2006 COUGAR FOOTBALL FALL PREVIEW

Armed with 23 players who have starting experience, including eight regular starters on offense, the Cougars are determined to build on last season's success. Bronco Mendenhall returns for his second season after guiding the Cougars to a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference and a trip to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl—the Cougars' first bowl appearance since 2001. BYU finished the regular season with a 6-5 record, including a 5-3 mark in league play. It was BYU's first non-losing season since the 2001 campaign.

"We expect to be an improved football team, competing at a higher level," Mendenhall said. "I expect our football team to perform well in critical situations. I like this football team. I like how they are working to achieve the standard of excellence in all they do. I like how they're working. I like their competitive spirit. I like how they're competing every day. I like the atmosphere. This is the best team chemistry I have felt since I began coaching at BYU."

Mendenhall said the team focus and determination during the off-season has created confidence heading into Fall Camp.

"The team has been very workman-like during the off-season, just going about their business with a quiet confidence. I like their confidence."

Under Mendenhall, and first-year offensive coordinator Robert Anae, the Cougars averaged 33.0 points per contest. BYU racked up over 462 yards per game, including 152.3 yards rushing and 310.1 yards passing per game.

"It was significant for our football program to reach the post-season in 2005," he added. Looking to the 2006 season, a lesson can be learned from our experience in 2005.

"We finished second in the Mountain West and lost a hard-fought, tightly contested bowl game. I have a better idea of what the standard is for this program. Our players have a better idea. We're not just satisfied with going to a bowl game. It was a nice step for our program, but we're not satisfied to finish second. That wasn't our goal. There's a different standard. We've seen it, we've felt it, we've touched it and we've seen how close it is."



OFFENSIVE PREVIEW

The Cougars return 13 players with starting experience, including eight regular starters. The list of returning starters includes three first-team All-MWC performers in quarterback John Beck, running back Curtis Brown and tight end Jonny Harline. Describing his expectations for the offense in 2006, Mendenhall said he expects good things to happen.

"The offense is experienced, talented, deep, confident, stable and productive," Mendenhall said. "As a result of these things, we expect positive things to happen offensively.

"I was pleased with our offense last year as we adapted and used personnel throughout the season to move the football and score points. We did an exceptional job in terms of ball security and "Blue Zone" scoring. We played good enough on offense, through the majority of the year, to give us a chance to win football games. With the experience, leadership and depth we have returning, we expect our offense to be explosive, in terms of yardage and points."

the Davey O'Brien Award, the Sammy Baugh Trophy and the Johnny Unitas Award, not to mention a candidate for preseason MWC Offensive Player of the

Year and All-America honors. Beck's play in 2005 made the Cougar offense one of the most dangerous in the nation. He finished the season with 3,709 yards and

27 touchdowns passes while completing 64.5 percent of his attempts. His average of 309.1 passing yards per game ranked him tops in the Mountain West Conference and fifth overall in the nation.

"John returns after a 3,000-yard season," Mendenhall said. "He has three years of starting experience and led our team to a second-place finish and a post-season appearance last year. We expect John will continue his development. With the maturity and strong leadership qualities he has displayed, we expect he will help our football team reach our goals in 2006."

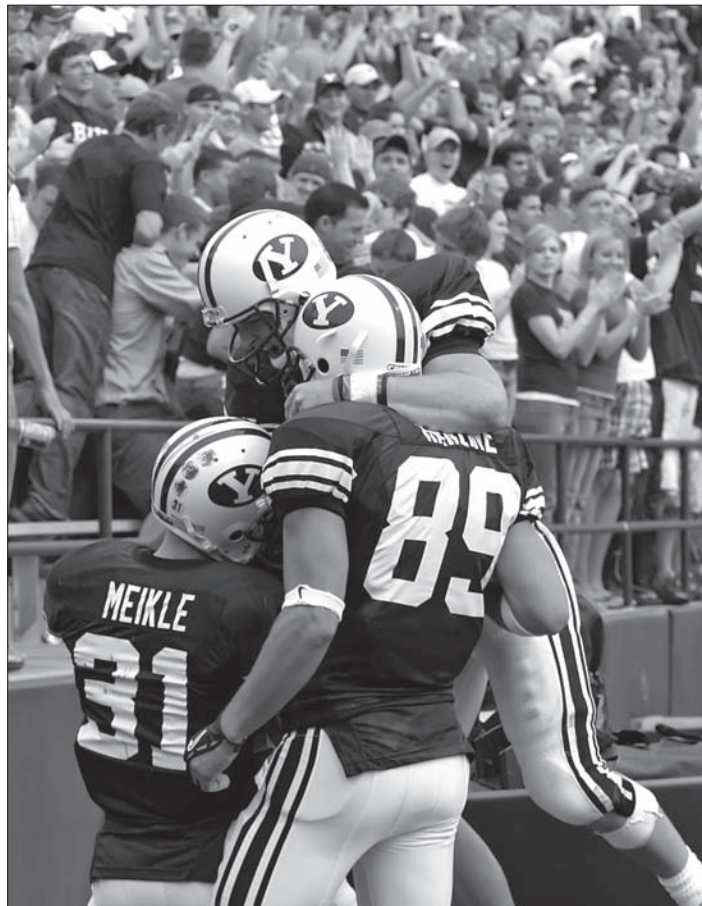
Jason Beck also returns for his senior season at quarterback. Jason Beck did not see action in 2005 but played the majority of the Stanford game in 2004. Joining the Becks in camp the Cougars welcome back Jacob Bower and Sam Doman from missionary service. Pine View High School standout James Lark will also be in camp this fall, along with Arizona State transfer Max Hall.

"Depth and talent will also be a strength for us this season," Mendenhall said.



QUARTERBACK

With senior John Beck returning, the Cougars will have a two-time, all-MWC signal caller running an experience offense. Beck has started 26 games in his career and only Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer started more games before entering his senior season. Like Detmer, Beck is sure to be listed on several preseason "watch lists", including

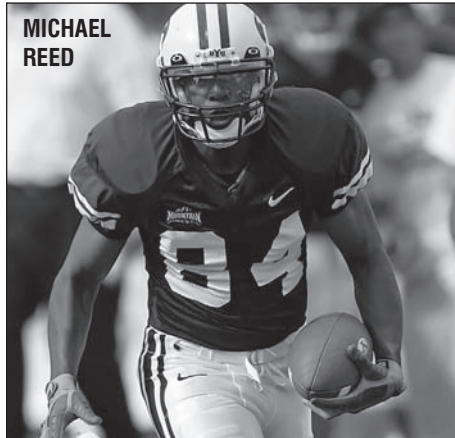


"While we have John Beck returning as the starter, we will have several quarterbacks competing for the next step in the process. With the current recruiting class and returning missionaries that we'll have in our program, we expect to return to the tradition of producing quarterbacks, one right after the other."



RUNNING BACK

Much like the quarterback position, the Cougars have an experienced player in senior Curtis Brown returning to carry the load at running back. Last season, Brown ran for 1,123 yards, fifth most for a BYU back in a single season, and scored 16 touchdowns (14 rushing, two receiving), tied for second most in a single season. Brown was also a threat receiving, finishing the year with 53 receptions, second on the team, for 454 yards.



MICHAEL REED

Joining Brown will be a crop of talented running backs who will be looking to make an impact in 2006. Wayne Latu, Joe Semanoff and Manase Tonga all saw action in 2005, combining for 132 yards on 23 carries. Ray Hudson returns after redshirting the 2005 season. Hudson lettered as a true freshman in 2004.

With Fahu Tahi lost to graduation, the Cougars will look to returned missionary Fui Vakapuna to replace Tahi's quickness and tough, punishing style of play. Vakapuna lettered as a true freshman in 2003, averaging 5.2 yards per carry. He was the team's second leading rusher with 157 yards on 30 carries.

The Cougars will also look to incoming freshmen Mike Hague and Harvey Unga to gain experience and add depth to the running back position.

"The running back position will be one of our key strengths on offense," Mendenhall said. "We'll have depth, experience and talent at running back."

WIDE RECEIVER

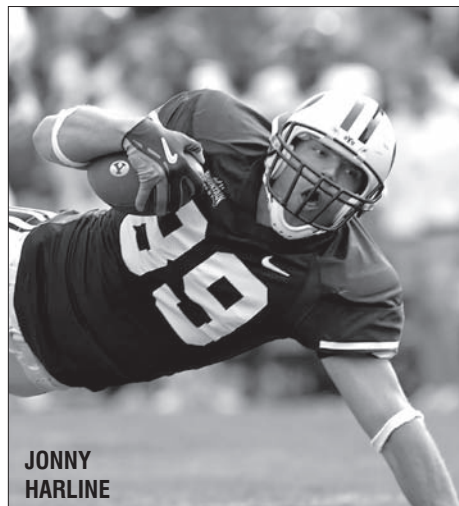
Despite the loss of deep threat Todd Watkins, the Cougars have several experienced players who are well suited to be effective in the spread offense. The leading returning receiver is Nate Meikle, a 2005 second-team Academic All-American, who caught 36 passes for 292 yards. He is joined by teammates Matt Allen (21 receptions, 272 yards, two touchdowns), Michael Reed (18 receptions, 272 yards, one touchdown) and Zac Collie (11 receptions, 158 yards, one touchdown).

All four players showcased their talents at different times during the 2005 season. Meikle was BYU's leading receiver in the Las Vegas Bowl as he caught 12 passes

for 93 yards. Allen scored the game-winning touchdown against New Mexico and Collie scored twice against TCU. Reed had his best day as a Cougar against Air Force when he hauled in five passes for 103 yards and a touchdown. One of his catches went for 50 yards.

Joining the returnees will be McKay Jacobson, a highly touted recruit from Southlake, Texas out of Southlake Carroll High School. Jacobson graduated from high school in December and enrolled at BYU for winter semester. He has been working out with the team since arriving in January and participated in Spring Camp.

Other receivers who will look to make an impact include Brett Cooper, Saia Hafoka, Travis Henderson, Bryce Mahuika, Sean Mosman, Ryan Neeley, Troy Sheide and Matt Smith. Mahuika was the team's primary kick and punt returner in 2004, but played sparingly last season due to injury.



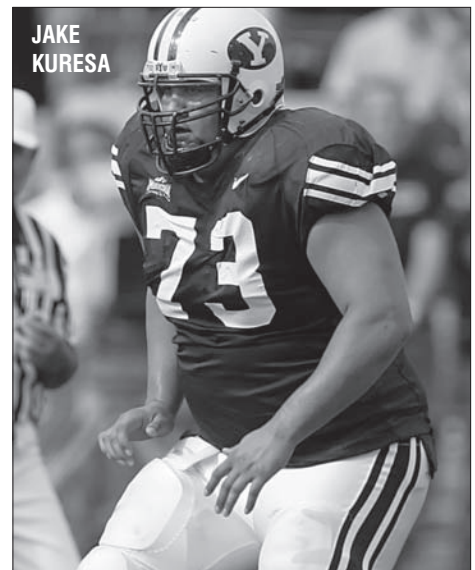

TIGHT END

The tight end position may be one of the deepest on the Cougar roster. The top returning player is senior Jonny Harline, who led the team in receptions (63) and receiving yards (853) and was named first-team All-MWC in 2005. Harline also caught five touchdown passes and had three 100-yard performances last season, including 123 yards against both San Diego State and New Mexico. Harline returns for his senior season as the nation's top returning tight end.

Senior Daniel Coats is also back after a successful 2005 season in which he caught 21 passes for 189 yards and three touchdowns. Other tight ends who will be in the mix for playing time include Vic So'oto and Andrew George.

So'oto showed promise as a pass-catching end in camp last season and played on special teams throughout the year.



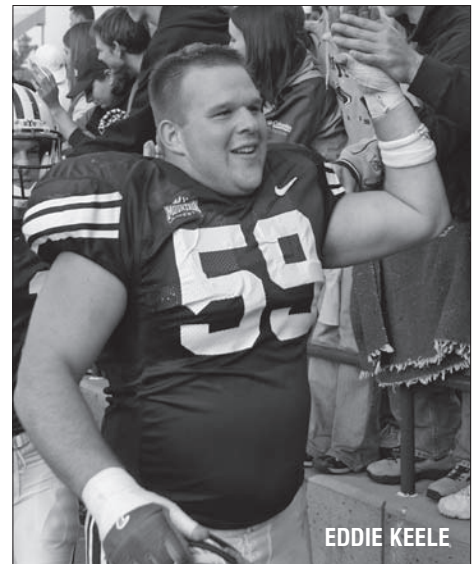

"The tight end position will be another of our offensive strengths," Mendenhall said. "We have four quality players at that position, including Jonny Harline, who returns as the nation's top returning tight end. Daniel Coats also returns after an excellent season in 2005."

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Cougars will return three of last year's five starters on the line, including second-team All-MWC performer Jake Kuresa, Eddie Keele and freshman All-American Dallas Reynolds. BYU will have to replace second-team All-MWC center Lance Reynolds, Jr. and Brian Sanders. Terence Brown, a regular contributor last season, has announced his intentions to serve a mission.

The line helped the BYU offense put up big numbers in 2005, including 33.0 points and 462.4 total yards per game. Despite the losses, there are several players who are capable of picking up the slack. Ray Feinga saw action in 2005 and will be expected to battle for a

starting position at guard along with Travis Bright, who was expected to contribute last season but, suffered an season-ending injury during fall camp. Jeff Rhea is one of three players who will be battling for the starting position at center. Erik Freeman and Sete Aulai will also compete at center.

Other players who will be competing for time on the line during Fall Camp include Nick Longshore, David Oswald and Marco Thorson.

"While we return three starters, we've lost some experience," Mendenhall said. "However, I feel very good about our top-eight guys.

"We'll enter spring lacking depth at offensive line. As a result, our spring practice format will be unique. Through recruiting, however, we've been able to address the depth issue along the offensive line."

When Fall Camp begins, the Cougars will welcome Tom Sorensen, a transfer from Vanderbilt University, as well as Rick Wolfley, a first-team all-state selection from Star Valley, Wyoming. Kamehameha High School standout Walter Kahaialii will also journey to Provo this fall. Two other incoming linemen include 2005 Sports Illustrated Preseason High School All-American Braden Hansen and all-state lineman Ryan Freeman.

DEFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Following an off-season review of the program, Mendenhall and the defensive coaching staff have implemented a handful of changes heading into Spring Camp.

Jaime Hill joins the staff after three years as an assistant coach in the Canadian Football League, including the past two seasons as the co-defensive coordinator for the Ottawa Renegades. Hill brings over 20 years of coaching experience to the BYU coaching staff. He will be responsible for coaching the defensive secondary, including corners and safeties. Long-time coach, Barry Lamb, will coach the outside linebackers and Paul Tidwell will be responsible for the inside linebackers. Steve Kaufusi will continue coaching the defensive line and Mendenhall will continue his responsibilities as the defensive coordinator.

ments around to make sure we get our best 11 players on the field."

With only four defensive starters returning, Mendenhall said his goal this spring is to find players who are ready to contribute based on effort, execution and discipline.

"Defensively, we have a lot of potential," he said. "I like our personnel. I really like this group of players and how hard they've worked."



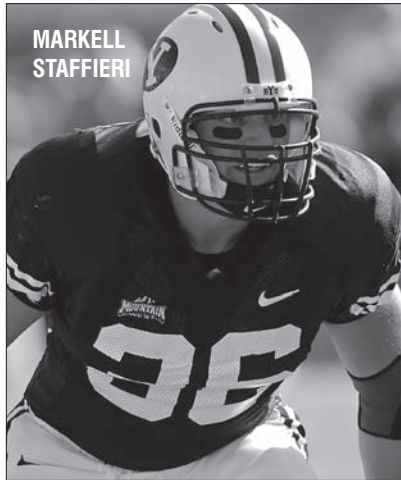
DEFENSIVE LINE

The coaching staff will be faced with the task of replacing the entire starting front line in 2006. Manaia Brown, Vince Feula, Justin Maddux and Daniel Marquardt, who all started at least six games in 2005, have departed due to graduation.

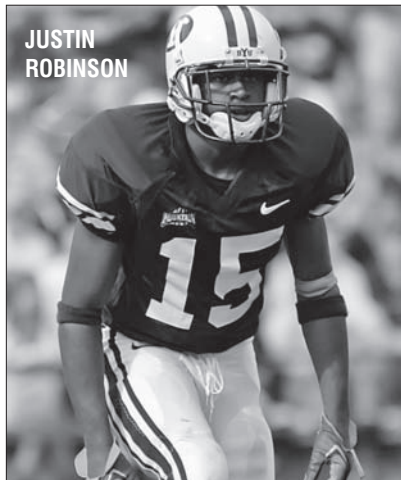
"We lost five of our top-six defensive linemen from last season," Mendenhall said. "Like the

offensive line, that need has been addressed through recruiting. We're bringing in five defensive linemen. Fall Camp will be very important, in terms of establishing depth at the defensive line."

The Cougars return just three letterwinners on the line, including Hala Paongo, who started the Las Vegas Bowl, Kyle Luekenga and Judd Anderton. Paongo played in all 12 games last year and recorded nine tackles, including one for a loss. Luekenga played in seven games as a freshman and had four tackles while Anderton appeared in four and had one tackle. All three, along with redshirt freshman Jan Jorgensen, will see plenty of action during the season.

Dan Alletto, Tyler Berry, Brett Denney, Mark Mathews, Temena Paongo, Mike Ratelle, Sean Sullivan and Russell Tialavea will all seek to impress the coaching staff during the Fall Camp in an effort to earn playing time.

"The entire front is unproven," Mendenhall added. "Jan Jorgensen is coming off a redshirt year, Kyle Luekenga played a little last season, Brett Denney is back from a mission and Russell Tialavea is coming off a redshirt season. There's potential for us to be very good up front, but there are a lot of unknowns. Frankly, I see that as a positive."

LINEBACKERS

Despite the loss of two starters, the linebacker position will be the key strength for BYU. According to Mendenhall, the linebacker position will be the featured position in 2006.

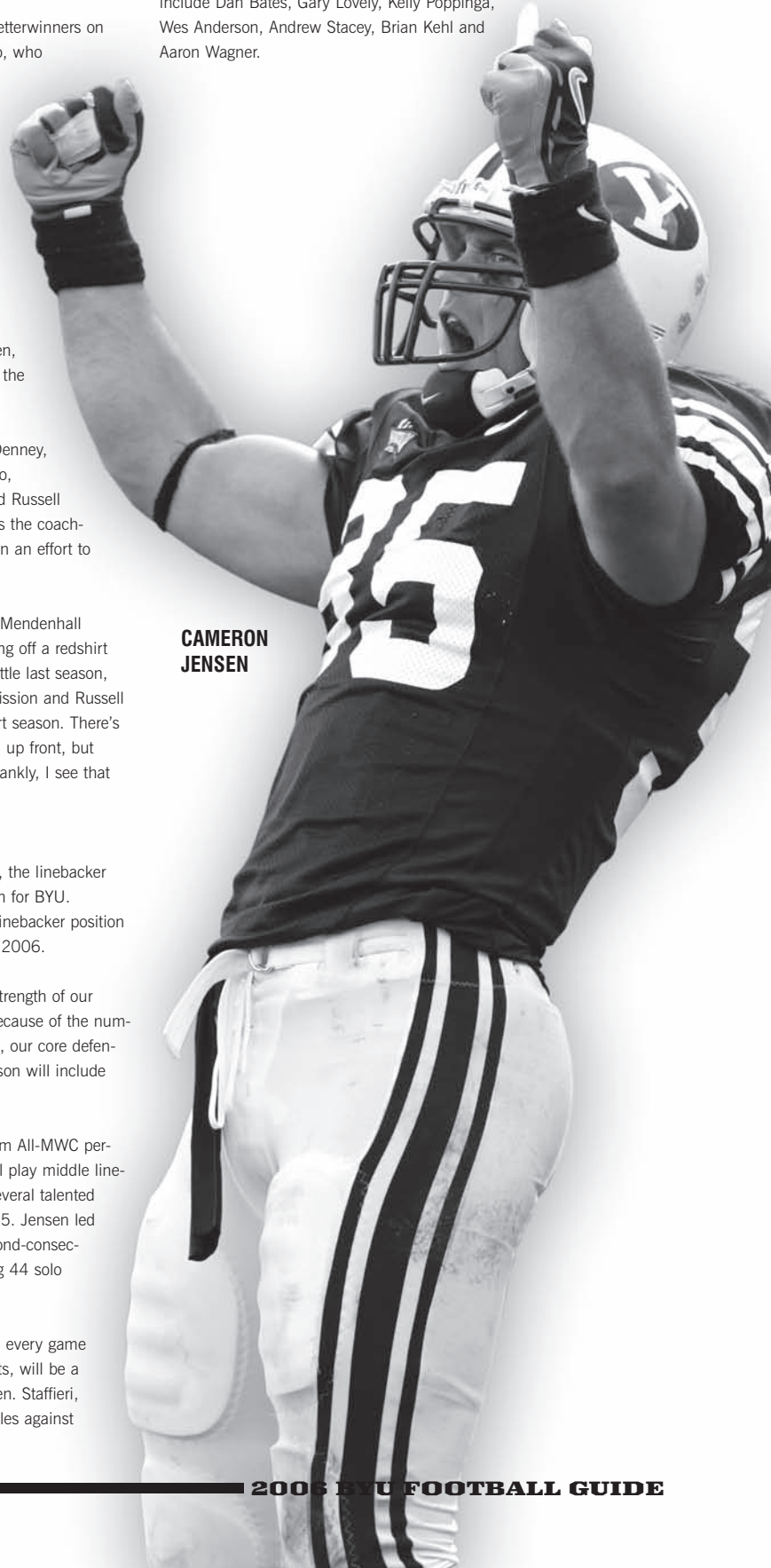
"The linebacking corps is the strength of our defense," Mendenhall said. "Because of the numbers and ability at that position, our core defensive package for the 2006 season will include more linebackers."

Cameron Jensen, a second-team All-MWC performer and a team captain, will play middle linebacker and will be joined by several talented players who saw action in 2005. Jensen led the team in tackles for the second-consecutive season with 84, including 44 solo takedowns.

Markell Staffieri, who played in every game last season and made two starts, will be a favorite to start alongside Jensen. Staffieri, who had a career-high 12 tackles against

San Diego State, had 35 total tackles in 2005, including four for a combined loss of 10 yards.

Other linebackers who will return and compete for playing time and starting spots in 2006 include Dan Bates, Gary Lovely, Kelly Poppinga, Wes Anderson, Andrew Stacey, Brian Kehl and Aaron Wagner.

Lovely played in 11 games last season and Wagner was a regular contributor before suffering a knee injury against Colorado State, sidelining him for the remainder of the season. Kehl was also a regular on defense and special teams, making 30 tackles and blocking one punt.

Poppinga came to BYU from Utah State following the 2004 season and sat out the 2005 season due to transfer rules. He is the brother of former Cougar Brady Poppinga, who was a rookie with the Green Bay Packers in 2005.

David Nixon, who saw significant action in 2003, is back from a two-year mission. During the 2003 season, he made 57 tackles, including 11 for a combined loss of 26 yards. He made two starts that season.

the Cougars return three players at safety with a year of experience. Corby Hodgkiss was a surprise contributor in 2005, recording 26 tackles and two sacks. David Tafuna saw action in all 12 games, racking up 19 tackles. Quinn Gooch played in nine games and was credited with 30 tackles. Cole Miyahira has made the switch from cornerback to safety and will be tested early and often in his new duties.

“We return a secondary with a year of experience,” Mendenhall said. “We’ve also addressed competition through recruiting with possible changes through the spring. We may have some corners who move to safety as that competition shapes out. It may be further involved as we access players like Brandon Bradley, Andre Saulsberry and Robbie Buckner.”

recorded 26 tackles and four pass breakups in seven games, including five starts.

SPECIAL TEAMS

BYU returns its kicker and punter in Jared McLaughlin and Derek McLaughlin. Jared McLaughlin connected on 14-of-19 field goals, including 11-of-11 from inside the 40-yard line. His season long was a 47-yarder against TCU. He was also 46-of-48 on extra points and was tied for fourth in the conference in points per game.

Derek McLaughlin transferred from Washington following his mission and averaged 40.0 yards per punt in 2005. His longest punt was 60 yards and he had 20 punts downed inside the 20.

Mitch Payne will be the other kicker in spring camp.



Mendenhall also said Chris Bolden and Terrance Hooks will be in the mix for significant playing time in 2006. Dustin Gabriel is also expected to compete for playing time at outside linebacker after playing safety in 2005.

Gabriel played in all 12 games, starting 10. He finished the 2005 season tied for third on the team with 55 tackles, including 35 solo takedowns. Gabriel also had two tackles for a loss of 12 yards, one sack for nine yards and one interception.

“There are a lot of unknowns here as well,” Mendenhall said. “Kelly Poppinga, Chris Bolden and Terrance Hooks all return after redshirting last year. David Nixon is back from a mission as well. Those guys are all really good players, but they’re unproven at this point.”

Despite the loss of starter Spencer White to graduation,

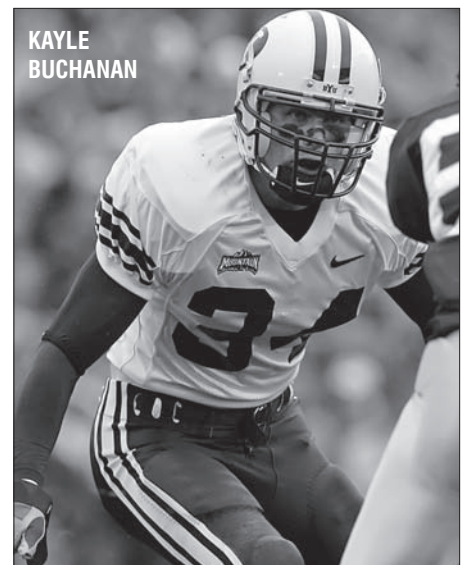
Other players listed at safety on the Fall Roster include Aaron Gordon, Aaron Attig, Michael Carr, Ben Criddle and Kellen Fowler.

BRONCO MENDENHALL

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY'S 14TH HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Bronco Mendenhall enters his second season as the head football coach at Brigham Young University. In his first year at the helm, he guided the Cougars to their first winning regular season and first bowl appearance since 2001. BYU finished the 2005 regular season at 6-5 and lost to California, 35-28, in the Las Vegas Bowl.

During the 2005 season, the Cougars finished second in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 record.

Mendenhall and his staff coached an offense reminiscent of BYU's glory days, ranking second in the MWC in scoring and sixth in the nation in passing. This season, Mendenhall will lead the Cougars against non-conference opponents Arizona, Tulsa, Boston College and Utah State, as well as a competitive conference schedule.

After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including two years as the defensive coordinator for BYU, Bronco Mendenhall was promoted to head football coach on December 13, 2004. Mendenhall became the 14th head coach since the University first officially recognized football as an intercollegiate sport in 1922.

Mendenhall (39)--one of the youngest NCAA Division I-A head coaches in the country-- served as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the Cougars during the 2003 and 2004 season. During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing

defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

In 2004, the Cougars ranked third in the Mountain West in rushing defense, allowing 149.3 yards per game. The Cougars also ranked second in the league, with 34 sacks for a combined loss of 232 yards.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the



Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

America honors. Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.



As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA America and JC Gridwire Academic All-

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to the former Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons: Cutter, Breaker and Raeder.

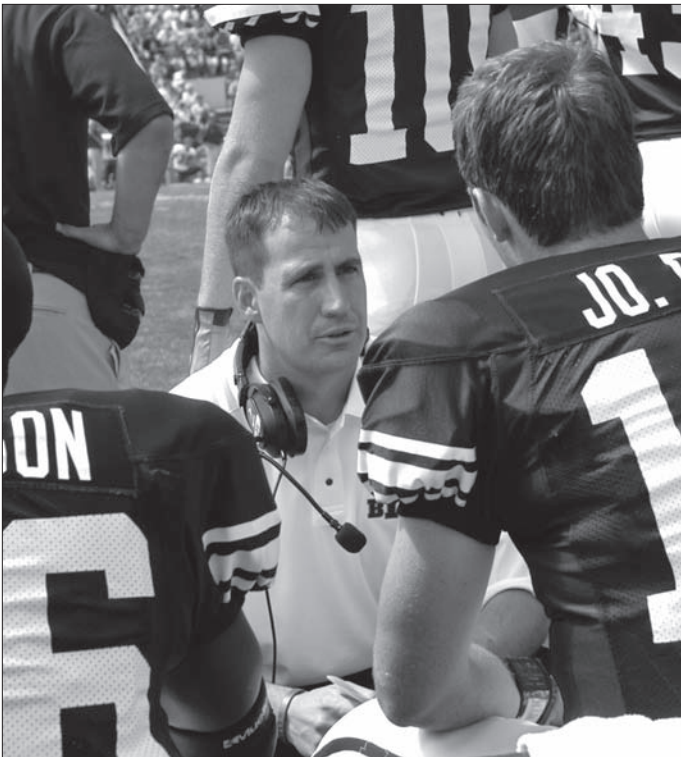

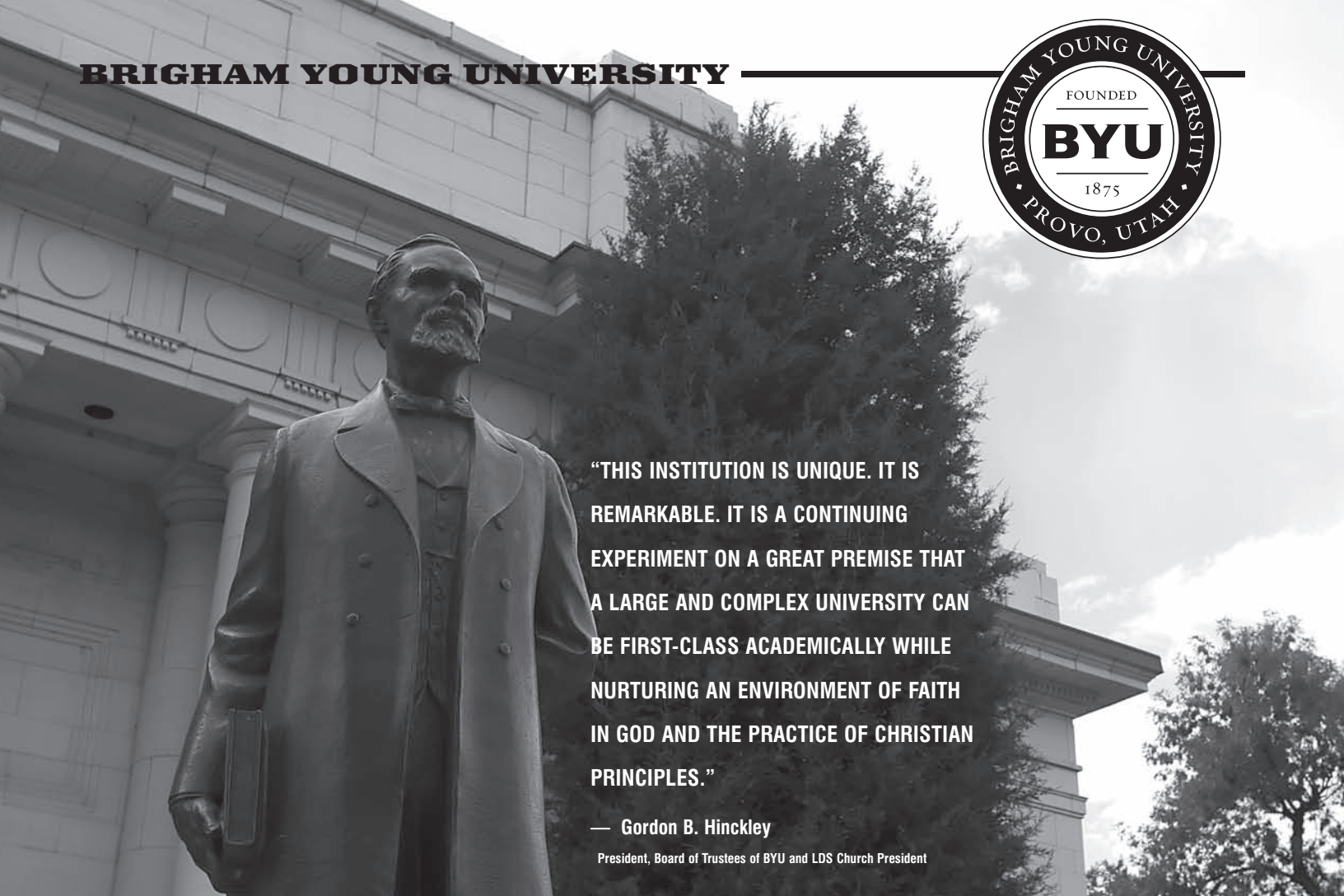
**KEVIN MORRIS***Head Football Trainer*

Established in 1875, Brigham Young University provides an outstanding education in an atmosphere consistent with the ideals and principles of its sponsor, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. With more than 30,000 students gathered from all 50 states, the District of Columbia and more than 120 countries, BYU is the largest privately owned, church-sponsored university in the United States. The university has an additional 2,800 part-time and 1,000 evening students, as well as 2,400 students enrolling at BYU-Hawaii and 10,000 others attending BYU-Idaho. Known for its multicultural and academically-minded student body, its world-class teaching and its beautiful mountain location, BYU is also recognized for its extensive language programs, talented performing arts ensembles, outstanding sports programs and devotion to combining solid scholarship with the principles of the restored gospel of Jesus Christ.

EXCELLENT LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

BYU students benefit from a campus environment ranked above the 90th percentile nationally in being supportive, being academically challenging and fostering active and collaborative learning as measured in the 2004 National Survey of Student Engagement. It's no

surprise that our graduates leave BYU with the skills and desire to make meaningful contributions all across the globe. Furthering their education in a highly supportive environment, an impressive number of undergraduates have the chance to become involved in research that enhances their course work. The BYU experience ensures that students are well prepared to pursue advanced degrees, enjoying strong acceptance rates into leading graduate programs. BYU graduates are also highly recruited among top employers.

