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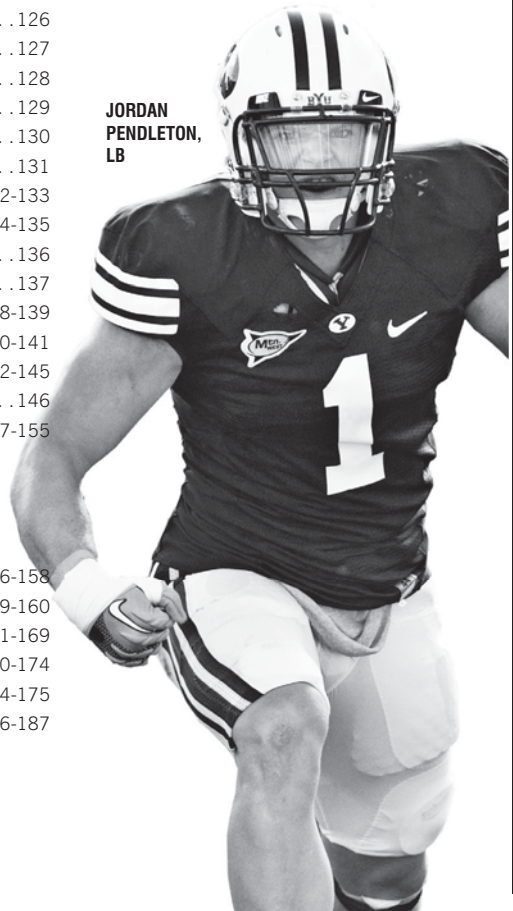

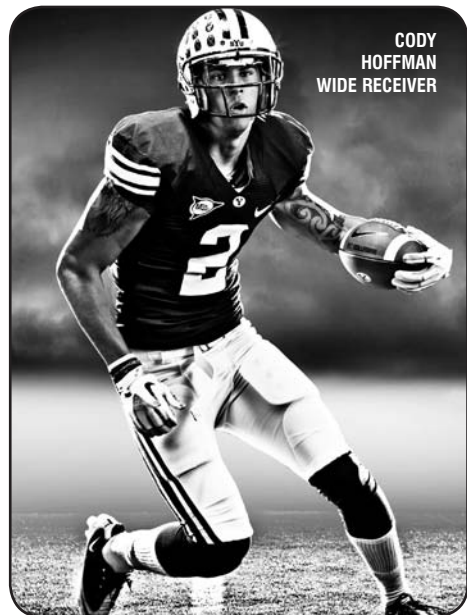

2011 COUGAR FOOTBALL SEASON PREVIEW

BOASTING STRONG SQUAD, COUGARS EMBARK ON INDEPENDENCE IN 2011

The BYU Cougars return 18 starters and 63 lettermen to a team set to embark on its first year as a football independent in 2011 with television partner ESPN.

With a proven system in place under seventh-year head coach Bronco Mendenhall, the Cougars will face teams from the Southeastern Conference, Big 12, Pac-12, Conference USA, Western Athletic Conference, Mountain West Conference and Big Sky. The 12-game schedule kicks off at Ole Miss on Sept. 3 and concludes at Hawaii on Dec. 3 with matchups against Texas, TCU, Utah, Oregon State, and Central Florida highlighting the 2011 schedule.

In his first six years as head coach, Mendenhall has the highest win percentage in BYU history at .731 (56-21) that also currently ranks him No. 9 in winning percentage among all active head coaches. His 56 wins are the most by a BYU coach in his first six seasons, and over the last five campaigns only eight teams have achieved more wins than BYU's 50 victories (Boise State 61-5, Ohio State 56-9, Florida 56-12, TCU 55-10, Oklahoma 54-15, Virginia Tech 52-16, USC 51-14, LSU 51-15). The Cougars have also been successful in postseason matchups, earning six-straight bowl invitations and joining a group of only 11 programs to win four bowls in the last five years.

BYU finished its 12-year tenure in the MWC with 64 conference victories—the most of any MWC school. The Cougars enter independence having finished in the Top 25 in four of the last five years and look to earn a spot among that elite company again in 2011.

Winning five of its final six games in 2010, BYU capped the season with a dominating 52-24 New Mexico Bowl victory over UTEP to finish the year 7-6 overall after a 1-4 start. BYU's bowl victory highlighted the progress and momentum the relatively young team gained over the course of the season as 19 freshman played for the Cougars and several played big roles in the season-ending victory.

True freshman quarterback Jake Heaps became the first frosh signal caller in BYU history to start in a bowl and completed 25-of-34 passes for 264 yards and four touchdowns to be named New Mexico Bowl Offensive MVP. Redshirt freshman wide receiver Cody Hoffman caught three touchdowns on eight receptions for 137 yards in the bowl win, while true freshman running back Joshua Quezada ran for 101 yards on 15 carries and one touchdown. The Cougars established 31 New Mexico Bowl records during the game and set 11 BYU bowl high marks, including most points (52) and most rushing yards (219).

"We were really making progress as the season ended last year and in the spring I was pleased to see we picked up where we left off," Mendenhall said. "This team is very talented and we have more depth than in

the previous six years that I've been the coach. They love to compete and they are fun to be around. I like our chemistry. I'm very optimistic."

Among 31 offensive and 28 defensive lettermen returning, the 2011 Cougars return 18 starters (10 on offense, 8 on defense) and 14 additional players who have starting experience. They also expect strong contributions from several who didn't have a chance to play last year due to transfer rules and injuries, such as USC transfer linebacker Uona Kaveinga and redshirt freshman receiver Ross Apo.

Detailed below is a breakdown of the 2011 team heading into fall camp.

OFFENSE

BYU employs a pro-style offense that under the direction of new offensive coordinator Brandon Doman will be similar to the traditional BYU offenses of the past. The offense came on strong the last half of the 2010 season after a slow start with inexperienced players in key roles against a tough schedule. With 10 of 11 starters returning, the 2011 squad looks to build on the experience and momentum gained last year, needing only to fill a void at right guard. Outland Trophy, Lombardi Award and All-America candidate Matt Reynolds (Sr., OL) anchors an offensive line that includes three players who have started every game each of the last two years and a fourth (Braden Brown) who started all of last year and part of the prior season. Sophomore Jake Heaps, who broke all BYU freshman QB records and was MVP of New Mexico Bowl, has a talented receiving corps returning along with all the running backs from last season that notched seven games of 200 or more yards on the ground for BYU, the most in a season by a Cougar team since 2001. After spring drills the offense is energized under the leadership of Doman, who in addition to tutoring Heaps last season has helped both of BYU's prior starters land in the NFL under his tutelage. New coaches on the

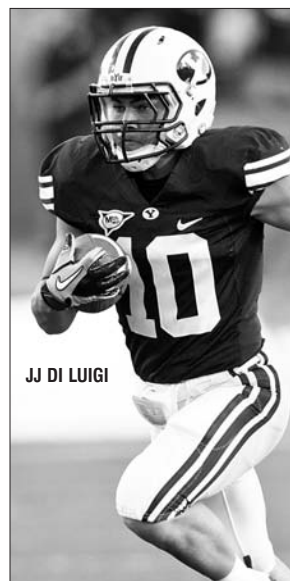
staff in 2011 include Joe DuPaix, who will coach running backs after coming to BYU from Navy, and former Cougar Ben Cahoon, who will mentor receivers after retiring in January as the CFL's all-time receptions leader.

QUARTERBACK

The tradition of the BYU quarterback factory should add another notable chapter in 2011 after true freshman Jake Heaps broke all the school's freshmen records in 2010. While the biggest question mark entering last season was who would take over at quarterback given three-year starter Max Hall's departure, this year BYU's quarterback stable is, well, just that—stable. Five talented players make up the depth chart at this vital position with Heaps the clear-cut starter, followed by juniors Riley Nelson and James Lark, sophomore Jason Munns and true freshman Alex Kuresa. Both Heaps and Nelson amassed huge numbers as high school All-Americans. Heaps has all the physical tools directing BYU's pro-style offense to be among the top signal callers in the nation. He can make every throw and has talented weapons at his disposal with 10 starters returning. Building on the strong finish to his 10-start true freshmen season, the nation's top-rated quarterback recruit in 2010 had an outstanding spring in his second go-around and seems poised for a big sophomore campaign in 2011 commanding the BYU attack. Nelson started the first three games in 2010, sharing time with Heaps in a two-quarterback rotation, before an injury early in the third game at Florida State put him out for the season. The athletic left-hander returned to put up strong numbers with both his arm and his feet during spring practices. Lark, the 2005 Utah 3A MVP out of Pine View High School in St. George, Utah, returned from a mission last year and backed up Heaps over the final 10 games of the season, appearing in four contests. Munns, the 2006 Big Nine Co-Player of the Year out of Southridge High School in Kennewick, Wash., also returned from a mission last year and is another very capable player should his number be called. Kuresa, the 2010 Utah Gatorade Player of the Year and Deseret News Mr. Football recipient, joins the mix out of Mountain Crest High School after setting nearly every career quarterback record in the state of Utah, including total offense (12,917), passing yards (10,951) and passing touchdowns (101).

RUNNING BACK

BYU returns all of its backs in 2011 in what should be a

strong group of playmakers. Senior JJ Di Luigi averaged 5.2 yards per carry while rushing for 917 yards last year, adding another 443 yards as a receiver. He had a team-leading eight touchdowns on the ground and one more through the air while touching the ball more than any other back or receiver with team-highs of 178 carries and 45 receptions. The shifty, make-you-miss runner should once again be an all-purpose weapon in the Cougar attack. Fellow senior Bryan Kariya, a north-and-south runner, added 550 yards on 137 carries last year with 21 catches for 122 yards. An excellent blocker and leader, Kariya will continue to play a critical role out of the backfield. One player sure to increase his touches in 2011 is Joshua Quezada. Coming off a strong end to his true freshman season in 2010, the sophomore excelled in the spring and should demand more reps as a primary ball carrier in his second season. Known as a strong runner, he has all the tools to be BYU's primary ball carrier over the next three years. True fullback Zed Mendenhall, a junior, returns as a powerful blocker with starting experience. Junior David Foote, sophomore Ryan Folsom and returned missionaries Michael Alisa, Iona Pritchard and Adam Hine are among those looking to take advantage of their opportunities to give BYU depth in the backfield under the new leadership of assistant coach Joe DuPaix, who enters his first year with the Cougars after coming from Navy. As freshmen in 2008, Alisa played linebacker and Pritchard saw time at both linebacker and running back. Alisa made the move to running back during spring practices and Pritchard will focus on the offensive side of the ball as well in 2011.

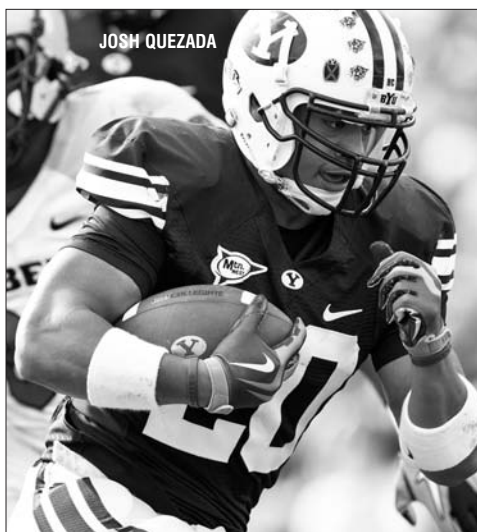
WIDE RECEIVER

BYU's receivers may be some of the most talented to ever line up for the Cougars and they will be tutored in 2011 by new receivers coach Ben Cahoon, the CFL's all-time receptions leader known for precision route running and excellent hands. Last year's starters return in senior McKay Jacobson and sophomore Cody Hoffman. Only one regular-rotation receiver—Luke Ashworth (2 starts, 368 yards, 7 TDs)—will not be back in 2011. While Ashworth's clutch scoring will need to be replaced, the talent level is high with the addition of redshirt freshman Ross Apo, who missed last season due to a finger injury. Joining the 6-foot-4 Hoffman, the 6-foot-3

Apo gives BYU two tall, athletic receivers for Heaps to throw to in 2011. Hoffman led BYU with 527 yards and shared TD honors with Ashworth, hauling in seven scoring receptions. He finished the year with three touchdowns on eight receptions for 137 yards in BYU's New Mexico Bowl victory. Jacobson is a speedy receiver with good hands poised for a strong final campaign. He totaled 410 yards on 37 catches in 2010 as the BYU offense worked out some kinks through the early going. He had 528 receiving yards and three touchdowns as a freshman in 2006 prior to serving an LDS Church mission. He ranked behind only All-American tight end Dennis Pitta in receiving yards as a sophomore in 2009 with 556 yards despite missing four games due to an injury. One of 10 players in the nation with two or more receptions over 70 yards, Jacobson's 24.2 yards per catch as a sophomore ranked No. 4 in the nation among all receivers who averaged at least one catch per game. Sophomore JD Falslev, a shifty runner known for making plays, showed during spring that he will press for time on the field in addition to his punt and kick return duties. Senior Spencer Hafoka, a three-year letterman with 22 receptions, and 6-foot-4 redshirt sophomore returned missionary Jordan Smith, a first-team All-State player out of Spanish Fork High School, are among a group of additional wideouts adding depth on the outside for BYU.

TIGHT END

After losing consensus All-America tight end Dennis Pitta and his all-conference backup Andrew George to the NFL, BYU introduced five freshman tight ends in 2010 and expects to see exponential growth in production from this sophomore class in 2011. One of the group, Mike Muehlmann, has moved to defensive end, leaving Devin Mahina, Marcus Mathews, Austin Holt and Richard Wilson returning to compete in fall camp. Joining the mix in addition to senior Matt Edwards is sophomore Kaneakua Friel, who played in eight games with one start as a freshman in 2008 prior to leaving for a two-year mission, and true freshman Colby Jorgensen, the nation's No. 28 tight end recruit in 2011 out of Timpview High School. The 6-foot-6 Mahina made five starts in 2010 and appeared in 12 games while leading the freshmen five last year with 11 catches for 118 yards. He comes out of spring practices

listed as the starter with Mathews and Holt sharing back-up slots on the depth chart. A strong threat as a down-field receiver, the 6-foot-5 Mathews totaled a position-best 136 yards in 2010 before a season-ending injury limited his action to eight games and eight receptions. At 6-foot-4, Holt excels as a blocker and receiver, earning two starts last year while seeing action in 12 games. Wilson will add his talents to the equation in fall camp after sitting out spring drills rehabbing from postseason surgery. The athletic, 6-foot-2 Wilson (3 starts and 12 games in 2010) joins the 6-foot-5 Friel, the 6-foot-7 Jorgensen and 6-foot-3 Edwards in making the tight end position not only deep but also more experienced compared to last year. Assistant head coach Lance Reynolds

coaches the tight ends in 2011, moving over from running backs. His mentorship and 32-years experience is expected to aid the development of this young group of talented players.

OFFENSIVE LINE

A key strength of the BYU team is literally its strength up front. Led by Outland Trophy, Lombardi Award and All-America candidate Matt Reynolds, the Cougars return four starters and have plenty of talent competing to get on the field in 2011. Perhaps the nation's top lineman, Reynolds is a three-year starter at the critical left tackle position and is prepared to deliver a strong final campaign before taking his talents to the NFL. He is a two-time first-team all-conference, College Football News All-Sophomore Team and multiple Freshman All-America honoree. After deciding to not enter the draft as a junior, Reynolds joins fellow returning starters Braden Hansen (LG, CFN All-Sophomore Team and All-MWC honorable mention, 2009 Freshman All-American), Terence Brown (C, All-MWC honorable mention, 2009 CFN All-Sophomore Team honorable mention), and Braden Brown (RT) in protecting quarterback Jake Heaps and creating holes for the Cougar running backs. Among those likely to replace departed right guard Jason Speredon are junior Walter Kahaial'i, sophomore Houston Reynolds (brother of Matt) and senior Marco Thorson. Another player who has the talent to be on the field is high school All-American Ryker Mathews. A mid-year enrollee, the true freshman played left tackle during spring while Matt Reynolds sat out rehabbing a postseason surgery. He showed he has all the tools to become Reynolds' heir apparent and could factor into the mix in his first season. Offensive line coach Mark Weber was able to give many of his younger linemen plenty of experience during spring practices as only Braden Brown participated among the starters with others rehabbing from surgeries. They made good progress and give Weber a deep cadre of big bodies prepared to spearhead the Cougar offensive attack in 2011.

