Conference performer totaled 479 yards rushing and 327 yards receiving and scored a team-leading eight touchdowns. The 6-foot-1, 218-pound running back earned MWC Offensive Player-of-the-Week honors after leading BYU to a 10-7 win over UNLV with a career-high 167 yards rushing on 28 carries. Known for his scoring ability, Staley has produced 17 rushing touchdowns and three TD receptions in two seasons, recording at least one touchdown in 12 of the 19 games in which he has played at BYU. Staley has tallied two three-touchdown performances.

After transferring from Cerritos Junior College last season, McDonald played in all 12 games as a junior at BYU. The 5-foot-10, 210-pound running back led the Cougars with eight rushing touchdowns, including three rushing TDs against Virginia in BYU's come-from-behind, overtime victory against Virginia. McDonald ranked second on the BYU roster with 455 yards rushing, averaging 4.5 yards per carry. McDonald also showed his versatility out of the backfield, recording 15 receptions for 79 yards.

Other players expected to contribute to the BYU backfield are seniors Ned Stearns, Mike Nielsen, Paul Peterson and freshman Logan Deans. Stearns and Nielsen mostly contributed last season on special teams, but are expected to see an increased number of minutes this season. Peterson led BYU last season with 516 yards on 24 returns, averaging 21.5 yards per kickoff return. He is also expected to play a significant role in the BYU backfield.

With the return of senior Doug Jolley and junior Gabriel Reid, in addition to newcomer Spencer Nead, a Junior College All-American, the Cougars will enjoy a great deal of size, depth, talent, speed and athletic ability at tight end. In perhaps one of BYU's strongest offensive positions, Crowton expects the tight ends to play a vital role in both the running game, as well as the passing game.

"This will be a key position for us," Crowton said. "We have size, speed, depth, good hands and guys who can block. I'm very excited about the caliber of players we have at tight end. This will be a very competitive position. With any one of these guys in the lineup, we have some options."

Jolley, a 6-foot-4, 241-pound senior recorded 14 receptions in nine games last season, producing 213 yards and one touchdown. Jolley who split time with Tevita Ofahengaue and Reid last season, averaged nearly 24 yards per game.

Reid, a 6-foot-3, 246-pound junior recorded four receptions in eight appearances as a sophomore, averaging 12.5 yards per reception. Nead enters the program after earning Junior College All-American honors at Ricks College

last season. The 6-foot-5, 250-pound highly-touted transfer led Teton High School to an Idaho State championship as a senior, earning all-state honors in both football and basketball.

Other tight ends on the roster looking to gain experience and playing time include Aissac Aiono, a 6-foot-5, 234-pound red-shirt freshman and Justin Jory, a 6-foot-2, 238-pound junior.

RECEIVERS

The question BYU coaches must answer this season ... how do you replace Margin Hooks and Jonathan Pittman? Last year's senior duo produced over 1,400 of the Cougars' 3,295 receiving yards.

"I really think we will see some good things out of our receivers," Crowton said. "We have a lot of guys at receiver right now. It may take some time for things to materialize, but I think we have some talented players. We'll just have to wait and see who will rise to the top."

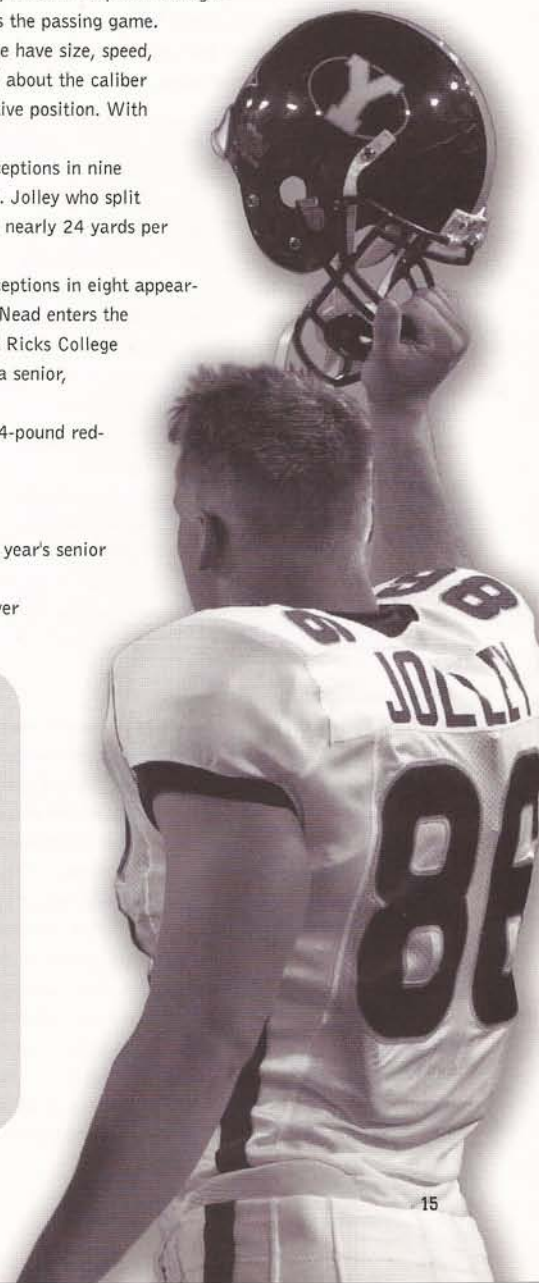
One of the major keys to the receiver corps will be the return of Junior Mahe. Following his freshman season at BYU, Mahe spent the past two seasons away from campus, including a year at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah. Mahe, a 5-foot-10, 190-pound junior earned All-America and all-conference honors at Dixie last season, leading the nation in receiving, with 57 receptions, 1,387 yards and 19 touchdowns.

The most experienced receiver to return is senior Mike Rigell. The 5-foot-7, 184-pound speedster saw action in all 12 games for the Cougars as a junior, recording 220 yards on 21 receptions. Rigell produced three TDs and averaged over 18 yards receiving per game.

Soren Halladay also brings game-time experience, producing 86 yards on five receptions last season. The 6-foot-

1, 195-pound senior played in five games as a junior, averaging 17.2 yards per game. Justin Anderson, a 5-foot-10, 175-pound senior is also expected to compete for playing time. Anderson, who is listed with excellent speed, made an early impression on the new offensive coaching staff during spring drills, but went down with a broken leg in the Blue-White Game. Anderson has had a successful off-season and is expected to compete at 100 percent.

Both David and Toby Christensen (no relation) return with game experience from a year ago. David played in six games as a freshman, though mostly on special teams. Toby also saw action, seeing action in every game last season. Another player with special-teams experience who is expected to contribute at receiver is junior Andrew Ord. The 6-foot-2, 204-pound, two-time letterman brings size and game experience, playing in five games as a sophomore on special teams. Others expected to compete for playing time include Pat Williams, a transfer from Ricks College and sophomore Jason Kukahiko.

"I've really been pleased with the progress of the receivers," Crowton added. "There is a lot for us to look at. We have some speedy guys who have shown some nice things. This position is going to be very competitive."

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN

Traditionally a solid position for the Cougars, BYU is left to do a little rebuilding this season -- especially on the interior. With Chris Hoke and Hans Olsen lost to graduation, defensive line coach Tom Ramage, who announced the 2001 season would be his last after 30 years at BYU, will have to look to some underclassmen and newcomers to fill some holes.

defensive line."

Ryan Gunderson, a 6-foot-3, 280-pound sophomore brings game experience to the tackle position as well, recording three tackles in three games last season. Gunderson is expected to compete for a starting position. Ricks College transfer John Denney, who was recruited as a defensive end, could also see playing time at the tackle position. It's an option Cougar coaches are considering.

"Ryan Gunderson did a nice job during spring," Crowton said. "John Denney has also done a nice job and may get some reps at tackle. He has shown the ability to move around a little. That's something we are continuing to look at."

After working a three-man rotation last season, two of the three ends return and are slated as starters entering fall. Ryan Denney and Brett Keisel are simply big, fast and have a great deal of experience which should play a major role in the Cougars ability to pass rush, as well as stopping the run.

"We have some quickness and good size along the defensive line," Crowton said. "Specifically, the guys we have lined up at defensive end are big and fast. They're going to be good. We also have some newcomers and some guys who have

converted from tight end who should make an impact."

Denney, a 6-foot-7, 275-pound senior played in 11 of the Cougars' 12 games last season, recording 47 tackles, including 31 unassisted takedowns. Denney produced 14 tackles for a combined loss of 54 yards, including four sacks for 23 yards. He was credited with two pass breakups, one hurry, one recovered fumble, one forced fumble and two blocked kicks. Keisel, a 6-foot-5, 269-pound senior, saw action in all 12 games as a junior, recording 22 tackles. Keisel produced 10 tackles for a combined loss of 54 yards, including five sacks for 47 yards. He was also credited with three pass breakups and two QB hurries.

Converted tight ends Brandon Stephens and Jeff Cowart, along with Ricks College transfer John Denney are also competing for playing time at defensive end. C.J. Ah You was a pleasant surprise during spring drills, displaying amazing speed and the ability to make big plays. Ah You is expected to play a key role along the defensive line for the Cougars.

LINEBACKERS

The linebacking corps, ranked second in the nation by Athlon magazine, is expected to be the heart and soul of the BYU defense. Anchored by seniors Justin Ena and Isaac Kelley, along with sophomore Paul Walkenhorst, all three return with plenty of experience and a proven track record for getting the job done.

Arguably one of the best trios in recent BYU history, Ena, Kelley and Walkenhorst combined for 218 tackles last season, including 34 tackles for a net loss of 132 yards.

"There is no question our linebackers are going to be good," Crowton explained.

"These three guys are experienced and bring a lot to the defense. Our linebackers, including

some of the younger guys, are going to get a lot of action this year. We expect they will be the key strength to our defense."

Ena, charged with replacing first-round draft pick Rob Morris at middle linebacker last season, simply led the Cougars in tackles as a junior, racking up 107 stops, including 49 unassisted tackles. The 6-foot-3, 261-pound first-team All-Mountain West Conference performer forced a team-leading three fumbles, along with three sacks and four pass breakups.

Kelley, a 6-foot-4, 240-pound senior returns as the starter along the weak side, recording 63 tackles and four sacks last season. The converted quarterback registered 14 tackles for a combined loss of 61 yards.

Walkenhorst, who was forced into action last season with the season-ending injury suffered by Josh Lowe, allowed the Cougars to carry on without missing a beat. The 6-foot-5, 255-pound sophomore produced 48 tackles in 10 games, carrying the responsibility as a true freshman with the composure of a hardened veteran. Walkenhorst recorded nine stops for a combined loss of 34 yards, including one sack for five yards.

In typical Ken Schmidt fashion, the Cougars have some talented players waiting in the wings as well. Each are expected to contribute and should see plenty of playing time this season. Sophomores Bill Wright, Colby Bockwoldt, Brent Carlson and Ammon Mauga each have game experience from last season, recording a combined 26 tackles on the season. Freshman Brady Poppinga, a 6-foot-3, 237-pound freshman, has made his mark and will see action for the Cougars.

After seeing plenty of action in 1999 at safety, Dustin Staley moved to corner last season, filling in for a slightly depleted roster. Staley is back at safety this season and is expected to start on the strong side.

"I think our safeties will be pretty good," Crowton said. "We have some experience there and they have shown some good things early on. They all have good size and range."

Junior Michael Madsen, sophomores Kurt Elliott, Alex Farris, Air Force Academy transfer Brandon Heaney and redshirt freshman Jon Burbidge will also compete for playing time at safety.

CORNERBACKS

After a one-year absence, sophomore Jernaro Gilford will highlight the BYU secondary with his highly-touted closing speed and dominating physical play. Gilford saw limited action in 1999, playing a back-up role to Brian Gray and Heshimu Robertson, but made the most of his playing opportunities, leaving BYU coaches anxious to get him back in the lineup.

"Jernaro is big and strong and can cover exceptionally well," Crowton said. "It will be good to have him back and not have to worry about that side of the field."

After seeing plenty of action last season, Derrus Wilson, Danny Phillips and

Michael Lafitte all return for their senior campaigns.

"We've got some guys who have made some real progress at corner,"

Crowton said. "We feel real good about the way things are developing at corner and really think we have the size, speed and experience to handle things there."

SPECIAL TEAMS

Aaron Edmonds will have some big shoes to fill. Owen

Pochman, BYU's all-time leading field goal kicker is on his way to the NFL's New England Patriots and Edmonds, a 5-foot-11, 192-pound senior, will have the job of maintaining BYU's reliable kicking game. Edmonds, who averaged 43.6 yards per punt and landed 17 punts inside the 20-yard line, will handle punting and kick-off duties for the Cougars. Though he may be called upon to kick field goals as well, that job is likely to be handled by redshirt freshman Matt Payne - a 6-foot-4, 247-pound North Ogden, Utah native.

"There's no question Edmonds can punt and kick for us," Crowton said. "But, we will have to see how that develops. Payne did a nice job during the spring and is making some improvements in his accuracy and range. I think our kicking game is going to be fine."

Though BYU coaches have yet to determine who will be returning punts and kickoffs, the usual list of suspects have been listed among those competing for the job.

Senior Mike Rigell led the Cougars last season with 29 punt returns, averaging 6.7 yards per return. Senior Paul Peterson is also back after leading the BYU roster with an average 21.5 yards per kickoff return last season. David Christensen has also been penciled in after recording 8.0 yards per punt and 22.2 yards per kick-off last season.

Gary Crowton, Chicago Bears' offensive coordinator and former head coach at Louisiana Tech was introduced by Brigham Young University President, Merrill J. Bateman, as the 13th head football coach at BYU.

"As we begin a new era of football at BYU, I can think of no other person who is as qualified and prepared to take over a program that has been under the direction of a living legend in LaVell Edwards, than Gary Crowton," said Bateman. "This is a wonderful day in the history of our tremendous athletics program."

Crowton, a native of Orem, Utah, will take over a BYU program that has been under the direction of college football's sixth all-time winningest coach, LaVell Edwards. Edwards took over the program in 1972, coaching the Cougars to a 257-101-3 (.716) record.

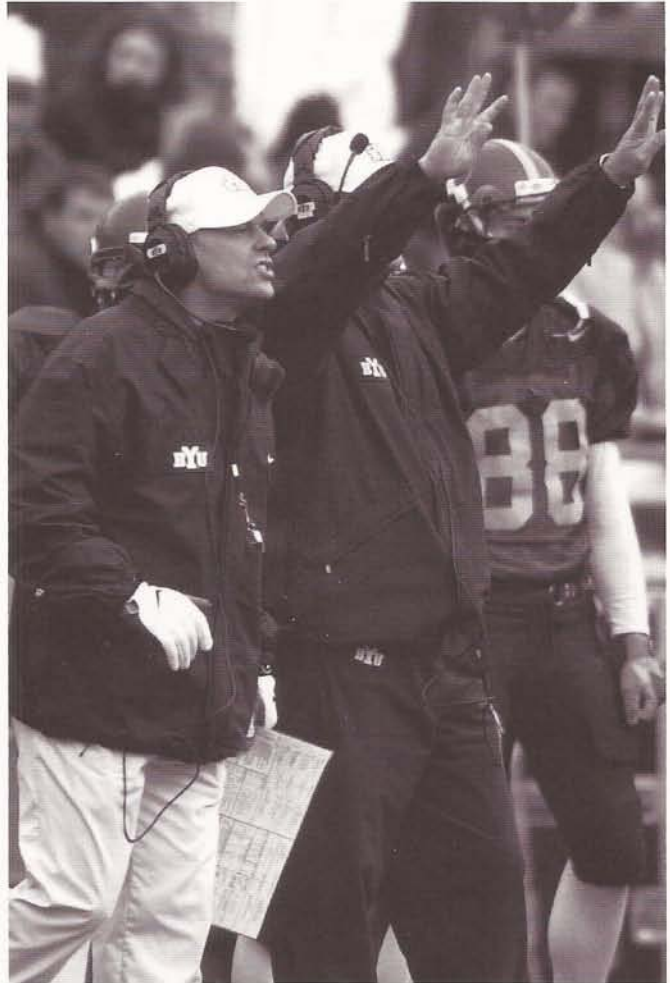
"This is an exciting time for me and my family," Crowton said. "I have always dreamed of coaching at BYU. To be able to follow in the footsteps of a legend like LaVell Edwards is both incredibly humbling and challenging. I pledge to BYU fans that I will devote my energy to continuing BYU's winning football tradition."

Crowton, 43, comes to BYU with a long and proven list of coaching accomplishments. Prior to serving the past two seasons as the offensive coordinator with the NFL's Chicago Bears, where his offense ranked third in the NFL in passing yardage during the 1999 season, Crowton was head coach at Louisiana Tech from 1996-1998. There he guided the Bulldogs to a 21-13 (.618) record over three seasons, including a 9-2 mark in 1997.

"Gary is a very articulate, hard-working football coach and will do a great job," Edwards said. "He has an excellent understanding of the game. From the opportunities I have had to work with Gary, I've always known he had the potential to be a very good coach. Everyone he's worked with has given him a glowing report."

Competing as an independent for three straight years, Louisiana Tech recorded wins over the likes of Mississippi State, Cal and Alabama. Using its Crowton-designed, high-powered offense, the program also recorded impressive wins by scoring 50-or-more points against eight different opponents, including games of 60-or-more points in five different games. Crowton's offense ranked third in the nation, both in passing and total offense, while the Bulldogs racked up 12,746 yards passing in three years, an average of 4,249 yards per season. The prolific Tech offense also produced 115 touchdown receptions, averaging 38.3 TDs per season. Under Crowton, NFL first-round draft pick Troy Edwards recorded a school-record 280 receptions and 4,352 yards receiving. Over a span of 34 games, Crowton's offense at Louisiana Tech engineered 22 different 300-yard passing games, including school-record 10, 300-yard outings during the 1998 season. In 1998, Crowton's final season at Louisiana Tech, the Bulldogs combined for a school-record 4,943 yards passing.

"We are thrilled Gary is coming home to Utah Valley," BYU athletics director Val Hale said. "He has an impressive list of coaching accomplishments, and I am confident he will continue the great tradition established by LaVell Edwards. He employs a wide-open offensive philosophy that is sure to excite the fans. BYU and Gary Crowton are a perfect match."

Crowton's coaching career actually began in 1982 as a student assistant under Edwards at BYU. While at BYU he worked with current Seattle Seahawks head coach Mike Holmgren and future NFL Hall of Famer, Steve Young. From BYU, Crowton moved on to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he coached from 1983-86. While at Snow College, Crowton moved from defensive backs coach to offensive coordinator. Under his offensive leadership, the Badgers won the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championship in 1985.

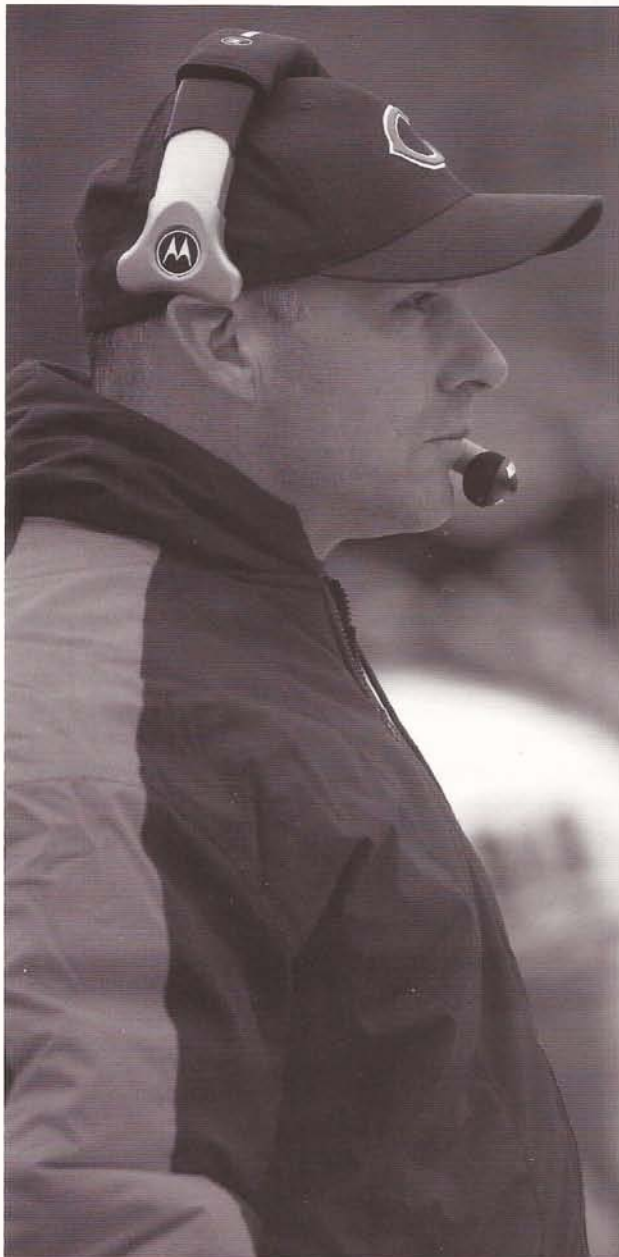
From Snow College, Crowton moved to Western Illinois, where he directed the Leathernecks' passing game for a single season. In 1988, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at New Hampshire, where the Wildcats were the top-rated passing team in the Yankee Conference from 1988-90.

In 1991, Crowton was hired as the quarterback coach at Boston College under head coach Tom Coughlin. There he helped develop quarterback Glenn Foley as a candidate for the Heisman Trophy. After three successful seasons with the Eagles, Crowton was hired as the co-offensive coordinator at Georgia Tech, where his offense led the Yellow Jackets to a No. 21 national ranking in his first and only season in Atlanta. In 1995, Crowton was hired as the offensive coordinator at Louisiana Tech, where he would become the head coach the following season.

Crowton was an all-state quarterback at Orem High School before earning All-American honors at Snow College. Crowton transferred to Colorado State, where he finished his career at wide receiver. Following an LDS Church mission to South Korea, Crowton attended Idaho State, where he ran track for the Bengals. After returning to BYU in 1982, Crowton earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1983.

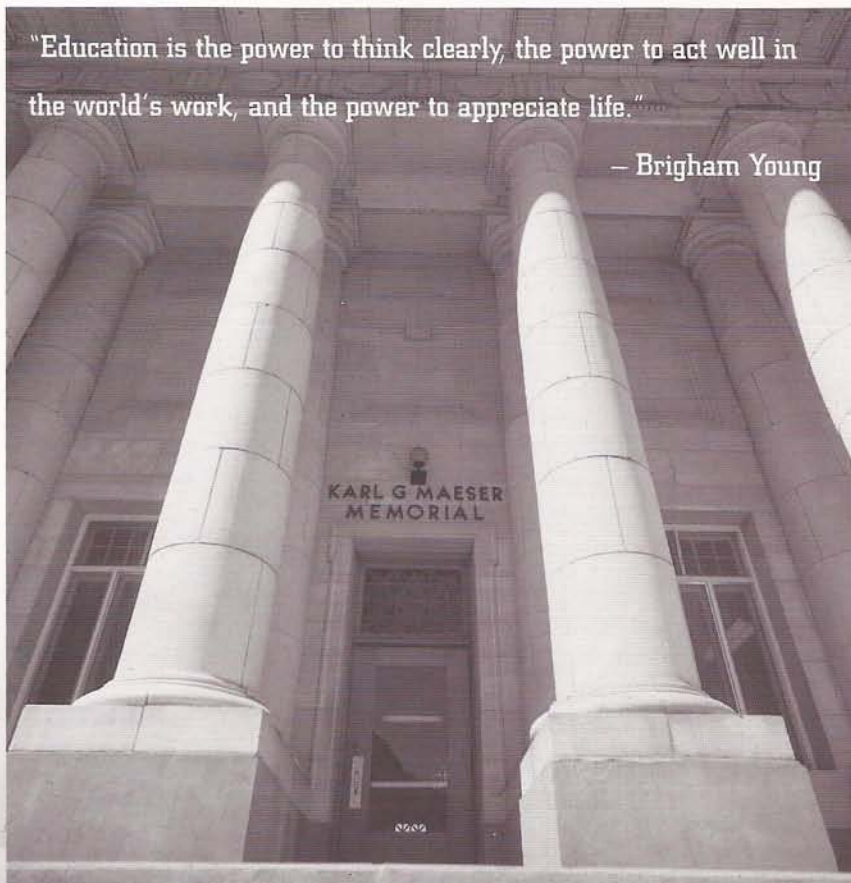
Brigham Young University was founded in 1875 and is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Competition for admission is stiff. In fall 2000, the average freshman admitted had a 3.76 GPA and a 27.6 composite score on the ACT. According to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, in its annual ranking of colleges and universities enrolling freshmen Merit Scholars named each year, BYU ranked 14th in the nation with its admittance of 130 freshmen Merit Scholars in 2000. The attention to academics doesn't end after admission to the university. BYU is one of the leaders in students who are award-



ed National Science Foundation fellowships; eight students received awards in 2000. During the last decade, BYU has also

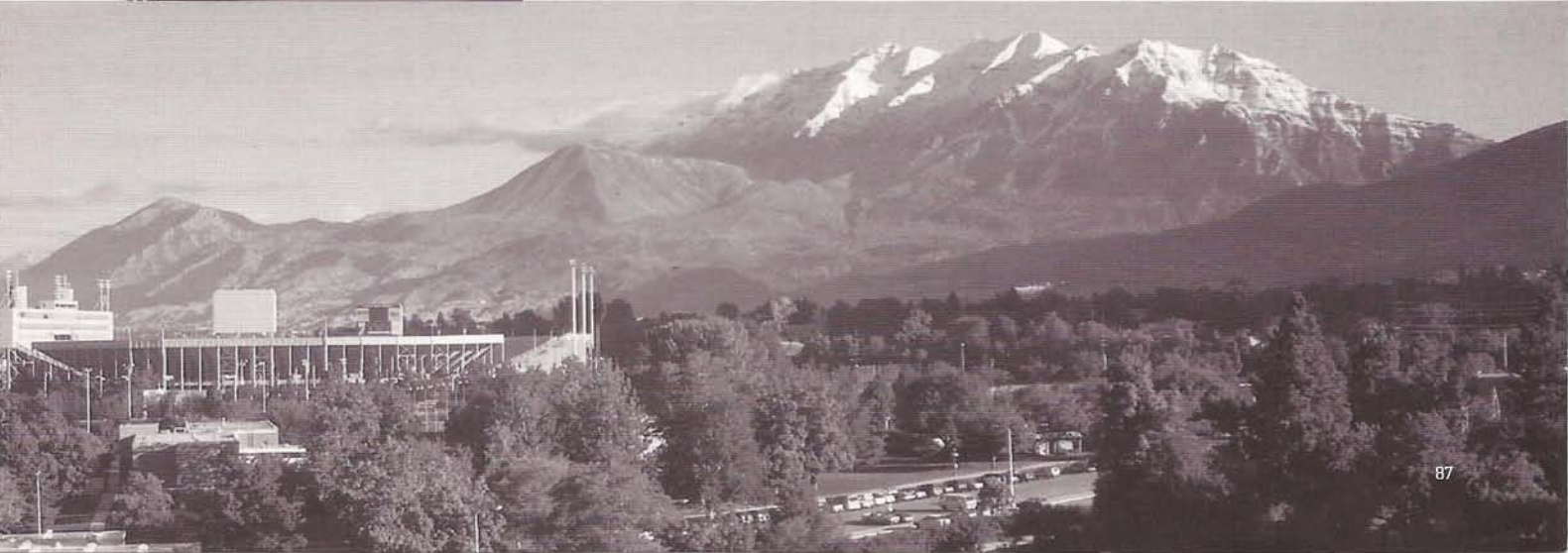
BYU students come from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and more than 100 countries. Approximately 50 percent are men, 50 percent are women, and 76 percent of the student body is single. Ninety-nine percent of the students are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and 1% represent over 20 other religions. Eighty-one percent of the men and 13 per-

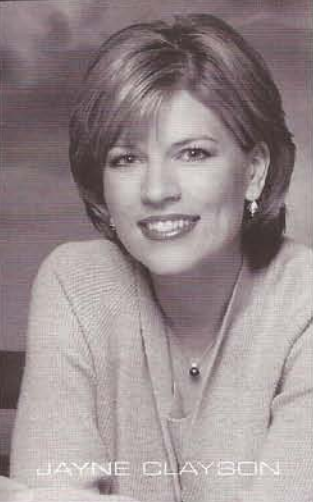
cent of the women have served full-time missions for the LDS Church. More than 70 percent of BYU students speak a second language.

Full-time enrollment for fall semester 2000 totalled 30,069 with another 2,485 part-time day students and 1,091 evening school students. Of the full-time day students, 28,257 are undergraduates and 1,812 are graduate students.



Although 99 percent of the student body is LDS, more than 20 other denominations are represented at BYU. Admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the BYU Honor Code.

MISSIONARIES

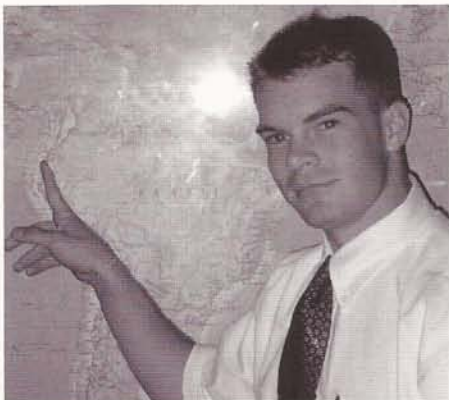
BYU is owned and operated by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. The program follows the biblical pattern of sending out missionaries two by two.

The Church operates more than 334 missions in the world. Each is presided over by a mission president called from the ranks of Church membership to serve for three years. The mission president directs the work of the missionaries assigned to his mission.

Currently, approximately 61,000 Latter-day Saints are serving proselytizing missions around the world. Approximately 75 percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26. Yet substantial numbers of single women (18 percent) and older couples (7 percent) also serve proselytizing missions. These missionaries serve for two years (men) or 18 months (women and couples), teaching the restored gospel and its ordinances and engaging in community service.

The missionaries or their families donate money to the Church equal to the average cost of a missionary's expenses. After their missions, missionaries return to schooling, vocations, or family.

Each missionary, when first called, is assigned to one of 16 missionary training centers around the world. Those required to learn another language spend eight weeks in training before traveling to their assigned mission. If the missionaries do not need to learn a new language, they attend only two or three weeks of basic orientation.

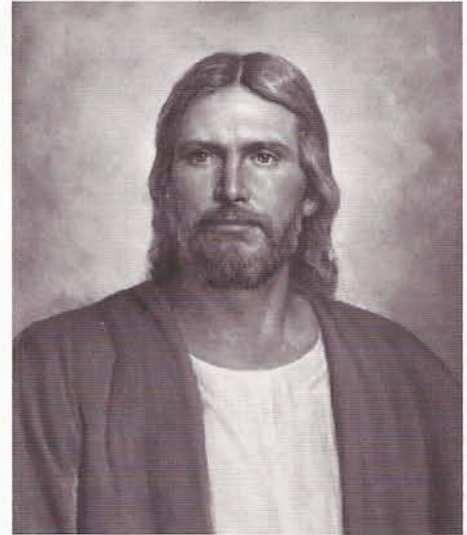
CHURCH BELIEFS

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on 6 April 1830 with six members. Today congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With more than 11 million members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

Members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints believe in God the Father, in His Son Jesus Christ, and in the Holy Ghost. The three make up the Godhead—one in purpose but separate in being.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is Christian but is neither Catholic nor Protestant. Rather, it is a restoration of the original church established by Jesus Christ. The Book of Mormon: Another Testament of Jesus Christ is regarded as divinely inspired scripture, as is the Holy Bible. Both volumes are used by Latter-day Saints side by side.

Through God's plan, all also come to earth to receive a physical body, gain experience, and prove themselves worthy to return to live with God forever. To Latter-day Saints, life on earth is a probationary state in which men and women are tried and tested, and where they gain experiences obtainable nowhere else.



THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER-DAY SAINTS

Many churches teach the importance of family as the bedrock of our civilization. Distinctively, the concept of a united family which lives and progresses forever is at the core of Latter-day Saint doctrine. Marriages performed in the Church's temples do not dissolve at death. Rather, marriage and family relationships "sealed" in this way may continue through eternity, contingent upon faithful observance of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

The Church and its faithful members embrace the biblical principle of tithing, which is contributing one-tenth of one's income for the work of the Church. The generous offerings of its members enable the Church to finance the construction, education, welfare, missionary, curriculum, humanitarian, and other programs that benefit people worldwide.