This survey also shows that significantly more BYU undergraduates (86 percent) participate “very often” in activities to enhance their spirituality than do undergraduates nationally (18 percent). Also, 74 percent of BYU undergraduates rate their overall education as being “excellent,” with the national rate at 33 percent.

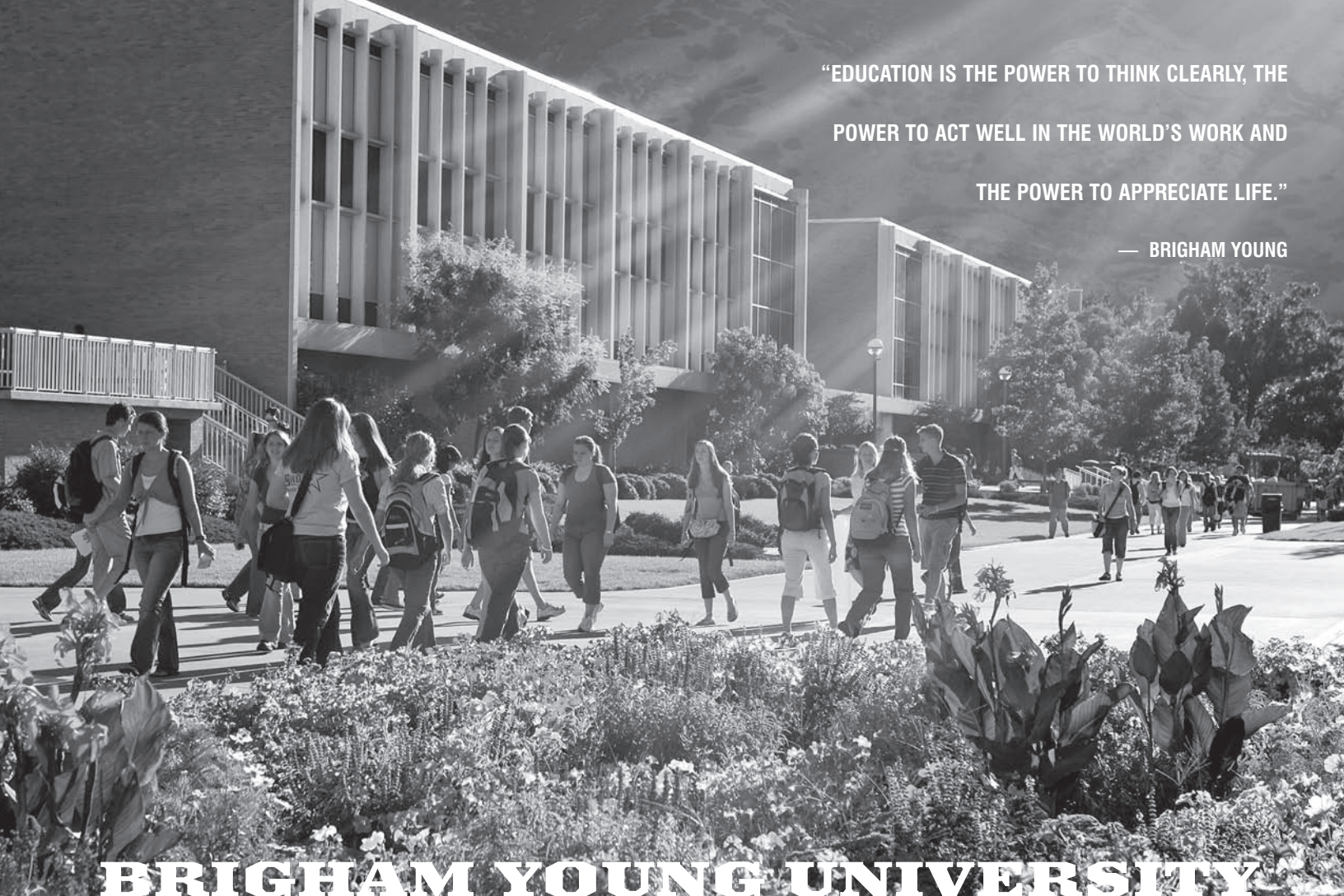
Consumers Digest ranked BYU as the second-best value in American private education. *The Princeton Review* awarded the university the top spot in the categories of “great college library” and “stone-cold sober,” sixth in “best quality of life” and seventh in “happiest students.” And Institutional Research and Evaluation Inc. named BYU the safest campus in the nation for schools of its size.

EXCEPTIONAL ACADEMICS

BYU ranks among the top 20 in National Merit scholars enrolled; among the nation's leaders in National Science Foundation fellowships (and fellows who go on to earn science and engineering doctorates); third among accounting programs; fourth in the number of Advanced Placement examination scores; and among the top 10 percent in nursing programs. BYU students garner distinction as Fullbright scholars, Mellon fellows and Barry M. Goldwater scholars. The University consistently achieves national recognition. *U.S. News & World Report* ranks BYU's law and business schools among the top 40 in the United States. In the July 2002 edition of the *Chronicle of Higher Education*, BYU was recognized as the best in the nation at turning research dollars into inventions and new companies.

A BEAUTIFUL CAMPUS SETTING

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of more than 115,000 situated 4,500 feet above sea level. The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. Surrounded by mountains, Provo is at the heart of Utah Valley with a combined population of more than 440,000. Utah Valley is framed by the 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west and 11,750-foot Mount

Timpanogos on the east. BYU also has campuses in La‘ie, Hawaii (Brigham Young University-Hawaii) and Rexburg, Idaho (Brigham Young University-Idaho) serving an additional 12,000 students. The main campus sits on approximately 600 acres at the foot of the Wasatch Mountains and includes 333 buildings. Additional facilities include the BYU Jerusalem Center, the BYU Salt Lake Center, LDS Business College and Missionary Training Centers around the world.

OUTSTANDING STUDENT BODY

BYU students arrive with superb preparation. The entering class has an average high school GPA of 3.71 (on a 4.0 scale) and an average ACT score that ranks in the

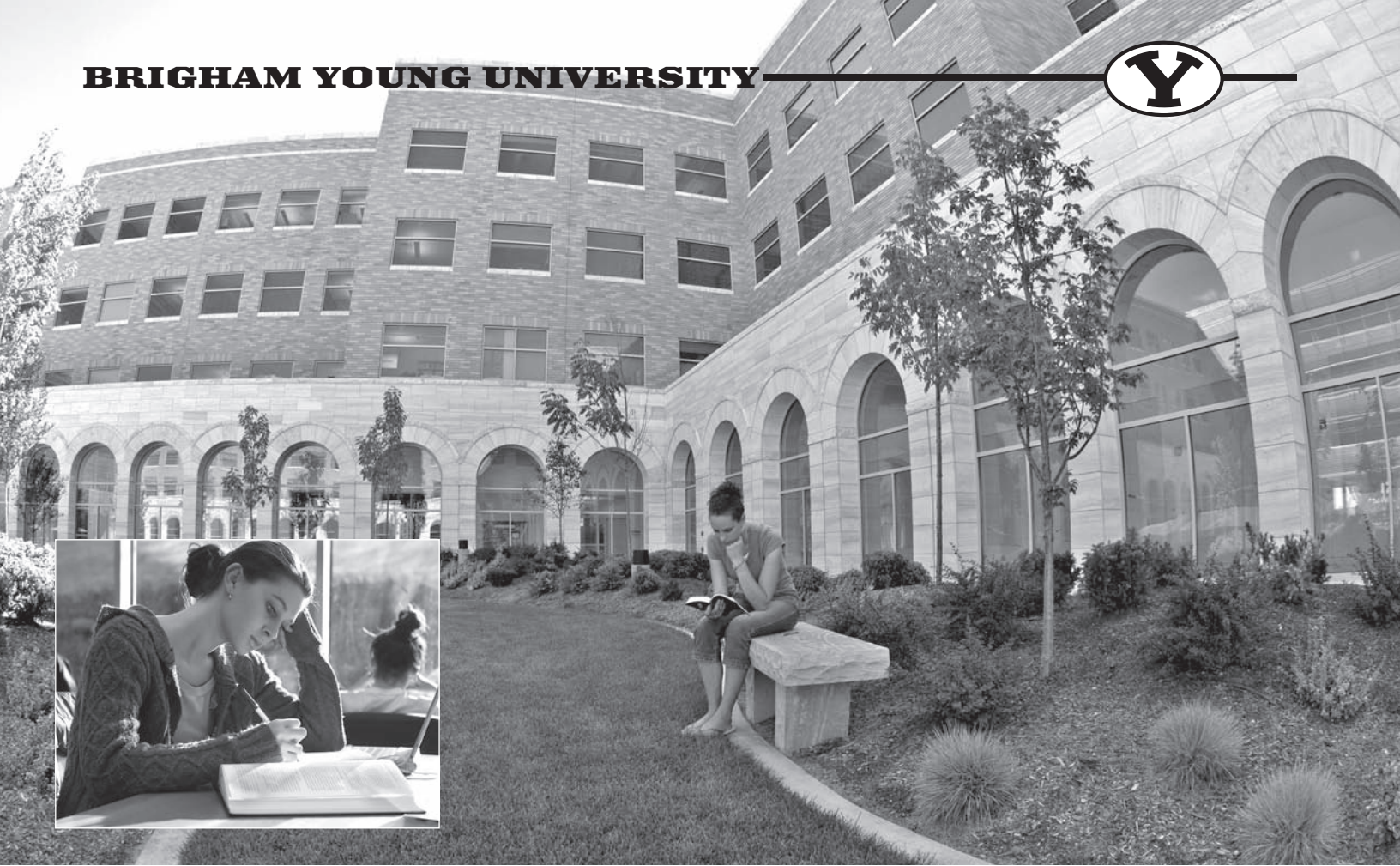
89th percentile nationally. The University consistently places in the top 20 for enrollment of National Merit Scholars. In addition to their academic excellence, students bring and share high values and ideals. Students come to BYU from all 50 states and more than 120 countries, bringing many international cultures and experiences to the campus.

Nearly half of these scholars have lived outside the United States, and three-fourths are fluent in at least two languages. The variety of cultures and backgrounds, coupled with an institutional commitment to the gospel of Jesus Christ, adds to an already rich academic experience that challenges the mind while feeding the spirit.

QUALITY PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION

A strong curriculum delivered by outstanding faculty is key to the academic excellence of BYU graduates. From business management to nursing, from the humanities to engineering, the University’s 11 colleges — supported by comprehensive offerings from religious education — continue to be internationally recognized for the quality of their education and the professional preparation they provide. In addition to the challenging course work and hands-on research, numerous programs offer academic and service outreach opportunities. Study abroad centers, distance-learning courses and worldwide performing arts tours are a few of the offerings that enrich BYU’s academic experience.



**INTERNATIONAL CENTER OF LEARNING**

BYU has been selected as a Center for International Business Education Research (CIBER), a program designated to promote the competitiveness of United States business through an integrated international curriculum, faculty and student international research and outreach programs. BYU's David M. Kennedy Center for International Studies provides support to colleges and departments in pursuing their international interests.

BYU runs the largest study abroad program in the United States, with satellite centers in London, Jerusalem, and Paris, as well as more than 20 other sites. The Institute of International Education ranks BYU as the number one university in the U.S. to offer students study abroad opportunities; nearly 2,000 students take advantage of more than 50 BYU study abroad programs yearly. BYU's motto is "The World is Our Campus."

Many factors contribute to the diversity and depth of language expertise at BYU. More than three-fourths of BYU students speak a language other than English—107 languages in all. Six percent of the student body is from outside the United States, representing more than 120 countries. Additionally, 82 percent of the men and 13 percent of the women at BYU have served church missions, which often entails gaining fluency in a second language. The variety of language skills among the student body allows the University to provide a rich forum for language instruction.

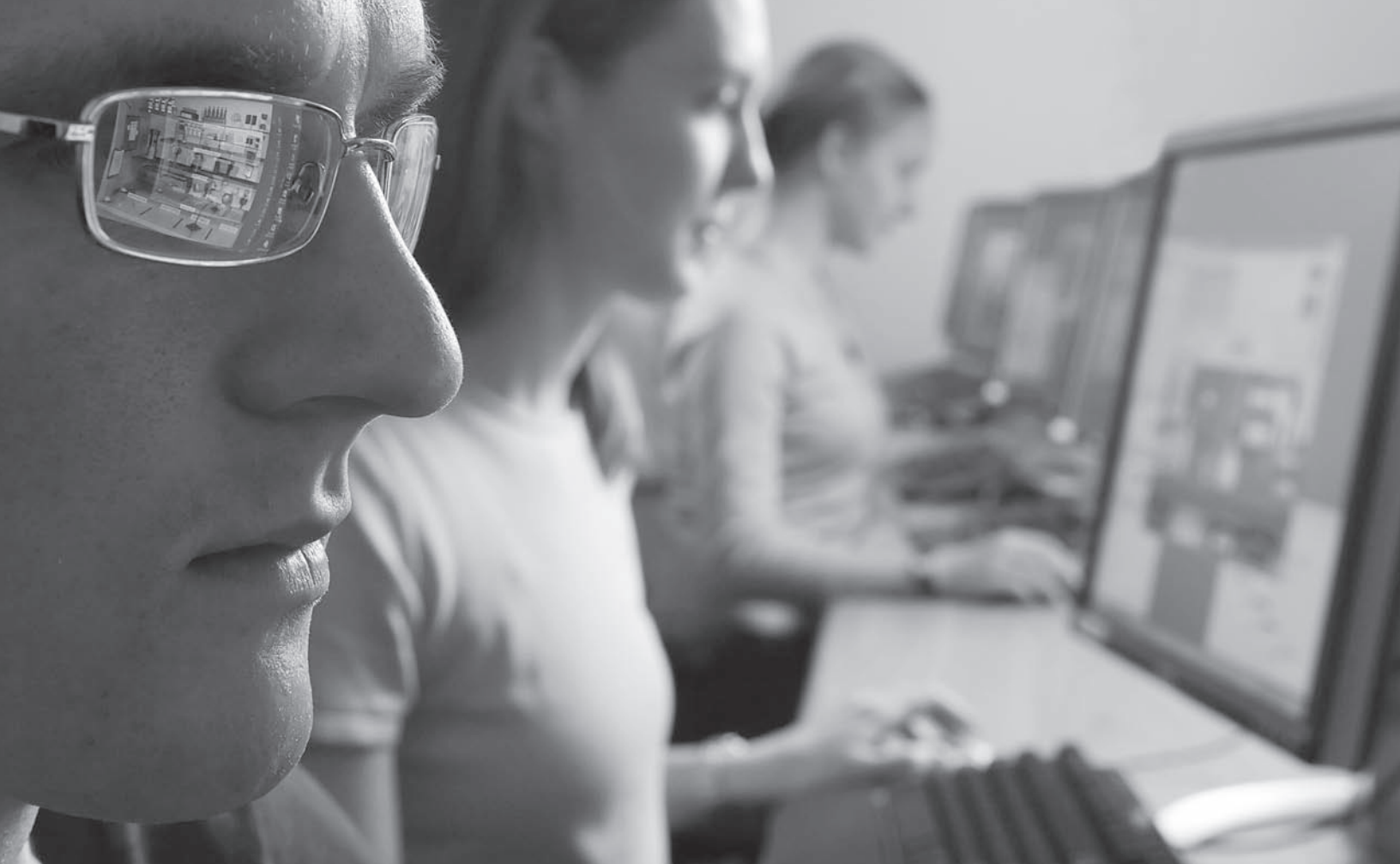
Regular classes are offered in 43 languages, with an additional 23 available with sufficient student interest—among the most offered anywhere in the country. The number of enrollments in language courses at BYU equals 31 percent of the student body, compared to the national average of 8 percent. The prior experience of most of the students allows for a higher standard of

instruction, using the language to teach other ideas—literature, history, culture—as well as to enhance their opportunities outside the lab and classroom.

DISTINGUISHED FACULTY

Faculty members hold advanced degrees from universities around the world. Their achievements are compelling and broad ranging as they pursue consequential research work that is making a real difference. Alleviating hunger worldwide through more efficient agriculture, finding low-pollution energy alternatives and making significant contributions to the strengthening of families are among their many pursuits. Faculty members are regularly called upon to head national and international professional organizations and to consult with corporate and governmental entities. Above all, these high-principled men and women share an unmatched devotion to bringing the best possible education to their students.





NATIONAL RANKINGS AND RECOGNITION

U.S. News and World Report gave BYU high marks in several categories in its 2005 “America’s Best Colleges” issue, ranking BYU in the second tier in the category of “Best National Universities,” 25th in the “Great Schools at Great Prices” among national universities with doctoral programs and among the top 10 with the least student-incurred debt.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School was ranked 34th in the 2005 issue of *U.S. News & World Report’s* “Best Graduate Schools.” The law school also earned the fourth spot in *The Princeton Review’s* ranking of law schools’ “overall academic excellence.” The Marriott School of Management’s MBA program was ranked 39th in the nation by *U.S. News & World Report*, fifth among

regional schools by *The Wall Street Journal*, and 49th in the world—moving up 26 spots—by the *Financial Times*. The *Journal* also rated the Marriott School second in the national category “best for hiring graduates with ethical standards” and fifth for excellence in accounting. Also rated in *U.S. News & World Report’s* “Best Graduate Schools” 2005 issue, BYU’s College of Nursing was 58th among graduate nursing programs, and the University’s Ira A. Fulton College of Engineering 81st among graduate engineering programs, with specific graduate programs in mechanical engineering ranking 53rd and in electrical and computer engineering ranking 68th.

BYU’S CODE OF HONOR

BYU exists to provide a university education in an atmo-

sphere consistent with the principles of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. This environment is preserved through adherence to a code of conduct called the Honor Code that reflects those ideals. Initiated by students in 1949, the Honor Code emphasizes being honest, living a chaste and virtuous life, abstaining from alcohol and tobacco, using clean language and other values encompassed in the doctrines of the Church. The code is supplemented by additional guidelines on dress, grooming and housing. Students and faculty are attracted by the opportunity to study and work among those who share their faith and standards. In a survey of BYU alumni, 77 percent cited their desire to “obtain a spiritual, religiously based education” as a very important or extremely important factor in their decision to attend BYU.

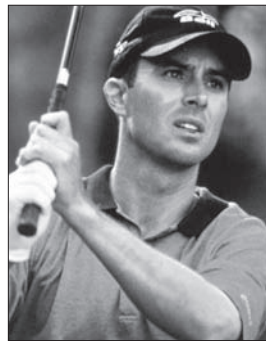

One of the first questions Bronco Mendenhall was asked after becoming the head coach at BYU was what he thought about the missionary program, and if he felt it helped or hurt the BYU football program.

"Serving missions is what makes this team, this university and the church unique," Mendenhall said. "These unique characteristics are based upon sound principles and values. Why would we not embrace them?"

Of the 105 student-athletes slated to participate in fall camp, 62 (59 percent) have served full-time, two-year missions in a combined total of over 21 different countries around the world, including Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Ecuador, England, Germany, Guatemala, Norway, Philippines, Portugal, Russia, Samoa and Tonga—just to name a few.

Brigham Young University is owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of the Church is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics.

The Church operates more than 330 missions around the world. A mission covers a geographic area and has a central headquarters. Each is presided over by a mission president who is called from the ranks of the Church membership to serve for a period of three years. The mission president directs the work of the missionaries assigned to his mission.

Approximately 52,000 missionaries, representing the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, are serving proselytizing missions in 330 missions around the world. Seventy-five percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men

between the ages of 19 and 26. A substantial number of young women and older couples also serve proselytizing missions.

Missionaries work long hours—seven days a week for two years, or 18 months for women and couples—teaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ and participating in community service.

In addition, about 5,100 individuals (including couples) are given special service assignments. Health specialists and doctors go to developing countries where the Church's health services program teaches preventive care. Craftsmen, artisans and construction supervisors train members in local building projects. Agricultural experts train people to produce food more effectively and economically. Other mission assignments include education, family history research and leadership training.

The missionaries and/or their families donate money to the Church to pay for their personal expenses. When his or her assignment is completed, the missionary returns home to pursue vocational, academic or other personal goals.

Aside from their brief orientation at a missionary training center, missionaries receive little formal training for their ministry. Missionary preparation comes primarily from personal study and, in many cases, from examples taught in the home from childhood.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on April 6, 1830 with six members. Today, congregations of the Church are found in more

than 160 nations and territories. With over 12.2 million members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world, and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is Christian, but is neither Catholic nor Protestant. Rather, it is a restoration of the original church established by Jesus Christ.

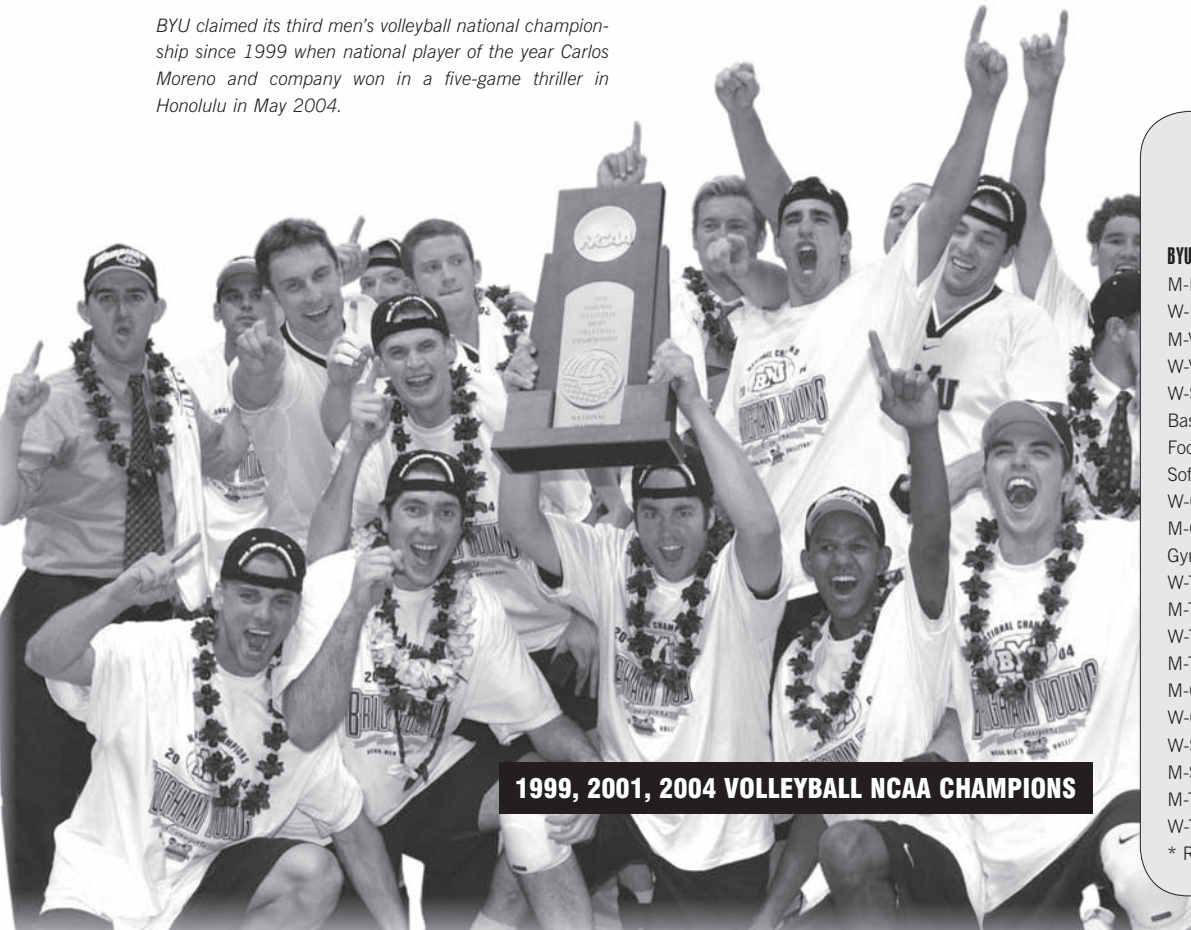

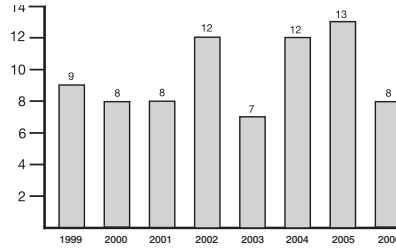
PRIDE OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST

In the seven-year history of the MWC, the Cougars have won 66 of 132 conference championships. That is 50 percent of all championships awarded by the conference, or as many championships as all other conference schools combined. In 2000-2001, BYU won all but three conference championships (16 of 19). From 1962 to 1999, BYU also dominated the Western Athletic Conference, winning more championships than any other WAC School. In fact, during the last three decades in the WAC, the Cougars won 60 percent of the WAC Championships—more than all other conference competitors combined. For the fourth straight season, BYU teams claimed eight MWC Championships.

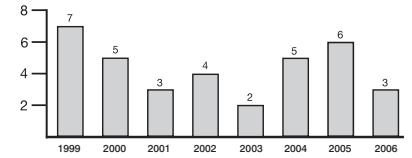


EIGHT YEARS OF SUCCESS: BYU's 21 athletic teams consistently rank among the best in the nation. BYU TEAMS IN NATION'S TOP 25



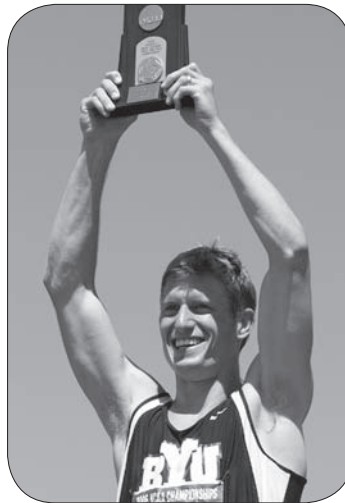

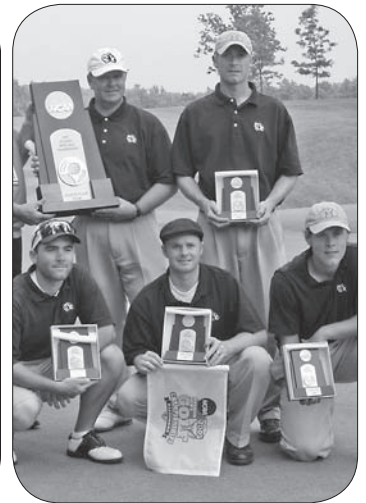

EQUIPMENT AND LOCKER ROOMS

The 75-yard-long locker room is patterned after the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles. There is also a special locker room for former BYU players who want to train in Provo during the off season.

TRAINING FACILITIES

Sponsored by Dynatronics, this area features a rehabilitation room and a hydro area with a cold pool, a hot tub with power jets, a treadmill pool with two cameras and a doctor's office. Trainers provide electrical stimulation and ultra sound treatments as well as bikes, treadmills and Cybex machines.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER

Most of the Strength and Conditioning Center's equipment was custom built by Free Motion and is sponsored by Icon Heath and Fitness. Among the features are 12 full power racks with platforms, seven half racks, three jerk racks, Sorinex hurricane racks, reverse hypers, Agaton Fitness Systems, an outdoor mondo plyometric warmup area, two super leg drive sleds, two different dumbbell areas and a medicine ball wall. The first floor also has a nutrition area sponsored by Pharmanex. The second floor is the speed development area has six Tomahawk spinning bikes and TVs, five Nordic Track incline trainers, three Versaclimbers, two Scifit upper body bikes, Woodway force treadmills, H/P Cosmos treadmills with Pneu Weight devices, vibratory boards, a step mill, a turf agility drill area with resistance and a testing area.

STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC CENTER

Tutors and mentors work through these offices. Athletes have access to 42 computer stations, an interactive classroom, 10 small study areas and one large quiet room. Also on staff are a sports psychologist and a nutritionist.

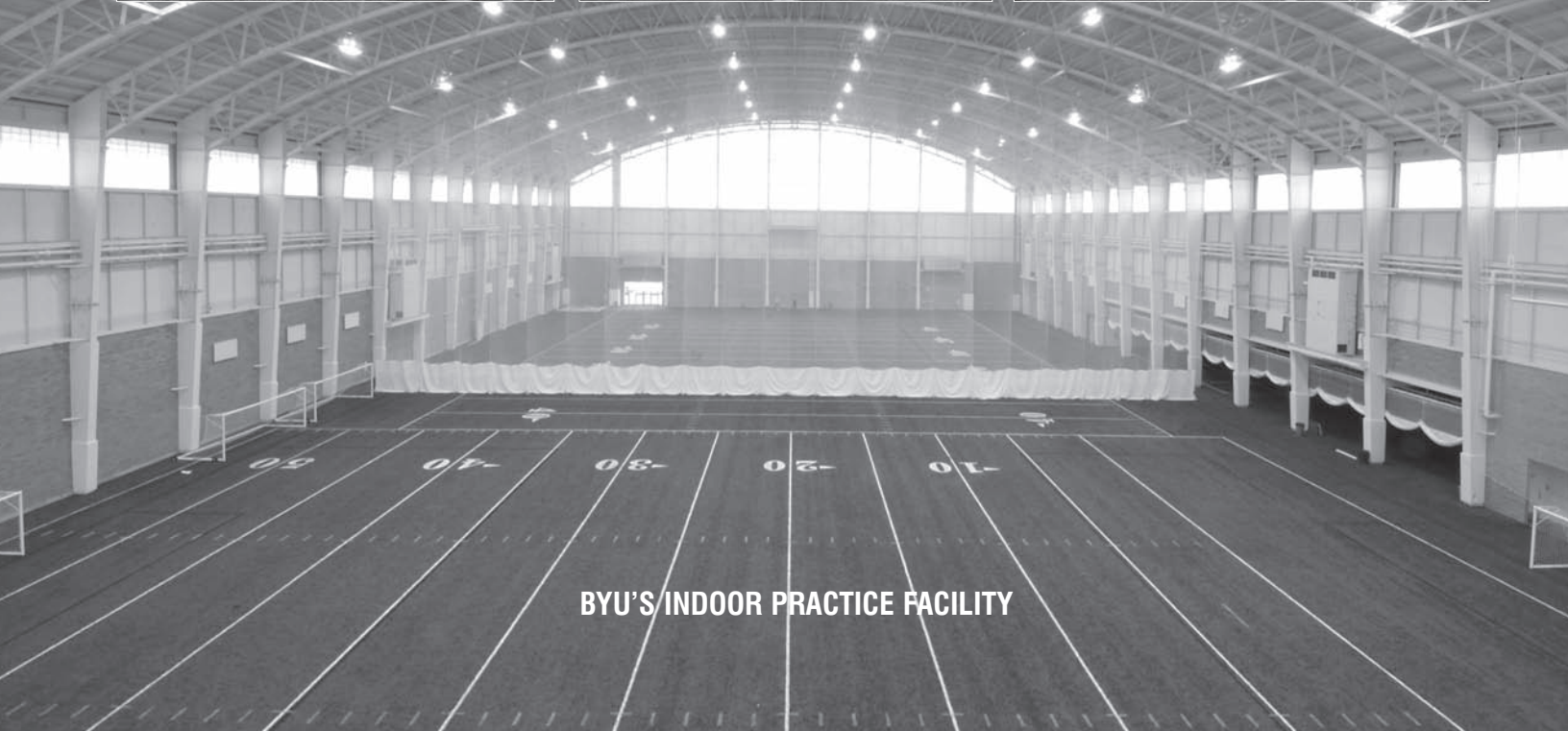

Fans, coaches and athletes can view 11 plasma TV screens, a ticker tape with world wide sports scores or view specialty events on a projection screen while catching a bite to eat.



INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

The IPF is 422 feet wide and 222 feet deep with a height of 86 feet at the center (106,000 square feet). Among its features are two artificial turf fields (55 yards & 65 yards), retractable goalposts on each end, a sideline staging facility for offensive linemen and four batting cages. The indoor surface is field turf and the building features four video platforms located 40 feet above the playing surface. The IPF serves as an indoor practice arena for the football, soccer, golf, baseball and softball teams and a variety of other sports programs, including extramurals and intramurals.

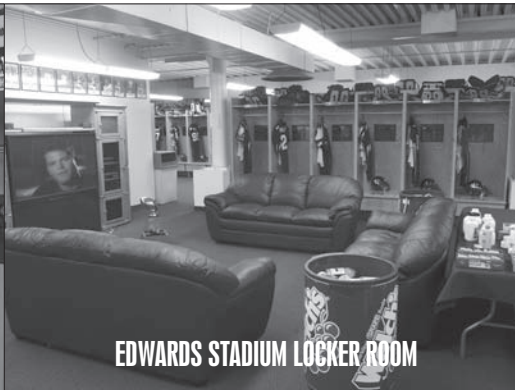

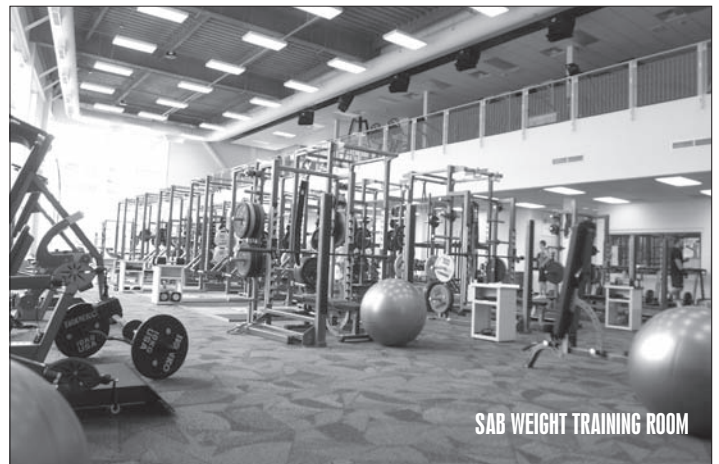

PICTURE PERFECT

With its 64,045-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards and immaculate press boxes, LaVell Edwards Stadium is home to legendary BYU football. Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 25 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.

