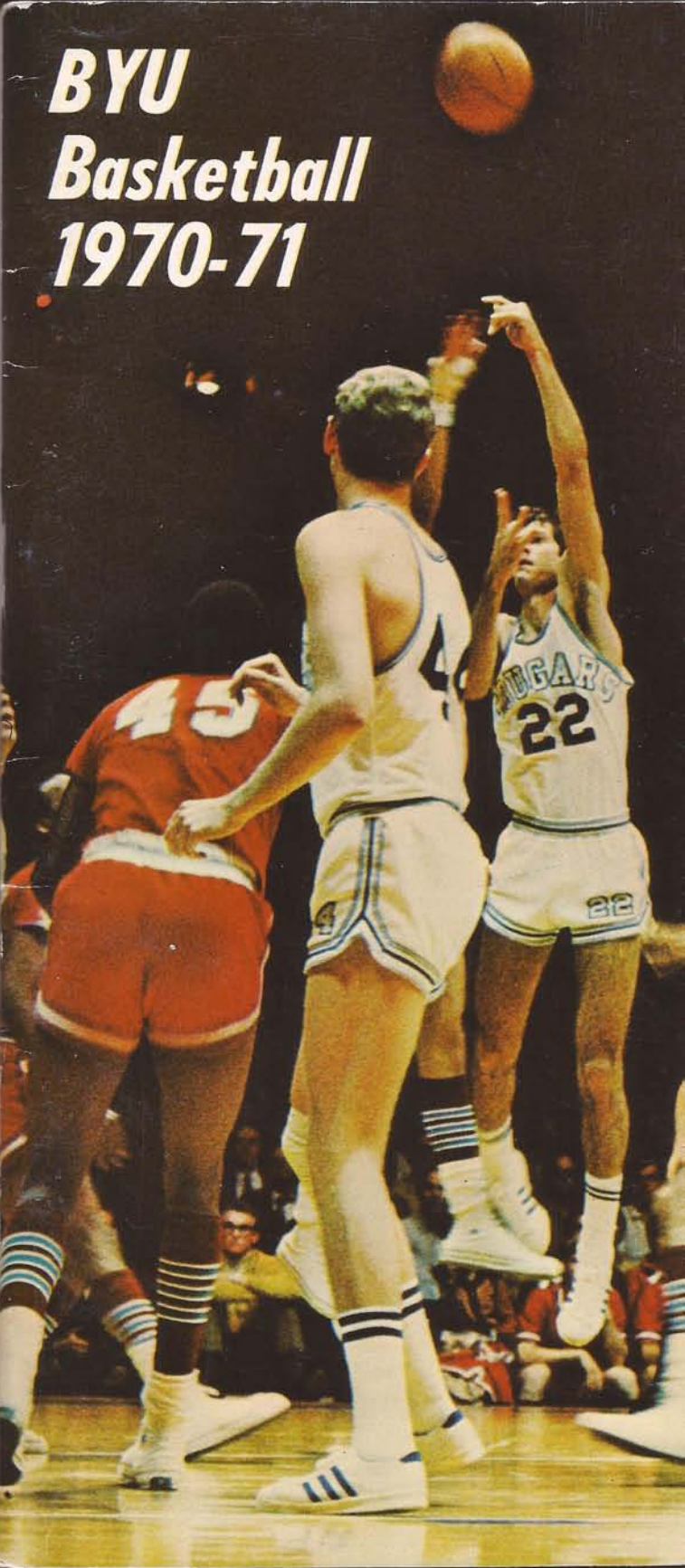
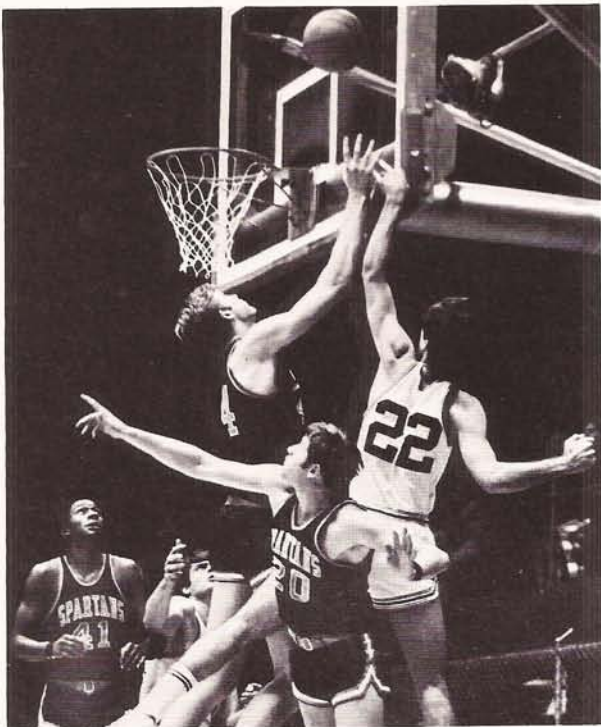

WELCOME, PRESS

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to the Sports Information Director a week prior to the game. Women are not allowed in the press box, and the area is reserved for those actually covering the game. Drivers, and others who may accompany those covering the game, will be asked to sit elsewhere.

PRESS BOX — The BYU press box is located on the west side of the playing floor, and is reached through entry of sections AA on the north end of the floor. All parking in the immediate vicinity of the fieldhouse is reserved. Parking permits should be requested in advance.

BROADCASTING BOOTHS — Three radio booths are available, including one reserved for the visiting station which is designated the official station by the visiting team.