DEFENSE

Bronco Mendenhall will maintain the defensive coordinator role in 2011. The Cougars came on strong after he took over the defense for the final eight games last season. After ranking 101st nationally in total defense following the 1-4 start, the Cougars showed significant improvement under Mendenhall's leadership to earn the nation's No. 24 overall defense at year's end, ranking only behind TCU—the nation's No. 1 defense—among MWC schools. In 2011, the Cougar front seven is as deep and talented as perhaps any of Mendenhall's previous teams and should prove stout against the run. First-team All-MWC defensive lineman Vic So'oto graduated, but he leaves his former teammates in good hands with seven starters and four others with starting

experience available among the front seven. In the secondary, BYU will introduce some new faces. The Cougars are replacing the team's KAT safety and team captain Andrew Rich as well as cornerbacks Brian Logan and Brandon Bradley. Rich led the team in tackles, interceptions, pass breakups and forced fumbles last season and was named All-MWC First Team. Sophomore returned missionary Daniel Sorensen demonstrated great potential during the spring in filling Rich's role, while two corners with starting experience return to compete with several talented redshirts and transfers to fill out the BYU secondary.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The defensive line loses defensive end Vic So'oto but boasts five players with starting experience. Before a season-ending knee injury, perhaps the team's best defensive player in 2010 was Romney Fuga. The 6-foot-2, 307-pound defensive tackle only played the first four games but is expected to again anchor the defensive front in 2011. Starting end Matt Putnam is back for his senior season along with junior Eathyn Manumaleuna, who started at end and tackle last year due to the variety of injuries the team suffered during the season. A two-year starter, Manumaleuna is slated to start at right end backed up by Jordan Richardson, who started five games last year in Fuga's spot before also suffering a year-ending injury. Putnam is joined on the depth chart by sophomore Graham Rowley at left end, both of whom could pull starting duties. Also in the mix is returning missionary Ian Dulan, who started three years before deciding to leave for his missionary service. If Dulan doesn't redshirt, he adds significant experience and ability to the defensive frontline. The middle of the line will be a strength that should help BYU be stingy against the run. Behind Fuga, the Cougars have two extremely talented players who showed during spring they should make a difference when on the field. Redshirt freshman Travis Tuiloma and senior Hebron Fangupo, a transfer from USC, give BYU perhaps one of the best 1-2-3 punches at one of the most important, if under-appreciated, positions. The Cougars may also be without the services of 2010 backup end Thomas Bryson, who left school and did not participate in spring but could return in the fall. Mike Muehlmann adds his agile frame to the mix after moving from tight end to defensive end during the

spring, while fall camp will bring the additional talents of incoming freshmen Moses Kaumatule (West Jordan, Utah/Bingham HS), Baker Pritchard (South Jordan, Utah/Bingham HS) and Stehly Reden (Valley Center, Calif./Valley Center HS).

LINEBACKERS

Adding to the depth of the defensive line, BYU's linebacking corps gives the Cougars a front seven that is deep and talented. The Cougars lose inside linebacker Shane Hunter to graduation but return four starters, three others with starting experience and several experienced transfers and returned missionaries. One of the starters back is strong-side linebacker Jordan Pendleton, who returns his NFL-caliber tools to the Cougar defense after playing in only six games last year because of an injury. A player whose development may have benefitted from Pendleton's missed action is sophomore Kyle Van Noy, who played in all 13 games as true freshman, including two starts. Perhaps the best athlete on the team, Van Noy is a playmaker who presents a unique combination of size and speed that can still frustrate offenses on otherwise well-executed plays. Lott Trophy candidate Jameson Frazier, voted a team captain in 2011, returns as a starting outside linebacker, joining the talents of Pendleton, Van Noy and Jadon Wagner, who was selected in the 2011 CFL Draft but has decided to put off a professional career to return for his final season. Frazier and Wagner, who started nine games in 2010, should man the weak side with Pendleton being joined by Van Noy on the strong side. Both Van Noy and Frazier have experience at both outside positions. Redshirt freshman Alani Fua is a talent ready to see his first action in a backup role on the outside, joining returned missionary freshman Kevan Bills and Ghana-native Ezekiel Ansah, who as a track athlete has the physical size and speed to be a real contributor as he becomes more familiar with the game. On the inside, junior Brandon Ogletree returns after starting eight games last year and finishing fourth on the team with 49 tackles. Likely to start at the other inside position is USC transfer Uona Kaveinga, who sat out last season due to transfer rules. The junior has proven through his redshirt year and during spring practices that he will be a leader on the defense and a name called by many announcers as he makes plays in

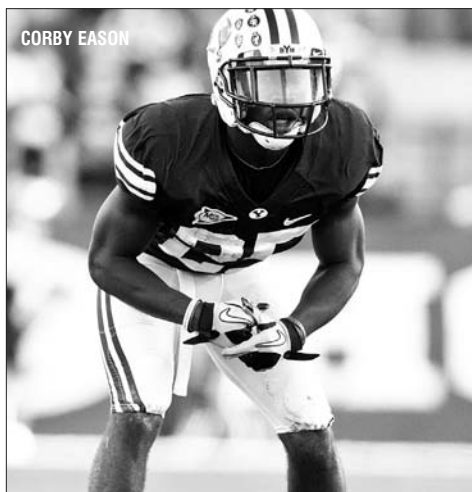

the BYU 3-4 defense. Junior Austin Jorgensen, who made three starts last year and was fifth on the team with 46 tackles, provides starter talent behind Kaveinga. Sophomore Spencer Hadley, who played in 11 games as a true freshman in 2008, returned from his mission and showed during spring that he will earn time in the middle along with Ogletree. Sophomore Zac Stout will redshirt due to offseason surgery; however, Aveni Leung-Wai has starting experience and is joined among others by sophomore Tyler Beck and incoming freshmen Lene Lesatele (Artesia, Calif./Gahr HS), Teu Kautai (Arlington, Texas/The Oakridge School) and Austin Heder (Pleasant Grove, Utah/Pleasant Grove HS) in making the 2011 linebackers among the deepest group at BYU in many years.

SECONDARY

The position with the most changes in 2011 will be the Cougar secondary. Gone are all-conference safety Andrew Rich and cornerbacks Brian Logan and Brandon Bradley. The big-hitting Rich led the team in multiple categories, including tackles, interceptions and pass breakups, while Logan was the team's primary cover corner the past

two seasons and Bradley was a steady performer at the boundary corner spot. Free safety Travis Uale, who has been voted a team captain going into his senior season, is the lone returning starter but is joined by a group of players who have the potential to make the transition in the defensive backfield a smooth one. The player who has turned the most heads is sophomore safety Daniel Sorensen, a returned missionary who played linebacker in 2008 before spending the past two years as a missionary in Costa Rica. Back in his original position at strong safety, Sorensen delivered hits and defended passes during spring practices in a way that could make the adjustment to life without Rich much better than might have been anticipated. Sophomore Jray Galea'i joins Sorensen on the depth chart at the KAT position, while junior Mike Hague is pushing Uale for time at free safety after moving from running back during the spring. Junior Carter Mees and sophomore Chase Pendley also show promise at the free and KAT positions, respectively. The corners have two players with starting experience returning in senior Corby Eason and junior Robbie Buckner. Eason was a major contributor last season at boundary corner with 22 tackles, 3.5 sacks and two forced fumbles. He sat out spring drills recovering from a postseason surgery, which gave Snow College transfer Preston Hadley the opportunity to show he will be a contributor in his first season at BYU. DeQuan Everett, a junior who redshirted last year after transferring from Cerritos JC, is also in the mix. Buckner is competing with redshirt freshman Jordan Johnson at the field corner spot vacated by Logan.

SPECIAL TEAMS

All but one specialist or returner is back in 2011. The lone exception is the MWC and BYU career scoring leader Mitch Payne, who has manned the team's primary placekicking duties for four years. Taking over the challenge of replacing Payne is the strong-legged returned-missionary Justin Sorensen. As a freshman in 2008, Sorensen handled kickoff responsibilities and booted 32 balls for touchbacks. He had limited opportunity kicking field goals as a freshman but made his only regular-distance attempt of 31 yards. His two other attempts were both unsuccessful 50-plus-yard kicks. The punting duties rest on the capable foot of a junior Riley Stephenson. The versatile junior will be able to concentrate on punting duties in 2011 after handling much of the kickoff responsibilities the past two years. An All-MWC honorable mention performer as a freshman, he can kick for distance or touch with 17 punts of more than 50 yards last year and 20 kicks placed inside the 20. He tied his career high and set a BYU bowl record with a 60-yard boot in BYU's New Mexico Bowl victory. Deep snapper Reed Hornung and holder Matt Marshall are back as well as return specialists JD Falslev and Cody Hoffman.



WORTH NOTING

-BYU is the only school in the nation to have its basketball and football coaches each in the top 10 winning percentage among active coaches. Bronco Mendenhall is currently 8th while basketball coach Dave Rose is 4th.

-BYU has a proven system in place under Bronco Mendenhall. In his six years as head coach, Mendenhall has the highest win percentage in BYU history at .731 (56-21). His 56 wins are the most by a BYU coach in his first six years of coaching.

-BYU has achieved a 50-15 record over the last five seasons. Only eight teams have more wins over that span (Boise State 61-5, Ohio State 56-9, Florida 56-12, TCU 55-10, Oklahoma 54-15, Virginia Tech 52-16, USC 51-14, LSU 51-15).

-BYU has been invited to six-straight bowl games and won four of its last five bowls. The last time BYU teams won four bowls in a five-game span was from 1980-84. BYU's 52 points in its 2010 New Mexico Bowl victory set a BYU bowl record. BYU is one of only 11 programs to win four bowl games in the last five years.

-BYU is only one of seven FBS programs in the country to win 10 or more games during at least four of the last five seasons. Those teams include Ohio State (5 times), Virginia Tech (5 times), Boise State (5 times), BYU (4 times), Oklahoma (4 times), TCU (4 times) and Texas (4 times). BYU and Boise State are the only programs in the West to do so.

-After three losing seasons from 2002-04, BYU has earned a 56-21 record over the past six season under head coach Bronco Mendenhall to rank No. 16 in total wins (tied with Auburn) among all teams in the nation during that span. The Cougars are one of only 12 schools to win 10 or more games a minimum of four different seasons during the past six years. Boise State (5 times), BYU (4 times), Oregon (4 times) and USC (4 times) are the only programs in the West to do so.

-BYU has finished ranked in the top 25 in the various national statistical categories 65 times in the past six seasons (42 offense, 16 defense, 6 special teams, 1 misc.). The Cougars have achieved 39 top-15 statistical rankings, 29 top-10 rankings and 15 top-5 rankings in that span.

-BYU has sold out 19 of its last 24 home games and consistently has one of the top attendance averages in the West. In 2010, BYU's average home attendance of 61,380 ranked No. 3 in the West behind only USC and Washington.

-BYU players have earned Academic All-America recognition six times over the past three seasons, the second-most honorees behind Penn State of any FBS school during that span.

-BYU has been ranked in the Top 25 during each of the past five seasons, including a place in the final national polls four of the past five seasons.

-ESPN and BYU have created a unique partnership to televise Cougar football games to a national, live audience on the sports leader's family of networks. ESPN agreed to an eight-year deal with BYU starting with the 2011 season, making BYU the first school in the nation to sign an exclusive broadcast agreement with ESPN. Including additional games broadcast on BYUtv, future Cougar games will consistently be broadcast to a national audience.

BYU IN NATIONAL STATISTICAL CATEGORIES

The Cougars have finished ranked in the top 25 in the various national statistical categories 65 times in the past six seasons (42 offense, 16 defense, 6 special teams, 1 misc.). BYU, ESPN PARTNERSHIP

On September 1st, 2010, BYU took a step in a new direction when it announced it would begin competition as a football independent for the 2011 season.

Along with the independence announcement, BYU also announced an 8-year partnership with ESPN to televise Cougar football on the sports leader's family of networks.

"BYU is nationally recognized as an outstanding university and for the history and tradition of its premier athletic programs," said Burke Magnus, ESPN senior vice president, college sports programming. "Once BYU decided to chart an independent course for football, we both recognized it is a good opportunity to build and grow our strong 30-year relationship. With this agreement, college football fans around the country will see the quality and pageantry of BYU as well as the passion and enthusiasm of its supporters."

One of the most important goals in becoming an independent was the opportunity for more national exposure for the university and its football program. BYU also sought better access for the Cougars' national fan base and the opportunity to schedule high-profile opponents.

"We've long sought broad, nationwide access to our games for our fans and increased visibility among those who may be less familiar with our university and athletic programs," said BYU President Cecil O. Samuelson. "We've also been looking for ways to take better advantage of our own unique broadcasting resources."

Beginning this fall, every BYU home football game will be televised to a live national audience on the ESPN family of networks or BYUtv. Additionally, BYU fans will be able to view same-day rebroadcasts on BYUtv of every home game and any away game to which ESPN has the rights through conference agreements with the host team.

BYU is the first football program to garner its own exclusive deal with ESPN to broadcast its games. ESPN and ESPN2 are both available in 99.5 million homes, while the 24-hour college sports network ESPNU is distributed to approximately 73 million homes. ESPN also produces college football games that are broadcast on ABC.

Each year, a minimum of three games will be carried on ESPN, ESPN2, or ABC. Additional games will be on ESPNU. At least one game each season will be carried live on BYUtv. As of July 1, 2011, ESPN has announced seven BYU games to be aired on its networks. The Cougars' September 3 season opener at Ole Miss will be broadcast live on ESPN and September 10 at Texas on ESPN2. BYU's September 17 matchup against Utah at LaVell Edwards Stadium will be on ESPN2 and contests against UCF, Utah State and TCU will be broadcast live on ESPN. The final regular season contest at Hawaii will be on ESPN2 on December 3.

BYUtv is available in 55 million North American homes and is growing every month. It's on the basic tier of both Dish and DirectTV and is carried by more than 500 cable systems. The network has recently constructed its own state-of-the-art production building that will allow it to televise every game in HD.

Competing as an independent will also allow BYU the opportunity to play a unique and challenging schedule. The day BYU announced its plan to move to independence, it announced a six-game deal to play Notre Dame. Throughout the year following the announcement BYU has scheduled games with Ole Miss, TCU and West Virginia, along with home-and-away series against Texas, Georgia Tech, Oregon State, UCF, Hawaii and in-state rival Utah, who recently joined the expanded Pac-12 Conference.



Postseason play has also been a focus and BYU has found a home for the 2011, '12 and '13 seasons if bowl eligible and not selected to a BCS bowl. In 2011, the Cougars have agreed to play in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl in Texas. BYU will play in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl in 2012 and travel to San Francisco for the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl following the 2013 regular season.

The future will be an exciting time for the school, the program and its worldwide audience as BYU begins a new era in its football history.



TRADITION SPIRIT HONOR

Playing football at BYU is a unique experience unlike any other in college athletics. With a heritage that runs deep in on-and-off the field success, members of the team are expected to do all things at a "higher level," in every aspect of life. The program is guided by three distinct principles—tradition, spirit and honor.

TRADITION

BYU's football history is packed full of championships, bowl games and national honors. This tradition is something that every player that passes through the program will become a part of and appreciate. Since 1974 BYU has played in 29 bowl games, won a National Championship, claimed 23 conference titles and earned 17 national top-25 finishes, including four top-10 finishes. Under head coach Bronco Mendenhall, BYU has posted a record of 56-21, won at least 10 games four of the last five years and gone to six straight bowl games. Since the 1970s, BYU has established itself as one of the top football programs in the West.

BYU makes it a priority to develop a player's faith, and make men of strength, courage, fortitude, and service.

During his six seasons as the head coach at Brigham Young University, Bronco Mendenhall has returned the Cougars to the ranks of the nation's top teams. Taking over a BYU program in 2005 that was coming off three consecutive losing seasons, Mendenhall has guided his teams to six straight bowl invitations, two outright Mountain West Conference championships and regular national top-25 rankings.

Under his leadership, BYU has earned a 56-21 (.727) record over the past six seasons to rank No. 16 in total wins among all teams in the nation during that span. The Cougars have received six straight bowl invitations for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994. Mendenhall is the only coach in BYU football history to take his first six teams to a bowl game.

Mendenhall has led BYU to bowl wins in four of the last five seasons to become the first Cougar teams to win four bowls in a five-year span since LaVell Edwards teams did so from 1980-84. Nationally, BYU is one of only 11 programs to win four bowl games in the last five seasons.

In the last five years the Cougars have achieved a 50-15 record -- only eight teams have more wins over that span. In fact, BYU is one of only seven FBS programs to win 10 or more games during at least four of the last five seasons, and BYU and Boise State are the only programs in the West to achieve that consistent level of success. From 2006-2009 Mendenhall guided the Cougars to four straight seasons with 10 or more wins for the first time in school history.

