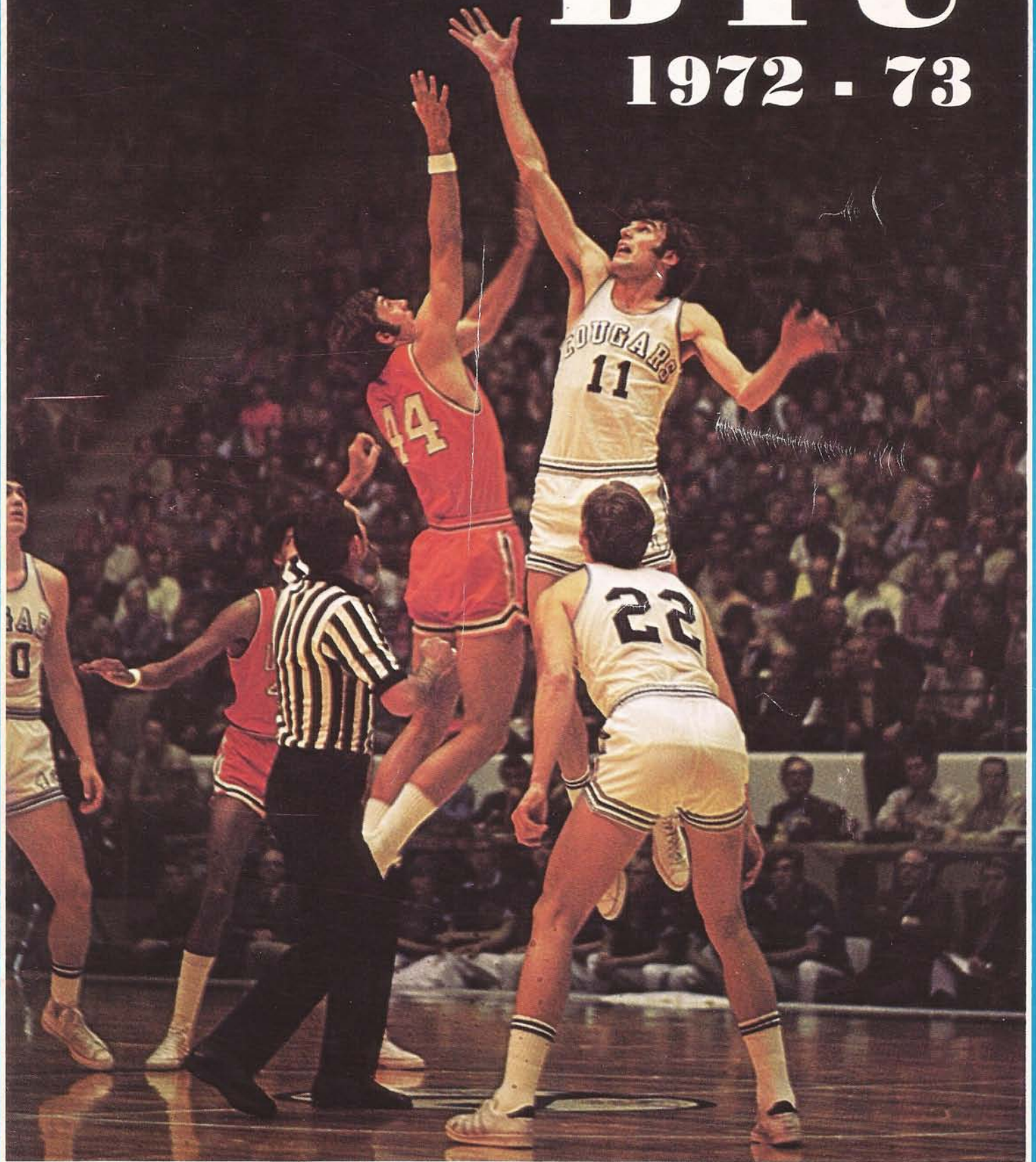

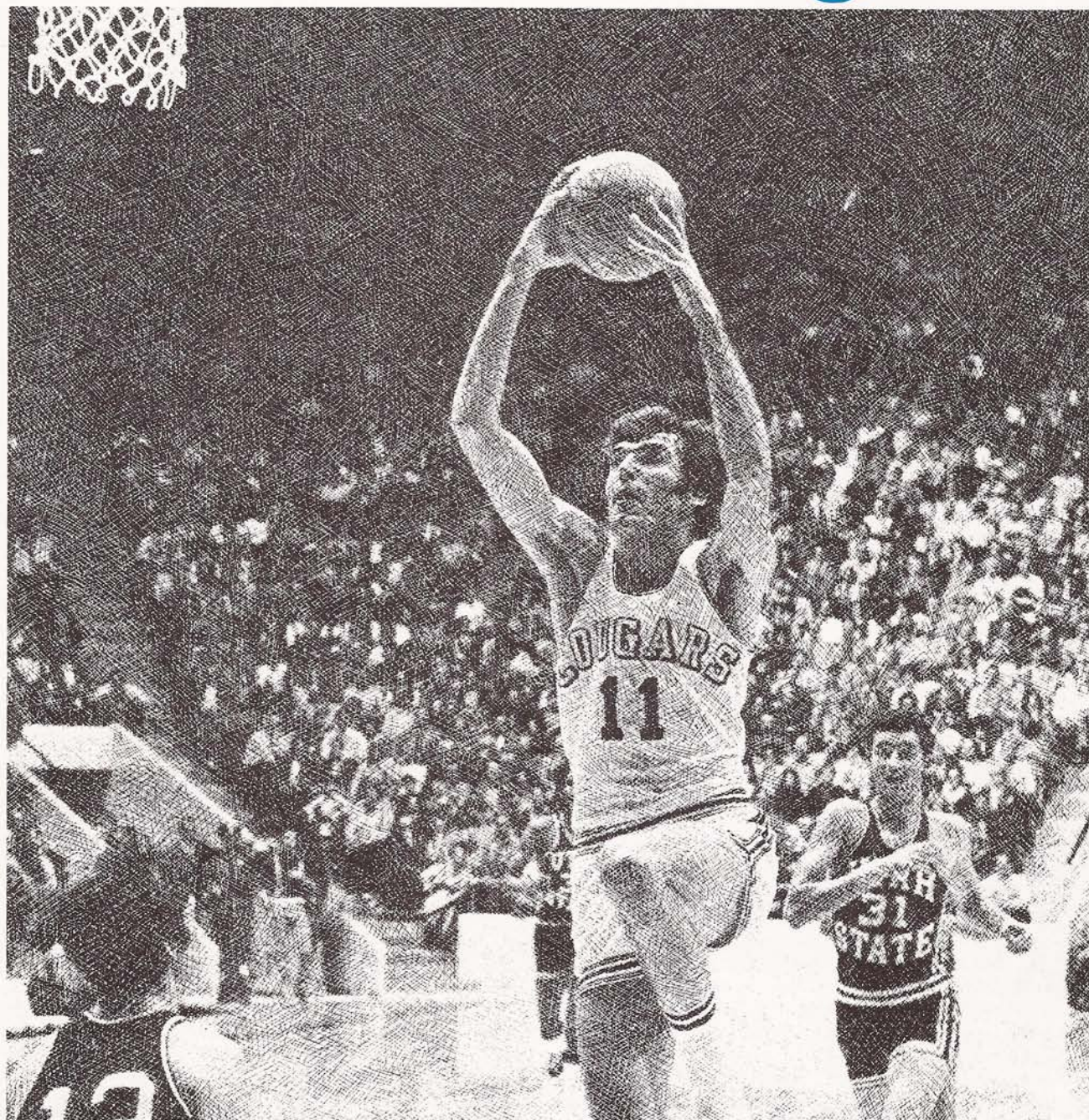

J. Willard Marriott Center

The doors of the J. Willard Marriott Center officially opened to the Cougars just one year ago, December 3, 1971, but to look at the attendance figures for the past year one might think that the Center had been opened for several years.

Just moving out of the "outdated" George Albert Smith Fieldhouse (seating capacity 10,200) into the new Marriott Center (seating capacity 22,700) was an experience in itself, but to have the Center filled to capacity game after game was an experience to behold.

Total home attendance figures show that 261,816 fans jammed into the Marriott Center to watch the Cougars play their 12 home games, and that averaged out to 21,818 fans per game. The single game mark was set against Colorado State when 22,985 came to see the contest. Ten out of the twelve home games were sold out by game time.

The building is the largest arena of its kind in the United States, covering about three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet, and will enclose 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is some ten stories.