THE FIELD

The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

LAST EXPANSION

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track

and Field Championships). The stadium expansion increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reportedly "the largest gathering ever in Utah history" at the time. In 2003 BYU added a luxury "Club Seating" area to the east stands taking the capacity of Edwards Stadium down to 64,045.

PRESS BOX

In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding press box working area." Rising over 10 stories high, the four-level press box is located on the west side of the stadium and runs the entire length of the stands. Levels one and two of the press box contain 42 private loges, each equipped with 12 padded chairs, a television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, sink and game programs. The BYU President's box, which includes 163 padded chairs, five television sets and a buffet area, is also located on the first floor. Level three is reserved for the print and electronic media along with all the game operators. The statistics,

public address, sound and scoreboard controls are all located on the third level. Altogether, approximately 300 people work on the third level during games. Level four is primarily used for television game filming.

VIDEO SCOREBOARD

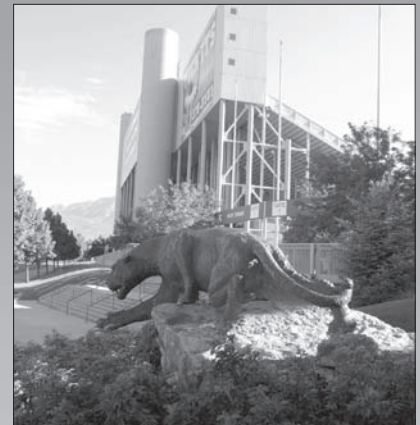
In 1996, a 23 x 31 foot video scoreboard wall, showing both live action and instant replays, was added above the stands on the south end zone. A new animation board and sound system was also added to the scoreboard above the north stands.

COUGAR ROOM

The BYU Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room is located in Edwards Stadium. The room is used for pre- and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets during the year. In addition to the many office areas, Edwards Stadium stores campus surplus furniture and maintenance vehicles.

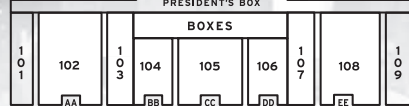

THE EDWARDS STADIUM EXPERIENCE

Hours before kickoff, fans gather across the street from LaVell Edwards Stadium for food and soft drinks, sharing stories of past football heroics and anticipating another triumphant victory. With the Wasatch Mountains serving as a picturesque backdrop, the stadium is filled with 64,045 of some of the nation's best fans, young and old alike. The BYU marching band entertains the blue and white clad crowd with spirited tunes and the Cougar Fight song, amplified by the voices of BYU fans. The BYU cheerleading squad, Cosmo the BYU mascot, and halftime shows with the Cougarettes, the defending national champion dance team, all help make LaVell Edwards Stadium one of a kind. The offense is high-powered and the fans await the boom of the Army ROTC cannon after every scoring play.

Y MOUNTAIN

Preparations for placing the initials BYU on the mountainside began in April of 1906 when president George H. Brimhall commissioned surveyors for the letters "B," "Y" and "U." The letter "Y" was first laid out to ensure that the initials were properly centered on the mountain. Beginning in the early morning, students formed a line that zigzagged up the mountain. Standing eight feet apart, each student would carry a load up to the next and then return for another.

The project, which many expected to be completed by 10 a.m., lasted until 4 p.m. and only the "Y" was covered. After such a laborious day of work, plans to fill in the other two letters were scrapped. Covered with a thin layer of lime powder, the letter was in need of constant repair. Hoping to make it more permanent, a layer of rock was added in 1907. The next year, 20,000 pounds of sand and cement were carried up the mountain to form a three-foot high wall around the letter to hold it together. Several years later the letter underwent a facelift as the blocks, or serifs, were added to it to give it its current appearance.

A nationally recognized symbol of BYU, Y Mountain is a featured shot of almost every Cougar game broadcast on television. Located about half a mile east of campus and halfway up the mountain, the "Y" looks out over the valley and is one of its most prominent features.

COSMO

The cougar, chosen as BYU's mascot by former coach Eugene L. Roberts in the early 1920s, has undergone a tremendous evolution since its inception to become what is now known as the feline phenomenon of Cosmo the Cougar. Beginning in 1924 when BYU purchased a pair of cougar cubs for 50 cents each to excite BYU fans at athletic events, live cougars prowled the sidelines of BYU games on a regular basis through the late 40s and on special occasions through the 60s.

The original cubs were housed on the south side of campus until 1929 when they managed to break out of their cage, kill two dogs and began stalking livestock

on nearby farms. Both were recaptured later the same day. Three weeks later, one cougar died and the other was taken to the old Salt Lake Zoo. BYU procured its mascots from nearby zoos and local bounty hunters but never owned its own cougars again.

Cosmo the Cougar, the brainchild of pep chairman Dwayne Stevenson, made his first official appearance before BYU fans on October 15, 1953. At a cost of 73 dollars for the costume, Daniel T. Gallego, Stevenson's roommate, became the first man under the fur. The name given the big cat was derived from BYU's diverse student body.

"BYU was a very international, cosmopolitan school and that is where we got the name Cosmo," said Gallego.

With over a half-century of service to the BYU community, Cosmo has become an icon of Cougar sports to fans and foes across the country. Through Cosmo's Kids Club and Cosmo's Corner, he is helping raise another generation of BYU fans. Prowling the sidelines for the Cougars, his antics add to the experience of game day at BYU. Cosmo brings out the best of Cougar spirit in fans at athletic competitions both home and away.

THE BEEHIVE BOOT

First instituted in 1971, the Beehive Boot is the symbol of gridiron supremacy in the state of Utah. The idea for the rotating trophy originated with Dave Schulthess, former Sports Information Director (SID) of BYU, and was agreed upon by SIDs from Utah, Utah State and Weber State. As the trophy would represent dominance within the confines of the Beehive State, it was decided that the trophy should be symbolic of the people Utah was built by—the Mormon pioneers.

Finding a suitable pioneer boot for use as a trophy proved to be a difficult task. As pioneers wore their boots until there simply wasn't much left of them, there weren't many pioneer boots lying around. After an arduous search that included numerous personal calls and

radio announcements, Tom Beasley, an antique dealer living in Cache Valley donated a pair of boots for use as the trophy. Estimated to be 100 or more years old, the Beehive Boot is an authentic piece of Utah History.

Awarded to the team with the best record against in-state opponents, the Beehive Boot lived its first four years at Utah State University. BYU then began a dominant run as it ascended into the realms of football's elite, claiming the Boot 19 times in the past 30 years. Utah has won the boot nine times. The longest streak in the history of the Beehive Boot is a five-year span from 1983 to 1987 by BYU. After a two-year stint in Provo, the Boot currently resides in Salt Lake. The Cougars look to bring it back home this season.

If Utah's teams should end the season with identical records against in-state opponents, a winner is chosen by vote of the in-state media who covered the schools' games. This situation has occurred twice in the history of the boot (1973 and 1997) and Utah State was given the trophy each time.



COUGAR FIGHT SONG

Penned in 1932 by Clyde D. Sandgren, "The Cougar Song" is the anthem of BYU sports. Sung after each touchdown and field goal at football games, its words can frequently be heard ringing out across Utah Valley on Saturday afternoons in the fall. Traditionally, fans remain seated through the verse and then stand, chant and shout through the chorus. Carried by 64,000 voices "The Cougar Song" can be an intimidating musical number to an opposing team as LaVell Edwards Stadium thunders to its tune.

Although written and composed in 1932, the song was not copyrighted and presented to the University until 1947. In addition to "The Cougar Song" Sandgren wrote and composed "The Old 'Y' Bell" which was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower that housed the Victory Bell before it was moved its current location outside the Marriott Center.

A 1937 graduate of BYU, Sandgren went on to obtain a law degree from St. John's University. He then became a partner of the New York law firm Burroughs and Brown until 1947 when he decided to return to his native Provo to establish his own law practice. Sandgren later served as general counsel and vice president of BYU. Although he passed away in 1989, Sandgren's memory lives on through the voices of Cougar fans across the nation.

THE VICTORY BELL

The original Y bell traveled across the plains with the early pioneers of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was used to call meetings among the saints and to announce any deaths in the community. Donated to the Brigham Young Academy in 1875, it was used to begin and dismiss classes until it was destroyed in a fire in 1884. The Academy went without a bell for the next 28 years, using instead a variety of instruments as a class bell.

Rung after each BYU victory, the bell was quieted in 1949 after a basketball win over rival Utah. Several overzealous students climbed the tower and vigorously beat upon the bell until it cracked. Repaired with a bronze patch in 1954 by Frank Hemingway, the bell was removed from the education building and mounted on a trailer so it could travel with BYU's teams to away games.

Its mobility proved its downfall as it was stolen in 1958 to be found six months later in nearby Springville. The theft prompted the construction of a bell tower on BYU's upper-campus overlooking the Smith Fieldhouse. Dedicated in 1959, the tower served well until 1973 when the bell fell while ringing in the dedication of the Marriott Center. The supporting yoke above the bell was broken and the bell shattered. The bell was soon repaired by Ray Mortenson of the BYU Maintenance shop using electric welding—miraculously maintaining its previous tone—and was remounted in the tower.

In 1978, the bell was moved to its current home on the southwest corner of the Marriott Center. The open arch tower was designed by BYU landscape architect Boyd Dawler and is made of the same cast stone as the exterior pillars of the Marriott Center. Although the old bell tower above the Smith Fieldhouse no longer stands, the massive steel I-beams that supported the tower have now been converted into the strongest park benches in the Intermountain West.

Over the years the ringing of the bell has come to represent honor, achievement and spirit, and has inspired several poems and songs from BYU faculty and alumni. Clyde D. Sandgren, who composed the Cougar Fight Song, penned a verse that was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower. As BYU victories have become more and more commonplace in recent decades, the ringing of the "Y bell" after each win has renamed it the "Victory Bell."





Conditioning encompasses all facets of physical performance. From speed and quickness, to cardiovascular endurance and brute strength, BYU's strength and conditioning head coach Jay Omer creates programs designed to increase them all. Training programs are sport-specific and position-specific within each sport, allowing athletes to focus on what they need to succeed in their individual competitive endeavors.

In no sport is the need for strength more evident than in football. Each game, each play, can be decided by who tires first. Week in and week out, players give and take a beating and are expected to come back for more of the same the next week. Less than a year after his arrival in 2001, Omer's subjects were seeing huge returns on their investment. Most players had increased their personal lifts 15-25 percent. Mike Tanner, a line-backer who was bench-pressing 330 pounds when Omer arrived, was lifting 400 at summer's end.

Conditioning also increases the production of athletes as it helps to prevent injury. Although football is a contact sport where injuries are common, proper conditioning can help to avoid major injuries and reduce the recovery time of minor injuries. An athlete in top condition tends to recover faster and be better able to withstand the rigors of physical activity.

Not only does the conditioning program improve each player as an individual, but it also improves the team as a whole. Working and sweating with each other in the weight room helps bring the players together. Seeing each person sacrifice and succeed in the off-season builds a camaraderie that carries over to the field as players work to make each other and the team better.

"He (Omer) has brought us a feeling of team chemistry, working out together and being accountable," said Teag Whiting, a former offensive lineman. "There's nothing we're going to see on the football field this season that's any tougher or harder than we're facing in our workouts. It makes us close."

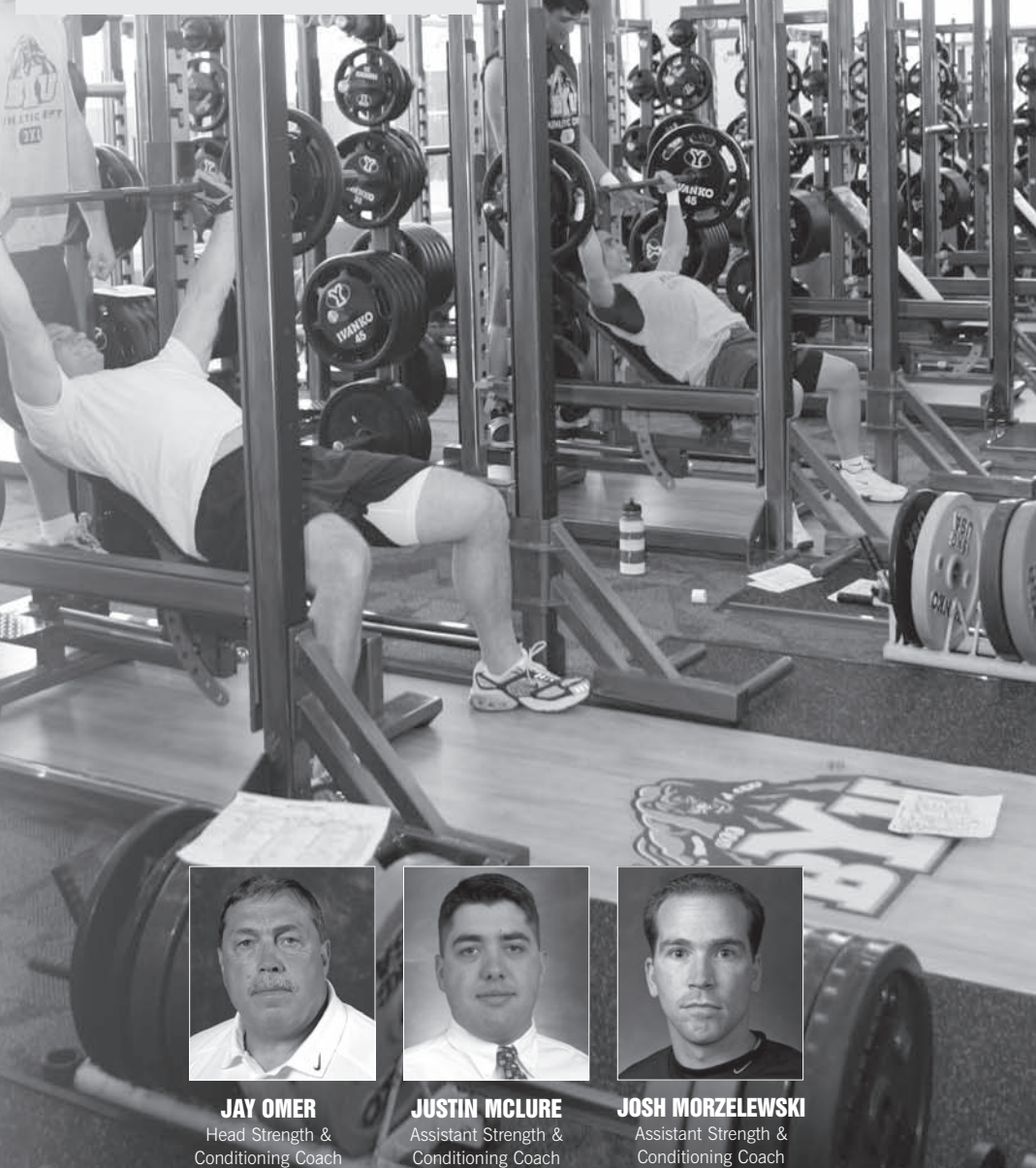
The results BYU players have realized have come from dedication and sacrifice. It's a time-consuming and often painful process in which athletes push themselves to higher levels of performance, and Omer is there to watch over them the whole time.

"The man is a sadist," said former offensive guard Jason Scukanec, "[but] you find yourself doing it. You find yourself pushing yourself and you don't know why. You don't want to disappoint him because it means something to you and your teammates."

Each fall when the Cougars take the field, they carry with them the hopes of BYU fans across the nation. With each passing week and after every win, those hopes get bigger and weigh more on the players. Arriving at the gym before most people are out of bed and staying until long after most people have gone home for the night, Jay Omer takes those hopes very seriously. It's his job to make sure the players are strong enough to carry those hopes to one more victory, one more title, one more bowl.

"I like to see kids work hard, make something of themselves and improve their abilities. That's the joy of this job. I'm also on the same page with coach Mendenhall. We believe a team can only be successful if it prepares well and has team chemistry. You can have a team of super stars, but I'd rather have a team of less talent that works hard, cares about each other, has team chemistry and will go to war because they believe in each other. That's what it's all about and that's what we're trying to get done here."

BYU student-athletes are seeking to excel academically, athletically, and are preparing for life after they graduate. The transition into university life can be challenging for any student. This is especially true for student-athletes who are expected to be good students and outstanding athletes. They are also under obligation to understand and comply with a variety of NCAA rules and regulations in order to be eligible to compete. The Student Athlete Academic Center was created to provide a place where student-athletes can receive support and resources as they pursue their goals.

One of the main priorities of the Center is to assist student-athletes as they transition into the BYU culture and the world of college athletics. Student-athletes are assigned an academic advisor to help them register for classes and monitor their progress toward graduation. The advisor is the contact person for student-athletes who have academic or eligibility questions and concerns. The advisor also helps student-athletes make connections with other campus resources such as the Counseling and Career Center, Multicultural Student Services, University Accessibility Center and College Advisement Centers.

ACADEMIC ADVISEMENT

The main focus of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to help student-athletes graduate on time. To achieve this goal, academic advisement is provided to all student-athletes. Advisors are available to help students-athletes register for classes, monitor athletic eligibility, secure tutorial help, and provide on-going support and encouragement. The academic advisors assist student-athletes by having them set weekly and semester goals, teaching them time management and

academic success strategies and helping them communicate effectively with their professors. Advisors also assist the coaching staff in monitoring the day-to-day progress of student-athletes who struggle academically.

TUTORING

Personal tutors are provided for athletes through the Student Athlete Academic Center with funds made available by the Cougar Club. Tutors are hired to tutor multiple subjects. To obtain a tutor, student-athletes may contact their academic advisor.

MENTORS

Mentors are available for any student-athlete through the Student Athlete Academic Center. Incoming freshmen will be assigned a mentor for their first semester. Mentors are most often fifth-year student-athletes or graduate students. Mentors provide time management help, study skills, test taking tips, help adjusting to college, etc. To obtain a mentor, see the academic advisor assigned to your team.

COMMITMENT TO ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A primary goal of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to ensure that every student-athlete graduates with a Bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study. To achieve this goal, the Center provides a team advisor as part of the comprehensive academic support program. Each athlete has regular visits with his/her team advisor who assists with registration and monitors progress toward graduation. Tutoring is also available for every student-athlete. The Student Athlete Academic Center is conveniently located on the third floor of the new Student Athlete Building.

COMMITMENT TO PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

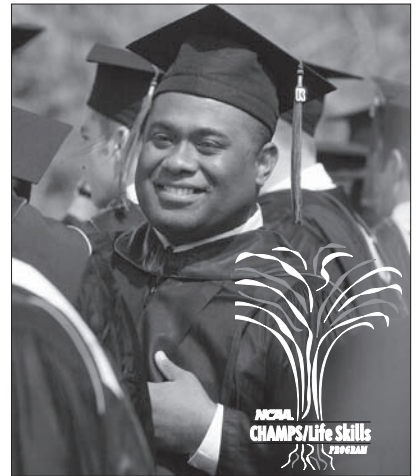

Student-athletes are taught about some of the unique issues they face in the world of college athletics and how to thrive in the university setting and beyond.

A career specialist is available to assist student-athletes with a variety of career issues. They receive help in choosing a major, building their resume, establishing a career network and preparing for their transition from college athletics into the world of work. These services are available through individual consultation, workshops, computer programs and University courses. CECIL SAMUELSON
University President

Cecil O. Samuelson began his work as the 12th president of Brigham Young University on May 1, 2003.

Dr. Samuelson is a Salt Lake City native who served at the University of Utah as professor of medicine, dean of the School of Medicine and vice president of health sciences. Prior to his call as a full-time General Authority of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day

Saints, he was senior vice president of Intermountain Health Care. He holds a bachelor of science degree, a master's degree in educational psychology and a medical degree from the University of Utah.

He fulfilled his residency and held a fellowship in rheumatic and genetic diseases at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, North Carolina. He has received numerous scholastic honors and is the author or co-author of 48 original publications, eight books or chapters of books and 13 abstracts. He also has served as a director, officer or member of several national medical and hospital organizations.

Dr. Samuelson was called in 1994 to serve the Church of Jesus Christ as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy. At the time of his assignment to BYU, he was a member of the Presidency of the Seventy. He has served the Church of Jesus Christ also as a regional representative, stake president, stake high councilor, branch president and missionary. He has served as president of two areas of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints: the Utah North Area and the Europe North Area. He and his wife, Sharon Giauque Samuelson, have five children and five grandchildren.



K. FRED SKOUSEN
Advancement Vice President

Dr. K. Fred Skousen is in his sixth year as advancement vice president of Brigham Young University. Previously, he was Dean of the Marriott School of Management and Director of the School of Accountancy at BYU. He earned a Bachelor's degree from BYU and Masters and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Illinois.

Dr. Skousen has been a consultant to the Financial Executive Research Foundation, the Controller General of the United States, the Federal Trade Commission and to several large companies. During the summer of 1969, he was a Faculty Resident on the staff of the Securities and Exchange Commission in Washington, D.C. During the summer of 1973, he was a Faculty Fellow with Price Waterhouse & Co., in Los Angeles. Dr. Skousen currently serves on the board of directors of several corporations.

Dr. Skousen taught at the University of Illinois and the University of Minnesota prior to joining the faculty at BYU. Professor Skousen was appointed to a nine-member National Commission on Professional Accounting Education in 1982. Dr. Skousen held the J. Willard and Alice S. Marriott Chair of Management at BYU from 1989-1998. Dr. Skousen is the author or co-author of more than 50 articles, research reports and books, including: "An Introduction to the SEC," "Intermediate Accounting," "Accounting: Concepts and Applications," and "Financial Accounting." Fred and his wife, Julie, have five sons, one daughter and 20 grandchildren.



TOM HOLMOE
Director of Athletics

On March 1, 2005, President Cecil O. Samuelson announced the appointment of Tom Holmoe as Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University. Holmoe is the 12th athletics director in school history and the first to oversee both the men's and women's sports programs.

A former Cougar defensive back from 1978-82, Holmoe returned to BYU in July 2001 as Associate Athletic Director of Development. As part of his responsibilities, he supervised the Cougar Club, served as the department's liaison with the LDS Foundation and worked on the capital campaign to raise funds for the University's new athletic facilities. Holmoe took over an athletic department that was consolidated from separate men's and women's programs in September 2004. For nearly six months until his appointment, Holmoe served as co-chair of a transitional team given the responsibility of merging the two athletic programs – including 21 athletic teams – into one organizational structure.

A native of La Crescenta, Calif., Holmoe came to BYU on a football scholarship in 1978. He became a starter as a sophomore in 1980 and led the Western Athletic Conference with seven interceptions. Holmoe went on to earn first-team Western Athletic Conference honors as a senior in 1982 and was selected in the fourth round of the 1983 NFL draft by the San Francisco 49ers. During his five years at BYU, the Cougars won five straight WAC titles. In his seven-year NFL career, Holmoe played on three Super Bowl teams with the San Francisco 49ers in 1984, 1988 and 1989. In addition, he won a fourth title as the 49ers secondary coach in 1994.

After retiring from pro football, Holmoe entered the coaching ranks, returning to BYU to serve as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards in 1990 and 1991. Holmoe then accepted an offer from Bill Walsh to become the Stanford secondary coach in 1992, where he remained for two seasons. The Cardinal was PAC-10 tri-champions in 1992 with a 10-3 overall record, including a win over Penn State in the Blockbuster Bowl. In 1994, Holmoe returned to the 49ers, serving as George Seifert's defensive backfield coach for two seasons. Two years later in 1996, Holmoe

joined the University of California staff as defensive coordinator under Steve Mariucci. Following Mariucci's departure to the NFL, Holmoe assumed duties as head coach of the Golden Bears' football program from 1997 until resigning after the 2001 season.

Holmoe graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology in 1983 and received a Master's degree from BYU in athletic administration in 1995. He and his wife, Lori, live in Provo with their four children.

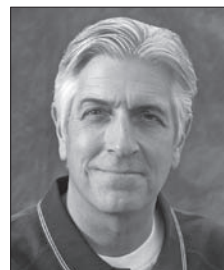

TOP OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West Conference has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MWC continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its seventh year, the MWC has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the unparalleled Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet - the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West), the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State and the southwestern flavor of New Mexico and Texas.

The Mountain West Conference was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions - Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, New

Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming - decided to form a new NCAA Division IA intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from the former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long standing athletic rivalries. Five of the MWC's eight members have been conference rivals since the 1960's (BYU, Utah, New Mexico, Wyoming, Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longstanding members as well. UNLV entered the fold in 1996, and TCU in 2005.

This fall, CSTV Networks and the Mountain West Conference kickoff an unprecedented 14-year relationship to offer the most in-depth coverage ever, centered around one Division I-A conference. The centerpiece of this historic relationship is the launch of The mtn. ("the mountain")—MountainWest Sports Network, the first-ever Super Regional Sports Network serving the Mountain West Conference 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

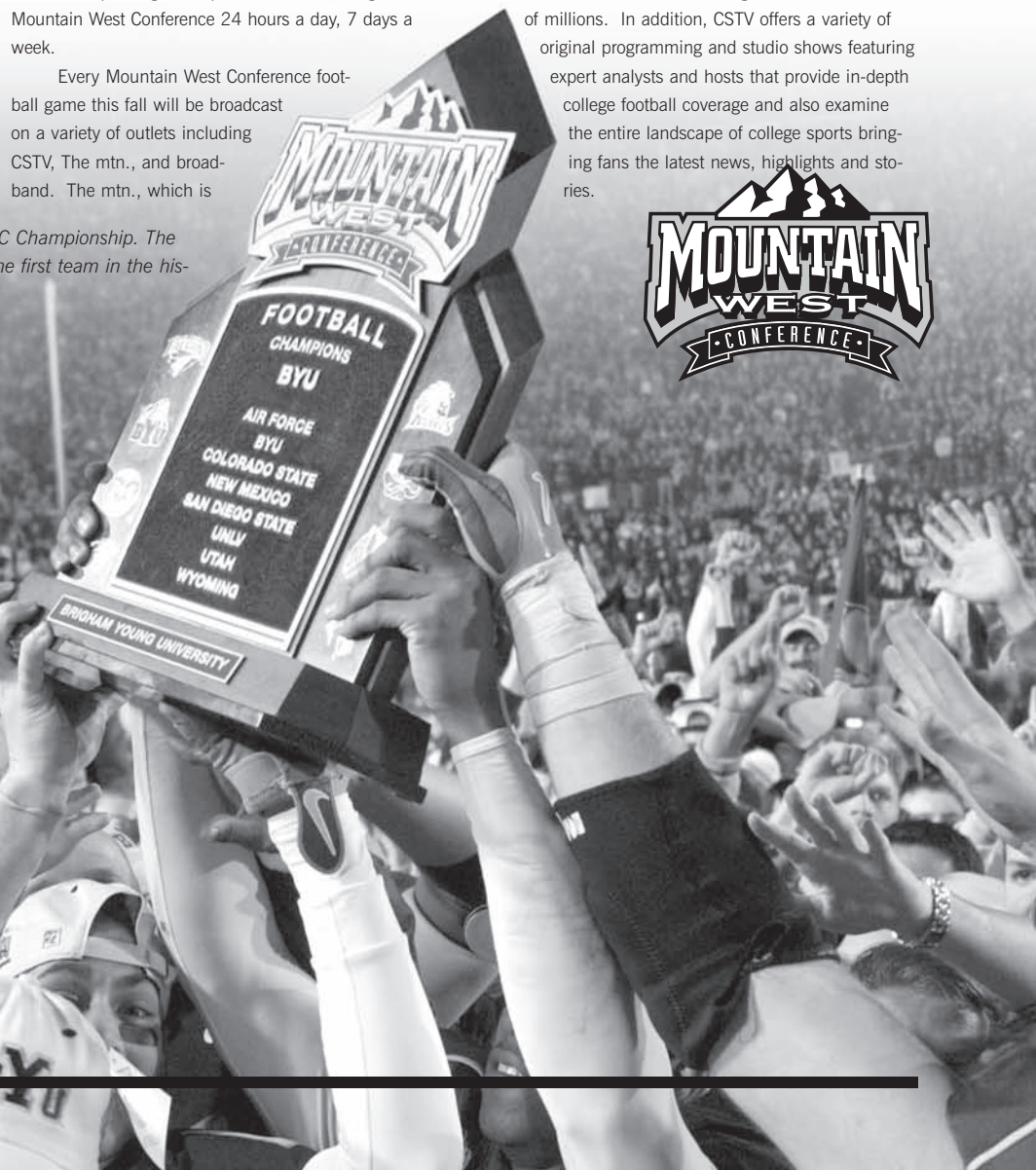
Every Mountain West Conference football game this fall will be broadcast on a variety of outlets including CSTV, The mtn., and broadband. The mtn., which is

powered by CSTV, will also offer localized studio programming, news and information and original programming surrounding the games including an extensive roster of coaches' shows, press conferences and innovative coverage of Media Day events. The Mountain West Conference puts the fans first, which is why The mtn. will primarily broadcast football on Saturday afternoons at fan friendly kickoff times.

In addition to football, The mtn. will feature coverage of every Mountain West Conference sport, including men's and women's basketball, women's volleyball, soccer, softball, baseball, and much more.

CSTV is the 24-hour college sports network owned by CBS Corporation. It covers more college sports and more schools, across more platforms than any other network. CSTV is a national network built to connect passionate college sports fans to their favorite sports and teams. During the 2006 season CSTV will air a comprehensive slate of 19 MWC football games to its audience of millions. In addition, CSTV offers a variety of original programming and studio shows featuring expert analysts and hosts that provide in-depth college football coverage and also examine the entire landscape of college sports bringing fans the latest news, highlights and stories.

A LOOK AT THE 2006 SCHEDULE

The Mountain West Conference 2006 football schedule is comprised of 72 games, including 36 conference match-ups. The Mountain West will begin its eighth season of football competition Labor Day weekend with an eight-game schedule. San Diego State opens the 2006 campaign hosting UTEP on Thursday, August 31. Conference play begins September 23 with San Diego State hosting Utah and Air Force visiting Wyoming. Eighteen of the league's 35 non-conference games are against teams that earned bowl berths in 2005 including Boise State (twice), Boston College, Colorado, Fresno State, Iowa State, Missouri, Nevada (twice), Navy, Notre Dame, Texas Tech, Tulsa, UCLA, UTEP (twice), Virginia and Wisconsin. 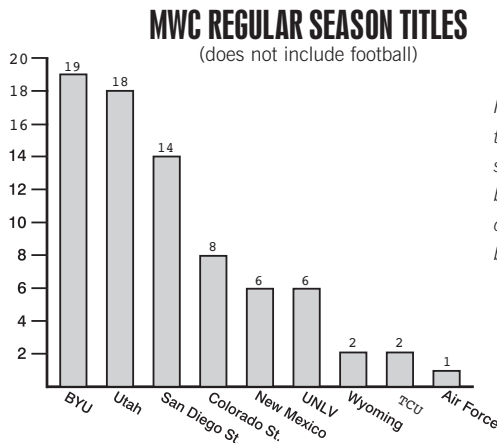
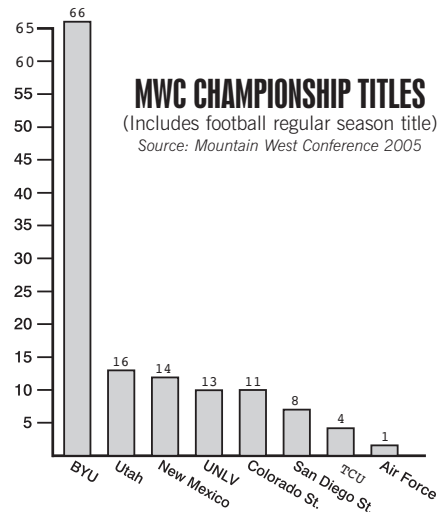

COUGARS LEAD MWC IN HOME ATTENDANCE

BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all six years of the league's existence, averaging 58,204 fans per game since the 1999 season. In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-seven crowds.



In the seven year history of the Mountain West Conference, the Cougars have won 66 of 132 conference championships. That is 50 percent of all championships awarded by the conference, or as many championships as all other conference schools combined. In 2000-2001, BYU won all but three conference championships (16-19).

MWC COACHES

Air Force head coach Fisher DeBerry carries the torch in terms of longevity in the Mountain West Conference. DeBerry has coached 21 seasons at the Academy, followed by Colorado State's Sonny Lubick with 12 seasons under his belt in Fort Collins. Rocky Long of New Mexico is third on the list as he enters the ninth season at the helm of his alma mater. TCU head coach Gary Patterson enters his seventh year, while Wyoming's Joe Glenn enters his fourth campaign in Laramie. Bronco Mendenhall of BYU, Mike Sanford of UNLV and Utah's Kyle Whittingham are each entering their second seasons at their respective institutions. The Mountain West will welcome one new head coach in 2006, San Diego State's Chuck Long who takes over for the Aztecs after serving as the Offensive Coordinator for Oklahoma from 2002-05.

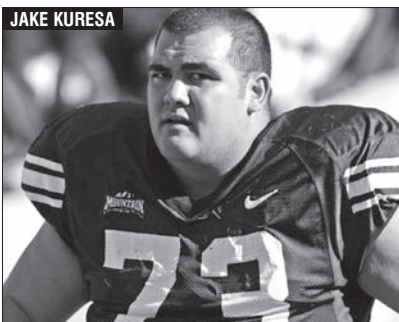

Since 1999, the MWC has posted an 11-11 bowl record. Below is a list of bowls that have a tie-in with the Mountain West Conference in 2006.