BYU's success under Mendenhall is also evident in the national rankings and NCAA statistics. BYU has finished ranked in the top 25 in the various national statistical categories 65 times in the past six seasons (42 offense,

16 defense, 6 special teams, 1 misc.). The Cougars have achieved 39 top-15 statistical rankings, 29 top-10 rankings and 15 top-5 rankings in that span. The Cougars have also been ranked in the top-25 polls during each of the past five seasons and finished ranked No. 12 following the 2009 season -- the program's highest final ranking since finishing No. 5 in 1996.

Another hallmark of Mendenhall's program has been the emphasis on balance and priorities in the many other facets of life outside of football. Reflecting that emphasis, BYU has consistently received the most academic all-conference honorees each season and has totaled 185 selections during Mendenhall's tenure, along with 64 MWC Scholar-athlete awards. BYU also ranks second nationally for Academic All-America recipients over the past three seasons. Six Cougar student-athletes have been named ESPN Academic All-Americans the past three years. Among all FBS schools only Penn State has had more during that period.

Going independent in 2011, BYU was consistently a top MWC contender under Mendenhall. BYU achieved a 39-9 (.813) conference record over the past six years to help the Cougars complete their 12-year tenure in the MWC with 64 conference wins -- the most of any MWC school. Mendenhall also helped the Cougars bring bowl wins over Oregon, UCLA, Oregon State and UTEP as the program enters a new era as one of four independent schools, joining Notre Dame, Army and Navy.

Last year's BYU team achieved a 7-6 record and tied for third in the MWC at 5-3 while playing 19 freshmen and facing a schedule that featured eight bowl teams and four opponents that finished in final BCS Top 25 standings. Mendenhall took over defensive coordinator responsibilities after the teams 1-4 start and the team responded to become one of the top defensive teams over the final eight games.

BYU's 52-24 New Mexico Bowl victory highlighted the progress and momentum the relatively young team gained over the course of the season as several freshmen played big roles in the season-ending victory. True freshman quarterback Jake Heaps became the first frosh signal caller in BYU history to start in a bowl, and he completed 25-of-34 passes for 264 yards and four touchdowns to be named New Mexico Bowl Offensive MVP. During the game, Heaps broke Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer's BYU record for freshman touchdown throws, finishing with 15 on the year to Detmer's 13. Redshirt freshman wide receiver Cody Hoffman caught three touchdowns on eight receptions for 137 yards in the bowl win, while true freshman running back Joshua Quezada ran for 101 yards on 15 carries and one touchdown.

While recording an 11-2 record and 7-1 league mark in 2009,

Mendenhall's team went 3-1 against ranked opponents, including a 14-13 season-opening win over No. 3 Oklahoma and a 44-20 season-finale Maaco Bowl Las Vegas victory over No. 16 Oregon State. BYU finished No. 12 in the final 2009 polls to earn the distinction of being one of only six programs nationally to be ranked in both final polls for four straight seasons.

In 2008, BYU finished 10-3 overall and 6-2 in the MWC to achieve three straight 10-win seasons and become the first teams in Cougar history to go unbeaten at home over three consecutive seasons. Mendenhall coached the Cougars to back-to-back 11-2 seasons in 2006 and 2007, while claiming consecutive outright MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American

Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, the Football Writers Association of America named Mendenhall one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award. On November 17, 2007, Mendenhall led the Cougars to a 35-10 victory over Wyoming to record his 25th career win. With the victory, Mendenhall became the only coach in BYU football history to win 25 games in his first 35 attempts.

In his first year in 2005 after taking over a program coming off three losing seasons, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned an invitation to the Maaco Bowl Las Vegas -- the team's first postseason bowl appearance in three seasons. The Cougars finished tied for second in the MWC with a 5-3 league ledger.

BYU recruits have earned Freshman All-America recognition each of Mendenhall's six seasons as the Cougars continue to demonstrate through their recruiting efforts how they are strengthening the program with talented players and quality individuals.

Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.



In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at

middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

Since taking over a BYU program in 2005 that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001, Bronco Mendenhall has guided BYU to six straight bowl invitations, two outright Mountain West Conference championships and four national top-25 finishes.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America

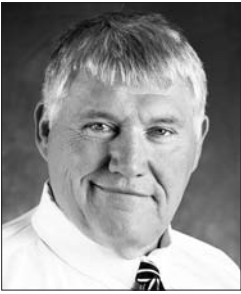

TOM HOLMOE

Director of Athletics

Tom Holmoe was named Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University on March 1, 2005. He oversees a nationally recognized program with 21 intercollegiate sports, involving more than 600 student-athletes and a 150-person staff.

Since Holmoe's appointment, BYU has captured 58 Mountain West Conference regular-season or postseason championships, and more than 100 student-athletes have earned All-America status. Over the past four years, both the football and men's basketball teams have enjoyed tremendous success. In fact, BYU is the only school in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision to win at least 10 football games and 25 basketball games from 2006-10.

A former Cougar defensive back from 1978-82, Holmoe returned to BYU in July 2001 as Associate Athletics Director for Development. As part of his responsibilities, he supervised the Cougar Club, served as the department's liaison with the LDS Foundation, served on the BYU Alumni Association Board of Directors and worked on the capital campaign to raise funds for the University's new athletic facilities. Holmoe currently serves on the BCS Athletics Directors Advisory Committee.

A native of La Crescenta, Calif., Holmoe came to BYU on a football scholarship in 1978. He became a starter as a sophomore and went on to earn first-team All-WAC honors as a senior in 1982. Holmoe was selected in the fourth round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Over a seven-year NFL career, he played on three Super Bowl championship teams with the 49ers. After retiring from professional football, Holmoe returned to BYU to serve as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards from 1990-91. He then accepted an offer from Bill Walsh to become the Stanford secondary coach in 1992, where he remained for two seasons. In 1994, he returned to the 49ers as defensive backfield coach for two seasons, where he earned a fourth Super Bowl ring. Two years later Holmoe joined the University of California staff as defensive coordinator and later became the head coach from 1997-2001.

Holmoe graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology in 1983 and received a master's degree from BYU in athletic

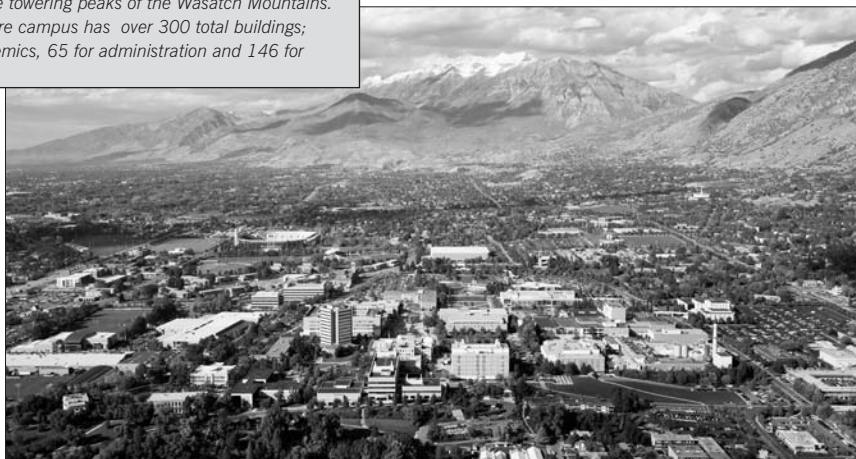
DISTINGUISHED FACULTY

Faculty members hold advanced degrees from universities around the world. Their achievements are compelling and wide-ranging as they pursue consequential research work that is making a real difference. Alleviating hunger worldwide through more efficient agriculture, finding low-pollution energy alternatives and making significant contributions to the strengthening of families are among their many pursuits. Faculty members are regularly called upon to head national and international professional organizations and to consult with corporate and governmental entities. Above all, these high-principled men and women share an unmatched devotion to bringing the best possible education to their students.

PREPARATION FOR THE FUTURE

A strong curriculum delivered by outstanding faculty is key to the academic excellence of BYU graduates. From business management to nursing, from the humanities to engineering, the University's 11 colleges -- supported by comprehensive offerings from religious education -- continue to be internationally recognized for the quality of their education and the professional preparation they provide. In addition to the challenging course work and hands-on research, numerous programs offer academic and service outreach opportunities. Study abroad centers, distance-learning courses and worldwide performing arts tours are a few of the offerings that enrich BYU's academic experience.

BYU's campus is in Provo, Utah, a city of 124,496 located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City. Provo sits 4,560 feet above sea level and rests between 23-mile-long Utah Lake and the towering peaks of the Wasatch Mountains. The 560-acre campus has over 300 total buildings; 97 for academics, 65 for administration and 146 for





COUGARS ON MISSIONS

One of the first questions Bronco Mendenhall was asked after becoming the head coach at BYU was what he thought about the missionary program and if he felt it helped or hurt the BYU football program.

“Serving missions is what makes this team, this university and the Church unique,” Mendenhall said. “These unique characteristics are based upon sound principles and values. Why would we not embrace them?”

Brigham Young University is owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of the Church is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. Since the organization of the Church in 1830, over one million missionaries have served.

The Church operates 340 missions around the world in 145 nations, speaking 164 languages. A mission covers a geographic area and has a central headquarters. Each is presided over by a mission president, who is called from the ranks of the Church membership to serve for a period of three years. The mission president directs the work of the missionaries assigned to his mission.

More than 52,400 missionaries representing The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are currently serving proselytizing missions. Seventy-five percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26. A substantial number of young women and older couples also serve proselytizing missions.

Missionaries work long hours—seven days a week for two years or 18 months for women and couples—teaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ and participating in community service.

In addition, about 5,100 individuals (including couples) are given special service assignments. Health specialists and doctors go to developing countries where the Church's health services program teaches preventive care. Craftsmen, artisans and construction supervisors train members in local building projects. Agricultural experts train people to produce food more effectively and economically. Other mission assignments include education, family history research and leadership training.

The missionaries and/or their families donate money to the Church to pay for their personal expenses. When his or her assignment is completed, the missionary returns home to pursue vocational, academic or other personal goals. Aside

Of the BYU football student-athletes slated to participate in 2011, 76 have served full-time, two-year missions 33 different countries around the world, including Australia, Brazil, Madagascar, Chile, England, Germany, Honduras, Japan, Philippines, India, Russia, Samoa, South Korea and Sweden—just to name a few. Another 38 are currently serving as missionaries.

from their brief orientation at a missionary training center, missionaries receive little formal training for their ministry. Missionary preparation comes primarily from personal study and, in many cases, from examples taught in the home from childhood.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on April 6, 1830 with six members. Today, congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With over 14 million members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

STUDENT ATHLETE BUILDING



◀ EQUIPMENT AND LOCKER ROOMS

The 75-yard-long locker room is patterned after the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles. There is also a special locker room for former BYU players who want to train in Provo during the offseason.

TRAINING FACILITIES

Sponsored by Dynatronics, this area features a rehabilitation room and a hydro area with a cold pool, a hot tub with power jets, a treadmill pool with two cameras and a doctor's office. Trainers provide electrical stimulation and ultra sound treatments as well as bikes, treadmills and Cybex machines.



◀ STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER

Most of the Strength and Conditioning Center's equipment was custom built by Free Motion and is sponsored by Icon Health and Fitness. Among the features are 12 full power racks with platforms, seven half racks, three jerk racks, Sorinex hurricane racks, reverse hypers, Agaton Fitness Systems, an outdoor mondo plyometric warmup area, two super leg drive sleds, two different dumbbell areas and a medicine ball wall. The first floor also has a nutrition area sponsored by Pharmanex. The second floor is the speed development area and has Tomahawk spinning bikes and TVs, five Nordic Track incline trainers, three Versaclimbers, two Scifit upper body bikes, Woodway force treadmills, H/P Cosmos treadmills with Pneu Weight devices, vibratory boards, a step mill, a turf agility drill area with resistance and a testing area.



◀ STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC CENTER

Tutors and mentors work through these offices. Athletes have access to 42 computer stations, an interactive classroom, 10 small study areas and one large quiet room. Also on staff are a sports psychologist and a nutritionist.

LEGENDS GRILLE

Fans, coaches and athletes can view 11 plasma TV screens, a ticker tape with world wide sports scores or view specialty events on a projection screen while catching a bite to eat.



◀ INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

The IPF is 422 feet wide and 222 feet deep with a height of 86 feet at the center (106,000 square feet). Among its features are two artificial turf fields (55 yards & 65 yards), retractable goalposts on each end, a sideline staging facility for offensive linemen and four batting cages. The indoor surface is field turf and the building features four video platforms located 40 feet above the playing surface. The IPF serves as an indoor practice arena for the football, soccer, golf, baseball and softball teams and a variety of other sports programs, including extramurals and intramurals.

EDWARDS STADIUM

PICTURE PERFECT

With its 63,725-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards and immaculate press boxes, LaVell Edwards Stadium is home to legendary BYU football. Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 30 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.

THE FIELD

The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

EXPANSION/SEATING CAPACITY

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships). The stadium expansion increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reportedly "the largest gathering ever in Utah history" at the time. In 2003 BYU added a luxury "Club Seating" area to the east stands taking the capacity of Edwards Stadium down to 64,045. In 2010 BYU created additional wheelchair access inside the stadium, which reduced the capacity by 320 seats to 63,725.

BYU VS. C-USA

Brigham Young University has entered into an agreement to participate in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl following the 2011 football season if bowl eligible and not selected for a BCS game.

The ninth annual Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl returns to Dallas for the second-straight year. The bowl game is scheduled for Friday, Dec. 30, at SMU's Gerald J. Ford Stadium in University Park, Texas, and will feature an opponent from Conference USA. The kickoff is set for 11 a.m. CST, and will be televised nationally on ESPN.

While BYU has never played in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl, it is no stranger to playing football in Texas. The Cougars won the 1997 Cotton Bowl by defeating Kansas State 19-15 and defeated No. 3 Oklahoma 14-13 in the inaugural college football game at Cowboys Stadium on Sept. 5, 2009. The Cougars' 2011 regular-season football schedule also features two games in the Lone Star state against Texas (Sept. 10 in Austin) and TCU (Oct. 28 at Cowboys Stadium in Arlington).

"We are extremely pleased to have an opportunity to host BYU as one of our bowl participants in 2011," said Brant B. Ringler, executive director of the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. "Our goal is to attract schools with a national presence to help us honor the men and women of the United States Armed Forces. BYU is a nationally recognized institution with an outstanding fan base."

This gives BYU a bowl affiliation for each of the next three football seasons. If bowl eligible and not selected by a BCS bowl, BYU will play in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl in 2012 at Qualcomm Stadium, and travel to San Francisco for the Kraft Fight Hunger Bowl in 2013 at AT&T Park.

BYU has an extensive bowl history that dates back to the 1974 Fiesta Bowl. Since then, the Cougars have been invited to 29 bowls, including a 52-24 victory over UTEP in the 2010 New Mexico Bowl on Dec. 18, 2010.

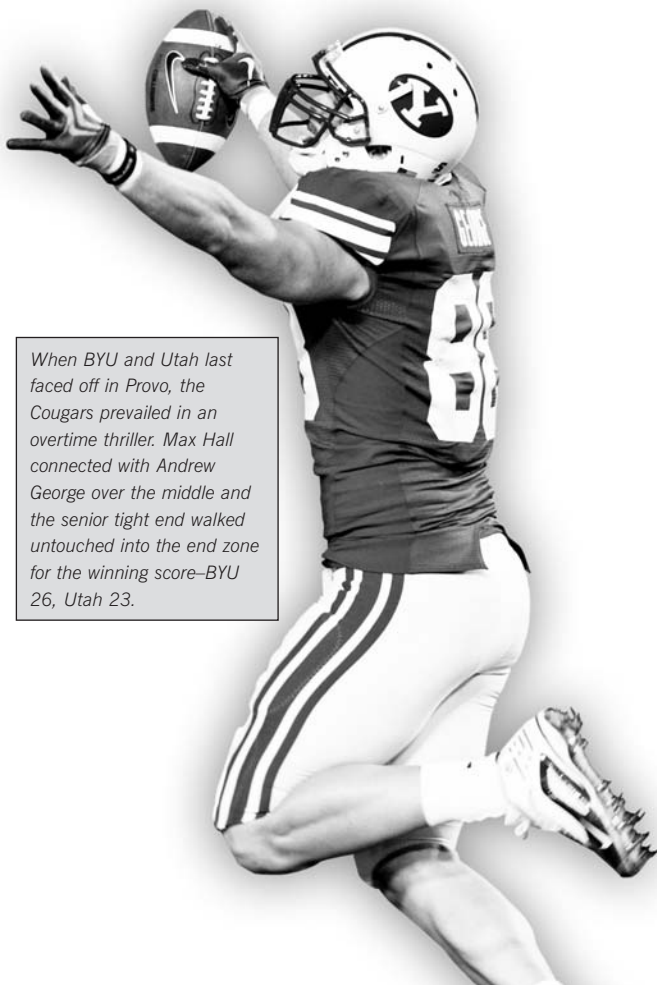

2010 SEASON IN REVIEW

Winning five of its final six games, BYU capped the 2010 season with a dominating 52-24 New Mexico Bowl victory over UTEP to finish the year 7-6 overall and become one of only 11 programs in the nation to win four bowl games over the past five seasons.