BYU'S NEW MILLER BASEBALL/SOFTBALL COMPLEX



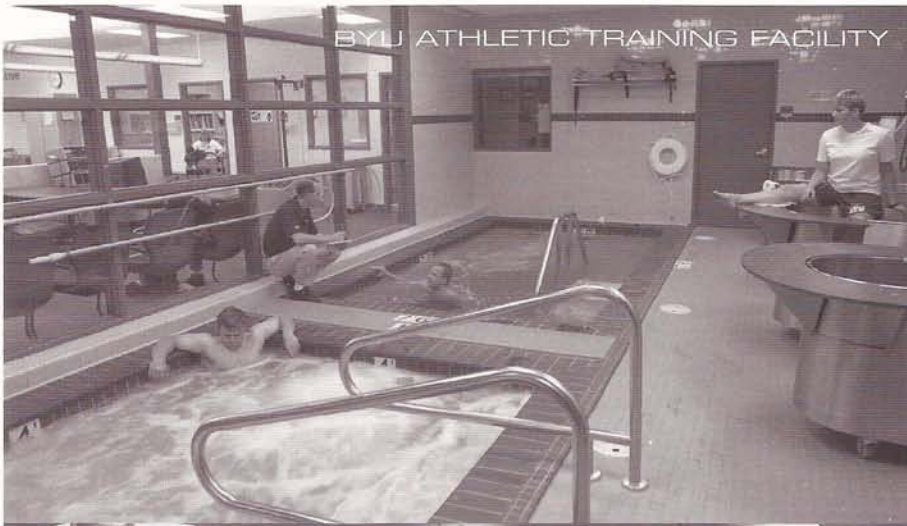

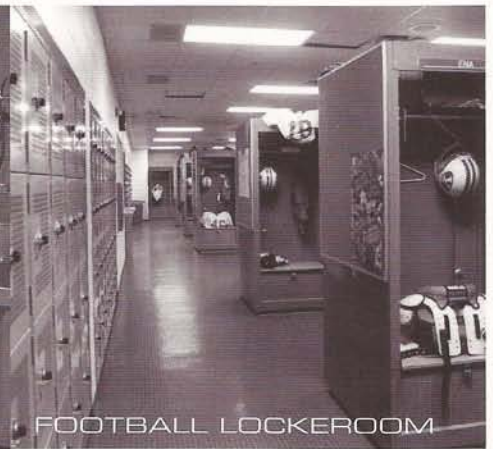

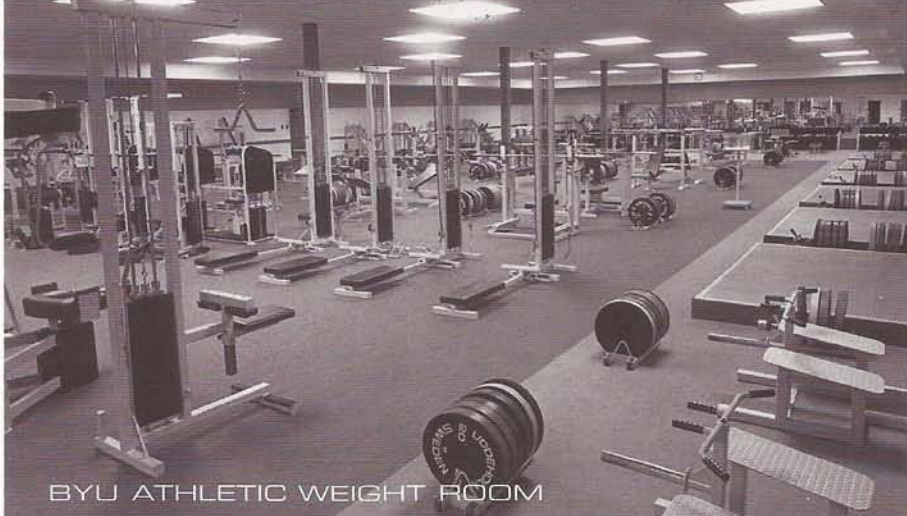

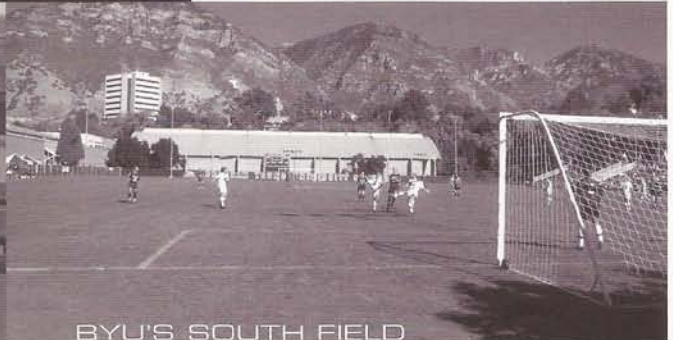
BYU's athletic training staff is responsible for the care of student-athletes from the time they arrive on campus, aiding in the prevention of injuries. When student-athletes do get injured, they are treated by one of the nation's most qualified athletic training staff. The staff includes certified athletic trainers, a sports physical therapist, a team physician, team orthopedic surgeons and a wide variety of other medical specialists. BYU athletic trainers are concerned with much more than just improvement in the weight room. They are committed to improving the athletes' overall fitness and health.

A \$3.5 million expansion to the team's locker room and athletic training facilities in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was finished in March of 1996. Success begins with training and BYU has a state-of-the-art strength and conditioning center with nearly 10,000 feet of working space that ranks among the nation's best. It features 106 stations to accommodate both female and male athletes. A well-structured strength and conditioning program is playing an increasingly vital role in the success of collegiate basketball programs.

The primary goal of the BYU program is to keep athletes healthy and prepared for competition by reducing their susceptibility to injury. BYU's strength and conditioning staff has experienced excellent results through its computer analyzed combination of a strict weight and conditioning program, a carefully planned diet and sufficient rest.

BYU'S SOUTH FIELD

new indoor practice facility

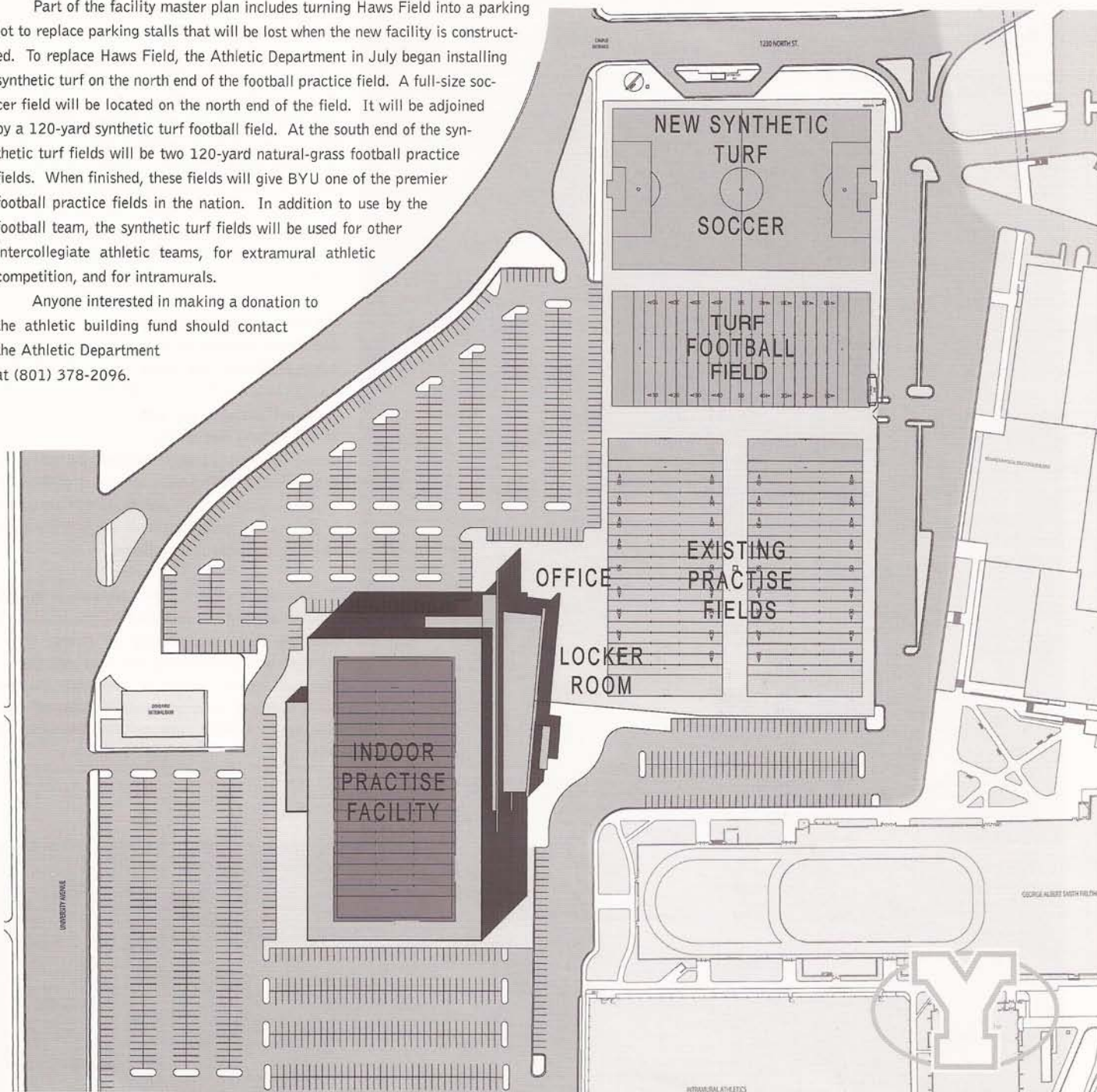
At BYU's final home game last year, President Gordon B. Hinckley, chair of BYU's Board of Trustees, and BYU President Merrill J. Bateman announced plans to build a new, state-of-the-art indoor athletic facility. The facility will include a 120-yard indoor football field, a strength and conditioning center, a football locker room, team meeting rooms, coaches offices, a student-athlete academic center, and administrative offices.

BYU currently is raising money to fund construction of the facility. "We need all our fans to help with this project," said Val Hale, BYU's director of athletics. "BYU Athletics has never embarked on a fund-raising campaign this ambitious. In addition to funding construction of the building, we must raise enough money to endow the maintenance of the building in perpetuity. Small donations are as important as large donations. Every penny helps."

BYU officials have traveled across the country to view the best collegiate and professional football facilities. They have taken the best ideas and tried to combine them into the design of the new facility, which will be located immediately west of the BYU football practice fields. Numerous sports will benefit from the indoor practice area. Football, soccer, baseball, softball, golf, and other sports will use the indoor practice area during winter months.

Part of the facility master plan includes turning Haws Field into a parking lot to replace parking stalls that will be lost when the new facility is constructed. To replace Haws Field, the Athletic Department in July began installing synthetic turf on the north end of the football practice field. A full-size soccer field will be located on the north end of the field. It will be adjoined by a 120-yard synthetic turf football field. At the south end of the synthetic turf fields will be two 120-yard natural-grass football practice fields. When finished, these fields will give BYU one of the premier football practice fields in the nation. In addition to use by the football team, the synthetic turf fields will be used for other intercollegiate athletic teams, for extramural athletic competition, and for intramurals.

THE FIELD

The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

THE EARLY YEARS

BYU football hasn't always had the luxury of Cougar Stadium. When BYU began its football program in 1896, pasture lands and city parks were the playing fields. In the early 1900's, a rocky field was cleared and a grandstand erected where the Joseph Smith Building now stands.

In 1928, the next Cougar playing field was built where the Stephen L. Richards Building now stands. By using the hillside for seating, the spectator accommodation was increased from a few hundred to five thousand.

As BYU football increased in popularity, the university was forced to find yet another location for a new stadium. Groundbreaking for the current Cougar Stadium commenced in October, 1963. The initial seating capacity was set at 28,812 but soon increased to 35,000.

LAST EXPANSION

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships).

The stadium expansions increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reported at the time as "the largest gathering ever in Utah history."

VIDEO SCOREBOARD

In 1996, a 23 x 31 foot video scoreboard wall, showing both live action and instant replays, was added above the stands by the south end zone.

A new animation board and sound system was also added to the scoreboard above the north stands.

OTHER EVENTS

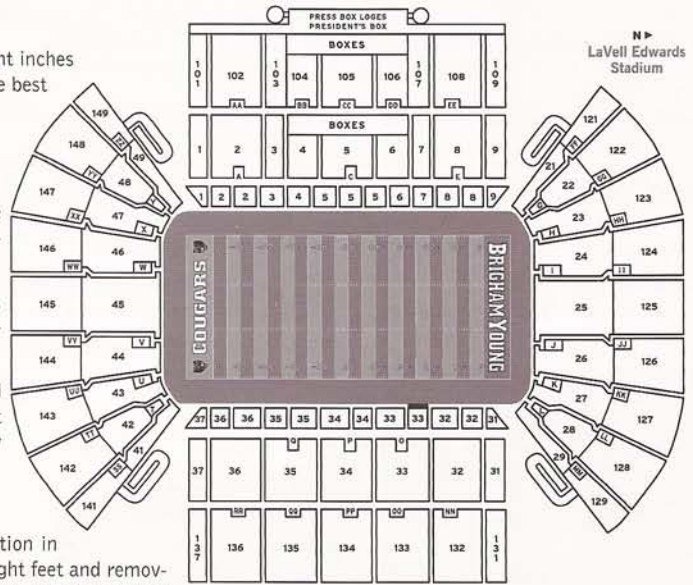
Besides the regular season football games, Cougar Stadium is also used for a variety of other purposes. Music concerts have been hosted there as well as the annual "Stadium of Fire," the July 4th Spectacular held as part of America's Freedom Festival.

High school playoff games and "the Rocky Mountain Band Competition" also include some of the competition on the field every year.

COUGAR ROOM

The BYU Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room is located in Cougar Stadium. The room is used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets during the year.

In addition to the many office areas, Cougar Stadium stores campus surplus furniture, maintenance vehicles and one of North America's largest Jurassic dinosaur collections.

LAVELL EDWARDS STADIUM

With its 65,000-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards, and immaculate press boxes, LaVell Edwards Stadium is home to legendary BYU football. Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 25 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.

THE FIELD


The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

PRESS BOX

In 1982, 1988 and 1997 the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding press box working area." The Cougar Stadium press box has been named the "Provo Marriott" by the media who cover BYU football.

Rising over 10 stories high, the four-level press box is located on the west side of the stadium and runs the entire length of the stands. Levels one and two of the press box contain 42 private loges, each one equipped with 12 padded chairs, a television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, sink and game programs.

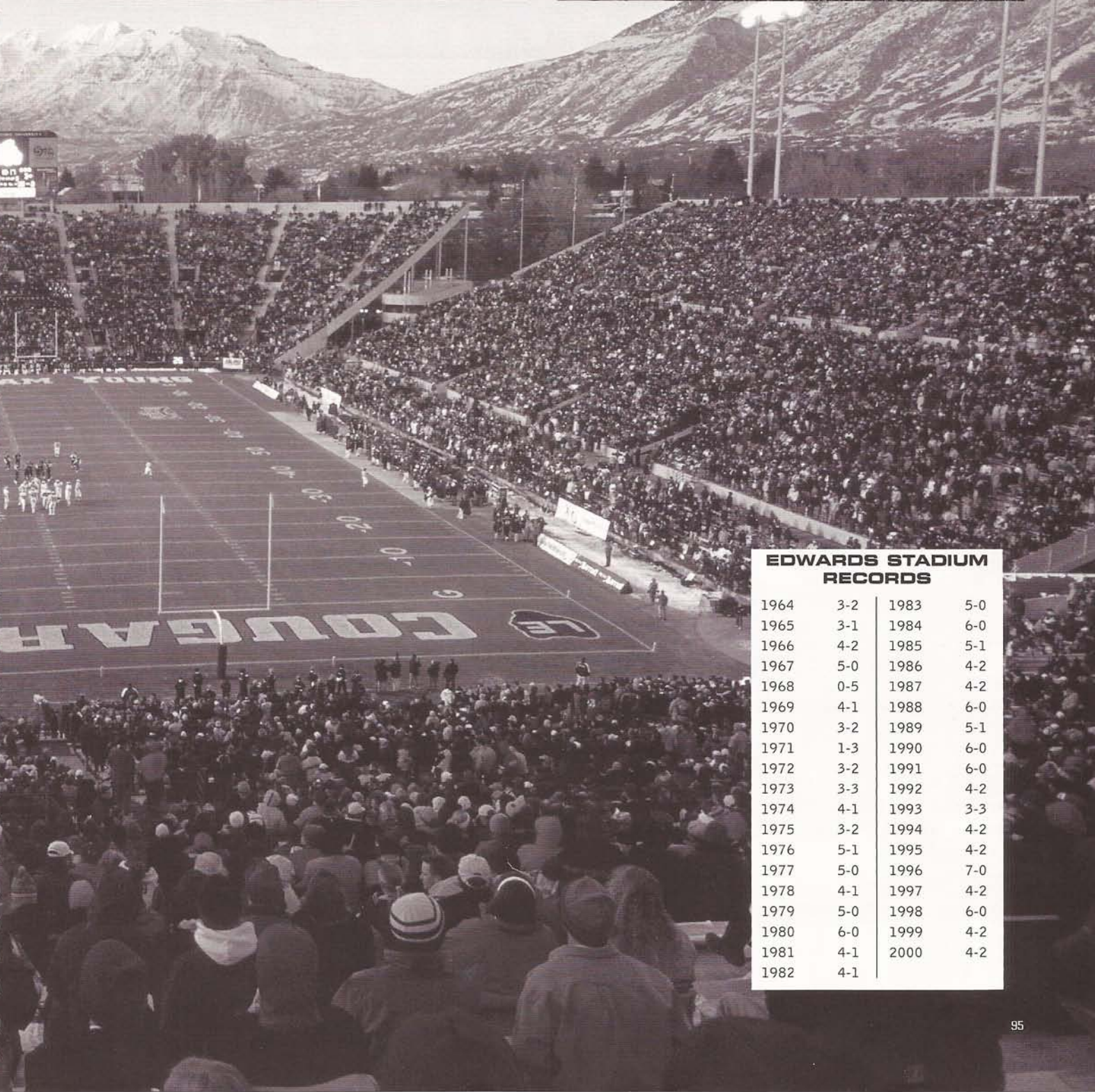
The BYU President's box, which includes 163 padded chairs, five television sets and a buffet area, is also located on the first floor. Level three is reserved for the print and electronic media along with all the game operators. The statistics, public address, sound and scoreboard controls are all located on the third level. Altogether, approximately 300 people work on the third level during games. Level four is primarily used for television game filming.



On Saturday, Nov. 18, LDS Church President, Gordon B. Hinckley announced the Board of Trustees, in honor and recognition of head coach LaVell Edwards, had approved the re-naming of Cougar Stadium. President Hinckley made the announcement to over 62,000 fans in a pregame ceremony, officially naming the stadium LaVell Edwards Stadium; Home of the BYU Cougars. Since the stadium's expansion in 1982, the Cougars posted a 90-22 record. Since the expansion, over 9,250,000 fans have entered the stadium to watch the LaVell Edwards-led Cougars. Edwards posted an overall record of 132-22 in Provo. With the win on Saturday, BYU finished the 2000 season 4-2 in Provo, including a mark of 1-0 in LaVell Edwards Stadium.



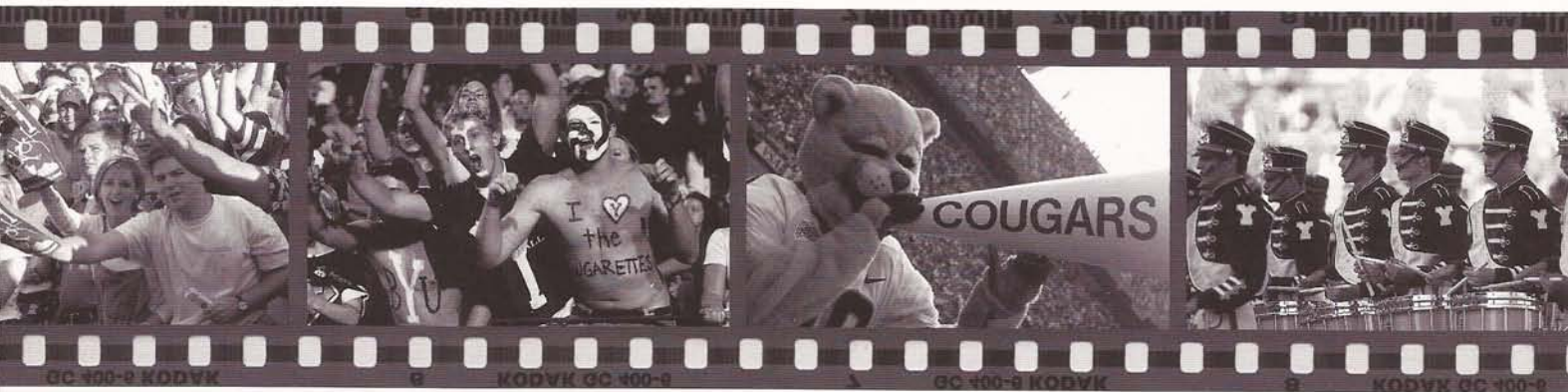

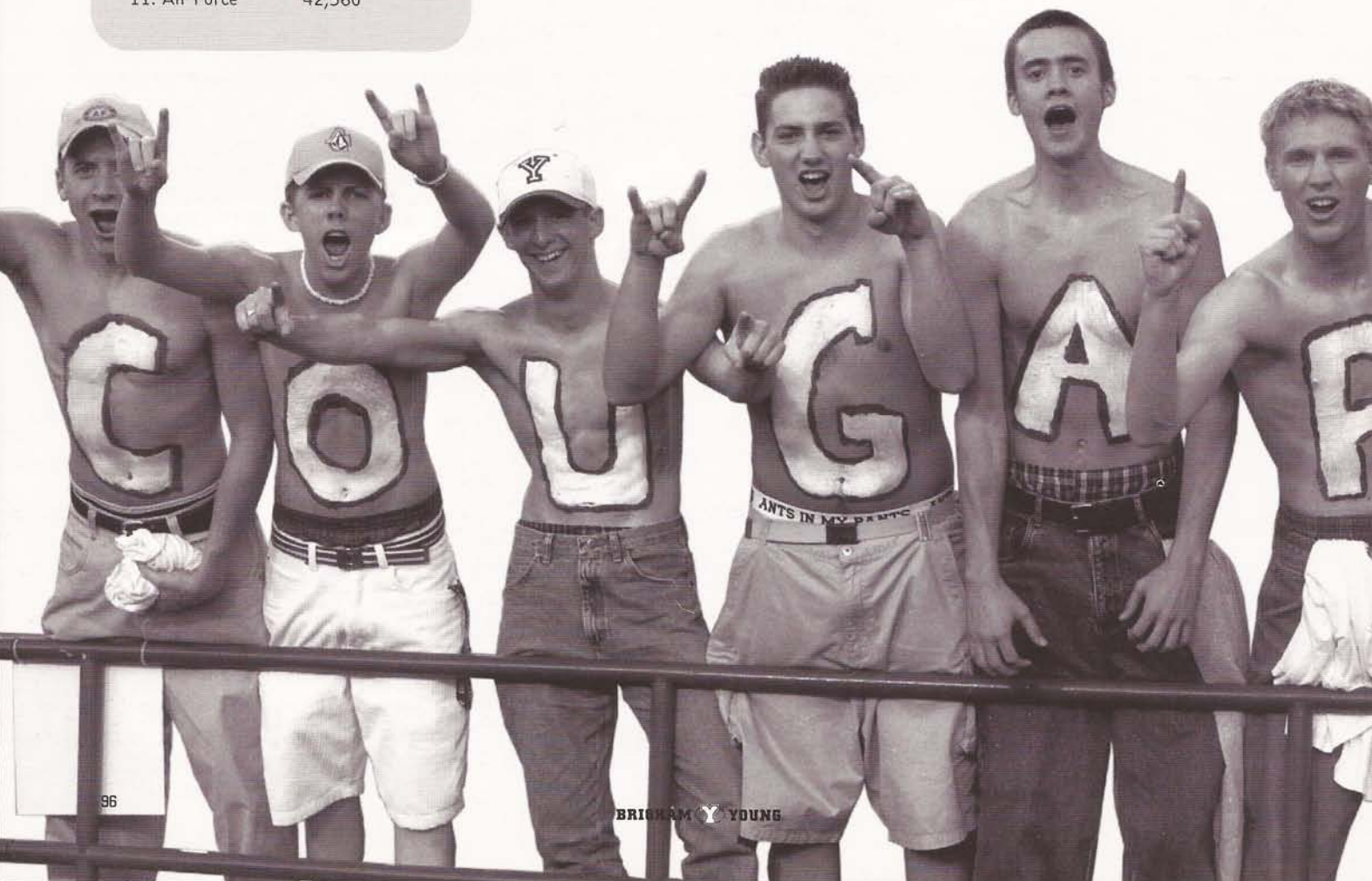

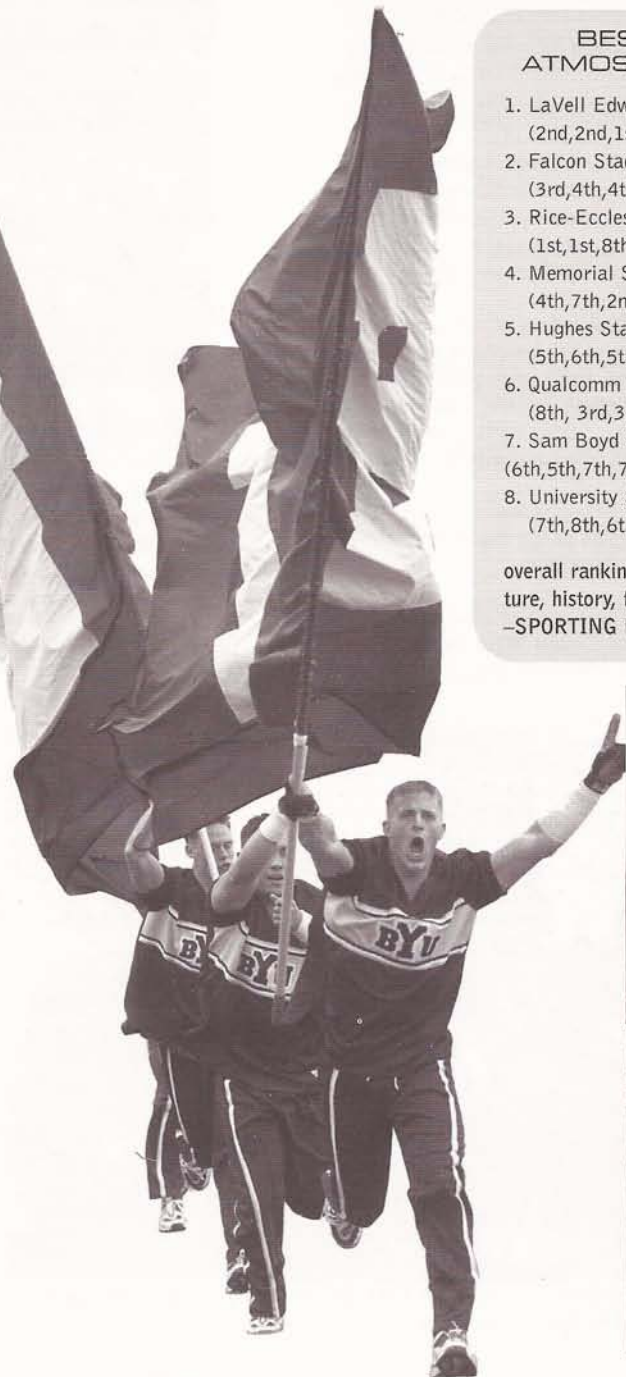

Pride of the Mountain West

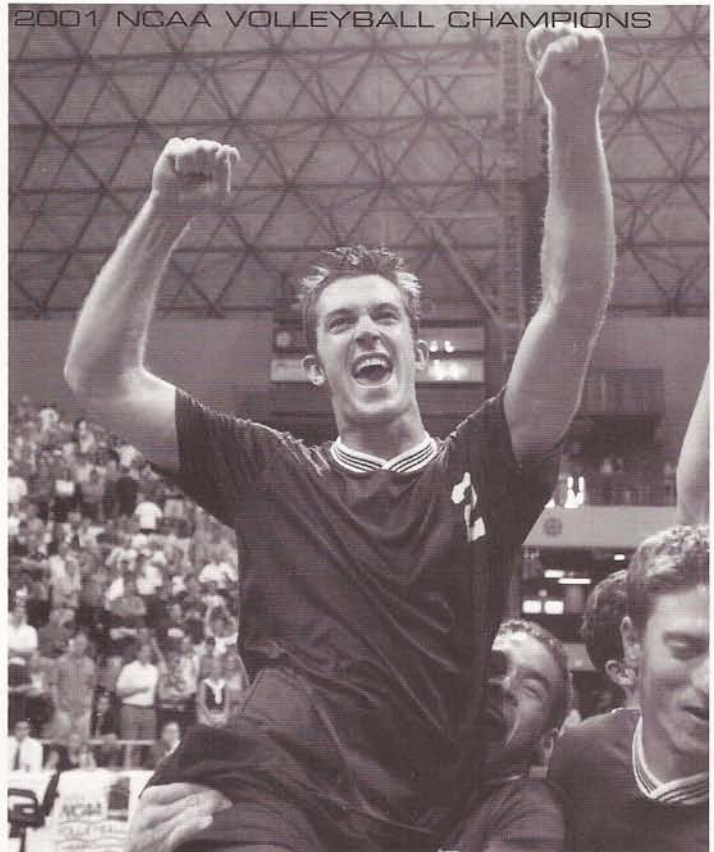
In the two year history of the MWC, the Cougars have won 27 of 38 conference championships. Last Season BYU won 16 of 19 MWC Championships while seven BYU teams finished the year ranked in the nations top 20 in helping the Cougars to a 17th place finish in the Sears Cup Standings.

With all of the 2000-2001 Mountain West Conference championships wrapped-up, BYU athletics is looking back on its most successful league performance ever. The Cougars took their share of conference titles winning 16 of the 19 sports they compete in, the most titles BYU has ever won in a year.

In 2000-2001, BYU won MWC titles in men's basketball, men's golf, women's soccer, men's swimming and diving, women's swimming and diving, men's cross country, women's cross country, women's volleyball, softball, baseball, men's indoor track, women's indoor track, men's outdoor track, women's outdoor track, men's tennis and women's tennis.

Outside of the MWC, BYU's volleyball teams won the MPSF regular season title and went on to win the NCAA National Championship, its second in three years.

Winning the conference title was business as usual for many BYU sports, while other sports made debut appearances in the winner's circle and some returned to glory.



All-American Mike Wall and BYU won its second volleyball national championship in three years becoming the first team to ever defeat volleyball powerhouse UCLA in three straight games in an NCAA Championship contest. The three game sweep of UCLA helped BYU become the only non-Californian school to win more than one men's volleyball national championship.

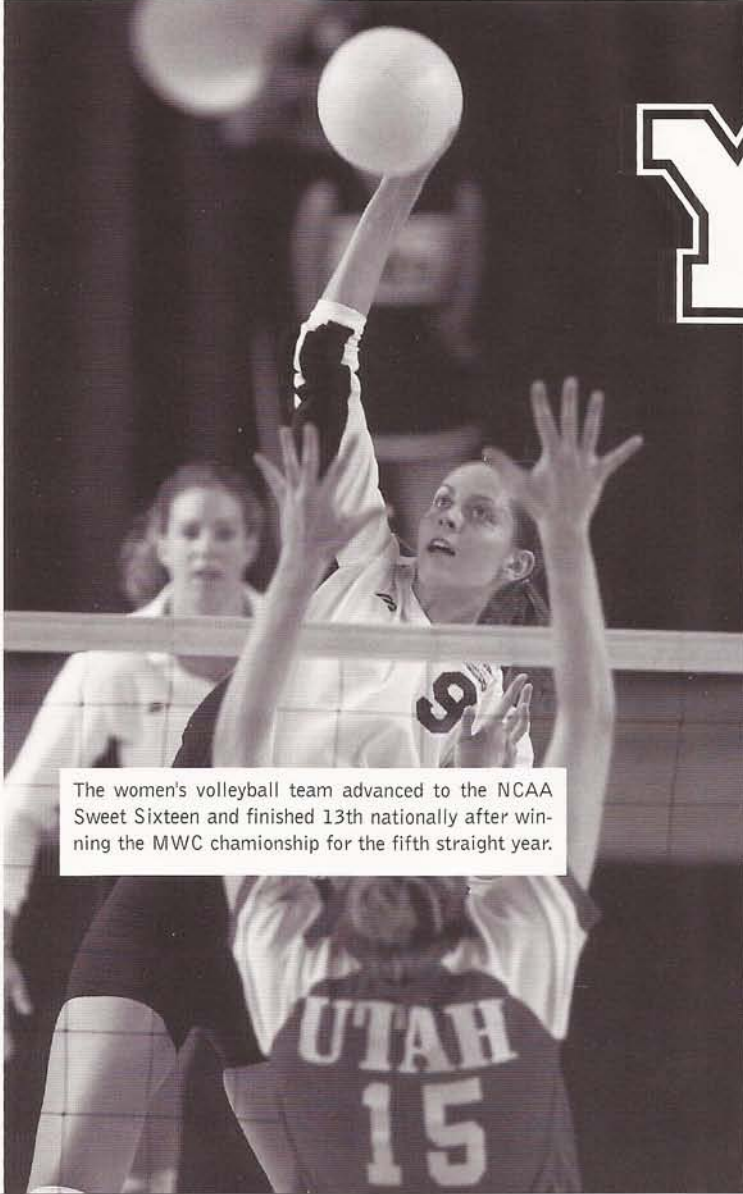

From 1962 to 1999 BYU dominated the Western Athletic Conference winning more championships than any other WAC School. 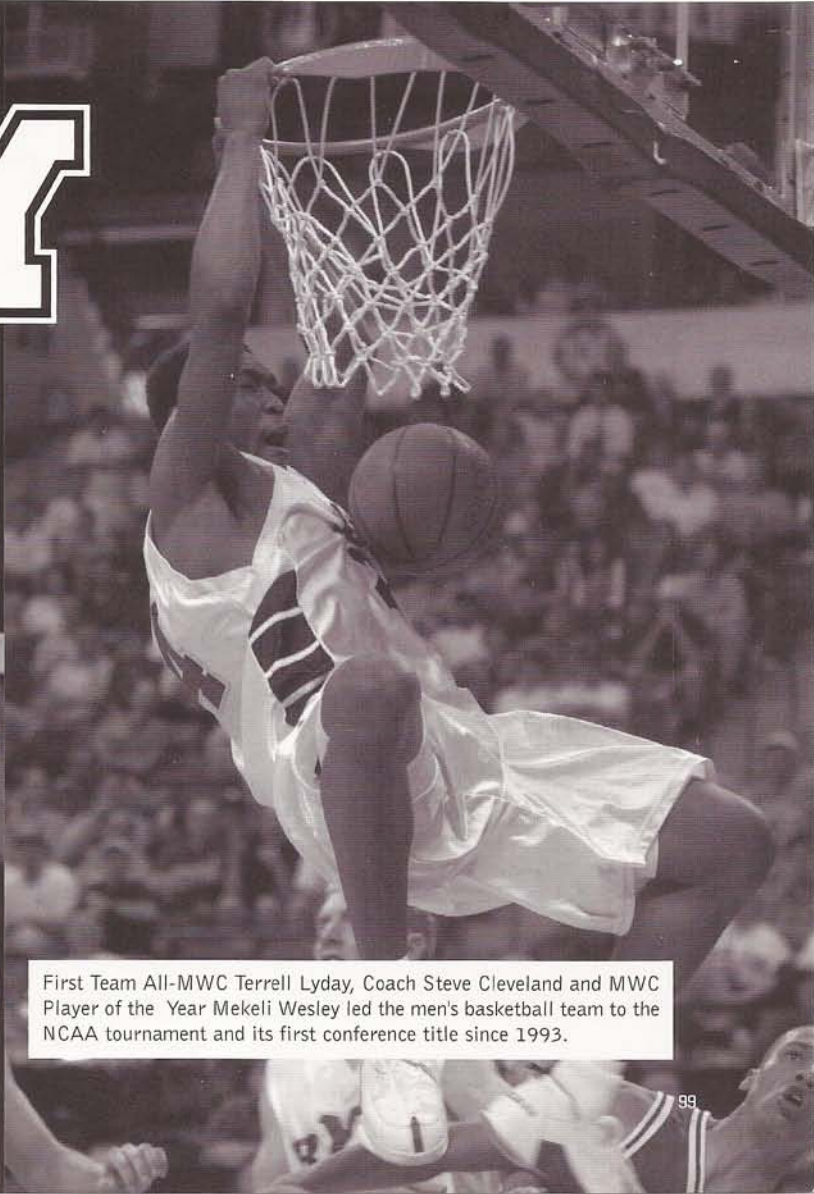

The women's volleyball team advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen and finished 13th nationally after winning the MWC championship for the fifth straight year.