LAS VEGAS BOWL

The Pac-10 and the Mountain West meet in the "Entertainment Capital of the World" Las Vegas on December 22 at Sam Boyd Stadium. Last year, BYU nearly pulled off an amazing fourth-quarter comeback against Cal in the 14th annual Las Vegas Bowl. The BYU vs. Cal game also set an attendance record for the up-and-coming bowl game. The Mountain West Conference has a 4-3 record against the PAC-10 in the Las Vegas Bowl.

POINSETTIA BOWL

The San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, in its second year, will match a team from the Mountain West Conference against an at-large opponent. A 7 p.m. kickoff is set for this year's game that will be played on Tuesday, December 19 at Qualcomm Stadium. The Poinsettia Bowl was established by the organizers of the Holiday Bowl and they get the No. 2 choice of Mountain West Teams.

FORT WORTH BOWL

The PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl signed a bowl agreement with the MWC that runs through the 2009 football campaign. It not only assures the Fort Worth Bowl access to one of the top three selections from the Mountain West, it also allows access to TCU's participation in the game and the possible selection of the MWC football champion in any given year. The 2006 Fort Worth Bowl matches a team from Conference USA against an opponent from the MWC.

NEW MEXICO BOWL

Owned by ESPN, the newly created college football bowl game will be played at the University of New Mexico's University Stadium in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The game will match a team from the Mountain West Conference against a team from the Western Athletic Conference on Saturday, December 23 and will be televised by ESPN.

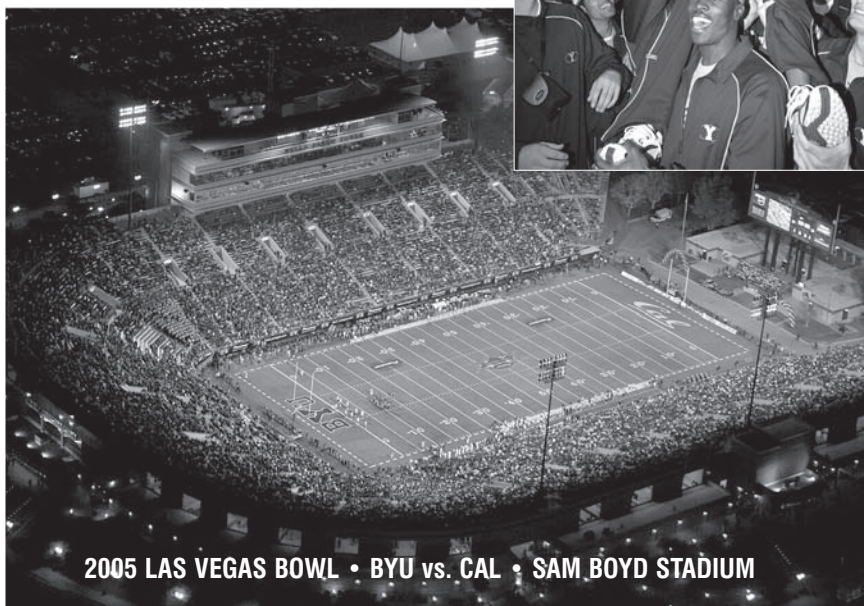

THE MWC AND THE BCS

With the addition of a fifth BCS bowl game in 2006, Bowl Championship Series officials announced modifications to the at-large qualification requirements. Instead of having to finish in the top 12 of the final BCS standings, teams finishing in the top 14 will now be eligible for a BCS game.

- Any Division I-A team is eligible for at-large consideration.
- Automatic qualifiers: No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the final BCS standings. Big East, Big Ten, SEC, Pac10, Big 12 and ACC champions and Notre Dame (if it finishes in the top eight).
- A non-automatic qualifying BCS team that finishes in the top 12, or in the top 16 if they're ahead of a BCS champion.

It all started on October 14, 1922. Well, according to BYU, anyway. Utah claims the first meeting between the schools was on April 6, 1896, when BYU was still Brigham Young Academy.

It's just one of many things the two schools don't agree on. The Academy played Utah six times between 1896 and 1898, before Provo could officially boast its own full-fledged university. Each team won three games.

The Cougars and the Utes have built a strong tradition of intense competition in the 83 years of the rivalry. With the exception of the war years from 1943-45, the two schools have faced each other every year since 1922.

The Utes dominated the series early on, avoiding defeat until 1942, when the Cougars finally won, 12-7, in Salt Lake City behind Coach Floyd Millet. The success was short-lived, however, as it took BYU another 16 years to win another contest, 14-7, again in Salt Lake City in 1958. In all, Utah won 34 of the first 40 contests, four of which were ties.

In 1965, the momentum began to turn in BYU's favor. The Cougars took three in a row from the Utes from 1965-67, and although Utah won the next four,

the competition had become much more interesting.

In 1972, the series took on an entirely different feeling with the arrival of LaVell Edwards as BYU's new head coach. He took on a program that had gone 5-38-4 (.149) against its fiercest rival and proceeded to post a 22-7 (.757) record against Utah in 29 years, including wins in 15 of his first 16 meetings with the Utes. In the Edwards era, the Cougars outscored the Utes an average of 34.9 to 20.9 per contest. Coach Edwards' career included winning streaks of nine (1979-87) and six (1972-77) games against Utah.

The annual showdown generates considerable interest throughout the state, making it a virtual certainty that whatever stadium the teams play in will be sold out well in advance. In all, seven of Utah's top ten home crowds before the expansion of Rice-Eccles Stadium were for games against BYU.

Meanwhile, 45 miles south in Provo, the grudge match has accounted for five of the 20 largest crowds in the history of LaVell Edwards Stadium.

One of the more memorable moments in the rivalry was the 1989 contest in which the Cougars pasted the Utes, 70-31, in Provo. It was a game in which the home team scored touchdowns in each of its first seven possessions and in all eight with Ty Detmer as quarterback. In a move of mercy, Detmer was replaced by backup Sean Covey late in the second quarter.

Then there were the infamous back-to-back, 34-31, losses at the hands of the Utes in 1993 and 1994, giving rebirth to a rivalry that had become ridiculously lopsided in the 80s and early 90s. In all, the Utes won three in a row (1993-95) under coach Ron McBride.

The Cougars responded to the new aggression in 1996 with

a dominating, 37-17, victory in Salt Lake City. BYU employed an extremely unconventional approach, gaining 376 yards in 63 attempts on the ground and attempting only 12 passes.

In 1998, a well-placed ESPN microphone picked up an audible “clank” as the potential game-winning kick bounced off the right goal post, allowing BYU to escape with a, 26-24, victory — despite Ron McBride's sideline prayer, as captured on national television.

BYU let the Utes back into the game after having seemingly put the game away in the fourth quarter, allowing Utah to set up a 32-yard field goal to win the game. BYU fans gave credit to divine intervention as the chip shot mysteriously hooked to the right at the last possible moment.

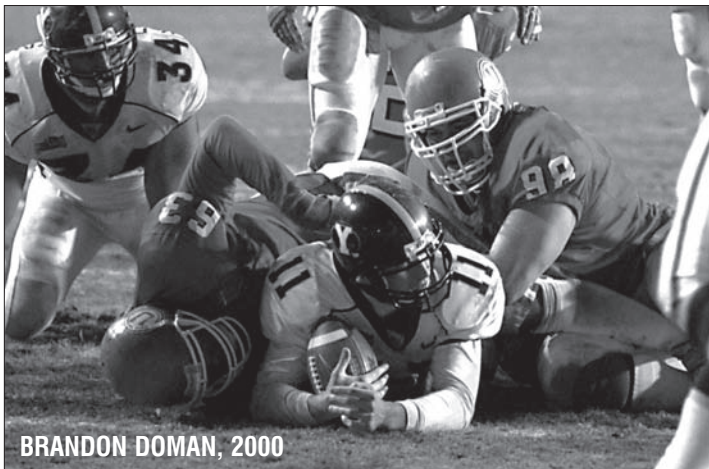
In 2000 LaVell Edwards worked his magic for the last time as Brandon Doman's touchdown with 23 seconds remaining finished an amazing last minute comeback to send the legendary BYU coach out a winner.

Provo has been much more friendly to the Cougars over the years, as BYU has posted a 13-16-1 record overall at home but has only managed a 15-31-3 record on the road against the Utes. Lately home field advantage seems to have become less of a factor, as the Utes won three straight at Edwards Stadium (1995, '97, '99) and the Cougars won three in a row in Salt Lake City (1996, 1998, 2000).

In 2001, BYU changed the trend in a miraculous, come-from-behind victory in Provo. With less than four minutes left in the game and down 11 points, BYU's hopes for a perfect season seemed dim. But Luke Staley scored two touchdowns in just over two minutes to erase the deficit and give the Cougars the 24-21 victory. The game was far from over after Staley's 30-yard touchdown. Lance Rice led Utah on a final drive in the last minute. Rice converted a key fourth-and-10 with a trick play, advancing the ball to the BYU 30-yard line. But on the very next play, Jernaro Gilford stepped in front of a Rice pass and intercepted the ball to seal the game.

In 2002 Utah beat the Cougars for the first time since 1994 in Salt Lake. The 13-6 Ute victory was not without controversy. BYU quarterback Lance Pendleton was stripped of the football on the goal line, but replays later showed that his knee was down before the strip.

In 2003 BYU held Utah to just three points on a snowy day in Provo. Only problem was, BYU was without offensive threat Reynaldo Brathwaite and its top quarterbacks. BYU's offense sputtered and the Utes gave BYU its first shutout since 1975 (Ending an NCAA record 361 consecutive games without a shutout). Meanwhile the win also gave Utah its first outright league championship since 1957. In 2005 BYU erased a 21-point halftime deficit and forced the game into overtime only to come up just short. John Beck's fourth down pass just missed the fingertips of Michael Reed as BYU fell 41-34 in OT.

In 2000 the Cougars led throughout the game only to fall behind 26-27 on a Matt Nickel TD reception with 2 minutes to play. Behind the heart of Brandon Doman and a little fate, BYU converted on a 4th down conversion with less than a minute to play. Then Doman connected with senior Jonathan Pittman along the sideline before Luke Staley took the ball inside Utah's 10-yard line. From there Doman scored with 23 seconds remaining on a quarterback sweep right to give BYU the miraculous come-from-behind victory (photo above).

A STEP FORWARD IN 2005

A LOOK BACK AT LAST SEASON

Under the direction of first-year coach Bronco Mendenhall, the Cougars finished the 2005 regular season with a winning record for the first time since 2001. BYU was 6-6 overall and finished second in the Mountain West Conference at 5-3.

The Cougars made several changes in the offense in preparation for the 2005 season, including a coaching change. Following the resignation of Gary Crowton, the Cougars promoted Bronco Mendenhall to head coach from his previous position as defensive coordinator.

Mendenhall brought former Cougar Robert Anae on as offensive coordinator and named Brandon Doman, the quarterback of the 2001 team that finished 12-2, the quarterbacks coach. Also new to the staff was Patrick Higgins, who was hired as the receivers coach.

Mendenhall also made the decision to switch back to the traditional uniforms, while maintaining the navy blue, worn by all of the great BYU teams with the traditional Y logo on the helmets.

With a new staff that focused on effort and discipline, and uniforms that evoked the tradition of the glory days, the Cougars kicked off the 2005 season at home against Boston College. Despite the excitement for the new season, BYU was unable to crack the Eagles' defense and the Cougars fell 20-3. Despite the offensive struggles, BYU showed signs of its potential as John Beck completed a conference and Edward's Stadium record 41 passes on 60 attempts for 330 yards. The Cougars also proved to be a disciplined team in the first game, recording no turnovers.

BYU gave Mendenhall his first win the next weekend as the Cougars defeated Division I-AA opponent Eastern Illinois, 45-10. Curtis Brown scored the team's first touchdown of the season on BYU's first possession of the game and from there the Cougars built a 31-0

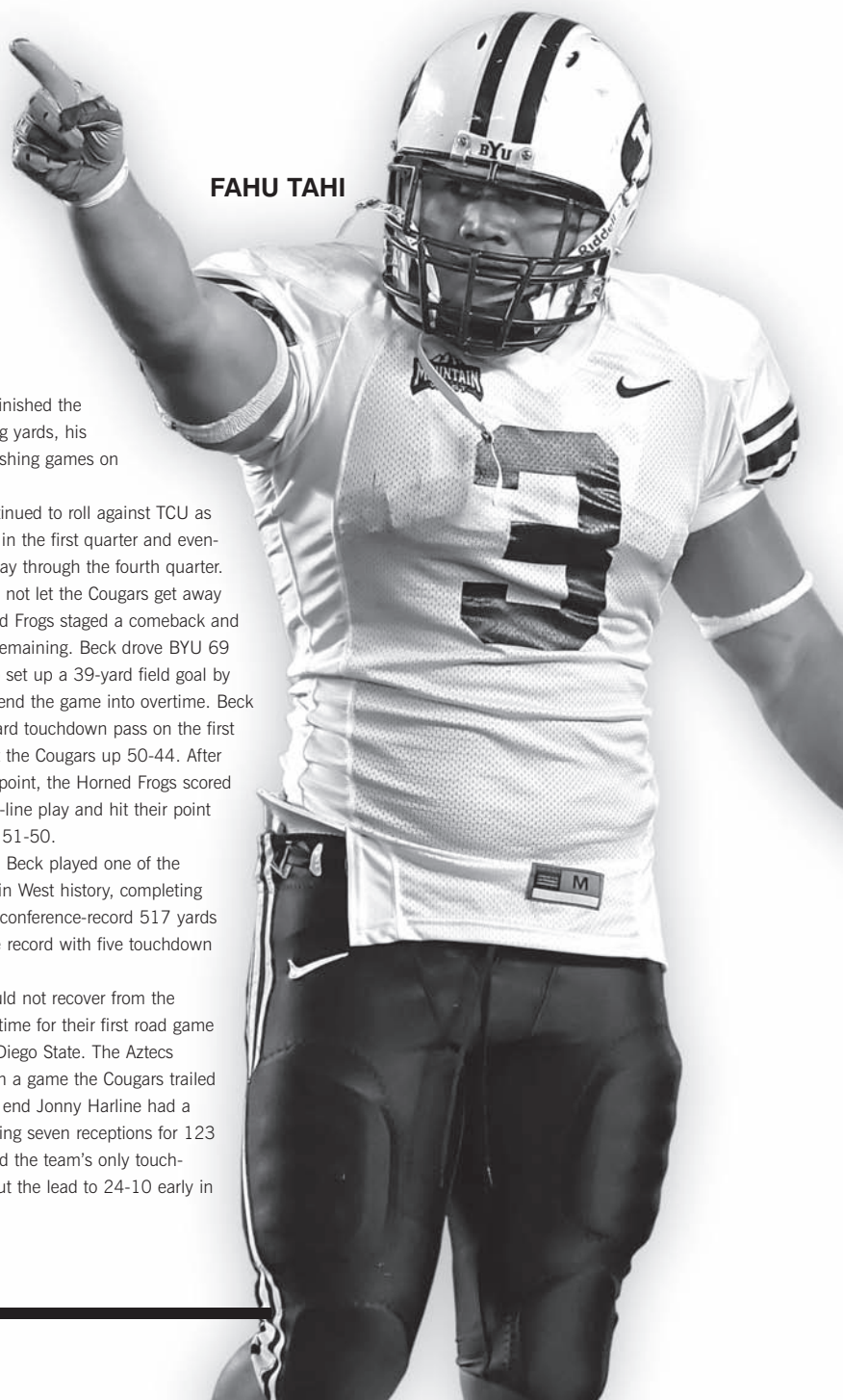
halftime lead. Brown finished the game with 110 rushing yards, his first of six 100-yard rushing games on the season.

The offense continued to roll against TCU as BYU scored 21 points in the first quarter and eventually led 41-29 midway through the fourth quarter. Newcomer TCU would not let the Cougars get away however, as the Horned Frogs staged a comeback and led 44-41 with 1:25 remaining. Beck drove BYU 69 yards on eight plays to set up a 39-yard field goal by Jared McLaughlin to send the game into overtime. Beck hit Watkins on a 25-yard touchdown pass on the first play of overtime to put the Cougars up 50-44. After BYU missed the extra point, the Horned Frogs scored on a controversial goal-line play and hit their point after to claim the win, 51-50.

Despite the loss, Beck played one of the best games in Mountain West history, completing 30-of-51 passes for a conference-record 517 yards and tying a conference record with five touchdown passes.

The Cougars could not recover from the heart-breaking loss in time for their first road game of the season, at San Diego State. The Aztecs defeated BYU 31-10 in a game the Cougars trailed 17-3 at the half. Tight end Jonny Harline had a breakout game, recording seven receptions for 123 yards. Fahu Tahī scored the team's only touchdown of the night to cut the lead to 24-10 early in

the fourth, but San Diego State responded two minutes later with another touchdown to seal the victory.

On the road for the second-straight week and standing at 1-3 overall and 0-2 in the conference, BYU picked up an important, come-from-behind, 27-24 win over New Mexico. Despite scoring first, the Cougars could not maintain a lead and trailed 24-13 at the end of the third quarter. With the Lobos driving and looking to add to their lead, Markell Staffieri recovered a New Mexico fumble on the BYU seven. The Cougars then scored on a nine-yard run by Borwn, capping a 93-yard, 13-play drive to pull within five.

BYU regained possession with 2:48 remaining in the game and Beck completed five-consecutive passes for a total of 80 yards, the final completion coming on a 23-yard scoring strike to Matt Allen to put the Cougars ahead 25-24. Brown converted on the two-point conversion to make the score 27-24. The defense held and Mendenhall recorded his first win over a Division I-A school and his first victory in the conference.

Following the New Mexico win, the Cougars put together another solid performance, defeating Colorado State, 24-14, at home. After a scoreless first quarter, Brown scored on a four-yard run and Beck completed a two-yard touchdown pass to Daniel Coats to put BYU up 14-0. McLaughlin hit a 28-yard field goal to put the Cougars up 17-0 before the Rams scored consecutive touchdowns to cut the lead to three.

Brown clinched the game for BYU with a two-yard touchdown run late in the fourth. He finished the game with 147 yards and two touchdowns and Tahi had 86 yards.

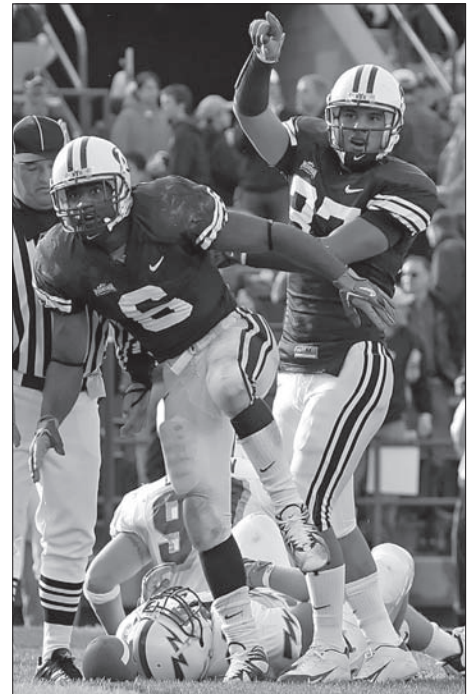
The next week, the Cougars went on the road to play No. 9 Notre Dame and kept the game close before the Irish ran away and won 49-23. BYU scored first on a field goal and after a Notre Dame touchdown, Harline caught a 12-yard touchdown pass from Beck to give the Cougars a 10-7 lead. The Irish then scored the next 21 points to take a 28-10 lead early in the fourth quarter. BYU then went to work, scoring on a 10-yard run by Beck, who on the Cougars' next possession, tossed a 10-yard scoring pass to Watkins to cut the lead to 28-23.

Notre Dame then scored twice within a 2:31 period at the end of the third quarter and added one more in the fourth to put the game out of reach. Beck completed 26-of-45 passes for 317 yards and two touchdowns to lead BYU.

The next weekend the Cougars were back in Edward's Stadium for a conference matchup with Air Force. BYU dominated the first three quarters, outscoring the Falcons 41-14 as Beck threw for three touchdowns and Brown and Nathan Meikle each added scores on the ground. The Falcons made a run in the fourth, scoring 27 points, cutting the lead to 48-34. Brown kept the BYU offense rolling, scoring three touchdowns to ensure the 62-41 victory.

The day belonged to Brown as he ran for career-highs of 219 yards and four touchdowns. As a team, the Cougars amassed 300 yards on 42 carries. Beck also had an impressive game, passing for 383 yards and three scores. The game marked the first time BYU passed and ran for over 300 yards the Utah game in 1989. The defense also recorded five takeaways.

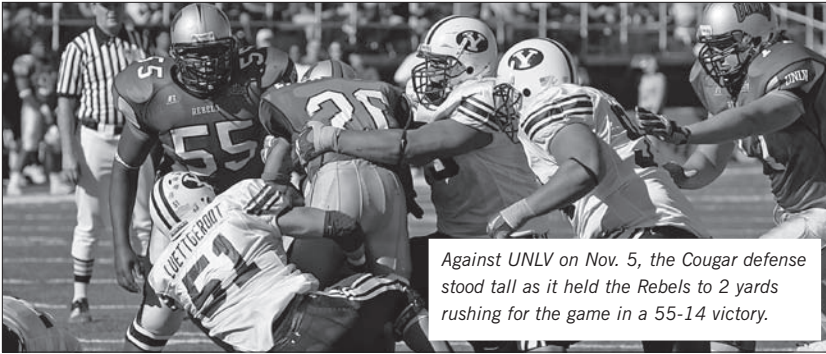
Against UNLV, the Cougars were again dominant on offense while also putting together a solid defensive performance, forcing three turnovers. BYU



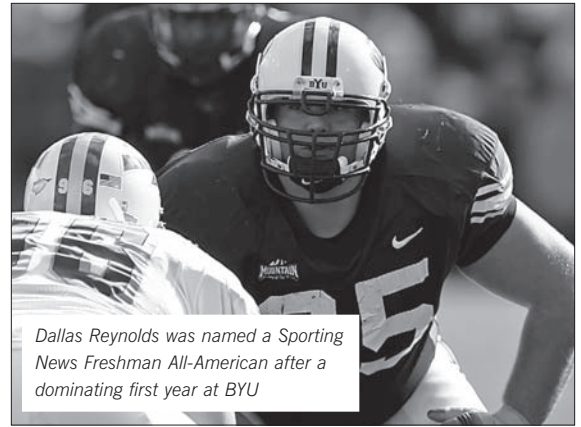

played a balanced offensive game, rushing for 224 yards and passing for 279. The game was tied at seven early in the second quarter before the Cougars scored 34-unanswered points to take a 41-7 lead. The Rebels added one more score before BYU tacked on 14 more in the fourth quarter. Beck threw for 267 yards and two touchdowns while Tahi ran 11 times for 62 yards and two scores. Wayne Latu came off the bench and ran 15 times for 93 yards and a touchdown.

The Cougars played their final game on the road at Wyoming. The Cowboys struck first, scoring on the games' first drive. BYU answered, scoring two-consecutive touchdowns before Wyoming scored again to tie the game at 14. The Cougars scored two more to take a 28-14 lead into the half.

The Cowboys came out strong in the third quarter, scoring on their first drive to cut the BYU lead to 28-21. They threatened to tie the game, but Justin Luetterodt recovered a fumble deep in Cougar territory and the offense took over, driving 94 yards on 10 plays and scoring on a six-yard pass from Beck to Harline to make the score 35-21 to put the game out of reach. Luetterodt recovered a fumble in each of the first three quarters and recorded an interception in the fourth. He recovered four of Wyoming's five turnovers on the day. With 153 yards on 25 carries, Brown had his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season and 10th of his career, tying for the

most career 100-yard rushing games in BYU history. He also added two touchdowns on the day.

The win at Wyoming made the Cougars 6-4 overall and 5-2 in the conference, clinching a winning regular season for the first time since 2001 and giving BYU at least a share of second place in the conference.

The Cougars returned home the next weekend for the season finale, a matchup with instate rival Utah. BYU struggled on both sides of the ball in the first half, falling behind 24-3. The Cougars stormed back in the second half, scoring on three of four possessions in the third quarter to cut the lead to three at 31-24. Brown scored twice in the quarter, the second on a 64-yard run, the longest of his career and the longest run from scrimmage by a BYU player in 2005.

Utah opened the fourth quarter with a field goal to go up 10 at 34-24 but the Cougars came back once again, scoring 10-more to tie the game and send it into overtime. The Utes started overtime with the ball and scored on their second play. BYU came out and failed to convert on fourth down when Beck threw a pass into the endzone, just out of reach of the outstretch arms of Michael Reed.

Brown ran for 153 yards and two touchdowns, giving him 11 100-yard rushing games on the season, the most 100-yard games in Cougar history. Beck threw for 309 yards and two touchdowns, giving him

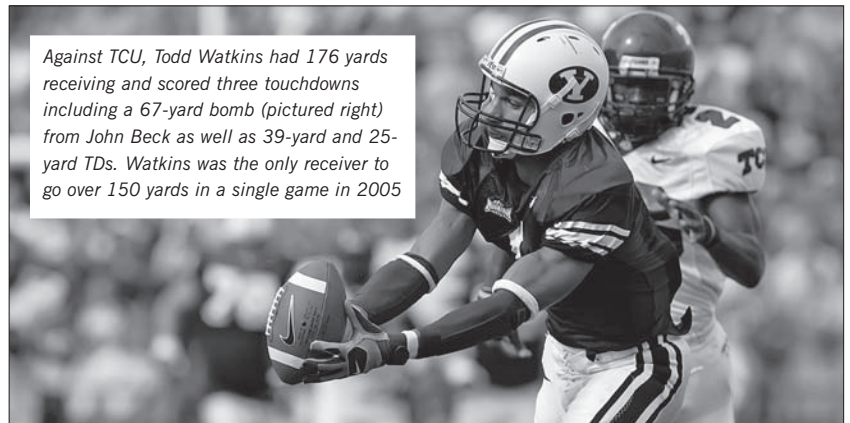
10-career 300 yard passing games, ninth best in BYU history. Brown finished the regular season with 1,123 rushing yards becoming the first Cougar to run for over 1,000 yards in one season. Beck had 3,709 yards on the year, the first time since 2001 a BYU quarterback has thrown for over 3,000 yards.

Several Cougars were honored for their performances throughout the season. Brown was named MWC Offensive Player of the Week for his performances against Air Force and Wyoming. Beck was also a two-time honoree, earning conference accolades for his play against TCU and New Mexico. Luetterodt rounded out the Cougars that were honored by the MWC as Defensive Player of the Week for his play against Wyoming. Harline was named the national John Mackey Tight End of the Week by the Nassau Country Sports Commission for his 10-reception, 123-yard performance against New Mexico. Nathan Meikle was recognized for his hard work in the classroom when CoSida and ESPN the Magazine named him second team Academic All-American.

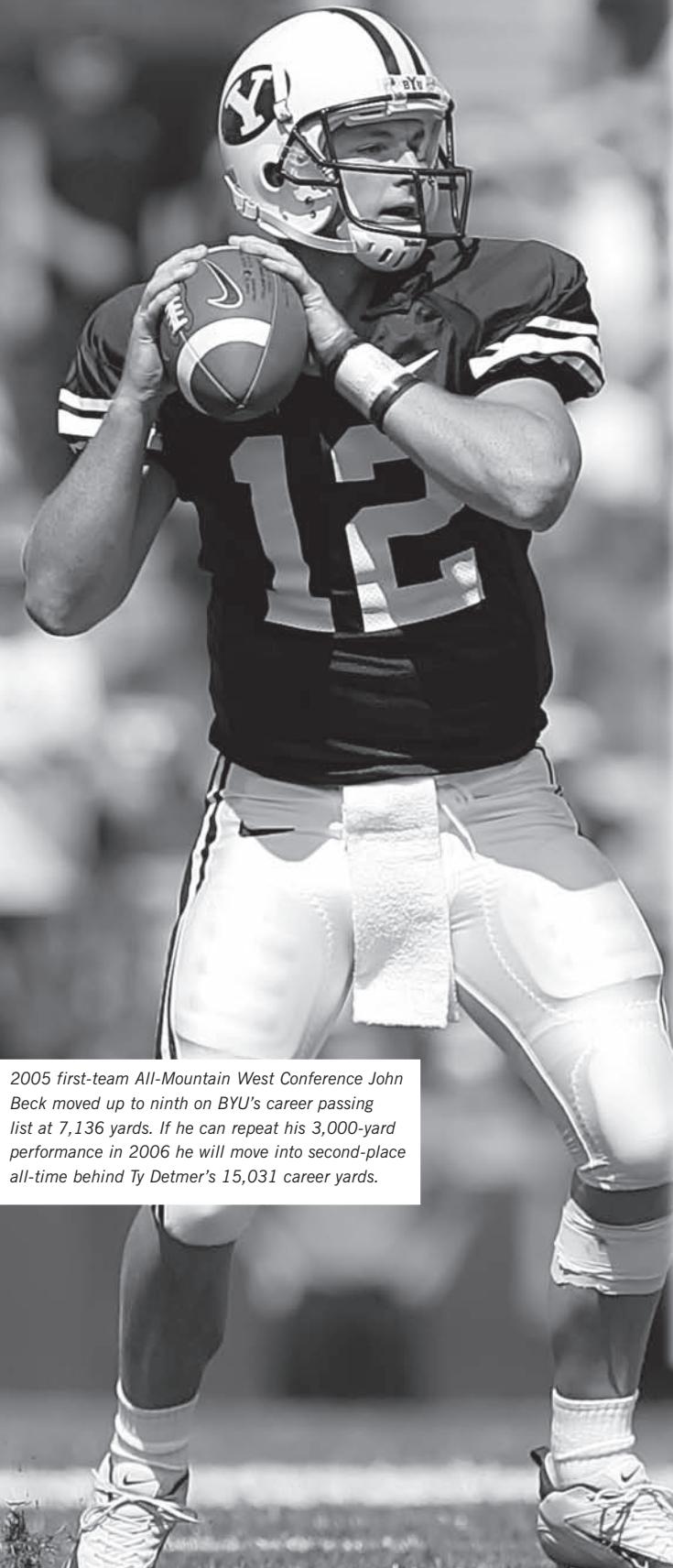
Despite falling to Utah for the fourth-consecutive year, BYU accomplished several of its goals, including finishing with a winning regular season and qualifying for a bowl.

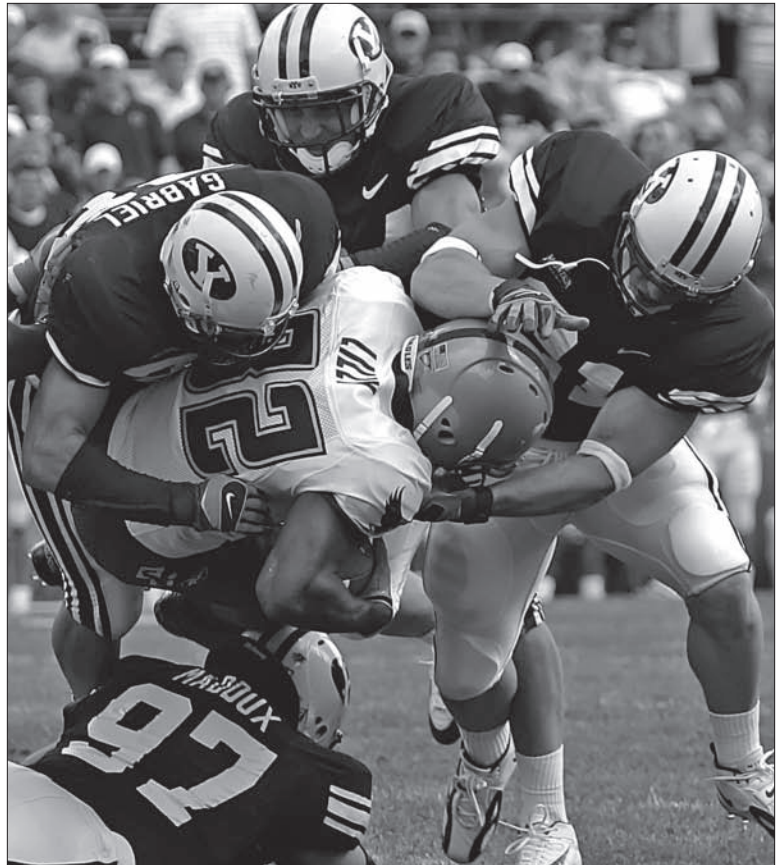

BYU VS. BOSTON COLLEGE GAME RECAP

Defense was the key for No. 22 Boston College as the Eagles handed BYU a 20-3 loss in the 2005 season opener. The loss was the Cougars' first home, season-opening loss since 1997 when they fell 42-20 to Washington. John Beck completed 41-of-60 passes for 330 yards. The 41 completions were a career high for Beck and set LaVell Edwards Stadium and Mountain West Conference records. Fahu Tahi led the way with 46 yards on eight receptions and Curtis Brown was the leading rusher with eight carries for 37 yards. Boston College struck first with 30 seconds remaining in the first quarter on a 10-play, 80-yard drive, ending with a 14-yard touchdown pass over the middle from Quinton Porter to tight end Chris Miller. The Eagles added three more points after Karim El Nokali blocked BYU's 47-yard field goal attempt. Three plays later, the 35-yard drive ended with a 39-yard field goal by Ryan Ohliger with three seconds remaining in the first half. Special teams came through for the Cougars in the third quarter when Bryan Kehl blocked a punt, which set up a 35-yard field goal by Jared McLaughlin with 10:16 remaining in the quarter. Boston College added another touchdown when Porter and Miller connected in the fourth quarter. The Eagles put the game away with a field goal by Ohliger with 4:25 remaining in the game.