The Cougars came into their 29th bowl appearance and first-ever New Mexico Bowl after tying for third place in the Mountain West Conference with a 5-3 league record. Coming back from a 1-4 start to the season, BYU earned its sixth straight bowl invitation and became the first Cougar team to win four bowls in a five-year span since LaVell Edwards-led teams do so from 1980-84. A mainstay in the college football postseason, only Michigan, Nebraska, Florida State, Ohio State, Tennessee and Georgia have gone to more bowl games than BYU in the last 33 years.

BYU's bowl victory highlighted the progress and momentum the relatively young team gained over the course of the season as several freshmen played big roles in the season-ending victory.

True freshman quarterback Jake Heaps became the first frosh signal caller in BYU history to start in a bowl and completed 25-of-34 passes for 264 yards and four touchdowns to be named New Mexico Bowl Offensive MVP. During the game, Heaps broke Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer's BYU record for freshman touchdown throws, finishing with 15 on the year to Detmer's 13. Redshirt freshman wide receiver Cody Hoffman caught three touchdowns on eight receptions for 137 yards in the bowl win, while true freshman running back Joshua Quezada ran for 101 yards on 15 carries and one touchdown.

BYU set or tied 42 BYU or New Mexico Bowl records in the victory. The Cougars established 31 New Mexico Bowl records during the game and set 11 BYU bowl high marks, including most points (52) and most rushing yards (219).

Heaps started the final 10 games of the season and set BYU freshman quarterback records for wins (6), touchdowns (15), passing yards (2,316), pass attempts (383), completions (219), games played (13) and games started (10). Nineteen freshmen saw the field for the Cougars in 2010, including seven earning starts. In all, 23 players without prior starting experience started at least one game for BYU during the year, including 13 on defense where several starters suffered season-ending injuries.

The Cougars entered the season opener against Washington with a two-quarterback rotation. BYU defeated the eventual 2010 Holiday Bowl winner as both junior Riley Nelson and

Heaps finished with exactly 131 yards passing in a 23-17 win.

With its win against Washington, BYU defeated a team from a BCS automatic-qualifying conference for the fifth-straight year, the third-longest streak in the nation. The Cougars have defeated at least one AQ school 14 of the past 15 years dating back to 1996. BYU received a Top 25 ranking during the season for the fifth-straight season with a No. 24 coaches poll rating after week one.

The Cougars played one of the nation's toughest early schedules in 2010 and faced eight teams overall that qualified for a bowl game. Six bowl-qualifying opponents—all but Utah and UTEP—won their bowl matchups and four teams—No. 2 TCU, No. 11/13 Nevada, No. 17/16 Florida State and No. 23 Utah—finished with a final Top 25 ranking.

After Nelson underwent season-ending shoulder surgery following his injury in the Florida State game, Heaps was handed the full-time reins of the offense. Hampered by injuries, particularly on defense, the Cougars lost their next two games. Three regular starters suffered season-ending injuries while four others missed multiple games.

After starting 1-4, BYU broke through at home against San Diego State (Poinsettia Bowl winners over Navy), earning a 24-21 homecoming win. BYU would win five of its next six, including a four-game win streak, due in part to head coach Bronco Mendenhall's decision to become the defensive coordinator following a loss at Utah State.

The Cougars came on strong after Mendenhall took over the defense for the final eight games. After ranking 101st nationally in total defense following the 1-4 start, the Cougars showed significant improvement under Mendenhall's leadership to earn the nation's No. 24 overall defense at year's end, ranking only behind No. 1 TCU in the MWC. The defense's statistics continued to shoot up after each game—rushing defense went from last in the nation at 259.2 per game through BYU's first five games to 71.5 yards per game over the next six. Over the same time, total defense went from 433.4 ypg to 267.5 ypg and scoring defense drastically improved from 28.8 ppg to 11.3 ppg.

The defense also proved successful at limiting points. After holding New Mexico to seven points, BYU held three-straight opponents to 10 points or less, the longest such streak since 1984. The Cougars held Colorado State to 10 points and UNLV to seven points the previous two games, matching the streak 17 years ago. BYU would go on to be

ranked 24th in pass defense (192.2), 32nd in scoring defense (21.6 points allowed) and 45th in run defense (138.6) at year's end after rankings of 28th, 87th and 120th, respectively, through five games.

BYU bumped up its 15.2 ppg average to 32.6 ppg after wins over SDSU (24-21), Wyoming (25-20), UNLV (55-7), Colorado State (49-10) and New Mexico (40-7). Highlights included senior wide receiver Luke Ashworth's four first-half touchdown receptions at CSU, setting BYU and MWC records for most touchdown receptions in a half, and Quezada's three touchdown runs versus UNLV.

Going independent in 2011, BYU finished its 12-year tenure in the MWC with 64 conference wins—the most of any MWC school. The Cougars almost earned a second-place finish in the league in 2010 after controlling nearly the entire game at Utah in the regular-season finale before suffering a one-point defeat. After Utah came back to take its only lead in the closing minutes, Heaps drove BYU into scoring position but Utah blocked the Cougar field-goal attempt to secure the 17-16 win.

BYU finished the season ranked 42nd

in rushing offense at 168.1 yards per game while achieving seven 200-yard rushing game on the year—the most 200-yard rushing games in a season since 2001.

Individually, senior safety and team captain Andrew Rich led the team in tackles (110), interceptions (5), pass breakups (8), forced fumbles (3) and tied for the team lead in fumbles recovered (1). He led the MWC and ranked No. 22 nationally in interceptions. Only one player in the MWC had more than Rich's 110 tackles, which tied for the third-most by a BYU player in the last 20 years (Rob Morris 155 in 1998 and 110 in 1997, Aaron Francisco 116 in 2003). Senior defensive end Vic So'oto led BYU with five sacks, 11.5 tackles for loss and eight quarterback hurries. He ranked No. 6 in the MWC in sacks and No. 4 in tackles for loss.

Junior offensive lineman and captain Matt Reynolds joined Rich and So'oto on the All-MWC First Team. An Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award candidate, Reynolds surrendered only one sack all season from his left tackle position. Di Luigi was selected to the All-MWC Second Team while seven additional Cougars received all-conference honorable mention (WR

Luke Ashworth, OL Terence Brown, OL Braden Hansen, OL Jason Speredon, LB Shane Hunter, CB Brian Logan, K Mitch Payne).

Di Luigi led the team in rushing (917) and all-purpose (1,422) yards to rank No. 4 in the MWC in both categories. His 45 receptions also led the team while contributing 443 receiving yards. Freshman wideout Cody Hoffman led BYU with 527 receiving yards and added a team-best 380 kick return yards.

Kicker Mitch Payne scored nine points on seven PATs and one field goal in the New Mexico Bowl to finish his career as BYU's all-time career scoring leader with 334 points, breaking the record previously held by Owen Pochman of 333 career points.

In addition, Payne and junior running back Bryan Kariya earned a place on the ESPN Academic All-America Second Team. A Chinese major with a 3.87 GPA, Kariya was the only running back from an FBS school to be named an Academic All-American. He was the sixth Cougar to earn Academic All-America accolades in the past three seasons.

BYU VS. WASHINGTON RECAP

The BYU football team won 23-17 over the Washington Huskies in front of a sell-out crowd of 63,771 for its first win of the season. Sophomore Eathyn Manumaleuna tipped a pass on a Washington fourth-down attempt that fell incomplete at the BYU 27-yard line with 1:55 left in the game. After BYU held the Huskies scoreless for the second half, the Cougars were able to hold on for the victory. The duo of Cougar quarterbacks, Jake Heaps and Riley Nelson, proved to be successful, ending up with identical passing yardage. The freshman Heaps finished 13-of-23 for 131 yards while Nelson went 11-of-17 for 131 yards and two touchdowns. Nelson's ground game added 45 yards on eight carries. Junior JJ Di Luigi had a big night for the Cougars, coming up with 152 all-purpose yards. Di Luigi caught four passes for 83 yards and touchdown, while adding 13 rushes for 69 yards. After keeping Washington off the board in the third, BYU's defense again held the Husky offense scoreless for the fourth quarter. Senior safety Andrew Rich totaled nine tackles while senior linebacker Shane Hunter added nine of his own. Junior linebacker Jordan Pendleton had eight tackles including half a sack. Senior defensive back Brian Logan contributed with three pass breakups on the night.

BYU VS. AIR FORCE RECAP

BYU fell to 1-1 on the season after suffering a 35-14 defeat at Air Force. After a solid first quarter, BYU lost the momentum and the early advantage as the Falcons went on to end the Cougars' six-game winning streak in the series. A sellout crowd of 46,692 attended the game, marking AFA's first sellout since hosting Notre Dame in 2006. BYU claimed a 14-7 lead after the first 15 minutes. The Cougars took the opening kick and put touchdowns on the board on two-of-three possessions in the first quarter with junior running back JJ Di Luigi scoring on a 1-yard rush and junior quarterback Riley Nelson on a 4-yard keeper. Sandwiched between those two Nelson-guided drives of 74 and 49 yards, freshman quarterback Jake Heaps led BYU on a drive that covered 80 yards and finished in the end zone but did not result in any points. On back-to-back runs of 17 and 43 yards, Di Luigi carried the ball for 60 yards on the drive but was stripped from behind at the 10-yard line on his second gallop. Air Force linebacker Parker Hennessey eventually recovered the loose ball in the back of the end zone for a Falcon touchback to end the BYU threat. Nelson finished with 95 yards rushing, a career high, while throwing for 73 yards, completing 8-of-19 attempts. Heaps went 2-of-6 for 15 yards on the first half and did not play the second half. Di Luigi led all Cougar rushers with his first-ever 100-yard game, totaling 103 yards on seven carries. On defense, BYU senior safety Andrew Rich earned a career-high 14 tackles, two for a loss, while adding a forced fumble. Vic So'oto added 11 tackles while Shane Hunter earned 10 and Jordan Richardson had nine, both marks also individual career highs.

BYU VS. FLORIDA STATE RECAP

A strong second-half surge helped propel Florida State to a 34-10 victory over BYU at Doak Campbell Stadium. Freshman quarterback Jake Heaps threw his first career touchdown, finishing 15-of-31 for 114 yards on the day after coming in for Riley Nelson early in the first half. Junior running back JJ Di Luigi followed up his first-career 100-yard game at Air Force last week with 93 yards on 18 carries while adding 36 yards on three catches. The Seminoles were the only team to get on the scoreboard in the first quarter, converting a 26-yard field goal with 36 seconds left on the clock. After the BYU defense forced a three-and-out, Heaps and Di Luigi provided some offensive firepower, guiding the Cougars 71 yards over 11 plays for Heaps' touchdown pass, a 4-yarder to freshman Cody Hoffman just 14 seconds before the half. Heaps converted the throw on a third-and-goal call, hitting Hoffman crossing over the back of the end zone. The touchdown was also the first of Hoffman's career. BYU VS. NEVADA RECAP

In his first career start at BYU, freshman quarterback Jake Heaps went 24-for-45 for 229 yards as BYU fell to Nevada 27-13 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. On the second Cougar drive of the game, Heaps combined with junior running back JJ Di Luigi for a 36-yard drive on five plays culminating in a 2-yard touchdown run by Di Luigi, his third touchdown of the season. The drive began after senior safety Andrew Rich recovered a Nevada fumble. After giving up 24 points in the first half, the Cougars came back to surrender only three in the second half, holding the Wolf Pack's fourth-ranked scoring offense well below their 50.7 season average. Di Luigi recorded 123 all-purpose yards, including 15 rushes for 67 yards and eight catches for 56 yards. Rich tied a career-high with 14 tackles, including nine solo takedowns in the loss. BYU cut into the Wolf Pack lead on a 27-yard Payne field goal with 1:20 to play in the first half after an 11-play, 35-yard drive. A 20-yard Heaps completion to freshman receiver Cody Hoffman set up the field goal. With 74 yards receiving on four catches, Hoffman recorded a career high in receiving yards while junior McKay Jacobsen added four catches for 44 yards to the Cougar passing attack. With 7:46 left in the fourth quarter, Payne was good from 29 yards out to end a nine-play, 65-yard drive, the Cougars first points of the fourth quarter in 2010.

BYU VS. UTAH STATE RECAP

BYU's 10-game winning streak over Utah State came to an end as the Aggies defeated the Cougars 31-16 at Romney Stadium. The Utah State win marks the program's first over in-state rival BYU since a 58-56 shootout victory in 1993. BYU quarterback Jake Heaps threw 27-of-54 for 271 yards. Junior wide receiver McKay Jacobson had 85 yards on eight receptions. BYU trailed 31-10 entering the fourth before scoring on a 2-yard run by Di Luigi on the final drive of the game with 31 seconds remaining. BYU VS. SDSU RECAP

Third down proved successful on both sides of the ball for the Cougars as BYU defeated conference foe San Diego State 24-21. BYU VS. TCU RECAP

No. 4 TCU earned a 31-3 home victory over BYU at Amon G. Carter Stadium. BYU's injury-riddled defense played well against TCU's high-scoring offense, but the hometown Horned Frogs used their No. 1-ranked defense to stifle the Cougar offensive attack and improve to 7-0 on the year. The BYU defense held strong against TCU, holding the Horned Frogs to some of their lowest offensive totals of the season. The Cougars held TCU to 108 rushing yards, the Horned Frogs' lowest total of the season and far below their season average of 278.7 yards per game, seventh-best in the country. BYU also kept TCU 100 total offensive yards below its season average. The Cougars set their strong defensive tone in the first half, holding a TCU team averaging 279 yards on the ground per game to just 37 rushing yards on 21 carries in the opening 30 minutes. The Horned Frogs had trouble getting on the scoreboard as well until scoring two late touchdowns on back-to-back short field possessions in the final two minutes of the half. Unfortunately for BYU, the Cougar offense could not get anything going against the nation's top defensive team, managing only one first down in the half and 13 total yards. TCU has led the NCAA in total defense each of the last two years and four times in the past 10 seasons. The Cougars totaled 112 yards in the third quarter, 70 of which coming on a 14-play drive that resulted in a Mitch Payne 27-yard field goal.

BYU VS. WYOMING GAME RECAP

The Cougar defense held on late in the fourth quarter to give BYU a 25-20 victory over Wyoming. With 27 seconds left in the game and the Cowboy offense facing a 4th-and-10 at the Cougar 26-yard line, freshman linebacker Kyle Van Noy batted down an Austyn Carta-Samuels pass to seal the Cougars' second conference win of the season. With the win, BYU improved its winning streak against Wyoming to six straight, including eight in a row dating back to the 1987 season at Edwards Stadium. The Cougar defense held Wyoming to 18 yards of total offense in the first half including minus-15 yards rushing while posting a season-high 12 tackles-for-loss on the day. Senior Vic So'oto had a strong outing with four tackles, three for loss, including one sack and a game-high two quarterback hurries. Seniors Shane Hunter and Vic So'oto recorded six and five tackles, respectively, while Van Noy, senior Andrew Rich and sophomore Brandon Ogletree added four tackles apiece. So'oto set a new career mark with a game-best four tackles-for-loss, including one sack, while adding a forced fumble and two quarterback hurries. Rich broke up a game-high three passes. Junior running back Bryan Kariya led the Cougar ground game with a career-high 88 yards rushing on 19 carries. Junior JJ Di Luigi added 82 yards of his own on 16 carries, while freshman Joshua Quezada carried the ball 14 times for 59 yards.

