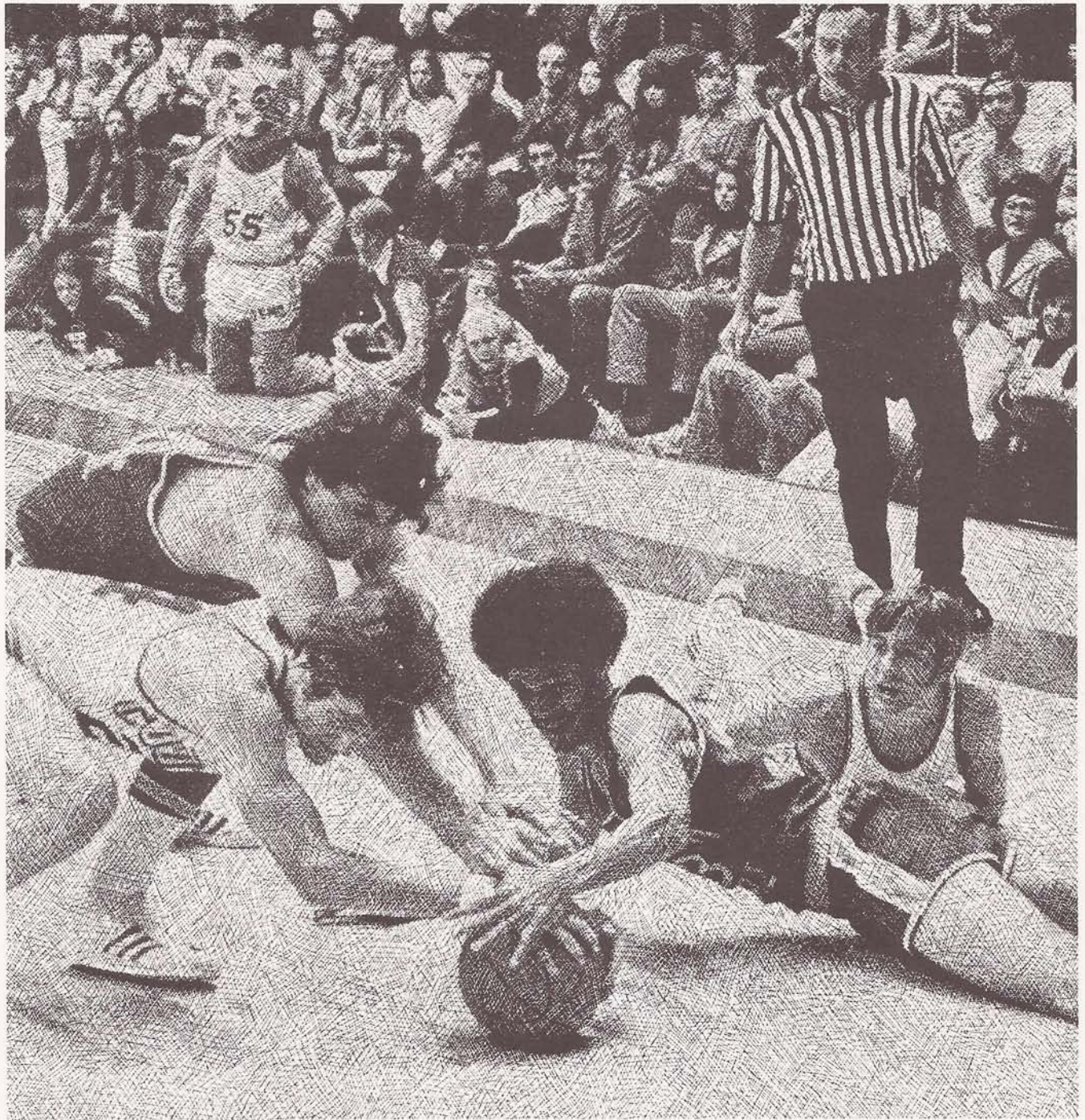

J. Willard Marriott Center

The home floor for the Cougar basketball team is the J. Willard Marriott Center located on the north side of campus. It is now in its second year of BYU activity and has already established many national attendance records.