THE FIELDHOUSE

The home floor for the Cougar basketball team is the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse located near the south end of the University's athletic complex.

Although the Fieldhouse was originally designed as a basketball arena, it is definitely multi-purpose. It is the scene of concerts, devotionals, forums, graduation exercises, and a hundred and one other activities where large audiences need to be accommodated.

Built in 1951, the original structure has since been added upon. A west annex, which provides a spacious area for indoor baseball and track, was added in 1959. The new gymnasiums, courts, locker rooms, etc., on the east end were added in 1964.

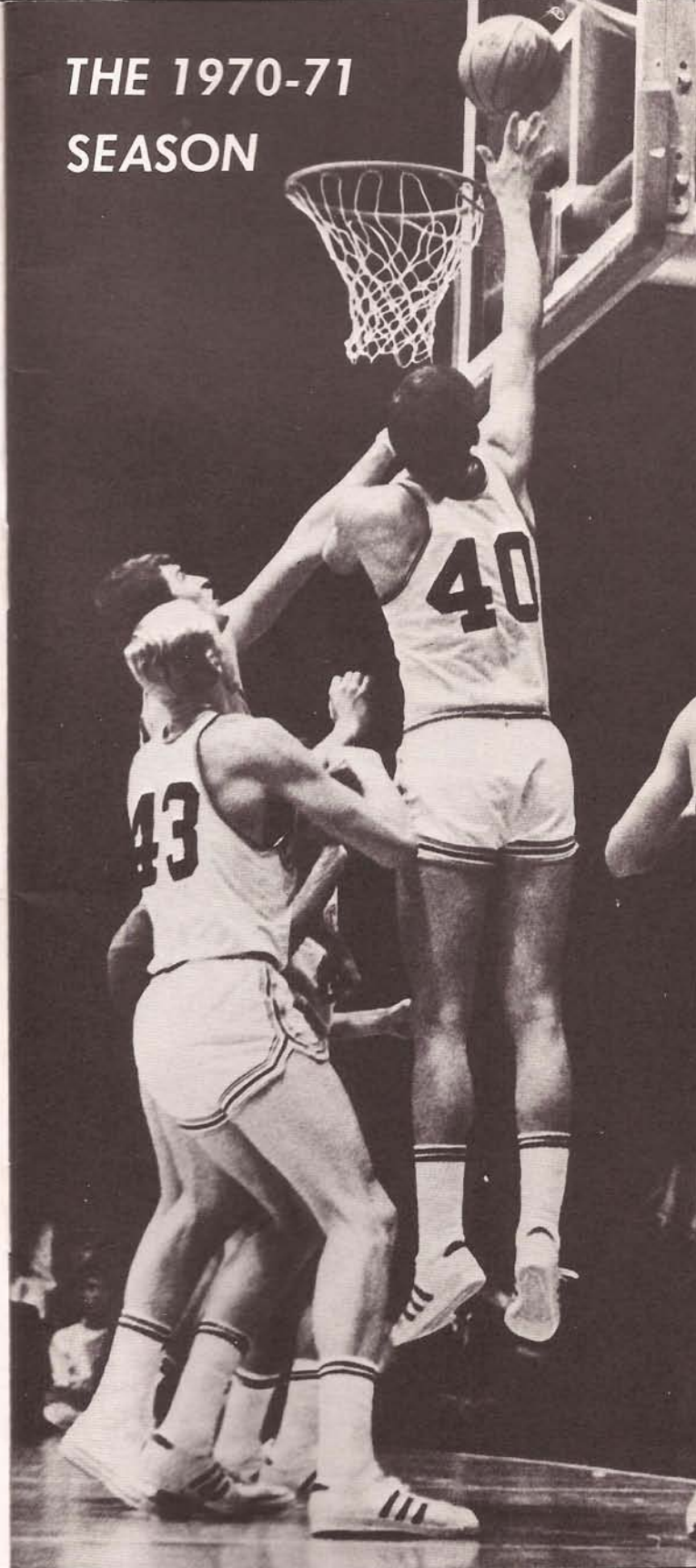
Seating capacity for the fieldhouse is 10,200.

The first game played in the Smith Fieldhouse was in Dec. of 1961. Brigham Young defeated Arizona in the inaugural game.

With the completion of the new Activities Center in 1971, the Cougars will move into their new facility, leaving the Smith Fieldhouse to intramural competition.

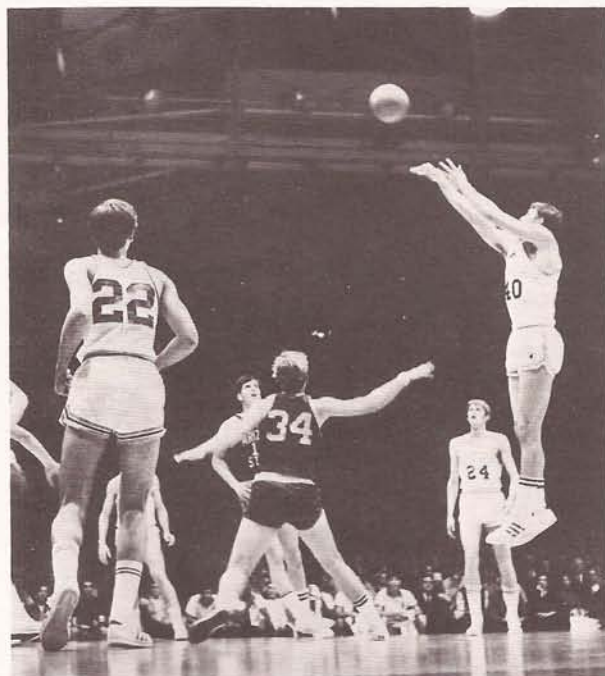
THE OUTLOOK

In the 20-plus years that Coach Stan Watts has been at the basketball helm, the Cougars have never had to resort to "comeback" talk. But as the campaign approaches, a break-even season would look and sound like a comeback of sorts for the Cougars who last season slipped into unfamiliar environs in the WAC's second division.