Seating capacity has been set at 22,700. Of that number 10,000 will be chair seats with the balance being bleacher seats. About 60% of the seats will be below the concourse level, with the remainder above the concourse level.

While the Marriott Center is generally associated with basketball, it should be pointed out that it has been, and will continue to be used for a wide variety of cultural events. It is equipped with facilities for such events as pageants, folk dance festivals, musicals, spectacles, extravaganzas, devotionals, forums, commencement exercises, assemblies, and other major events at the University.

outlook

In approaching the 1972-73 season at Brigham Young University, my view of the season might best be described as cautiously optimistic. True, we have the bulk of our team of last year back. But we lost two very valuable players, and it will be noted that our league as a whole appears to be tougher from top to bottom.

Looking at our losses first, the two starters missing from the '72 club are guard Bernie Fryer (6-3) and forward Phil Tollestrup (6-6). Fryer was second only to Cosic in scoring, and averaged nearly 20 points per game over two seasons at BYU. Phil was our number three scorer, averaging 13.7 points per game.

To offset these losses, we must find replacements from among our newcomers and returning squadmen. It should be noted at this point that we did not acquire any transfers, but must draw from our three red-

shirts, two players up from the frosh, plus the remaining squad members.

Last year we had only three freshmen on grant-in-aid. Center Troy Jones (6-9) will be battling experienced players at that position, and forward Robert Eaglestaff (6-6) will redshirt. The third player, guard Mark Warner (6-6) chose to go on a mission.

Much of our backup strength will be coming from the redshirts where we have three fine players. Center Steve Lackey (7-0), forward Greg Snow (6-7) and guard Grig Clawson (6-2) are all capable of pushing for starting positions.

The heart of our club, however, will consist of the eight returning lettermen of last year; six seniors and two juniors.

GOOD GUARD LINE

Our back court strength looks good. Doug Richards (6-3), only a junior, played very well down the stretch last year, capping the season with his finest performance in the NCAA regionals against Long Beach State. Doug is playing with more confidence this year, and we are hoping he will increase his scoring output and take over the leadership in the back court. Belmont Anderson (6-3), another junior who started as a forward for a number of games in '72, will return to the guard line where he is more at home.

Contesting these two are senior Dave Bailey (6-1), who has exceptional quickness but lacks game experience, and redshirt Grig Clawson (6-3), who has good speed and shooting ability.

QUESTION MARK AT FORWARD

Last year the forward position opposite Tollestrup was a question mark, and it remains the same as the season draws closer. We had three alternating starters—Belmont Anderson, Brian Ambrozich (6-6) and Moni Sarkalahti (6-8) until Brian came on strong at the end of the season. Moni is an excellent rebounder and has had valuable playing experience playing for his country (Finland) in international competition. Also figuring in our plans are senior Craig Jorgensen (6-8) and sophomores Greg Snow (6-7) and Robert Eaglestaff (6-6).

TALL, STRONG AT CENTER

I definitely feel we are strong at center. Kresimir Cosic (6-11), our All-America candidate, is back on campus after playing with Yugoslavia in the Olympics at Munich. Kres, who was all-conference as a sophomore and junior, is one of the most entertaining players in the country. Another senior, Jay Bunker (6-8), has played well at times over the past two years, adding quickness and rebounding. In Steve Lackey (7-0), a sophomore from Sacramento, Calif., we have another fine prospect. When Steve acquires consistency, he should add depth to this position. Moving up from the frosh is Troy Jones (6-9), who made remarkable progress in his first year. Troy shot 70% from the field as a freshman. And if he continues to improve, he could see action. Physically, he is the strongest player on the squad.

NEW LOOK FOR COUGARS?

One of the most common questions asked regarding BYU basketball this season is regarding any changes in our attack. The best answer, I suppose, is to say that we are going to be flexible. At times you may see three guards or two centers on the floor, depending on which players prove to us they can get the job done. We will definitely be a fast-break team. But I feel a good team has to learn to play at any

tempo. You never know when you are going to run into a slow down like we did against UTEP last season.

WILD RACE IN THE WAC

On paper, the conference appears to be much stronger this year. I can't see a team going 12-2 as we did last season. With the possible exception of Arizona State and ourselves, every team has added strength with (1) fine sophomore up from last year, (2) good junior college personnel, and (3) incoming blue-chip freshmen.

I personally feel UTEP and New Mexico will be definite title contenders. The Miners lost two starters, but has outstanding newcomers. New Mexico, with three great junior college players, may have the best front line in the conference. At this point, the rest of the schools are in the dark horse class, depending on how the newcomers fit into the programs.

LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

We will play some excellent non-league teams this winter. We open with Santa Clara, a conference contender, then travel to New York City for a single game with University of Michigan in the new Nassau Coliseum. The Wolverines should rank among the top 20 this season. During the holiday break we will travel to Oklahoma City for the All-College, which will feature one of the best fields ever; Long Beach State, Florida State, etc.

Niagara, a runner-up in the NIT last year, will play in the Marriott Center in January, and we also meet rival Utah State on a home-and-home basis.

In summary, our goal is to win the WAC championship for the third year in a row. Last year was the first time a WAC team won back-to-back championships. I have no idea what the odds are for winning three in a row.

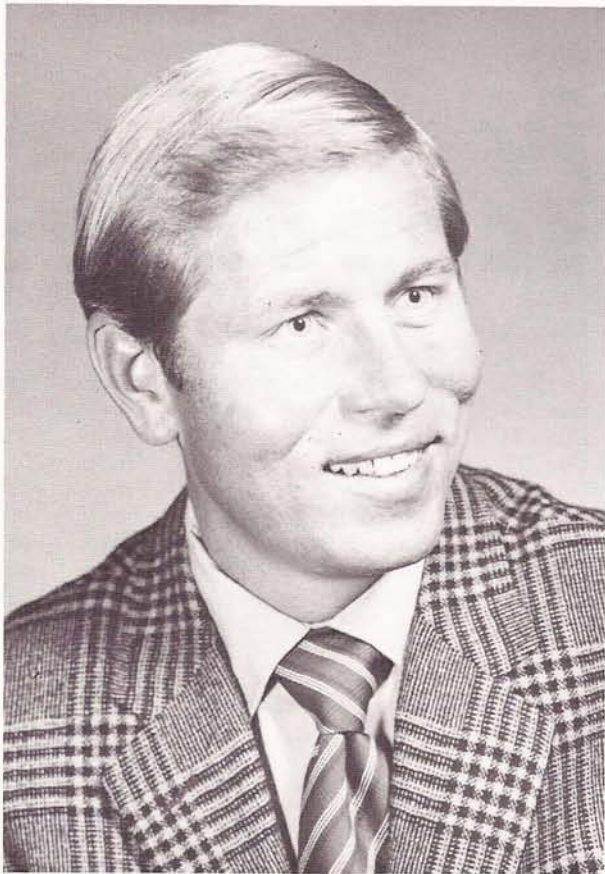

GLENN POTTER

GLENN POTTER will be entering this season as the first rookie basketball coach at BYU in over 20 years and he feels the challenge.

On March 17, 1972 coach Stan Watts relinquished the helm as head mentor of the BYU basketball program, a position that he had held for some 23 years, to Coach Glenn Potter.

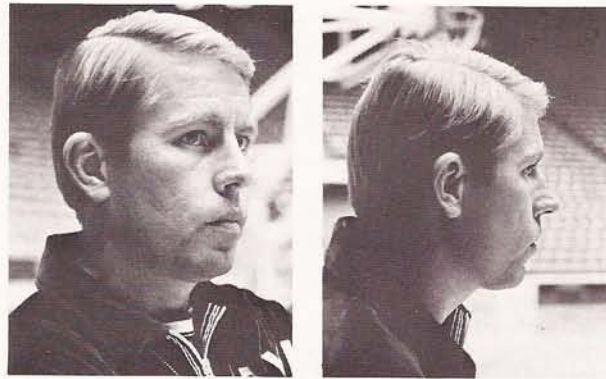
Potter, realizing the great accomplishments of coach Watts over the years, has accepted the challenge with determination to build, if it is possible, BYU basketball into an even greater national basketball power.

Coach Potter has been with the BYU basketball program as an assistant for the past two years and has helped the Cougars win back-to-back WAC championships. In those two years the Cougars have compiled an impressive 39-16 win-loss record.

Coach Potter came to BYU from Nebraska where he served as an assistant to head coach Joe Cipriano from 1963 to 1969.