When plans were being drawn up for the center, Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson, then president of the university, said "For the first time in recent years, devotional messages, commencement exercise and all other major campus events along with basketball will be held under one roof for all students." From its completion on December 3, 1971, it has been just such a place.

Total home attendance figures show that 263,523 fans jammed into the Marriott Center to watch the Cougars play their 15 home games, and that averaged out to 18,823 fans per game. The single game mark was set against University of Utah when 22,987 came to see the contest. That game was just 13 short of 23,000 fans.

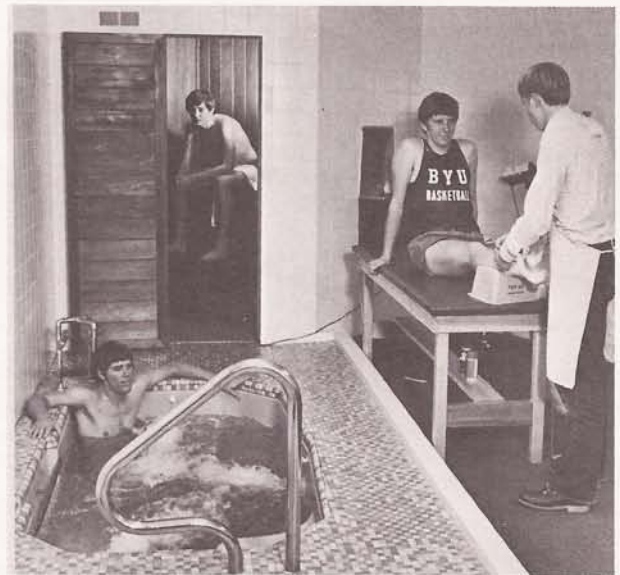
The building is the largest arena of its kind in the United States, covering about three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet, and will enclose 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is some ten stories.

Seating capacity has been set at 22,768. Of that number 10,000 are chair seats with the balance being bleacher seats. About 60% of the seats are below the concourse level, with the remainder above the concourse level.

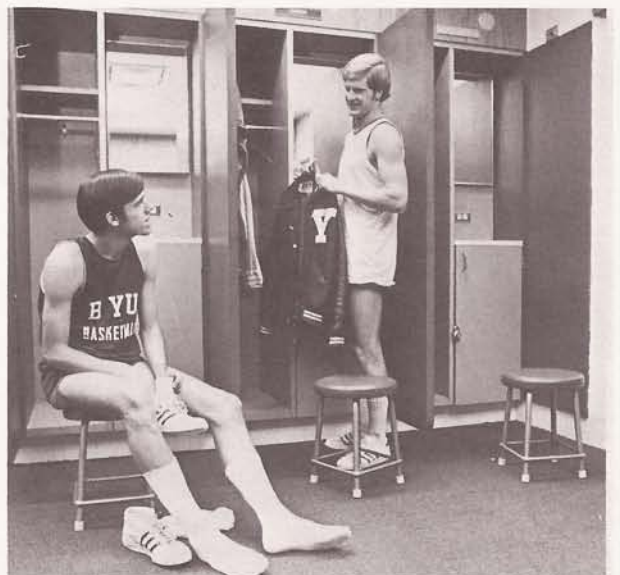
While the Marriott Center is generally associated with basketball, it should be pointed out that it has been, and will continue to be used for a wide variety of events and purposes. The building includes offices for the coaching staff and ticket personnel, locker rooms, and is equipped with facilities for pageants, dance festivals, musicals, and other various assemblies at the University.

outlook

In last year's press guide outlook, I said I had no idea what the odds were for winning three conference championships in a row. This year the question is academic for winning three out of four, since we lost 62% of our scoring and 67% of our rebounding strength from last year's team.

Right now we will have a difficult time matching the accomplishments of the three years I have been at BYU, both as an assistant and as head coach. First, we must replace our entire front line, including the first substitute at that position. Second, we play 16 of our 26 games on the road. And third, the overall strength of the league is improving every year.