First Team All-MWC Terrell Lyday, Coach Steve Cleveland and MWC Player of the Year Mekeli Wesley led the men's basketball team to the NCAA tournament and its first conference title since 1993.

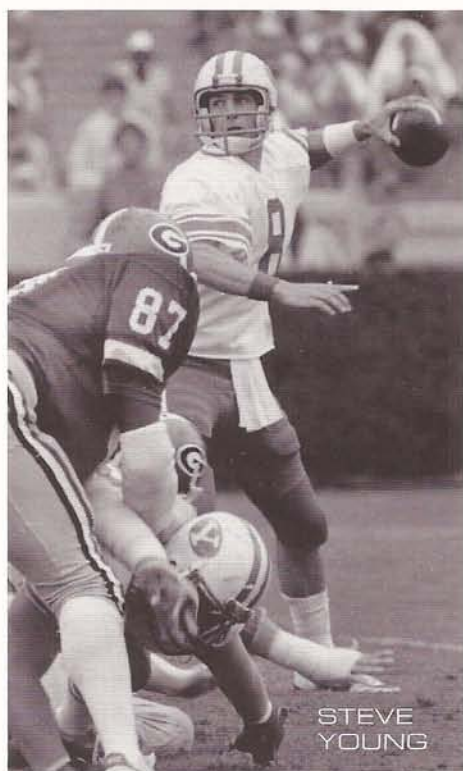
Selection into the Hall of Fame is based on playing ability, integrity, sportsmanship, and character, as well as contributions to sport, team, and community.

- Frank Fredericks—Among BYU's most decorated track athletes, All-American sprinter Frank Fredericks has won four Olympic silver medals and is currently the world indoor record holder in the 100 and 200 meter dashes.
- Karl Tucker—As BYU golf coach, Tucker coached 69 All-Americans and led the Cougars to 17 top-ten finishes. Tucker was NCAA Coach of the Year in 1981 and was inducted into the GCAA Golf Coaches Hall of Fame in 1983.
- Andy Toolsen—An all-conference guard and Academic All-American at BYU, Andy Toolson still holds BYU records for career three-pointers made (141), most threes in a season (74) and best single-game free throw percentage (14-14, 1.000). After completing an 11-year professional career in May, he returned to BYU as an assistant men's basketball coach.
- Courtney Nelson Murrell—won the national title in platform diving two consecutive years while at BYU and earned seven All-America awards. She received the Phillips 66 Performance Award as the outstanding performer at the U.S. Outdoor National Championships in 1989.
- K.C. Cline—Five time All-American backstroker for the Cougars from 1987-91. K.C. holds the BYU record for the 100 and 200 back.

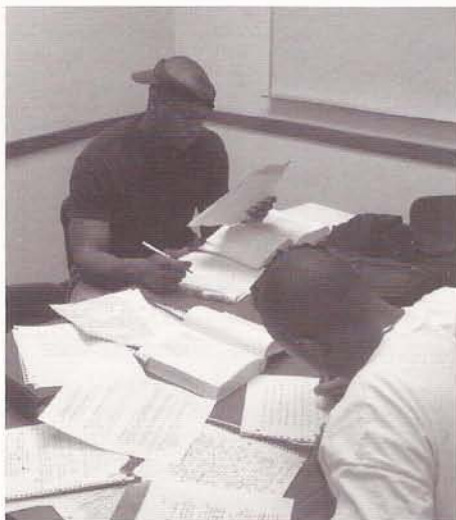

student athlete center

BYU student-athletes are seeking to excel athletically, academically, and are preparing for life after they graduate. Their lives are complex and challenging as they seek for balance and to reach their lofty goals. On April 1, 1999, BYU created the Student Athlete Center to provide a place where student-athletes can receive support and resources enabling them to be successful in their athletic and academic pursuits, personal and career development, and transition into the BYU culture.



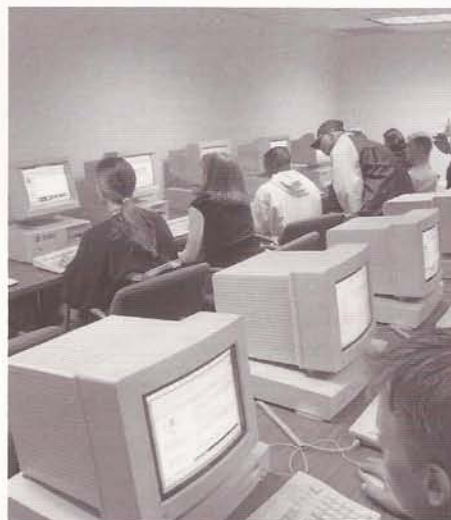
The Student Athlete Center seeks to assist student-athletes so their BYU experience will be spiritually strengthening, intellectually enlarging, character building, and lead to lifelong learning and service. Paul Warner is the Director of the Student Athlete Center. Warner, who received a doctorate in educational administration from BYU and is also a former LDS seminary teacher, serves as Chaplain for the non-LDS students. "I am pleased with this opportunity and appreciate working with our students in creating a home base where their needs can be met in a supportive environment. If we can build connections early on, we are able to ease the transition into campus life for all our student-athletes," said Warner. One of the main priorities of the Student Athlete Center is to help those student-athletes who are not members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to feel welcomed and succeed in the BYU environment.

Another priority of the Student Athlete Center is to network well with other BYU departments and work in coordination with their existing services. Some of these departments include the Counseling and Career Center, Multi-cultural Student Services, Services for Students with Disabilities, college advisement centers, and BYUSA.

The BYU Athletics Department is an active participant in the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The services provided by the Student Athlete Center target each of the five commitments of the CHAMPS/Life Skills program.

COMMITMENT TO ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A primary goal of the Student Athlete Center is to ensure that every student-athlete graduates with a



bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study. To achieve this goal, the Center provides a team liaison as part of the comprehensive academic support program. Each athlete has regular visits with his/her team liaison who assists with registration and monitors progress toward graduation. Tutoring is also available for every student-athlete. The Student Athlete Center is conveniently located in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse and contains a study hall and computer lab. Study skills classes and workshops are also taught regularly for student-athletes who may need additional assistance to achieve academic success.

COMMITMENT TO ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

The Student Athlete Center employs a sport psychologist to provide performance enhancement interventions for BYU teams, coaches, and student-athletes. These interventions include: increasing awareness for sport performance, goal-setting, arousal regulation through relaxation and energizing techniques, imagery training, confidence building through self-talk strategies, developing pre competition plans, concentration (focusing) training, and team building interventions. The overall objective of these types of interventions is to assist individual student-athletes and

athletic teams to perform at consistently high levels. Personal counseling is also available through the sport psychologist and Chaplain as needed.

COMMITMENT TO PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Student Athlete Center personnel are also active in teaching classes designed to promote leadership, emotional well-being, personal growth, and decision-making skills. Student-athletes are



taught about some of the unique issues they face in the world of college athletics and how to thrive in the university setting and beyond.



COMMITMENT TO CAREER DEVELOPMENT

A career specialist is available to assist student-athletes with a variety of career issues. They receive help in choosing a major, building their resume, establishing a career network, and preparing for their transition from college athletics into the world of work. These services are available through individual consultation, workshops, computer programs, and University courses. Career exploration and career transition classes are highly recommended to all student-athletes. Internship and employment opportunities are also made available through the Career Network which is made up of Varsity Club and Cougar Club members.

COMMITMENT TO SERVICE

All BYU student-athletes are encouraged to participate in at least three community service programs each year. There are a wide variety of opportunities available through the Student Athlete Center including: "The Buff Don't Puff" program, speaking opportunities at local schools and churches, food drives, mentoring school children, and involvement in BYUSA and community agency projects. A Student Athlete Center representative organizes the community service program and works closely with the Student Athlete Advisory Council in providing opportunities for all student athletes who want to participate.

5. All non-LDS student-athletes will participate in at least one section of the Book of Mormon course designed for them.
6. All student-athletes will understand and commit to live the BYU Honor Code.

dent for six years before his death in March 1996 after a long bout with cancer.

At his inauguration, President Gordon B. Hinckley described Bateman as "a man of large capacity and solid faith. His academic credentials are spotless. His experience in the real world...has been remarkable. His service [in the Church] has been constant and wonderful."

Before receiving his call to be a general authority, Bateman headed his own consulting and capital management companies. He was dean of the College of Business and the School of Management at BYU from 1975 to 1979. Before joining the BYU faculty, he was an executive with Mars, Inc. in England and the United States ('71-75).

President Merrill J. Bateman, the 11th president of Brigham Young University, has had numerous academic, commercial, government, and church administrative roles throughout Asia, Africa, England, and the United States.

He officially began his BYU Presidential duties on January 1, 1996. Bateman, 64, serves simultaneously as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He succeeded the late Rex E. Lee, who served as presi-

Born in Lehi, Utah, and raised in neighboring American Fork, Bateman earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in economics from MIT. He was inducted into the Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Beta Kappa Honor Societies in 1960 at the University of Utah. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow from 1960 to 1961 and a Danforth Fellow from 1960 to 1964.

Early in his career, Bateman was an assistant professor of economics at the U.S. Air Force Academy (1964 to 1967) and later an associate professor of economics at BYU (1967 to 1971). He was also a lecturer at the University of Ghana in 1963.

Bateman has served the Church as a missionary, bishop, stake high counselor, stake president, regional representative, and as Presiding Bishop he testified before the U.S. Senate Finance Committee. He also helped lay the foundation for the establishment of the Church in Ghana and Nigeria.

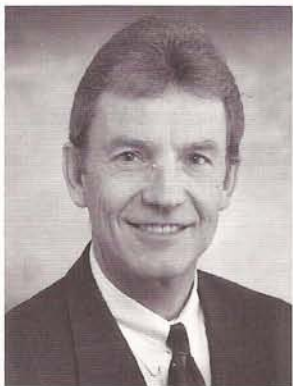

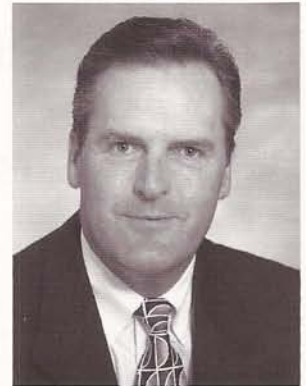

In her seventh year as Director of Women's Athletics, Elaine Michaelis is responsible for 11 women's intercollegiate sports in one of the nation's top overall programs. Two women's national champions have been crowned (cross country in 1997 and 1999) in the last four seasons and last year eight women's teams earned conference titles while all 11 qualified for a postseason tournament.

Michaelis also enters her 40th year as BYU's women's volleyball coach where she ranks second all-time in Division I victories with an 867-216-5 (.799) record (since records first kept in 1969). She has guided her teams to 27 consecutive 20-win seasons and to a national postseason tournament in 29 of 32 years, including 19 of 20 NCAA Tournaments. Her 1993 team became the first BYU team to earn an NCAA Final Four berth. In all, BYU has finished as high as second (1972-73), and has had 10 top-five and 20 top-10 finishes while earning a 73-43 (.629) national tournament record. Michaelis has been named conference coach of the year eight times and region/district coach of the year twice. She is a member of the Utah Summer Games Hall of Fame (1987) and Utah Network of Women and Girls in Sport Hall of Fame (1990), and the recipient of the Volleyball Festival Distinguished Service to U.S. Volleyball Award (1993), Dale Rex Memorial Award (1994) and AVCA Founders Award (1996).

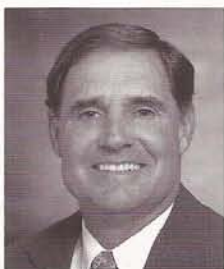

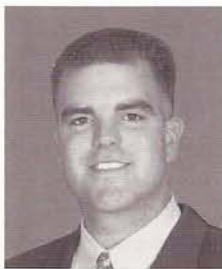


gary pullins

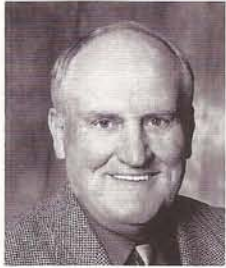

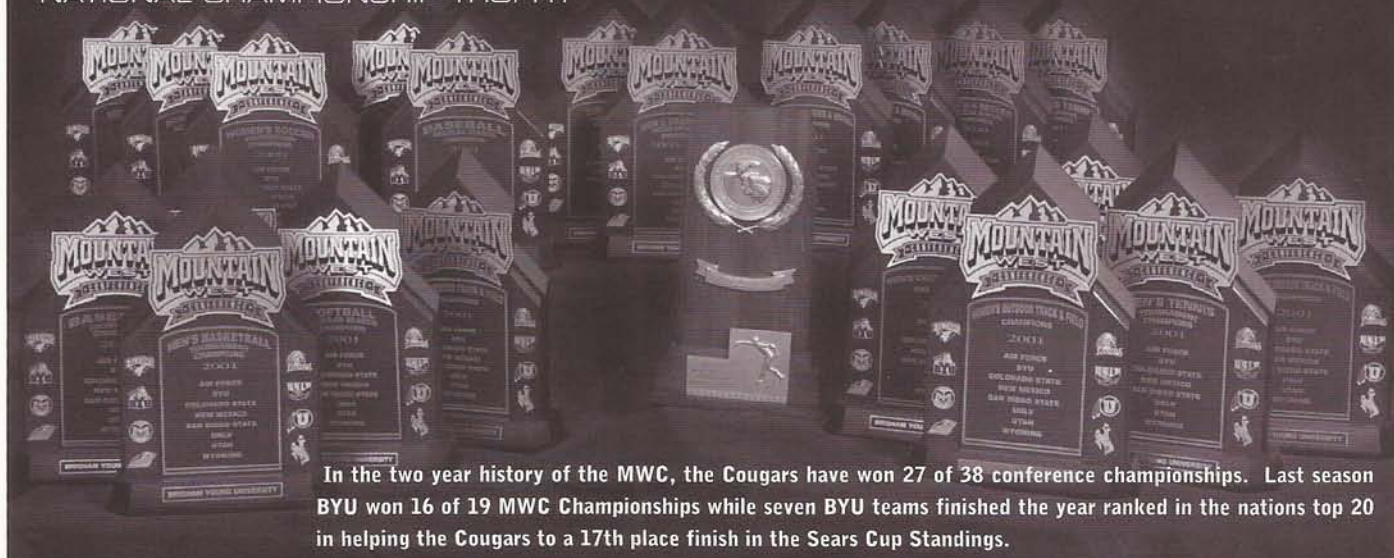

2000-2001 MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHIES & VOLLEYBALL NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY



In the two year history of the MWC, the Cougars have won 27 of 38 conference championships. Last season BYU won 16 of 19 MWC Championships while seven BYU teams finished the year ranked in the nations top 20 in helping the Cougars to a 17th place finish in the Sears Cup Standings.

"We're grateful our teams have performed so well, but frankly, we expect each of them to win the conference championship every year. When we don't win, we're very disappointed. It's a source of pride. We expect to win, and we truly believe we can."

The newest conference in the nation has quickly emerged as one of the best. The Mountain West Conference, which officially commenced operation on July 1, 1999, sent three football teams to bowl games and won a national championship (women's cross country) in its first year.

The MWC was conceived on May 26, 1998, when eight teams announced they were breaking away from the Western Athletic Conference. Those teams -- Utah, Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV and Wyoming -- brought immediate credibility to their new league.

From a team perspective, when the eight schools splintered off and created the Mountain West Conference, they took the backbone of the WAC with them. Half were charter members of the WAC when it was founded in 1962: Utah, BYU, New Mexico and Wyoming. Colorado State (1967) and San Diego State (1978) both competed

as WAC members for at least two decades, while Air Force (1980) was also a longstanding member. Only UNLV, which joined the WAC during its expansion in 1996, was a newcomer.

The split from the former 16-team WAC signaled the end to an unwieldy nine-state, five-time zone conference. However, the Mountain West Conference has maintained its geographical diversity. Some of the most beautiful geography in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the unparalleled Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,000 feet) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West), the balmy weather and Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State and the southwestern flavor of New Mexico.

The Mountain West Conference office is located in Colorado Springs, Colo., and

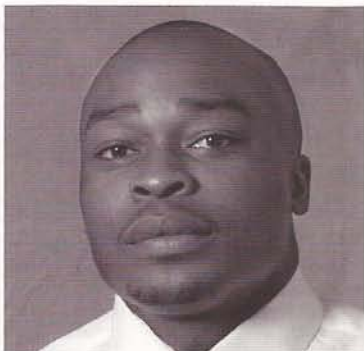
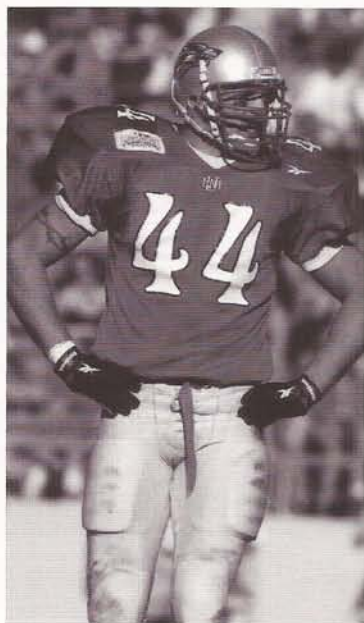
is under the guidance of Commissioner Craig Thompson. One of Thompson's first priorities was to secure a television contract for the conference. On February 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc. and the Mountain West Conference announced a seven-year, \$48 million agreement giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to MWC football and men's basketball. In 2000, the Conference will have at least 16 national television appearances for football.

The Mountain West Conference also secured a three-year contract for two post-season bowl games, which began with the 1999 season: the Liberty Bowl, which takes the MWC champion, and the Las Vegas Bowl, which gets the second choice. For the third consecutive season the Mountain West Conference is assured of sending at least three teams to post-season bowl games. The New Orleans Bowl will have the third MWC selection to match-up against the Sun Belt Conference champion.

In just the first season of the MWC, football attendance as a conference ranked seventh nationally and men's basketball was fourth at the gate, behind the Big Ten, ACC and SEC.

At the conclusion of the Board of Directors meetings in June 2000, the MWC announced its acceptance of an invitation to participate in discussions related to the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) for the next six years. This announcement came less than two months after being granted eligibility for automatic qualification to all NCAA championship sports sponsored by the Mountain West Conference.

Eighteen MWC football student-athletes earned postseason honors, including Academic All-Americans Jared Lee (BYU) and Kimball Christianson (Utah). Ryan McGuffey (Wyoming),



■ **NFL'S TOP ROOKIES:** Two former Mountain West Conference athletes were named NFL Offensive and Defensive Rookies of the Year. New Mexico standout Brian Urlacher, a linebacker with the Chicago Bears, earned defensive rookie of the year honors, while Utah alum and Denver Broncos running back Mike Anderson garnered offensive rookie of the year accolades. Anderson, who starter 12 games this season for the Broncos, became the fifth rookie in NFL history to rush for more than 1,500 yards in a season. He also established a rookie single-game rushing record, running for 251 yards vs. New Orleans. Urlacher, the ninth overall pick in the 2000 draft, led the Bears with 125 tackles.

Jason Kaufusi (Utah) and Brandon Ratcliff (New Mexico) earned Freshman All-America status, and CSU's John Howell was named to Sports Illustrated's All-Bowl Team. Cecil Sapp (CSU), Nate Turner (UNLV), Mike Thiessen (Air Force) and Dave Adams (Air Force) were Bowl MVPs. Two Mountain West Conference athletes were selected in the first round of the 2000 NFL Draft. New Mexico's Brian Urlacher was with the ninth overall pick, chosen by the Chicago Bears, and BYU's Rob Morris was selected with the 25th pick by the Indianapolis Colts.

A total of 1,489,527 fans attended the games during the MWC's inaugural football season, ranking the conference seventh nationally in total attendance. Conference schools averaged 34,640 fans per game.

The Mountain West Conference concluded the 2000 football season by becoming the only conference with multiple bowl games to go unbeaten in the postseason, posting a 3-0 mark. The 2000 Las Vegas Bowl broke the previous year's attendance record with 29,113 on hand to see UNLV beat Arkansas, 31-14. The Liberty Bowl's third-largest crowd witnessed Colorado State's 22-17 victory over Louisville. It marked the second straight year CSU played in front of the third-largest crowd in Liberty Bowl history. Air Force completed the perfect bowl season with a thrilling 34-31 victory over Fresno State in the inaugural Silicon Valley Football Classic.

In its first two years the MWC has participated in six bowl games, sending five of the eight Mountain West Conference teams to postseason bowls.

In addition to the 19 MWC-sponsored sports, programs like Utah and BYU have national titles in non-league sports. The Utes have won 10 national championships apiece in women's gymnastics and skiing, while BYU won the 1999 and 2001 NCAA men's volleyball championship.

In the two year history of the Mountain West Conference, BYU has won 27 of 38 conference championships. During the 2000-01 Season BYU claimed 16 of the 18 MWC championships (men's cross country, women's cross country, women's soccer, women's volleyball, men's swimming and diving, women's swimming and diving, men's indoor track and field, women's indoor track and field, men's basketball, men's tennis, women's tennis, men's golf, softball, baseball, men's outdoor track and field, women's outdoor track and

field). The Cougars finished the season ranked 17th in the final Sears Directors Cup standings.

Colorado State was crowned champion in football and captured the women's basketball title, while New Mexico won the women's golf championship.

The league's football success continued at the professional level as former student-athletes Mike Anderson (Utah) and Brian Urlacher (New Mexico) earned NFL Offensive and Defensive Rookie of the Year honors, respectively, for the 2000 season.

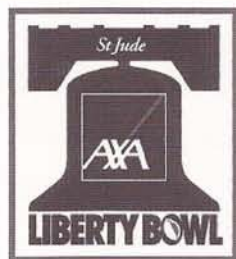
In basketball the MWC qualified 9 of 15 eligible teams for post-season play. Four of seven eligible men's teams advanced into the post-season (BYU-NCAA, Utah-NIT, Wyoming-NIT, New Mexico-NIT) and five of eight women's teams (Colorado State-NCAA, Utah-NCAA, New Mexico-WNIT, BYU-WNIT, UNLV-WNIT), with New Mexico losing in the finals of the WNIT. The Mountain West Conference set new marks for attendance and tickets sold for its Basketball Championships at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas, Nev.

The MWC sent 31 teams and 60 individuals on to NCAA post-season action. Thirty-eight student-athletes from member institutions were named first-team All-America. Mountain West Conference student-athletes Scott Becker (Air Force) and Jared Lee (BYU) claimed two of the six Division I-A postgraduate scholarships presented by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame.

The Mountain West Conference enters the 2001 season with agreements to send its league champion to the Liberty Bowl and number two pick to the Las Vegas Bowl. The MWC is in its third and final year of its original three year contracts with the Liberty and Las Vegas bowls. The conference has sent three teams on to post-season bowl games in each of its first two years.

LIBERTY BOWL

The Mountain West Conference secured its first bowl tie-in with the AXA Liberty Bowl, sending its champion to the Memphis bowl to play the champion of Conference USA in 1999, 2000 and 2001. This is the only bowl in the country that guarantees a match-up between conference champions and the '99 game marked the first time in the Liberty Bowl's 41-year history that a championship match-up was guaranteed.

Colorado State represented the Mountain West Conference in the league's first Liberty Bowl appearance in 1999. The Rams returned again the following season as champions of the MWC.

The 2001 game marks the AXA Liberty Bowl's 43rd year, making it college football's seventh oldest postseason bowl game. Over the years, the Liberty Bowl has featured many of the game's greatest players, including Heisman Trophy winners Ernie Davis, Terry Baker, Bo Jackson and Doug Flutie. Coaching greats Bear Bryant, John McKay, Joe Paterno, Tom Osborne, Johnny Vaught, LaVell Edwards, Fisher DeBerry and Lou Holtz have paced the Liberty Bowl sidelines.

A.F. "Bud" Dudley, a Philadelphia businessman and sports promoter established the Liberty Bowl as a tribute to American Patriotism. The first Liberty Bowl, played at Philadelphia Stadium in 1959, pitted Alabama and legendary coach Paul "Bear" Bryant against Penn State.

METHOD TO DETERMINE LIBERTY BOWL PARTICIPANT

1. The Conference champion shall be determined by regular season winning percentage in Conference competition.
2. An ineligible team shall not be considered in the standings for determination of the Conference champion.
3. If there is a two-way tie for the Conference championship, the winner of the game between those teams would be recommended to represent the Conference.
4. In the event of a three-way tie, co-champions shall be declared with the following tie-breaker applied to suggest the Conference representative:
 - A. The most recent team representing the Conference shall be eliminated and head-to-head competition between the remaining two teams would determine Conference representative.
 - B. If one team defeated both of the other teams, then that team would be the Conference representative.
 - C. If two of the three teams both defeated the third team, the third team is eliminated and remaining two teams shall revert to head-to-head competition to determine Conference representative.
 - D. If all teams have the same record vs. the teams involved in the tie, the team with the highest BCS ranking would be the Conference representative.
5. If there are four teams tied for the championship, the following selection procedure shall be followed in recommending the Conference representative:
 - A. The most recent team representing the Conference shall be eliminated and the three-way tie-breaker procedure followed.
 - B. If one team defeated each of the other three teams, then that team shall be the Conference representative.
 - C. If two of the four teams defeated each of the other two teams, the latter two teams are eliminated and the two remaining teams shall revert to the two-team tie-breaker procedure.
 - D. If three of the four teams defeated the fourth team, the fourth team is eliminated and the remaining three teams shall revert to the three-team tie-breaker procedure.
 - E. If all teams have the same record vs. the teams involved in the tie, the team with the highest BCS ranking would be the Conference representative.
6. The Liberty Bowl may select any of the co-champions in the event of a tie.



MWC UNDEFEATED IN POST-SEASON PLAY

The Mountain West became the only conference playing multiple bowl games this post-season to go undefeated. The MWC concluded the 2000 bowl season with a 3-0 mark. In its two-year existence, Mountain West Conference teams have posted a 4-2 mark in the post-season (.667). The league has sent five of its eight teams onto bowl games. Teams qualifying for post-season play in 2000 were Air Force (Silicon Valley Football Classic), Colorado State (Liberty Bowl) and UNLV (Las Vegas Bowl). Last year saw BYU (Motor City Bowl), Colorado State (Liberty Bowl) and Utah (Las Vegas Bowl) earn post-season berths.

MWC POSTS NATION'S BEST BOWL RECORD

The Mountain West Conference was the only league playing multiple bowl games to go undefeated. Below is a listing of how the nation's Division I-A conferences fared in the 2000 post-season:

BOWLED OVER

A relative infant on the I-A college football scene, the Mountain West Conference has become a regular in the post-season during its two-year history. The eight-team league has qualified three teams for bowls in each of its first two seasons. The MWC has sent five of its eight teams to bowl games.



MWC HEADQUARTERS

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After a series of tie-ins with various leagues, the Liberty Bowl joined with Conference USA in 1996 to form part of the bowl's current conference alignment. The champion from Conference USA has served as the host team for the bowl over the past five years. The league champions have been Houston ('96), Southern Mississippi ('97), Tulane ('98), Southern Miss ('99) and Louisville ('00).

Another first for the Liberty Bowl came in 1997 with the announcement of a partnership with its first corporate title sponsor—AXA/Equitable. AXA, the world's largest global insurer/asset manager, and Equitable, one of the nation's leading providers of financial services, joined together with the Liberty Bowl Festival Association and St. Jude Children's Research Hospital to form an unbeatable team dedicated to the game of football and the city of Memphis.

LAS VEGAS BOWL

In June 1999, the Mountain West Conference Board of Directors voted to enter into a three-year agreement that would send a second-selection from the MWC to the Las Vegas Bowl. In its 10th year, the Las Vegas Bowl will match the second choice of the Mountain West against an at-large selection in an ESPN national telecast.

The Las Vegas Bowl is one of three post-season bowl games this year that has the flexibility of choosing an at-large team.

The Mountain West Conference representative has emerged victorious in its two Las Vegas Bowl appearances. Utah claimed the MWC's first bowl victory in the league's young history with a 17-16 defeat of Fresno State in the 1999 game.

Last year's contest pitted UNLV, playing in its first bowl game in six years, against Southeastern Conference representative, Arkansas. The Rebels improved the MWC's record in the Las Vegas Bowl to 2-0, with a 31-14 win over the Razorbacks.

In May it was announced that ESPN Regional Television, a subsidiary of ESPN, Inc., had purchased the Las Vegas Bowl from the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority. Beginning in 2001, ERT assumes ownership and operation of the Las Vegas Bowl. With the announcement, ESPN becomes the first television broadcaster to own a sporting event.

Again this year, the host venue for Las Vegas Bowl X will be Sam Boyd Stadium (capacity 40,000), home to the UNLV Rebels football program. A recently completed renovation project includes changes to the stadium's seating configuration, concourse, and press box, as well as completely overhauling the playing surface from turf to natural grass.

NEW ORLEANS BOWL

The Mountain West Conference has entered into a one-year agreement to send a team to the inaugural New Orleans Bowl. The game will feature the third choice of the MWC against the champions of the Sun Belt Conference.

The New Orleans Bowl kicks off the 2001 bowl season on Tuesday, December 18. The game will be played in the Louisiana Superdome and televised nationally on ESPN2.

The Sun Belt Conference begins its first season competing at the I-A level. The Conference consists of: Arkansas State, Idaho, Louisiana-Lafayette, Louisiana-Monroe, Middle Tennessee, New Mexico State and North Texas.

The game is presented by the Greater New Orleans Sports Foundation.

Remaining ABC, ESPN2 and ESPN Regional broadcasts will be announced in the coming months. ABC will select at least two games involving Mountain West institutions, in addition to the other ESPN2 telecasts. Again this season, ESPN Regional (ESPN+Plus) will syndicate an eight-game Mountain West Game of the Week package. The ESPN contract requires that all games for the first three weeks of September will be determined by August 1. The remaining games will be chosen on 6-day or 12-day picks.

ALL-CONFERENCE

The Mountain West Conference returns 11 players from last year's All-Conference team as selected by the league's head coaches. CSU leads the way with three All-Conference performers returning (Pete Rebstock, WR, PR/KR; Jose Ochoa, TE; Cecil Sapp, RB), followed by BYU (Justin Ena, LB; Aaron Edmonds, P) and UNLV (Anton Palepoi, DL; Kevin Thomas, DB) with two each; with Air Force (Ryan Fleming, WR), San Diego State (Will Demps, DB), New Mexico (Brian Johnson, DL) and Utah (Doug Kaufusi, OL) adding one apiece. Thirteen players return from the All-Conference second-team.

LEADING THE WAY

Six statistical category leaders return from last season. The conference's top three receivers are back. Ryan Fleming (Air Force) ranked 26th nationally and led the MWC with a receiving yards per game average of 84.5. Ryan McGuffey (Wyoming) and J.R. Tolver (San Diego State) were one and two, respectively, in receptions per game. McGuffey averaged 5.73 receptions per game, ranking 26th in the country, while Tolver made 5.64 catches per game, checking in at 31st nationally. The leader in all-purpose yards is back in Pete Rebstock (CSU). Rebstock was 16th in the country with an average of 153.6 all-purpose yards per game. The league's top three punt returners are also back. Rebstock (CSU), Troy Mason (UNLV) and Holmon Wiggins (New Mexico) averaged 16.8, 16.4 and 8.5 yards per return, respectively. Rebstock ranked sixth in the country, with Mason right behind him at number seven. Brian Johnson (New Mexico) returns after leading the MWC with 9.5 sacks last season. Aaron Edmonds (BYU) and Brian Simjanovski (San Diego State) were the MWC's top two punters, averaging 43.3 and 42.8 yards per punt, respectively. Also back are Jason Thomas (UNLV) with the league's second highest pass efficiency rating (138.1) last season; Lon Sheriff's (San Diego State) passing yards average of 216.3 per game was number two in the conference; and the league's number two and three running backs return in Cecil Sapp (CSU) and Adam Tate (Utah). Sapp averaged 76.5 rushing yards per game, while Tate checked in with 73.3.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

This marks the third consecutive season a Mountain West Conference team has opened its campaign against the defending national champions. BYU faced Florida State in last year's Pigskin Classic and Wyoming opened with Tennessee in 1999.

REMATCH

After going 3-0 in the post-season, the 2001 schedule features rematches from two of the MWC bowl games last year. In a replay of the Las Vegas Bowl, UNLV opens its campaign at Arkansas on September 1. AXA Liberty Bowl foes get reacquainted when Colorado State travels to Louisville on Thursday, October 4, in an ESPN match-up.