BYU VS. EASTERN ILLINOIS GAME RECAP

BYU bounced back after a season-opening loss by posting a 45-10 victory over Eastern Illinois. The Cougars sprinted to a 31-0 halftime lead before finishing off the Panthers and giving Bronco Mendenhall his first victory as a head coach. The BYU rushing game was much improved from the previous week, gaining 188 yards on 32 carries. Curtis Brown led the way with 18 carries for 112 yards and a touchdown. Fahu Tahī added 59 yards on nine carries and a touchdown. Todd Watkins pulled in seven catches for 93 yards while John Beck finished the day completing 26-of-40 attempts for 255 yards and three touchdowns. The 35-point win was the Cougars' most lopsided victory since posting a 59-21 win over San Diego State on Oct. 27, 2001.

The Cougars wasted little time to show their resolve and determination, scoring on the first drive of the game. Brown ran for a one-yard score, capping an eight-play, 67-yard drive. After the Panthers fumbled a snap deep in their own territory, BYU scored another touchdown just two plays later when John Beck picked up a one-yard touchdown to give the Cougars a 14-0. BYU added a field in the first quarter following an interception by Dustin Gabriel. Senior receiver Todd Watkins got into the act during the second quarter by scoring a pair of touchdowns, including a 31-yard reception from Beck and an acrobatic 6-yard reception. Eastern Illinois took advantage of BYU miscues and scored 10-unanswered before Tahī scored twice in the fourth quarter.

BYU VS. TCU GAME RECAP

Despite a record setting performance, the Cougars lost to TCU, 51-50 in overtime and fell to 1-2 to start the season. John Beck threw for a MWC single-game record 517 yards and tied an MWC record with five touchdown passes. Todd Watkins pulled in seven catches for 176 yards and tied a conference record with three touchdown receptions. Curtis Brown played a solid game, compiling 172 total yards with nine catches for 92 yards and 23 rushes for 85 yards. It was not enough to hold off TCU as the Horned Frogs overcame the Cougars' 18-point lead and won in overtime. The comeback was fueled by backup quarterback Jeff Ballard, who entered the game in the third quarter for an injured Tye Gunn. He finished the game 8-of-12 for 150 yards and two touchdowns. The game lasted 4:42, the longest game in BYU history. BYU got out to a quick start, putting up 21 points in the first quarter. The Cougars scored on their first drive of the game on a 10-play 80-yard drive ending in a seven-yard strike from Beck to Zac Collie, his first career touchdown. Beck and Collie connected for the second time in the first quarter on a 37-yard touchdown pass, putting the Cougars up 21-10. BYU led 41-29 in the fourth quarter before TCU scored 15 unanswered points to take the lead. The Cougars then drove the ball 69 yards in eight plays and Jared McLaughlin hit the game-tying, 39-yard field goal to send the game into overtime.

On the first play of overtime, Beck connected with Watkins for a 25-yard touchdown. However, BYU fumbled the snap on the extra-point attempt and failed to convert. TCU then put together a four-play, 25-yard drive that ended in a controversial touchdown call when TCU's Rodgers appeared to fumble the ball on the goal line. After reviewing the play, the officials stuck with the ruling on the field. TCU's Chris Manfredini put the extra point through the uprights to give TCU the victory.

BYU VS. SAN DIEGO STATE GAME RECAP

San Diego State's Lynell Hamilton racked up 161 yards rushing with two touchdowns and the Aztecs kept the Cougars offense in check and defeated BYU 31-10. The loss dropped the Cougars to 1-3 overall and 0-2 in the conference. A week after posting 50 points and 614 yards, the Cougars found it difficult to move the ball against the Aztecs. SDSU held the Cougars to just 305 total yards on the night, including only 44 yards rushing and 261 yards passing. Jonny Harline led the Cougars' with 123 yards on seven receptions, while Fahu Tahī had a team-high eight receptions for 80 yards. John Beck was 25-of-49 for 261 yards, while Tahī also led the running game with 33 yards rushing and one touchdown. After a scoreless first quarter, the Aztecs struck in the second quarter when Kevin O'Connell scored on a six-yard run. O'Connell's touchdown run capped a 13-play drive that covered 80 yards. On the Aztecs' next drive, O'Connell found receiver Jeff Webb for a 50-yard completion, setting up a 30-yard Garrett Palmer field goal that extended the lead to 10-0. With 4:51 left in the second quarter, Bryan Kehl recovered an SDSU fumble at the Aztec's 40-yard line. Seven plays later, Jared McLaughlin nailed a 33-yard field goal to get the Cougars on the board. San Diego State extended its lead to 17-3 after Hamilton scored on a one-yard run right before the half. In the second half, the Aztecs picked up where they left off, capitalizing on a Beck fumble and scoring seven plays later on Brandon Bornes' 4-yard touchdown run. Faced with a first-and-30 from the BYU 34-yard line, the Cougars managed to get the offense rolling. Fahu Tahī scored on a one-yard run with 13:12 left in the fourth quarter. San Diego State answered on the following drive with Hamilton scoring on a six-yard run to give the Aztecs a commanding 31-10 lead.

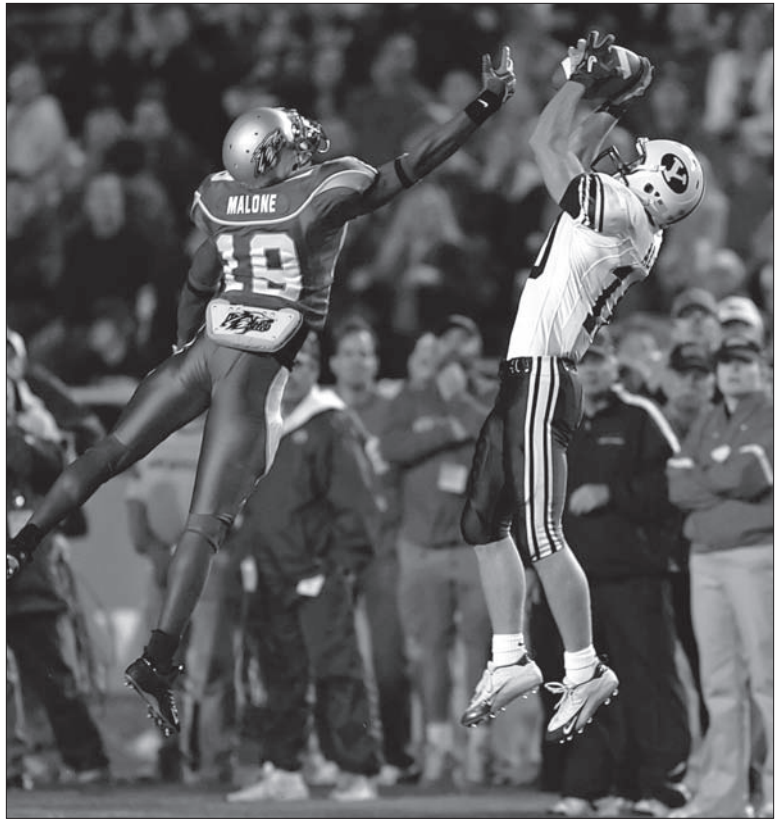

BYU VS. NEW MEXICO GAME RECAP

The Cougars gave BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall his first Division I-A victory, scoring 14 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to claim a 27-24 come-from-behind victory over New Mexico. John Beck finished the night with a game-high 371 yards passing, completing 34-of-44 attempts with three touchdowns on the evening. Curtis Brown had a game-high 104 yards rushing while Jonny Harline had a team-high 10 receptions, equaling a season-best 123 yards. Todd Watkins added six receptions for 68 yards, including a critical 29-yard reception during the Cougars' game-winning drive. Brown totaled five catches for 35 yards. All totaled 11 receivers were credited with at least one reception against the Lobos. The defense, led by linebackers Cameron Jensen and Paul Walkenhorst held the Lobos scoreless in the fourth quarter.

Down 24-19 with less than three minutes remaining in the game, Beck led the Cougars on a five-play, 80-yard drive that ended with Matt Allen catching the 23-yard, game-winning touchdown with just 1:40 remaining in the game. Curtis Brown converted on the two-point try to extend the lead to three at 27-24. A tough defensive stand forced the Lobos to turn the ball over on downs with 45 seconds remaining, sealing the Cougars' first Mountain West victory of the season. With just under 13:00 minutes left in the game, BYU got a much-needed break when Markell Staffieri recovered a McKamey fumble on the Cougars' own seven-yard line. The Cougars marched 93 yards in 13 plays, scoring on a nine-yard run by Brown to pull within five points with 7:15 remaining in the game. Early in the first quarter, the Cougars struck first when Beck found Dan Coats for an 11-yard touchdown reception. The teams then traded touchdowns before New Mexico jumped out to a 24-13 lead in the third quarter.

BYU VS. COLORADO STATE GAME RECAP

The one-two punch of running backs Curtis Brown and Fahu Tahi was too much for Colorado State as the Cougars rolled past the Rams 24-14 on Homecoming night and handed Colorado State its first conference loss of the season. BYU racked up a 274 yards rushing, the most since BYU ran for 410 yards against Colorado State in 2001. Brown led the way with 147 yards and two touchdowns on 31 carries. Tahi gained 86 yards on 14 carries. The defense came up big for the Cougars, holding the Rams to only 30 rushing yards. The Cougar defense also had a season-high four sacks in the game with Justin Luetzgerodt leading the way with two and a half.

The Cougars struck first with 12:27 left in the second quarter on a four-yard touchdown run by Curtis Brown ending a 10-play 65-yard drive. BYU put seven more points on the scoreboard with 1:32 left in the second quarter when Daniel Coats made a spectacular catch in the back of the end zone on a two yard pass from John Beck, the only pass attempt in the quarter. The Cougars added three more on a 28-yard field goal by Jared McLaughlin with 6:40 remaining in the third quarter to go up 17-0. Colorado State scored consecutive touchdowns to cut the lead to three at 17-14. The Cougars answered with a 14-play, 76-yard drive that ended on a two-yard touchdown run by Brown with 2:07 left in the game, putting the game out of reach for the Rams.

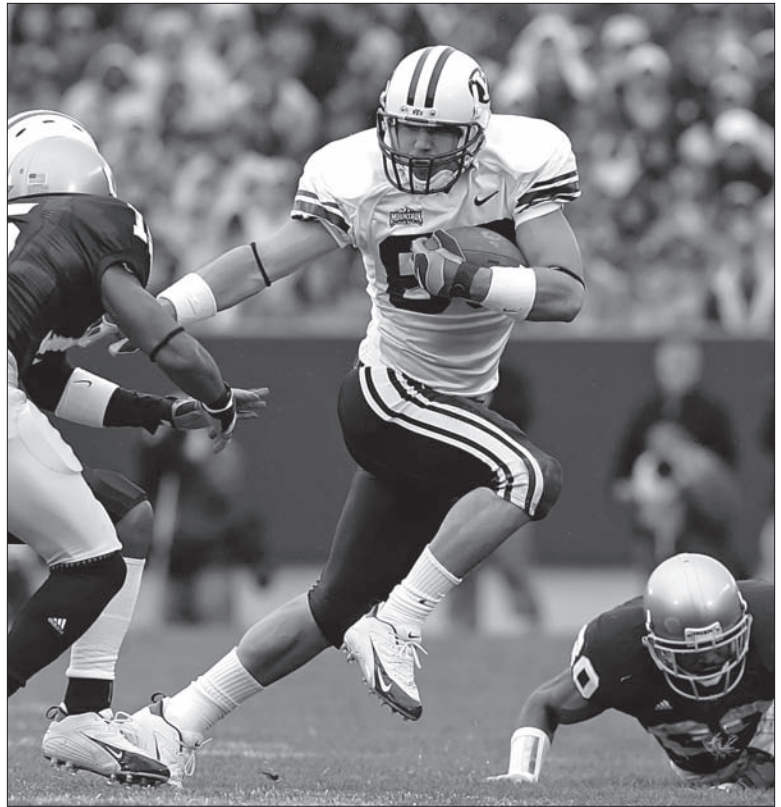

BYU VS. NOTRE DAME GAME RECAP

Despite keeping the score close for much of three quarters, the Cougars were unable to contain the Notre Dame air attack and fell 49-23 to the Irish. Irish quarterback Brady Quinn threw for a Notre Dame record six touchdowns, including a school record four TD's to receiver Maurice Stovall. John Beck completed 26-of-45 attempts for 317 yards and two touchdowns, marking his eighth-career 300-yard game. Senior running back Fahu Tahī led the Cougars with 63 yards on the ground, and added 73 yards receiving. The BYU defense held the Irish to just 44 yards rushing, limiting running back Darius Walker to just 17 yards on the night. Safety Corby Hodgkiss was credited with the Cougars' only sack of the game, stopping Quinn for a four-yard loss. The defense had four tackles for a combined loss of 20 yards. Jared McLaughlin connected on a 44-yard field goal on BYU's opening drive to give the Cougars a 3-0 lead. The Irish took the lead on the ensuing series on a 10-yard pass from Quinn under pressure to Stovall. The Cougars responded to go up 10-7 when Beck hooked up with Harline for a 12-yard touchdown to complete a 51-yard drive. Notre Dame regained the lead for good at 14-10 on Quinn's 14-yard pass to Samardzija. The Irish extended their lead to 28-10 in the second quarter before the Cougars made a run and cut the lead to 28-23. Beck scored on a 10-yard run to trim the lead to 28-17. After a Notre Dame punt, BYU cut the lead to 28-23 after Beck connected with Watkins in the endzone on a fourth-down attempt from the six-yard line. The Irish then responded with three touchdowns.

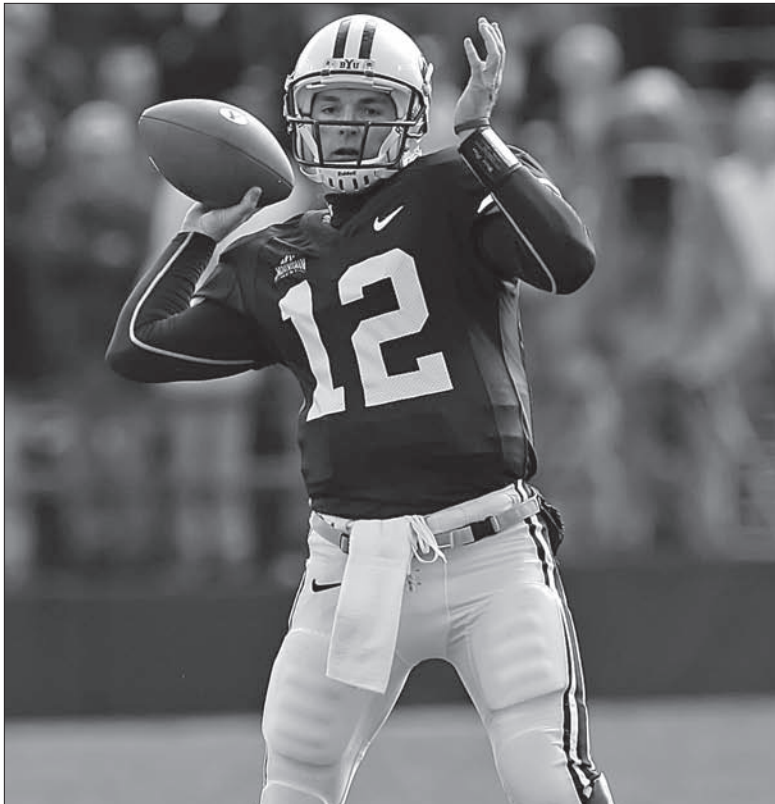

For the second consecutive year, quarterback John Beck had an impressive passing performance against the Falcons. Beck completed 31-of-43 attempts for 383 yards and three touchdowns. This was Beck's fourth 300-yard passing game on the season.

BYU VS. AIR FORCE GAME RECAP

The Cougar offense racked up 300 yards rushing and 383 yards passing for a season-high 683 yards en route to a 62-41 shootout win over Air Force. The game marked the first time since 1989 against Utah the Cougars had over 300 yards rushing and passing in the same game. The 683 yards marked the most yards the Cougars have racked up in a game since the 2001 season. In addition, the team picked up 39 first downs, equaling a team record. Curtis Brown ran for a career-high 219 yards and scored a personal-best four rushing touchdowns while John Beck completed 31-of-43 pass attempts for 383 yards, three touchdowns and one interception. Michael Reed caught five passes for 103 yards and his first-career touchdown. Air Force's backup quarterback Adam Fitch entered the game for an injured Shawn Carney and threw for 265 yards and five touchdowns.

The Cougars took a 14-0 lead in the first quarter on a 14-yard touchdown reception by Reed and a 12-yard run by Nathan Meikle, which came immediately following a fumble recovery by Justin Luetzgerodt. The Falcons scored in the second quarter before BYU added two more touchdowns, the first a six-yard run by Brown and the second a 14-yard pass from Beck to Fahu Tahī, to make the score 28-7. In the third quarter, Jared McLaughlin notched two field goals and Daniel Coats had a 15-yard touchdown reception, making the score 41-7. Air Force scored their second touchdown of the game on the last play of the third quarter with Fitch and Jason Brown hooking up for the second time on a 57-yard pass. The Falcons made it a game in the fourth, cutting the gap to two touchdowns at 48-34 and scoring a total of 27 points. The Cougars added 21 points of their own during the final frame as Curtis Brown scored three touchdowns in the quarter.

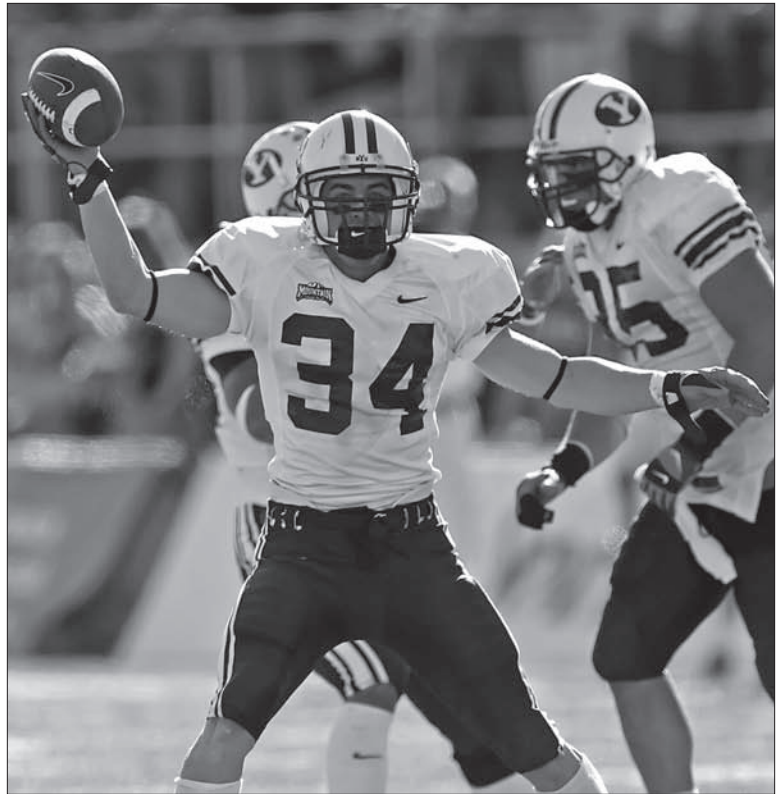

BYU VS. UNLV GAME RECAP

BYU eclipsed the 50-point plateau for the second-consecutive game in defeating UNLV 55-14 to improve to 5-4 overall and 4-2 in Mountain West Conference action. BYU held the Rebels to a season-low two yards rushing, and picked off three Rebel passes which led to 21 points. BYU also registered five sacks, led by Justin Maddux who had 3.0 sacks for a combined loss of 22 yards. Offensively, the Cougars rolled up 224 yards rushing and added 267 yards passing. John Beck passed for 267 yards and three touchdowns while completing 23-of-34 attempts. BYU's leading receiver was Jonny Harline, who had 80 yards and one touchdown on six receptions. Freshman Wayne Latu had 93 yards and one touchdown on 15 carries while Curtis Brown scored a rushing and a receiving touchdown.

The Cougars got on the board first for the fifth straight game, scoring on a one-yard run by Fahu Tahi. UNLV tied the score in the second quarter when Greg Estandia caught a five-yard touchdown pass. BYU went back ahead on the following drive on a 45-yard field goal by Jared McLaughlin. From there the Cougars broke the game open as Justin Luettgerodt picked off a pass on the Rebel's next possession and returned it to the UNLV 24-yard line. Several plays later Beck hit Todd Watkins for an 11-yard score. Another BYU interception, by Kayle Buchanan, got the ball back for the Cougars who scored six plays later on a one-yard run by Curtis Brown. BYU added another field goal before the half to take a 27-7 lead into the locker room. The Cougars continued to dominate in the second half, outscoring the Rebels 28-7 as Brown, Tahi, Harline and Latu all scored.

BYU VS. WYOMING GAME RECAP

BYU scored 21 points off five Wyoming turnovers, defeating the Cowboys 35-21 in Laramie. The win put the Cougars at 6-4 overall and 5-2 in the Mountain West, ensuring the Cougars their first winning regular season since 2001 and giving the team the necessary number of wins to become bowl eligible for the first time over that three-year span. The Cougars also clinched at least a share of second place in the league standings. Justin Luetterodt emerged as the defensive hero as he recovered with three fumble and had a fourth-quarter interception that sealed the Cougars' victory. Offensively, John Beck completed 20-of-29 attempts to 11 different receivers for 179 yards and two touchdowns. Jonny Harline had a team-high four receptions for 28 yards and two touchdown receptions. Curtis Brown tied the BYU record for career 100-yard games, picking up the 10th of his career. Brown had a game-high 153 yards on 25 carries and two touchdowns.

Wyoming took the opening drive 80 yards in just five plays to take an early 7-0 lead as Corey Bramlet connected with Jovon Bouknight for a 21-yard touchdown. On the following drive, the Cougars used a balanced attack to even the score, driving 84 yards on five rushing plays and five passing plays. Brown capped the drive with a six-yard touchdown run. Luetterodt got the ball back for BYU as he recovered a fumble and Beck found Harline for a 14-yard touchdown pass to give the Cougars a 14-7 advantage. Wynel Seldon answered with a 69-yard touchdown run to tie the score at 14. BYU responded with a methodical 17-play scoring drive that covered 89 yards and took 8:21 off the clock and ended with Brown scoring on a six-yard run to give BYU the 21-14 lead. Luetterodt was credited with his second fumble recovery on Wyoming's next drive and seven plays later, Fahu Tahi strolled into the endzone to give BYU a 28-14 lead. The Cowboys scored first in the second half and threatened to tie the score at 28 but Luetterodt came up with another fumble recovery that led to another scoring drive as Harline make a spectacular one-handed grab in the back of the endzone to make the score 35-21.

BYU erased a 21-point halftime deficit and had a chance to win the game in the final two minutes, but came up just short. Freshman Michael Reed (above) was also just short of catching this fourth-down John Beck pass in overtime as the Cougars fell to their rivals 41-34.

BYU VS. UTAH GAME RECAP

BYU concluded the 2005 regular season with a 41-34 overtime loss to Utah. Curtis Brown racked up 237 yards of total offense, including 153 rushing yards, his BYU-record 11th career 100-yard rushing game, and scored two touchdowns. Brown caught seven passes for 84 yards. John Beck completed 27-of-47 passes for 309 yards and two touchdowns. He also caught one of his own passes, which was deflected by an official, for three yards. Utah started backup quarterback Brett Ratliff, filling for injured starter Brian Johnson, who completed 17-of-32 passing attempts for 240 yards and four touchdowns. He also carried the ball 19 times for 112 yards and a touchdown.

Utah controlled the first half, scoring 14 points in the first quarter and 10 in the second while limiting the Cougars to a field goal. The Utes scored on their opening possession when Ratliff found Hernandez in the endzone on a three-yard pass. Ratliff threw another scoring pass in the first quarter and scored one rushing touchdown in the second quarter. BYU began its come back in the third when Brown scored two touchdowns within 1:33. The first was a five-yard run that capped the Cougars' first drive of the half, an eight-play, 72-yard drive. On the second play of BYU's next drive, Brown broke free for a 64-yard run to cut the lead to 24-17, the longest run of his career. Utah pushed the lead back to 14 at 31-17 when Ratliff hit Hernandez for a 48-yard score but the Cougars came right back at the end of the third when Beck hit Todd Watkins for a 13-yard touchdown. Utah pushed the lead back to 10 with a field goal in the fourth but BYU tied the score at 34 when Beck threw a 28-yard touchdown pass to Matt Allen and Jared McLaughlin kicked a 37-yard field goal. Utah had the ball first in overtime and Ratliff hit LaTendresse for the winning touchdown on the Utes' second play. BYU failed to convert on its chance in overtime as Beck's pass on fourth down fell incomplete in the endzone.

John Beck nearly led a BYU comeback in the fourth quarter against Cal in the Las Vegas Bowl. The Cougars were driving to tie the game in the final two minutes, but Beck was hit as he threw, which led to a game-sealing Cal interception. The Cougars had three touchdown drives over 90 yards against one of the Pac-10's top defenses. A Las Vegas Bowl record 40,053 fans (primarily BYU fans) witnessed a close battle in the desert.

BYU VS. CAL GAME RECAP

The Cougars concluded the 2005 season with a 35-28 loss to California in the Las Vegas Bowl. It was BYU's first bowl appearance since 2001 when the Cougars went to the Liberty Bowl. Trailing 35-14 in the fourth quarter, BYU stormed back with two touchdowns and had the ball with 2:20 remaining but John Beck was intercepted after he was hit when releasing the ball, ending the Cougars' comeback hopes. Despite the pick, Beck had a record-setting performance, completing 35-of-53 attempts for 352 yards and three touchdowns. The 35 completions, 53 attempts and 352 yards were all Las Vegas Bowl records. Nathan Meikle caught a game-high 12 passes for 95 yards while Jonny Harline had seven receptions for 73 yards and one score and Todd Watkins added five catches for 95 yards and a touchdown.

BYU fell behind 7-0 in the first quarter but scored early in the second when Beck found Curtis Brown for a 19-yard touchdown pass. California scored again but Fahu Tahi scored on a three-yard run to tie the game at 14 with 38 seconds left in the second quarter. The Golden Bears struck again before the half, going 58 yards in 27 seconds to take a 21-14 lead into the locker room. California scored twice in the third quarter to increase its lead to three touchdowns at 35-14. In the fourth, Beck engineered a 74-yard drive that ended with Harline scoring and then a 96-yard drive that ended with Watkins catching a nine-yard touchdown pass from Beck. California's ensuing drive ended with a missed field goal and the Cougars had a chance to tie but the drive ended on Beck's interception.

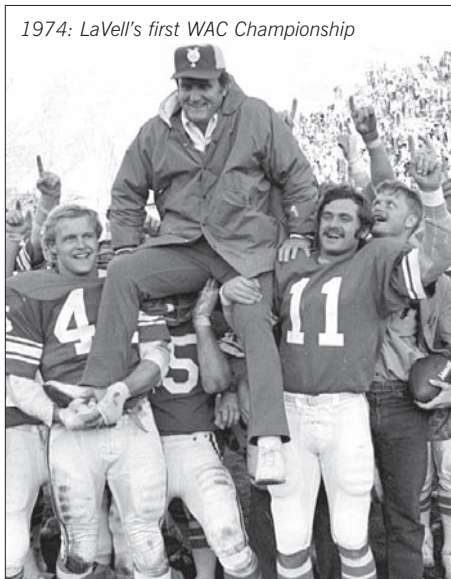
One of BYU's marquee victories came in 1990 when the Cougars opened the season by stunning top-ranked Miami in Provo. After the victory, fans stormed the field to celebrate another major victory for the BYU football program.



BYU's winning tradition was built by legendary Cougar head coach LaVell Edwards. After taking over the program in 1972, Edwards erected an offensive powerhouse that rewrote the record books and established itself among the nation's elite football programs. Edwards, a two-time NCAA National Coach of the Year and the sixth winningest coach in NCAA history, taught his players and the nation what a passing offense truly was. The Cougar offense passed 103,562 yards (about 59 miles) throughout Edwards' 29 seasons as head coach, and now BYU's football stadium is branded with a namesake worth a lifetime of amazing stories. Since 1972 the Cougars have won 20 conference championships, a national championship in 1984 and 23 postseason appearances.

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January... had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962... halfback Pete Van Valkenburg wins NCAA rushing title beating out All-Americans Greg Pruitt and Otis Armstrong with a 138.6 yards-per-game average... the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively... quarterback Gary Sheide is runner-up in NCAA passing and third in total offense... teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards)... Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense... Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game... running back Steve Stratton is named the first Academic All-American in school history.



1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories: seventh in passing offense, third in rushing defense... Gary Sheide is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) ... Sheide's career completion percentage is fourth all-time.. Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title... LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma St.—BYU's first bowl.

1975 A year of adjustment: the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games... Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth

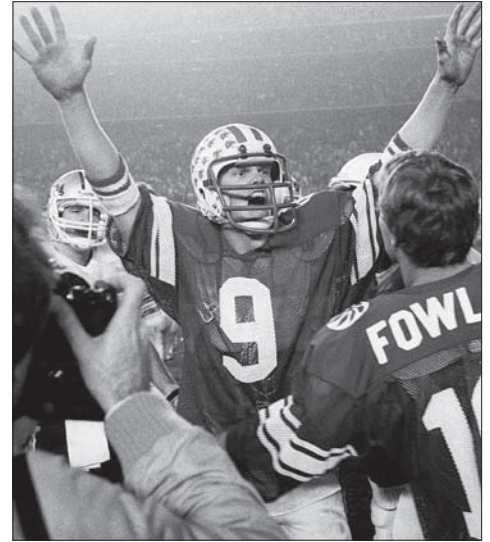
game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory... Nielsen sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing... becomes starter... Cougars finish 10th nationally in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA completions per game (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place... Nielsen finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense... Cougars finish first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9)... Nielsen voted first team All-American... BYU ties for WAC title and plays Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over... by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage... Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense... Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)... BYU's 341.6 yards passing per game was third highest in NCAA history, and 41 TDs was second... Cougars top the nation in takeaways (fumbles recovered or interceptions) with a total of 56... Cougars tie for first in WAC and make a post-season trip to play two Japanese all-star teams.

1978 Both Marc Wilson and sophomore Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties... Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries... Cougars win the WAC, play their final regular-season game in Yokohama, Japan, against UNLV, and meet Navy in the first Holiday Bowl.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt McMahon and play senior Wilson... Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins ... Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)... finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit... Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3)... Cougars are 12th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)... BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season... LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd Coach-of-the-Year award... Cougars win the WAC and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.



Jim McMahon was named the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year, with Marcus Allen, after an amazing 1981 season. McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was a consensus All-American and was third in the Heisman balloting.

1980 The school's first 12-win season... BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)... quarterback Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Eyre... McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)... sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever... also led the nation in total offense (385.6)... after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight ... Cougars win WAC and defeat SMU in Holiday Bowl III by scoring 21 points in the final four minutes.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 70 NCAA records and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ... McMahon wins the first Davey O'Brien Award ... Cougars win WAC and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV... LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl... also coaches in the Japan Bowl... Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top 10 in the nation.



1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game... loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and plays Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V... Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-American... BYU finishes third nationally in total offense... Steve Young is named WAC Offensive Player of the Year.

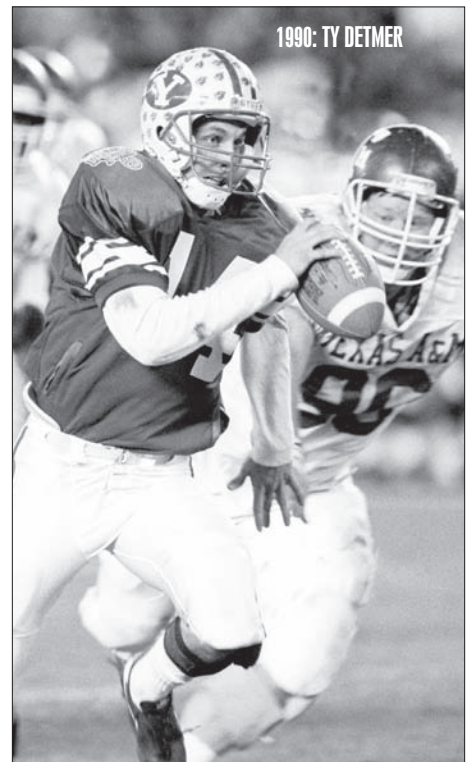
1983 Another 11-win season... Cougars are ranked seventh in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team... quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-Americans... after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games... BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring... Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards

per game... BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI... Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone... Young wins the Davey O'Brien Award and finishes runner-up for the Heisman.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season... win streak is extended to 24 games... quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8)... defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-American... team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)... defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense... another WAC championship and a victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII... Edwards named NCAA Coach of the Year by most organizations ...Bosco is runner-up for the Davey O'Brien Award and third in the Heisman.

1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic... that game plus a bowl and playing at Hawaii allows BYU to become the only collegiate team to play 14 games in a season... defensive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-American and WAC Defensive Player of the Year... Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors... a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship... quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting... BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall... Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes Frank Kush as the winningest coach in WAC football history... Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the



Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-America ... Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams ... Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards... Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU defense leads the nation with 50 takeaways (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with Troy Long getting the most defensive points... after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games... Cougars come within a two-point conversion of another WAC title... Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer... Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)... Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense... Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regular-season game against Colorado St.) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All American Bowl versus Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race... punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting... behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 13th in total offense and 13th in scoring... BYU plays second-ranked Miami even for three quarters... Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker... 11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.





1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-American... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-American teams ... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy...also wins the Davey O'Brien Award...finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-American and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU...



1994: Mike Ulufale and the No. 10 ranked BYU Cougars

Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204... BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon... BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl.

1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Ty Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)... BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa, 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu winds up with

the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah... Ryan Hancock finishes third in total offense and passing... BYU wins WAC title and goes to the Aloha Bowl...BYU's 15th straight bowl.

1993 BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl

game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State... Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October... BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season... team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency... freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown receptions (29) and yardage (3,066)... BYU's NCAA record of 53-straight games with a touchdown pass ends at CSU, but Cougars extend the nation's longest streak without being shut out to 236 consecutive games.