In any event, it looks like a good year for the Cougars to be on the rebound. The trouble is, the heart of last year's club has long departed, including three of the top four scorers for last year's 8-18 team. The Howards, Ruffners and Warners are gone, and that represents a pretty big chunk of experience and scoring power.

"The thing most evident to us," says Watts, "is our real dearth of experienced players. This isn't something you can develop overnight, which means we will have to be patient in bringing the club along."

Watts believes the forward line will be strong enough, but he is uncertain about the post, and he also has real concern about the depth on the guard line.



"While we are green, there are some pluses that should be taken into consideration. For one thing, many of our younger players display the kind of enthusiasm and hustle that can get a team moving. We are hoping this will be the case with our present club."

Watts' youth movement is a distinct possibility, since only three members of squad are seniors. This trio of vets consists of guard Jim Miller (a two-year starter), reserve center Veikko Vainio, and guard-forward Steve Kelly (a regular towards the end of the season). There are two other returning lettermen, both of whom are juniors; forward Phil Tollestrup (a starter) and reserve center-forward Clyde Baker.

The balance of the Cougar squad will be made up from the frosh team (12-6), and a transfer or two.

A good bet for starting positions are forward Tollestrup (6-6) and Kelly (6-3), with the latter fitting in at forward or guard, depending on the immediate need. Tollestrup, who started as a sophomore, finished the year with an 11.6 scoring average and was the team's number three rebounder.

If Kelly is shifted to the guard line, the other forward spot could go either to sophomore Kalevi Sarkalahti (6-8) or sophomore Kresimir Cosic (6-10). Sarkalahti, a Finn, led the frosh in rebounding (11.2 per game) and averaged 18.9 points per game.

Cosic, to use a trite expression, is something else. The big Yugoslavian had a (17.4) scoring average and the team's best rebounding average before he injured his knee and was out for the last half of the freshman season. Cosic, who was on the Yugoslavian team that beat Russia in the Olympics at Mexico, could be the starter at center or forward. The sooner he works into the system, the sooner the Cougars are likely to be a threat.

As for the guard line, veteran Jim Miller, a light scorer but strong floor man, should be at one of the starting positions. Jim carried a 8.0 scoring average at the end of the year, but was fifth in rebounding.

Top candidate to join Miller at guard is Bernie Fryer, a 6-3 transfer from Peninsula College in Washington. Fryer had an amazing scoring average his first two seasons, and it is hoped that it will carry over to the BYU varsity. Fryer will be taking the position vacated by Doug Howard.

BYU's bench strength at guard will rest with three sophomores; John Starkins (6-2), Dave Bailey (6-1) and Jim Challis (6-2), none of whom have any varsity experience.

There is good backup on the forward line with letterman Clyde Baker (6-7), Craig Jorgensen (6-8), and John Bennion (6-7). All but Baker are sophomores, and there is a chance that Baker may be moved to the post.

At this writing the softest spot on the club could be at center where there is not, as yet, a standout performer. Letterman Veikko Vainio (6-9) could take over, as could transfer Jay Bunker (6-8).

Team height will be about the same, which is encouraging, and there should be a little more overall team speed for the Cougars' fast break.

COACH STAN WATTS



Entering his 22nd year as the Cougar head mentor, Coach Stan Watts will be wearing two hats throughout this basketball season—Chairman of the Department of Athletics, and head basketball coach.

Earlier this summer Stan Watts (Mr. Basketball) was named new chairman of the Department of Athletics, replacing Floyd Millet.

No stranger to administration, Stan has served as acting chairman, and was assistant chairman at the time of his appointment. Last year he completed a term as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, and still sits on the board.

In his 22 years as head mentor of the Cougar teams, Coach Stan has shaped BYU into a basketball empire, while establishing himself as one of the all-time winningest coaches.

Stan is one of the top 20 basketball coaches in the nation, and his record speaks for itself. After two decades with the Cougar varsity, Watts and his teams have netted two NIT championships (1951 and 1966) and six conference championships; not to mention 384 victories against 224 defeats while playing some of the best competition in collegiate basketball.

WAC Record

Against WAC competition, considered among the country's best conferences, Stan has a 47-37 record, for a .559 percentage, which is among the top in the

WAC. El Paso holds a slight edge after its first year of competition with a 10-4 record, and a .714 percentage.

To know the man and his accomplishments, one must go back to 1949, the year he took over at BYU. The Cougars were regarded as a good basketball school at the time, but it wasn't until Stan took the helm that they won a national tournament. His colorful, fast-break basketball shaped a basketball tradition that is known far and wide today.

TOURS

Part of the fame abroad has come as a result of the team's several tours. While Watts has been the head coach, the Cougars have made three extended tours overseas. The first trip was made in 1950, the year the Cougars toured South America, came back and won the NIT. BYU returned to Central and South America in 1965, playing some of the best teams to be found in the Latin American countries. The summer of 1967 found the team making an extended tour through the Orient-Pacific. Consequently, the BYU Cougar (or Puma, as it is known in South America) is often identified by fans on foreign courts.