Glenn and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as an assistant at Idaho while working on his Master's degree in secondary education.

Upon arrival at the University of Nebraska in '63, as an assistant, Potter helped shape Nebraska into a winning team (something they had not had there for thirteen seasons). During the five years Potter spent



at Nebraska the Cornhuskers set a respectable 80-46 win-loss record.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, and graduated in education in 1960. After completing his eligibility at Idaho, Glenn coached the frosh for one year.

While in school Glenn proved himself an outstanding student. Because of his academic achievement Potter was honored by being asked to become a member of several national honorary societies—Blue Key, Phi Epsilon Kappa, and Phi Delta Kappa.

From November 1961 to August 1963 coach Potter served as an officer in the United States Army. During that time he coached the Ft. Hood (Texas) basketball team to an outstanding 46-10 record.

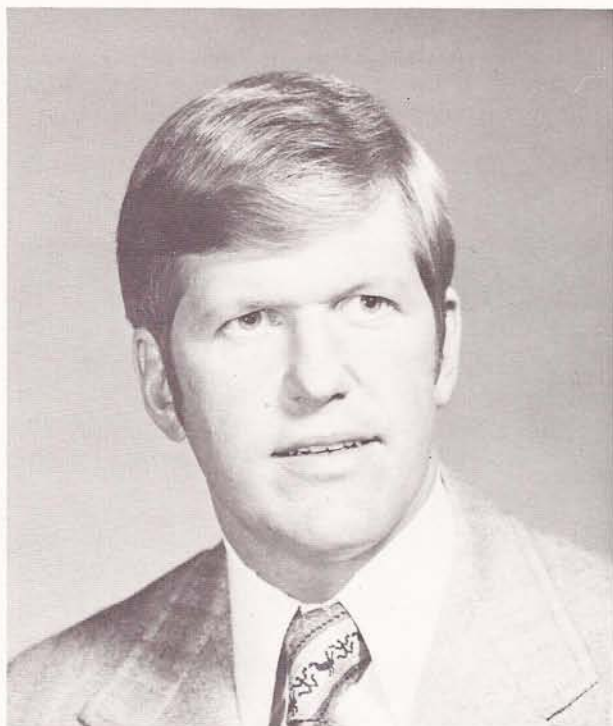
Coach Potter was born on March 7, 1938 in Twin Falls, Idaho and at 34-years has to be considered among the youngest major college coaches in the nation.

Glenn is married to the former Mary Beckstead, and they have five children: Lori (11), Steven (9), Jennifer (6), Cindy (4), and John who was born October 28, 1972.

BOB FREDERICK

BOB FREDERICK, newest member of the BYU coaching staff came to Cougar country by way of the University of Kansas where he served as an assistant.

After just one season at Kansas, where he also served as head golf coach, Bob was lured away from his alma mater to join the Cougar coaching staff.

Before joining the Kansas staff, Frederick coached at Coffeyville Junior College for the 1970-71 season and compiled an impressive 21-9 win-loss record.

Bob played his college ball at Kansas during the 1960 and 1961 seasons but had to sit out his senior year because of a knee injury.

Bob graduated from Kansas in 1962 with a major in chemistry and two years later received a master's in educational administration.

Starting a coaching career in the prep ranks in 1964, Frederick coached two years at Rich Central in Olympia Fields, Ill., and four years at Russell, Kansas, before stepping up to the Coffeyville job in '70-'71.

Frederick's over-all high school coaching record for six years was 71-49.

Bob is a native of Glendale, Missouri, a St. Louis suburb, and he was graduated from Kirkwood High School in 1958.

Frederick is married to the former Margaret Wallett. Bob and his lovely wife were married in May of this year.



COURTNEY LEISHMAN

COURTNEY LEISHMAN, who joined the Cougar basketball staff three years ago as the frosh coach, will have added responsibility this coming season as he will continue to coach the freshman team and will help also as a varsity assistant.

In his first three seasons as the frosh head mentor Leishman has compiled an impressive record of 35 wins against 16 defeats.

After graduating from Utah State in 1958, Courtney launched his coaching career at Malad High in Idaho. During his three-year stay in Malad he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1961 he came to BYU where he obtained his master's degree. The next year Leishman accepted the head coaching position at BY High, in Provo, and spent seven seasons there.

While coach of the BY High Wildcats, his basketball teams won or placed second in the region all but one year, even though the school had a relatively small student body. Courtney's over-all basketball record at BY High was 82 wins against 31 defeats.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Leishman graduated from South Cache High in 1950. He is married to the former Virginia "Pat" Humphreys, and they have four children: Kathy Lee (14), Jearlene (12), Mike (5), and Richard (1).

DR. DALLIN H. OAKS, President

Brigham Young University's new president is 40-year-old Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who assumed office Aug. 1, 1971. President Oaks, former professor of law at University of Chicago, replaces Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who served as president of BYU for a period of 20 years (1951-1971).

President Oaks was born in Provo, Utah (Aug. 12, 1932) a son of the late Dr. Lloyd E. Oaks and Stella H. Oaks. He graduated from BYU in 1954 with high honors, receiving the B.A. degree in accounting and economics. At University of Chicago Law School he received the Doctor of Jurisprudence degree in 1957, graduating cum laude, second in a class of 86, and was named to the Order of the Coif. He was also editor-in-chief of the University's Law Review in 1956-57.

He began an illustrious legal career as law clerk to the Chief Justice of the United States, Earl Warren. A year later he entered private law practice in Chicago (Kirtland, Ellis, Hodson, Chaffetz and Masters). In 1961 he became associate professor of law at Chicago University, and was associate dean from May 1962 to January 1963, serving as dean during the last three months of this period. He was also Assistant United States Attorney of Cook County (1964) and visiting professor of law at University of Michigan Law School (1968).

From January through June 1970 he was on leave of absence to serve as legal and research adviser to the Bill of Rights Committee of the Illinois Constitutional Convention. He became executive director of

the American Bar Foundation (1970).

President Oaks has been co-editor, co-author, or author of four books dealing with subjects of church and state, trust law, operation of criminal courts in Chicago. He has also authored about 30 articles in leading periodicals and other magazines.

An active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he served as first counselor in the presidency of the Chicago Stake (district) and was formerly mission president in Chicago Stake.

He married June Dixon of Spanish Fork, Utah, and they have five children: Sharmon, Cheri, Lloyd, Dallin and TruAnn.



DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, Dean

The key administrator and planner in BYU's recent athletic growth is Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the College of Physical Education at BYU. A powerful force in the shaping of the Cougar sports program, "Milt" has also filled a number of key administrative assignments on the national level with the NCAA. . . . born Feb. 26, 1907 in Downey, Idaho . . . graduated from Downey High . . . attended Idaho State, obtained his B.S. degree from Utah State in 1930 . . . served as coach and teacher at Grace, Idaho (1930-36), then as principal at Grace (1936-44) . . . earned his M.Ed. at Utah State (1939) . . . superintendent of Grace schools (1948-52), then superintendent of Pocatello schools (1952-54) . . . obtained Ed.D. at UCLA in 1956 . . . was appointed dean at BYU in 1956 . . . also became BYU faculty adviser (1956-62), then faculty representative (1962-) . . . was chosen professor of the year at BYU (1963) . . . has completed numerous professional appointments in professional, civic and church organizations . . . former stake president of Bannock Stake in Grace, Idaho (1944-52) . . . was also a member of three NCAA committees . . . married Virgil Burrup Mar. 27, 1928, and they have four children: Mrs. Max (Lois) Morrill, Mrs. Ted (Bonnie) Simons, Richard and Kip.