EXTRA GAME

Two Mountain West teams (BYU, Air Force) will travel to Hawaii this season, allowing them to play a 12-game regular-season schedule. This marks the second consecutive year BYU will play a 12-game schedule. Teams playing 12 games are required to win seven contests to become bowl eligible. Last season, three teams (BYU, New Mexico, UNLV) played 12-game slates, with BYU and New Mexico playing in pre-season Classics, and UNLV closing its regular-season at Hawaii.

EXPERIENCE COMING BACK

A perusal of the Mountain West Conference's depth charts reveals why many of the league coaches are looking forward to the 2001 season. All total, the MWC returns 109 of 179 starters from last year. Below are the number of returning starters for the 2001 season by school:

HOLD ONTO YOUR SEAT

One thing is becoming clear in the first two years of Mountain West Conference football; MWC games go down to the wire. Nearly half of the 56 league games played during the Conference's first two years have been decided by seven or less points. During the 2000 season, 12 games played between

MWC foes were of the "nail biter" variety. Also, four of the six bowl games MWC teams have participated in have made for dramatic finishes. Last season saw Colorado State up-end Louisville, 22-17, in the Liberty Bowl, while Air Force held on for a 37-34 win over Fresno State. The 1999 season was capped with Colorado State losing to Southern Miss by six (17-23) and Utah squeezing by Fresno State, 17-16.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

Twenty Division I-A coaches have been in their current jobs longer than six years. Of that total one-fifth (four) coach in the Mountain West Conference. Air Force's Fisher DeBerry (17) and Utah's Ron McBride (11) are two of 13 coaches who have reached double figures. Also on the list of 20 are Colorado State's Sonny Lubick (8) and San Diego State's Ted Tollner (7). The MWC is the only conference to have more than three coaches with seven or more years tenure at their current posts.

UP TO THE CHALLENGE

Mountain West Conference institutions play a challenging non-conference schedule in 2001. MWC schools take on five defending conference champions in 2001 - Oklahoma (Big XII), Northwestern (Big 10), Oregon (Pac-10), Louisville (Conference USA), UTEP (WAC). MWC teams face opponents from the Big XII six times, Pac-10 on five occasions, while playing three games against Big 10 competition and two vs. SEC teams. Additionally 11 non-conference games are scheduled against opponents that participated in bowl games last season.

ADDITION TO THE SCHEDULE

Air Force opens the 2001 season against defending national champions Oklahoma Sooners on September 1, in Falcon Stadium. The Falcons were originally scheduled to play Southwest Texas State in the season opener. In its place AFA added Tennessee Tech to the schedule with a September 8th home game. Air Force and Oklahoma will meet for the first time. The Falcons are 0-4 vs. the defending national champions, having faced Notre Dame three times and BYU once. This game represents the first of a home-and-home series with Oklahoma, with the return date slated for the 2004 season.

DOUBLE VISION

Colorado State identical twins Justin and Jason Gallimore became the Mountain West Conference's second pair of brothers from the defensive side of the ball to score and first to do so in the same game. The Gallimore's each posted returns for touchdowns in CSU's regular-season finale victory over Wyoming. Jason put the Rams on the board with a second-quarter, 52-yard fumble return. Justin got into the act with a third-quarter, 63-yard interception return, ranking as the fourth-longest in Mountain West Conference history.

REEL 'EM IN

The Mountain West Conference record for receiving yards in a game has been broken three times last season. BYU senior Jonathan Pittman turned in a record-setting performance in the Cougars' overtime win at Virginia with 161 yards. His record stood for almost two months until Air Force wide out Ryan Fleming set a new mark with a 163-yard effort at Notre Dame. Two weeks later, Colorado State junior Pete Rebstock put his name atop the MWC record book with a 168-yard outing at Air Force.

ATTENDANCE FIGURES

A total of 1,419,326 fans attended games at the eight schools that comprise the Mountain West Conference last season. As a league, the MWC averaged 32,257 fans per home game, placing the conference seventh among the 12 Division I-A conferences (including independents). BYU ranked 25th nationally in home attendance, with an average of 60,619 fans attending the Cougars six home games in 2000.

beehive state rivalry

It all started on October 14, 1922. Well, according to BYU, anyway. Utah claims the first meeting between the schools was on April 6, 1896, when BYU was still Brigham Young Academy.

It's just one of many things the two schools don't agree on. The Academy played Utah six times between 1896 and 1898, before Provo could officially boast its own full-fledged university. Each team won three games.

The Cougars and the Utes have built a strong tradition of intense competition in the 75 years of the rivalry. With the exception of the war years from 1943-45, the two schools have faced each other every year since 1922.

The Utes dominated the series early on, avoiding defeat until 1942, when the Cougars finally won, 12-7, in Salt Lake City behind Coach Floyd Millet. The success was short-lived, however, as it took BYU another 16 years to win another contest, 14-7, again in Salt Lake City in 1958. In all, Utah won 32 of the first 40 contests, four of which were ties.

In 1965, the momentum began to turn in BYU's favor. The Cougars took three in a row from the Utes from 1965-67, and although Utah won the next four, the competition had become much more interesting.

In 1972, the series took on an entirely different feeling with the arrival of LaVell Edwards as BYU's new head coach. He took on a program that had gone 5-38-4 (.149) against its fiercest rival and proceeded to post a 21-6 (.778) record against Utah in 27 years, including wins in 15 of his first 16 meetings with the Utes. In the

Edwards era, the Cougars outscored the Utes an average of 35.6 to 20.7 per contest. Coach Edwards' career has included winning streaks of nine (1979-87) and six (1972-77) games against Utah.

The annual showdown generates considerable interest throughout the state, making it a virtual certainty that whatever stadium the teams play in will be sold out well in advance. In all, seven of Utah's top ten home crowds before the expansion of Rice Stadium were for games against BYU.

Meanwhile, 40 miles south in Provo, the grudge match has accounted for five of the 20 largest crowds in the history of Cougar Stadium.

One of the more memorable moments in the rivalry was the 1989 contest in which the Cougars pasted the Utes, 70-31, in Provo. It was a game in which the home team scored touchdowns in each of its first seven possessions and in all eight with Ty Detmer as quarterback. In a move of mercy, Detmer was replaced by backup Sean Covey late in the second quarter.

Then there were the infamous back-to-back, 34-31, losses at the hands of the Utes in 1993 and '94, giving rebirth to a rivalry that had become ridiculously lopsided in the 80s and early 90s. In all, the Utes won three in a row (1993-95) under coach Ron McBride.

The Cougars responded to the new aggression in 1996 with a dominating, 37-17, victory in Salt Lake City. BYU employed an extremely unconventional approach, gaining 376 yards in 63 attempts on the ground and attempting only 12 passes.

In 1998, a well-placed ESPN microphone picked up an audible "clank" as the potentially game-winning kick bounced off the right goal post, allowing BYU to escape with a 26-24, victory — despite Ron McBride's sideline prayer, as captured on national television.

BYU let the Utes back into the game after having seemingly put the game away in the fourth quarter, allowing Utah to set up a 32-yard field goal to win the game. BYU fans gave credit to divine intervention as the chip shot mysteriously hooked to the right at the last possible moment.

Last year LaVell Edwards worked his magic for the last time as Brandon Doman's touchdown with 23 seconds remaining finished an amazing last minute comeback to send the legendary BYU coach out a winner.

Provo has been much more friendly to the Cougars over the years, as BYU has posted a 12-14-1 record overall at home but has only managed a 14-30-3 record on the road against the Utes. Lately home field advantage seems to have become less of a factor, as the Utes have won three straight at Cougar Stadium and the Cougars have taken three in a row in Salt Lake City.



■ LaVell Edwards' last game against Utah was a classic showcase of this intense rivalry. The Cougars led throughout the game only to fall behind 26-27 on a Matt Nickel TD reception with 2 minutes to play. Behind the heart of Brandon Doman and a little fate, BYU converted on a 4th down conversion with less than a minute to play. Then Doman connected with senior Jonathan Pittman along the sideline before Luke Staley took the ball inside Utah's 10-yard line. From there Doman scored with 23 seconds remaining on a quarterback sweep right to give BYU the miraculous come-from-behind victory (photo above).

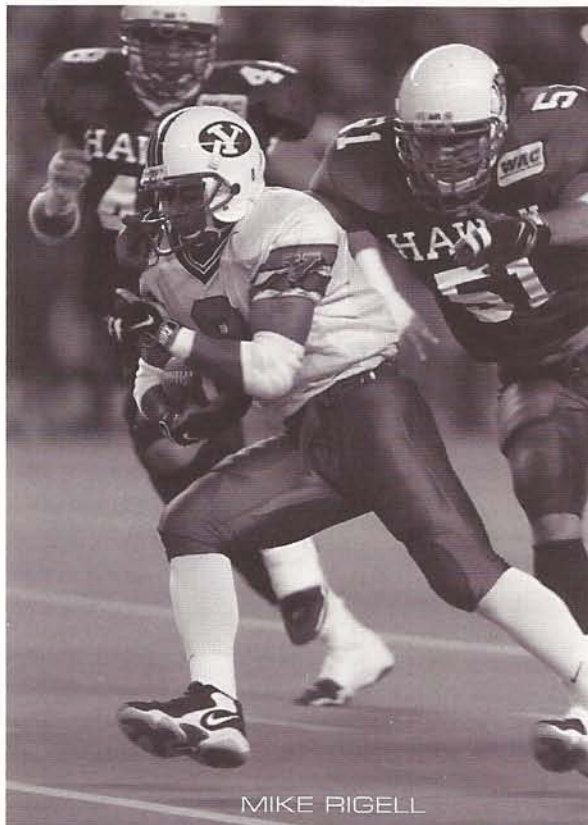

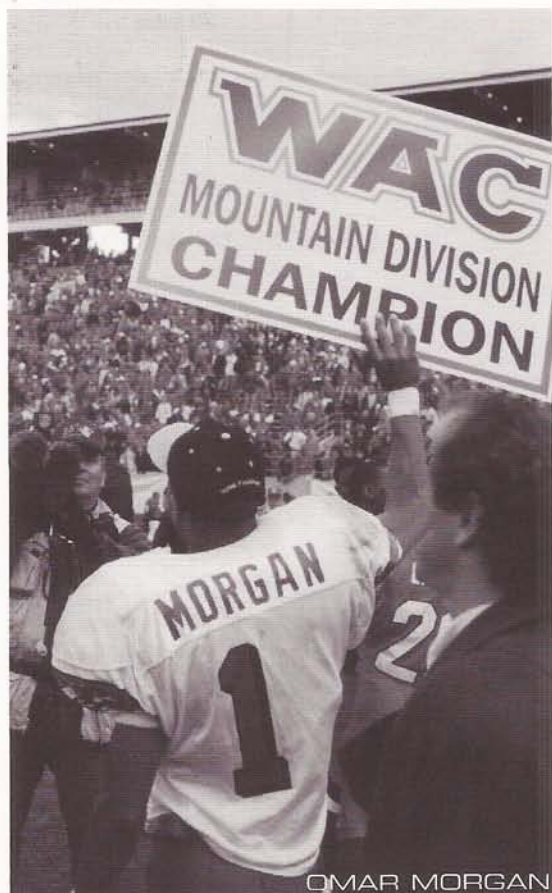

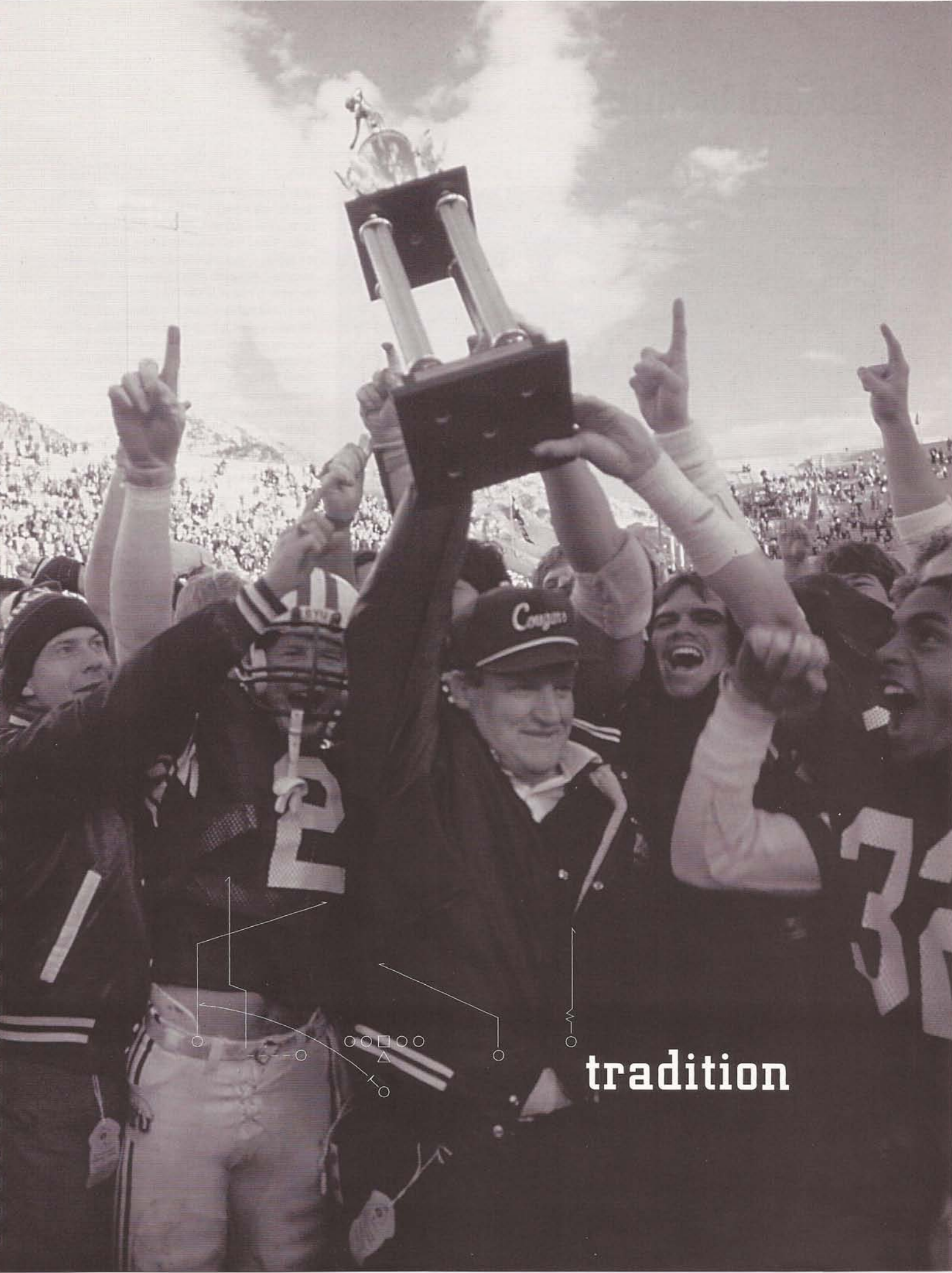

1984 BOSCO LEADS BYU TO VICTORY AT UTAH

After all, it was 34 years ago the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title, and the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season. In 1972, however, BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year and things have not been the same since.

In the past 28 years, the Cougars have won 251 games and been to 22 bowl games (including 17 in a row at one point). BYU has won the WAC title 18 times under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-1985.

Coach Edwards led his team to a national championship (1984), and was national coach of the year two times, served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner and two Outland Trophy winners.

Things were not always so rosy, however. Football had its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU consistently finds itself among the national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU in 1896, but was discontinued after three seasons because of the administration's concern over the violent nature of the sport. The game returned to campus in 1922, and since then BYU has played 75 seasons (football was not played for three seasons during World War II). BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have propelled BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. The list reads like a who's who of college football signal callers: Virgil Carter (1964-66), Gary Sheide (1973-74), Gifford Nielsen (1975-77), Marc Wilson (1977, 1979-80), Jim McMahon (1978, 1980-81), Steve Young (1982-83), Robbie Bosco (1984-85), Ty Detmer (1988-91) and Steve Sarkisian (1995-96) have all left their mark on BYU's record books.

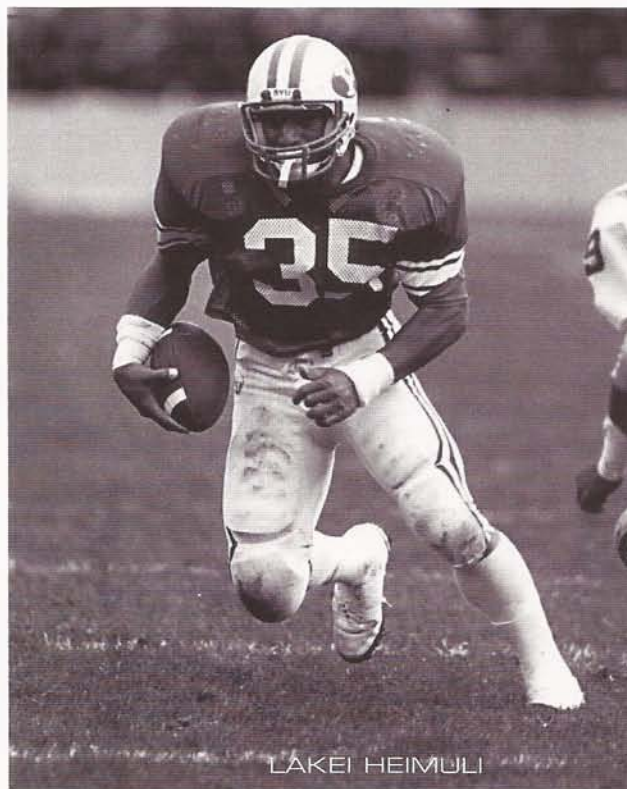
Detmer finished his incredible career by throwing for 15,031 yards—the first player ever to go over 12,000 yards passing.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco, Detmer and Sarkisian were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over,

some impressive running backs have also hit the field for the Cougars. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62) won All-American honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71) led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-American. Fullback John Ogden (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975-77) did such a good job catching the football, that he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Jamal Willis (1991-94) became the school's leading career rusher in 1994 and Brian McKenzie moved into the No. 6 spot all-time in just two seasons (1996-97) at BYU. In two seasons at BYU the talented speedster Ronney Jenkins set many rushing and scoring records in 1996 and 1998. Other great running backs at BYU over the years include Jeff Blanc (1973-76), Eric Lane (1979-80), Casey Tiimalu (1982-83), Lakei Heimuli (1983-86), Fred Whittingham (1986-89), Peter Tuipulotu (1987, 1989-91), and Kalin Hall (1992-93).

Eric Drage (1990-93) became the receiving leader, breaking yardage and touchdown receiving records set by Phil Odle (1965-67). Other outstanding receivers that have brought honor to the Cougar blue on the playing field include Jay Miller (1972-74, 76), Todd Christensen (1974-

77), Danny Plater (1978-81), Glen Kozlowski (1981, 83-85), Mark Bellini (1982, 83-84), Matt Bellini (1987-90), Andy Boyce (1988-90), K.O. Kealaluhi (1995-96), Kaipō McGuire (1993-96), Ben Cahoon (1996-97), Margin Hooks (1997-2000), and Jonathan Pittman (1999-2000).

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), Orrin Olsen (1972-75), Tom Bell (1974-79), Nick Eyre (1977-80), Bart Oates (1977-82), Trevor Matich (1979-84), Scott Brumfield (1991-92), Evan Pilgrim (1992-94), Larry Moore (1995-96), John Tait (1996-98) and Joe Wong (1997-98).

BYU has also had a bevy of talent at tight end including Clay Brown (1978-80), Gordon Hudson (1979-83), David Mills (1980-84), Chris Smith (1987-90), Chad Lewis (1993-96) and Itula Mili (1991, 1994-96), Tevita Ofahengaue (1998-2000).

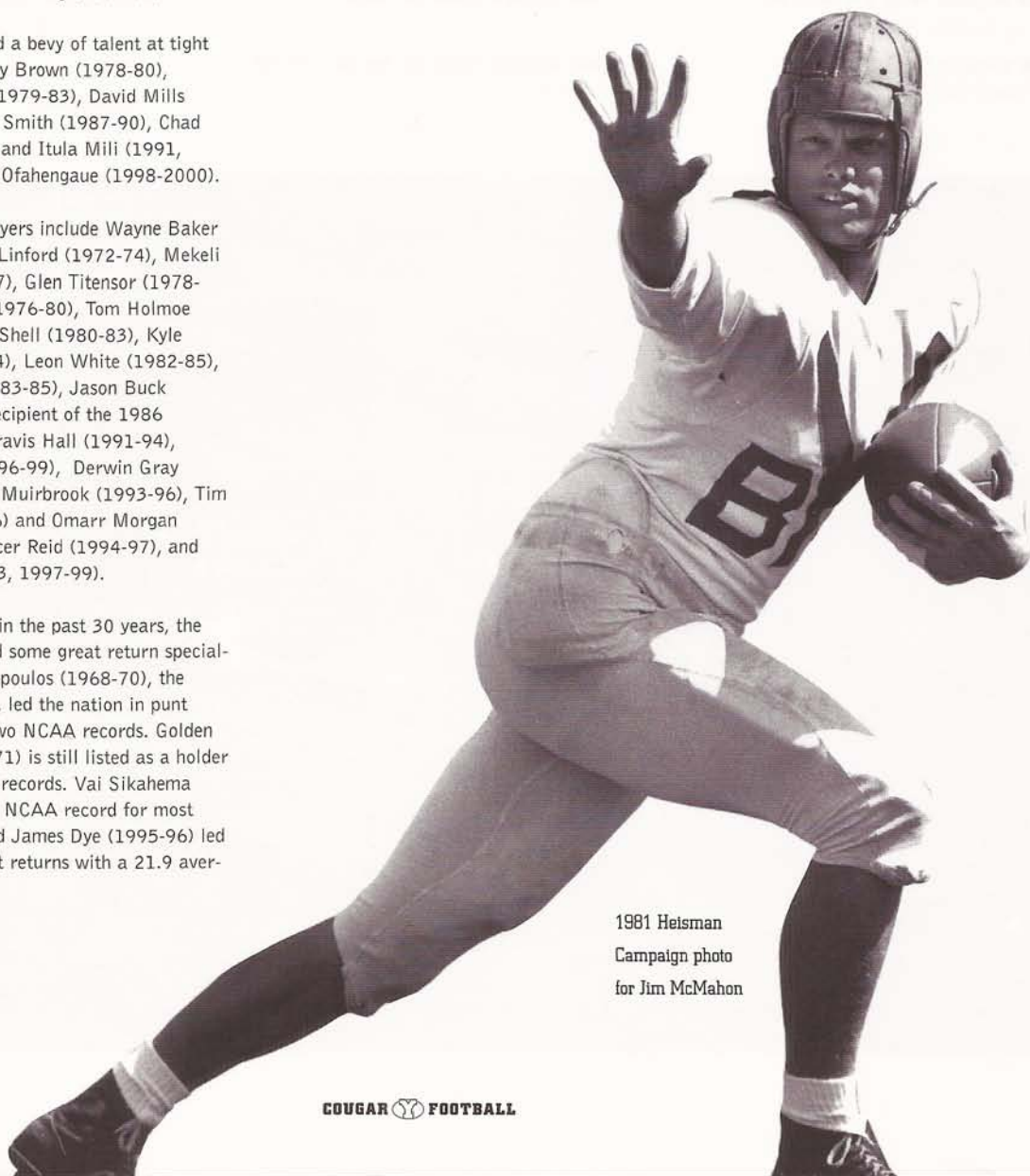
Top Defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekeli Jeremia (1975-77), Glen Titensor (1978-80), Glen Redd (1976-80), Tom Holmoe (1979-82), Todd Shell (1980-83), Kyle Morrell (1980-84), Leon White (1982-85), Kurt Gouveia (1983-85), Jason Buck (1985-86), the recipient of the 1986 Outland Trophy, Travis Hall (1991-94), Byron Frisch (1996-99), Derwin Gray (1989-92), Shay Muirbrook (1993-96), Tim McTyer (1995-96) and Omarr Morgan (1996-97), Spencer Reid (1994-97), and Rob Morris (1993, 1997-99).

At various times in the past 30 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. Golden Richards (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. Vai Sikahema (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns, and James Dye (1995-96) led the nation in punt returns with a 21.9 average in 1995.

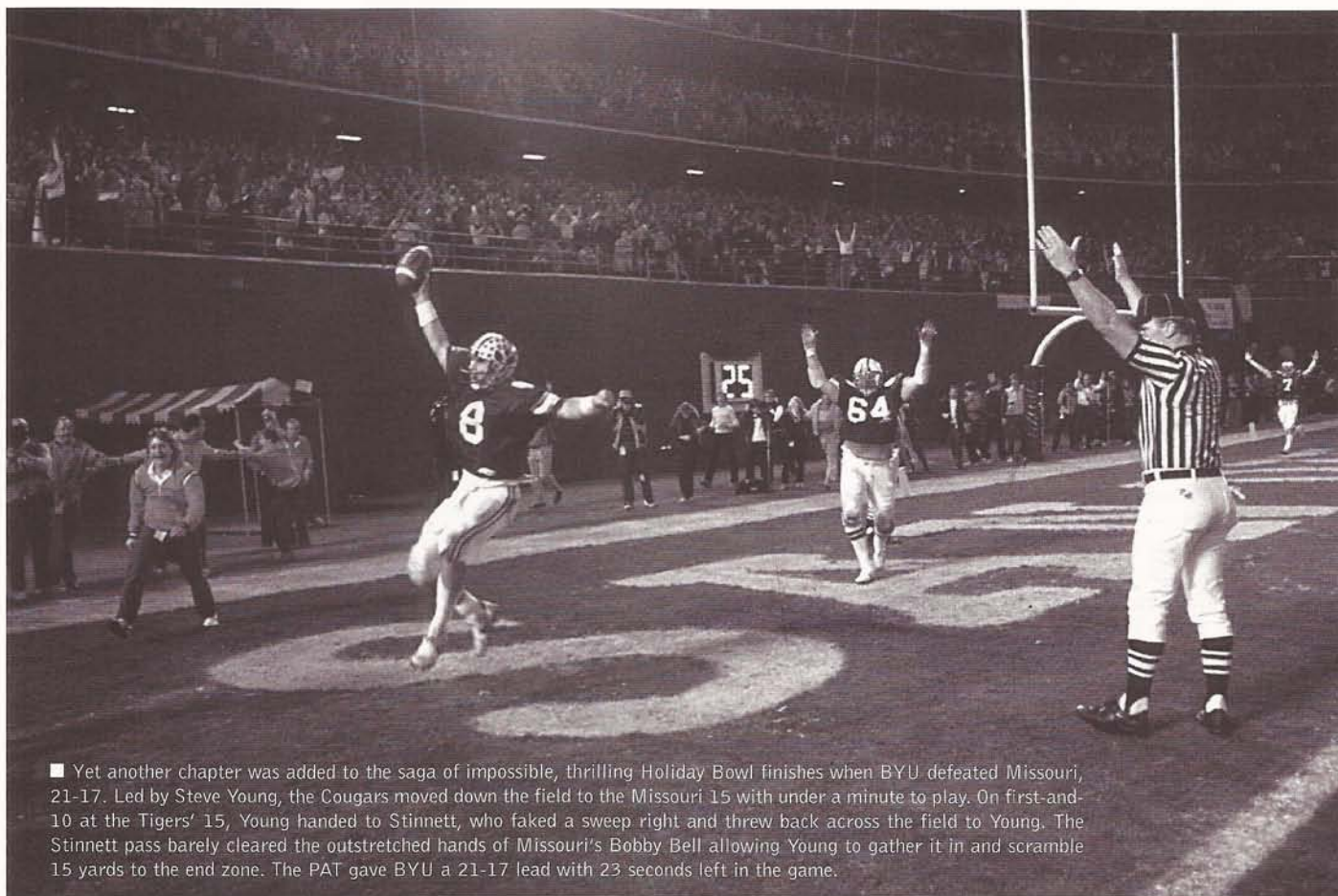

■ Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. Led by Steve Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left in the game.

BYU 24, Arizona State 6 **Sept. 18, 1965**

Tommy Hudspeth's Cougars defeated Frank Kush's Sundevils, 24-6, on the way to winning BYU's first conference championship in the school's 43 years of football mediocrity. The Cougar's were led by quarterback Virgil Carter and receiver Phil Odle, as they connected five times on the evening for 92 yards and a touchdown. Carter also had 83 yards on the ground. Cougar running back Jonathan Ogden added 75 yards rushing on 14 carries. BYU started the game by scoring on the first drive and the Cougars never let up, going up 24-0 before Arizona State added a fourth quarter touchdown.

BYU 21, Arizona State 18 **Nov. 9, 1974**

In only his third year, a young LaVell Edwards led the Cougars past Arizona State in what may have been a turning point in BYU football. "I'd have to say this is the biggest win I've had at BYU," said Edwards on defeating the longtime conference power in a pivotal game that would eventually put BYU in their first bowl, the Fiesta Bowl. After a 55-yard interception for a touchdown that put ASU up 18-14 late in the third quarter, Gary Sheide directed a nine-play, 80-yard drive, including a fourth down run by Jeff Blanc bouncing off defenders and fighting for the yardage. The drive was capped by a nine-yard TD pass to Tim Mahoney to give the Cougars the 21-18 lead, and eventually the win. The Cougar defense held ASU to 76 yards rushing and 108 yards passing, while Sheide racked up 223 yards of passing and two touchdowns.

BYU 23, Arizona 16 **Sept. 25, 1976**

A pivotal game for both teams, the Cougars offense was slowed by a torrential rainstorm in Tuscon. With neither team able to move the ball as expected, the game appeared headed for a 16-16 tie with 14 seconds left on the clock. Electing to go with one last desperation pass, quarterback Gifford Nielsen dropped back, sprung free from the grasp of two tackles and, just before he was forced out of bounds, threw the ball in the direction of George Harris, who caught the ball over the extended arms of two Arizona defenders for the winning touchdown. Despite both offenses being slowed by the rain, Nielsen hit on 18 of 28 passes for 200 yards and two touchdowns.

BYU 18, Texas A&M 17 **Sept. 8, 1979**

In the first game of the 1979 season, BYU's high-powered offense met Texas A&M, complete with a Heisman Trophy candidate, a record-setting quarterback and an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate. Down 7-3 going into the second half, both teams scored third quarter touchdowns, making it 14-10, Texas A&M. In the fourth quarter, A&M scored a field goal with 6:53 remaining to go up by seven. On the first play of the next drive, Wilson threw his third interception of the game, giving A&M the ball near midfield. But, on the next series, BYU's Pulusila Filiaga recovered an Aggie fumble, giving BYU new hope. After the Aggies forced BYU to punt in three plays, the Cougars then forced the Aggies to punt after three plays, setting

up the dramatic finish. On the ensuing punt, BYU's Tim Halverson blocked A&M's kick to give BYU the ball at the Texas A&M 19-yard line. Two A&M penalty's and a completed pass put the Cougars on the three-yard line. With 53 seconds left, Wilson hit Clay Brown in the endzone to pull the Cougars within one. Then, wanting to leave Texas with a win, LaVell Edwards chose to go for the two-point conversion. It paid off with Wilson hitting Mike Lacey for a diving catch to put BYU up by one. A final 51-yard field goal attempt by Texas A&M sailed wide left to give the Cougars the win, setting the stage to an 11-0 regular season finish and No. 9 national ranking.

Air Force 39, BYU 38 **Sept. 25, 1982**

After a last-minute loss to Heisman-winner Herschel Walker and the 4th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs, the Cougars returned home -- to the newly expanded Cougar Stadium and 65,000 fans. League-leading Air Force would be the first opponent the Cougars would face in the new stadium. BYU, with Steve Young at the helm, passed for 215 yards and ran for 244, but the Air Force offense was just as potent with 489 of total offense. After the tow teams battled to a 17-17 halftime tie, the Cougars came out in the third quarter and scored 14 third-quarter points to go up 31-24. In the fourth quarter, the two teams traded touchdowns, and the Cougars held on to a seven-point lead. After a BYU punt put Air Force on their own one-yard line with 1:30 left in the game, the Air Force offense put together their most important drive of the game. Then, at the BYU 37, AFA's quarterback Marty Louthan threw an interception to BYU's Marv Allen, seemingly sealing the victory. But, the Cougars were penalized for roughing the passer, giving Air Force the ball at BYU's 23 yard-line. On the next play, Air Force scored a touchdown to come within one point of the Cougars. With six seconds left in the game, a Louthan to Mike Brown two-point conversion gave the Falcons the win.

BYU 37, UCLA 35 **Oct. 1, 1983**

At the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Steve Young and the high-powered BYU offense took on UCLA, led by Steve Bono and Rick Neuheisel. BYU went up 14-0 in the first quarter before UCLA retaliated with 14 second-quarter points of their own, making it a 24-14 BYU halftime lead. UCLA came within three points after a third quarter touchdown, but the Cougars scored 13 fourth quarter points to go up 37-28. The Bruins scored a touchdown with 25 seconds left, but the Bruin on-side kick was recovered, by Kurt Gouveia to seal the win.

BYU 55, Utah 7 **Nov. 19, 1983**

In the final game of the regular season, the Cougars welcomed Utah to the new Cougar Stadium with an impressive offensive show. Steve Young led BYU to a 35-7 halftime lead with four touchdown passes and one rushing TD by Eddie Stinnett. The Cougar defense allowed only one touchdown all day, a six-yard pass early in the second quarter. The second half was much the same, as Young threw for two more touchdowns and Stinnett rushed for one more, bringing the score to the final of 55-7 with almost four minutes remaining in the third quarter.