Looking first at our front line losses, we are missing three starters; Kresimir Cosic (6-11), Moni Sarkalahti (6-8), and Brian Ambrozich (6-5). This means we have to replace three of our first five scorers, plus our top three rebounders. We also lost Jay Bunker, our first replacement at both forward and center.

BALANCE MISSING, TOO

Balance was a big word last year with all starters averaging in double figures. Cosic seemed to be the real cog, however, since he was both our leading scorer and rebounder. How do you replace a three-year, first team all-WAC performer and legitimate All-America candidate?

To offset these losses, we must find replacements

We did not sign any junior college transfers, so from among our returning players and newcomers, we must draw from two seniors, two juniors, two sophomores and six freshmen. Very probably this represents the youngest, least experienced team of any varsity squad BYU has put on the playing floor in the last 25 years. But I do feel we have some good players, and it seems to be a question of how quickly we will mature. (Last year Arizona proved you could compete and win with young players.)

NEW OFFENSIVE ALIGNMENT

One thing I feel will help the effectiveness of our young players is the change in our offensive set from 2-1-2 to 1-3-1, high-low post. This means our taller freshmen, Mark Handy (6-9) and Jay Cheesman (6-9), will be competing for a position closer to the basket, and will not have to make a complete transition from center, where they both played in high school, to a regular forward. Because of the introduction of this new offense, I will refer to these positions as "inside" (high and low post) and "outside" (point and two wings).

THE OUTSIDE POSITION

The nucleus of our varsity experience is at this position. Doug Richards (15.9), the second leading scorer from last year's club, and Belmont Anderson (13.0), will be called upon to increase their leadership abilities and all-around performance. Both of these seniors received recognition as all-conference performers, and their play proved more consistent as the season progressed. One thing is certain—they must take charge if we hope to cope with the lack of experience at other positions.

After Anderson and Richards, the third outside position is a tossup. Grig Clawson (6-3) averaged 8-minutes of playing time a game last year, and should have an edge in experience. Chris Williams (6-7) is up from the freshman team where he averaged 13.6 points per game. Chris is a fine ball handler, and will challenge for the third spot.

With such a small number of lettermen returning, there will be many new faces on the squad. Doug Ainge (6-5) appears to be excellent shooter; Mike Berning (6-1) may be the fastest of the newcomers; Veryl Law (6-1) appears to be very consistent; and Gifford Nielsen (6-5) will be late in reporting, since he is involved in football.

Any of the above could be the third outside player. In any event, they will provide good depth to the outside positions, even though they lack experience.

THE INSIDE ATTACK

Troy Jones (6-9) and Greg Snow (6-7) are the only front-liners returning from last year. Troy has the size (220), and he handles himself well close to the basket. He is equally adept with both his right and left hand. Only a sophomore, he was a redshirt last year. Greg, a returning letterman, is an excellent shooter, but lacks consistency in rebounding, where he must improve. A pair of freshmen, Mark Handy (6-9) and Jay Cheesman (6-9) will also be competing for the post positions. Mark seems to have the tools to become an excellent player. He has size, strength, jumping ability, and quickness to be a real contender for a starting berth.

Jay has been handicapped because of an injury he received this summer. It was necessary to operate and attach three ligaments to the bone in his ankle. He, too, has good size (200) and is a good shooter.

THE CONFERENCE RACE

It appears the power in the Western Athletic Conference has shifted to the southern schools, with the possible exception of Utah. Arizona, Arizona State, New Mexico, UTEP and Utah should all field excellent teams. Arizona needed a center, and recruited one, while ASU needs only to replace its starting guards from last year's championship team. New Mexico must replace some proven players, but last year they had more depth than any team in the conference. UTEP had some unfortunate injuries, but if Jim Forbes is healthy, they will be a challenge. Utah played many young players last season, and all are back, with the exception of Eddie Trail, so I look for them to be improved.

Colorado State has a number of transfers, as does Wyoming. A lot depends on how quickly they jell as to where they will finish in the league.

Personally, I feel Arizona and Arizona State are the teams to beat, with UTEP, New Mexico, and Utah right behind. I would have to place CSU, Wyoming and BYU in the darkhorse class.