1994 It's a historic season with victories over Notre Dame and Oklahoma to finish 10th in the final CNN/USA Today poll... five players are drafted, the most ever... Cougars win their first bowl game since 1988... BYU dedicates Copper Bowl effort to graduate assistant coach John Farley, who was sidelined in August with heart trouble and died in December... Cougars are third nationally in passing with John Walsh fifth in total offense... Jamal Willis becomes the all-time leading rusher and breaks the record for touchdowns...David Lauder sets a career record for consecutive PATs with 53.

1995 A first-ever multi-year contract for a BYU coach is given to Edwards... the string of 17 consecutive bowl games comes to an end... Cougars finish number two in NCAA in punt returns at 18.9, while James Dye is number one at 21.9... Steve Sarkisian is the first junior college player since 1973 to start as a BYU quarterback ... BYU finishes in a four-way tie for first in the WAC.

1996 BYU completes the longest season in Division I college football history and plays in its first ever New Year's Day bowl game with a 19-15 Cotton Bowl victory over Kansas State... BYU finishes the season with a 14-1 record and a No. 5 national ranking in both polls, its highest ranking since

1984...QB Steve Sarkisian leads the nation in pass efficiency with a 173.6 rating...the Cougars finish sixth in the nation in total offense with 478 yards per game... the defense leads the WAC in rushing yards allowed (124.6), total yards allowed (316.3) and points allowed (18.7)...James Dye finishes second in the nation in punt returns with a 17.6 average...BYU wins the inaugural WAC Championship game with a 28-25 victory over Wyoming in Las Vegas, Nevada...BYU goes undefeated in the WAC, giving LaVell Edwards his 18th career title.

1997 BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever true freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

1998 BYU runs up a 7-1 conference record (9-5 overall) to win the WAC Pacific Division title ... The Cougars meet Tulane in their first-ever Liberty Bowl appearance ... BYU's season is highlighted by its defense, ranked No. 5 in the nation, allowing only 91.2 rushing yards and 273.9 total yards per game ... After a slow start, the Cougars won seven games in a row ... Season highlights included a 26-6 thumping of Arizona State, a 13-0 shutout of San Diego State and a 26-24 victory over Utah ... Rob Morris, John Tait, Brian Gray and Daren Yancey were all named

to the All-WAC first team ... John Tait was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft (14th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs ... Sophomore kicker Owen Pochman set a school record by connecting on 62 consecutive PATs.

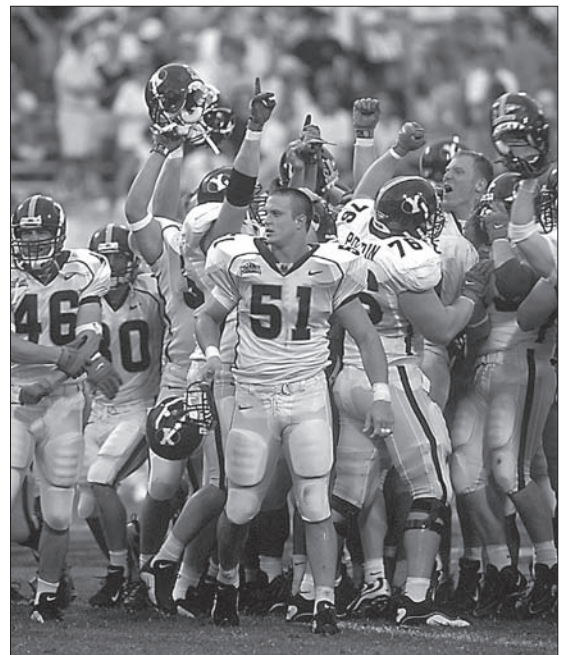
1999 Won the first-ever Mountain West Conference Championship with an 8-4 season record (5-2 conf.) ... A 27-20 win over Air Force marks LaVell Edwards' 250th victory as head coach of the Cougars ... junior kicker Owen Pochman becomes the school's all-time leading scorer, picking up 90 points on the season to give him a career total 247 ... a six-game winning streak in the middle of the season has BYU ranked as high as No. 12 in the *USA Today*/CNN Coaches' Poll ... running back Luke Staley is named Freshman All-American and conference Freshman of the Year, leading the nation's freshmen in scoring average with 78 points in eight games ... Rob Morris returns from a four-game absence to earn All-America status ... Morris is picked in the first round with the 28th overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts ... The Cougars finish the season ranked first in the conference in total offense and rushing defense, as well as eighth in the nation in passing offense and 14th in the nation in rushing defense ... BYU makes its first-ever Motor City Bowl appearance against Marshall ... Edwards concludes the season with his 20th career conference title and 22nd bowl appearance in 28 years.

program Gary Crowton led the Cougars to 12 consecutive victories and an outright Mountain West Conference title thanks to a dramatic come-from-behind victory over rival Utah in Provo ... Luke Staley was named a consensus All-American and became BYU's first Doak Walker Award winner for the nation's top running back ... Staley led the nation in scoring at 15.45 points per game and was third nationally in rushing at 143.82 yards per game ... The Cougars led the nation in scoring offense with 46.77 points per game and in total offense with 542.85 yards per game ... BYU was the first MWC school to go undefeated in conference games and boasted eight players being named as first-team all-league ... Staley was named Offensive Player of the Year in the Conference and set BYU single-season records for points scored, touchdowns scored and rushing yards ... injuries took Staley out of the Cougars final two games which resulted in losses at Hawaii and in the Liberty Bowl against Louisville ... BYU climbed the national polls to as high as No. 7 on Nov. 25th and finished the

2000 BYU won its last two games, including a memorable thriller at Utah, to send coach LaVell Edwards out with a 6-6 record in his 29th and final year as a head coach...Playing one of its toughest schedules in history, the Cougars played Mississippi State, Syracuse, Virginia and national power Florida State in the Kickoff Classic...Against Utah, BYU trailed by one point but went 80 yards on nine plays, including two dramatic passes from quarterback Brandon Doman to wide receiver Jonathan Pittman, for the come-from-behind victory... Owen Pochman, Setema Gali, Jr., Justin Ena and Aaron Edmonds were all named to the All-Mountain West Conference first team... Pochman and Tevita Ofahengaue are both selected in the NFL draft with Ofahengaue being "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last player selected in the draft.

season ranked No. 24 in both polls ... First-Team All-MWC defensive end Ryan Denney was named to the Academic All-America team and was drafted in the second round by the Buffalo Bills ... All-MWC tight end Doug Jolley was also selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

2002 For the first time since 1973 the Cougars finished the regular-season with a sub-.500 record ... coincidentally, the '73 season was the second under legendary coach LaVell Edwards ... his replacement, Gary Crowton, just completed his second season at BYU... for the first time in the four-season history of the MWC, BYU failed to win a conference road game, going 0-3 ... the Cougars combined to post a

9-2 conference road mark through the league's first three seasons ... Matt Berry was the first redshirt freshman quarterback to start at BYU since Ty Detmer in 1988... Brady Poppinga led the MWC with eight sacks for minus 52 yards .. he averaged 0.67 sacks per game, with all of his sacks being solo stops...BYU attempted fourth-down conversions a MWC leading 42 times this season. The Cougars converted 17 times and ranked sixth in the league with a 40.5 percentage...Matt Payne led the country with a punting average of 47.6 yards ... BYU continued its NCAA record streak of not being shutout for 350 games.

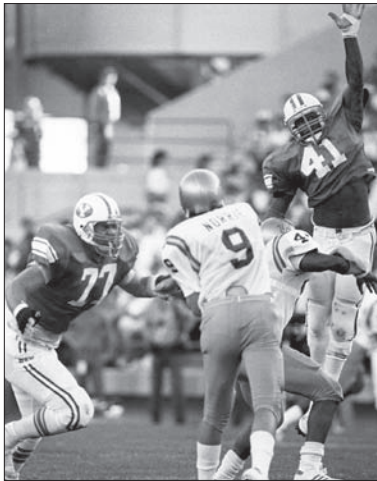
2003 BYU posted back-to-back losing seasons for the first time since 1970-71 before LaVell Edwards took over the reigns of the program...John Beck became only the second true-freshman to start at quarterback for BYU when he started against Stanford ... Drew Miller was the only other true-freshman to start at quarterback...Running back Reynaldo Brathwaite recorded the longest run from scrimmage in Cougar history against San Diego State. Brathwaite, who also had an 89-yard run against New Mexico, scampered for a 95-yard score against the Aztecs on his way to 144 yards rushing on the night ... Freshman tight end Daniel Coats was named to The Sporting News Freshman All-America team after posting 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns...The Cougars' NCAA-record scoring streak ended at 361 after being shut out 3-0 against Utah in the final game of the season. The last time BYU was shut out was when Arizona State blanked the Cougars 20-0 on September 27, 1975.

2004 BYU posted its third-consecutive losing season, the longest such streak since the Cougars were sub-.500 from 1959-64 ... Despite the losing 5-6 record, BYU finished third place in the Mountain West Conference at 4-3 ... The Cougars' schedule was one of the most difficult in team history, including games against Notre Dame, the defending national champions USC, then-undefeated Boise State and an undefeated University of Utah team that won the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl ... John Beck and newcomer receivers Todd Watkins and Austin Collie combined to create one of the most potent passing attacks in the league ... Beck threw for 2,563 yards while Watkins, a transfer from Grossmont Junior College caught 52 passes for 1,042 yards and six touchdowns ... Collie, a true freshman, caught a team-high 53 passes for 771 yards and eight touchdowns ... Curtis Brown came on strong after a slow start to finish the season with 828 rushing yards ... Matt Payne finished his career as second on BYU's all-time scoring list with 312 and set an NCAA record for most consecutive field goals between 40-49 at 14, dating back to the 2002 season ... he also set the school record for most consecutive PATS with 67, dating back to 2002 ... Gary Crowton resigned at the end of the season and replaced by Bronco Mendenhall.

2005 Under the direction of first-year coach Bronco Mendenhall, the Cougars finished the 2005 regular season at 6-6, the first time BYU finished at .500 or better since 2001 ... The Cougars were 6-5 overall in the regular season and finished tied for second in the Mountain West Conference at 5-3 ... BYU earned an invitation to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl and played California ... The Cougars fell to California, 35-28 ... Mendenhall revamped the coaching staff prior to the season, adding Robert Anae (offensive coordinator), Brandon Doman (quarterbacks coach) and Patrick Higgins (wide receivers coach) ... BYU also switched back to the traditional uniforms, while maintaining the navy blue, worn by all of the great BYU teams with the traditional Y logo on the helmets ... John Beck, Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown led an offensive attack that was BYU's most potent since 2001, averaging 33.0 points per game (second in the MWC and 24th in the nation) and 462.4 yards of total offense per game ... Beck led the conference and was fifth in the nation in passing yards (309.1 per game) and led the conference in touchdown passes (27) ... Brown was fourth in the conference in rushing yards with 1,123 and scored 16 touchdowns, the second most in a season in BYU history ... Brown also added six 100-yard rushing games to give him 11 for his career, the most in BYU history ... Harline led the team and ranked among the top tight ends in the nation with 63 receptions for 853 yards and five touchdowns ... Beck, Brown and Harline were all named to the All-MWC First Team Cameron Jensen led the team in tackles for the second-consecutive year by recording 84.

BYU YEAR-BY-YEAR RECORD SINCE 1972

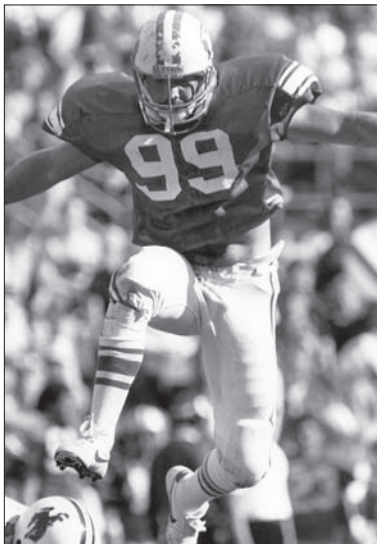

BYU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

After posting a perfect 13-0 season, the Cougars were awarded gold national championship rings after winning the 1984 National Championship.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the *Associated Press*, the *United Press International*, *Sports Illustrated*, *CNN-USA Today* and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawaii, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun late in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were offensive lineman Craig Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

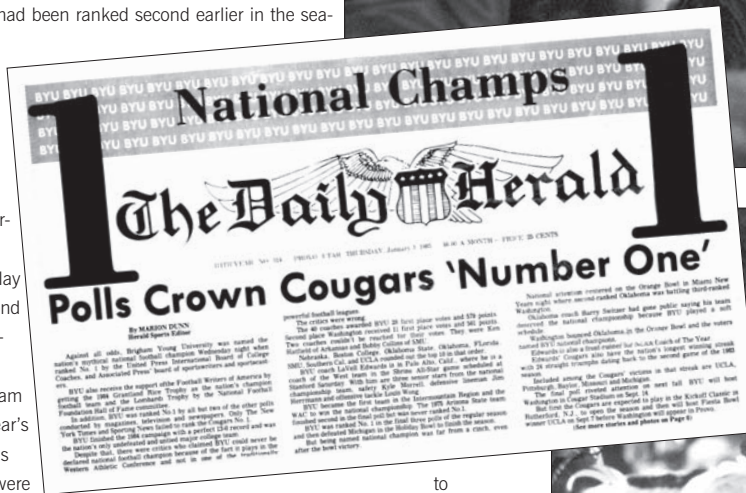
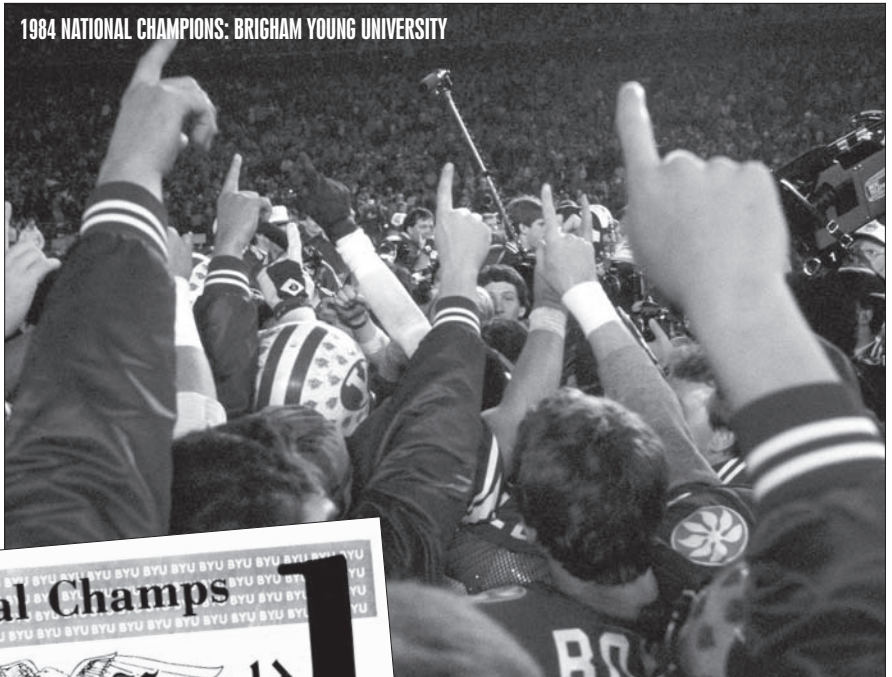
The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

TY DETMER: 1990 HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER

“He had me running around like a chicken with my head cut off. We didn’t play that bad, Detmer is just that good.”

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawaii. Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, “Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU,” — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the

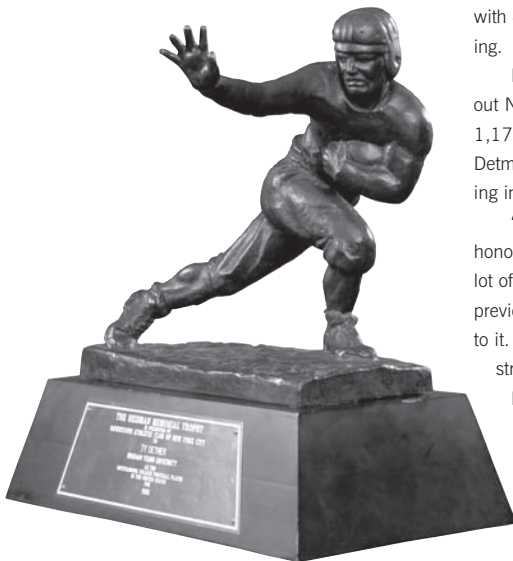
Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor has been awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations “necktie” campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

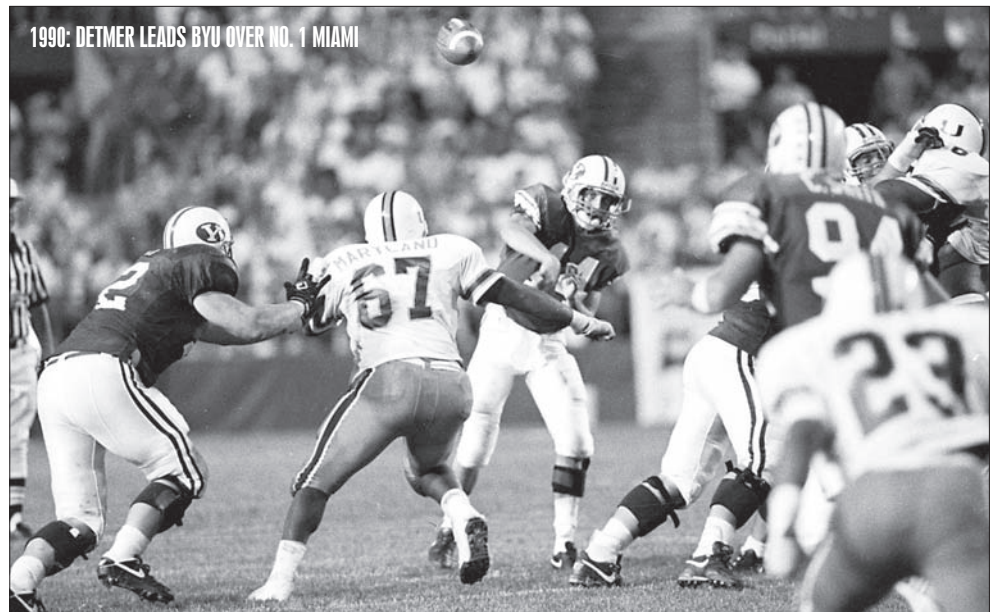
Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame’s Raghib “Rocket” Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman ballot in 1991.

“Winning the Heisman was a great honor,” said Detmer. “There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU.”

Detmer’s portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of LaVell Edwards Stadium.



1990: DETMER LEADS BYU OVER NO. 1 MIAMI

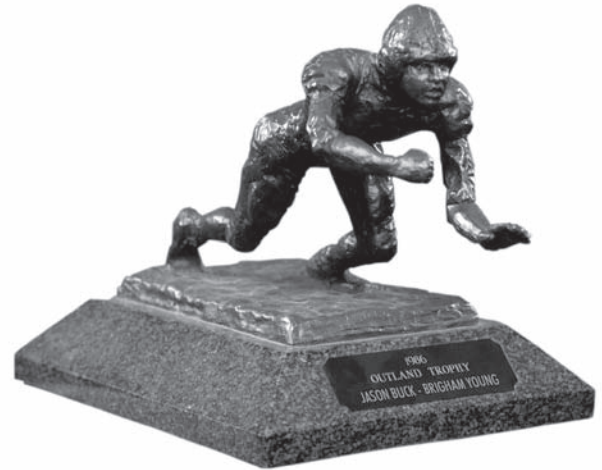
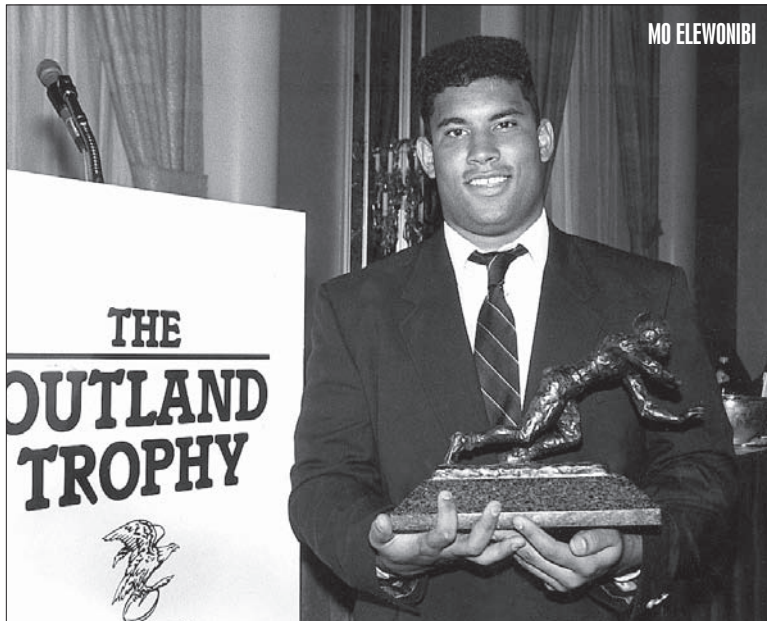

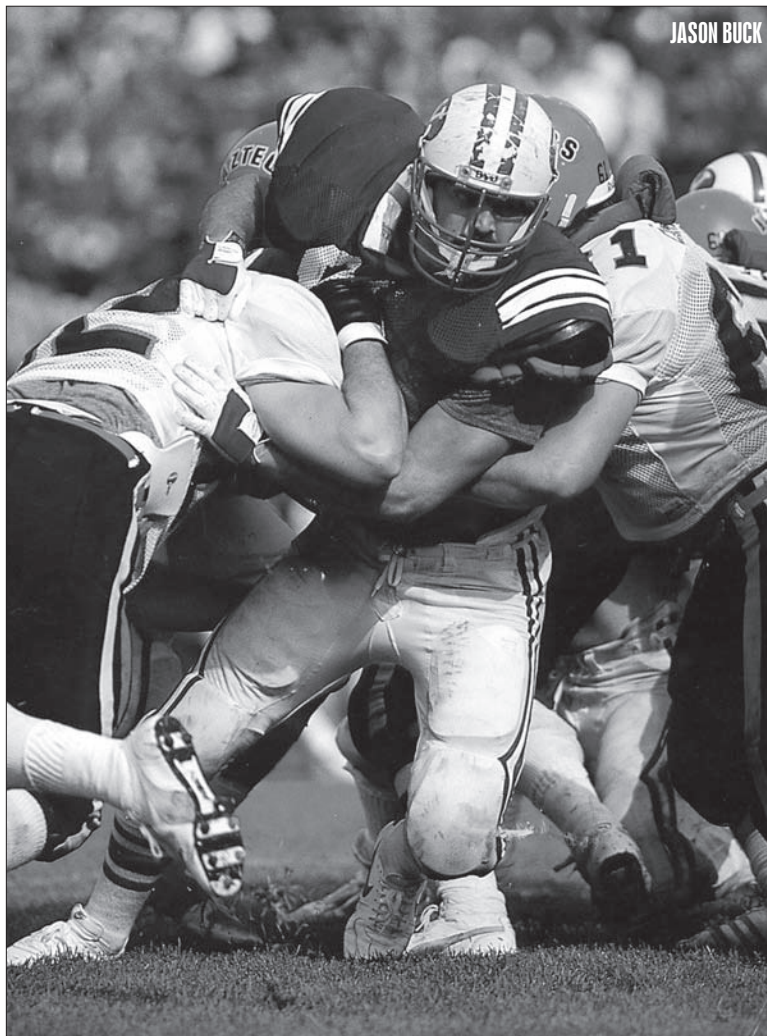

BYU'S TWO OUTLAND TROPHY WINNERS



BYU is one of only 11 schools to have two Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas.



JASON BUCK • 1986

Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270-pound senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."

MOHAMMED ELEWONIBI • 1989

Mohammed Elewonibi, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "Mount Mohammed" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

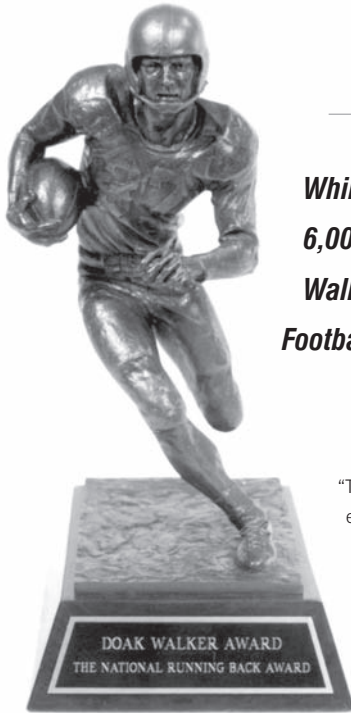
The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

Two of BYU's greatest interior linemen, Mohammed Elewonibi (top left), an offensive guard, and Jason Buck (bottom left), a defensive tackle, earned the Outland Trophy award. Elewonibi won the award in 1989 because of his outstanding protection of future Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer. In 1986, Buck, an amazing pass rusher, anchored one of BYU's strongest defensive teams ever. Both players went onto successful professional careers in the NFL.



LUKE STALEY • 2001 DOAK WALKER AWARD WINNER



While his teammates and coaches were watching in their hotel rooms from Hawaii, over 6,000 miles away, BYU running back Luke Staley was named the winner of the 2001 Doak Walker Award. The annual award, which was presented on the ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show from Orlando, Fla., is presented to college football's top running back.

"This is a great honor," Staley said. "I can't express how grateful I am for my family, my teammates, my coach - everyone who made this possible."

In addition to winning the Doak Walker Award, Staley was also named as a first-team member of the prestigious Walter Camp Foundation All-America Team. Staley is the first BYU consensus All-American since

Ty Detmer was twice selected in 1990 and 1991. In addition to the Walter Camp Foundation All-America team, Staley was named a first-team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association, Football Writers Association of America, the Associated Press, The Sporting News, Football News and CNSI—just to name a few.

"We're very proud of Luke and all his accomplishments," BYU head coach Gary Crowton said. "Since we started this season back in August, we have been telling these guys to work hard, stay focused and great things will happen. This award, although presented to Luke, is a tribute to the hard work and commitment each and every player and coach has made this season. Luke is probably one of the best examples we have had, in terms of working hard and staying focused. This is a great tribute for a great athlete, a great teammate and a great young man. We couldn't be more proud of him."

Staley, from Tualatin, Ore., led the nation in scoring (15.5 p/game), yards per

carry (8.1 y/carry) and finished the 2001 season ranked third in the nation in rushing, averaging 143.8 yards per game. He helped pace the Cougars to a 12-2 record on the season, scoring a BYU single-season record 28 touchdowns. Staley also racked up a BYU single-season record 1,582 yards rushing on the season.

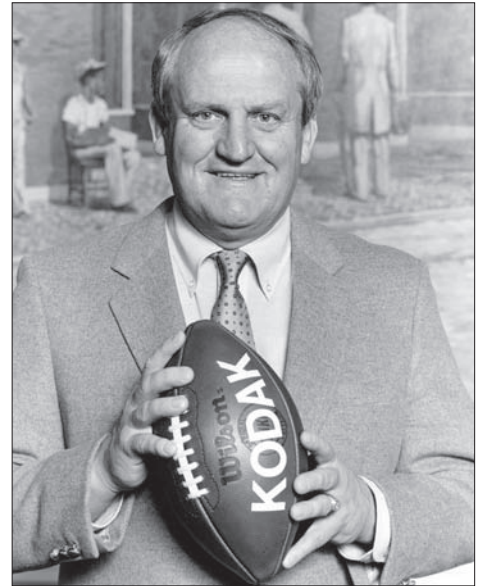
Legendary Cougar coach LaVell Edwards has twice been recognized as one the greatest coaches in college football. The sixth-winningest coach in NCAA football history earned the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award in 1979 and the Kodak Coach of the Year Award in 1984.

Along with his teams' successes during his coaching tenure, LaVell Edwards accumulated many personal accolades to match. Edwards' first national recognition for his coaching prowess came in 1979 when he was honored with the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award. A panel of 11 former college football coaches selected the BYU coach. On the heels of BYU's first national championship five years later, Edwards' coach-

ing peers honored him with what he then called his greatest personal accolade, the Kodak Coach of the Year Award.

As successful as his teams were on the field, Edwards' coaching philosophy did not reflect a win-at-all-costs mentality. He didn't bark orders or rule the sideline with an iron fist. Generally, the assistant coaches were delegated the duty of handling the Xs and Os while he saw to the administrative tasks of the program. His personal demeanor also gave him the ability to relate well with his players whether teaching them about football or other more personal matters.

"Just seeing how he handles himself with the media and with people in general ... he's always genuine with them.



He treats everybody well." Former BYU quarterback and current BYU athletic administrator Robbie Bosco said. "Those are the things he'll leave with me, more than winning football games."