BYU 20, Pitt 14 **Sept. 1, 1984**

The perfect season began when BYU traveled to Pittsburgh to take on 3rd-ranked Pitt and the longest winning streak in the country. The Cougars, led by Robbie Bosco, had an 11 game winning streak themselves and were up to the challenge. BYU started out slow on offense, scoring only three first half points. But the BYU defense recorded a first-half shutout against a Pitt offense that featured freshman phenom Craig Heyward and All-American tackle Bill Fralic. The Cougars forced three punts, one interception and had two fourth-down stops on the Panthers in the first two quarters. In the second half, Pitt showed they were worthy of their pre-season ranking, scoring 14 quick points off Cougar turnovers. The first came on a 78-yard interception return by Bill Callahan and the second was a one-yard run after a tipped Bosco pass was intercepted on BYU's own 20 yard-line. The Cougar offense made up for the miscues by capitalizing on a Pitt interception, scoring a 12-yard TD run by Lakei Heimuli to bring the score to 14-9. A Lee Johnson field goal with 9:15 left in the game brought BYU within two points, while the Cougar defense continued to stifle the Pitt offense. Then, after both teams traded punts, BYU started their final drive on their own 26 yard-line with 3:05 on the clock. After moving the ball to midfield, Bosco hit Adam Haysbert on a 50-yard bomb to go ahead for good. A two-point conversion put BYU up 20-14. The Pitt offense threatened, moving to BYU's 35 yard-line before the defense stiffened and stopped a fourth-and-four to end the game and give the Cougars the win.



1983 : BYU BEATS THE BRUINS

BYU 18 Hawaii 13 **September 22, 1984**

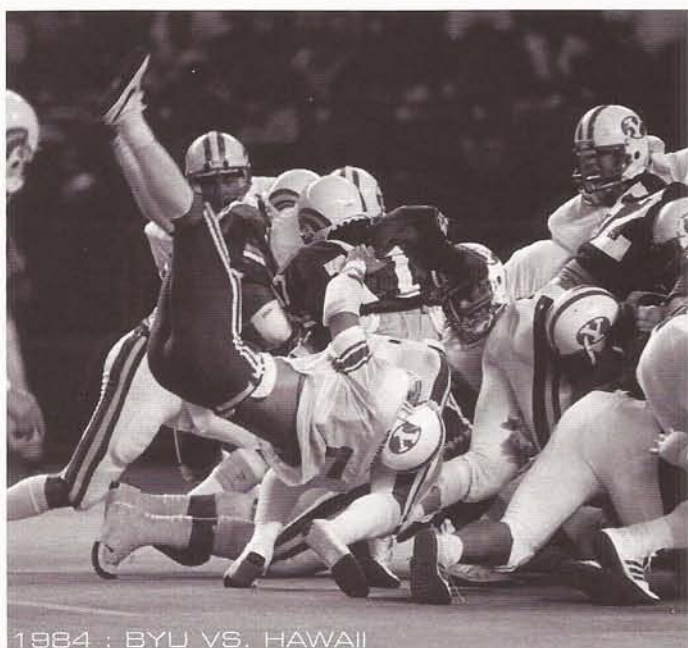
In one of the biggest defensive stands in Cougar football history, BYU kept Hawaii out of the endzone after a first-and-goal from the two-yard-line. The defensive stand was highlighted by linebacker Kyle Morrell's leaping tackle, grabbing Hawaii running back Raphel Cherry by the back of his neckpad and pulling him down with one arm to keep Hawaii from taking a 20-12 lead. On the very next drive, the Cougars covered 80 yards on six plays, capped by a 25-yard pass from Bosco to Glen Kozlowski for the go-ahead touchdown. The BYU defense held the Rainbow Warriors on their next two possessions to secure the win.



1984 : BYU UPSETS PITT

BYU 41 Wyoming 38 **October 13, 1984**

In a tough conference match-up, Wyoming came to Provo trying to stop the Cougars from getting their 17th straight victory. BYU got off to a quick start with two first-quarter touchdowns to go up 14-0. Wyoming came back by scoring on a 64-yard halfback pass for a touchdown. After BYU scored again to make it 21-7, the Cowboys scored two unanswered TD's to go in at the half trailing 21-20. Wyoming continued to move the ball in the third quarter against the tough Cougar defense, scoring 18 points on three TD's and three missed two-point conversions in the quarter. But BYU traded scores with the Cowboys, scoring 12 points on two TD's and two missed two-point conversions, putting Wyoming up 38-33 going into the final quarter. With 8:43 left in the game, Bosco and the Cougars put together an 11-play 80-yard drive, completing his fifth TD pass of the game to David Mills from 14 yards out. This time, after five consecutive missed conversions by both teams, Bosco hit Kelly Smith to put BYU up for good at 41-38 and give BYU the slim victory.



1984 : BYU VS. HAWAII

BYU 24 UCLA 27 **September 7, 1985**

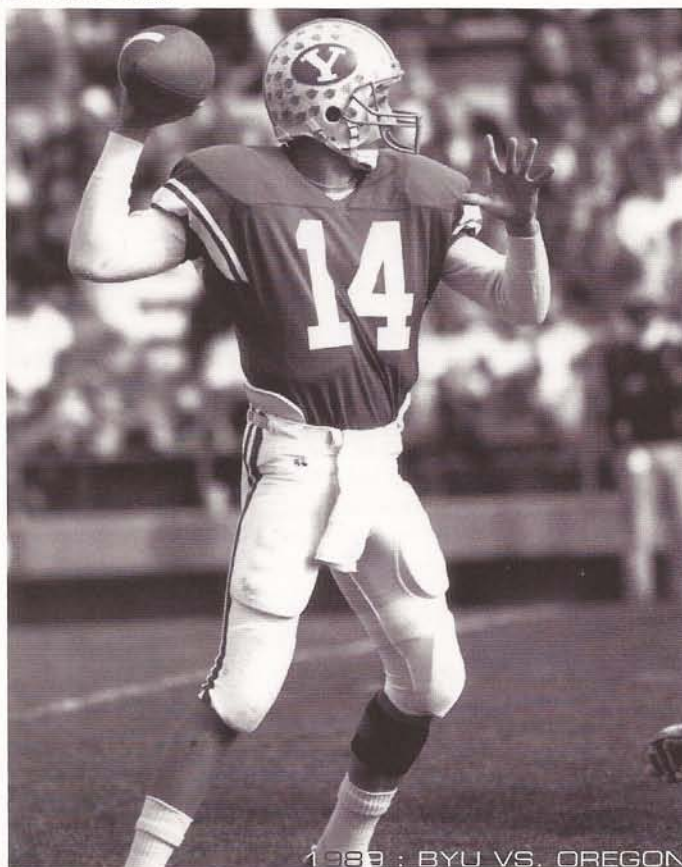
After silencing some critics by disposing of Boston College in the Kickoff Classic, the defending national champion Cougars would face another test, the UCLA Bruins, ranked No. 2 in some preseason polls. The Bruins, led by sophomore running back Gaston Green, got on the scoreboard first with a field goal from All-American Jon Lee. The Cougars came back to tie it up with a field goal of their own. The Bruins scored again just two minutes later, this time on a 65-yard interception return by Craig Rutledge. Then the Cougars scored twice in the second quarter to go up 17-13 at the half. UCLA added two more field goals to take the lead at 19-17 with 9:01 left in the game. It would seem as if Bosco and the Cougars were going to pull off another exciting win when the offense engineered a 14-play, 80-yard drive to go ahead 24-19 with less than three minutes remaining. But the UCLA offense was too much as they opened up the next drive with a 62-yard pass from Matt Stevens to Mike Sherrard. Five plays later the Bruins found the endzone and came away with the big win.

BYU 31, Washington 3 **Sept. 14, 1985**

Against Washington, the 1984 runner-up in the national championship race, came to town with fans expecting another showdown like the previous week against UCLA. But the Cougars bounced back from their first loss in 26 games to pummel the Huskies, 31-3. In an untypical outing for the Cougars, BYU scored four rushing TD's, two each by Vai Sikahema and Lakei Heimuli. Meanwhile the BYU defense held Washington to a single field goal. The Cougar offense racked up 460 yards, passing for 292 and rushing for 187. The defense held Washington to 205 yards through the air and 177 yards rushing, holding their top rusher to just 38 yards on 14 carries.

BYU 45, Oregon 41 **Nov. 4, 1989**

In a game that produced more yards of offense than any other game in history up to that point, the Cougars came from behind to beat the Ducks, 45-41 in a game that produced 1,276 yards of offense between the two teams. Led by sophomore Ty Detmer, BYU got down early when Oregon scored on a Derek Loville run. BYU came back with a Fred Whittingham 19-yard TD run. With a 19-14 halftime lead, Oregon came out firing in the third quarter, scoring two touchdowns in the first five minutes to go up 33-14. But on the next kickoff, Tony Crutchfield returned the kick 60 yards to the Oregon 34 yard-line and igniting the crowd and the team. BYU scored 24 consecutive points to go ahead, 38-33. Oregon responded with an 80-yard drive, capped by a 16-yard Bill Musgrave TD pass to Terry Obee, taking back the lead, 41-38. Then, with less than three minutes left in the game and the Cougars on their own five-yard-line, BYU put together a drive that ended with a 15-yard TD pass to Jeff Frandsen, putting BYU up for good, 45-41, sealing the victory.

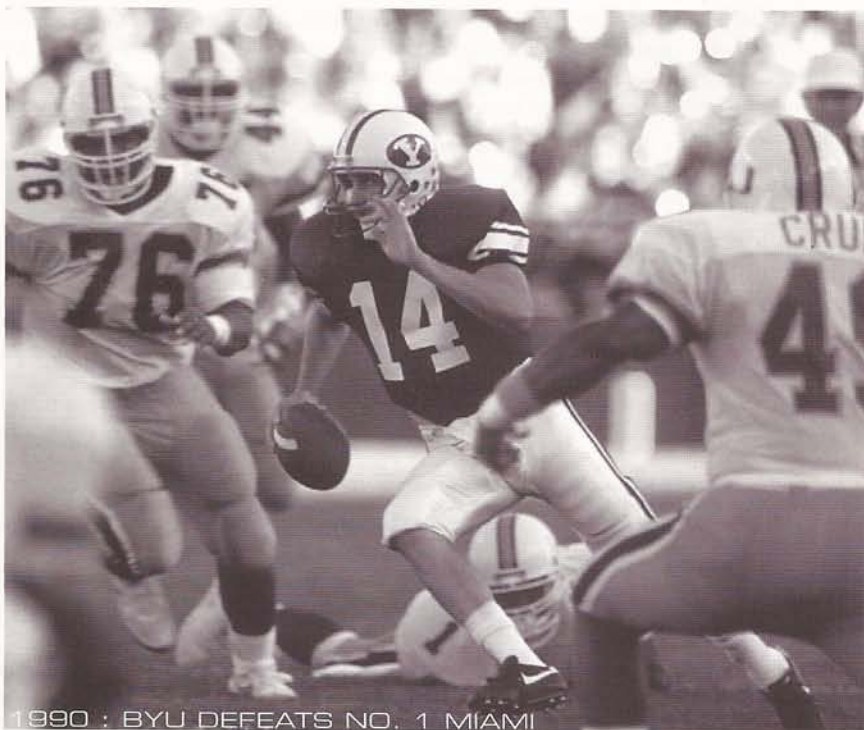


1989 : BYU VS. OREGON

BYU 28, (No. 1) Miami 21 **Sept. 8, 1990**

With the No. 1 team coming to town, Provo was buzzing with excitement. Cougar fans were excited because they had a Heisman candidate and a national ranking of their own (14th). The game would live up to all of the hype. Before a record crowd of 66,235 fans, Miami scored first on a seven-yard run by Stephen McGuire. BYU tied the score in the second quarter with a 14-yard TD pass from Ty Detmer to Matt Bellini then took the lead with a 32-yard Earl Kaufmann field goal. Both teams scored again before the half and, despite four first-half turnovers, the Cougars were up 17-14. The second half started the same way the first half did -- a Miami score. This time it was a five-yard Leonard Conley run to put the Hurricanes back on top 21-17. But that was the last scoring the 'Canes would do. The Cougar defense held Miami scoreless in the final 26:48 of play. Meanwhile, Ty Detmer gave a Heisman-like effort that saw BYU score two more times. First, a 63-yard drive ended with a 29-yard Kaufmann field goal to bring BYU within one point of the Hurricanes. After the defense held Miami to no gain twice after a third-and-one, the Cougars got the ball back on Miami's 43-yard line. Nine plays later, with Detmer scrambling between two Hurricane defenders, Mike Salido broke free in the endzone where Detmer hit him for the go-ahead touchdown. A two-point conversion pass from Detmer to Andy Boyce gave the Cougars a 28-21 lead with three minutes left in the third quarter. In the final quarter, the BYU defense bent but did not break. After Miami drove 62 yards to the BYU 15, a Hurricane fumble was recovered by BYU's Alema Fitiseanu to stop the drive. Then, when a BYU fumble was recovered on BYU's 37 yard-line, Miami was threatening to score after driving to the Cougar 13-yard line. But on third-and-ten, Ervin Lee intercepted Craig Erickson's pass to stop another Miami score. One last time, with Miami at the BYU 25 and less than two minutes remaining, an Erickson pass fell incomplete to give BYU the ball and the chance to run out the clock to secure the first Cougar win over a No. 1 ranked team.



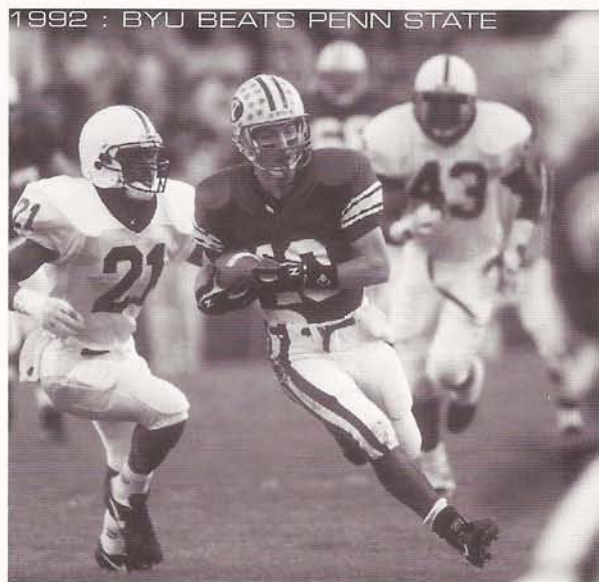
1990 : BYU DEFEATS NO. 1 MIAMI

BYU 52, San Diego St. 52 **Nov. 16, 1991**

In the highest scoring tie ever played, Ty Detmer brought the Cougars back from a 45-17 deficit with five minutes left in the third quarter to tie the score at 52 with 30 seconds remaining. The Cougars started the scoring with a 31-yard pass from Detmer to Jamal Willis. But San Diego State went on to score 35 first-half points and 10 third-quarter points to take the 45-17 lead. The Cougars then scored touchdowns on five of their next six possessions. Detmer had 599 yards of passing, hitting 10 different receivers. Aztec David Lowery had 568 yards, while Marshall Faulk added 119 yards rushing and 116 receiving. Cougar freshman Jamal Willis added 163 yards receiving, 66 yards rushing and three touchdowns.

BYU 30, Penn State 17 **Oct. 31, 1992**

With national power Penn State coming to Provo, Kalin Hall gained 141 yards and one touchdown on the ground to lead the Cougars to their first victory over the Nittany Lions. Penn State scored first with a 39-yard field goal from V.J. Muscillo. The Cougars came back to score 30 unanswered points, including an 80-yard bomb from Hancock to Tyler Anderson, to take a 30-7 lead going into the fourth quarter. In the final quarter, Penn State scored on a one-yard run by Richie Anderson and a five-yard pass from Kerry Collins to O.J. McDuffie to bring the final score to 30-17.

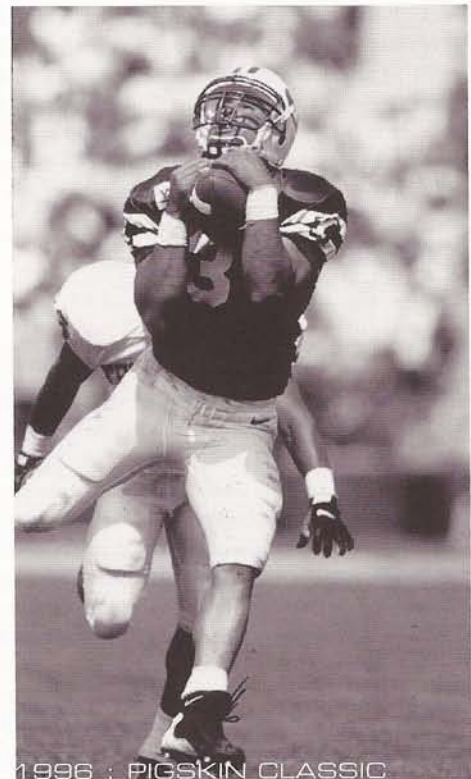
1994 : COUGARS BEAT THE IRISH IN SOUTH BEND

BYU 21, Notre Dame 14
Oct. 15, 1994

Prepared to avenge a 1993 loss in Cougar Stadium, BYU headed to South Bend to take on Notre Dame, the 1993 runner-up for the national championship. A 41-yard run by Randy Kinder got the Irish on the scoreboard first just 2:45 into the ballgame. BYU came back with 49 and a 48-yard David Lauder field goal to bring the score to 7-6. The scoring continued in the second quarter when John Walsh hit Jamal Willis on a 19-yard touchdown pass to put BYU up 13-7. But the Fighting Irish came back with a touchdown pass of their own – a 7-yarder from Ron Powlus to Derrick Mayes, putting Notre Dame back on top by one, 14-13 with 34 seconds left in the half. In the third quarter, after Notre Dame moved the ball to the BYU three yard-line, Powlus rolled left on a naked boot-leg, looking for the score. BYU’s Jon Pollock wasn’t fooled, sacking Powlus for a loss of 18 yards and forcing the Irish to attempt a field goal. But the attempt was blocked by sophomore tight end Chad Lewis, halting Notre Dame’s attempt to score. The very next possession, BYU took the ball 77 yards on 13 plays, shaving over five minutes off the clock, before scoring the go-ahead touchdown on a one-yard Willis dive. A two-point conversion made the score 21-14. The rest of the final quarter saw both defenses tighten, forcing one punt, two fumbles, one missed field goal and one turnover on downs and leaving the final score 21-14, as the Cougars left with a rare win in South Bend and a 6-1 record.

BYU 41, Texas A&M 37
Aug. 24, 1996

To begin a season that would see the Cougars record more wins than any other school in history (14), Texas A&M would be coming to town to play in the annual Pigskin Classic. The game was indeed a classic as Steve Sarkisian threw for 536 yards and six touchdowns, leading BYU to the victory. The first TD pass was a five-yarder to Chad Lewis, made possible by a 48-yard pass play to BYU’s other stand-out tight end, Itula Mili. A blocked PAT made it 6-0. The Aggies came back with a field goal and a touchdown to take a 10-6 lead after the first quarter. Another A&M field goal and touchdown made it 20-6 early in the second quarter. But the Cougars responded with a 10-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a nine-yard bootleg pass to Mili. Another drive, this time 74 yards and 10 plays, tied the score at 20 going into halftime. In the second half, both teams traded scores, but another missed PAT put the Cougars down 34-26 going into the final quarter. Early in the fourth, BYU drove 80 yards, scoring on a 12-yard pass to James Dye. A Sarkisian pass to Dustin Johnson on the two-point conversion tied the game at 34. Both defenses tightened and neither team scored until, with just 1:27 on the clock, Texas A&M kicked a 52-yard field goal to take the lead. BYU started their last drive with 1:23 but only needed 20 seconds to take the lead. An 11-yard pass, a 21-yard pass and a 46-yard touchdown pass to K.O. Kealaluhi made it 41-37. With a minute left, the Cougar defense forced an A&M fumble to seal the game.



1996 : PIGSKIN CLASSIC

BYU 28, Wyoming 25

Dec. 7, 1996

With the WAC Championship on the line, BYU and Wyoming played one of the most exciting games in the history of WAC football. The Cougars came in ranked sixth in the nation while the Cowboys were ranked 20th, both teams losing only once on the year. After Chris Ellison intercepted a Josh Wallwork pass on Wyoming's 23 yard-line, the Cougars settled for a 30-yard field goal to go up 3-0. With each team missing a field goal, the score remained 3-0 going into the second quarter. An 11-yard touchdown run by Brian McKenzie early in the second quarter put BYU up 10-0 and Ethan Pochman added another field goal with 55 seconds left in the second quarter to make it 13-0 at halftime. Wyoming wasted no time getting on the scoreboard in the second half, scoring on a Jay Jenkins 25-yard fumble recovery. Wyoming scored the next 10 points to take the lead 17-13 early in the fourth quarter. Less than two minutes later, the Cougars struck again with a 13-yard TD pass from Steve Sarkisian to Chad Lewis, reclaiming the lead at 20-17. With an offense that had gained momentum, the Cowboys came right back on the next possession to go 80 yards in just four plays, scoring a 14-yard TD pass and converting the two-point attempt. Behind 25-20, the Cougars engineered a 13-play, 70-yard drive that took over six minutes, but saw BYU come up short, failing to convert a fourth-and-goal on the Wyoming two. The Cowboys now had the task of holding on to a five-point lead for the remaining 2:57, but were backed up to their own two-yard-line. BYU's defense took advantage, forcing the Cowboys to take a safety on fourth-and-seven. Down just three, the BYU offense started their final drive on their 40-yard line with just under two minutes remaining. Seven plays later, the Cougars were at the Wyoming three yard-line with third-and-one, but only one second remaining on the clock. Ethan Pochman came in and calmly nailed the 20-yard field goal to send the game into overtime. When BYU won the toss in overtime, they chose to defend, and defend is what they did, sacking Wyoming's Wallwork and forcing two incomplete passes before Cory Wedel missed a 47-yard field goal. With the ball on the 25 yard-line, McKenzie rushed three straight times to bring the Cougars to the 16 yard-line, where Pochman hit the biggest field goal of his career and gave BYU the 28-25 overtime win and the WAC Championship.

BYU 26, Utah 24

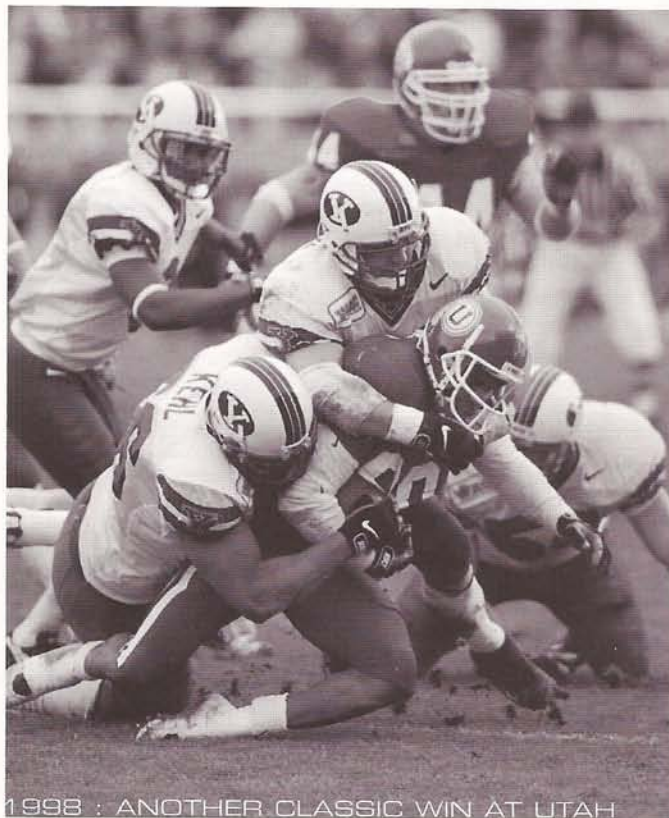
Nov. 21, 1998

BYU went into the fourth quarter with a 20-17 lead, then built upon that with two Owen Pochman field goals to make it a 26-17 Cougar lead with under three minutes left in the game. But on the ensuing kickoff, Utah's Daniel Jones returned the kick 95 yards for the touchdown to bring the Utes within two points. On the next possession, the Utah defense forced the Cougars to punt after three unsuccessful plays, giving the Utes a chance to win the game. On their first play, Jonathan Crosswhite hit Jones for a 43-yard gain to the BYU 24 yard-line, but a celebration penalty moved the Utes back to the BYU 39. With 51 seconds remaining, Crosswhite hit Donny Utu for 11 yards, then three plays later Crosswhite hit Jones again for a nine yard gain, putting Utah on the 17 yard-line and well within range of a winning field goal. After Mike Anderson ran to the center of the field for a two-yard gain, BYU called two timeouts to try and ice the Ute kicker, Ryan Kaneshiro. Apparently, the strategy worked as Kaneshiro's 32-yard attempt hit the upright and bounced back onto the field, giving BYU the two point victory and the WAC Championship.

BYU 35, Washington 28

Sept. 9, 1999

In the season-opener, Washington scored first when a Husky punt hit Heshi Robertson on the BYU two yard-line and bounced into the endzone where Washington's Ben Mahdavi fell on the live ball for the touchdown and a 7-0 Husky lead. BYU came back, scoring three straight touchdowns, but missing a PAT to take a 20-7 lead in the third quarter. Both teams exchanged scores, making it a 27-14 BYU lead with one quarter to play. The missed PAT would come back to haunt the Cougars, as Washington scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns on two Cougar turnovers to take a 28-21 lead with 5:00 remaining. The Huskies forced BYU to punt, giving the Huskies the ball on their own 34 yard-line with 4:06 left in the game and a one point lead. But three straight stops by the Cougars forced Washington to punt. With 2:35 remaining, BYU started at their own 11 yard-line. A quick pass from Kevin Feterik to Carlos Nuno gained 14 yards and another 17-yard completion to freshman Luke Staley, playing in his first collegiate game, put BYU on their 42 with first-and-ten. The next three Feterik passes went incomplete, putting BYU in a fourth-and-ten hole. But, dropping back to pass, Feterik threw a perfect pass between two defenders and into the hands of Ben Horton for a 12-yard gain and a first down with 1:34 on the clock. A pass interference call put BYU on the Washington 38 yard-line, where Feterik threw a TD bomb that was caught by another freshman, Chris Hale, in the corner of the endzone. A two-point

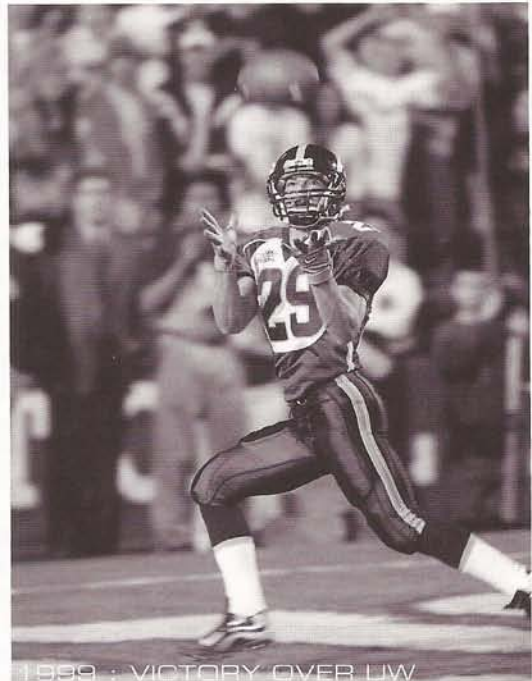
conversion put the Cougars up by seven with 1:16 still remaining. That time was enough for the Huskies to drive to the BYU 11 yard-line, where Marques Tuiasosopo's fourth-and-ten pass fell incomplete as time expired.

BYU 38, Virginia 35 Sept. 2, 2000

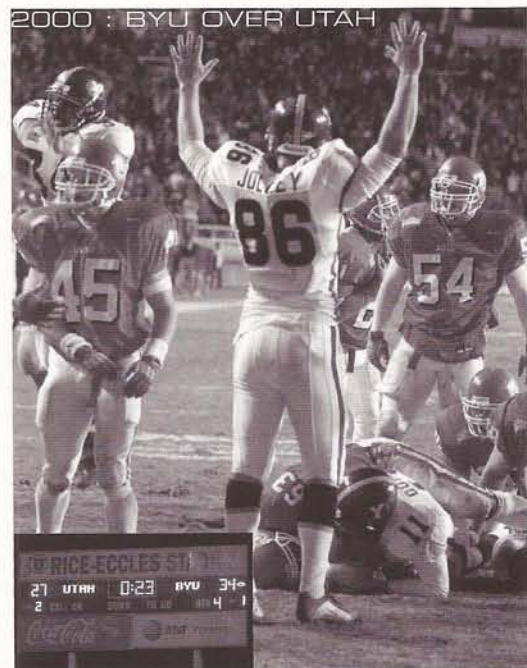
In the first half, Cougar fans watched Virginia rack up 21 points while holding BYU to a shutout. In the second half, it seemed a different Cougar team was on the field, as quarterback Bret Engemann ended the game with 447 yards of passing, completing 34 of 41 attempts to lead the Cougars back from the 21 point deficit to a three-point overtime win. BYU started the second-half scoring on the very first possession when an 80-yard drive was capped by a six-yard Brian McDonald TD run. A Cavalier punt gave the Cougars the ball again, again going 80 yards before McDonald scored his second touchdown of the game, this time from one yard out, making it 21-14. Virginia responded with a 28-yard touchdown pass of their own, going back up by 14. Going into the fourth quarter, a 70-yard pass from Engemann to Jonathan Pittman put BYU on the Virginia eight yard-line, where McDonald scored again on a six-yard run, and the Cougars were back within seven. BYU could not afford to exchange scores, but that is what they did, with the Cavaliers scoring in just four plays to make it 35-21. BYU scored another TD when Engemann hit tight end Doug Jolley for a six-yard TD. This time the defense stiffened, holding Virginia on a crucial fourth-and-one, giving BYU the ball at midfield and one last chance to pull even. Eight plays later, the Cougar offense scored its sixth touchdown in seven second-half possessions when Engemann hit Margin Hooks on a six-yard TD pass for the tying score with 50 seconds left. In overtime, Tyson Smith intercepted a Dan Ellis pass to stop Virginia's chance to score. Then, after driving from the 25 to the nine yard-line, Owen Pochman nailed a 26-yard field goal attempt to give the Cougars the dramatic win.

BYU 34, Utah 27 Nov. 24, 2000

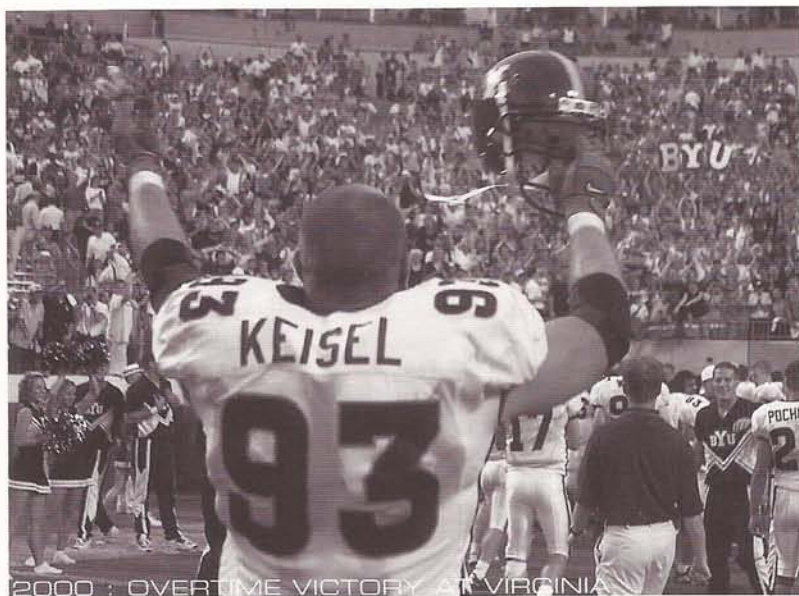
In LaVell Edwards' last game as the head coach of the Cougars, Utah got a quick 7-0 lead when Andre Dyson returned a Brandon Doman pass 24 yards for the touchdown. BYU came back, controlling the game going into the final quarter, leading 26-10. But a field goal and two TD passes gave Utah 17 unanswered points and the Utes a one-point lead with two minutes left in the game. With one last chance, Doman and the Cougar offense would try to engineer a game-winning drive. After an incompletion and a sack made it third-and-twenty, Doman completed a seven-yard pass to Luke Staley, making it fourth-and-13 with 1:04 on the clock. After

a timeout, Doman took the snap, escaped one sack and, with a Ute defender chasing him towards the sideline, threw the ball downfield where Jonathan Pittman adjusted his route and made a leaping 34-yard catch at midfield. On the very next play, Doman hit Pittman again on a beautiful sideline catch for 36 yards, giving BYU the ball on the 13 yard-line. A nine-yard rush set up a four-yard Doman quarterback run that gave the Cougars the come-from-behind win to finish Edwards' career. "It was a great ballgame on both sides. It couldn't be a better way out," said Edwards.

lavell's legacy

Named after newly retired head coach LaVell Edwards, BYU's football stadium is branded with a namesake worth a lifetime of amazing stories. Over 29 seasons, Edwards has built a football tradition at BYU making the most of each season. Edwards, a two-time NCAA national coach of the year and the sixth winningest coach in NCAA history, taught his players and the nation what a passing offense truly was. The Cougar offense passed 103,562 yards (about 59 miles) throughout Edward's 29 seasons as head coach. Edwards coached the Cougars to 20 conference championships, 22 postseason games and the national championship in 1984.

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January... had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962... halfback Pete Van Valkenburg wins NCAA rushing title beating out All-Americans Greg Pruitt and Otis Armstrong with a 138.6 yards-per-game average... the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively... quarterback Gary Sheide is runner-up in NCAA passing and third in total offense... teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards)... Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense... Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game... running back Steve Stratton is named the first Academic All-American in school history.

1974: LAVELL'S FIRST WAC CHAMPIONSHIP



1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories: seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense... Gary Sheide is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) ... Gary's career completion percentage is fourth all-time.. Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title... LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma St.—BYU's first bowl.

1975 A year of adjustment: the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games... Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory... Nielsen sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing... becomes starter... Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA completions per game (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place... Nielsen finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense... Cougars finish first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9)... Nielsen voted first team All-American... BYU ties for WAC title and plays Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over... by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage... Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense... Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)... BYU's 341.6 yards passing per game was third highest in NCAA history, and 41 TDs was second... Cougars top the nation in take-aways (fumbles recovered or interceptions) with a total of 56... Cougars tie for first in WAC and make a post-season trip to play two Japanese all-star teams.