NON-CONFERENCE GAMES

My first thought is that we play too many road games. We open at home on Nov. 30 (Weber State) and Dec. 1 (Idaho State). Immediately thereafter we play only one other regular scheduled home game between Dec. 1 and Jan. 24.

Besides our two Big Sky opponents (Weber has represented the conference in the NCAA tournament as far back as I can remember), we play New Mexico State twice, Denver, Kansas State and Creighton. NMS has hopes of joining the top-twenty after failing off last year. Denver is coming off an excellent season, while Kansas State (loser to Memphis State in the NCAA regional tournament) must find replacements for two starters.

In summary, this will be the youngest, least experienced team that I have ever had an opportunity to work with. Our success will depend on two things: 1) increased leadership and improved play from our returning lettermen, and 2) consistency from our incoming freshmen.

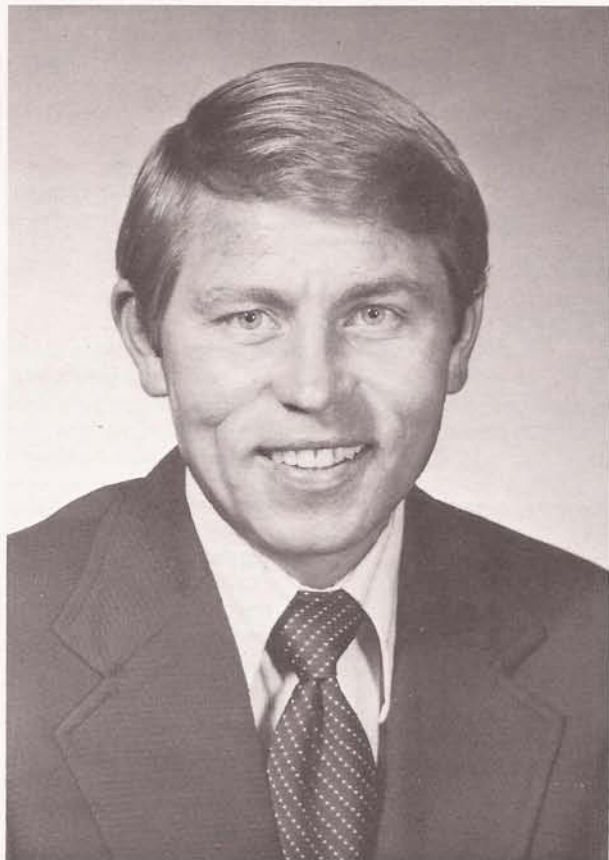

GLENN POTTER

GLENN POTTER begins his second year as head basketball coach at BYU after assuming control of the Cougar program in March of 1972. Previously he was an assistant to Coach Stan Watts from 1970 to 1972. After experiencing two consecutive WAC championships prior to last year's second-place finish, Coach Potter will enter a season of rebuilding in 1973. A mere two starters from last year's squad (and only five players in all) return for the Cougars this year. But the 35-year-old Potter has been in similar situations before.

Upon arrival at the University of Nebraska in 1963 as an assistant to Joe Cipriano, Potter helped shape Nebraska into a winning basketball team. That marked the end of a 13-season losing streak for the Cornhuskers. During the five years Potter was at Nebraska, the team posted a respectable 80-46 won-loss record. But Nebraska was not the first time Potter and Cipriano teamed together in coaching.

Glenn and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as an assistant at Idaho while working on his Master's degree in secondary education.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, and graduated in education in 1960. After completing his eligibility at Idaho, Glenn coached the frosh for one year.

While in school Glenn proved himself an outstanding student. Because of his academic achievement Potter was honored by being asked to become a member of several national honorary societies—Blue Key, Phi Epsilon Kappa, and Phi Delta Kappa.



From November 1961 to August 1963 coach Potter served as an officer in the United States Army. During that time he coached the Ft. Hood (Texas) basketball team to an outstanding 46-10 record.