Stan grew up in Murray, a small community just outside of Salt Lake City. An all-around athlete at Murray High, he attended Weber State before enrolling at BYU for junior and senior years. Stan won honors in three sports with the Cougars and, graduated in 1938.

Continuing his endeavors along the athletic lines, Stan began his coaching career at Millard High, where he was head coach in three sports. From Millard he moved to Dixie College as athletic director and head basketball coach. He returned to the high school ranks in 1945 as head coach at Jordan High. Two years later he joined the staff as an assistant coach at BYU. In his early years at BYU he served as head baseball coach, assistant football coach, and track coach. When the basketball post opened at BYU in 1949, Stan was everyone's choice.

SCHEDULE

Stan handpicks his own schedule, and year after year his teams have faced the elite in collegiate basketball. In addition, his teams have played in practically all major tournaments in the country.

Besides coaching, Watts has done very well as a lecturer and author. His book, "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball," has sold well since its publication in 1959. He is also a regular contributor to magazines and periodicals on the subject of basketball.

Stan and his wife, the former Emily Kelly, have been married more than 30 years. They have four children: Janice (Mrs. Dennis Jones), Susan, (Mrs. Richard Coon) Judy, and Howard.

PETE WITBECK



The 1970-71 basketball season finds Alan "Pete" Witbeck in his seventh year as Watt's right hand man.

Hired initially as a scout for the varsity, Pete joined the BYU faculty in the College of Physical Education in 1955, after obtaining his master's degree from BYU.

Witbeck began scouting for Coach Watts in the late 50's, and was soon after named freshman basketball coach. For several years the frosh teams, under Witbeck, enjoyed unusual success. His last three freshman teams had a combined record of 38-3. His 1964 squad included such players as Craig Raymond, Neil Roberts, Gary Hill, and Jim Jimas, and they averaged 109 points in winning all 14 games.

The following year found Pete joining the Cougar varsity as assistant coach. He thus has moved up the coaching ladder very rapidly, and is highly respected in the profession.

Serving as top recruiter and scout, amongst his other duties, Pete works at his assignments. In 1965 he traveled about 100,000 miles, scouting and recruiting, including a 25,000-mile expedition into South and Central America with the Cougars. Pete improved on that mark in 1967, covering 30,000 miles while touring the Orient-Pacific with the varsity.

As an outstanding paddleball player, Witbeck is able to stay in good condition throughout the year.

A native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, Witbeck was a distance runner for the Cougar track teams of 1950-52. He lettered for three years in the mile and two-mile.

Coach Witbeck is married to the former Kathy Marshall, and they have two children: Jill (9), and Von (2).

GLENN POTTER



A big addition to Coach Watt's hardwood crew for this season is new assistant Glenn Potter.

In his first year at BYU, Potter will be concentrating on the Cougars' defensive game, as well as scouting, recruiting, and other general duties of an assistant.

Coach Potter came to BYU from Nebraska where he served as assistant to head coach Joe Cipriano since 1963.

Glenn and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as an assistant at Idaho while working on his masters degree in secondary education.

Upon arrival at the University of Nebraska in '63, as an assistant, Potter helped shape Nebraska into a winning team (something they had not had there for thirteen years). During the past five seasons, the Cornhuskers set a respectable 80-46 win-loss record.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, graduating in 1960. After completing his eligibility, he coached for one season of freshman basketball at Idaho.

For two years Potter served in the U.S. Army. There he coached the 1962-63 Ft. Hood (Tex.) team to an outstanding 56-10 season.

Glenn is married to the former Mary Beckstead, and they have four children: Lori (9), Steven (7), Jennifer (5), and Cindy (2).

COURTNEY LEISHMAN



In his second year with the Kitten frosh, Courtney Leishman will be looking for greater accomplishments than were made in last year's successful campaign.

Last season the Kittens finished with a respectable 12-6 record under Coach Leishman's direction.

After graduating from Utah State in 1958, Courtney launched his coaching career at Malad High, in Idaho. During his three-year stay in Malad he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1961 he came to BYU where he obtained his master's degree. The next year Leishman accepted the head coaching position at BY High, in Provo, and spent seven seasons there.

While coach of the BY High Wildcats, his basketball teams won or placed second in the region all but one year, even though the school had a relatively small studentbody.

With Leishman at the helm in 1963, BY High won the state class "B" championship, posting a 10-0 record on a regional level and a 22-2 overall mark. His overall basketball record at BY High was 82 wins against 31 defeats.

Before joining the coaching ranks at BYU, Courtney served as an administrative assistant in the Department of Athletics. He joined the BYU staff when BY High discontinued operations two years ago.

Courtney's responsibilities with the freshman are great, as the strength of the varsity in years to come depends largely on the strengths of the frosh.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Leishman graduated from South Cache High in 1950. He is married to the former Virginia "Pat" Humphreys, and they have three children: Kathy Lee (12), Jearlene (9), and Mike (3).

THE TRAINERS

Training tandem for the Cougars consists of **Rod Kimball** and **Marv Roberson**. Rod is a veteran of more than 30 years service with BYU athletic teams, while Roberson has spent the last five years with the Cougars.

Rod is practically a fixture within the department, and his contributions to the teams and the school have been considerable. In fact, Rod, who is one of the most liked persons of campus, is the most traveled member on the BYU staff. He has been to Europe no less than four times, twice to South America, and once on an extended tour of the Orient-Pacific, not to mention thousands of miles on countless trips within the USA.