1978 Both Marc Wilson and sophomore Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties... Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries... Cougars win the WAC, play their final regular-season game in Yokohama, Japan, against UNLV, and meet Navy in the first Holiday Bowl.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt McMahon and play senior Wilson... Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight

wins ... Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)... finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit... Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)... BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season... LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award... Cougars win WAC and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season... BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)... quarterback Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Eyre... McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)... sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever... also led the nation in total offense (385.6)... after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight ... Cougars win WAC and defeat SMU in Holiday Bowl III by scoring 21 points in the final four minutes.

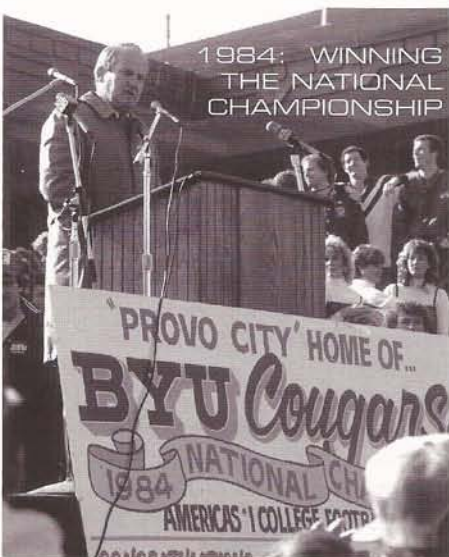
1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ... McMahon wins the first Davey O'Brien Award ... Cougars win WAC and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV... LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl... also coaches in the Japan Bowl... Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top 10 in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game... loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and plays Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V... Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-America... BYU finishes third nationally in total

offense... Steve Young is named WAC Offensive Player of the Year.

1983 Another 11-win season... Cougars are ranked seventh in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team... quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-America... after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games... BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring... Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game... BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI... Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone... Young wins the Davey O'Brien Award and finishes runner-up for the Heisman.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season... win streak is extended to 24 games... quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8)... defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-America... team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)... defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense... another WAC championship and a victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII... Edwards named NCAA Coach of the Year by most organizations ... Bosco is runner-up for the Davey O'Brien Award and third in the Heisman.



1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic... that game plus a bowl and playing at Hawai'i allows BYU to become the only collegiate team to play 14 games in a season... defen-

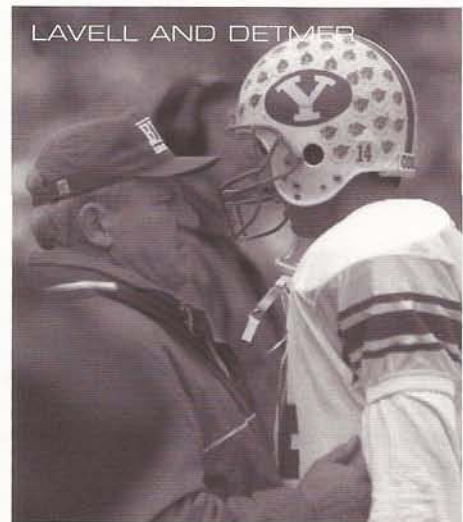
sive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-America and WAC Defensive Player of the Year... Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors... a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship... quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting... BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall... Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes Frank Kush as the winningest coach in WAC football history... Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American... Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams... Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards... Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU defense leads the nation with 50 takeaways (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with Troy Long getting the most defensive points... after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games... Cougars come within a two-point conversion of another WAC title... Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer... Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)... Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense... Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regular-season game against Colorado St.) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All American Bowl versus Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race... punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting... behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 10th in total offense and 13th in scoring... BYU plays second-ranked Miami even for three quarters... Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker... 11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is con-



sensus All-America... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-America teams ... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy...also wins the Davey O'Brien Award...finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-America and has more receptions yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU... Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204... BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon... BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl.

1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Ty Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)... BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa, 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu winds up with the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were

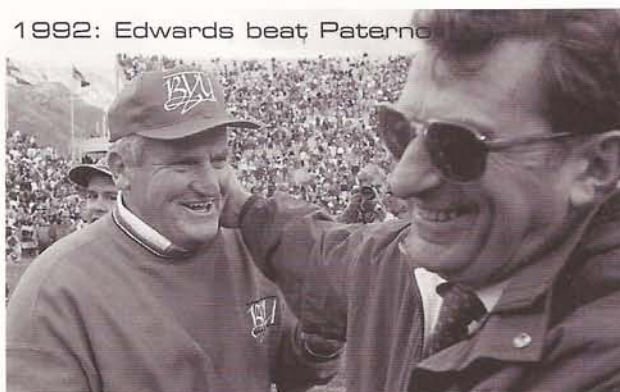

beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah... Ryan Hancock finishes third in total offense and passing... BYU wins WAC title and goes to the Aloha Bowl...BYU's 15th straight bowl.

1993 BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State...Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October... BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season... team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency... freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown passes (29) and yardage (3,066)... BYU's NCAA record of 50-straight games with a touchdown

1994 It's an historic season with victories over Notre Dame and Oklahoma to finish 10th in the final CNN/USA Today poll... five players are drafted, the most ever... Cougars win their first bowl game since 1988... BYU dedicates Copper Bowl effort to graduate assistant coach John Farley, who was sidelined in August with heart trouble and died in December...Cougars are third nationally in passing with John Walsh fifth in total offense... Jamal Willis becomes the all-time leading rusher and breaks the record for touchdowns...David Lauder sets a career record for consecutive PATs with 53..

1995 A first-ever multi-year contract for a BYU coach is given to Edwards...the string of 17 consecutive bowl games comes to an end... Cougars finish number two in NCAA in punt returns at 18.9, while James Dye is number one at 21.9... Steve Sarkisian is the first junior college player since 1973 to start as a BYU quarterback...BYU finishes in a four-way tie for first in the WAC.

1996 BYU completes the longest season in Division I college football history and plays in its first ever New Year's Day bowl game with a 19-15 Cotton Bowl victory of Kansas State...BYU finishes the season with a 14-1 record and a No. 5 national ranking in both polls, its highest ranking since 1984...QB Steve Sarkisian leads the nation in pass efficiency with a 173.6 rating...the Cougars finish sixth in the nation in total offense with 478 yards per game...the defense leads the WAC in rushing yards allowed (124.6), total yards allowed (316.3) and points allowed (18.7)...James Dye finishes second in the nation in punt returns with a 17.6 average...BYU wins the inaugural WAC Championship with a 28-25 victory over Wyoming in Las Vegas, Nevada...BYU goes undefeated in the WAC, giving LaVell Edwards his 18th career title.

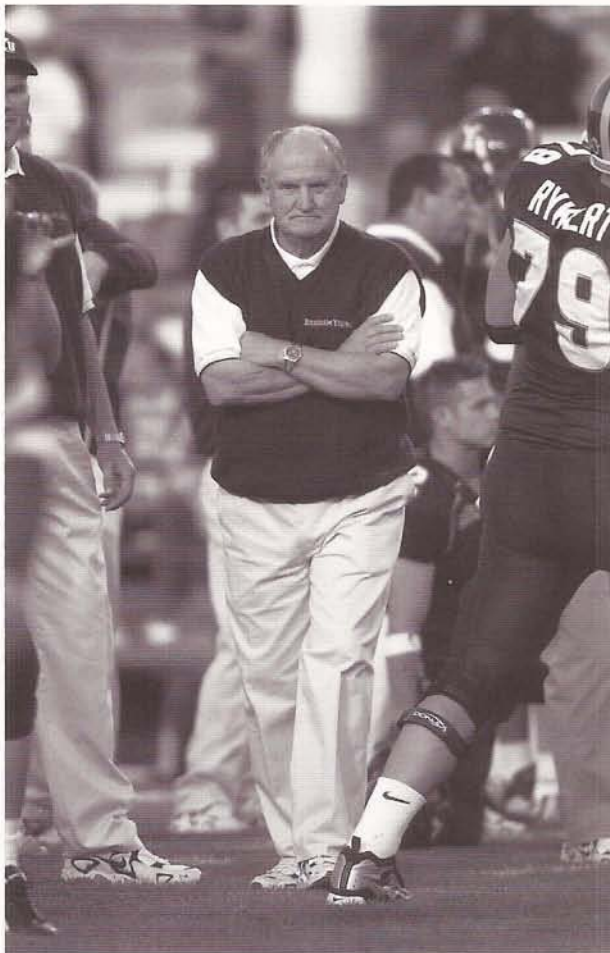
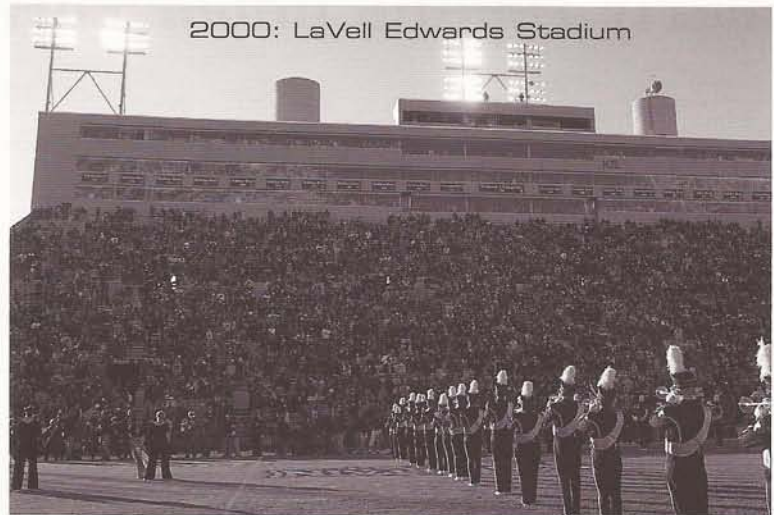
1997 BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever true freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

1998 BYU runs up a 7-1 conference record (9-5 overall) to win the WAC Pacific Division title... The Cougars meet Tulane in their first-ever Liberty Bowl appearance ... BYU's season is highlighted by its defense, ranked No. 5 in the nation, allowing only 91.2 rushing yards and 273.9 total yards per game ... After a slow start, the Cougars won seven games in a row ... Season highlights included a, 26-6, thumping of Arizona State, a, 13-0, shutout of San Diego State and a, 26-24, victory over Utah ... Rob Morris, John Tait, Brian Gray and Daren Yancey were all named to the All-WAC first team ... John Tait

was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft (14th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs ... Sophomore kicker Owen Pochman set a school record by connecting on 62 consecutive PATs.

1999 Won the first-ever Mountain West Conference Championship with an 8-4 season record (5-2 conf.) ... A 27-20 win over Air Force marks LaVell Edwards' 250th victory as head coach of the Cougars ... Junior kicker Owen Pochman becomes the school's all-time leading scorer, picking up 90 points on the season to give him a career total 247 ... A six-game winning streak in the middle of the season has BYU ranked as high as No. 12 in the USA Today/CNN Coaches' Poll ... Running back Luke Staley is named Freshman All-American and conference Freshman of the Year, leading the nation's freshmen in scoring average with 78 points in eight games ... Rob Morris returns from a four-game absence to earn All-America status ... Morris is picked in the first round with the 28th overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts ... The Cougars finish the season ranked first in the conference in total offense and rushing defense, as well as eighth in the nation in passing offense and 14th in the nation in rushing defense ... BYU makes its first-ever Motor City Bowl appearance against Marshall ... Edwards concludes the season with his 20th career conference title and 22nd bowl appearance in 28 years.

2000 BYU won its last two games, including a memorable thriller at Utah, to send coach LaVell Edwards out with a 6-6 record in his 29th and final year as a head coach...Playing one of its toughest schedules in history, the Cougars played Mississippi State, Syracuse, Virginia and national power Florida State in the Kickoff Classic...Against Utah, BYU trailed by one point but went 80 yards on nine plays, including two dramatic passes from quarterback Brandon Doman to wide receiver Jonathan Pittman, for the come-from-behind victory...Owen Pochman, Setema Gali, Jr., Justin Ena and Aaron Edmonds were all named to the All-Mountain West Conference first team...Pochman and Tevita Ofahengaue are both selected in the NFL draft with Ofahengaue being "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last player selected in the draft.

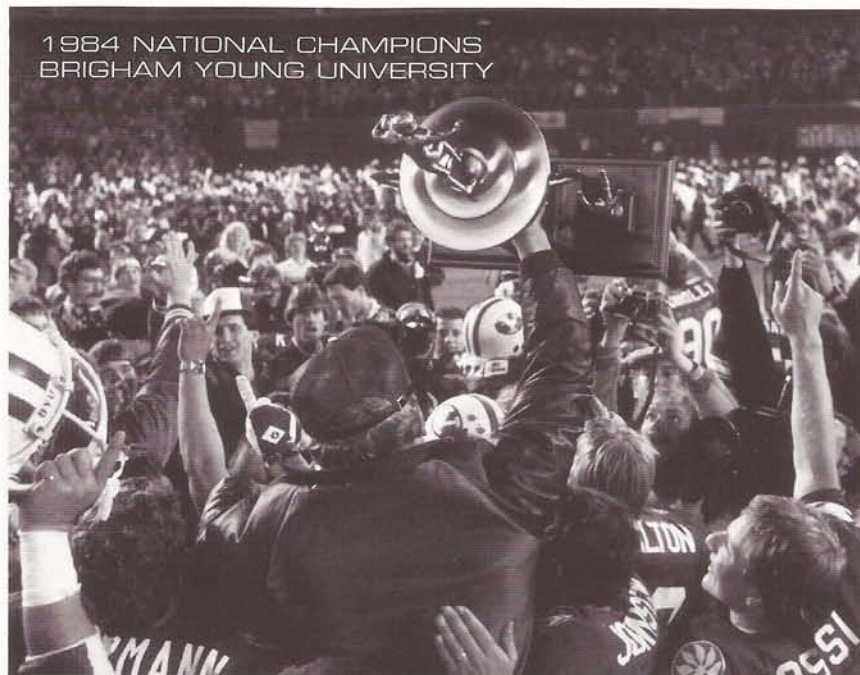

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the Associated Press, the United Press International, Sports Illustrated, CNN-USA Today, and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawai'i, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun late in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout

the season were to offensive lineman Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawai'i. Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

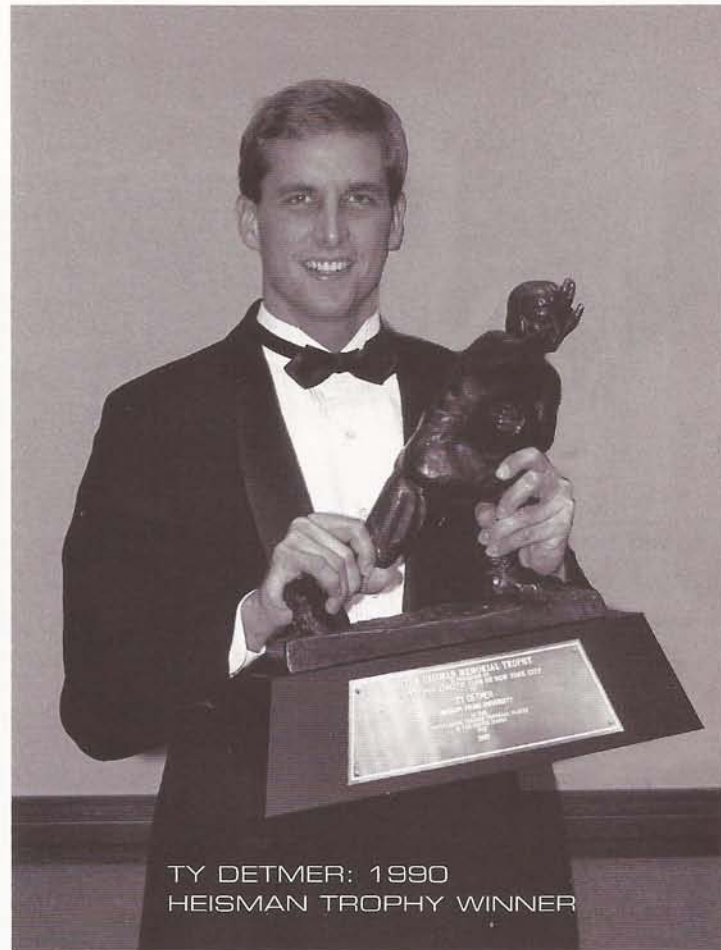
Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor is awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame's Raghīb "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU."

Detmer's portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of Cougar Stadium.

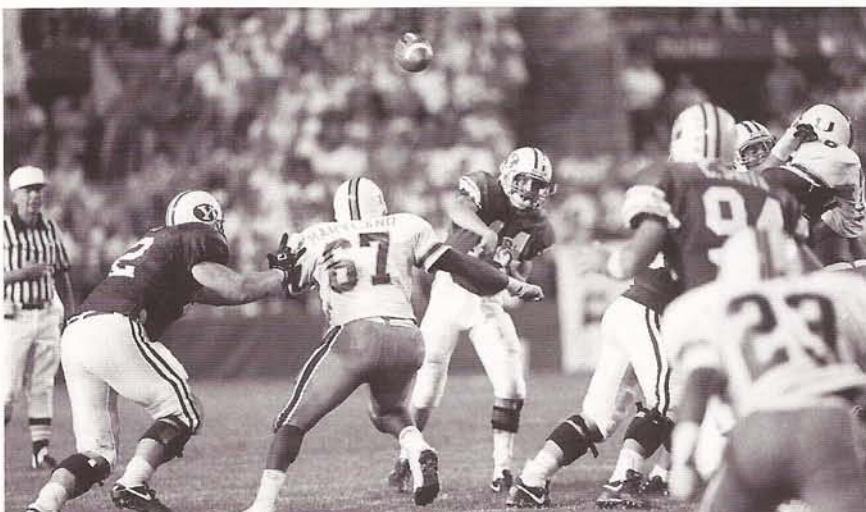

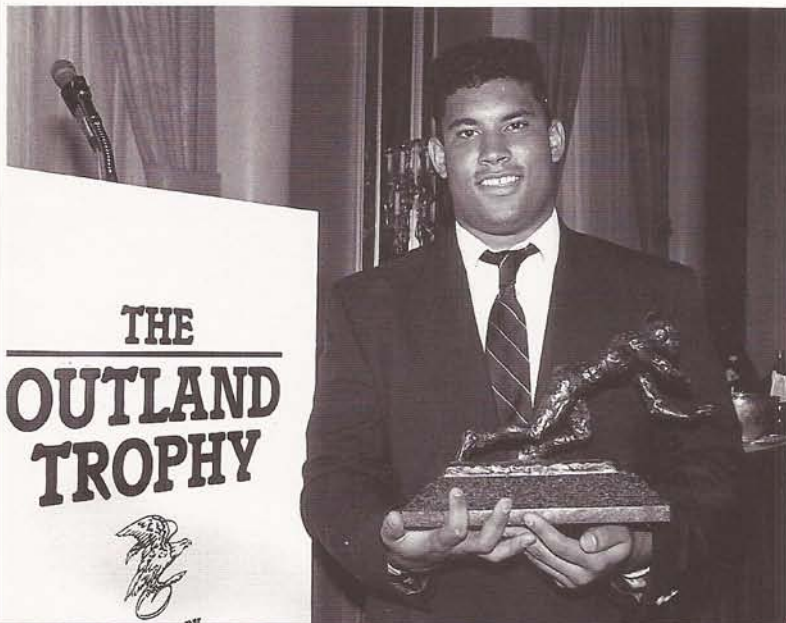

the outland trophy



BYU is one of only 11 schools to have two Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas

Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270, senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

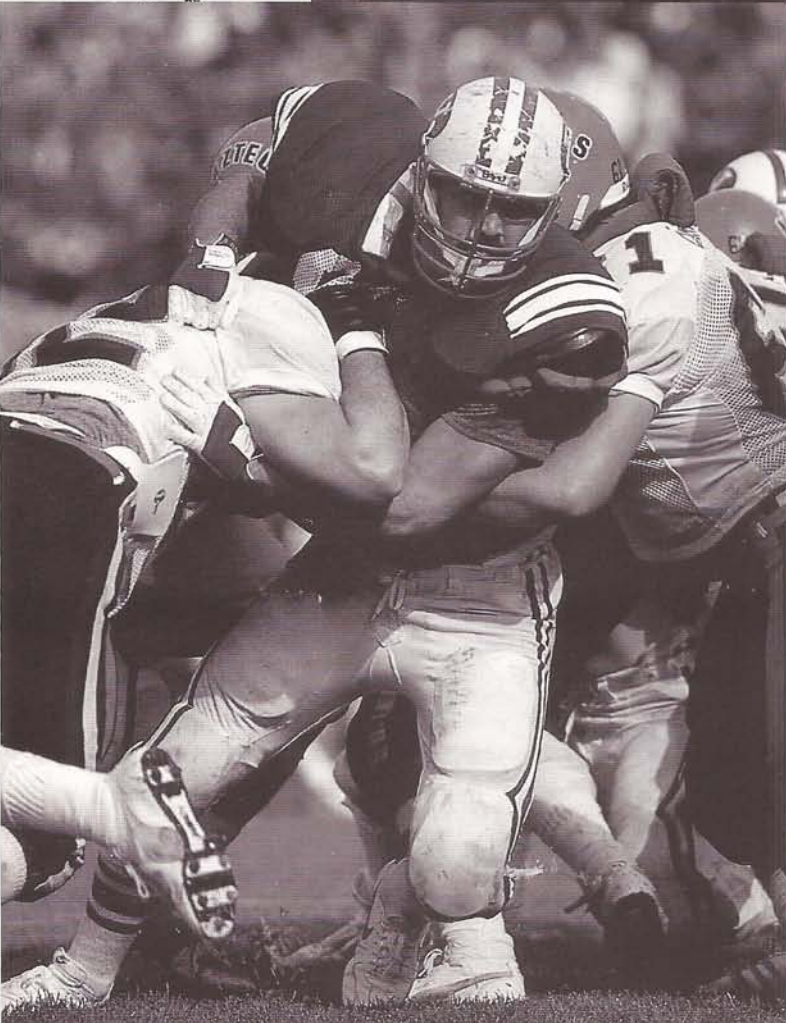
Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."

Mount Mohammed, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "Mo" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.



■ Two of BYU's greatest interior linemen Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, and Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, earned the Outland Trophy Award. Elewonibi won the award in 1989 because of his outstanding protection of future Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer. Buck, an amazing pass rusher, anchored one of BYU's strongest defensive teams in 1986. Both players went on to successful professional careers in the NFL.

quarterback honors

sammy baugh trophy college passer of the year



On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the seventh BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year.

In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award.

Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972), Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Steve Walsh (1988), Jeff George (1989), David Klingler (1990), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994) and Danny Wuerffel (1995).



the davey o'brien award

In 1981, the Davey O'Brien Educational and Charitable Trust of Fort Worth, Texas, named Jim McMahon the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award — honoring the nation's best quarterback.

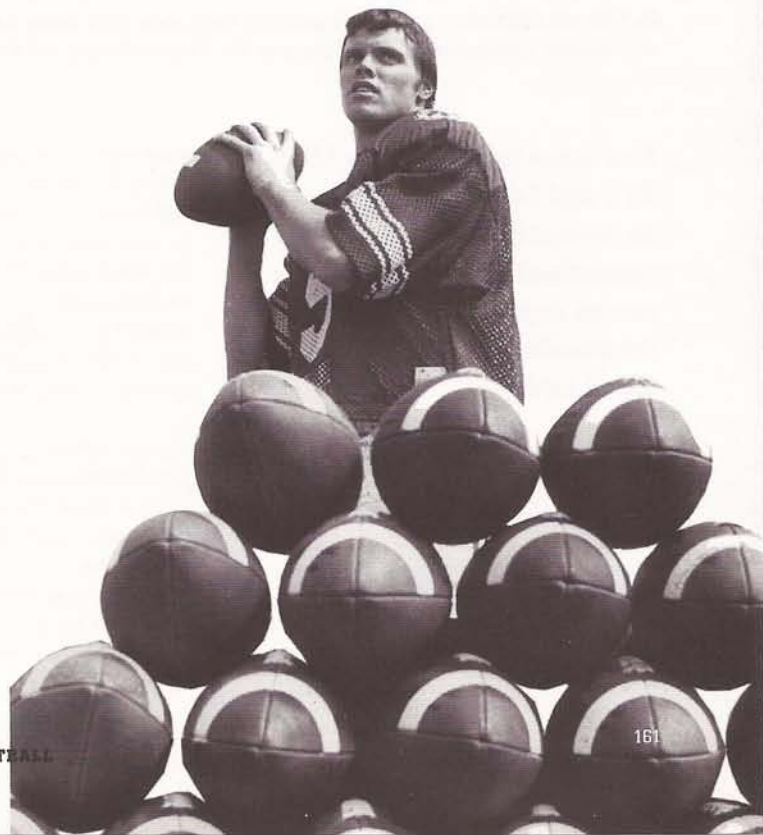
In 16 years, BYU quarterbacks have won the Davey O'Brien Award four times — more than any other school.

In addition to winners McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Ty Detmer (1990 & '91), Robbie Bosco finished runner-up in 1984 and Steve Sarkisian finished third in 1996.

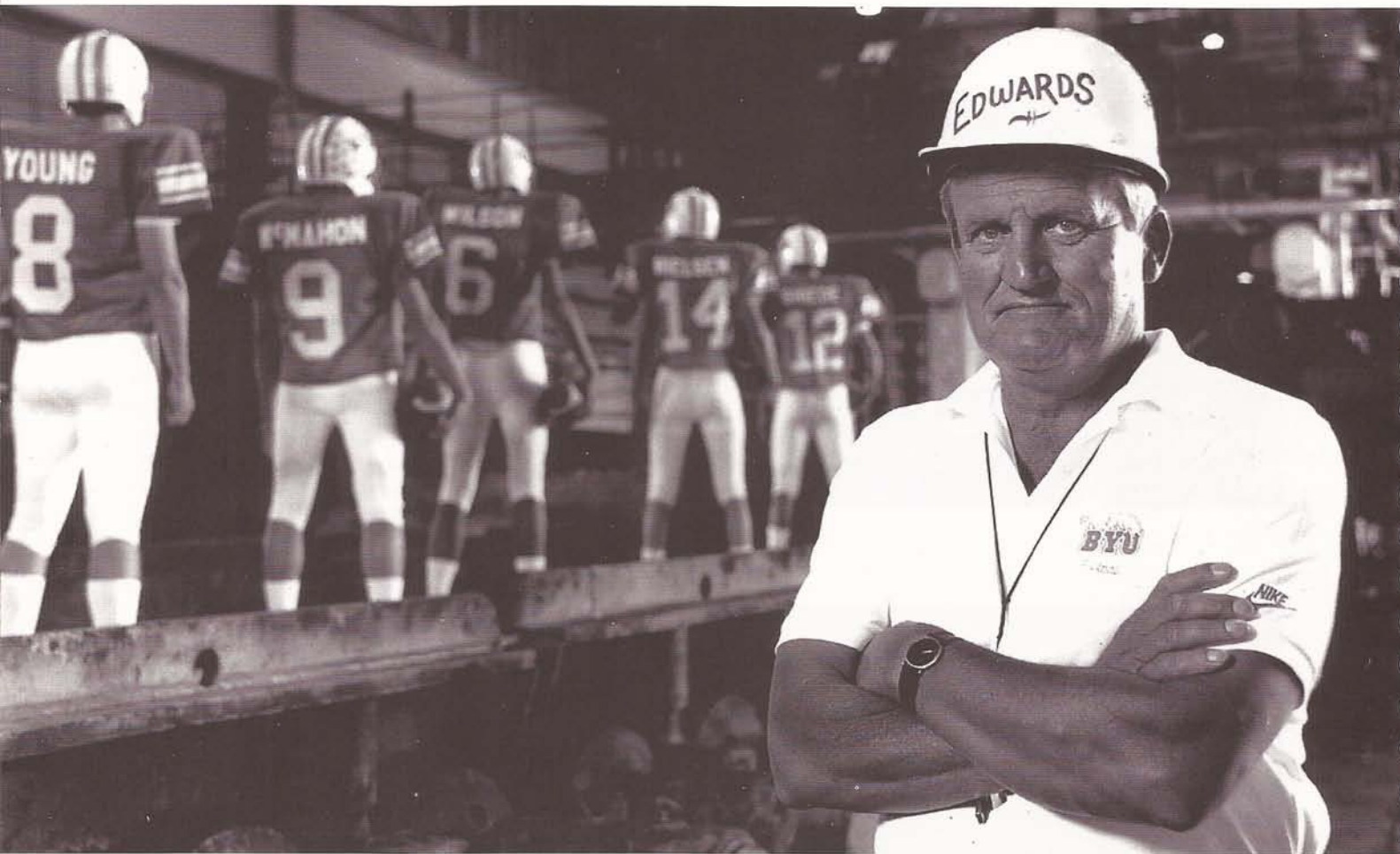

Ever since Gary Sheide in 1973, BYU and LaVell Edwards produced an assembly line of outstanding quarterbacks in Provo that have earned unprecedented success in the market of college and professional football.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many

other Heisman Trophy candidates. Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young have been inducted into the college football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 13 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Three of the top five career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 27 years Edwards has coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times.

When Edwards was named head coach at

BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC or MWC championship 19 times, played in 22 post-season bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

Taking Turns: From 1978 to 1984 — seven straight years — a BYU quarterback was named first-team All-Western Athletic Conference. McMahon got the ball rolling in 1978 as a sophomore. Wilson followed as a senior in 1979, then McMahon twice (1980, 1981), Young twice (1982, 1983) and finally Bosco in 1984.

Rewriting the NCAA Record Book: From Wilson in 1978 to Detmer in 1991 BYU quarterbacks broke or tied an amazing 165 NCAA records. McMahon led the way with an unheard of 70 records.

season passing efficiency & rating records

At one time, BYU quarterbacks held season passing efficiency and rating records at all levels of competition. In 1980, Jim McMahon threw 47 touchdown passes on his way to establishing a new NCAA season passing efficiency mark at 176.9 (a record that still holds for 30-plus attempts per game). McMahon's record held up until 1995 when Danny Wuerffel of Florida set the new mark at 178.4. McMahon is currently No. 4 followed by BYU greats Ty Detmer at No. 5 (175.6) and Steve Sarkisian at No. 7 (173.6).

In 1994, future Cougar Sarkisian set a new NJCAA record at 203.8 while playing at El Camino College in Torrance, Calif. That same year, Steve Young broke the NFL mark, establishing the new record at 112.8.

As a team, the Cougars finished first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9). 1994 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

mark wilson- Threw 250 completions for 3,720 yards with 29 touchdown passes. Threw seven touchdown passes in first start. Led NCAA in total offense. Ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating. 1979 Senior Bowl MVP. Finished third in Heisman voting. Set 10 NCAA records in his career. Winner of Sammy Baugh Trophy as College Passer of the Year. Led team to an undefeated regular season and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. 1996 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

clay brown- Made game winning hail mary catch in 1980 Holiday Bowl against SMU. Member of Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame.

nick eyre- Nicknamed "The Bear." Was BYU's first consensus All-America lineman. Finished third in the Outland Trophy voting. Was a three-year starter for 24 consecutive games.

jim mcmahon- 1980 Led nation with 4,571 yards passing including 47 touchdowns. First Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. Set or tied 26 NCAA records. Led nation in total offense (385.6) and pass efficiency (176.9), which ranks second all-time in NCAA history. Finished fifth in Heisman voting. 1981 Won first-ever Davey O'Brien Award. Led nation with 3,555 yards passing including 30 touchdowns. Led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8). Finished third in Heisman voting. Finished career with 70 NCAA records. 1998 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

dan plater- Had 62 catches for 891 yards, an average of 5.2 yards per catch, including five touchdown passes.

bart oates- As a two-year starter on the offensive line, Oates earned Honorable Mention All-WAC in 1981 and All-WAC First Team in 1982. He was also named to the District VII. Oates also enjoyed a successful career in the NFL.

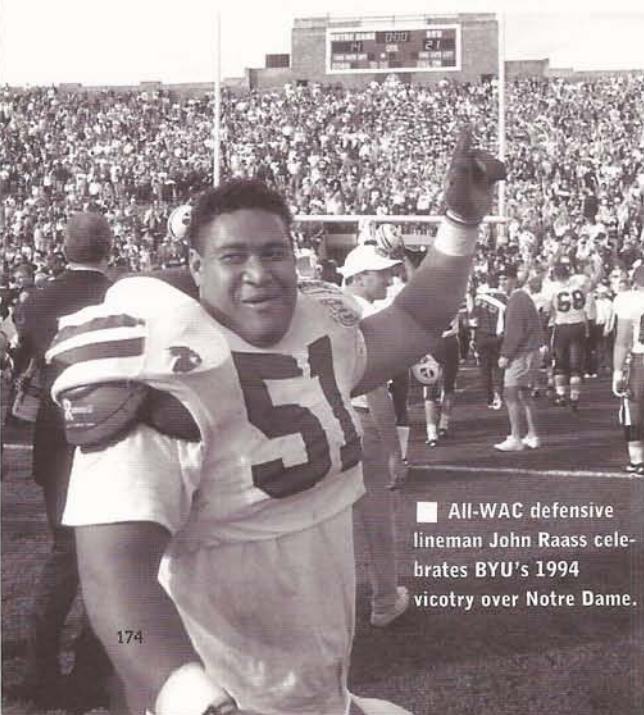

college football hall of fame

Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc., the first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least ten years and a first team All-American selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12 member panel made up of athletic directors, conference and bowl officials, and media representatives.

Jim McMahon

Quarterback: 1978-81

Inducted: 1998

The 1998 class of players for the College Football Hall of Fame included quarterback Jim McMahon of Brigham Young University, 1977-78, 80-81.

"I am happy to be selected and think there will be additional BYU quarterbacks joining me in the future," said McMahon. "I'd do it all over again. There was no one who could stop our offense."

McMahon joins former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

"This is an honor and recognition that is richly deserved by Jim," said BYU Head Coach LaVell Edwards. "We are pleased that he was selected."