Senior receiver Luke Ashworth had a record-setting day to help BYU drum Colorado State 49-10. The senior from Provo, Utah, become the first player in the history of the Provo-based school to score four touchdowns in the first half of a game while equaling the team record for the most scoring receptions in an entire game. His four touchdown grabs also tied a Mountain West Conference record and set a new Hughes Stadium mark. Ashworth's four TD grabs were his only receptions of the game, finishing with a career-high 113 yards. On the other end of the touchdowns was freshman quarterback Jake Heaps, who went 15-of-20 for 242 yards and a career-high four touchdowns in three quarters of play. The Cougars opened the scoring with their longest drive of the year, highlighted by their longest play of the season. BYU VS. UTEP GAME RECAP

BYU opened the 2010 bowl season with its fourth bowl victory in the last five years with a 52-24 triumph over UTEP in the New Mexico Bowl on Saturday. The Cougars had a record-setting day to finish the season with a 7-6 record and wins in five of their last six games. New Mexico Bowl Offensive MVP Jake Heaps went 25-of-34 for 264 yards and four touchdown passes, passing Ty Detmer's freshman record for most touchdown passes. Heaps also set the BYU bowl record for best completion percentage (.735) in a bowl game. Senior safety Andrew Rich was awarded the game's Defensive MVP in his final game as a Cougar, finishing with four solo tackles, two interceptions, one tackle-for-loss, one sack and a pass breakup. Freshman wide receiver Cody Hoffman set career highs across the board with eight receptions for 137 yards and three touchdowns, tying a BYU bowl game record for most touchdown receptions in a game. Overall,



BYU outgained the Miners, now 6-7 on the year, 514 total yards to 233. Quezada rushed for a game-high 101 yards on 15 carries to average 6.7 yards per carry while Di Luigi added 98 yards on 20 carries as the Cougars totaled 219 yards and three touchdowns on the ground. Through the air, Heaps and sophomore James Lark combined for 295 yards with Heaps finishing the game with four touchdowns. After freshman running back Joshua Quezada bulled his way to an 8-yard touchdown with 12 minutes remaining, Payne converted the point-after attempt to pass Owen Pochman as the Cougars' all-time scoring leader with 334 points. While BYU's offense was successfully moving the ball, the Cougar defense was equally successful keeping the Miners from gaining ground. BYU finished the first quarter with a 17-3 lead while totaling 143 yards and holding UTEP to minus-5 yards. Special teams continued to provide return highlights as BYU freshman Cody Hoffman ran back UTEP's ensuing kick a career-best 51 yards to set up Mitch Payne's 38-yard field goal for the 17-3 advantage. The Cougars quickly added to the lead in the opening moments of the second quarter after sophomore linebacker Brandon Ogletree intercepted Vittatoe's tipped pass on the Miners' first-down play. Eight seconds and one-play later, Heaps connected with Hoffman for a 31-yard strike. The 24-3 lead became 31-3 when Heaps and Hoffman again teamed for a touchdown, this time from three yards out. The eight-play, 64-yard drive completed a string of five straight possessions that resulted in a BYU score. The touchdown also moved Heaps past Ty Detmer for the most scoring throws by a Cougar freshman, giving Heaps 14 on the year and three for the half. Cougar punter Riley Stephenson boomed a punt 60 yards, tying his career best and also equaling the BYU bowl record Stephenson set in last year's Maaco Las Vegas Bowl.

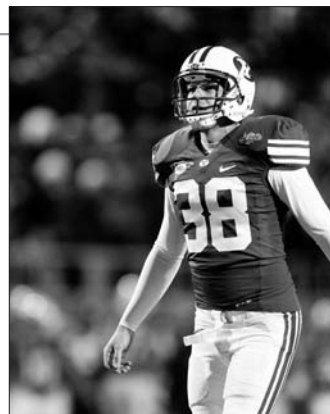

CONFERENCE HISTORY

On Aug. 31, 2010, BYU announced its football program will compete in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision as an independent beginning with the 2011 season. Since the university instituted a football program in 1922, BYU had been a member of five different conferences, including the Rocky Mountain (1922-37), Mountain States/Skyline (1938-61), Western Athletic (1962-98) and Mountain West (1999-2010). The Cougars claimed their first conference championship in program history in 1965, going 4-2 in the WAC under head coach Tom Hudspeth. BYU won its next title, the first of 18 under legendary coach LaVell Edwards, in 1974. During its time in the MWC, the Cougars won four championships, including back-to-back undefeated conference seasons in 2006 and 2007.

MOUNTAIN WEST (1999-10)

-- For the third time in program history, BYU chartered the creation of a new conference, this time joined by New Mexico, Utah, Air Force, Colorado St., San Diego St., UNLV and Wyoming. TCU joined in 2005. -- Football posted a 64-26 (.711) conference record in its 12 years in the conference.

-- The Cougars' 4 MWC titles, 64 wins and 54 All-MWC First Team selections equal or surpass any MWC team since the league's inception.

-- BYU won four MWC titles, including back-to-back championships in 2006-07. In three of its championship seasons, BYU went undefeated in conference play.

WESTERN ATHLETIC (1962-98)

-- BYU was a charter member of the conference along with Arizona, Arizona State, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming.

-- The WAC eventually expanded to as many as 16 schools in 1996.

-- Football posted a 187-69-2 (.729) conference record in its 37 years in the conference.

-- While in the WAC, the Cougars won the 1984 National Championship, finishing 14-0.

-- BYU won a total of 19 titles while in the WAC, including its first-ever football championship in 1965 and 10-straight from 1976-85.

-- BYU's 19 WAC titles, 187 conference wins and 199 All-WAC First Team selections are all still the most by far of any WAC team.

MOUNTAIN STATES/SKYLINE (1938-61)

-- BYU was a charter member of the conference, leaving with Colorado, Colorado St., Denver, Utah, Utah State and Wyoming when the RMFAC was deemed too large. Montana and New Mexico joined in 1951.

-- After Colorado left in 1947, the conference became popularly known as the Skyline Conference. -- Football posted a 41-75-12 (.367) conference record in its 24 years in the conference.

-- Conference dissolved in early 1962 after BYU, Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico left to form the WAC.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN FACULTY ATHLETIC (1922-37)

-- BYU joined the RMFAC in 1918 with football participation beginning four years later.

-- Football posted a 46-52-4 (.471) conference record in its 16 years in the conference.

Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors... a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship... quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting... BYU defense ranks

19th against the rush and 18th overall... Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes Frank Kush as the

winningest coach in WAC football history... Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-America ... 1987 BYU defense leads the nation with 50

1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-American... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-American teams... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy...also wins the Davey O'Brien Award...finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-American and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU... BYU ties No. 7 Iowa, 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu

winds up with the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah... Ryan Hancock finishes third in total offense and passing... BYU wins WAC title and goes to the Aloha Bowl

1993 BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State...Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October... BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season... team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency... freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown receptions (29) and yardage (3,066)... BYU's NCAA record of 53-straight games with a touchdown pass ends at CSU, but Cougars extend the nation's longest streak without being shut out to 236 consecutive games.

1994 It's a historic season with victories over Notre Dame and Oklahoma to finish 10th in the final CNN/USA Today poll... five players are drafted, the most ever... Cougars win their first bowl game since 1988... BYU dedicates Copper Bowl effort to graduate assistant coach John Farley, who was sidelined in August with heart trouble and died in December... Cougars are third nationally in passing with John

Walsh fifth in total offense... Jamal Willis becomes the all-time leading rusher and breaks the record for touchdowns

1995 A first-ever multi-year contract for a BYU coach is given to Edwards... the string of 17 consecutive bowl games comes to an end... Cougars finish number two in NCAA in punt returns at 18.9, while James Dye is number one at 21.9... Steve Sarkisian is the first junior college player since 1973 to start as a BYU quarterback ... BYU finishes in a four-way tie for first in the WAC.

1996 BYU completes the longest season in Division I college football history and plays in its first ever New Year's Day bowl game with a 19-15 Cotton Bowl victory over Kansas State... BYU finishes the season with a 14-1 record and a No. 5 national ranking in both polls, its highest ranking since 1984...QB Steve Sarkisian leads the nation in pass efficiency with a 173.6 rating...the Cougars finish sixth in the nation in total offense with 478 yards per game...the defense leads the WAC in rushing yards allowed (124.6), total yards allowed (316.3) and points allowed (18.7)...James Dye finishes second in the nation in punt returns with a 17.6 average...BYU wins the inaugural WAC Championship game with a 28-25 victory over Wyoming in Las Vegas, Nevada...BYU goes undefeated in the WAC, giving LaVell Edwards his 18th career title.

1997 BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever true freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes

only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

1998 BYU runs up a 7-1 conference record (9-5 overall) to win the WAC Pacific Division title ... The Cougars meet Tulane in the Liberty Bowl ... BYU's season is highlighted by its defense, ranked No. 5 in the nation, allowing only 91.2 rushing yards and 273.9 total yards per game ... After a slow start, the Cougars won seven games in a row ... Season highlights included a 26-6 thumping of Arizona State, a 13-0 shutout of San Diego State and a 26-24 victory over Utah ... Rob Morris, John Tait, Brian Gray and Daren Yancey were all named to the All-WAC first team ... John Tait was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft (14th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs ... Sophomore kicker Owen Pochman set a school record by connecting on 62 consecutive PATs.

1999 Won the first-ever Mountain West Conference Championship with an 8-4 season record (5-2 conf.) ... A 27-20 win over Air Force marks LaVell Edwards' 250th victory as head coach of the Cougars ... junior kicker Owen Pochman becomes the school's all-time leading scorer, picking up 90 points on the season to give him a career total 247 ... a six-game winning streak in the middle of the season has BYU ranked as high as No. 12 in the *USA Today*/CNN Coaches' Poll ... running back Luke Staley is named Freshman All-American and conference Freshman of the Year, leading the nation's freshmen in scoring average with 78 points in eight games ... Rob Morris returns from a four-game absence to earn All-America ... Morris is picked in the first round with the 28th overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts ... The Cougars finish the season ranked first in the conference in total offense and rushing defense, as well as eighth

in the nation in passing offense and 14th in the nation in rushing defense ... BYU makes its first-ever Motor City Bowl appearance against Marshall ... Edwards concludes the season with his 20th career conference title and 22nd bowl appearance in 28 years.

2000 BYU won its last two games, including a memorable thriller at Utah, to send coach LaVell Edwards out with a 6-6 record in his 29th and final year as a head coach...Playing one of its toughest schedules in history, the Cougars played Mississippi State, Syracuse, Virginia and national power Florida State in the Kickoff Classic...Against Utah, BYU trailed by one point but went 80 yards on nine plays, including two dramatic passes from quarterback Brandon Doman to wide receiver Jonathan Pittman, for the come-from-behind victory...Owen Pochman, Setema Gali, Jr., Justin Ena and Aaron Edmonds were all named to the All-Mountain West Conference First Team... Pochman and Tevita Ofahengaue are both selected in the NFL draft with Ofahengaue being "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last player selected in the draft.

2001 In his first season after taking over the BYU football program Gary Crowton led the Cougars to 12-consecutive victories and an outright Mountain West Conference title thanks to a dramatic come-from-behind victory over rival Utah in Provo ... Luke Staley was named a consensus All-American and became BYU's first Doak Walker Award winner for the nation's top running back ... Staley led the nation in scoring at 15.45 points per game and was third nationally in rushing at 143.82 yards per game ... The Cougars led the nation in scoring offense with 46.77 points per game and in total offense with 542.85 yards per game ... BYU was the first MWC school to go undefeated in conference games and boasted eight players being named as first-team all-league ... Staley was named Offensive

Player of the Year in the Conference and set BYU single-season records for points scored, touchdowns scored and rushing yards ... injuries took Staley out of the Cougars final two games which resulted in losses at Hawaii and in the Liberty Bowl against Louisville ... BYU climbed the national polls to as high as No. 7 on Nov. 25th and finished the season ranked No. 24 in both polls ... First-Team All-MWC defensive end Ryan Denney was named to the Academic All-America team and was drafted in the second round by the Buffalo Bills ... All-MWC tight end Doug Jolley was also selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

2002 For the first time since 1973 the Cougars finished the regular-season with a sub-.500 record ... coincidentally, the '73 season was the second under legendary coach LaVell Edwards ... his replacement, Gary Crowton, just completed his second season at BYU...for the first time in the four-season history of the MWC, BYU failed to win a conference road game, going 0-3 ... the Cougars combined to post a 9-2 conference road mark through the league's first three seasons ... Matt Berry was the first redshirt freshman quarterback to start at BYU since Ty Detmer in 1988...Brady Poppinga led the MWC with eight sacks for minus 52 yards ... Matt Payne led the country with a punting average of 47.6 yards.

2003 BYU posted back-to-back losing seasons for the first time since 1970-71 before LaVell Edwards took over the reigns of the program ... John Beck became only the second true-freshman to start at quarterback for BYU when he started against Stanford ... Running back Reynaldo Brathwaite recorded the longest run from scrimmage in Cougar history, a 95-yard score against San Diego State ... Freshman tight end Daniel Coats was named to *The Sporting News*



Freshman All-America team after posting 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns...The Cougars' NCAA-record scoring steak ended at 361 after being shut out 3-0 against Utah in the final game of the season. The last time BYU was shut out was when Arizona State blanked the Cougars in 1975.

2004 BYU posted its third-consecutive losing season, the longest such streak since the Cougars were sub-.500 from 1959-64 ... Despite the losing 5-6 record, BYU finished third place in the MWC at 4-3 ... The Cougars' schedule was one of the most difficult in team history, including games against Notre Dame, the defending national champions USC, then-undefeated Boise State and an undefeated University of Utah team ... John Beck threw for 2,563 yards while Chris Watkins caught 52 passes for 1,042 yards and six touchdowns ... Austin Collie, a true freshman, caught a team-high 53 passes for 771 yards and eight touchdowns ... Matt Payne finished his career as second on BYU's all-time scoring list with 312 and set an NCAA record for most consecutive field goals between 40-49 at 14 ... he also set the school record for most consecutive PATS with 67 ... Gary Crowton resigned at the end of the season and replaced by Bronco Mendenhall.

2005 Under the direction of first-year coach Bronco Mendenhall, the Cougars were 6-5 overall in the regular season and finished tied for second in the Mountain West Conference at 5-3 ... BYU earned an invitation to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl and played California, losing 35-28 ... Mendenhall revamped the coaching staff prior to the season, adding Robert Anae (offensive coordinator), Brandon Doman (quarterbacks coach) and Patrick Higgins (wide receivers coach) ... BYU also switched back to the traditional uniforms with the Y logo on the helmets while maintaining the navy blue ... John Beck,

Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown led an offensive attack that was BYU's most potent since 2001, averaging 33.0 points per game (second in the MWC and 24th in the nation) and 462.4 yards of total offense per game ... Beck led the conference and was fifth in the nation in passing yards (309.1 per game) and led the conference in touchdown passes (27) ... Brown also added six 100-yard rushing games to give him 11 for his career, the most in BYU history ... Harline led the team and ranked among the top tight ends in the nation with 63 receptions for 853 yards and five touchdowns ... Beck, Brown and Harline were all named to the All-MWC First Team Cameron Jensen led the team in tackles for the second-consecutive year by recording 84.

2006 BYU knocked off 10 straight opponents over the final three months to finish the 2006 season with an 11-2 record ... The Cougars tallied a perfect clip against league opponents to win their first outright Mountain West Conference Championship since the 2001 season ... BYU went on to dismantle Oregon, 38-8, in the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl ... The Cougars' 10-game win streak marked the longest since the 2001 season and only the seventh time in the program's history the Cougars have had nine or more consecutive wins in a single season ... BYU earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings, finishing at No. 15 in the final poll ... Under head coach Bronco Mendenhall—the Mountain West Conference and AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year—the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.5 yards per game during the regular season. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.5 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring

offense, averaging 36.8 points per game ... The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of 167.08 ... Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging +1.08 turnovers per game ... BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.7 points per game ... BYU outscored its opponents during the regular season by an average 36.8 to 14.7 (+22.1) ... The Cougars posted 138 first-quarter points and held opponents to just 15 points in the opening quarter of play throughout the season ... Registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006, finishing the season as the most dominant home team in the nation and the most dominant home team in BYU history by earning a +35.16 home scoring margin, first in the nation and a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979.

2007 Head coach Bronco Mendenhall led the 2007 BYU team to its second-straight outright Mountain West title behind another perfect 8-0 MWC season ... BYU's second straight 11-win season was capped with a No. 14 national ranking in both the Associated Press Top-25 and USA Today Coaches Poll ... The season marked the highest finish for the Cougars in the national polls since 1996 ... Behind the arm of All-MWC sophomore quarterback Max Hall and the legs of Freshman All-American Harvey Unga, BYU's all-time leading freshman running back, the Cougars are the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win back-to-back outright league titles and to record back-to-back undefeated league records ... To go along with their 16-game conference win streak, the Cougars boasted the nation's longest overall winning streak at 10 games and won 21 of their last 23 games ... BYU reached its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl

victory, 17-16, in dramatic fashion -- with a block on UCLA's potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired ... Mendenhall is the first coach in school history to lead the Cougars to three consecutive bowl games in his first three years as head coach ... Hall, in his first year as a starter, put in the fourth best performance by a first-year quarterback at BYU to date and was the nation's top sophomore quarterback in terms of passing yards ... As the nation's 10th ranked defense, the Cougars allowed just 307.2 yards per game, allowing only one 100-yard rusher all season ... Unga picked up Freshman All-America and MWC Freshman of the Year honors after leading the Cougars with an average of 94.4 yards per game ... Defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen ranked ninth nationally with 13.5 sacks on the season.