Marv, too, has seen some time on the road. During the '68 Olympics in Mexico he was trainer for the Finnish team, and twice in recent years he has been invited to Europe to conduct clinics on training techniques.

Born in Arizona, Rod was raised in Jordan, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete and student officer at Jordan High. He attended Utah State, and later transferred to BYU where he was to obtain his B.S. and M.S. degrees. Rod has spent most of his life serving the school and the LDS Church. He and his wife, LeNeve, have 12 living children.

Trainer Roberson will be remembered by many BYU fans as a shot putter on the Cougar track team of several years ago. He, too, graduated from BYU ('57), then moved to Stanford where he picked up his M.A. degree and was assistant trainer with the Indians for four years.

In 1962 Marv was named head trainer at Foothill College in California. He joined the BYU staff in 1966. He is a native of Long Beach, Calif., and he and his wife Doris have three children.

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON, President

Much of the credit for BYU's rise as a major institution of higher learning must be given Dr. Wilkinson. He has provided much of the driving force behind the school's dramatic growth. He left a successful law practice to head the institution in 1951.

A man with deep convictions about the destiny of BYU, Dr. Wilkinson was born and raised in Ogden, Utah. He attended Weber State, then transferred to BYU where he was editor of the campus newspaper and an outstanding debater. He attended George Washington Law School, graduating summa cum laude. At Harvard he received his judicial science degree.

Since his appointment in 1951 the school has flourished into one of the largest church-related schools in the world.

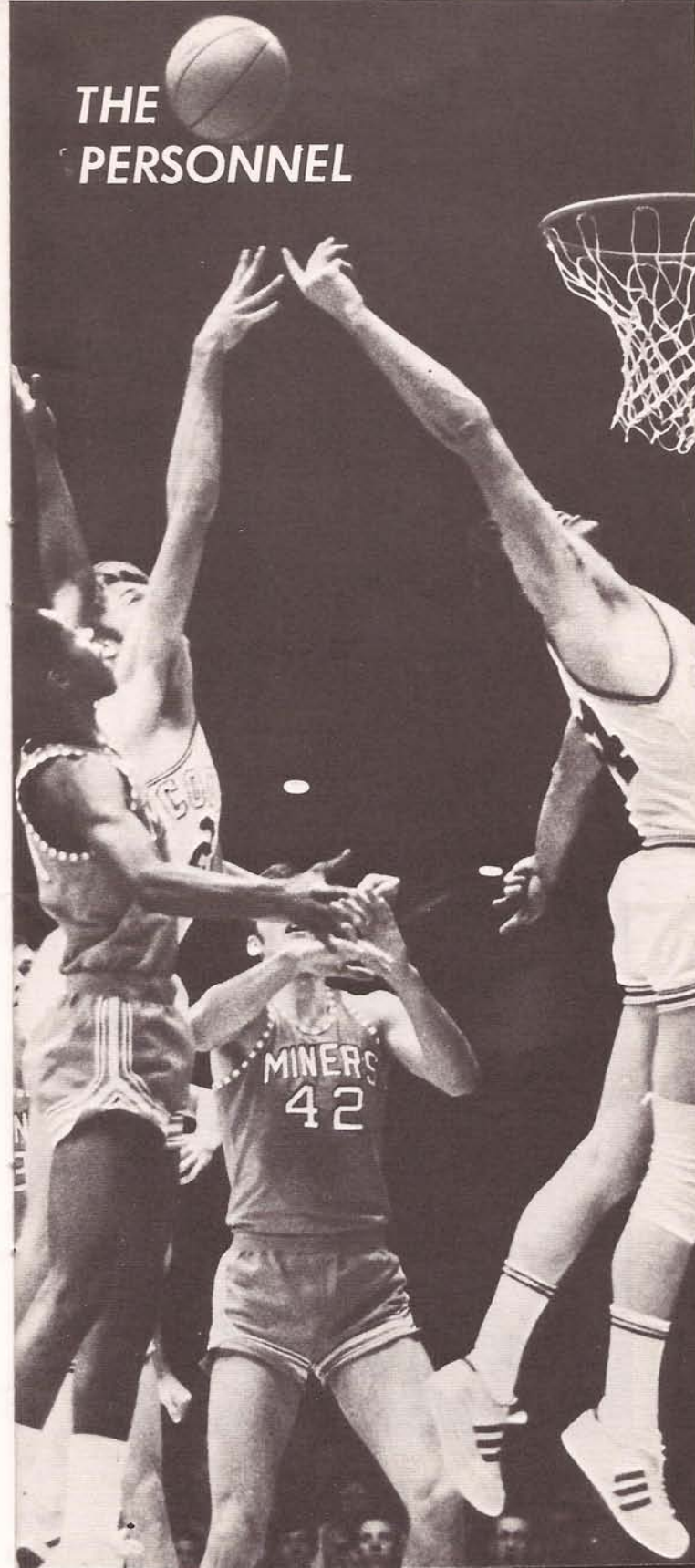
DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, Dean

Dean of the College of Physical Education is Milton F. Hartvigsen, key administrator and planner for things athletic at BYU. A former teacher, coach, principal and superintendent of schools in Idaho, he came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed.D at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State, and also obtained his M.Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU he has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs have won wide-spread commendation, and are the result of careful design and administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen, who is also faculty adviser at BYU, has served on a number of NCAA assignments, and was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