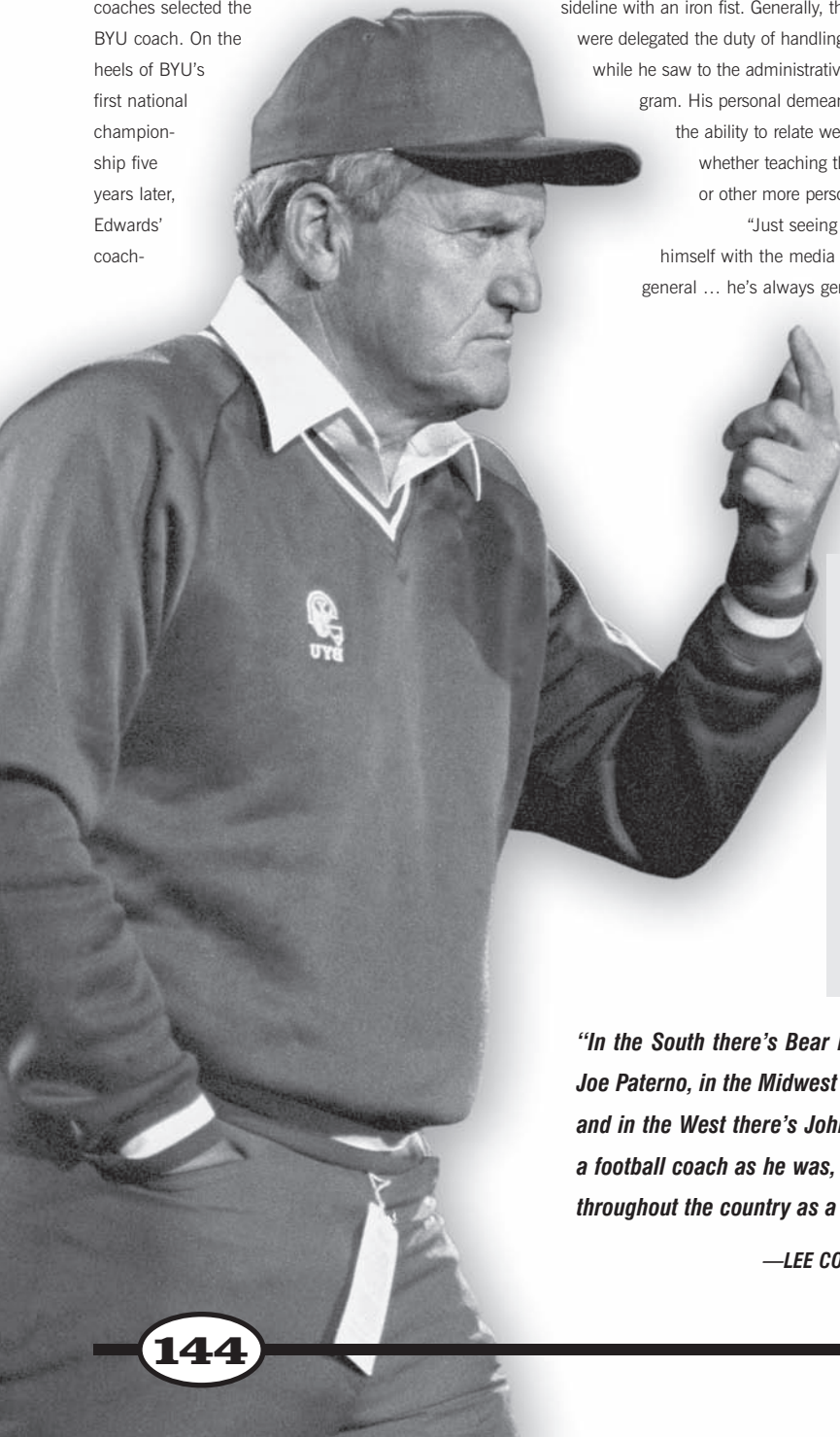

SAMMY BAUGH TROPHY

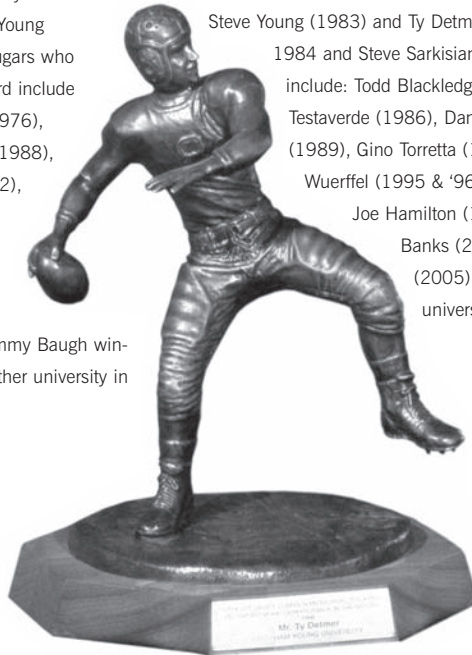
On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the seventh BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year. In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award. Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972), Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Steve Walsh (1988), Jeff George (1989), David Klingler (1990), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995), Ryan Leaf (1997), Daunte Culpepper (1998), Chad Pennington (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), David Carr (2001), Kliff Kingsbury (2002), B.J. THE DAVEY O'BRIEN AWARD

In 1981, the Davey O'Brien Educational and Charitable Trust of Fort Worth, Texas, named Jim McMahon the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award — honoring the nation's best quarterback. BYU quarterbacks have won the Davey O'Brien Award four times — more than any other school. In addition to winners McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Ty Detmer (1990 & '91), Robbie Bosco finished runner-up in 1984 and Steve Sarkisian finished third in 1996. Others who have won the award include: Todd Blackledge (1982), Doug Flutie (1984), Chuck Long (1985), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Dan McPherson (1987), Troy Aikman (1988), Andre Ware (1989), Gino Torretta (1992), Charlie Ward (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995 & '96), Peyton Manning (1997), Michael Bishop (1998), Joe Hamilton (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), Eric Crouch (2001), Brad Banks (2002), Jason White (2003 and 2004), Vince Young (2005). 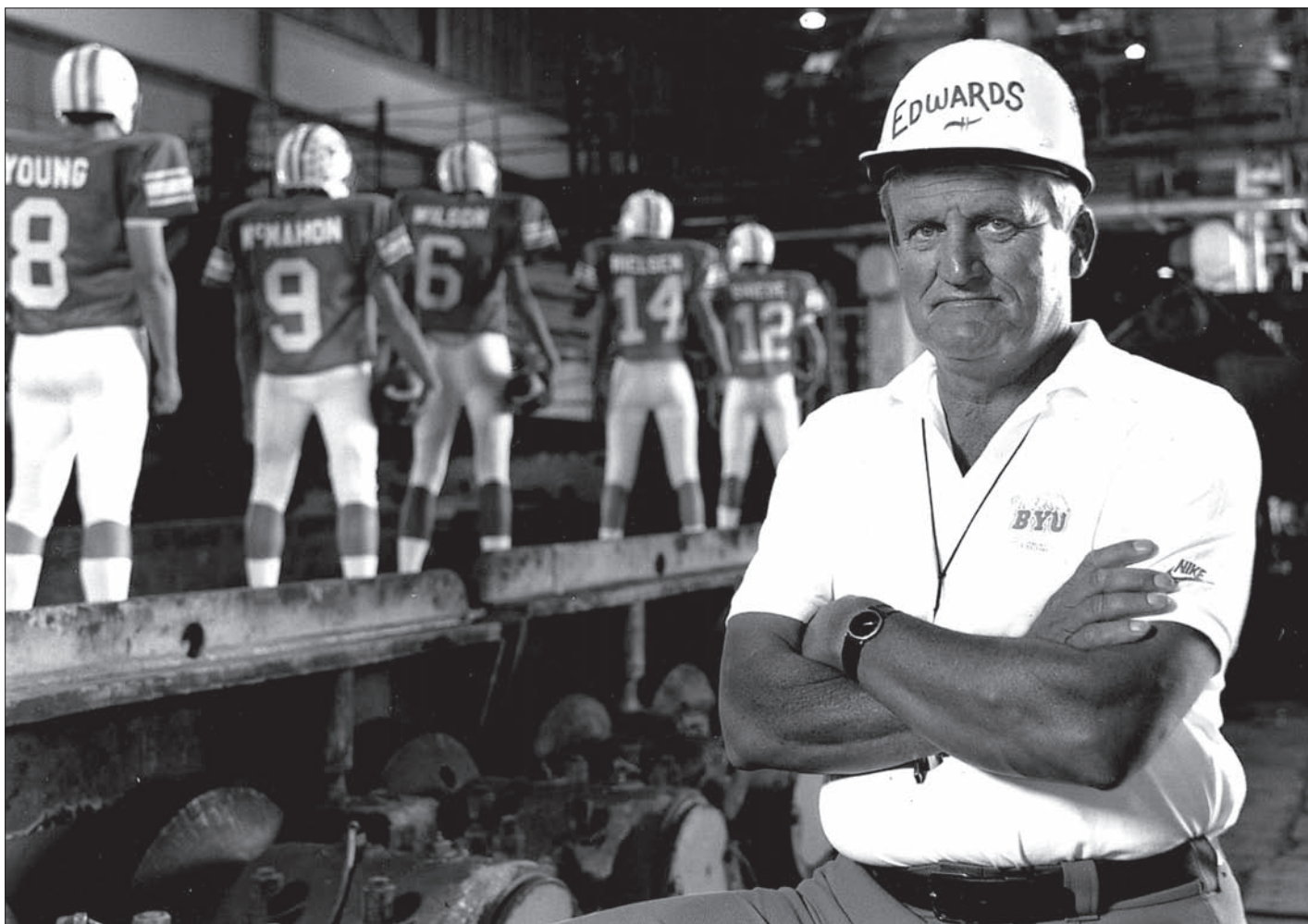

STEVE SARKISIAN SPOTLIGHT: After tutoring a Heisman Trophy winner (Carson Palmer) and winning a national championship at USC, the former Sammy Baugh Trophy winner and BYU signal caller continues to excel in the football world. In 2004 he was the quarterbacks coach for the NFL's Oakland Raiders before returning to USC as the offensive coordinator, replacing former BYU assistant Norm Chow. While at BYU, Sarkisian had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 TDs in his career. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, the seventh best mark ever) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and a second-team All-American. As a junior, he was All-WAC and led BYU to the WAC title. Against Fresno State that season, he set an NCAA game completion percentage record when he hit 31-of-34 passes (91.2 percent)

EVER SINCE GARY SHEIDE IN 1973, BYU HAS PRODUCED AN ASSEMBLY LINE OF OUTSTANDING QUARTERBACKS IN PROVO THAT HAVE EARNED UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS IN THE MARKET OF COLLEGE AND PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many other Heisman Trophy candidates.

Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young have been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 20 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Three of the top five career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 29 years Edwards coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times. In 2005 First Team All-Mountain West Conference quarterback John Beck was the No. 5 passer in the nation as he helped lead a resurrection of the storied BYU offense of old.

When Edwards was named head coach at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC or MWC championship 20 times, played in 24 post-season bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

BYU's football program has tapped into the Pacific Islands to find players since 1951 when Harry Bray of Hilo, Hawaii transferred from Weber College to play for the Cougars. Other Pacific Islanders who followed included: Famika Anae (1954-55; father of current BYU Offensive Coordinator Robert Anae), John Kapele (1957-59), John Kawaa (1962-1963); John Lupoi (1967-1969) and Henry Nawahine (1964-1965). Some of BYU's most celebrated and decorated players have come from the Pacific islands, including All-Americans, national record holders and players who have gone on to compete in the NFL.

Since 1951, over 100 Polynesian players have suited up for BYU, including 23 that will don the blue and white in 2006. The Cougars' Polynesian players have come from Hawaii, Tonga, Samoa and Fiji. Some of the most notable players include Vai Sikahema, the NCAA's career leader in punt returns, All-American and NFL veteran tight end Itula Mili and BYU's second all-time rushing leader Lakei Heimuli. Eight former BYU Polynesian players are currently on NFL rosters.

Of the more than 100 Polynesian players, several rank among the top statistical

leaders in BYU history. Two of the top-10 career rushers are Polynesian as are two of the top-10 leaders in career receiving yards. Since 1982, nine of BYU's season-rushing leaders have been Pacific Islanders.

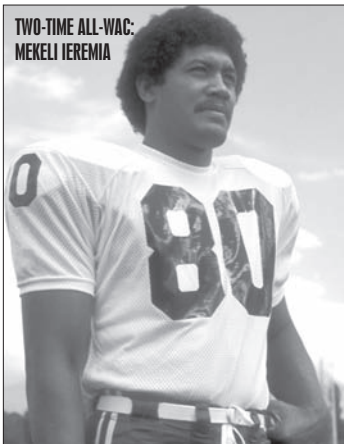

Although known as the Quarterback Factory, BYU signal callers wouldn't make the record books without someone on the receiving end of their throws. With BYU's tradition of wide-open offenses, the tight end position has thrived in its offensive scheme.

Tight ends have thrived in the BYU offensive system for years. Like no other school in the nation, BYU's tight ends have earned unprecedented success as a featured position in BYU's wide-open offense. Over the years, Cougar football has emerged as the home of some of the best pass-catching tight ends in NCAA history.

Starting with "Miracle Bowl" hero Clay Brown in 1980, seven BYU tight ends have earned All-American status. Since 1976, 10 Cougar tight ends have received 15 First-Team All-Conference citations. Four BYU tight ends are currently playing in the NFL. Doug Jolley (A second-round NFL pick) is a starter for the New York Jets while Gabriel Reid is entering his third season with the Chicago Bears. Itula Mili of the Seattle Seahawks and Chad Lewis, a Pro Bowl tight end who has played with the Philadelphia Eagles, both are entering their ninth NFL seasons. Two former BYU tight ends Todd Christensen and Chad Lewis have been named to several Pro Bowl teams during their successful professional careers.

In 2005 BYU once again turned to its tight ends with tremendous success. Tight end Jonny Harline led the team in receiving with 853 yards on 63 receptions and five touchdowns while earning First Team Mountain West Conference honors. He returns as an All-American candidate in 2006 along with fellow talented tight ends Daniel Coats and sophomore Vic So'oto. Offensive Coordinator Robert Anae continues to utilize the tight end position. In 2005 BYU's passing offense was ranked No. 6 in the country while it was No. 13 in total offense as well.

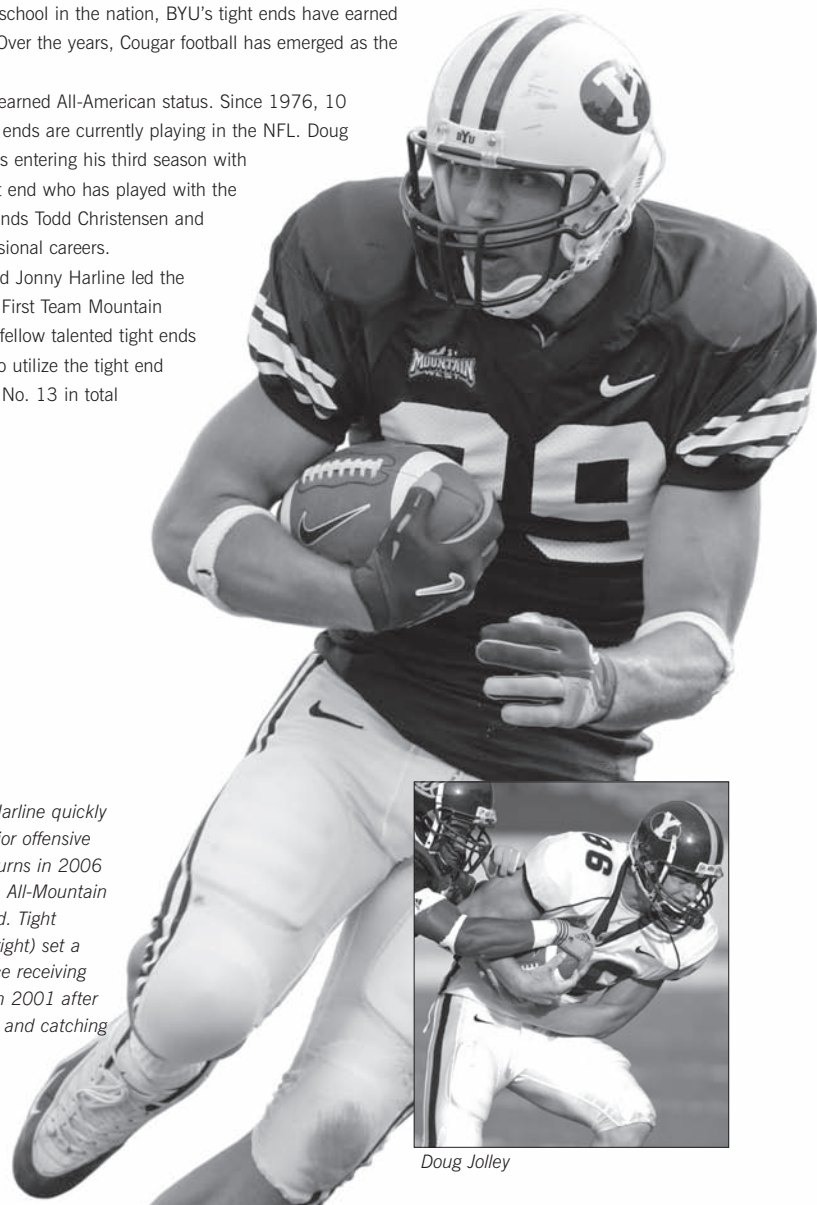

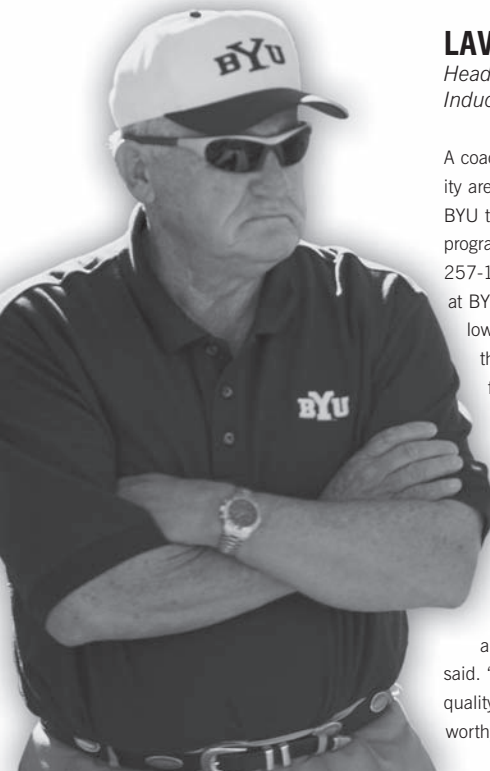

Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc., the first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least ten years and a first team All-America selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12-member panel made up of athletic directors, conference and bowl officials and media representatives. 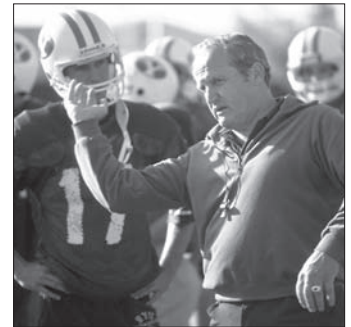
LAVELL EDWARDS

*Head Coach: 1972-2000
Inducted: 2004*

A coaching icon, whose success and longevity are paralleled by few, Edwards guided BYU to heights never before reached in the program's history. Edwards posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over a span of 29 seasons at BYU. From 1972 until his retirement following the 2000 season, Edwards roamed the sidelines at BYU--a tenure that ranks

fifth all-time among coaches at one school. In 20 of those 29 seasons, the Cougars claimed the league title. Guiding BYU to 22 bowl game appearances, including a streak of 17 straight bowl appearances, Edwards reached the pinnacle of coaching success in 1984 by winning the National Championship. His 257 wins rank him sixth in NCAA Division I-A history, and he has more victories than every other coach in BYU history combined. At the helm, Edwards compiled a program best .716 win percentage, coached one Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients, four Davey O'Brien award winners and 32 All-Americans--not to mention countless players who went on to professional careers in the NFL.

BYU's success didn't come without personal reward for Edwards either. He was named NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year eight times, the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and AFCA National Coach of the Year in 1984. Named the State of Utah's Coach of the Century, Edwards is a member of the State of Utah Sports Hall of Fame. "A spectacular choice," Steve Young said. "When you think of the Hall of Fame, you think of longevity, excellence, leadership and quality. In my book, Hall of Fame and LaVell Edwards go hand in hand. He is definitely a worthy recipient of this honor."

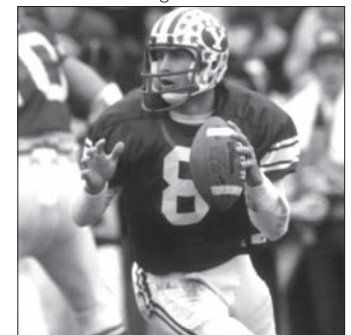
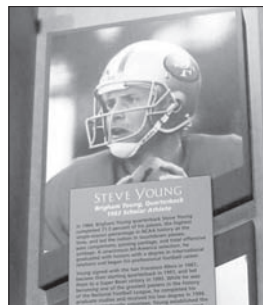
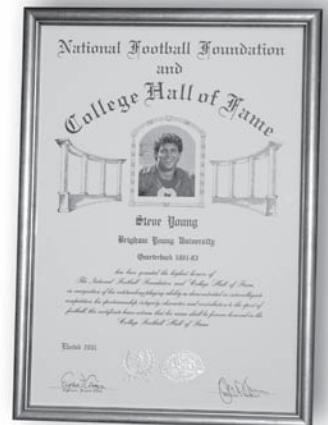

One of the greatest collegiate quarterbacks of all time, Steve Young was consistently at the top of all the nation's statistical categories for quarterbacks en route to setting 13 NCAA records. As a junior, he averaged 318.8 yards per game of total offense, earning All-Western Athletic Conference recognition and Conference Player-of-the-Year honors.

In his senior season, he repeated as a first-team All-WAC selection, completed 306-of-429 pass attempts for an impressive .713 percentage and led BYU to its second straight Holiday Bowl. His .713 completion percentage, 3,902 yards passing, 4,346 yards of total offense and 33 touchdowns all led the nation. Few rival Young's career totals. He completed 592-of-907 attempts for a .653 average, threw for 7,733 yards and 56 touchdowns and his 8,817 yards of total offense in only 31 games is among college football's all-time greatest career numbers.

A unanimous All-American and academic All-WAC selection, Young was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and received a National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award in recognition for his excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community -- a tradition he maintains today with the successful Forever Young Foundation.

Young retired after 15 seasons in the NFL, where he earned two MVP awards, seven trips to the Pro Bowl and led the San Francisco 49ers to the Super Bowl Championship in 1995, earning most-valuable-player honors. Young will be inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in 2005.





JIM MCMAHON

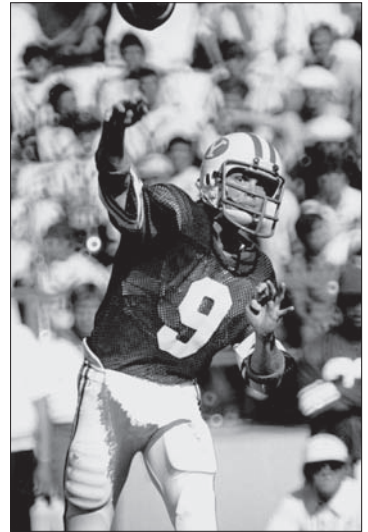

In 1998 Jim McMahon (1977-78, 80-81) joined former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was a 1981 First Team All-American by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he earned First team All-America from the FWAA. McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the

Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8) in 1981 as well as pass efficiency (176.9) and total offense (385.6) in 1980. He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first team all-league. He broke 23 school records, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU.

McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).



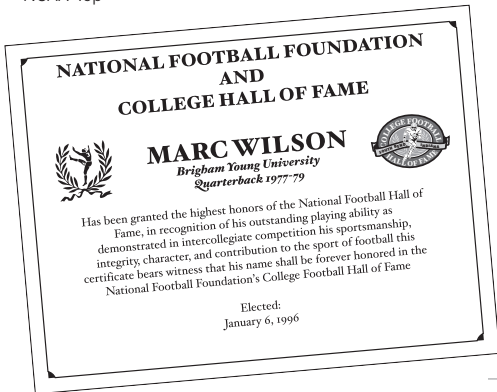
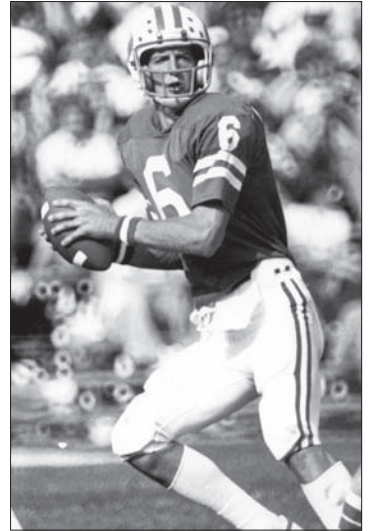
MARC WILSON

*Quarterback: 1976-79
Inducted: 1996*

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-America honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named *Sports Illustrated's* Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman balloting, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the

Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Washington with their four children.



GIFFORD NIELSEN

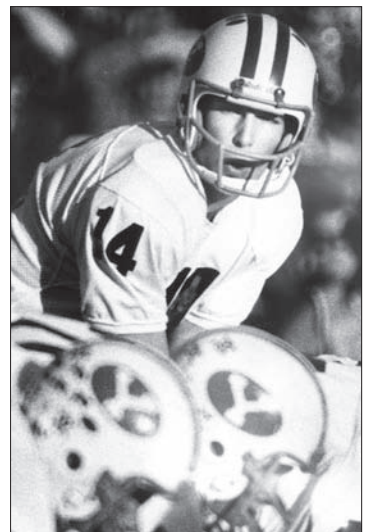

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

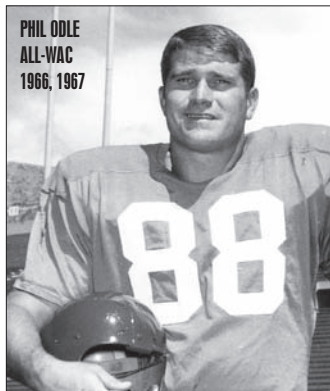
"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.

ELDON FORTIE- Nicknamed "The Phantom," Fortie broke 21 school records and is one of only two players in BYU football history to have his number retired. Rushed for 1,149 yards, an average of 5.8 per game, and passed for 814 yards in 1962. Holds BYU record for most rushing yards in a game (272).

JAY MILLER- Led the nation in receiving with 100 receptions for 1,181 yards including eight touchdowns. Holds BYU record for most receptions in a game (22) and most receiving yards in a game (263).

WAYNE BAKER- Named second team All-American his senior season when he finished with 82 tackles (67 assisted, 15 solo). He also recorded nine quarterback hurries and 10 quarterback sacks as a senior.

BRAD OATES- He was All-Western Athletic Conference and co-captain his last two seasons at BYU, and was named second team All-American by the Associated Press, the highest honor ever for a BYU football player to that date.

JEFF BLANC- Finished his career as BYU career record holder for career rushes, touchdowns, points scored and

most yards rushing. Still holds the record for most career rushes (625). Compiled 984 yards rushing and 10 touchdowns during his junior season when he was named honorable mention All-American by UPI.

ORRIN OLSEN- Started all 11 games. Brother of Merlin and Phil Olsen.

GIFFORD NIELSEN- Nicknamed the "Mormon Rifle," he threw 207 completions for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdown passes. Led nation in touchdown passes, second in total offense, fourth in passing. As a team, the Cougars finished first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9). 1994 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

MARC WILSON- Threw 250 completions for 3,720 yards with 29 touchdown passes. Threw seven touchdown passes in first start. Led NCAA in total offense. Ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating. 1979 Senior Bowl MVP. Finished third in Heisman voting. Set 10 NCAA records in his career. Winner of Sammy Baugh Trophy as College Passer of the Year. Led team to an undefeated regular season and was

named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. 1996 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

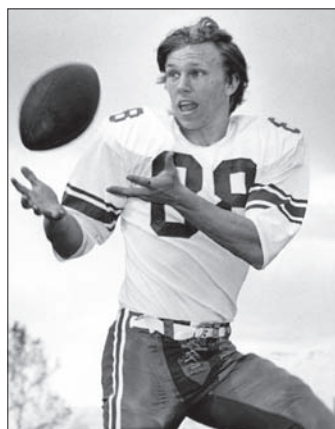
CLAY BROWN- Made game winning "hail mary" catch in 1980 Holiday Bowl against SMU. Had 1,009 receiving yards in 1980.

NICK EYRE- Nicknamed "The Bear." Was BYU's first consensus All-American lineman. Finished third in the Outland Trophy voting. Was a three-year starter for 24 consecutive games.

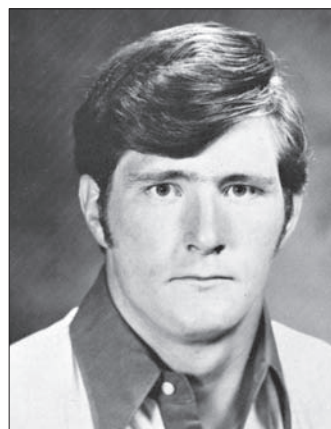
JIM McMAHON- Led nation with 4,571 yards passing including 47 touchdowns in 1980. First Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. Set or tied 26 NCAA records. Led nation in total offense (385.6) and pass efficiency (176.9), which ranks fourth all-time in NCAA history. Finished fifth in Heisman voting. Won first-ever Davey O'Brien Award in 1981. Led nation with 3,555 yards passing including 30 touchdowns. Led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8). Finished third in Heisman voting. Finished career with 70 NCAA records. 1998 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.



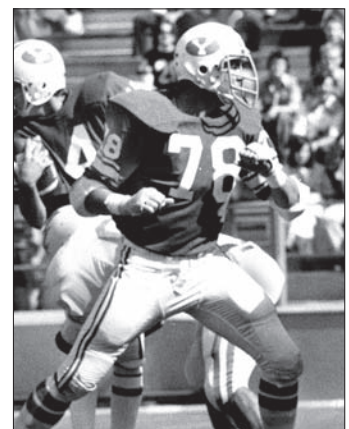

BART OATES- As a two-year starter on the offensive line, Oates earned Honorable Mention All-WAC in 1981 and All-WAC First Team in 1982. He was also named to the All-District VII team. Oates also enjoyed a successful career in the NFL.

GORDON HUDSON- A two-time All-American, Hudson had 67 catches for 928 yards and six touchdowns in 1982 and 44 catches for 596 yards and six touchdowns in 1983. He was also a two-time first-team All-WAC selection.

STEVE YOUNG- Won Davey O'Brien Award and finished runner-up for the Heisman. BYU led nation in total offense and was second in scoring. Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game.

ROBBIE BOSCO- Led BYU to only National Championship in school history. Led nation in passing and finished runner-up in passing efficiency (151.8). Runner-up for Davey O'Brien Award and third in Heisman voting.

KYLE MORRELL- As BYU's safety Morrell was honored as the WAC Defensive Player of the Year with 70 tackles, three interceptions and one sack.

LEON WHITE- Selected defensive MVP of the 1984 Holiday Bowl. Named second-team All-America by *The Sporting News* as a junior (1984) and honorable mention All-America as a senior (1985) by the AP. Had 10 pass deflections in 1984, including five against Utah State. Recorded 90 tackles, five tackles for loss and two sacks his senior season.

MARV ALLEN- A two-year starter and four-year letterman that played an integral part on the defensive unit of the 1984 National Championship team. He finished the season with 131 tackles and tied for the team lead in interceptions with four. His efforts earned him First-Team All-WAC honors, an honorable mention All-America nod from the AP. He was also named second-team Academic All-American.

DAVID MILLS- Led team in receiving during his senior season when he caught 60 passes for 1,023 yards and seven touchdowns. Played on four WAC championship teams, including the National Championship team in '84.

MARK BELLINI- A former walk-on, Bellini led BYU with 63 receptions for 1,008 yards, including 14 touchdowns his senior season in 1985. He was also 10th nationally in receiving average of 5.7 catches per game. Had 138 receptions, 2,267 yards receiving and 23 touchdowns in his career.

TREVOR MOLINI- Named third-team All-American as a tight end his sophomore season and received an honorable mention nod during his junior season. Caught 63 passes for 849 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore. Caught 11 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns against New Mexico in 1985.

JASON BUCK- Became only the third player in the western United States to win Outland Trophy. Had 59 tackles, 13 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks in 1986.

PAT THOMPSON- Led conference in punting with 49 punts for 2,195 yards, an average of 44.8 yards per punt. Led the nation in punting for much of the season.

MO ELEWONIBI- Didn't play football until after high school. Led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

BOB DAVIS- Had 137 tackles, including six sacks his senior season. A Dick Butkus Award candidate.

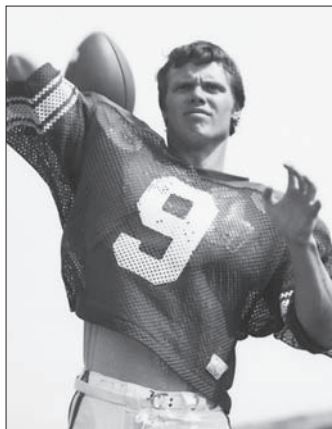

TY DETMER- 1990, 1991 First collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Passed for 5,188 yards and 41 touchdowns. Member of the NCAA All-Decade team. Still holds 58 NCAA records. His career record of 15,031 yards passing is nearly 3,000 yards more than anyone else in Division I history.

BYRON REX- Named UPI Second Team All-American tight end in 1992. He was also a two-time All-WAC selection (1991-1992).

ALAN BOARDMAN- A four-year starter who recorded 204 punts for 8,636 yards, averaging 42.3 yards per kick. His freshman year he ranked ninth among punters nationally with a 43.13 average per kick.

EVAN PILGRIM- A three-year starter on BYU's offensive line. In 1994, his senior season, Pilgrim anchored an offensive line that was fifth in the nation in total offense. He helped Jamal Willis become the all-time leading rusher in BYU history, while also leading BYU to a Copper Bowl victory over Oklahoma and No. 10 national ranking (final season ranking). Pilgrim was named a second team All-American guard by the *Associated Press* after his senior year.

ITULA MILI- Had 46 catches for a nation-leading 692 yards and three touchdowns for tight ends. First-team All-WAC after senior season.

STEVE SARKISIAN- He had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career at BYU. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 TDs in his career. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, the seventh best mark ever) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and a second-team All-American.

ROB MORRIS- Two-time all-conference selection. His 345 career tackles is eighth all-time at BYU. He was as a first round draft pick in 2000 by the Indianapolis Colts. Morris was named to the *Associated Press*, *The Sporting News*, *Football News* All-American first-teams after his senior year. He was also a semifinalist for Butkus Award, given to nation's top linebacker, and the WAC Defensive Player of the year in 1998 after posting 147 tackles during his junior season.

LUKE STALEY- NCAA leader in scoring (15.45 points per game) and third in the nation in rushing average at 143.82 yards per game. Set BYU single season records in touchdowns scored (28), most points scored (170) and rushing yards (1,596). He led BYU to 12-2 record and MWC Championship. He earned the nation's top running back award, the Doak Walker Award, after his outstanding junior season.

MATT PAYNE- In 2004 he was named AFCA and *Sporting News* First Team All-American and AP Second Team All-American as a punter. 2004 Ray Guy and Lou Groza Award Semifinalist. Led the nation with 51 punts for an average of 48.0 yards per punt while earning All-America honorable mention recognition in 2002. He was also an All-MWC First Team selection three times (2002-04).

DANIEL COATS- Set a BYU freshman tight end receiving record with 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns. Named a *Sporting News* Freshman All-American in 2003.

AUSTIN COLLIE- Named a *Sporting News* Second Team Freshman All-American in 2004 after leading the nation's freshman receivers with 4.82 catches per game and 70.1 yards per game. He was also the 2004 MWC Freshman of the Year.

DALLAS REYNOLDS- Named a *Sporting News* Third Team Freshman All-American and a Rivals.com Second Team Freshman All-American in 2005 after anchoring an offensive unit that was ranked No. 13 in the nation. He started in all 12 games as a freshman.