2008 The Cougars posted their third consecutive season with 10 or more wins with a 10-3 final record in 2008 ... BYU earned a spot in the national polls each week during the season, including a ranking as high as No. 7 ... BYU finished third in the MWC at 6-2 and received an invitation to the 2008 Pioneer Las Vegas bowl ... ranked No. 16 in the final BCS standings before a 31-21 defeat to Arizona in Las Vegas ... with another undefeated home record the 2008 Cougars maintained LaVell Edward Stadium's undefeated record over the past three seasons, a first in program history ... three Cougars -- Matt Bauman, Kellen Fowler and David Oswald -- were named ESPN the Magazine Academic All-Americans, a program record ... junior wide receiver Austin Collie, junior tight end Dennis Pitta and senior offensive linemen Ray Feinga and Dallas Reynolds were named to the All-MWC First Team, while junior defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen was named to the first-team defense ... Pitta was one of only two unanimous selections ... seven Cougars received All-America accolades ... Collie was named to six different teams, including first-team All-America recognition from CBSSports.com and second-team accolades from The Associated Press ... offensive lineman Matt Reynolds was named to four Freshman All-America teams, including three first-team awards ... Collie, Hall, Pitta, Jorgensen, Dallas Reynolds and Feinga were among the top considerations for national awards at their respective positions ... Collie led the nation in total receiving yards and in receiving yards per game with a BYU single-season record of 153.8 receiving yards ... Pitta was second among tight ends and 27th among all receivers with 83.31 receiving yards per game ... Hall was No. 6 in passing yards per game, No. 7 in total passing yards, No. 8 in completions per game, No. 9 in total offense and No. 11 in passing efficiency ... he totaled a MWC single-season record 35 touchdowns, including seven scoring throws in BYU's 59-0 win over UCLA ... Unga turned in his second-straight 1,000-yard rushing season with 1,132.

2009 In a season featuring several signature victories, BYU achieved an 11-2 record (7-1 MWC) and No. 12 final ranking in the national polls ... No. 12 ranking is highest since No. 5 in 1996 ... ranked as high as No. 7 during the season ... earned highest-ever final BCS standings at No. 14 ... one of only six schools nationally to be ranked in both final polls and the final BCS standings each of the last four years and the only program to do so from a non-automatic-qualifying BCS conference ... won more games (43-9 record) the last four years than all but four teams in the country ... opened the season with a 14-13 win over No. 3 Oklahoma at new Dallas Cowboys Stadium and finished with a 26-23 overtime win against No. 19 Utah and a 44-20 triumph over No. 16 Oregon State in the Maaco Bowl Las Vegas ... made its fifth-straight bowl appearance for the first time since a string of 17 consecutive bowls invitations from 1978 through 1994 ... individually, senior tight end Dennis

2010 Starting the season 2-5 with six games against eventual bowl-bound teams, BYU finished the year winning 5 of its last 6 to finished third in the MWC (5-3) and earn the program's sixth-straight bowl invitation ... finished the season with a 52-24 win over UTEP in the New Mexico Bowl ... BYU set 31 New Mexico Bowl and 11 BYU bowl records during the game ... Heaps was named Offensive MVP while Rich was named Defensive MVP ... Senior kicker Mitch Payne set the all-time BYU scoring record, finishing with 334 points ... Heaps broke every BYU freshman quarterback record, playing in every game as a true freshman ... Junior Bryan Kariya was named an Academic All-American, the only FBS running back to earn the honor ... Riley Nelson was one of 11 FBS players named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team ... Matt Reynolds, Andrew Rich and Vic So'oto were named All-MWC First Team and JJ Di Luigi was named to the Second Team with seven others named honorable mention ... BYU finished its time in the MWC with the most wins (64) in conference history.

Pitta earned Consensus All-America honors while setting the NCAA record for most career receiving yards by a tight end (2,901) and breaking Austin Collie's school record for career receptions (221) ... Pitta was named to 10 different All-America teams ... Nine different Cougars (Pitta, Max Hall, Brian Logan, Matt Reynolds, Terence Brown, Braden Hansen, Jordan Pendleton) received various All-America recognition, including two receiving Academic All-America honors (Scott Johnson, Matt Bauman) ... seven members of the team were named to the All-Mountain West Conference teams with six other Cougars received honorable mention ... Harvey Unga became the school's all-time leading rusher with third straight 1,000-yard season ... Max Hall set BYU record for most wins as a starting quarterback with 32.

BYU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

After posting a perfect 13-0 season, the Cougars were awarded gold national championship rings after winning the 1984 National Championship.

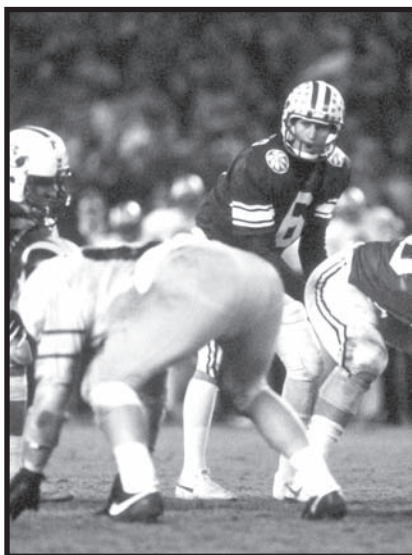
The Cougars were named No. 1 by the *Associated Press*, the *United Press International*, *Sports Illustrated*, *CNN-USA Today* and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan at the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawaii, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun late in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were to offensive lineman Craig Garrick and circus-catching wide receiver Glen Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU

47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

TY DETMER: 1990 HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawaii. Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, "Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU," — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor has been awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

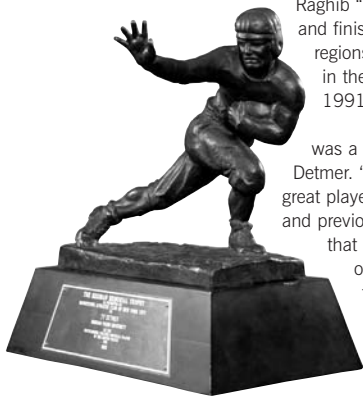
A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations "necktie" campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame's Raghib "Rocket" Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman balloting in 1991.

"Winning the Heisman was a great honor," said Detmer. "There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU."

Detmer's portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait

of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of LaVell Edwards Stadium.

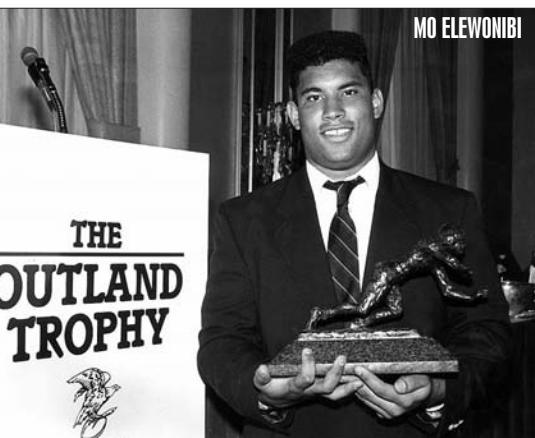

Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270-pound senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."



MO ELEWONIBI

MOHAMMED ELEWONIBI • 1989

Mohammed Elewonibi, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "Mount Mohammed" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

BYU is one of only 11 schools to have two Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas. ▼

LUKE STALEY: 2001 DOAK WALKER AWARD WINNER

While his teammates and coaches were watching in their hotel rooms from Hawaii, over 6,000 miles away, BYU running back Luke Staley was named the winner of the 2001 Doak Walker Award. The annual award, which was presented on the ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show from Orlando, Fla., is presented to college football's top running back.

"This is a great honor," Staley said. "I can't express how grateful I am for my family, my teammates, my coach - everyone who made this possible."

In addition to winning the Doak Walker Award, Staley was also named as a first-team member of the prestigious Walter Camp Foundation All-America Team. Staley was the first BYU consensus All-American since Ty Detmer was twice selected in 1990 and 1991. In addition to the Walter Camp Foundation All-America team, Staley was named a first-team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association, Football Writers Association of America, the Associated Press, The Sporting News, Football News and CNN/ISI—just to name a few.

"We're very proud of Luke and all his accomplishments," BYU head coach Gary Crowton said. "Since we started this season back in August, we have been telling these guys to work hard, stay focused and great things will happen. This award, although presented to Luke, is a tribute to the hard work and commitment each and every player and coach has made this season. Luke is probably one of the best examples we have had, in terms of working hard and staying focused.

This is a great tribute for a great athlete,

a great teammate and a great young man. We couldn't be more proud of him."

Staley, from Tualatin, Ore., led the nation in scoring (15.5 p/game), yards per carry (8.1 y/carry) and finished the 2001 season ranked third in the nation in rushing, averaging 143.8 yards per game. He helped pace the Cougars to a 12-2 record on the season, scoring a BYU single-season record 28 touchdowns. Staley also racked up a BYU single-season record 1,582 yards rushing on the season.

LAVELL EDWARDS: TWO-TIME NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR

• 257 Victories • 19 Conference Titles • 1 National Title

Legendary Cougar coach LaVell Edwards has twice been recognized as one the greatest coaches in college football. The sixth-winningest coach in NCAA football history earned the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award in 1979 and the Kodak Coach of the Year Award in 1984.



Along with his teams' successes during his coaching tenure, LaVell Edwards accumulated many personal accolades to match. Edwards' first national recognition for his coaching prowess came in 1979 when he was honored with the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award. A panel of 11 former college football coaches selected the BYU coach. On the heels of BYU's first national championship five years later, Edwards' coaching peers honored him with what he then called his greatest personal accolade, the Kodak Coach of the Year Award. As successful as his teams were on the field, Edwards' coaching philosophy did not reflect a win-at-all-costs mentality. He didn't bark orders or rule the sideline with an iron fist. Generally, the assistant coaches were delegated the duty of handling the Xs and Os while he saw to the administrative tasks of the program. His personal demeanor also gave him the ability to relate well with his players whether teaching them about football or other more personal matters.

"Just seeing how he handles himself with the media and with people in general ... he's always genuine with them. He treats everybody well," Former BYU quarterback and current BYU athletic administrator Robbie Bosco said. "Those are the things he'll leave with me, more than winning football games."

"In the South there's Bear Bryant, Daryl Royal and Frank Boyles, in the East there's Joe Paterno, in the Midwest there's Bo Schembechler, Woody Hayes and Tom Osborne and in the West there's John McKay and LaVell Edwards. He's a legend. And as good a football coach as he was, he's a better man and he did it the right way. He's known throughout the country as a legend."

SAMMY BAUGH TROPHY

On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the seventh BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year. In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award. Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972), Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Jeff George (1989), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995), Ryan Leaf (1997), Daunte Culpepper (1998), Chad Pennington (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), David Carr (2001), Matt Leinart (2004), Brady Quinn (2005) and Sam Bradford (2008). BYU'S QUARTERBACK FACTORY

EVER SINCE GARY SHEIDE IN 1973, BYU HAS PRODUCED AN ASSEMBLY LINE OF OUTSTANDING QUARTERBACKS IN PROVO THAT HAVE EARNED UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS IN THE MARKET OF COLLEGE AND PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many other Heisman Trophy candidates. Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young have been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In

the last 20 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Three of the top-15 career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 29 years LaVell Edwards coached at BYU, the Cougars led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times. In 2006, Mountain West Conference Player of the Year quarterback John Beck was the No. 4 passer in the nation as he helped lead a resurrection of the storied BYU offense of old. The tradition continued with quarterback Max Hall who was the nation's top-ranked sophomore quarterback in his first season as the starter and was among the top ten in passing yards and passing efficiency his senior year.

When Edwards was named head coach at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball. The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC or MWC championship 22 times, played in 29 bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

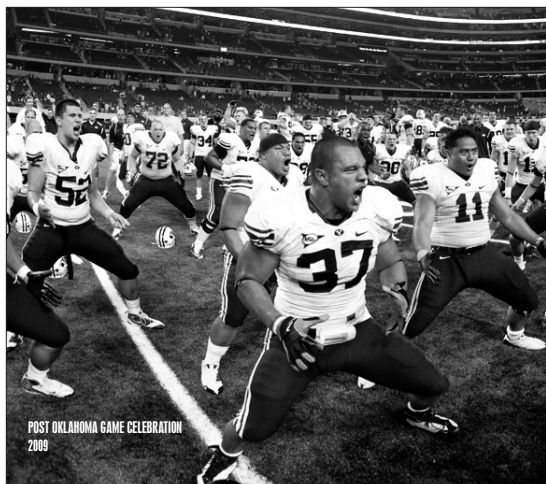

BYU's football program has tapped into the Pacific Islands to find players since 1951 when Harry Bray of Hilo, Hawai'i transferred from Weber College to play for the Cougars. Other Pacific Islanders who followed included: Famika Anae (1954-55), John Kapele (1957-59), John Kawaa (1962-1963), John Lupoi (1967-1969) and Henry Nawahine (1964-1965). Some of BYU's most celebrated and decorated players have come from the Pacific islands, including All-Americans, national record holders and players who have gone on to compete in the NFL.

Since 1951, hundreds of Polynesian players have suited up for BYU. The Cougars' Polynesian players have come from Hawaii, Tonga, Samoa and Fiji. Some of the most notable players include Vai Sikahema, the NCAA's career leader in punt returns, All-American and NFL veteran tight end Itula Mili and BYU's second all-time rushing leader Lakei Heimuli. Five former BYU Polynesian players are currently on NFL rosters.

Of the more than 100 Polynesian players, several rank among the top statistical leaders in BYU history. Two of the top-10 career rushers are Polynesian, including career leader Harvey Unga. Two of the top-10 leaders in career

receiving yards are also Polynesian. Since 1982, 10 of BYU's season-rushing leaders have been Pacific Islanders.

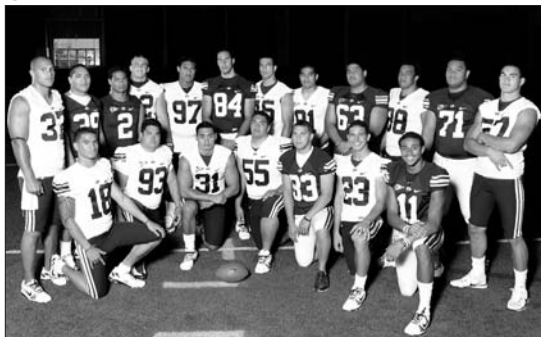

Tight ends have thrived in the BYU offensive system for years. Like no other school in the nation, BYU's tight ends have earned unprecedented success as a featured position in

BYU's wide-open offense. Over the years, Cougar football has emerged as the home of some of the best pass-catching tight ends in NCAA history. Starting with "Miracle Bowl" hero Clay Brown in 1980, ten BYU tight ends have earned All-American status. Since 1976, 12 Cougar tight ends have received 20 First-Team All-Conference citations. In this decade alone nine different Cougar tight ends have made NFL rosters. Four former Cougars helped lead their teams to the Super Bowl—Doug Jolley with the Oakland Raiders in 2003, Chad Lewis with Philadelphia Eagles in 2005, Itula Mili with the Seattle Seahawks in 2006, and Gabriel Reid with the Chicago Bears in 2007. Two former BYU Cougars, Todd Christensen and Chad Lewis, have been named to several Pro Bowl teams during their successful professional careers as tight ends. Five of the past seven seasons, tight ends have led the Cougars in receptions, and a BYU tight end was named first-team all-conference (Jonny Harline in 2005 and 2006 and Dennis Pitta in 2007, 2008 and 2009) in five-straight years. In 2009, BYU became the first team in conference history to sweep the MWC tight end honors as Andrew George earned All-MWC Second Team accolades while Pitta was a consensus All-American.

The College Football Hall of Fame, located in South Bend, Indiana, has honored six of BYU's Football Greats. The sixth Cougar to be inducted into this prestigious hall is BYU All-American tight end Gordon Hudson.

Hudson is the sixth former Cougar to be elected to the College Football Hall of Fame. Legendary coach LaVell Edwards was inducted in 2004, while former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen (inducted 1994), Marc Wilson (inducted 1996), Jim McMahon (inducted 1998) and Steve Young (inducted 2001) are also College Football Hall of Famers. Hudson is the first non-quarterback to represent BYU as a player in the Hall. A consensus All-America First Team pick in 1982 and 1983, Hudson is still the NCAA FBS record holder for most passes caught per game by a tight end (5.4) in a career, most career yards per game by a tight end (75.3) and most yards in a single game by a tight end (259). Hudson helped BYU win four conference championships (WAC) and earn four Holiday Bowl invitations during his career from 1980-83. He totaled 2,484 receiving yards and 22 touchdowns during his All-American career.