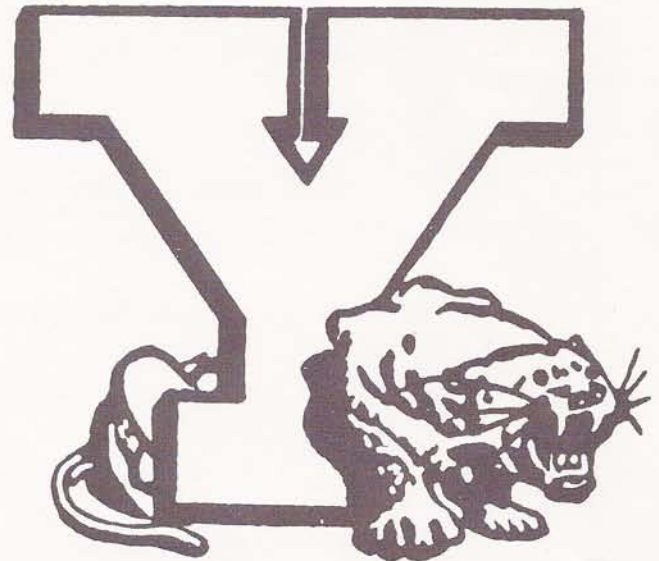


STAN WATTS, Athletic Chairman

If anyone on the Provo campus deserves the athletic title of "Mr. BYU," it's Stan Watts, the Cougars' athletic chairman . . . until last spring when he elected to retire from coaching, Stan was a man wearing two hats . . . his basketball teams won back-to-back WAC championships (1971-72) before Watts decided to spend full time directing Cougar athletic affairs . . . although he has coached football, baseball, track and basketball in his 25 years at BYU, Stan is identified most with the cage game where he coached BYU teams for 23 years . . . he also served as assistant director of athletics and acting director of athletics, taking over the chairman duties in the summer of 1970 . . . born August 30, 1911 in Murray, Utah . . . son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Watts . . . attended Murray High (1928), was an all-around athlete at Weber State (class of '36), and won letters in several sports at BYU (class of '38) . . . began coaching career at Millard High (1938-41) where one of his top players was Clarence Robison, now BYU track coach . . . was A.D. and cage coach at Dixie College (1941-45) . . . coached three sports at Jordan High (1945-47) . . . joined the athletic staff at BYU in 1947, coaching baseball, track, and assisted in football and basketball . . . replaced Floyd Millet as head basketball coach (1949) . . . his teams have won two NIT titles ('51 and '66), eight conference championships . . . his overall basketball record is 431-260 . . . assistant director of athletics (1949) . . . former president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (1969-70) . . . member of NCAA rules committee . . . author of "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball" . . . married Emily Kelly August 21, 1939 . . . four children: Mrs. Dennis (Janice) Jones, Mrs. Richard (Susan) Coon, Judy and Howard Watts . . . phone 373-8156.

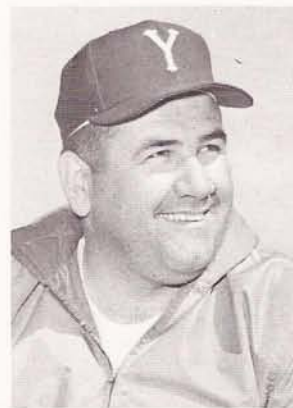

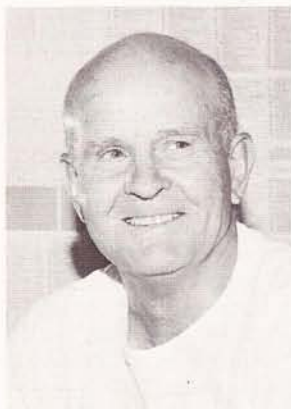

DR. WENDELL VANCE, team doctor for many years. A man who spends a lot of time patching up our athletes.

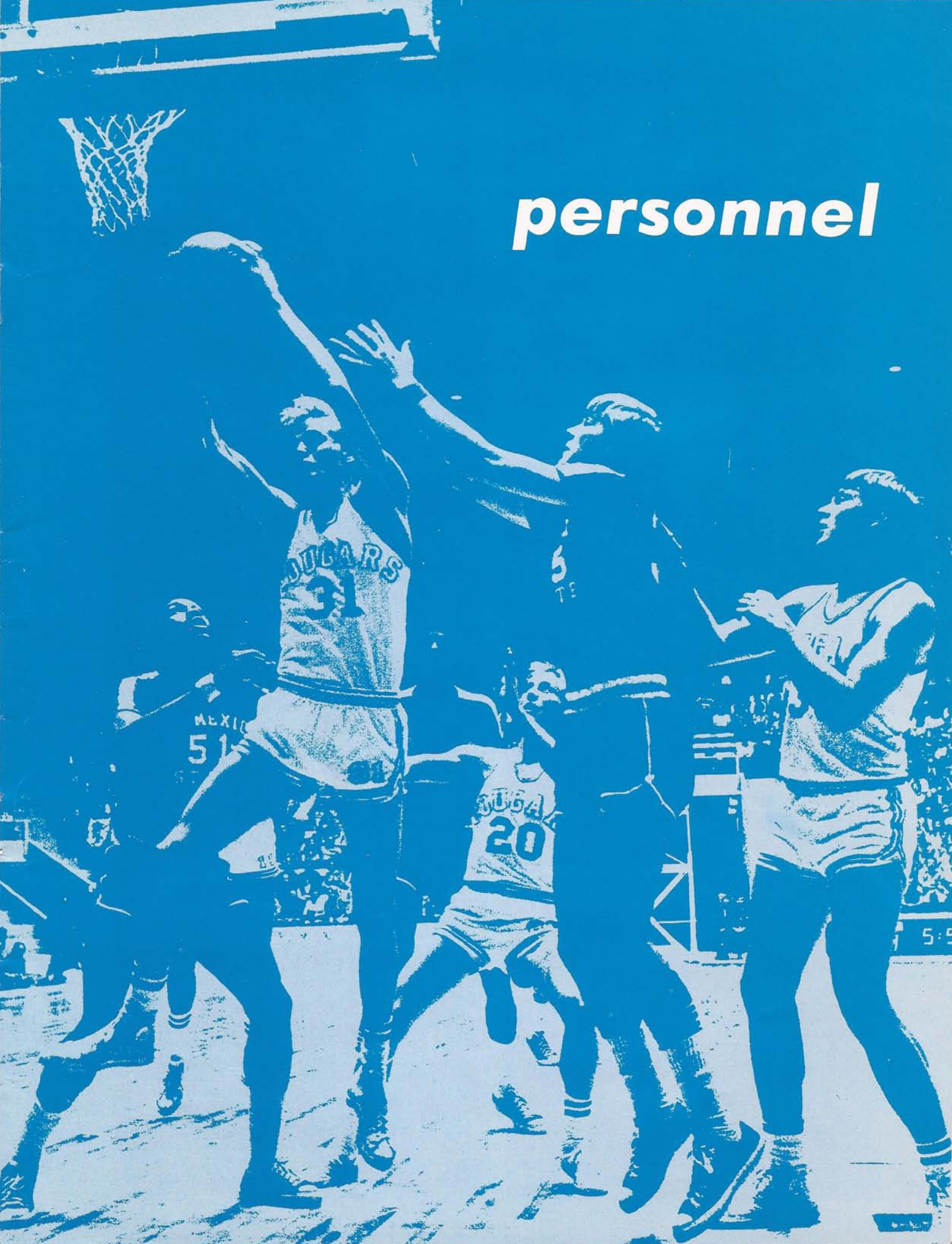

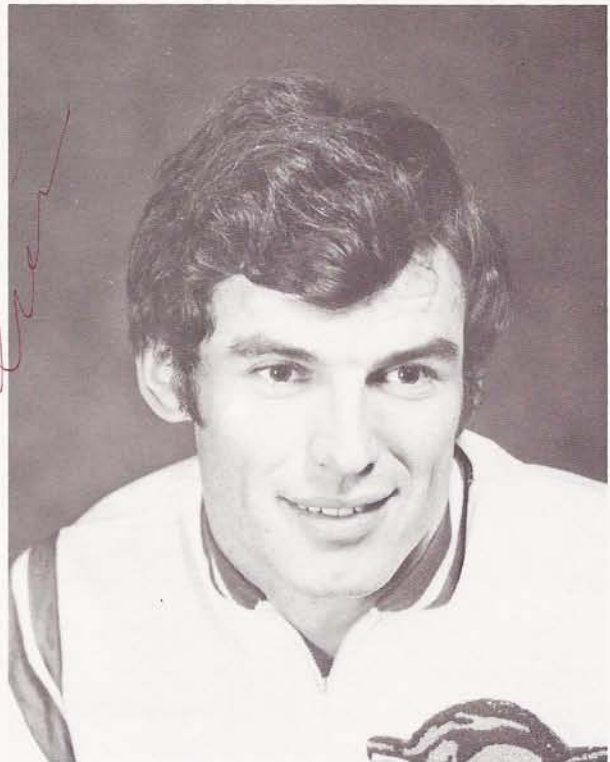

When it comes to describing Kresimir Cosic, where do you start?

There's just no way one can adequately describe the impact this slender, bushy-haired basketball player has had at Brigham Young University.

For instance, with another good season such as he had last year, Cosic could:

- ... become the first Yugoslavian to earn bona-fide All-America honors in NCAA basketball.