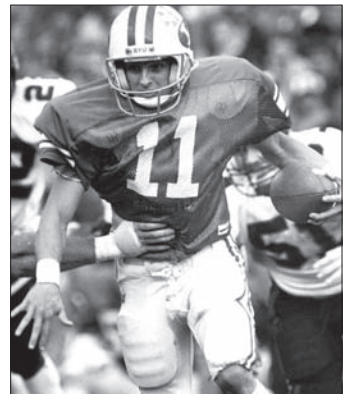

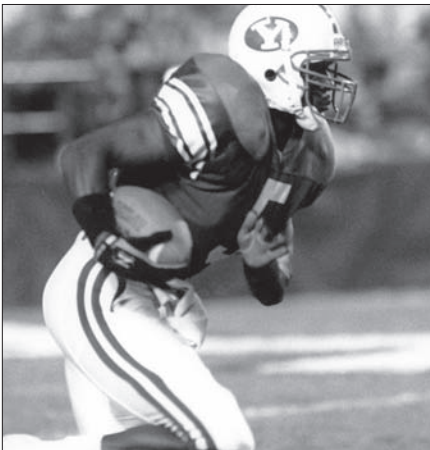

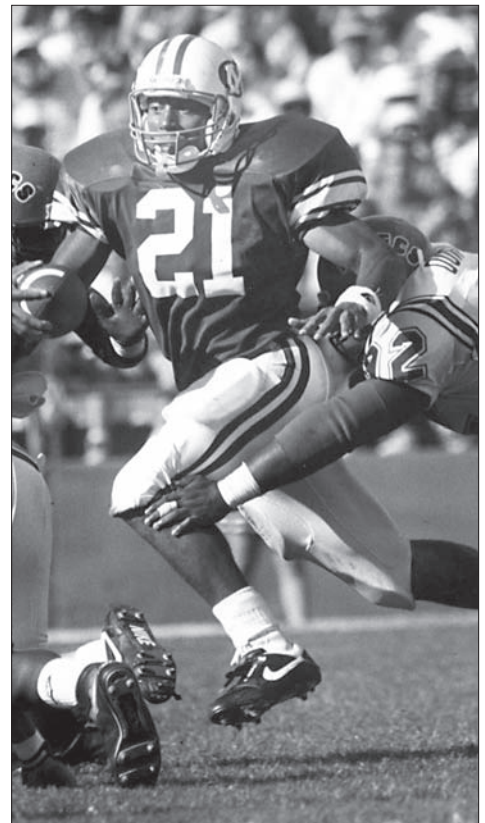

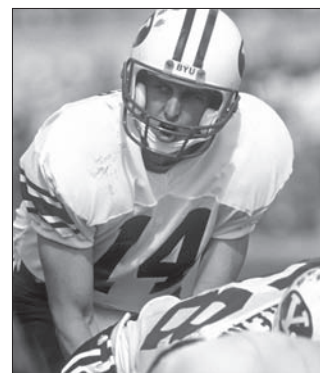

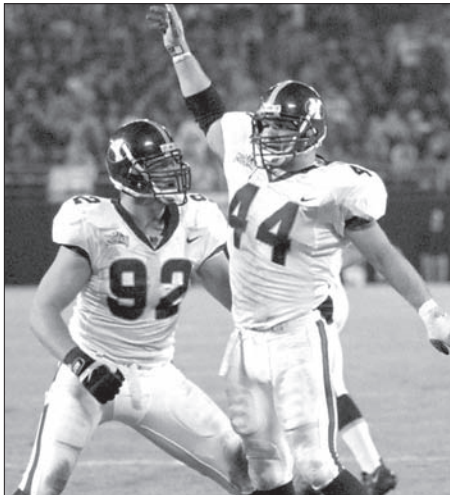

GAME SUMMARY:

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

GAME SUMMARY:

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys. BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402. BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula. Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

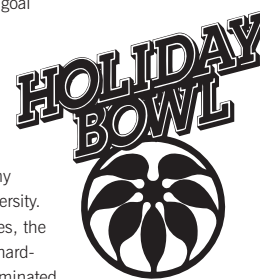

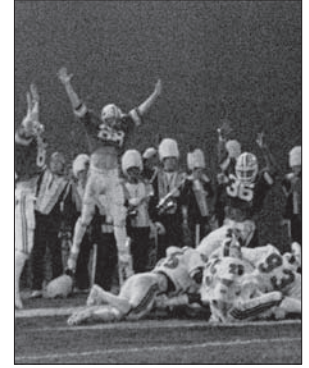
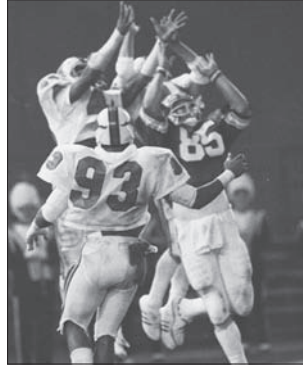

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead. Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation. Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana. The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense. Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

GAME SUMMARY:

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration. SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33. Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield. SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left. McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

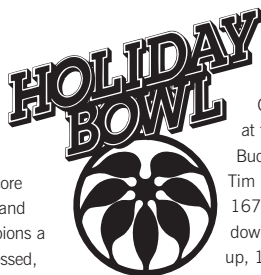

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge. As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground. Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79. Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.



GAME SUMMARY:

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17. BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points. Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7. Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime. Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good. BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomzak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground. Ten different BYU players caught passes, led by Hudson with seven receptions for 81 yards and Balholm with 58 yards receiving.

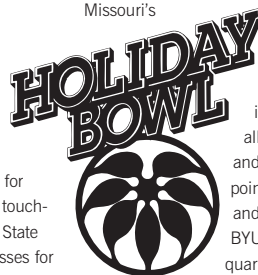

GAME SUMMARY:

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt. BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

GAME SUMMARY:

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship. The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive. The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break. Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go. Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship. David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge. Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead. In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead. Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats—one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor. Mark Bellini had 89 yards receiving while Lakei Heimuli added 10 receptions for 77 yards.

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24. The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries. The first half was all defense as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

The 11th annual All-American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up. The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times. Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission. BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter. Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining. But that was as close as the Cougars would get. Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal. It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7. A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter. BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory. Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

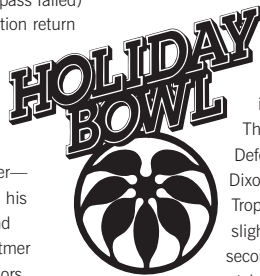

GAME SUMMARY:

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game. For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team. BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points. Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown. Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

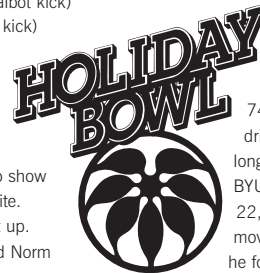

Defensive backs Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up and Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his non-throwing shoulder. The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead. With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter. The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player. BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

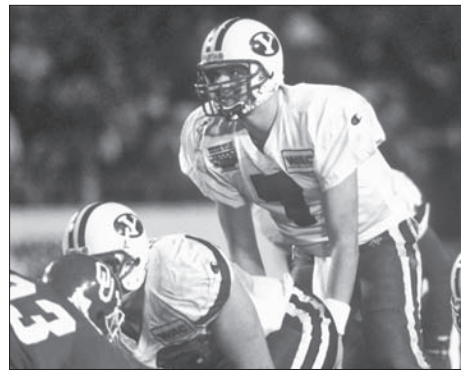
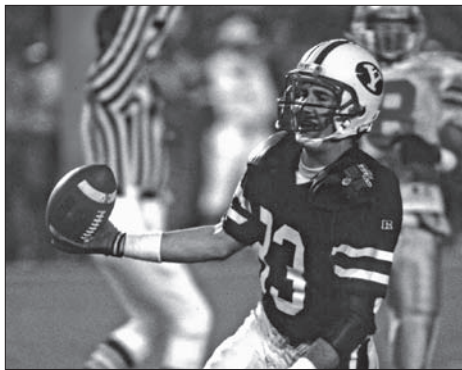

From there, he found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6. BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer-to-Tyler Anderson touchdown from 29 yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13. Each team threatened to score late in the fourth quarter. Iowa missed a 40-yard field goal with 4:19 left. On the game's final drive the Cougars moved inside the Iowa 20 with 33 seconds left to play, but Detmer's pass to tight end Byron Rex was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the end zone to preserve the tie. Josh Arnold of BYU earned defensive MVP honors as BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the AP and CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa was 10th in both polls.

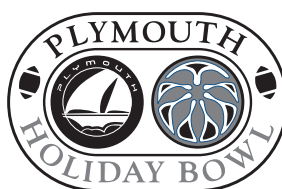

Despite Harris' rushing, the Cougars managed to go into the halftime break tied at 21. Chad Lewis made a spectacular one-handed touchdown grab in the corner of the end zone to bail the Cougars out of a fourth-and-eight situation. After Harris' short touchdown run late in the third, BYU and OSU traded possessions until late into the fourth quarter. After forcing a rare Buckeye punt, BYU got the ball back on its own 42 with 43 seconds left. On first down, Walsh hooked up with senior co-captain Eric Drage who ran away from Buckeye defenders and advanced the ball 52 yards to the OSU six-yard-line. Walsh had 389 yards and fullback Kalin Hall rushed for 42 yards on 11 carries. Tyler Anderson returned five kicks for 145 yards, including an exciting 45-yarder. Harris and Walsh shared MVP honors.

BYU fans celebrated the New Year early as the Cougars dominated Oklahoma and ended its five-year winning drought in bowl games. Quarterback John Walsh and the offense clicked on all cylinders and the Cougars' defense was dominating throughout the ESPN telecast. Walsh threw a seven-yard TD pass to Bryce Doman in the first quarter and had a 25-yard pass to Mike Johnston in the second quarter. A four-yard scoring pass to Johnston in the third quarter and a 28-yard touchdown pass to Doman in the fourth quarter vaulted Walsh's stats to 454 yards and four touchdowns on 31 of 45 passes with no interceptions against the Sooner defense which had held national champion Nebraska to 13 points. BYU's defense was dominating as it held Oklahoma to just 72 yards rushing and 163 yards passing—most of those in the last quarter. The Sooners did not cross midfield until their ninth possession on the second-to-last play of the third quarter. Jamal Willis caught seven passes for 103 yards and was chosen Offensive Player of the Game. Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final game at BYU. BYU finished 10th in the CNN/USA Today poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.

BYU assumed the nation's longest winning streak with a come-from-behind 19-15 victory in the 61st annual Cotton Bowl. It was the first New Year's Day appearance for both 14th-ranked Kansas State and fifth-ranked BYU. More than 40,000-purple clad Kansas State supporters out-numbered the 15,000 Cougar patrons as 71,928 fans filled the Cotton Bowl. BYU got on the board first with a safety, then turned the ensuing punt into a field goal to lead 5-0 in the first quarter. The safety came when linebacker Shay Muirbrook, the game's defensive MVP, collected one of his six sacks. Kansas State took a half-time lead with a 41-yard Hail Mary pass and a successful two-point conversion with no time left on the clock. The Wildcats increased the lead to 15-5 in the third quarter when offensive co-MVP Kevin Lockett caught a 72-yard TD. Fueled by consecutive controversial interference no-calls, quarterback Steve Sarkisian engineered two fourth-quarter drives capped by touchdown passes of 32-yards to James Dye and 28-yards to K.O. Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy. KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an interception from a Wildcat slant pattern at the 12 yard line to secure the game.

GAME SUMMARY:

In BYU's first ever appearance at the Liberty Bowl, the Cougars ran into tenth-ranked Tulane that entered the New Year's Eve game with a perfect season record. The Cougars struck first on an 11-yard pass from Kevin Feterik to receiver Ben Horton. Tulane would score 20 unanswered points in the first half. With just 41 seconds remaining in the half, BYU looked to put an end to the Green Wave momentum, but came up short as Feterik was sacked by Phil Henderson for a 10-yard loss to end the half. Things didn't get much better for the Cougars in the second half, as Tulane scored its third touchdown of the game on the opening drive of the half. On its next possession, the Green Wave would strike again on a 13-yard pass from King to Jamaican Dartez to give Tulane a 34-6 lead with just over seven minutes remaining in the third quarter. On its first drive of the final period, BYU scored for the first time since the 8:49 mark in the first half on an Aaron Cupp three-yard run. Tulane answered with a six-play drive that covered 76 yards, giving the Green Wave a 41-13 lead with just over nine minutes remaining in the game. Trailing by 28 midway through the fourth quarter, BYU finally crossed the Tulane 20-yard line for the first time since the first half and went on to score 14 unanswered points before time expired. Feterik completed an 18-yard pass to Cupp, while Junior Mahe capped off the BYU scoring with a three-yard plunge into the endzone.

On BYU's ensuing drive, Feterik connected with Margin Hooks for a 67-yard pass play that took the Cougars all the way to the nine-yard line. However, the Cougars couldn't capitalize inside the red zone and Feterik suffered a collarbone injury off a blind-side corner blitz. Pochman, who had connected on 18 of 25



attempts in the regular season, missed wide left on his field goal attempt. 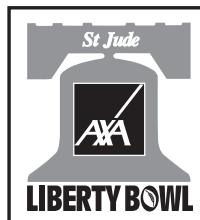

Although Louisville went on to win 28-10, BYU's defense played one of its best games of the season, holding the Cardinals' high-powered offense to 228 yards passing and only 58 yards rushing.

The Golden Bears struck again before the half, going 58 yards in 27 seconds to take a 21-14 lead into the locker room. In the fourth, Beck engineered a 74-yard drive that ended with Harline scoring and then a 96-yard drive that ended with Watkins catching a nine-yard touchdown pass from Beck. California's ensuing drive ended with a missed field goal and the Cougars had a chance to tie but the drive ended on Beck's interception.

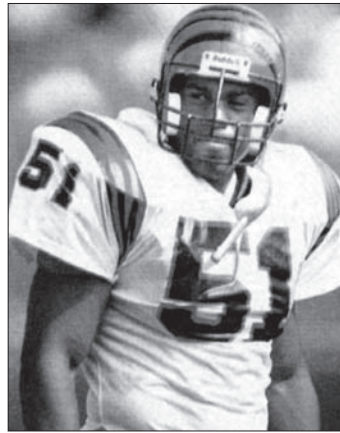




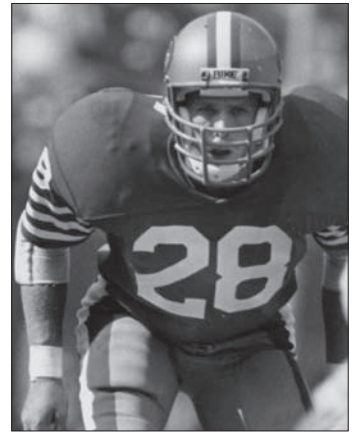

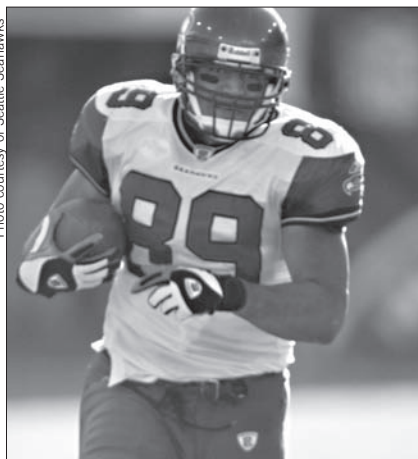

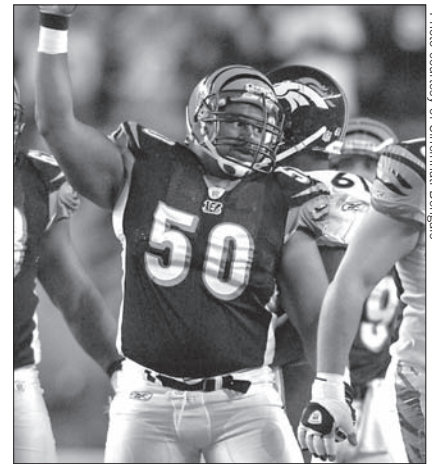

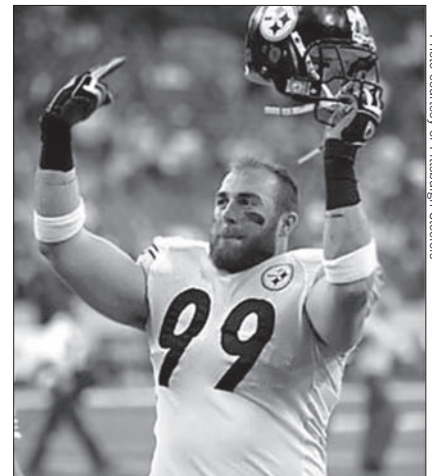

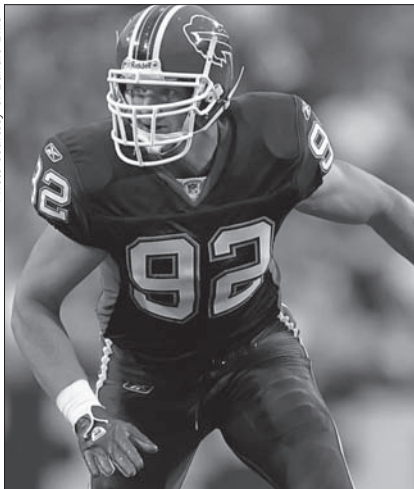

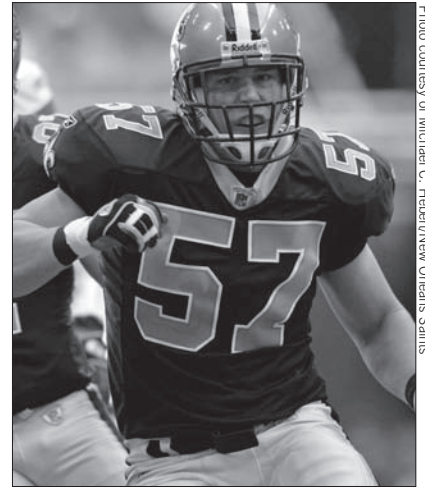

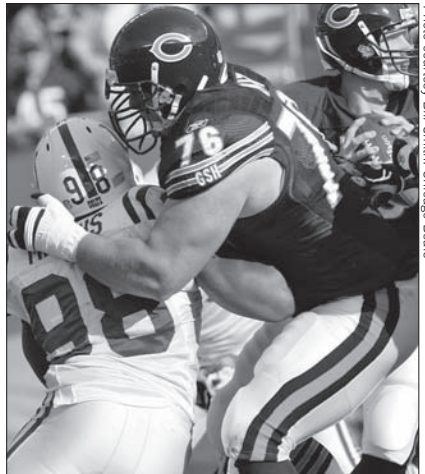

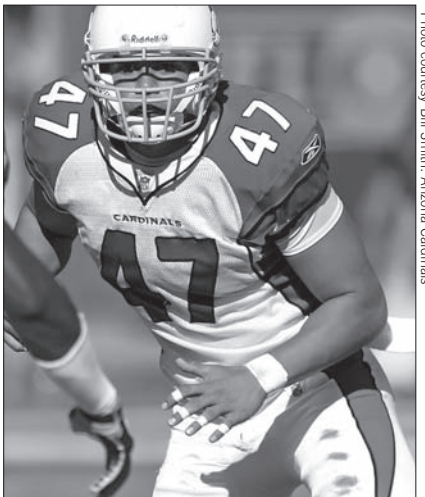

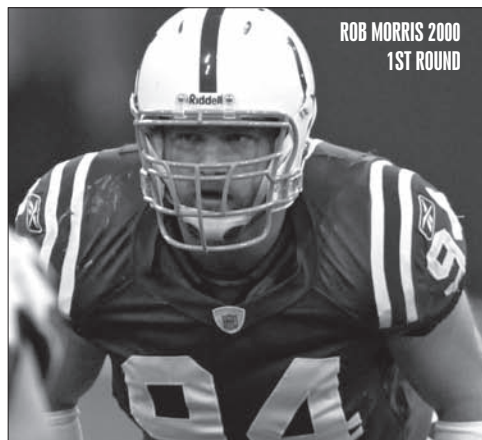

BYU'S NFL DRAFT FACTS

- The Cougars have had 10 players selected in the first round of the draft, including eight different players who were drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft, one player selected in the first round of the USFL Draft and one player selected in the first round of the CFL Draft.
- BYU has had 62 players drafted over the past 21 years, including 34 players over the past 15 years.
- Four members of the BYU coaching staff were selected in the NFL Draft, including Lance Reynolds (1978, Pittsburgh Steelers), Robert Anae (1985, New England Patriots), Steve Kaufusi (1988, Philadelphia Eagles) and Brandon Doman (2002, San Francisco 49'ers.) Additionally, two BYU athletic department administrators were also selected in the NFL Draft, including Robbie Bosco (1986, Green Bay) and Tom Holmoe (1983, San Francisco).
- Over the past 20 seasons, 34 offensive players from BYU have been drafted, as well as 26 defensive players and two special teams players.
- As the 24th selection in the fourth round of the 2005 draft (125th overall), Brady Poppinga was the highest BYU draft pick since Doug Jolley (Oakland Raiders) and John Denney (Buffalo Bills) were selected in the second round of the 2002 draft.
- Todd Watkins was the first player from BYU to be drafted by the Cardinals since Tevita Ofahengaue in 2001. It was only the third time since 1997 only one player from BYU has been selected in the NFL Draft.
- The 2005 NFL Draft marked the first time BYU has had three players drafted since five Cougars were selected in the 2002 draft.

John Tait proved why he was a first-round draft pick and one of the NFL's best in 2003 as he helped pave way for RB Priest Holmes to set the NFL single-season TD record while totaling 1,420 rushing yards for the NFL's top scoring offense (Kansas City).



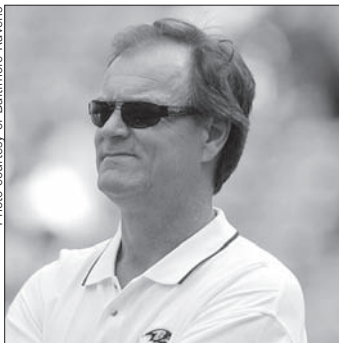
TOP OF THE CLASS: BYU's rich football tradition has bred some of the top football minds in the country. Three former BYU players and coaches are currently successful coaches in the NFL. Former BYU tight end Brian Billick led his Baltimore Ravens to the Super Bowl title in 2001 while former BYU offensive lineman Andy Reid led the resurgent Philadelphia Eagles into Super Bowl in 2004. Former BYU assistant coach under LaVell Edwards, Mike Holmgren, has also won a world championship when he led his Green Bay Packers to the 1997 Super Bowl title.



BYU's football influence also extends to other football leagues. In 2003, former BYU linebacker Todd Shell was named Arena Football's Coach of the Year. Shell is the head coach of the New York Dragons in the Arena Football League (AFL).

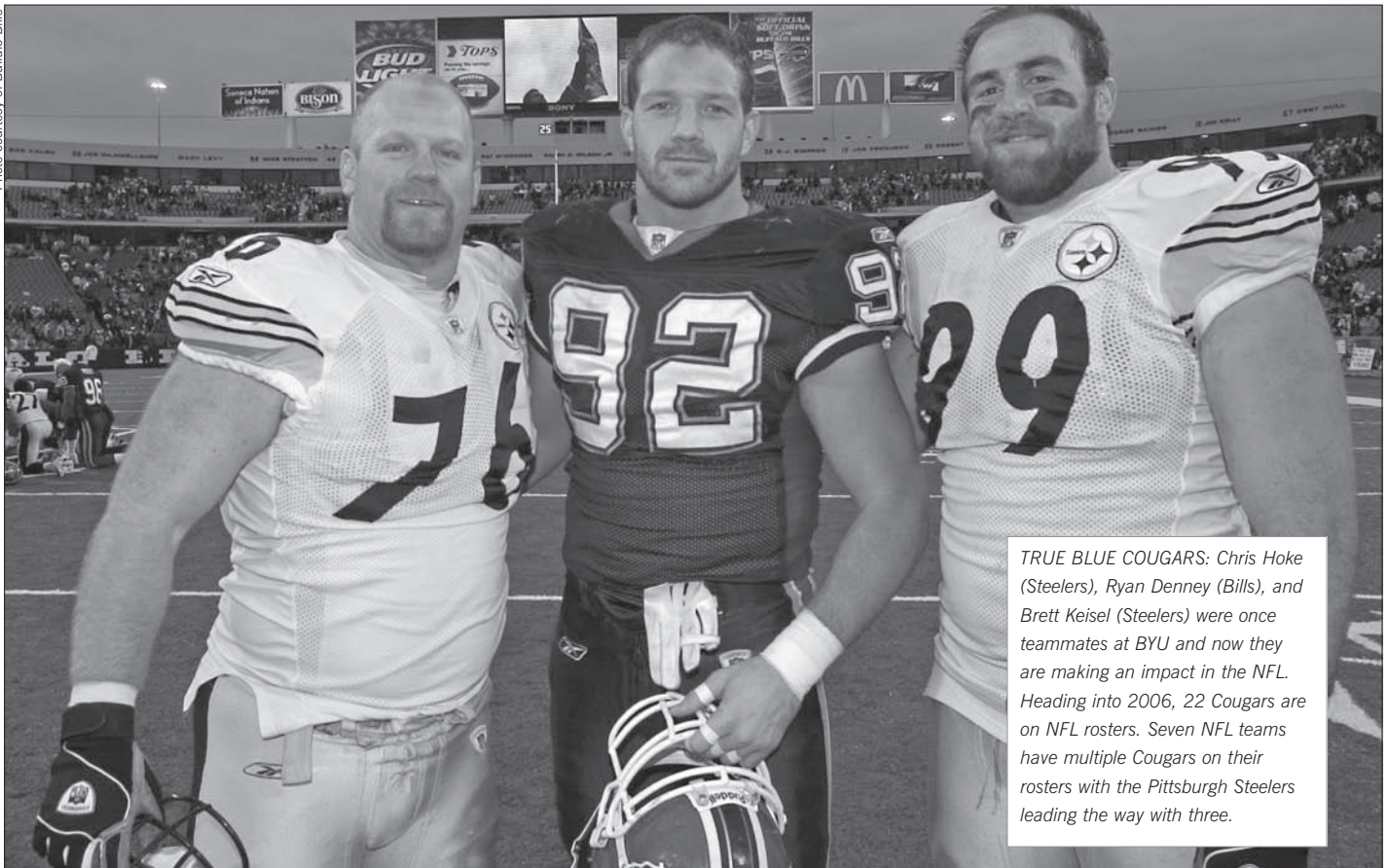

We sincerely appreciate your coverage of BYU football and look forward to working with you this season.

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

All requests for credentials to cover BYU football should be sent on company letterhead to: Jeff Reynolds, Associate Director; Athletic Communications; 30 SFH; Provo, UT 84602. Fax requests may be sent to (801) 422-0633.

All single-game credential requests should be received no later than one week prior to the date of the game. Requests received later than noon on the day prior to the game will not be accepted. Credentials for working media, including print and electronic (radio & television) media outlets, are restricted in accordance with BYU, Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules and guidelines. It is our intention to ensure proper, professional use is made of the space available for credentialed media.

PRESS BOX

Working press box credentials shall be issued only to accredited newspaper, radio and television reporters only. Requests from other media sources shall be evaluated on a game-by-game basis. Reporters representing newspapers with next-day editions, daily editions, national magazines, wire services, live television and radio broadcasts and television and radio stations covering for nightly news shall be given priority. Spouses, dates, children and other non-working persons will not be credentialed and are not allowed in the working media areas during the game as dictated by NCAA guidelines.

Credentials must be displayed prominently throughout the game, including pre- and post-game coverage. Pre-game interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstances. Properly credentialed media representatives shall be allowed field access with four minutes remaining on the game clock. Interviews with players and/or coaches may not be conducted until the NCAA-mandated 10-minute cooling off period has expired. Individuals

or organizations violating this policy may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and television reporters/camera operators on assignment. Television organizations shall be restricted to one camera operator and one reporter on the field at all times, except by prior approval from the BYU Athletic Communications office. Freelance and amateur photographers, not on assignment, are not eligible for sideline credentials, except by prior approval from the BYU Athletic Communications office.

All Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules will be enforced regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yardlines. Sideline supervisors will patrol both sidelines to make certain all rules are enforced. Individuals or organizations violating sideline policies may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium. For additional questions regarding photography guidelines, please contact University photographer Mark Philbrick at (801) 422-7322.

MEDIA SERVICES

The working media area is located on the third floor of the press box, situated on the west side of LaVell Edwards Stadium. Access to the press loge may be obtained via either the north or south elevators.

The BYU Athletic Communications staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs, game stats, post-game quotes and media guides for both teams.

With four minutes remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU Head Coach Bronco Mendenhall and selected players will be available in the media room following the mandatory 10-minute cooling-off period. The BYU locker room is closed to all media.

Several courtesy telephones (with campus extensions) will be available in the working area of the press box, while a limited number of phones will be available in the media room. All phones are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Phone lines can be purchased for your organization's exclusive use on a season-long basis. Collect or credit card calls can be made from each of these telephones.

The BYU press box is also equipped with high-speed internet access, including ethernet connections and wireless access.

PARKING

LaVell Edwards Stadium is located on the northwest corner of the BYU campus, just off Canyon Road (200 East) and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is in Lot No. 2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking passes are required and must be obtained in advance.

INTERVIEWS

During the season, all player and coach interviews must be scheduled through Jeff Reynolds in the Athletic Communications office at (801) 422-8948. Interview requests must be made 24 hours in advance. Interviews with players and coaches may be conducted following selected practices during the week. Practices will be closed to media on Thursday and Friday prior to a Saturday game. Interview schedules will be adjusted for Thursday or Friday games. Players and coaches will not be available for interview prior to practice. Telephone interviews, for out-of-town media, can be arranged through the Athletic Communications office. Interviews with players on the day prior to the game, as well as game day, are not permitted. No player interviews will be conducted during regular class hours.

WEB SITES

To have access to athletes, coaches, practice, games, etc., Internet sites must be held to the same professional standards required of traditional media. Website personnel must show caution, restraint and professional judgment in covering potential student-athletes and the recruiting process. Websites covering BYU recruiting must be familiar with and follow all NCAA rules. Proper judgment and an understanding of NCAA rules must be dis-

played at all times. Access will be determined on a case-by-case basis. Failure to adhere to the standards and regular media policies established by the BYU Athletic Communications office may result in the loss of privileges. Live, real-time updates will not be permitted. Websites interested in seeking credentials or access should contact the Athletic Communications office for specific rules and guidelines.

SPORTS RADIO

All interviews must be arranged through the Athletic Communications office. The Athletic Communications office will not facilitate the broadcast of live guests during regular class hours. All interviews for sports talk radio must be conducted with players after practice or during the weekly media luncheon. Radio stations will be responsible for attending practices and for providing their own equipment (i.e. tape, digital recorders, telephones, etc). All sports talk radio stations will be issued one credential per home game.

WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEON

Each Wednesday, Coach Mendenhall and selected players will be available for interview purposes from noon until 1 p.m. All live electronic interviews, during the luncheon, must be arranged in advance with the Athletic Communications office. The luncheon is for credentialed media only. The weekly luncheon will be held in the new Student Athlete Building.

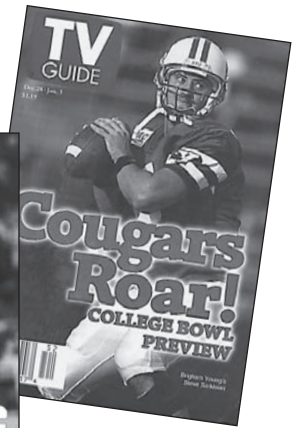

MEDIA ATTENTION

From national publications to live television broadcasts, BYU football is one of the more visible programs in the country. Since its first national television appearance in 1974, BYU has posted a 52-40-2 record while playing in front of a national audience, including a 24-17 mark on ABC and a 27-23-2 mark on ESPN. Dating back to 1980, the Cougars have appeared on national television an average of three times per season. The Cougars have played at least five games on national TV over eight different seasons, including the 2004, 2003, 2002, 2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1988 and 1985 seasons. Since 1980, BYU has played in at least one nationally-televised game per season. On Sept. 1, 1984, Robbie Bosco (right) led BYU to a 20-14 victory over Pitt in the first live ESPN College Football broadcast. Three out of the top 10 largest television audiences ever to watch a college football game on ESPN were BYU football games.

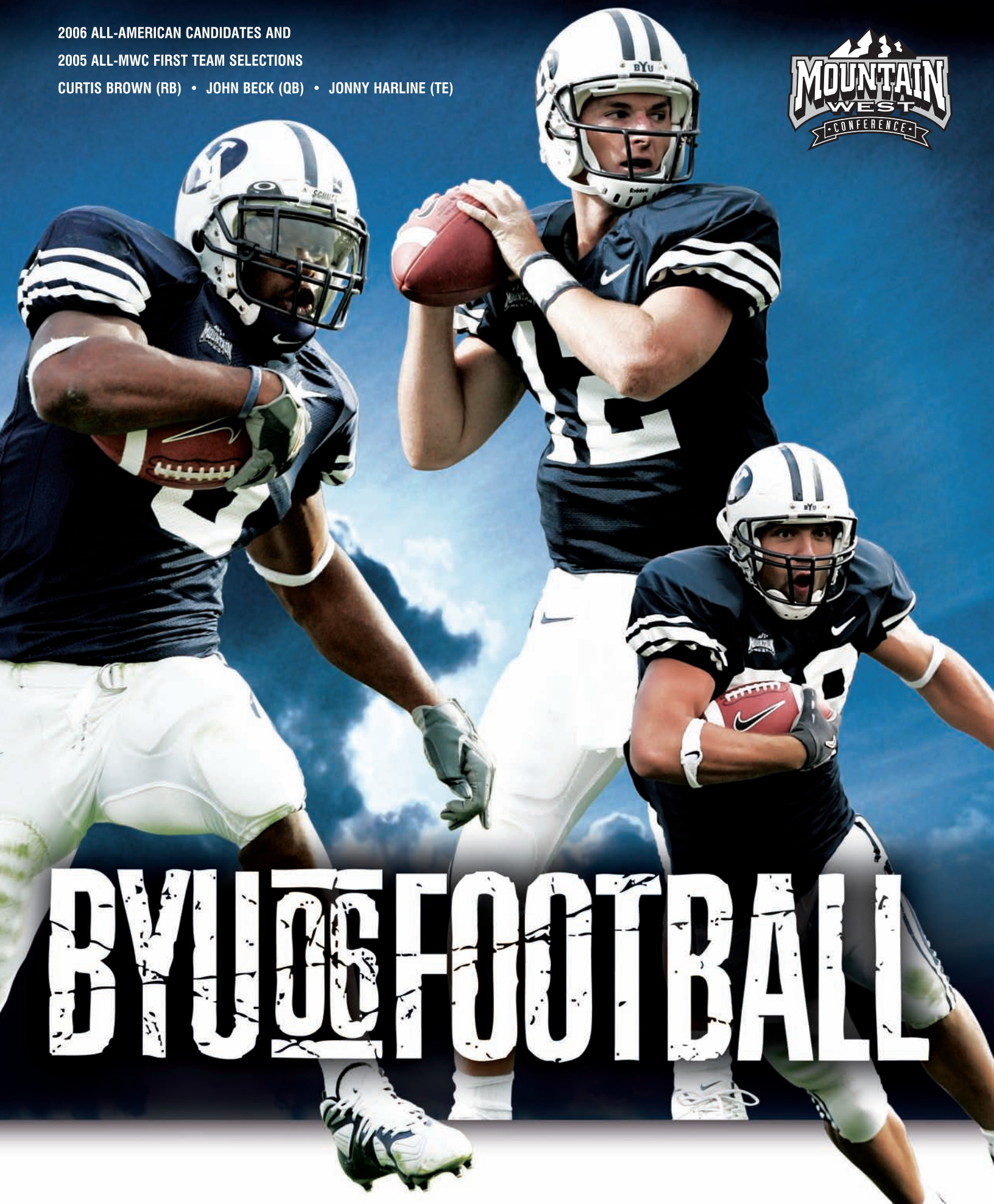