STEVE YOUNG

Quarterback: 1982-83

Inducted: 2005

One of the greatest collegiate quarterbacks of all time, Steve Young was consistently at the top of all the nation's statistical categories for quarterbacks en route to setting 13 NCAA records. As a junior, he averaged 318.8 yards per game of total offense, earning All-Western Athletic Conference recognition and Conference Player of the Year honors. In his senior season, he repeated as a first-team All-WAC selection, completed 306-of-429 pass attempts for an impressive .713 percentage and led BYU to its second straight Holiday Bowl. His .713 completion percentage, 3,902 yards passing, 4,346 yards of total offense and 33 touchdowns all led the nation. Few rival Young's career totals. He completed 592-of-907 attempts for a .653 average, threw for 7,733 yards and 56 touchdowns and his 8,817 yards of total offense in only 31 games is among college football's all-time greatest career numbers. A unanimous All-American and academic All-WAC selection, Young was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and received a National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award in recognition for his excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community -- a tradition he maintains today with the successful Forever Young Foundation. Young retired after 15 seasons in the NFL, where he earned two MVP awards, seven trips to the Pro Bowl and led the San Francisco 49ers to the Super Bowl Championship in 1995, earning Most Valuable Player honors. He was inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in 2005.



LAVELL EDWARDS

Head Coach: 1972-2000

Inducted: 2004

A coaching icon whose success and longevity are paralleled by few, Edwards guided BYU to heights never before reached in the program's history. Edwards posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over a span of 29 seasons at BYU. From 1972 until his retirement following the 2000 season, Edwards roamed the sidelines at BYU--a tenure that ranks fifth all-time among coaches at one school. In 20 of those 29 seasons, the Cougars claimed the league title. Guiding BYU to 22 bowl game appearances, including a streak of 17-straight bowl appearances, Edwards reached the pinnacle of coaching success in 1984 by winning the National Championship. His 257 wins rank him sixth in NCAA Division I-A history, and he has more victories than every other coach in BYU history combined. At the helm, Edwards compiled a program best .716 win percentage, coached one Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients, four Davey O'Brien award winners and 32 All-Americans--not to mention countless players who went on to professional careers in the NFL. BYU's success didn't come without personal reward for Edwards either. He was named NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year eight times, the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and AFCA National Coach of the Year in 1984. Named the State of Utah's Coach of the Century, Edwards is a member of the State of Utah Sports Hall of Fame. "A spectacular choice," Steve Young said. "When you think of the Hall of Fame, you think of longevity, excellence, leadership and quality. In my book, Hall of Fame and LaVell Edwards go hand in hand. He is definitely a worthy recipient of this honor."

JIM MCMAHON*Quarterback: 1978-81
Inducted: 1998*

In 1998 Jim McMahon (1977-78, 80-81) joined former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively. McMahon set 75 NCAA records at BYU, was a 1981 First Team All-American by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he earned First team All-America from the FWAA. McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the Sammy Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8) in 1981 as well as pass efficiency (176.9) and total offense (385.6) in 1980. He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first team all-league. He broke 23 school records, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU. McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).

**MARC WILSON***Quarterback: 1976-79
Inducted: 1996*

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-America honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named *Sports Illustrated's* Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman balloting, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the NCAA Top Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots. Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Washington with their four children.

**GIFFORD NIELSEN***Quarterback: 1975-77
Inducted: 1994*

Nicknamed the "Mormon Rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes. "From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked. "It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. Over three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game. Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He and his wife Wendy have six children.



Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc., the first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least ten years and a first team All-America selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12-member panel made up of athletic directors, conference and bowl officials and media representatives. The College Football Hall of Fame is located in South Bend, Indiana, and is open year round. For more information visit <http://collegefootball.org/>.

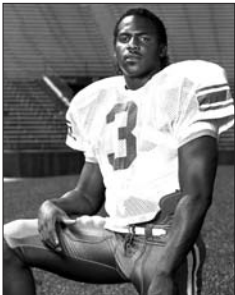

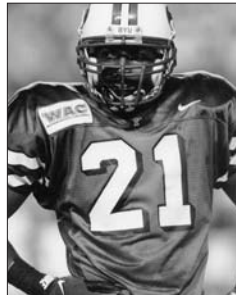

ALL-AMERICANS

ELDON FORTIE- Nicknamed "The Phantom," Fortie broke 21 school records and is one of only two players in BYU football history to have his number retired. Rushed for 1,149 yards, an average of 5.8 per carry, and passed for 814 yards in 1962. Holds BYU record for most rushing yards in a game (272).

JAY MILLER- Led the nation in receiving with 100 receptions for 1,181 yards including eight touchdowns. Holds BYU record for most receptions in a game (22) and most receiving yards in a game (263).

WAYNE BAKER- Named second team All-American his senior season when he finished with 82 tackles (67 assisted, 15 solo). He also recorded nine quarterback hurries and 10 quarterback sacks as a senior.

BRAD OATES- He was All-Western Athletic Conference and co-captain his last two seasons at BYU, and was named second team All-American by the Associated Press, the highest honor ever for a BYU football player to that date.

JEFF BLANC- Finished his career as BYU career record holder for career rushes, touchdowns, points scored and most yards rushing. Compiled 984 yards rushing and 10 touchdowns during his junior season when he was named honorable mention All-American by UPI.

ORRIN OLSEN- Started all 11 games. Brother of Merlin and Phil Olsen.

GIFFORD NIELSEN- Nicknamed the "Mormon Rifle," he threw 207 completions for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdown passes. Led nation in touchdown passes, second in total offense, fourth in passing. As a team, the Cougars finished first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9). 1994 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

MARC WILSON- Threw 250 completions for 3,720 yards with 29 touchdown passes. Threw seven touchdown passes in first start. Led NCAA in total offense. Ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating. 1979 Senior Bowl MVP. Finished third in Heisman voting. Set 19 NCAA records in his career. Winner of Sammy Baugh Trophy as College Passer of the Year. Led team to an undefeated regular season and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. 1996 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

CLAY BROWN- Made game winning "hail mary" catch in 1980 Holiday Bowl against SMU. Had 1,009 receiving yards in 1980.

NICK EYRE- Nicknamed "The Bear." Was BYU's first consensus All-American lineman. Finished third in the Outland Trophy voting. Was a

three-year starter for 24 consecutive games.

JIM McMAHON- Led nation with 4,571 yards passing including 47 touchdowns in 1980. First Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. Set or tied 26 NCAA records. Led nation in total offense (385.6) and pass efficiency (176.9), which ranks fourth all-time in NCAA history. Finished fifth in Heisman voting. Won first-ever Davey O'Brien Award in 1981. Led nation with 3,555 yards passing including 30 touchdowns. Led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8). Finished third in Heisman voting. Finished career with 75 NCAA records. 1998 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

BART OATES- As a two-year starter on the offensive line, Oates earned Honorable Mention All-WAC in 1981 and All-WAC First Team in 1982. He was also named to the All-District VII All-Academic team. Oates also enjoyed a successful career in the NFL.

GORDON HUDSON- A two-time All-American, Hudson had 67 catches for 928 yards and six touchdowns in 1982 and 44 catches for 596 yards and six touchdowns in 1983. He was also a two-time first-team All-WAC selection. He set five NCAA records.

BYU is home to 47 All-Americans with 12 multi-year honorees. Eldon Fortie began BYU's long line of All-Americans in 1961 and Marc Wilson was BYU's first consensus All-American in 1979. BYU boasts 12 consensus All-Americans as well as an additional 34 Academic All-American citations.

STEVE YOUNG- Won Davey O'Brien Award and finished runner-up for the Heisman. BYU led nation in total offense and was second in scoring. Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game.

ROBBIE BOSCO- Led BYU to only National Championship in school history. Led nation in total offense and finished runner-up in passing efficiency (151.8). Runner-up for Davey O'Brien Award and third in Heisman voting.

KYLE MORRELL- As BYU's safety Morrell was honored as the WAC Defensive Player of the Year with 70 tackles, three interceptions and one sack.

LEON WHITE- Selected defensive MVP of the 1984 Holiday Bowl. Named second-team All-America by *The Sporting News* as a junior (1984) and honorable mention All-America as a senior (1985) by the AP. Had 10 pass deflections in 1984, including five against Utah State. Recorded 90 tackles, five tackles for loss and two sacks his senior season.

MARV ALLEN- A two-year starter and four-year letterman that played an integral part on the defensive unit of the 1984 National Championship team. He finished the season with 131 tackles and tied for the team lead in interceptions with four. His efforts earned him First-Team All-WAC honors, an honorable mention All-America nod from the AP. He was also named second-team Academic All-American.

DAVID MILLS- Led team in receiving during his senior season when he caught 60 passes for 1,023 yards and seven touchdowns. Played on four

WAC championship teams, including the National Championship team in '84.

MARK BELLINI- A former walk-on, Bellini led BYU with 63 receptions for 1,008 yards, including 14 touchdowns his senior season in 1985. He was also 10th nationally in receiving average of 5.7 catches per game. Had 138 receptions, 2,267 yards receiving and 23 touchdowns in his career.

TREVOR MATICH- Was named to the AP All-America Third Team and Football News Honorable Mention as a center. Also named All-WAC First Team, played in the senior bowl, and was the 28th pick in the 1985 NFL draft by the New England Patriots.

TREVOR MOLINI- Named third-team All-American as a tight end his sophomore season and received an honorable mention nod during his junior season. Caught 63 passes for 849 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore. Caught 11 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns against New Mexico in 1985.

JASON BUCK- Became only the third player in the western United States to win Outland Trophy. Had 59 tackles, 13 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks in 1986.

PAT THOMPSON- Led conference in punting with 49 punts for 2,195 yards, an average of 44.8 yards per punt. Led the nation in punting for much of the season.

MO ELEWONIBI- Didn't play football until after high school. Led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

He was the 1989 Outland Trophy winner.

BOB DAVIS- Had 137 tackles, including six sacks his senior season. Dick Butkus Award candidate.

CHRIS SMITH- Led team with 60 catches for 1,090 yards, including five touchdowns in 1989. Set NCAA record for tight end with 1,156 yards receiving in 1990. Caught 68 passes and scored two touchdowns.

TY DETMER- 1990, 1991 First collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Passed for 5,188 yards and 41 touchdowns. Member of the NCAA All-Decade team. Still holds 10 NCAA records. His career record of 15,031 yards passing is third highest in Division I football history.

BYRON REX- Named UPI Second Team All-American tight end in 1992. He was also a two-time All-WAC selection (1991-1992).

ALAN BOARDMAN- A four-year starter who recorded 204 punts for 8,636 yards, averaging 42.3 yards per kick. His freshman year he ranked ninth among punters nationally with a 43.13 average per kick.

EVAN PILGRIM- A three-year starter on BYU's offensive line. In 1994, his senior season, Pilgrim anchored an offensive line that was fifth in the nation in total offense. He helped Jamal Willis become the all-time leading rusher in BYU history, and led the Cougars to a No. 10 national ranking (final season ranking). Pilgrim was named a second team All-American guard by the *Associated Press* after his senior year.



ITULA MILI- Had 46 catches for a nation-leading 692 yards and three touchdowns for tight ends. First-team All-WAC after senior season.

STEVE SARKISIAN- He had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career at BYU. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 TDs in his career. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, the seventh best mark ever) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and a second-team All-American.

ROB MORRIS- Two-time all-conference selection. His 345 career tackles is eighth all-time at BYU. He was as a first round draft pick in 2000 by the Indianapolis Colts. Morris was named to the *Associated Press*, *The Sporting News*, *Football News* All-American first-teams after his senior year. He was also a semifinalist for Butkus Award, given to nation's top line-backer, and the WAC Defensive Player of the year in 1998 after posting 147 tackles during his junior season.

LUKE STALEY- NCAA leader in scoring (15.45 points per game) and third in the nation in rushing average at 143.82 yards per game. Set BYU single season records in touchdowns scored (28), most points scored (170) and rushing yards (1,596). He led BYU to 12-2 record and MWC Championship. He earned the nation's top running back award, the Doak Walker Award, after his outstanding junior season.

MATT PAYNE- In 2004 he was named AFCA and *Sporting News* First Team All-American and AP Second Team All-American as a punter. 2004 Ray Guy and Lou Groza Award Semifinalist. Led the nation with 51 punts for an average of 48.0 yards per punt while earning All-America honorable mention recognition in 2002. He was also an All-MWC First Team selection three times (2002-04).

DANIEL COATS- Set a BYU freshman tight end receiving record with 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns. Named a *Sporting News* Freshman All-American in 2003.

JONNY HARLINE- Picked up six All-America citations, including First Team honors from The Sporting News, ESPN, College Football News, CBS Sportsline.com, SI.com and Third Team honors from the Associated Press. Harline led all BYU receivers in receiving yards (935) and touchdowns (12).

JOHN BECK- Named a Sporting News Second Team All-American while picking up Honorable Mention citations from CBS Sportsline.com, Pro Football Weekly and College Football News. Beck finished his BYU career as the second Cougar passer to surpass to 10,000-yard mark.

JAKE KURESA- Named a College Football News Second Team All-American while earning an Honorable Mention citation from The Sporting News. Anchored an offensive unit that was fourth in the nation in yards per game. He started games at tackle, guard and center during the 2006 season.

JAN JORGENSEN- Earned Third Team Freshman All-America honors from the Sporting News. Jorgensen started each of BYU's 13 games as a freshman. He tied for the team league with five sacks and led all defensive linemen with 34 total tackles.

HARVEY UNGA- Named a Rivals.com Second Team Freshman All-American in 2007 after compiling 1,050 rushing yards and 600 receiving yards. Unga is the Cougars' all-time leading freshman running back and the first BYU freshman to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in a single season. He holds the school record for most 100-yard rushing games as a freshman with seven and holds the MWC Freshman Rushing record with 1,227 yards. Received College Football News Sophomore Team honorable mention in 2008 after rushing for 1,132 yards

DALLAS REYNOLDS- Named a College Football News Third Team All-American as a senior center in 2008 after anchoring an offensive unit that was ranked No. 6 in the nation in passing and No. 16 in total offense. Named a Sporting News Third Team Freshman All-American and a Rivals.com Second Team Freshman All-American in 2005 on offense that

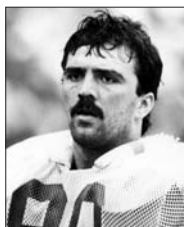
was ranked No. 13 in the nation. He started in all 12 games as a freshman and all 51 games of his career.

AUSTIN COLLIE- Named to six different All-America teams as a junior in 2008 after leading the nation with 1,538 receiving yards and 118.31 yards per game. He was named to the CBS Sports.com First Team, earned second-team honors from AP, The Sporting News, Sports Illustrated and Rivals and third-team recognition from College Football News. Declared early for the NFL Draft as BYU's career receiving leader. Named a Sporting News Second Team Freshman All-American in 2004 after leading the nation's freshman receivers with 4.82 catches per game and 70.1 yards per game. He was also the 2004 MWC Freshman of the Year.

DENNIS PITTA- Named a consensus All-American in 2009. Earned first-team honors by Walter Camp Foundation, AFCA, and Pro Football Weekly; second team by AP, Sports Illustrated, CBS Sports and Rivals; third-team by Sporting News and Phil Steele; HM by College Football News. Set the NCAA record for career receiving yards by a tight end (2,901). Was Rivals.com All-America Third Team in 2008. Also received honorable mention from Sports Illustrated and College Football News.

MATT REYNOLDS- Named to four different Freshman All-America teams in 2008, including Football Writers Association of America First Team, Rivals.com First Team, College Football News.com First Team and Sporting News Second Team. Started all 13 games on veteran offensive line featuring four other senior starters. Received College Football News Sophomore Team recognition in 2009.

BRADEN HANSEN- Named a first-team Freshman All-American by Football Writers Association of America and Phil Steele. Received honorable mention from College Football News.