- ... become one of the few players in Western Athletic Conference history to win first-team all-conference honors three years in a row.

- ... eclipse most of the major individual records set at BYU.

While all of the above are conditional, let's look at what Kresimir has already accomplished. In the eight years since he first picked up a basketball, he:

- ... has played in two Olympic games (1968 in Mexico, 1972 in Munich) as a member of the Yugoslavian team, winning a silver medal on the team that beat Russia four years ago.

- ... has been named to the European all-star team that recently spent 20 days on tour of China.

- ... has been starting center at BYU for the past two years, helping the Cougars to two consecutive WAC championships and subsequent NCAA regional playoff games.

And, with all due respect for some outstanding players, coaches and fans at BYU, the good-natured Croation has had a lot to do in attracting record crowds (21,818 per game) to the new Marriott Center.

Part of his popularity stems from the fact that Kresh doesn't try to hide his feelings. When he has cause to be distressed (which is infrequently), it becomes rather evident to all concerned. These feelings quickly subside. When he has occasion to feel happy, he bubbles over like a little boy.

As a player, there are few things that Cosic can't do with a basketball. He may be a little unorthodox, but he is very effective. He has a variety of shots in and around the boards, and he is equally adept with soft shots from the corners and outside the key. He takes great pride in his passing game, and is team leader in assists. There are even times when he brings

the ball down court, even though this is taboo for 6-11 centers. He has cat-like quickness, great court savvy.

As a freshman at BYU, Kresh had modest (for him) success. Adjusting to varsity play as a sophomore, he started slow but came on strong by the start of WAC play. He averaged 24 points per game in a crucial stretch drive and playoff series. He also controlled the boards, averaging 15 rebounds per game over a 12-game stretch, pulling down 23 rebounds in a playoff game with UCLA.

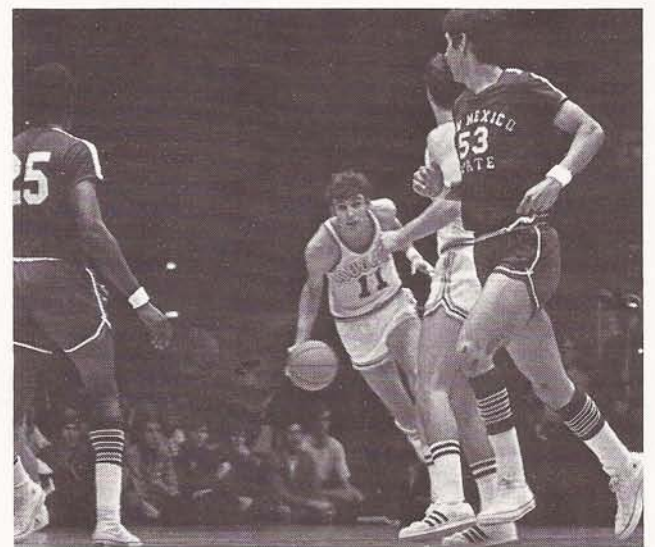
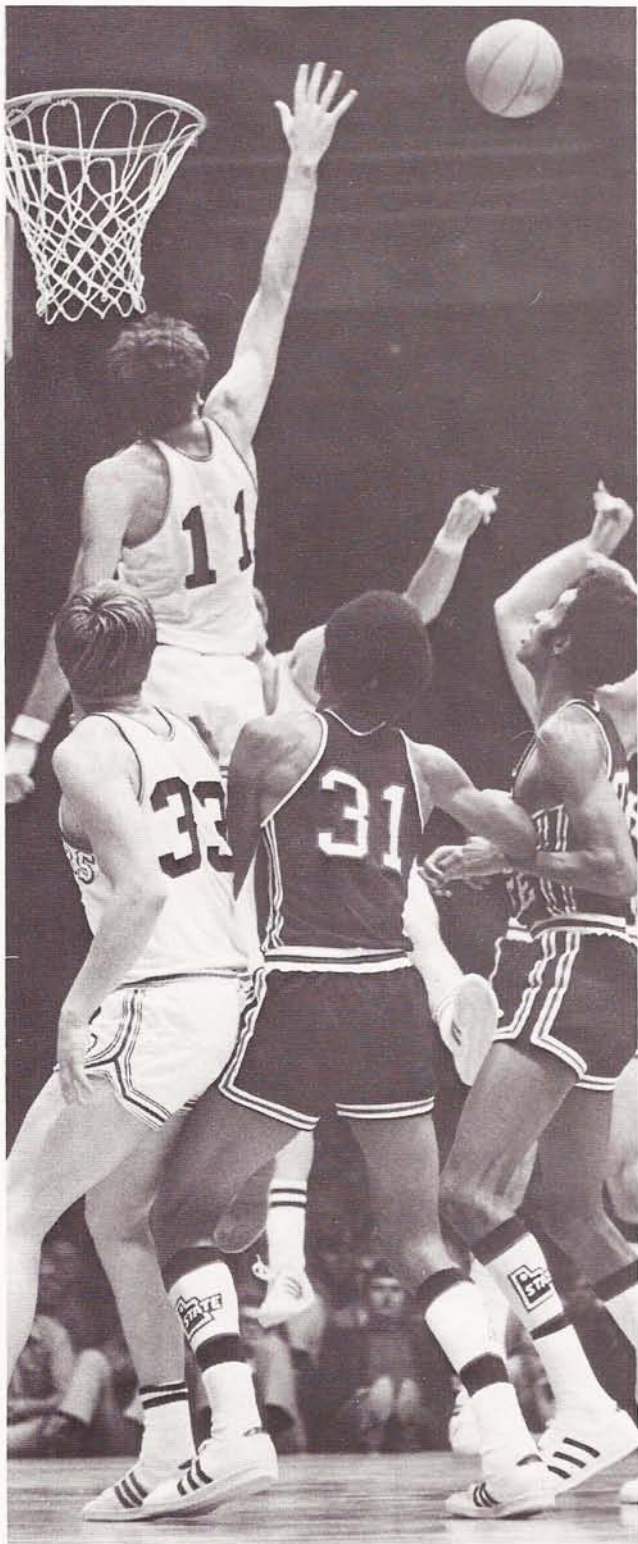
As a junior last season, he led the team in scoring (22.3) and rebounding (about 13 per game). He had four games in which he scored 30 or more points and four games in which he controlled 18 or more rebounds. The Cougars were undefeated in 12 games played in the Marriott Center, won the WAC title with the best ever record for a conference team, won nine out of 14 on the road, and advanced into the first round of the NCAA regional playoffs.

As a result, Kresh was named to several All-America selections (**Converse** and **Helms** included).

But I like the mountains and the city and the people and the school. I am very happy." . . . P. E. major . . . single.