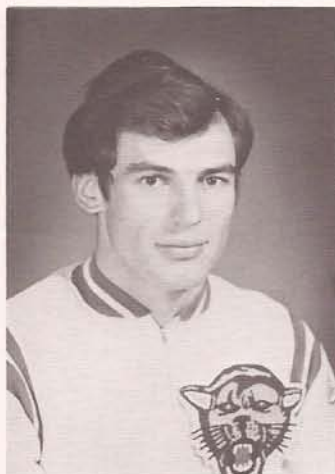

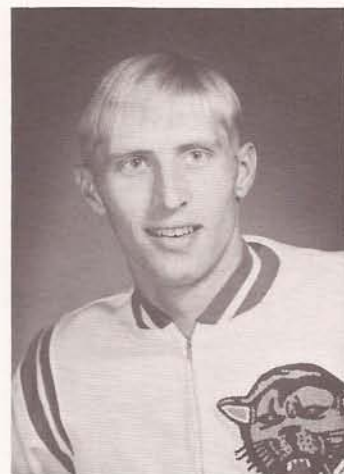

11 **KRESIMIR COSIC**, Center-Forward, 6-10, 190, Soph., Zadar, Yugoslavia. Started strong for the freshman at center last season, but saw limited action after injuring a knee . . . averaged 17.4 points per game with over 12 rebounds in each contest . . . was 1st team All-Europe . . . ACTIVITIES CENTER

A year from now the Cougars, it is earnestly hoped, will be in a new home. Really, the word "home" doesn't do justice to the team's new quarters; it will be more like a palace, a 22,500-seat palace.

The new campus facility is Brigham Young University's new Activity Center, and it should be ready for the 1971-72 basketball season. It will be more than a basketball arena, since it is designed for any number of large scale productions, cultural as well as athletic.

With a seating capacity of around 22,500, needless to say, it will be one of the largest facilities of its kind in the nation. It will contain 10,000 chair seats, and the balance will consist of bench seating.

While the new building is generally associated with basketball, it will also serve as a center for musical productions, devotionals, concerts, pageants, festivals and other large assemblies.

Rectangular in shape with a concourse ringing the brick building, the structure will have approximately 60 per cent of its seats below ground level, and 40 per cent above. Entrance to the main seating arenas of the Center will be through 22 separate portals around the building.

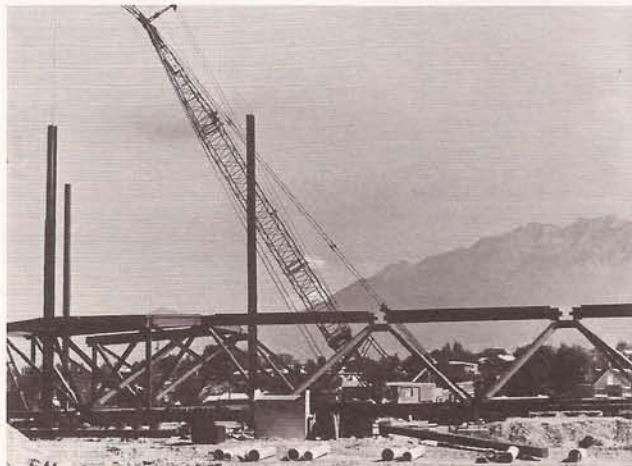
Here are some facts concerning the new Activities Center:

SEATING—The exact figure is not known, but it is believed to be between 22-23,000.

COMPLETION DATE—Target date is the fall of 1971, or the first game of the 1971-72 season.

HEIGHT—The equivalent of a 10-story building, 100 feet from the floor to the roof.

ROOF AREA—Approximately 130,000 feet of roof, or about three acres. It will be large enough to cover two football fields side by side.



The beginnings of a palace

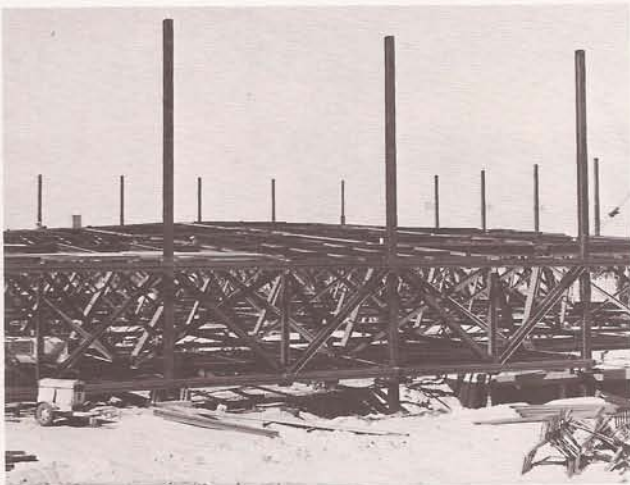
CUBIC FEET—The building will include 8-million cubic feet of space.

STEEL—The spaceframe will have 2½-million pounds of high strength steel, and over 50,000 bolts are required for assembly.

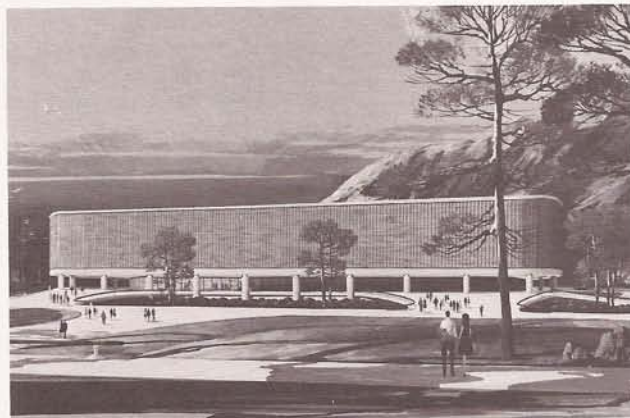
PARKING—Room for over 3,000 cars within easy walking distance.