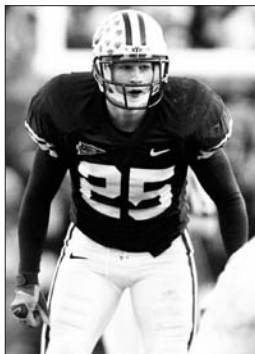

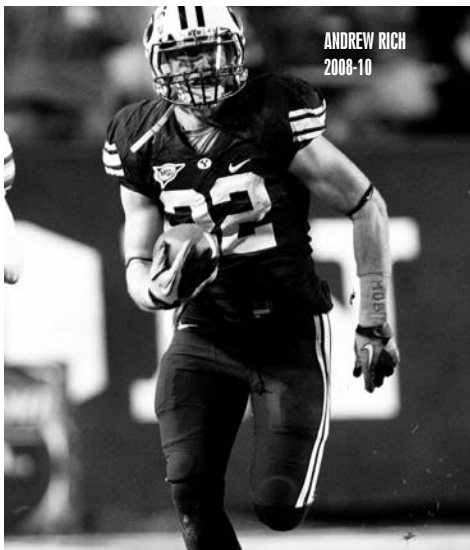

GAME SUMMARY:

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys. BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402. BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula. Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead. Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation. Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana. The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense. Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

GAME SUMMARY:

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games—a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration. SMU controlled the “first game,” leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the “second game” began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs’ two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, and blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a “Hail Mary” pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33. Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield. SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left. McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge. As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground. Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79. Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7. Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime. Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good. BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomzak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground. GAME SUMMARY:

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt. BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

GAME SUMMARY:

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship. The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive. The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break. Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go. Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship. David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge. Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead. In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead. Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats—one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor. Mark Bellini had 89 yards receiving while Lakei Heimuli added 10 receptions for 77 yards.

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24. The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA out-standing running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries. The first half was all defense as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

The 11th annual All-American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up. The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times. Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission. BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter. Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining. But that was as close as the Cougars would get. Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia coach George Welsh was head coach of Navy, which beat BYU 23-16 in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Cool weather didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns. But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second half. Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal. It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7. A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter. BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory. Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game. For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team. BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points. Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown. Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 half-time lead. The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. The safety came when linebacker Shay Muirbrook, the game's defensive MVP, collected one of his six sacks. Kansas State took a half-time lead with a 41-yard Hail Mary pass and a successful two-point conversion with no time left on the clock. The Wildcats increased the lead to 15-5 in the third quarter when offensive co-MVP Kevin Lockett caught a 72-yard TD. Fueled by consecutive controversial interference no-calls, quarterback Steve Sarkisian engineered two fourth-quarter drives capped by touchdown passes of 32-yards to James Dye and 28-yards to K.O. Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy. KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an interception from a Wildcat slant pattern at the 12 yard line to secure the game.



Omarr Morgan's fourth quarter interception sealed a BYU victory over Kansas State and an eventual top-5 national ranking in 1996.

Nathan Meikle caught a game-high 12 passes for 95 yards while Jonny Harline had seven receptions for 73 yards and one score and Todd Watkins added five catches for 95 yards and a touchdown. BYU fell behind 7-0 in the first quarter but scored early in the second when Beck found Curtis Brown for a 19-yard touchdown pass. California scored again but Fahu Tahī scored on a three-yard run to tie the game at 14 with 38 seconds left in the second quarter. The Golden Bears struck again before the half, going 58 yards in 27 seconds to take a 21-14 lead into the locker room. In the fourth, Beck engineered a 74-yard drive that ended with Harline scoring and then a 96-yard drive that ended with Watkins catching a nine-yard touchdown pass from Beck. California's ensuing drive ended with a missed field goal and the Cougars had a chance to tie but the drive ended on Beck's interception.

The 2006 BYU championship run ended with a Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl championship as the Cougars (11-2) dominated Oregon (7-6), 38-8, to finish the season with a 10-game winning streak in front of a Sam Boyd Stadium record crowd of 44,615. The Mountain West Conference champion BYU team set a school record for margin of victory in a bowl game, beating the Ducks by 30 points. Previously, the largest margin of victory for a BYU team in a bowl game was a 25-point defeat of Oklahoma in the 1994 Copper Bowl. BYU dominated all facets of the game, out-gaining Oregon 548 total yards to 260 total yards. BYU passed for 375 compared to Oregon's 166 and rushed for 173 compared to the Ducks 94. BYU seniors John Beck, Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown finished their careers in style. Beck completed 28-of-46 passes for 375 yards and two touchdowns. Harline, who was named Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl MVP, caught nine passes for a career-best--and Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl record--181 yards and a touchdown. Brown had 17 carries for 120 yards and two touchdowns and also caught seven passes for 55 yards. Brown also became the first BYU runner to rush for over 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons. Beck and Brown became the first quarterback/running back combo to pass for 3,000 yards and rush for 1,000 in the same season twice.

No. 17 BYU (11-2) won its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16, against UCLA (6-7) in dramatic fashion -- by blocking the Bruins' potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired. With only three ticks on the clock, true freshman Eathyn Manumaleuana extended his right hand at the right time to block UCLA's potential game-winning, 28-yard field goal as time expired to create what will be known as one of the most memorable bowl finishes in BYU Football history. The victory also avenged an early-season loss to the Bruins -- one of only two losses the Cougars suffered during the season. The Cougars, who finish the 2007 season on a 10-game winning streak, were led by sophomores Max Hall and Austin Collie. Hall threw 21-35 for 231 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore receiver Austin Collie was named the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl Most Valuable Player after racking up a game-high 107 yards on six receptions. Collie's 14-yard touchdown reception from Max Hall with 10:32 left in the second quarter gave the Cougars a 10-3 advantage. He was also credited with a game-high 195 all-purpose yards, including three kick returns for a total of 88 yards. The win marked the first time BYU has won back-to-back bowl games since the 1994 Copper Bowl and the 1996 Cotton Bowl. The win over UCLA extended the Cougars' win streak to 10 straight games, which marked the nation's longest active winning streak.

BYU totaled 444 yards of total offense compared to Arizona's 416, but the No. 16 Cougars fell short of their third-straight bowl victory, falling 31-21 to the Arizona Wildcats in the 2008 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl at Sam Boyd Stadium on Dec. 20. Trailing late in the game, BYU put pressure on Arizona with a comeback attempt when the Cougars followed a touchdown with a successful on-side kick. Wide receiver O'Neill Chambers recovered the ball for BYU, but the ensuing field-goal attempt hit the upright and left the Wildcats with a two-possession lead, enough to hold on for the win. Austin Collie continued to set BYU records in career receptions (215) and single-season receptions (106). The All-American receiver also tied an NCAA single-season record held with Texas Tech's Michael Crabtree with his 11th consecutive 100-yard receiving game. BYU quarterback Max Hall completed 30-of-46 passes for 328 yards and one touchdown pass. The Cougars finished the year 10-3 while the Wildcats improved to 8-5. BYU is one of only seven programs in the nation to win 10 or more games each of the past three seasons. The Cougars last accomplished the feat from 1983-85.

GAME SUMMARY:

A season that started with a win over No. 3 Oklahoma in Dallas ended with an impressive victory over No. 16 Oregon State in Las Vegas as the No. 14 BYU Cougars defeated the Pac-10 second-place Beavers 44-20 at the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas. BYU finished the season with an 11-2 record, including a 3-1 resume against ranked opponents. In the first-ever MAACO Bowl Las Vegas matchup pitting two top-20 teams, the Mountain West Conference runner-up dominated the scoreboard to earn its third 11-win season in the last four years. Only three schools—Boise State, Florida and Texas—have won more games over the last four years while BYU has achieved a 43-9 record. BYU's senior class anchored the win as quarterback Max Hall earned Most Valuable Player honors after completing 19-of-30 passes for 192 yards and three touchdowns. Manase Tonga contributed two touchdowns, while senior tight ends Andrew George and Dennis Pitta led all receivers with 46 and 45 yards, respectively. Defensively, senior linebacker Matt Bauman recovered a key fumble, returning it 34 yards for a touchdown. The score marked the first fumble recovery for a touchdown in BYU bowl history. Fellow team captain Scott Johnson intercepted an Oregon State pass in the fourth quarter and returned it 56 yards to set up BYU's final touchdown of the game. Collectively the defensive seniors accounted for 28 tackles, four tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries, one forced fumble, one interception and four pass breakups. BYU and Oregon State met for the first time in a bowl game and for the first contest since BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall played for the Beavers in 1986. Both teams had to learn to deal with not only each other but also a cold 43-miles-per-hour wind flowing through the north end of Sam Boyd Stadium. Wind gusts of 55 mph created some havoc for the passing and kicking games. BYU punter Riley Stephenson kicked a 60-yard low liner with the wind that was the longest kick of his career and tied a BYU bowl record. Oregon State fell to 8-5 with the loss, ending a streak of five-straight bowl victories by the Beavers.

GAME SUMMARY:

BYU opened the 2010 bowl season with its fourth bowl victory in the last five years with a 52-24 triumph over UTEP in the New Mexico Bowl. The Cougars had a record-setting day to finish the season with a 7-6 record and wins in five of their last six games. New Mexico Bowl Offensive MVP Jake Heaps went 25-of-34 for 264 yards and four touchdown passes, passing Ty Detmer's freshman record for most touchdown passes. Heaps also set the BYU bowl record for best completion percentage (.735) in a bowl game. Senior safety Andrew Rich was awarded the game's Defensive MVP in his final game as a Cougar, finishing with four solo tackles, two interceptions, one tackle-for-loss, one sack and a pass breakup. BYU played well from the start at University Stadium, scoring on its first five possessions to take a 31-3 lead and set a new first-half New Mexico Bowl scoring record. The Cougars went up 14-0 after Heaps found senior wide receiver Luke Ashworth for a nine-yard score with 4:37 to go in the first quarter. While BYU's offense was successfully moving the ball, the Cougar defense was equally successful keeping the Miners from gaining ground. BYU finished the first quarter with a 17-3 lead while totaling 143 yards and holding UTEP to minus-5 yards. The 24-3 lead became 31-3 when Heaps and Hoffman hooked up for their second touchdown of the game, this time from three yards out. The Cougars took a 45-17 lead into the final quarter. Hoffman set career highs across the board with eight receptions for 137 yards and three touchdowns, tying a BYU bowl game record for most touchdown receptions in a game. After freshman running back Joshua Quezada bulled his way to an 8-yard touchdown with 12 minutes remaining, Payne converted the point-after attempt to pass Owen Pochman as the Cougars' all-time scoring leader with 334 points.

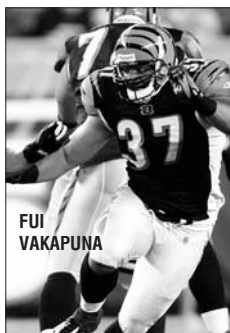

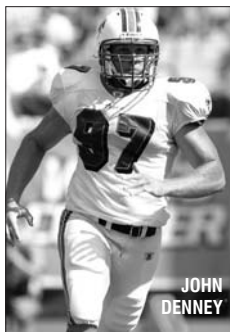

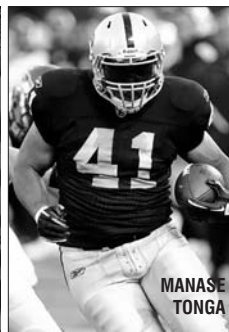

BYU'S NFL DRAFT FACTS

- The Cougars have had 10 players selected in the first round of the draft, including eight different players who were drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft, and one player selected in the first round of the USFL Draft (Steve Young).
- Dennis Pitta became the 10th BYU tight end picked in the NFL Draft and the fourth since 2001. The consensus All-American was the 16th pick in the fourth round, 114th overall by the Baltimore Ravens. Pitta is the first Cougar to be selected by the Ravens.
- BYU has had 66 players drafted over the past 25 years, including 38 players over the past 19 years.
- Four members of the BYU coaching staff were selected in the NFL or CFL Draft, including Lance Reynolds (1978, Pittsburgh Steelers), Steve Kaufusi (1988, Philadelphia Eagles), Ben Cahoon (1998, Montreal Alouettes) and Brandon Doman (2002, San Francisco 49ers.) Additionally, two BYU athletic department administrators were also selected in the NFL Draft, including Robbie Bosco (1986, Green Bay Packers) and Tom Holmoe (1983, San Francisco 49ers).
- Over the past 24 seasons, 37 offensive players from BYU have been drafted, as well as 27 defensive players and two special teams players.
- BYU's all-time leading receiver Austin Collie was drafted by the Indianapolis Colts in the fourth round of the 2009 NFL Draft. A 6-foot-2, 206-pound wide receiver, Collie was the 27th pick of the fourth round and the 127th overall selection. In his rookie year, Collie was named to the All-Rookie team, catching 60 receptions for 676 yards and seven touchdowns including 6 catches for 66 yards in Super Bowl XLIV.

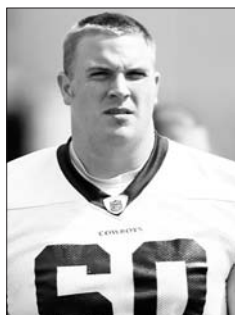

MEDIA SERVICES

The working media area is located on the third floor of the press box, situated on the west side of LaVell Edwards Stadium. Access to the press loge may be obtained via either the north or south elevators with media credentials.

The BYU Athletic Communications staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs, game stats, post-game quotes and media guides for both teams.

With four minutes remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU Head Coach Bronco Mendenhall and selected players

Credentials must be displayed prominently. All NCAA rules will be enforced regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines. Individuals or organizations violating sideline policies may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium. For additional questions regarding photography guidelines,

INTERVIEWS

All interview and information requests regarding all players, coaches and Athletic Department personnel must be arranged in advance through the Athletic Communications office at (801) 422-8948. BYU provides regular media availability each week. Local media members are responsible for attending after-practice media availability to conduct interviews. Opponent and national media can arrange telephone interviews through the Athletic Communications office.

The Athletic Communications office will send an advisory each week detailing the weekly availability opportunities. Any other interview requests must be made at least 24 hours in advance. Interviews with players are not permitted after Wednesday each game week. Players and coaches will not be available for interviews prior to practice. No player interviews will be conducted during regular class hours.

A weekly news conference with head coach Bronco Mendenhall will be held each Monday on the second floor of Legends Grille in the Student Athlete Building on campus. The news conference will begin at 10 a.m. MT and will be broadcast live on BYUtv and BYUtv.org. In addition, Coach Mendenhall will also be available during a weekly teleconference

to be held each Tuesday during the season. Please contact the Athletic Communications office for specific times and other details if requesting access opportunities.

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TELEVISION PARTNERS

On Sept. 1, 2010, Brigham Young University announced a new 8-year deal with ESPN to televise Cougar football on the sports leader's family of networks. BYU is the first program to sign an exclusive deal with ESPN.

ESPN has agreed that any BYU games it doesn't select may be televised live on BYUtv.

Beginning in 2011, every BYU home football game will be televised to a live national audience on the ESPN family of networks or BYUtv. Additionally, BYU's national fan base will be able to view same-day rebroadcasts on BYUtv of every home game and any away game to which ESPN has rights through conference agreements with the host team.

"We've long sought broad, nationwide access to our games for our fans and increased visibility among those who may be less familiar with our university and athletic programs," said BYU President Cecil O. Samuelson. "We've also been looking for ways to take better advantage of our own unique broadcasting resources."

BYUtv is available in 55 million North American homes and is growing every month. It's on the basic tier of both Dish and DirecTV and is carried by more than 500 cable systems. The network owns a new state-of-the-art production truck that will allow it to televise games in HD.

ESPN and ESPN2 are both available in 99.5 million homes, while the 24-hour college sports network ESPNU is distributed to approximately 73 million homes. ESPN also produces college football games that are broadcast on ABC.

Each year, a minimum of three games will be carried on ESPN, ESPN2, or ABC. Additional games will be on ESPNU. At least one game each season will be carried live on BYUtv.

ESPN has televised many of the great games in Cougar football history, beginning with the network's first live college football telecast. In that 1984 game, the Cougars defeated No. 3 Pitt at the beginning of BYU's national championship season.

ESPN also carried BYU's defeat of top-ranked Miami in 1990, a contest that is still the eighth-highest rated regular-season college football game on ESPN since that year. BYU's season-opening win over No. 3 Oklahoma was ESPN's ninth-highest rated game of the 2009 regular season.

"BYU is nationally recognized as an outstanding university and for the history and tradition of its premier athletic programs," said Burke Magnus, ESPN senior vice

president, college sports programming. "Once BYU decided to chart an independent course for football, we both recognized it is a good opportunity to build and grow our strong 30-year relationship. With this agreement, college football fans around the country will see the quality and pageantry of BYU as well as the passion and enthusiasm of its supporters."

RADIO

The exclusive radio home of BYU football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is KSL Newsradio in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 11th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell is in his 20th year on the broadcast crew, having served as the sideline reporter before stepping into the booth.

Wrubell's on-air partner and game analyst is ex-Cougar quarterback Marc Lyons, who begins his 31st season on the BYU Football broadcasts. Former Cougar defensive back and 2009 team captain Scott Johnson begins his second year reporting from the sidelines, while Andrew Adams returns for his fourth season as game-day host in the "Cougar Scoreboard Studio."