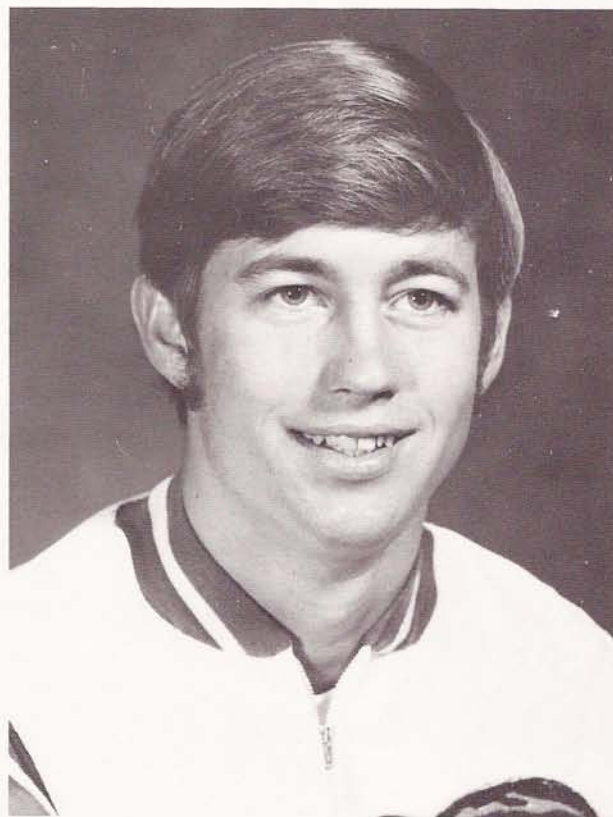

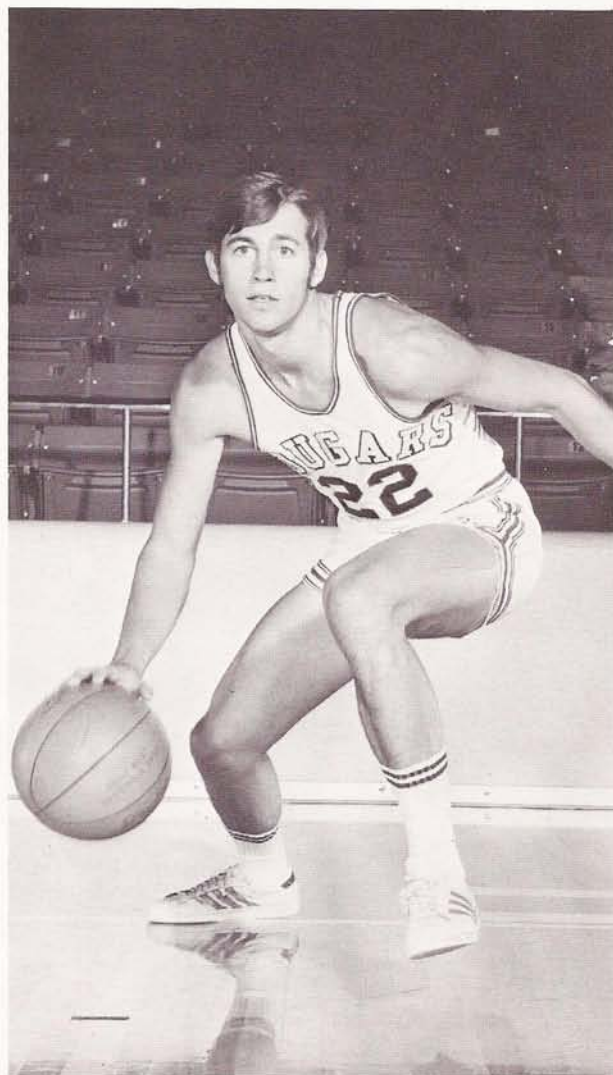
Although he is only 6-3, he has the best standing jump of any member of the team. Bill is versatile enough to play at guard or forward, depending on where he is needed. He can drive, he can shoot from outside, and very often he does the former with physical abandon.

Playing where and when needed, Bill saw action in all but two varsity games last season as a sophomore. He led the team in percentage of field goals made with 54%. Moreover, Anderson is now developing a court savvy and know-how that may have been lacking last season. Another plus is his 3.35 grade point average and all-academic selection by the WAC.

A locally-grown star, Anderson came to BYU with outstanding credentials. A two-time all-state player, Bill won All-America ranking, scoring 30.2 as a junior, 32.0 as a senior. He led BYU's freshman scorers two years ago. His sophomore season had its ups and downs, and Bill finished as the number five scorer on the club. Anderson seemed to do his best playing against Arizona State, hitting for a combined total of 30 points for two games with the Sun Devils.

Such high praise from the head man is deserved in Doug's case.

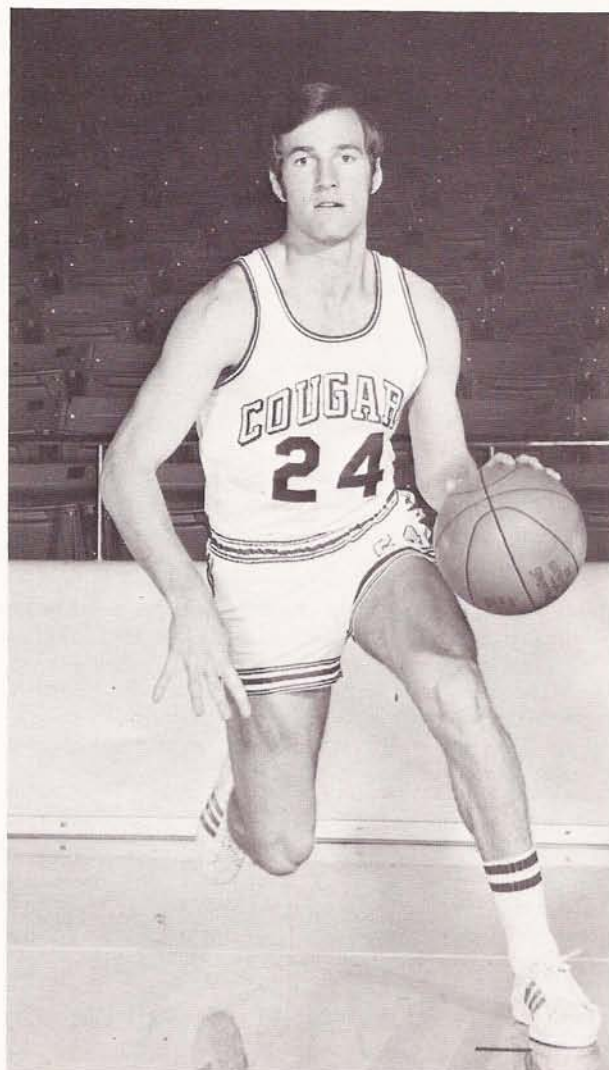
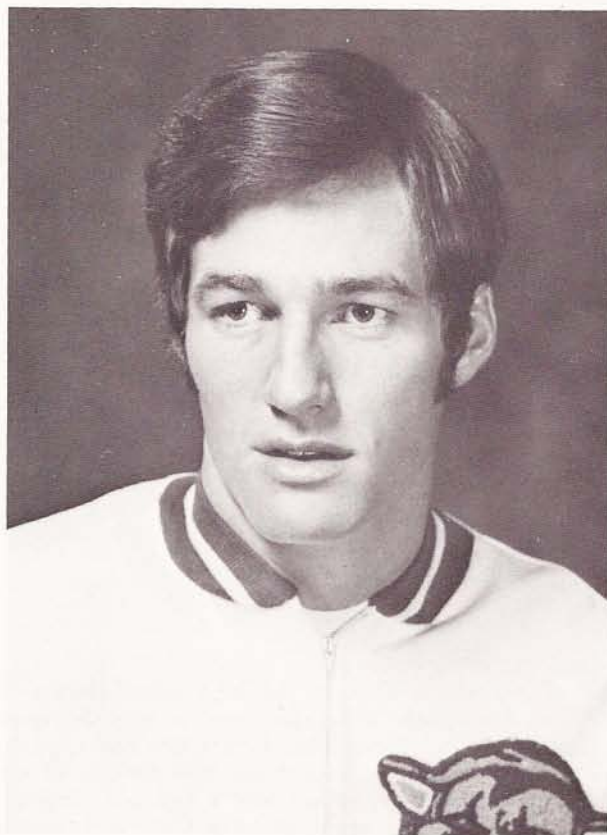

Doug's prep career was about par for a member of the clan. He was all-state at Granite High in Salt Lake City in two sports (basketball and football). 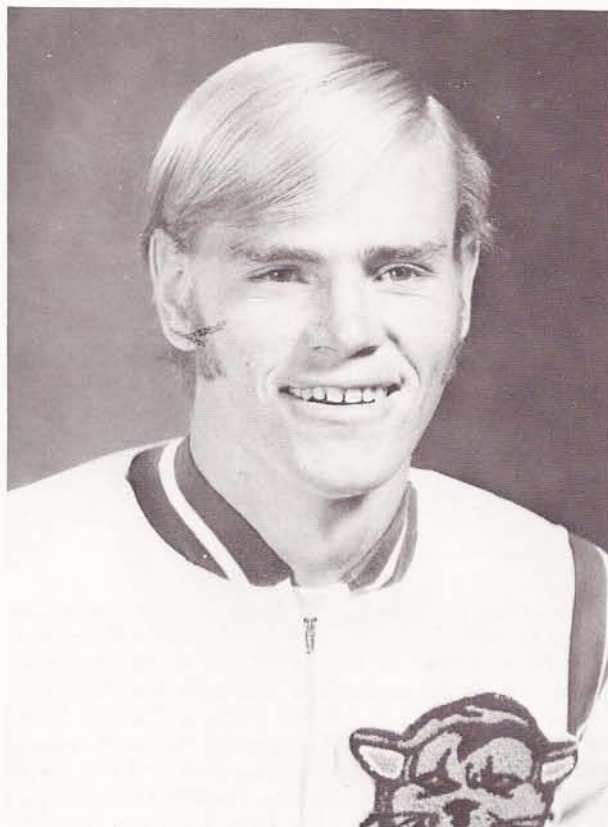

There was a time in the high school career of Brian Ambrozich when he was completely overshadowed by his teammates. In fact, one had to probe around the roster to even know that Ambrozich was there. Part of the problem was a fine ball player, a teammate, by the name of Mike Contreras, now a regular at Arizona State. Another teammate was Roy Miller of Long Beach State. No wonder, then, that Brian was lost in the rush by the colleges. After all, he had lettered only one year at Huntington Beach High.