The 1998 Class was inducted December 8 at the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's 41st Annual Awards Dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City and was permanently enshrined during ceremonies at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Indiana, in the summer of 1999.

McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was 1981 First team All-America by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he was First team All-America by the FWAA and Second team by

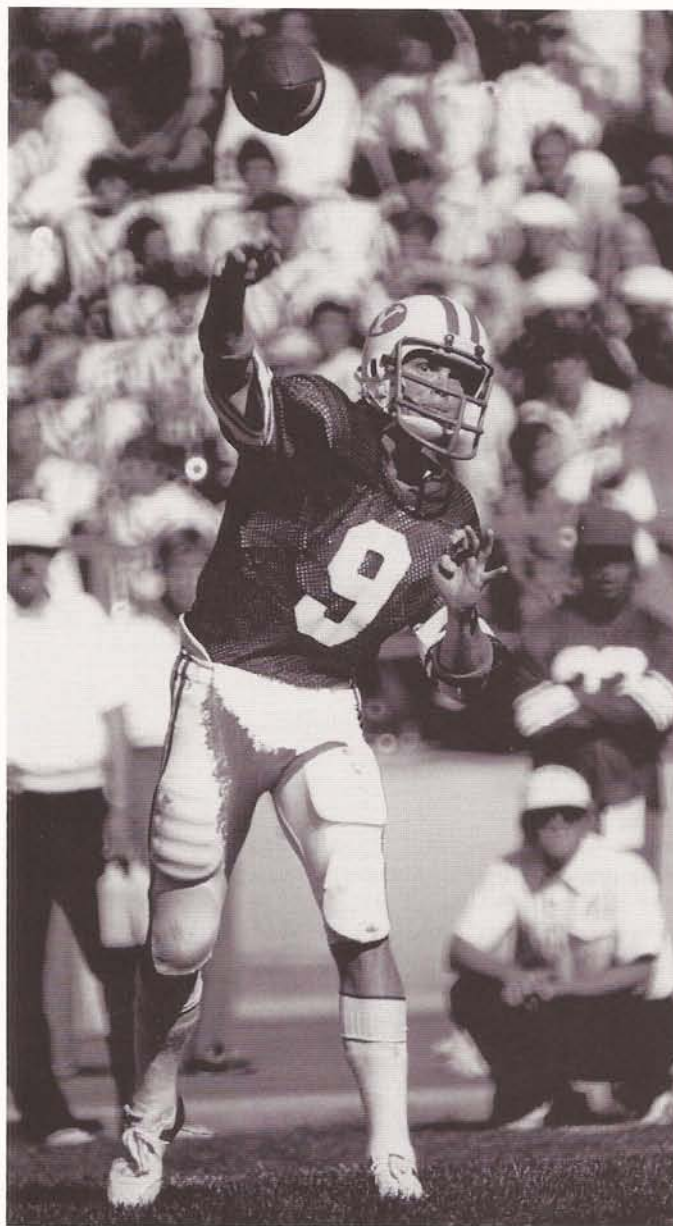
McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year, and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8) in 1981 as well as pass efficiency (176.9) and total offense (385.6) in 1980. He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first-team all-league.

He broke 23 school records, won the 1982 Dale Rex Award, the 1981 Cougar Club Crowd Pleaser Award, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls, and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame.

McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).

His charitable work includes the Jim McMahon Foundation, Jim McMahon Golf Tournament (to benefit Ronald McDonald House), Children's Miracle Network, Juvenile Diabetes Fund, American Cancer Society, Society for the Prevention of Blindness and Think First Foundation for Children.

He will forever be known as the player who threw the Hail Mary pass to Clay Brown in the 1980 Holiday Bowl to come from 20 points behind with four minutes remaining and upset SMU, 46-45 — resulting in BYU's first bowl victory. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU.



college football hall of fame

Steve Young

Quarterback: 1982-83

Inducted: 2001

The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Chairman Jon F. Hanson and Honors Chairman Gene Gorrigan today announced the names of the 2001 Division IA College Football Hall of Fame inductees. Among the 15 former collegiate players and three head coaches was BYU All-American and NFL MVP Steve Young.

One of the greatest collegiate quarterbacks of all time, Steve Young was consistently at the top of all the nation's statistical categories for quarterbacks en route to setting 13 NCAA records. As a junior, he averaged 318.8 yards per game of total offense, earning All-Western Athletic Conference recognition and Conference Player-of-the-Year honors.

In his senior season, he repeated as a first-team All-WAC selection, completed 306-of-429 pass attempts for an impressive .713 percentage and led BYU to their second straight Holiday Bowl. His .713 completion percentage, along with 3,802 yards passing, 4,246 yards of total offense and 33 touchdowns all led the nation. Few rival Young's career totals. He completed 592-of-907 attempts for a .652 average, threw for 7,733 yards and 56 touchdowns and his 8,817 yards of total offense in only 31 games is among college football's all-time greatest career numbers.

A unanimous All-American and academic All-WAC selection, Young was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and received a National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award in recognition for his excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community -- a tradition he maintains today with the successful Forever Young Foundation.

Young recently retired after 15 seasons in the NFL, where he earned two MVP awards, seven trips to the Pro Bowl and led the San Francisco 49'ers to the Super Bowl Championship in 1995, earning most-valuable-player honors. Young is the fourth BYU quarterback to be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Gifford Nielsen was inducted in 1994, Marc Wilson was selected in 1996 and Jim McMahon was honored by the Hall in 1998.



Marc Wilson

Quarterback: 1976-79

Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-American honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 12 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named Sports Illustrated's Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman balloting, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP.

A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Wash., with their four children.



Gifford Nielsen

Quarterback: 1975-77

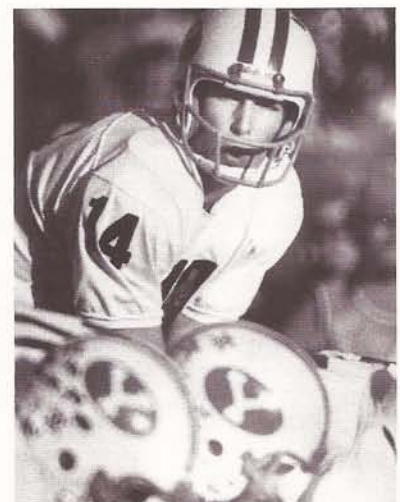
Inducted: 1994

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

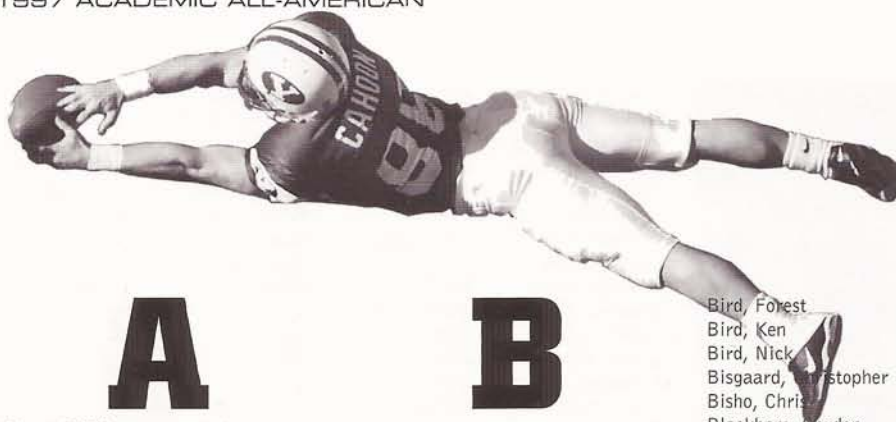
"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over the three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage.

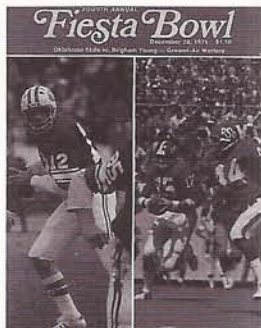
OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard half-

back pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards.

After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

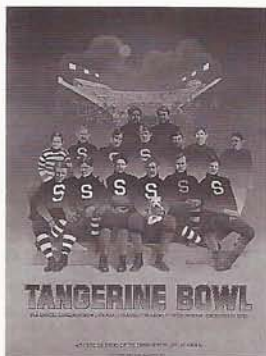

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry

returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys.



BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown,

but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402.

BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula.

Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

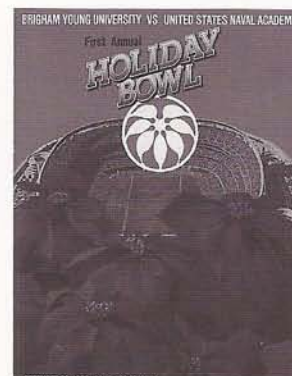

Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson

missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead.

Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard



pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation.

Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half.

BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson.

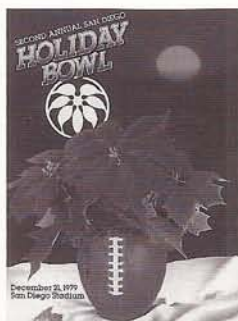
But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37.

With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense.

Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of three quarters and another of four minutes duration.

SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

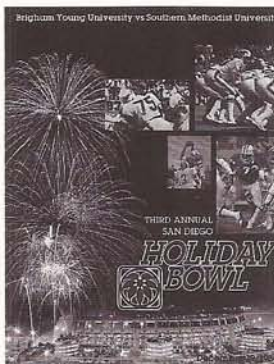
With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown.

With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33.

Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield.

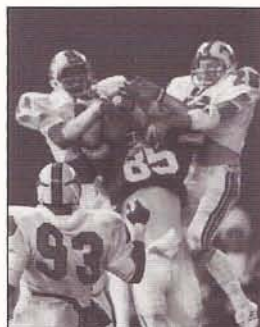

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419.

BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge.

As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126

yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground.

Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rush-

ing while Don LaBomme had 79.

Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17.

BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points. Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7.

Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime.

Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good.

BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomczak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground.

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17.

The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young.

The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play.

The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go.



Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.

David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

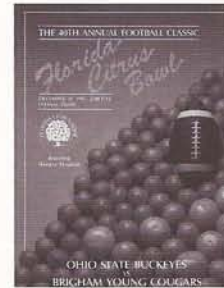

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema



fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge. Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

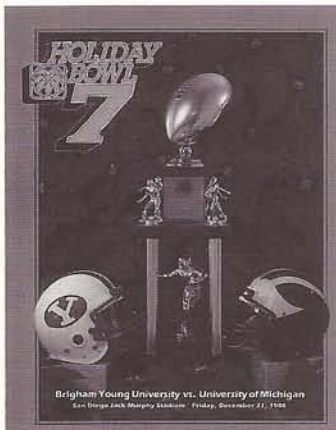
In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead.

Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats—one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left.

Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor. Matt Bellini had 89 yards receiving while Lakei Heimuli added 10 receptions for 77 yards.

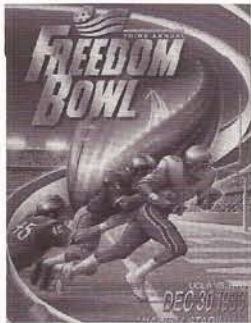
Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was all defense as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal.

UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage.

Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

The 11th annual All-American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up.

The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

But that was as close as the Cougars would get. Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

A star was born in the fifth annual Freedom Bowl when Ty Detmer came off the bench to earn MVP honors while leading the Cougars to an upset victory over Colorado.

Cool weather didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns. But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second half. Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a



BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team.



BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points.

Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play.

Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown.

Bellini had 10 catches for 124 yards while Boyce had 127 yards in receptions and Nyberg 117.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player.



BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

Quarterback Matt Rodgers led Iowa on a 74-yard scoring march on the game's opening drive. The Hawkeyes also scored on another long drive in the second quarter.

Down 13-0, BYU finally got things rolling. Starting on the BYU 22, Detmer connected on five of six passes to move the Cougars to the Iowa nine. From there, he found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6.

BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer-to-Tyler Anderson touchdown from 29 yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13.

Each team threatened to score late in the fourth quarter. Iowa missed a 40-yard field goal with 4:19 left.

On the game's final drive the Cougars moved inside the Iowa 20 with 33 seconds left to play, but Detmer's pass to tight end Byron Rex was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the end zone to preserve the tie.

Josh Arnold of BYU earned defensive MVP honors as BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the AP and CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa was 10th in both polls.

BYU got to the Ohio State six, 14, 22-yard lines in the second half without scoring. Meanwhile, Raymont Harris, OSU's senior halfback, battered the BYU defense all night long, scoring three touchdowns on his way to a record 235 yards rushing.

Despite Harris' rushing, the Cougars managed to go to the halftime break tied at 21. Jamal Willis and Bryce Doman each collected 27-yard Walsh offerings and walk-on tight end Chad Lewis made a spectacular one-handed touchdown grab in the corner of the end zone to bail the Cougars out of a fourth-and-eight situation.

After Harris' short touchdown run late in the third, BYU and OSU traded possessions until late into the fourth quarter. After forcing a rare Buckeye punt, BYU got the ball back on its own 42 with 43 seconds left.

On first down, Walsh hooked up with senior co-captain Eric Drage who ran away from Buckeye defenders and advanced the ball 52 yards to the OSU six-yard-line.

Walsh had 389 yards and fullback Kalin Hall rushed for 42 yards on 11 carries. Tyler Anderson returned five kicks for 145 yards, including an exciting 45-yarder. Harris and Walsh shared MVP honors.

Quarterback John Walsh and the offense clicked on all cylinders and the Cougars' defense was dominating throughout the ESPN telecast.

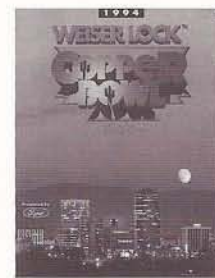
Walsh threw a seven-yard TD pass to Bryce Doman in the first quarter and had a 25-yard pass to Mike Johnston in the second quarter.

Tulane would score 20 unanswered points in the first half. With just 41 seconds remaining in the half, BYU looked to put an end to the Green Wave momentum, but came up short as Feterik was sacked by Phil Henderson for a 10-yard loss to end the half.

Things didn't get much better for the Cougars in the second half, as Tulane scored its third touchdown of the game on the opening drive of the half. On its next possession, the Green Wave would strike again on a 13-yard pass from King to Jamaican Dartzet to give Tulane a 34-6 lead with just over seven minutes remaining in the third quarter.

On its first drive of the final period, BYU scored for the first time since the 8:49 mark in the first half on an Aaron Cupp three-yard run.

Tulane answered with a six-play drive that covered 76 yards, giving the Green Wave a 41-13 lead with just over nine minutes remaining in the game.

Trailing by 28 midway through the fourth quarter, BYU finally crossed the Tulane 20-yard line for the first time since the first half and went on to score 14 unanswered points before time expired. Feterik completed an 18-yard pass to Cupp, while Junior Mahe capped off the BYU scoring with a three-yard plunge into the endzone.

"We tried real hard to get up for this game," BYU linebacker Rob Morris said. "It's a difficult thing...We came out, we lost the momentum, we lost confidence and we lost the game."

Quarterback Kevin Feterik was then face-masked to keep the drive alive, but the Cougars were unable to find the endzone.

In the second quarter, Marshall drove the ball down to the BYU five-yard line, but failed to convert as a 22-yard field goal attempt by Billy Malashevich missed wide to the right. On the Herd's next possession, Chad Pennington put Marshall on the board with a 30-yard touchdown pass to Doug Chapman.

On BYU's ensuing drive, Feterik connected with Margin Hooks for a 67-yard pass play that took the Cougars all the way to the nine-yard line. However, the Cougars couldn't capitalize inside the red zone and Feterik suffered a collarbone injury off a blind-side corner blitz. Pochman, who had connected on 18 of 25 attempts in the regular season, missed wide left on his field goal attempt.

Feterik attempted to play in the second half, but left the game midway in the third quarter. Freshman Bret Engemann took the QB controls and connected with Tevita Ofahengaue for a first down before BYU was forced to punt. Jesse Sowards got off a 60-plus-yard punt, which upped his average to 48.3 on the afternoon.

Just before the end of the third quarter, Marshall struck a big play when Chapman rushed 87 yards for a touchdown.

Marshall was given an opportunity to score in the fourth quarter as Rogers Beckett picked off an Engemann pass and ran it back to the BYU one-yard line. Chapman, to cap off his MVP performance, scored Marshall's final touchdown.

The Cougars missed a final chance to score when Brian Gray had a clear path to the end zone, but dropped a sure interception.

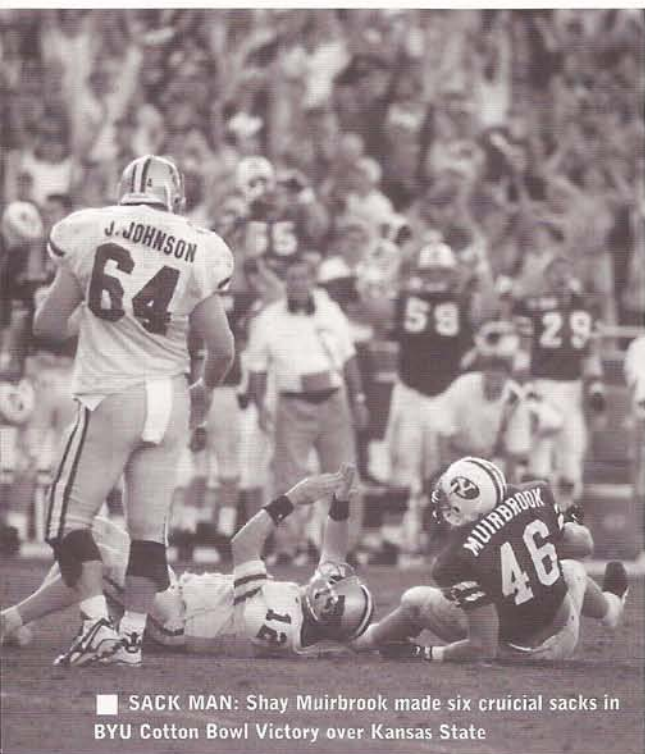

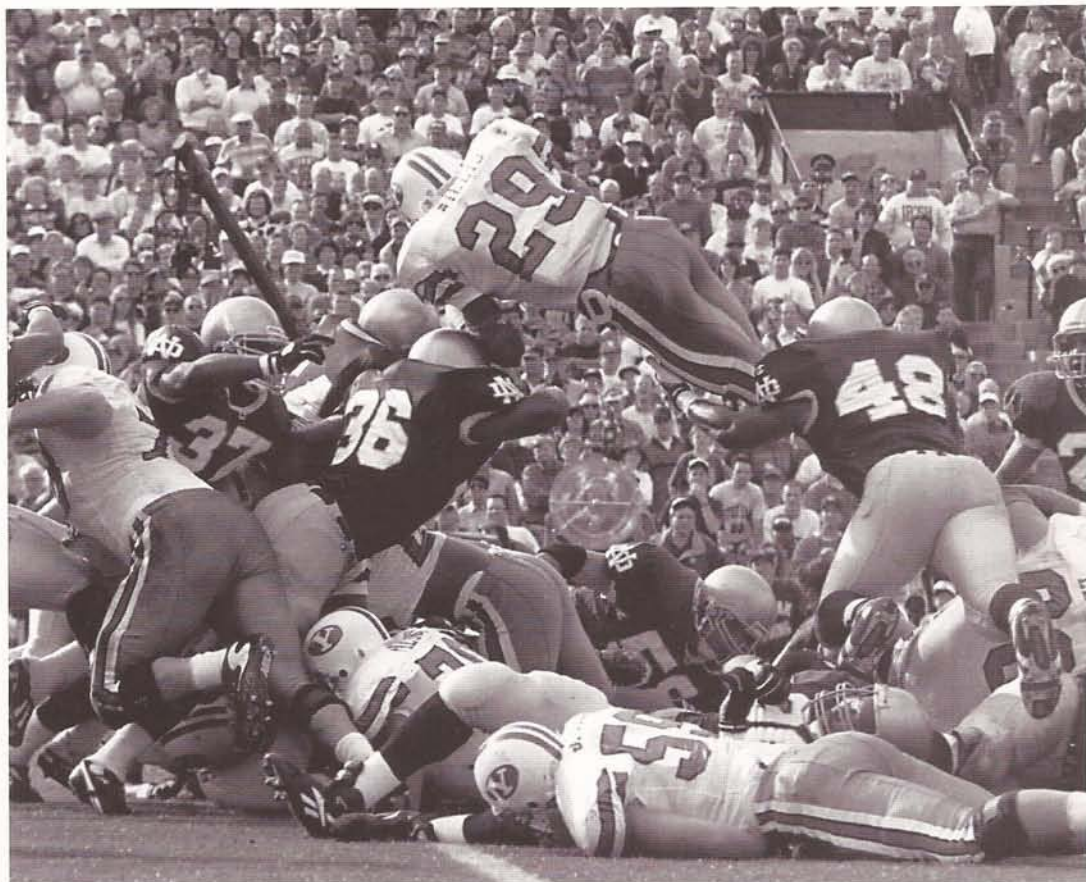

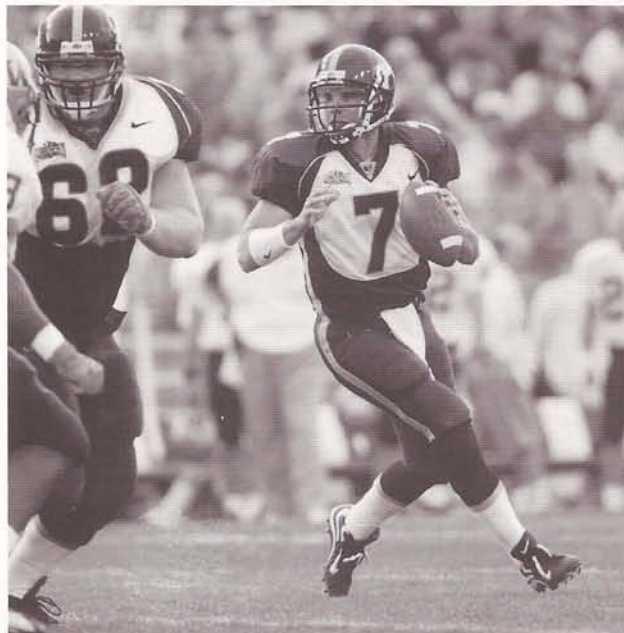

going out with a bang....



After roaming the BYU sidelines for 29 years, LaVell Edwards announced his retirement on August 17, 2000.

Playing defending national champion and second-ranked Florida State in the Pigskin Classic, BYU lost to the Seminoles 29-3. The Cougars scored on an Owen Pochman 42-yard field goal towards the end of the third quarter to keep its record for consecutive games without being shutout alive. Justin Ena had 7.5 tackles, including three for a loss and one sack, and was named the Mountain West Conference Defensive Player of the Week.

In one of the most exciting games of the year, BYU overcame a 21-point deficit to defeat Virginia in an overtime thriller, 38-35. The Cougars began the third quarter with a seven play, 80-yard drive, capped by Brian McDonald's six-yard run. After just three plays, BYU manufactured another

scoring drive to cut the Cavalier lead to 21-14. McDonald punched the ball in from the one-yard line for his second touchdown of the game. After an interception, Virginia went 40 yards on five plays to push the lead back to 14 points. McDonald scored his third touchdown of the day, a six-yard scamper to close the margin to 28-21. The drive was highlighted by a 70-yard pass from quarterback Bret Engemann to receiver Jonathan Pittman. The Cavaliers seemed to take the wind out of the Cougars sail as running back Antwoine Womack scored on a 67-yard touchdown, again giving Virginia a two-touchdown lead. BYU scored on a six-yard pass from Engemann to tight end Doug Jolley to cut the lead to 35-28. With 4:48 remaining in the game, the Cougars drove 49 yards on eight plays and tied the game with 50 seconds to play on another six-yard pass from Engemann to Margin Hooks. David Greene missed a 48-yard field goal as time expired. In overtime, an interception by Tyson Smith returned possession to BYU. Pochman nailed a 26-yard field goal to give the Cougars a dramatic 38-35 overtime victory. Engemann passed for 447 yards and two touchdowns while being named the Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week. McDonald rushed for 86 yards and three scores while Pittman caught six passes for 161 yards to lead BYU.

After the dramatic victory over Virginia, BYU came out strong against Air Force in its first Mountain West Conference game, scoring 20 points in the first half but the offense went silent in the second half as the Cougars lost 31-23. Pochman went 3-for-3 on field goals, including two of 40 yards or better. After 274 yards of total offense in the first half, BYU managed just 86 yards in the second half. Losing only its second game to Air Force in Colorado Springs.

Three defensive touchdowns by Mississippi State spoiled the BYU home opener as the Bulldogs recorded a 44-28 victory. A 39-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Charlie Peterson to Pittman brought the Cougars to within a touchdown but that is as close as they would get. Three second-quarter touchdowns by Mississippi State put the game out of reach. Pittman scored again in the fourth quarter on a 19-yard touchdown reception but it was too late. Peterson passed for 268 yards and two touchdowns in his first-ever start.

A 25-yard touchdown run by McDonald and a 42-yard field goal by Pochman in the first quarter gave BYU an early 10-0 lead against UNLV. The Rebels made things interesting when they scored a touchdown at the beginning of the fourth quarter and threatened again later in the game, but the Cougar defense held tough, winning 10-7. Luke Staley rushed 28 times for 167 yards to lead BYU and was named Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Week.

After the tough UNLV victory, BYU again traveled across the country only to be beat 42-14 by Syracuse. The Orangemen set the tone early, scoring 21 points in both the first and second quarters. The Cougars trailed 28-0 by the time they got on the board with a 28-yard touchdown pass from Peterson to Pittman. Peterson and Pittman combined for the second and final score of the game on a 27-yard pass. Peterson threw 18 completions for 206 yards

and two touchdowns while Engemann sustained a season-ending shoulder injury in the first quarter.

After trailing early in the previous game, BYU took matters into its own hands, scoring 24 first-half points, including 21 in the second quarter, en route to a decisive 38-14 win over in-state rival Utah State. Pochman got the Cougars on the board first with a 28-yard field goal in the first quarter. Staley punched the ball in from three yards out to cap a 12 play, 86-yard drive that put BYU up 10-0. The Aggies made it interesting early, responding with a drive of their own to cut the deficit to 10-7. However, that is as close as Utah State would get. Staley scored again on a nine-yard run and Mike Rigell caught a 21-yard touchdown pass from Peterson for a 24-7 halftime lead. The Cougars increased their lead to 31-7 when Staley scored his third touchdown of the game. McDonald capped the scoring in the fourth quarter with a seven-yard touchdown run. Peterson passed for 324 yards and one touchdown. Staley rushed 16 times for 75 yards and three touchdowns while freshman Marcus Whalen ran for 91 yards on 10 carries. Pittman caught seven passes for 105 yards.

After the dominating performance against Utah State, the BYU offense struggled as San Diego State hit a last-second field goal for the 16-15 win—the Aztecs' second victory ever in Provo and the first since 1992. Pochman kicked a 24- and 28-yard field goal to put the Cougars up 6-0. San Diego State took a 7-6 lead on a Larry Ned 19-yard touchdown run. Peterson threw a two-yard touchdown pass to Margin Hooks at the end of the half to send BYU to the locker room with a 12-7 lead. The Aztecs scored the only points of the third quarter—a two-yard touchdown run by Ned. With 46 seconds to play in the game, Pochman hit a 50-yard field goal, his third field goal of the game and longest of his career to put the Cougars up 15-13. San Diego State proceeded to march 62 yards on six plays with Nate Tandberg hitting the game-winning 36-yard field goal with one second remaining. Peterson completed 34 passes for 376 yards and one touchdown. Hooks caught nine passes for 124 yards and one touchdown.

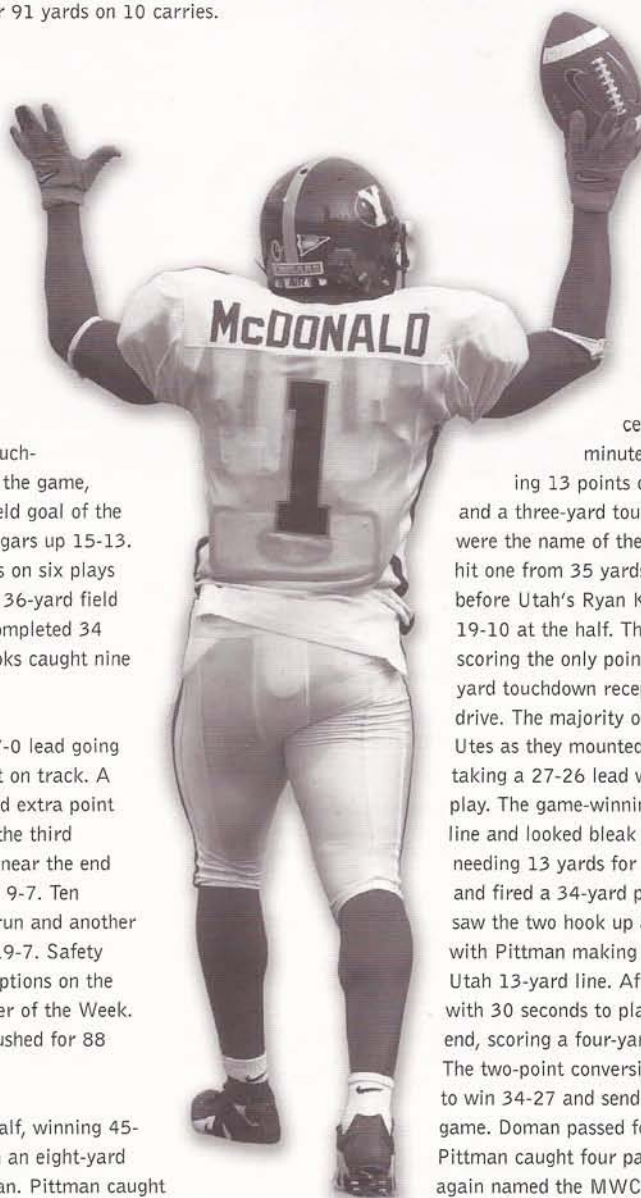
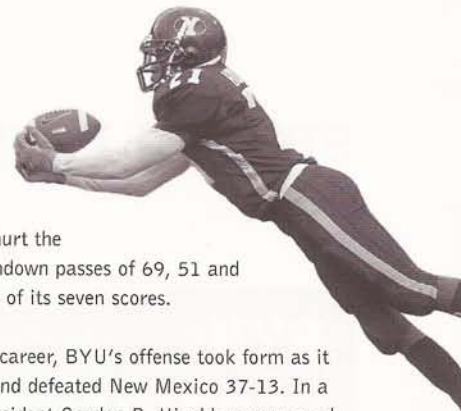
A 12-yard touchdown pass gave Wyoming a 7-0 lead going into halftime, as the BYU offense couldn't get on track. A five-yard Peterson touchdown run with a failed extra point attempt cut the Cowboy lead, to 7-6 early in the third quarter. Pochman nailed a 48-yard field goal near the end of the third quarter to put the Cougars on top 9-7. Ten fourth-quarter points on a Whalen four-yard run and another Pochman field goal sealed the win for BYU, 19-7. Safety Tyson Smith had a MWC record three interceptions on the day and was named the MWC Defensive Player of the Week. Peterson passed for 225 yards while Staley rushed for 88 yards and caught three passes for 78 yards.

Colorado State scored 38 points in the first half, winning 45-21. The Rams led 45-0 before BYU scored on an eight-yard touchdown run by quarterback Brandon Doman. Pittman caught a three-yard touchdown pass from Doman and Staley scored on a four-yard

run in the fourth quarter. Big plays hurt the Cougars as Colorado State had touchdown passes of 69, 51 and 13 yards, and a 39-yard run for four of its seven scores.

In the final home game of Edwards' career, BYU's offense took form as it amassed 512 yards of total offense and defeated New Mexico 37-13. In a pre-game ceremony, LDS Church President Gordon B. Hinckley announced that the name of the stadium would subsequently be known as LaVell Edwards Stadium Home of the BYU Cougars. Staley started the scoring with a two-yard touchdown run to put the Cougars up 7-0 after the first quarter. In the second quarter, a one-yard score by McDonald and a BYU-record 56-yard field goal by Pochman as time expired put the Cougars up 17-10 at the half. BYU scored three times in the third quarter on a two-yard Staley run, an eight-yard Doman scamper, and a 32-yard Pochman field goal to increase the lead to 34-13. A 33-yard field goal by Pochman in the fourth made the score 37-13 and sent Edwards out a winner in his final home game. Pochman was honored as MWC Special Teams Player of the Week.