DIMENSIONS—The overall dimensions of the building will be 380-feet by 340-feet.

To help finance the new building, a committee has been formed to raise over \$1-million. The committee, which is headed by Dr. DaCosta Clark of Provo, has already raised over three-quarters of a million, and the balance of the money should be pledged before the end of the current season.

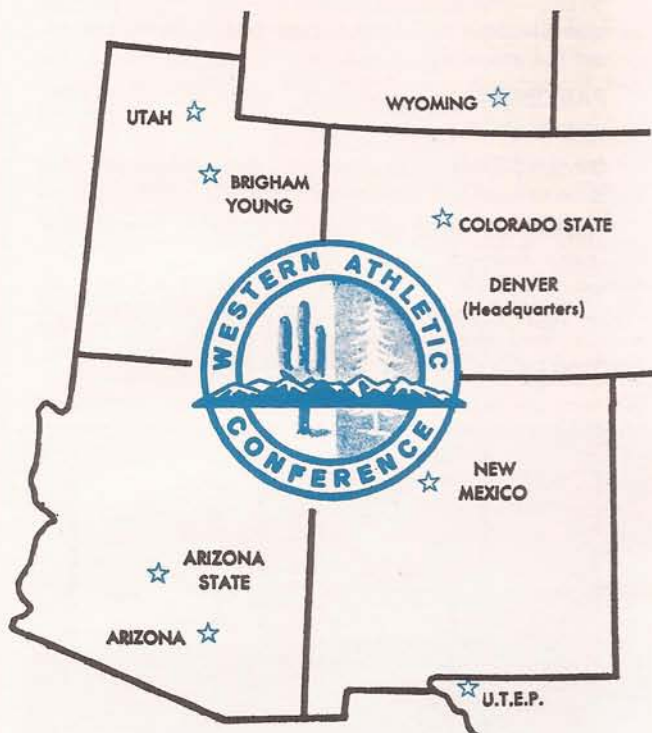

THE CONFERENCE

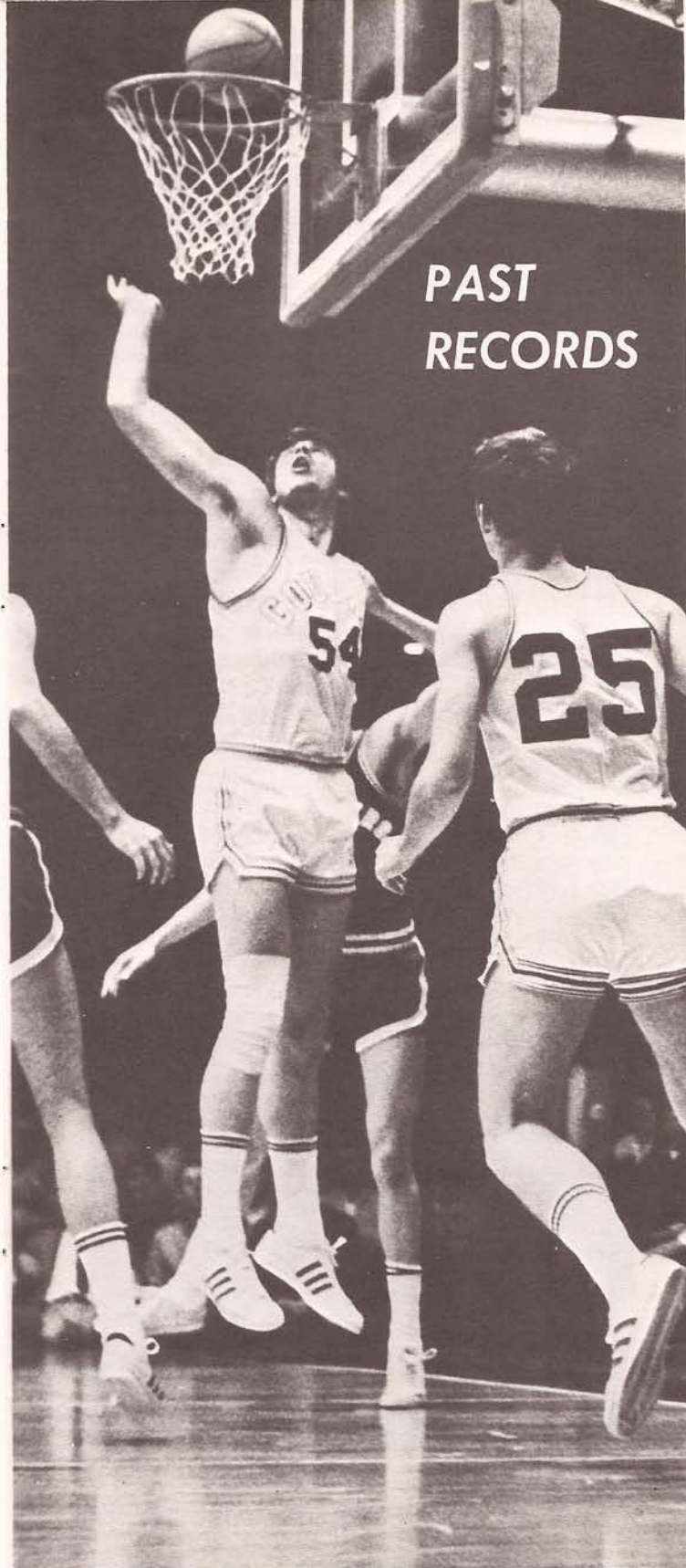


Boasting one of the finest all-around records in the country, the Western Athletic Conference is now entering its eighth year. Its eight team members extend into six states, and the league has its headquarters in Denver, Colo.