Enrolling at Golden West Junior College, Ambrozich had a modest first year. As a sophomore, however, he suddenly caught fire, scoring an average of 20 points per game and hauling in an average of 19 rebounds a game. Sought and signed by BYU, Brian eased into the picture at BYU. In his first game for the Cougars, Kansas State in the opener, Brian scored 13 points and pulled down 11 rebounds. He played in all but two games for the Cougars last year, and he finished very strong as something more than an alternate starter at forward. He was second only to Kresimir Cosic in rebounding (180 in 26 games), and his best night on the boards came against Cincinnati, a total of 15.

The thing Brian enjoys most about basketball is the competition, but he admits it might be the same with any sport.

As for the WAC outlook for this year, Ambrozich takes a confident view of the race. "If all goes well, and I know that's a big 'if', we could be even better than last year." He views New Mexico and UTEP as the main contenders with Utah as a dark horse.

Coach Potter credits Brian's work on the boards to great timing. "It's something that's hard to coach," is the way Potter puts it. "He just has a great sense of being where the ball is."

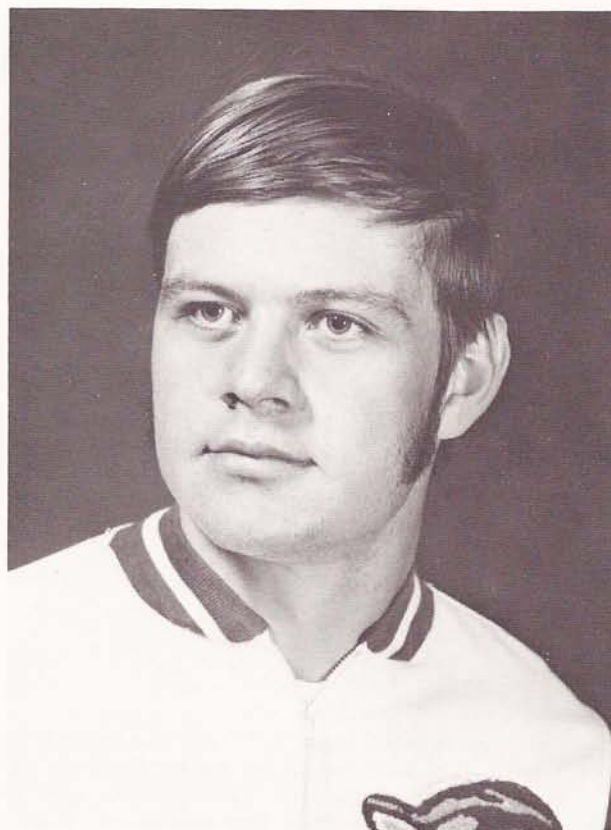

Confidence and a good attitude are two factors that could swing Kalevi "Moni" Sarkalahti into the basketball spotlight this season. The big senior from Finland has a fresh outlook on things, and he might be the answer at one of the forward positions.

Moni (a nickname that means "rookie" in Finnish) is a very physical player, and he is demonstrating improved form in nearly all phases of the game. He is very strong around the basket, and he drives well. He is improving on his outside play, and he is known as a tough rebounder.

The road has not been an easy one for Sarkalahti. Learning English in his first year at BYU was difficult, and he experienced some homesickness during his sophomore year.

Moni got his first glimpse of the United States when he was 17 years old and was a member of the Finnish national basketball team that was touring the country. When he enrolled at BYU he found the transition from European to U.S. rules only minor; no 30-second rule or dunking, but otherwise pretty much the same.

As a freshman he came within a point of winning the team scoring title (340 points, an 18.9 scoring average). He averaged 11 rebounds a game, and hit a season high of 37 points against Idaho State.

His sophomore season was just mediocre, and his junior year wasn't what Moni was hoping for. But the 1972-73 campaign may find the Helsinki student equal to the task.

As a member of the Finnish national team, Sarkalahti spent part of last summer playing in Russia, West Germany and his homeland. He indicated there are a lot of good European players available, but very few being recruited by the U.S. colleges.

Bunker experienced a dip in his productivity last season, seeing action in only 20 games. But every indication is that Jay is ready for a great senior year.

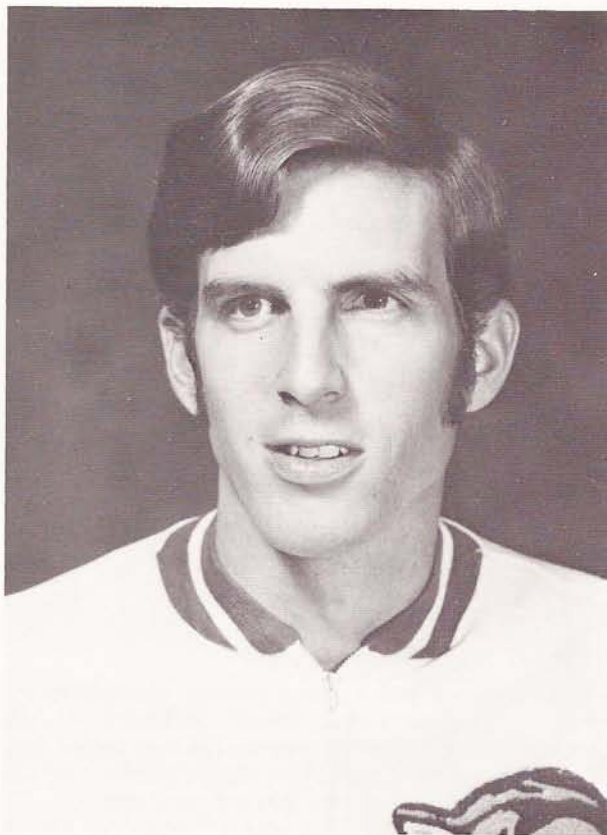

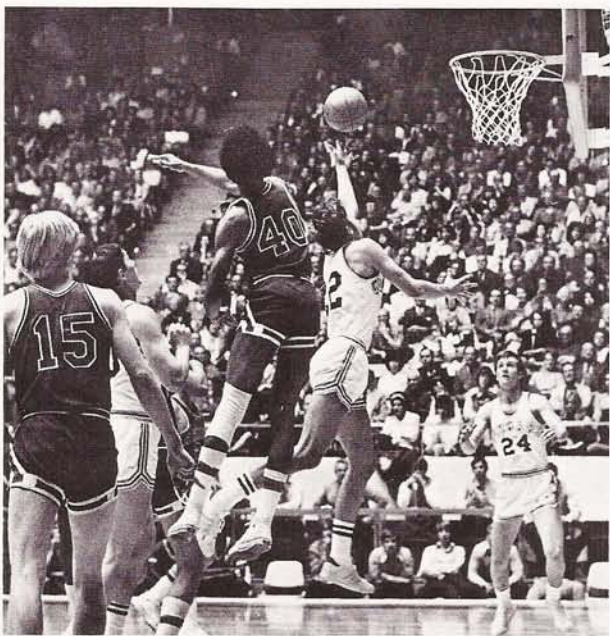
1971-72 review

The '72 season at Brigham Young University seemed to have everything.

From the tipoff of the first game in the new Marriott Activities Center until the final buzzer in the overtime game at Pocatello, the season was packed with all the interest and excitement one could ask for.

The season had to stop somewhere, but the Cougar fans were hoping it wouldn't have to be at Pocatello. The game with Long Beach State may be the most re-lived, re-created sporting event in recent years, which just adds needless futility and frustration to the emotional stockpile.

Even after the playoff in the Minidome, basketball interest remained high for an additional week as BYU and Provo hosted the NCAA Far West Regionals.

And it didn't end there, as head coach Stan Watts announced his retirement after 23 years, and the reins were passed to assistant Glenn Potter.

That's the kind of season it was, and it deserves some recounting.

Judged from the point of victories against losses, the season was the winningest on record at BYU—a 21-5 record for a per cent of .808. And the Cougars' 12-2 record in the WAC was the best win-loss percentage in the league's 10-year history.

At one juncture in the campaign the Cougars had a 17-2 record, and the team spent most of the sea-

son moving up and down the scale among the nation's top twenty in the weekly pools. BYU was ranked in ninth place on the final ballot.