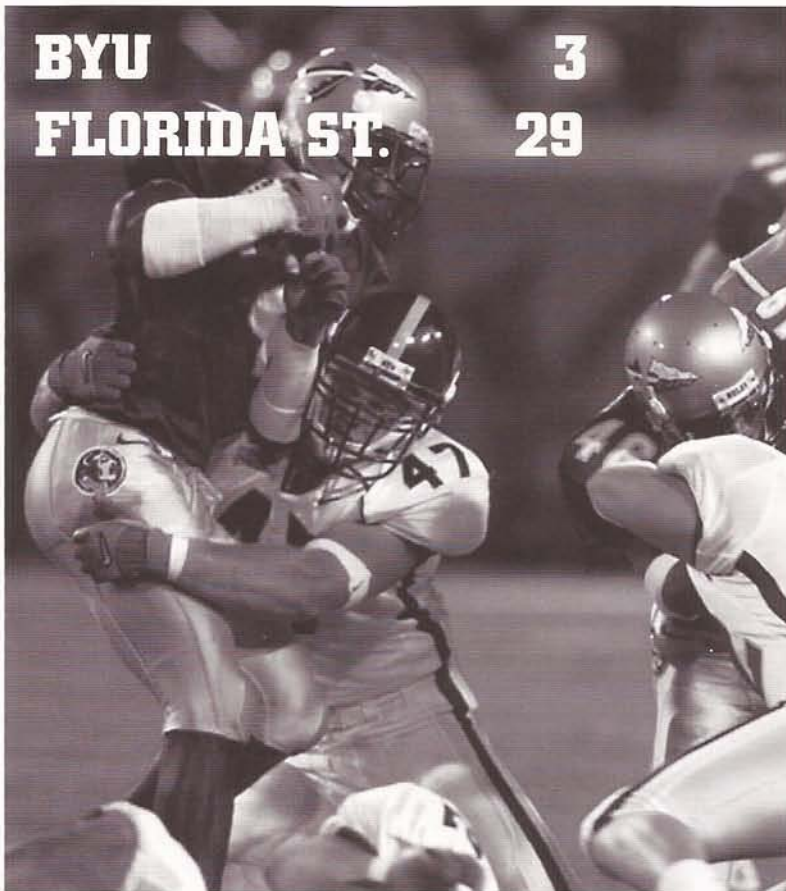
BYU needed a win in the final game of the season against rival Utah to prevent sending Edwards out with a losing record for only the second time in his 29 years of coaching. The game was dramatic and emotional, but BYU won 34-27 to even its record at 6-6. Things didn't start out well for the Cougars as Andre Dyson returned an interception for a touchdown less than a minute into the game. BYU responded, scoring 13 points on two Pochman field goals (45, 38) and a three-yard touchdown run by McDonald. Field goals were the name of the game in the second quarter. Pochman hit one from 35 yards out and another from 22 yards before Utah's Ryan Kaneshiro nailed a 40-yarder. BYU led 19-10 at the half. The Cougars increased their lead by scoring the only points of the third quarter on a Rigell 36-yard touchdown reception from Doman, capping a 77-yard drive. The majority of the fourth quarter belonged to the Utes as they mounted a comeback, scoring 17 points and taking a 27-26 lead with just 2 minutes and 16 seconds to play. The game-winning drive started at the BYU 20-yard line and looked bleak as the offense faced fourth down, needing 13 yards for the first down. Doman dropped back and fired a 34-yard pass to Pittman. The very next play saw the two hook up again as Doman fired a 36-yard pass with Pittman making a spectacular sideline catch at the Utah 13-yard line. After a Staley rush and a BYU timeout with 30 seconds to play, Doman scampered around the right end, scoring a four-yard touchdown with 23 seconds to play. The two-point conversion was good as the Cougars went on to win 34-27 and send Edwards out a winner in his final game. Doman passed for 284 yards and one touchdown while Pittman caught four passes for 117 yards. Pochman was again named the MWC Special Teams Player of the Week.

GAME #1 BYU VS. FSU

Florida State came into the 11th annual Pigskin Classic, the first game of the 2000 college football season, looking to begin the defense of their 1999 National Championship. BYU came in looking to upset the 'Noles and give their legendary coach LaVell Edwards a farewell season to remember.

Led by 2000 Heisman Trophy winner Chris Weinke, Florida State's high-powered offense struck early and often in the first half, bringing a 22-0 lead into the locker room.

With a struggling offense, the Cougars defense tightened in the second half, forcing FSU to open the half with five consecutive punts. The Cougar defense only allowed 59 yards on the ground the entire game and sacked Weinke four times.

But, the second-half defensive effort was not enough. Looking to bring the score within two scores, BYU's offense drove 67 yards to the Florida State 30 yard-line. But any momentum the Cougars may have had was lost when FSU's Derrick Gibson forced a BYU fumble to stop the drive.

The Cougars' only points in the game came on a 42-yard field goal by Owen Pochman in the third quarter. BYU held the Seminoles to one second half TD, making the final score 29-3.

GAME #2 BYU AT VIRGINIA

In one of the greatest comebacks in recent Cougar history, BYU started off against Virginia the same way they had left off with Florida State -- struggling on offense. But what the offense couldn't produce in the first half, they made up for in the second half, coming from a 21-0 halftime deficit to defeat the Cavaliers, 38-35.

Virginia started the game by scoring on three of their first four possessions. Meanwhile, on the other side of the ball the Cougar offense could not get going. BYU's first-half offense included two punts, an interception and a fumble.

In the second half, Cougar QB Brett Engemann led a BYU offense that produced 38 points, scoring five TD's on six possessions, including a 70-yard bomb to Jonathan Pittman and three rushing TD's by Brian McDonald.

Having climbed to within two touchdowns, the Cougars started off the final quarter with another TD, but once again Virginia tried to thwart the comeback, scoring again and making the score 35-21 with only 12 minutes remaining in the game.

But, BYU's offense came through by scoring two unanswered TD's in the final minutes, one with only 50 seconds remaining, to tie the score at 35.

In sudden death overtime, the Cougar defense came up with the biggest stop of the night when Tyson Smith intercepted a Virginia pass, stopping the Cavaliers from scoring. With an experienced kicker, the Cougars played it safe, driving to a first down at the Virginia nine yard-line before allowing Owen Pochman to nail the game's only field goal to win the game.

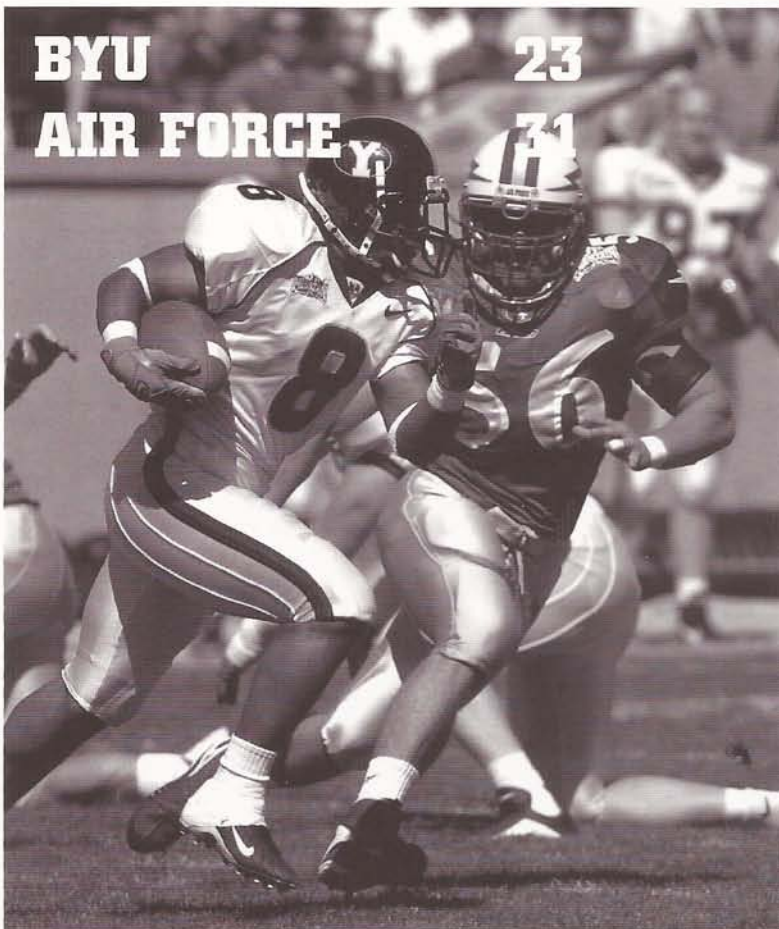

GAME #3 BYU AT AIR FORCE

In the first conference game of the 200 season, the Cougars faced the famed rush attack of the Air Force Falcons. But, this time it was the passing game, led by Mike Thiessen's four TD passes, that lifted the Falcons to a 31-23 victory.

In front of a Falcon Stadium record 45,277 fans, BYU scored first with a 27-yard Pochman field goal. Air Force countered with Thiessen's first TD, a 13-yarder to Qualario Brown. The Cougars and Falcons then traded scores, eventually putting Air Force up 21-20 at the half.

Despite three field goals by Pochman, including two from over 40 yards, BYU could not stop the Thiessen to Ryan Fleming connection, which produced 145 yards of passing offense and two TD's.

BYU's Engemann passed for 235 yards on the afternoon, including a 55-yarder to tight end Doug Jolley, and McDonald rushed for 89 yards on 10 carries, but the second half saw the Cougars punt on four consecutive possessions. Engemann and the Cougars' comeback was stopped short with two drive-ending turnovers to end the game.

The BYU offense only scored once in the second half and Thiessen connected with Brown again to give the Falcons the 31-23 victory.

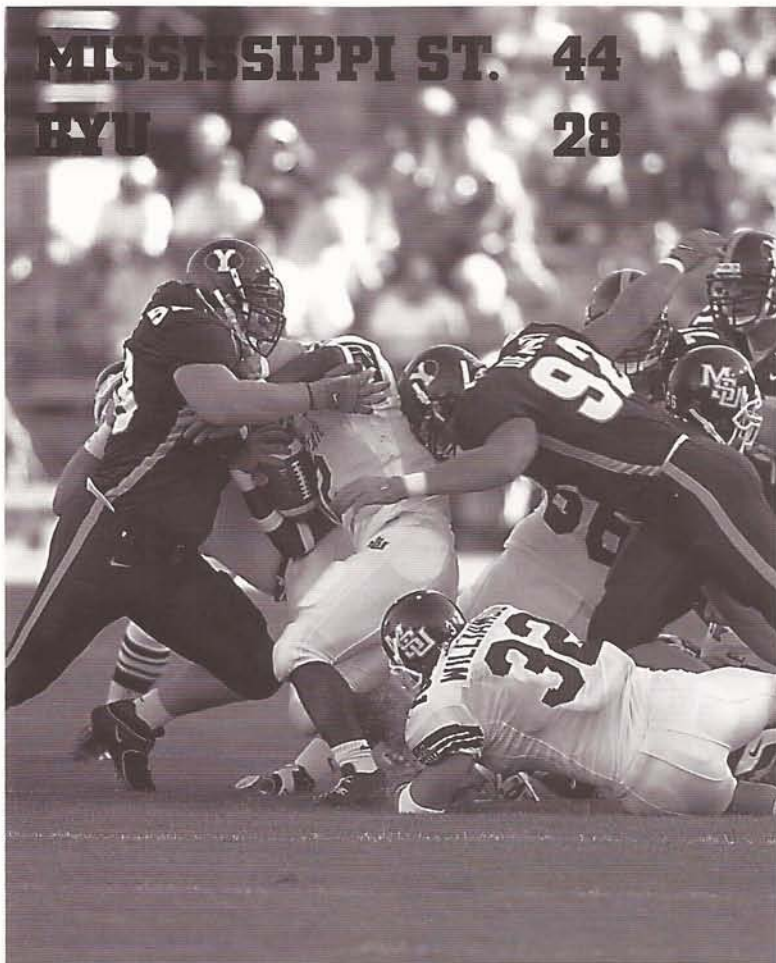

On a Thursday-night ESPN game, BYU could not overcome an explosive Mississippi State defense that scored three TD's to lead the Bulldogs to a 44-28 defeat of the Cougars.

In BYU's home opener, Mississippi State scored first on a 14-yard TD run by Dizenzo Miller, putting MSU up 7-0. After a field goal, BYU countered with a 39-yard TD pass from Charlie Peterson to Jonathan Pittman, bringing the Cougars within three at 10-7.

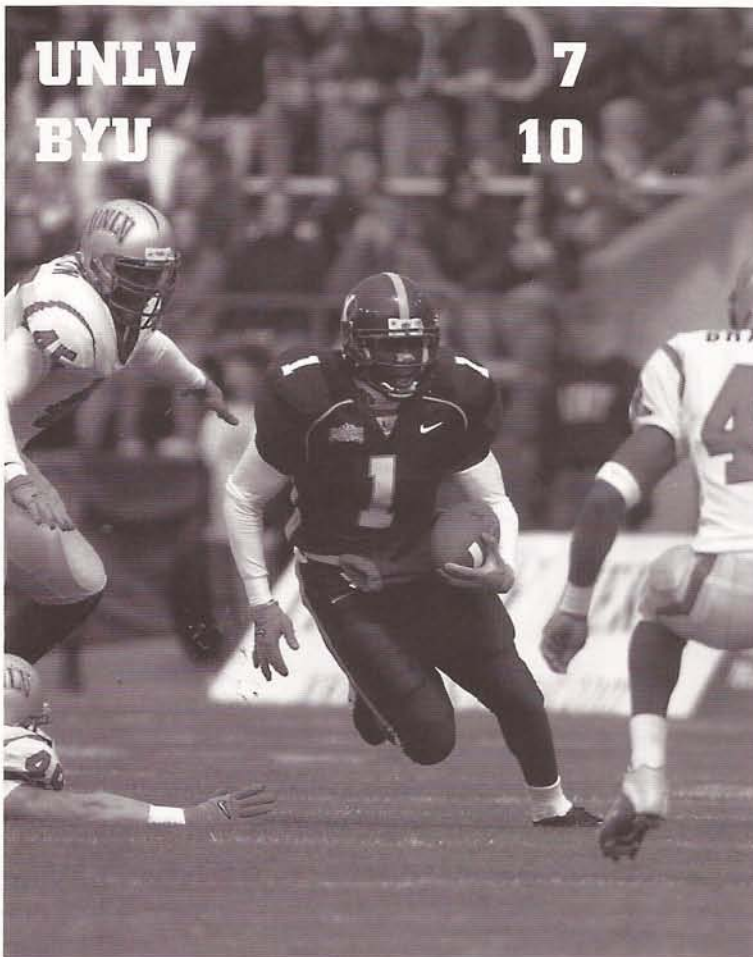

GAME #5 BYU VS. UNLV

On a drizzly day in September, BYU scored all ten of their points in the first quarter in a defensive battle that included 15 punts and 10 sacks. Ten points proved to be enough as the Cougar defense stifled UNLV's offense for three and a half quarters before allowing one fourth-quarter touchdown to give BYU a 10-7 win.

In rare form, the Cougar offense garnered more yards rushing than passing. Luke Staley was the biggest reason why, with 186 all-purpose yards including 167 on the ground. Engemann and Peterson shared time at quarterback, combining for 157 yards and one interception.

Led by Jared Lee's six tackles and Ryan Denney's three tackles for loss, the Cougar defense forced four fumbles and one interception. Each time UNLV threatened to score, the Cougar defense tightened. After an interception that gave the ball to UNLV at BYU's own 38 yard-line on the third play of the game, BYU's Isaac Kelley forced a James Wofford fumble just two plays later.

Then, in the second quarter, when UNLV drove to BYU's 12 yard-line on a Jason Thomas 72-yard run the Cougar defense forced the Rebels to settle for a field goal. But, the 29-yard Ray Cheetany attempt was blocked by Cougar defender Paul Walkenhorst to keep UNLV off the scoreboard and go on to defeat the 2000 Las Vegas Bowl Champion Rebels.

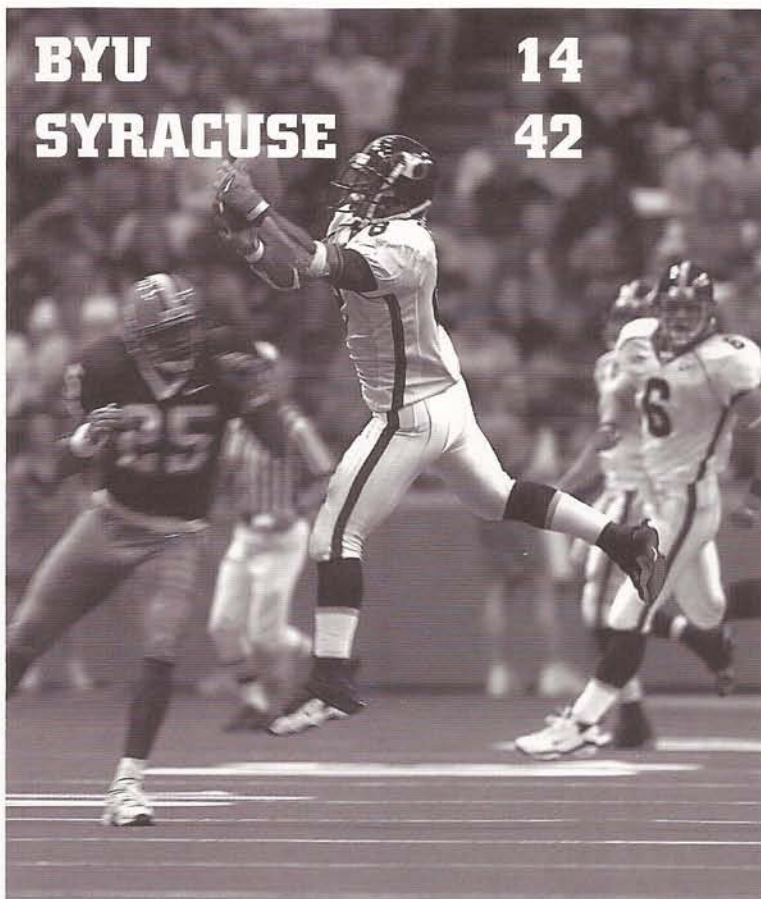

GAME #6 BYU AT SYRACUSE

The Syracuse Orangemen scored 21 points in both the first and second quarter to take a 42-7 halftime lead, cruising to a 42-14 win over travel-weary BYU. In their fourth road game in five weeks, and their third trip of over 3,000 miles, BYU was misfiring on offense and defense as the Orangemen delivered a drubbing to the Cougars and quarterback Brett Engemann sustained a season-ending injury.

On the Cougar's first offensive series, BYU lost 21 yards on three plays. Starting their first possession on BYU's 43 yard-line, Syracuse scored on 10 plays, making it 7-0. Things soon turned sour for BYU. After a second Cougar punt, Syracuse only needed one play to get their next touchdown -- a 61-yard scamper by James Mungro.

On the very next play, a Brian McDonald fumble was recovered and brought in for the score on the very next play to give Syracuse a quick 21-0 first quarter lead. Less than three minutes into the second quarter, Syracuse struck again. This time a 79-yard TD pass from Troy Nunes to Pat Woodcock put the Orangemen up 28-0.

After giving up the big lead, the Cougar offense finally showed signs of life with a 7-play, 80-yard drive, capped by a 28-yard TD pass from Charlie Peterson to Jonathan Pittman. But BYU could not recover, scoring only once more -- a third quarter 27-yard TD pass to Pittman.

GAME #7 BYU VS. UTAH STATE

The annual Friday night meeting between the Cougars and the Aggies had a lot to live up to after BYU's overtime victory the previous year.

After just one field goal in the first quarter, BYU scored 21 second-quarter points to bring a 24-7 lead into halftime in front of 63,318 fans. Luke Staley rushed for two of the TD's while Peterson hit Mike Rigell on a 21-yard pass for the third score.

The Cougars opened the second half with a touchdown on another Staley run, putting BYU up 31-7. The Aggies added a third quarter TD before Brian McDonald scored the game's final touchdown, making it 38-14.

The Cougar defense dominated Utah State, holding the Aggies to only 11 yards on the ground and just 215 yards of total offense, compared to BYU's 533 yards of total offense, including Charlie Peterson's first 300-yard game with 335 yards passing and 198 yards rushing.

Besides his three rushing TD's, Staley added 84 yards on 16 carries. Freshman running back Marcus Whalen averaged nearly 10 yards per carry, gaining 91 yards on 10 carries. Jonathan Pittman had 105 yards on 7 catches.

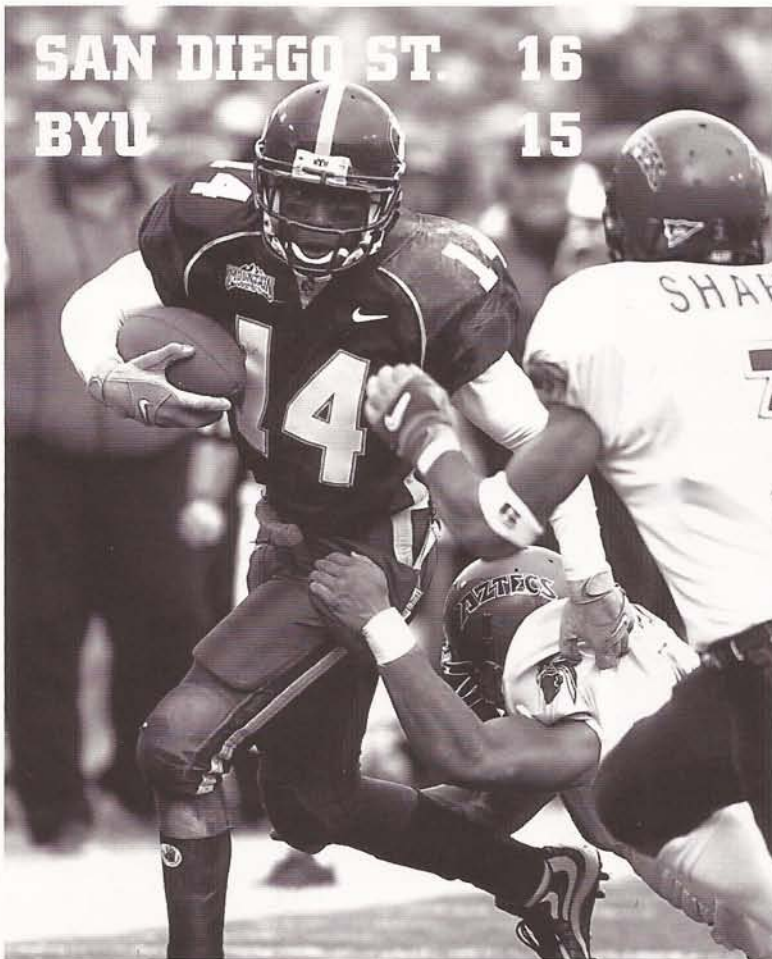

GAME #8 BYU VS. SAN DIEGO STATE

With BYU trailing 13-12 going into the fourth quarter, the usually accurate Owen Pochman missed three long fourth-quarter field goals of 52, 43 and 50 yards before nailing a 50-yarder with 46 seconds left to take a 15-13 lead and what looked like a Cougar win.

But after holding the Aztecs to only one second half score, San Diego State completed three passes, the longest being a 39-yarder that put the Aztecs on the BYU 18-yard line. San Diego State's Nate Tandberg then lined up to kick a 36-yard game-winning field goal with one second remaining to give the Aztecs the 16-15 win and kill the struggling Cougars' hopes of pulling to .500 on the year.

Despite holding the opponent to under 100 yards rushing for the fourth time in eight games, the Cougar defense allowed 239 yards through the air, including the crucial 39-yarder at the end. BYU only sacked the San Diego State QB once in 30 pass attempts.

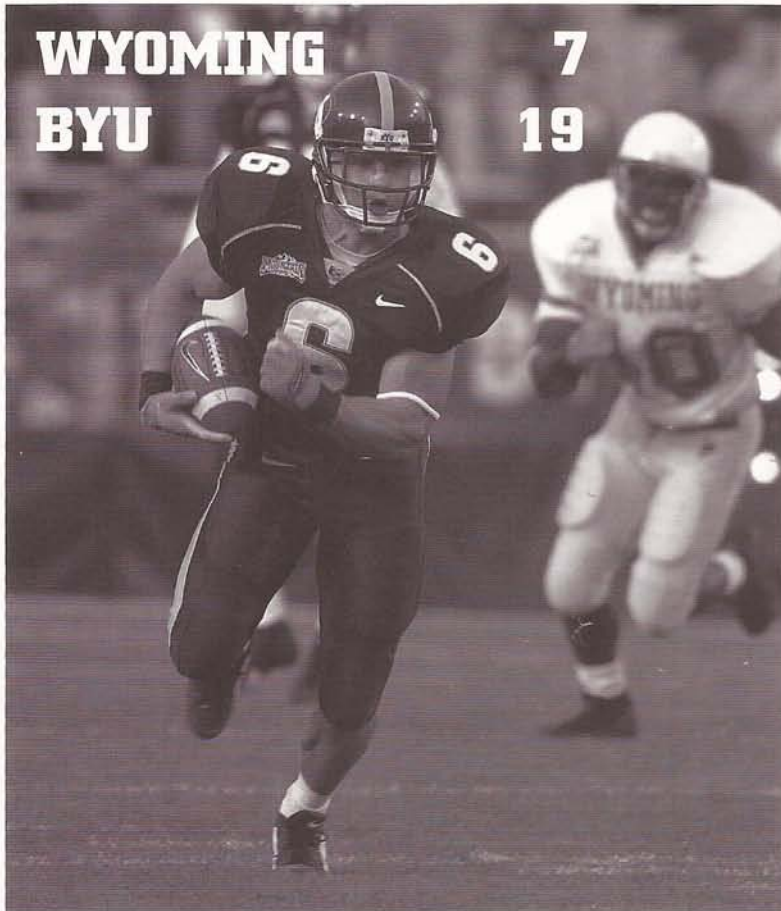

GAME #9 BYU VS. WYOMING

In a game that saw both offenses struggle in the first half, BYU outlasted Wyoming, 19-7, to get a win that tied BYU head coach LaVell Edwards with legendary Nebraska head coach Tom Osborne for the second most wins by a head coach at one school with 255.

The Cougars opened the game by driving 72 yards to the Wyoming six-yard line. However, the Cowboys stopped BYU on a fourth-down run and took over possession of the ball.

The ensuing Wyoming drive was also stopped on the goal line when BYU's Michael Madsen intercepted a Jay Stoner pass at the Cougar 1-yard line. That was as close as either team would come to scoring until Stoner hit Malcom Floyd on a 12-yard touchdown pass that gave Wyoming a 7-0 lead with 49 seconds remaining in the first half.

The second half saw the BYU offense get rolling as Peterson scored on a five-yard rush. Then, after holding Wyoming to four plays on its next drive, the Cougars took over and drove the ball 24 yards, finishing with an Owen Pochman 48-yard field goal that hit the crossbar and bounced over to give the Cougars a 9-7 lead.

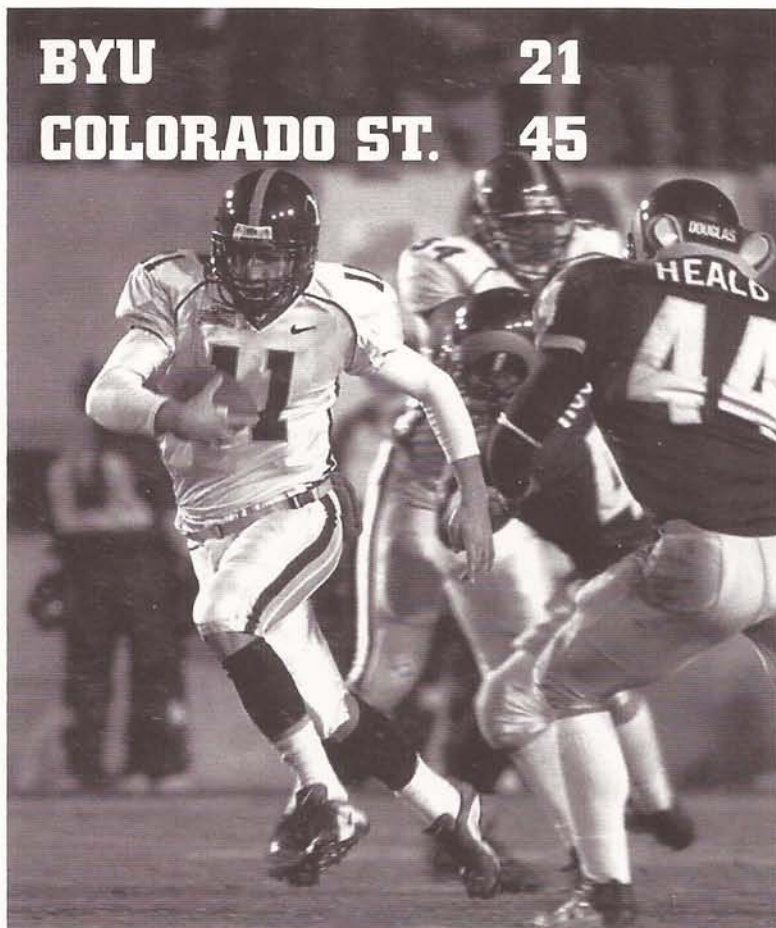

With a dominating performance from No. 21 Colorado State, the Rams went up 45-0 early in the second half on their way to a 45-21 defeat of the Cougars, their first win over BYU in Ft. Collins since 1975.

After forcing BYU to punt on the first possession of the game, the Rams scored on a 69-yard touchdown pass from Matt Newton to Pete Rebstock on their third play from scrimmage to take the 7-0 lead. Leading 38-0 at halftime, the Rams scored one more touchdown with 8:22 left in the third quarter to take a 45-0 lead on a 51-yard touchdown pass from Newton to Will Layne.

The Cougars finally got their offense going after junior defensive end Ryan Denney blocked a Rams punt that gave the Cougars the ball at the Colorado State 8-yard line. Brandon Doman scored on the first play of the drive with an eight-yard touchdown run.

GAME # 11 BYU VS. NEW MEXICO

In the final home game for BYU head coach LaVell Edwards, the Cougars defeated New Mexico, 37-13, in the newly named LaVell Edwards Stadium. The Cougars jumped on the scoreboard first with a 93-yard touchdown drive in the first quarter, capped by a two-yard touchdown run by sophomore Luke Staley to give BYU a 7-0 lead.

The Cougars took a 17-10 lead into halftime after senior Owen Pochman kicked a career-long 56-yard field goal on the last play of the half. The 56-yarder is the longest ever by a BYU kicker and is the second longest ever-kicked in Provo.

BYU scored two more touchdowns and two field goals in the second half, while holding the Lobos to one third-quarter field goal to take the game, 37-13.

Junior quarterback Brandon Doman, in his first career start for the Cougars, finished the night with 349 yards passing and a team-high 51 rushing yards. He also had an 8-yard touchdown run in the third quarter. Doman had four receivers end with more than 50 yards. Senior Margin Hooks led the Cougars with four catches and 69 yards.

The BYU offensive line protected Doman all night, marking the second straight game without a sack. Staley finished with two touchdown runs, while Doman and Brian McDonald each added one. The BYU defense held New Mexico to just 90 yards rushing, including just 42 yards in the first half.

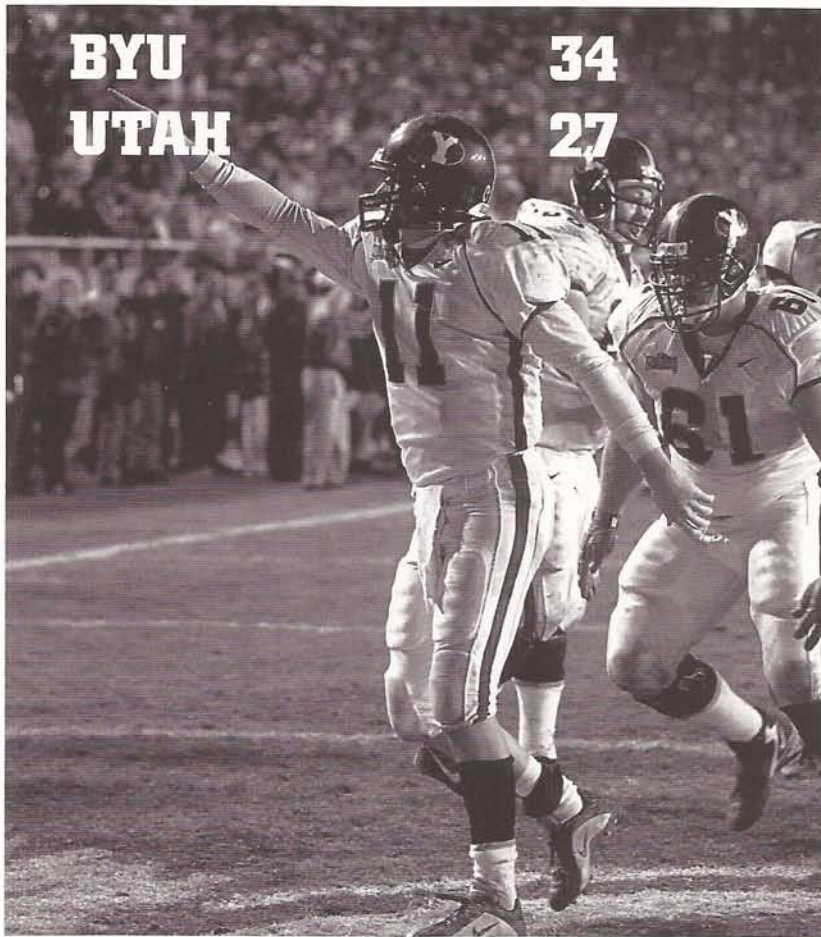

GAME # 12 BYU AT UTAH

In the final game of legendary coach LaVell Edwards' career the Cougars pulled off another come-from-behind miracle, defeating Utah, 34-27, with a last-minute touchdown in Rice-Eccles Stadium on Friday evening.

After Utah came back from 16 points down in the fourth quarter to go ahead 27-26 with just over two minutes left in the game, the BYU offense had one last chance for the come-from-behind victory. After an incomplete pass, a sack and a short gain, the Cougars faced fourth down and 13 from their own 17-yard line. But, in what seemed like a fairy-tale ending fitting for Edwards' final game, the Cougars found a way to defeat rival Utah one last time.

On fourth down, Doman scrambled and hit Jonathan Pittman on a 34-yard bomb for the first down. On the very next play Doman hit Pittman once again down the sideline for a 36-yard gain to bring the Cougars to the Utah 13-yard line. After a nine-yard run by Luke Staley, Doman added a four-yard touchdown rush to put BYU up by five. A pass to Soren Halladay for the two-point conversion extended the lead to seven, forcing Utah to drive the field on their next drive.

The BYU offense got off to a rough start when Cougar quarterback Brandon Doman threw his first pass of the game for an interception, which was returned for a touchdown by Andre Dyson, to put the Utes up 7-0. But Doman came back and led the BYU offense to 13 first-quarter points, the most first-quarter points scored by the Cougar offense this year, to jump out to a 13-7 lead.

BYU extended the lead to 19-10 at the half; due in part to a BYU record four field goals in the first half by Owen Pochman. The Cougars extended the lead to 26-10 in the second half when Doman hit Mike Rigell on a 36-yard touchdown pass with 4:36 left in the third quarter. But, in the fourth quarter, Utah came back by scoring 17 unanswered points to take the lead at 27-26, with 2:11 left to play in the game before the heroics of Doman and Pittman helped BYU to the win.