Wiles Hallock, former director of public relations and director of special services for the NCAA, is now in his third year as Conference Commissioner. He replaced Dr. Paul Brechler who held that office from its inception in 1962.

The WAC, which covers the Rocky Mountain-Southwest, came into being on July 1, 1962. There were six charter members; Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. Two other schools, Colorado State University and Texas-El Paso were added on July 1, 1968.

Conference headquarters are located in Denver, Colo., with offices at 1515 Cleveland Place (the Denver-Hilton). Director of Information for the WAC is G. David Price.

1969-70 REVIEW

It wasn't the winningest season on record, but the 1969-70 basketball campaign completed by BYU's team will definitely go into the books as the Cougars' most memorable.

Actually, it was more than a basketball season; it was a long, drawn out mixture of sports, social tension and demonstration. And under such circumstances it isn't surprising that the Cougars had to settle for an 8-18 overall record.

The best evidence that BYU was off its usual game can be found in the Cougars' record at home. Prior to this year, Coach Stan Watts' teams had lost only five home games over a five-year period. But in the season just concluded, the Cougars ended with a 6-6 split at home.

Playing under more social pressure than any team should be expected to handle, the Cougars finished well back in the Western Athletic Conference standings. But they managed to finish ahead of last-place Arizona State.

Individual scoring honors were taken by Doug Howard, 6-3 senior guard from Salt Lake City who wound up his playing career with an 18.2 scoring average. Howard also finished among the top ten free throw shooters in collegiate ball, hitting 85 percent of his attempts from the free throw line. Doug also became the fourth highest scorer in BYU history.

Paul Ruffner, the Y's 6-9 center, finished his senior year with a 17.7 scoring average, plus rebounding honors. Ruffner averaged 10 rebounds per game over the 26-game schedule.

Scott Warner finished the season as the number four scorer with a 10.1 average, and was the team's number two rebounder.

There is other evidence that the Cougar's game was well below the BYU standard. The team's scoring output was the lowest it has been in the past five years, and the Cougars excelled opponents in only one department—rebounding.

The Cougars lost four seniors—Howard, Ruffner, Warner and Bob Davis—but will have three starters returning. The three are forwards Phil Tollestrup and Steve Kelley, and guard Jim Miller.

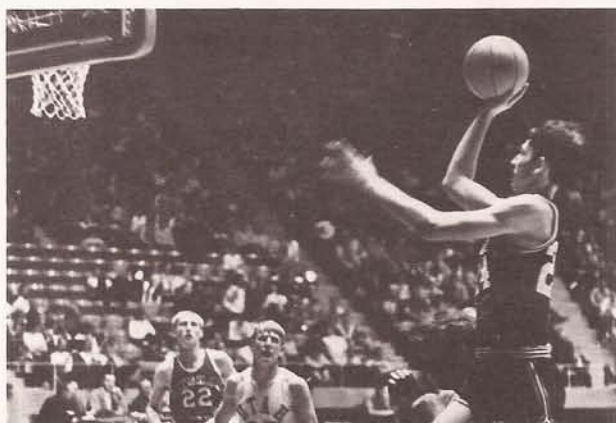

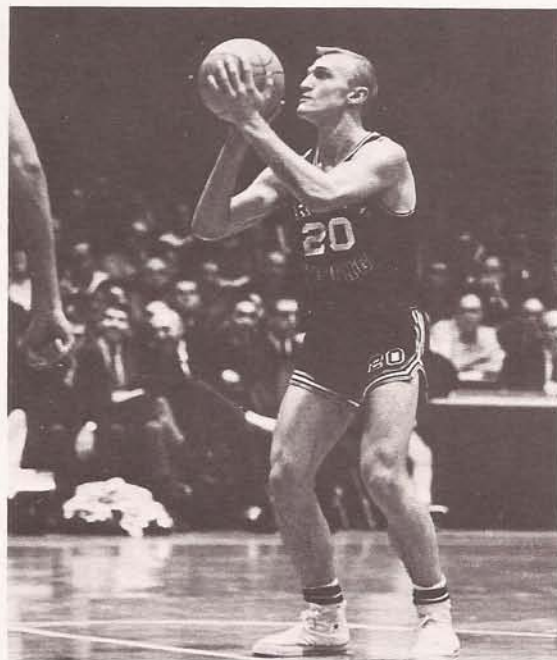

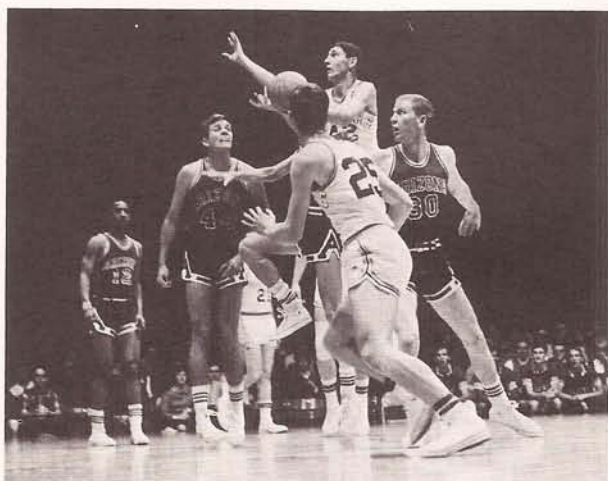