BYU opened the season with a 78-72 victory over Kansas State (Big Eight champions) in the New Marriott Center. The Cougars remained undefeated in 12 games on the home floor, and finished with a 9-5 road record.

The most impressive testament of BYU's basketball popularity, however, is found in the attendance figures for the season.

BYU completely shattered former NCAA home attendance records, breaking the old national mark (16,128 by Illinois in 1971) by more than 5,000 per game. During the course of the 12 home games played in the 22,700-seat arena, home crowds averaged 21,818. Fans were turned away at all but four games, and some games were televised closed-circuit to other buildings on campus.

"Looks like we didn't build it big enough," noted Stan Watts at the finale, which drew 22,985 for the game with Colorado State.

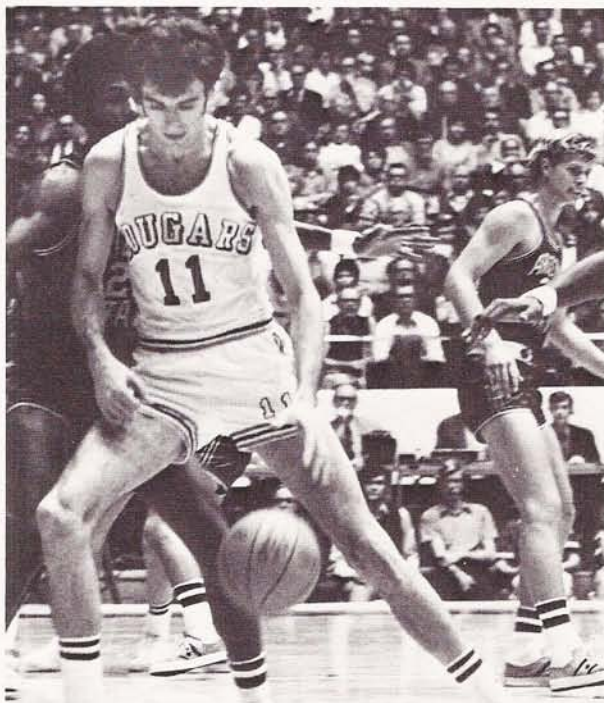
Individually, the Cougars were led by 6-11 center Kresimir Cosic who was tops in scoring and rebounding for the year. Cosic finished with a 22.3 scoring average (second highest in the school's history for one season) and 332 rebounds (12.8 per game).

Senior guard Bernie Fryer, the floor general for the Cougars, ended his final year at BYU with an average of 18.2 points. In two seasons with BYU, both of them title-winning years, Fryer scored a total of more than 1,000 points.

Both Cosic and Fryer were named to the official all-Western Athletic Conference team.

Statistically, however, it was a pair of sophomores who came up with the best shooting percentages from the floor. Forward-guard Belmont Anderson and guard Doug Richards shot 54% and 53% respectively from the field, which places both of them among the top five in the school's long history in that department.

All-in-all, looking back it was a very good year.

wac basketball record: a byu success story

In the ten years since the formation of the Western Athletic Conference, Brigham Young University has become the foremost basketball power in the league. The ten-year record of the WAC supports this position.

A comparison of the WAC basketball teams and records during this period brings out some interesting points: (a) the ups and downs of some teams, which is a somewhat natural consequence, and (b) the closeness of competition over the long haul, which is indicative of a well balanced basketball program within the conference.

CHAMPIONSHIPS WON

During the ten years the WAC has been functioning, Brigham Young University has won or shared the championship **five** times. Starting in 1965, the Cougars have either won outright or shared the crown every other year; 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971, and 1972. In winning outright titles back to back in 1971 and 1972, the Cougars established a conference first. Arizona State and New Mexico have each won a title and shared a title during this same period. Wyoming has

shared the title twice, and Utah has one undisputed championship. Texas-El Paso won the title its first year as a member of the league (1970). Arizona and newcomer Colorado State are the only schools in the conference who haven't cracked the winner's circle.

OVERALL RECORDS

The Cougars also claim the best win-loss record during this period. Through the ins and outs the Cougars have been able to compile a 69-43 mark. With the exception of newcomer Texas-El Paso, the Cougars also have the best victory percentage—.616.

WAC HOME-ROAD RECORD

In the minds of many basketball buffs the real test of any team should be the home-road records over the ten-year pull. Here again the Cougars carry the edge among the six original members of the WAC. BYU has won more home games (50) and more road games (19) than any team in the league. Road wins have been notoriously hard to come by in the WAC, yet the Cougars have won over one-third of their road games in the conference play.

OFFENSE, SCORING MARGIN

The Cougars have also established themselves in the area of offense, leading the league in most points scored (9301). BYU has also led the WAC in scoring five different years (1963, 1964, 1965, 1967, and 1972). The Cougars hold the WAC season scoring average (92.4) and league field goal percentage mark (49.1 in 1967). The single game records include BYU's 62 points in one half (against Utah in 1966) and 115 points in one game (Utah the same year).

Basketball games in the WAC are traditionally close and hardfought. After ten years in the WAC, the Cougars carry a +2.8 scoring margin over conference opponents—by far the biggest edge in the league.

THE PAST SEASON

In winning the 1972 Western Athletic Conference championship the Cougars turned in one of the best balanced performances in the history of the league. BYU led the conference in field goal percentage (.489), offensive average (81.0), free throw percentage (.723) and scoring margin (+9.3 per game). The Cougars also finished third in rebound percentage (.523) and third in team defense (71.7).

The Cougars' 12-2 league record in 1972 was also the most wins ever by a team in WAC play. They set additional record for most road wins in one season (5), most consecutive wins in one season (8) and most consecutive road wins over a two-year period (6).

COUGAR BASKETBALL POPULAR

1972 was the opening season for Cougar basketball in the mammoth Marriott Center (capacity approximately 22,700) and more people turned out to watch BYU play than ever before. In 12 home games the Cougars attracted a total of 261,815 fans for an average of 21,818 per game. In all, BYU played before a total of 357,287 spectators for an average of 14,434 per contest.

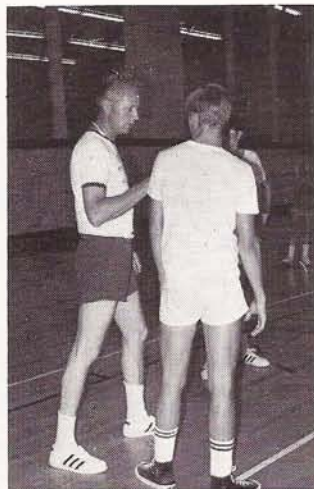
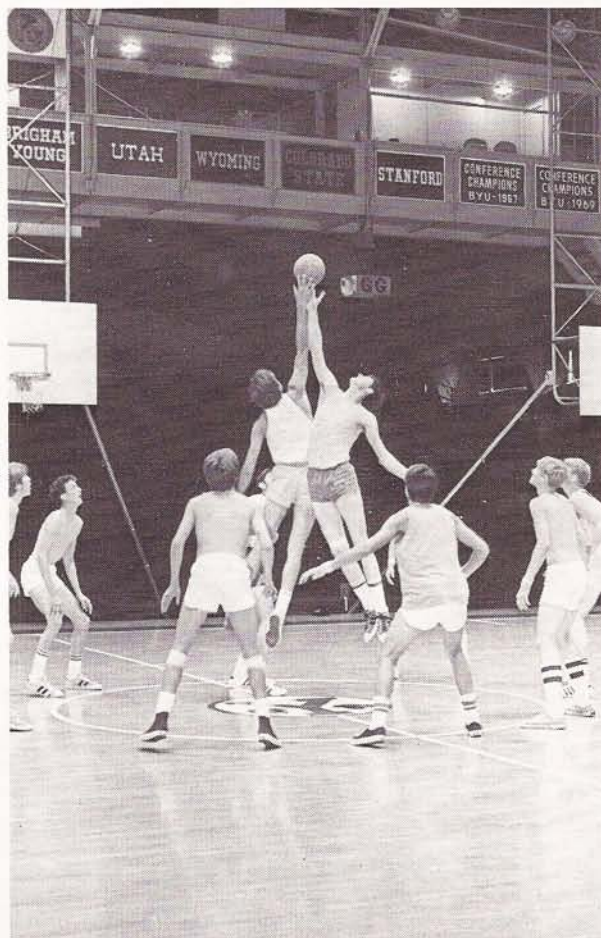
Cougar basketball camp