An avid teacher of defensive fundamentals and team balance, Potter is becoming recognized as one of the strong young coaches in the NCAA today. He is co-author of the book entitled **Nebraska Basketball** and spent two weeks last summer in Yugoslavia conducting clinics in Zagreb.

Coach Potter was born March 7, 1938, in Twin Falls, Idaho. He is married to the former Mary Beckstead and they are the parents of five children: Lori (12), Steven (10), Jennifer (7), Cindy (5), and John (1).

BOB FREDERICK

BOB FREDERICK, who enters his second season as a member of the Cougar coaching staff, came to BYU from the University of Kansas, where he was assistant varsity basketball and head golf coach.

Bob was lured away from his alma mater after just one season at Kansas, and along with varsity responsibilities, has directed much of the recruiting and scouting.

Before joining the Kansas staff, Frederick coached at Coffeyville Junior College for the 1970-71 season and compiled an impressive 21-9 win-loss record.

Bob played his college ball at Kansas during the 1960 and 1961 seasons but had to sit out his senior year because of a knee injury.

Bob graduated from Kansas in 1962 with a major in chemistry and two years later received a master's in educational administration.

Starting a coaching career in the prep ranks in 1964, Frederick coached two years at Rich Central in Olympia Fields, Ill., and four years at Russell, Kansas, before stepping up to the Coffeyville job in '70-'71.

Frederick's over-all high school coaching record for six years was 71-49.

Bob is a native of Glendale, Missouri, a St. Louis suburb, and he was graduated from Kirkwood High School in 1958.

During his coaching stay at Kansas, Bob met the former Miss Margaret Walleit. They have been married just over a year.



COURTNEY LEISHMAN

COURTNEY LEISHMAN, as an assistant to head coach Glenn Potter, has duties that go beyond heading the junior varsity program. He assumed the JV position after an impressive record of 35 wins against 16 defeats as head frosh mentor. He also takes charge of the academic eligibility for all players and assists with scouting and recruiting chores.

After graduating from Utah State in 1958, Courtney launched his coaching career at Malad High in Idaho. During his three-year stay in Malad he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1961 he came to BYU where he obtained his master's degree. The next year Leishman accepted the head coaching position at BY High, in Provo, and spent seven seasons there.

While coach of the BY High Wildcats, his basketball teams won or placed second in the region all but one year, even though the school had a relatively small student body. Courtney's over-all basketball record at BY High was 82 wins against 31 defeats.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Leishman graduated from South Cache High in 1950. He is married to the former Virginia "Pat" Humphreys, and they have four children: Kathy Lee (14), Jearlene (12), Mike (5), and Richard (1).

DR. DALLIN H. OAKS, President

Brigham Young University's president is 41-year-old Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who assumed office Aug. 1, 1971. President Oaks, former professor of law at University of Chicago, replaced Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who served as president of BYU for a period of 20 years (1951-1971).

President Oaks was born in Provo, Utah (Aug. 12, 1932) a son of the late Dr. Lloyd E. Oaks and Stella H. Oaks. He graduated from BYU in 1954 with high honors, receiving the B.A. degree in accounting and economics. At University of Chicago Law School he received the Doctor of Jurisprudence degree in 1957, graduating cum laude, second in a class of 86, and was named to the Order of the Coif. He was also editor-in-chief of the University's Law Review in 1956-57.

He began an illustrious legal career as law clerk to the Chief Justice of the United States, Earl Warren. A year later he entered private law practice in Chicago (Kirtland, Ellis, Hodson, Chaffetz and Masters). In 1961 he became associate professor of law at Chicago University, and was associate dean from May 1962 to January 1963, serving as dean during the last three months of this period. He was also Assistant United States Attorney of Cook County (1964) and visiting professor of law at University of Michigan Law School (1968).

From January through June 1970 he was on leave of absence to serve as legal and research adviser to the Bill of Rights Committee of the Illinois Constitutional Convention. He became executive director of the American Bar Foundation (1970).

President Oaks has been co-editor, co-author, or author of four books dealing with subjects of church and state, trust law, operation of criminal courts in Chicago. He has also authored about 30 articles in leading periodicals and other magazines.

An active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he served as first counselor in the presidency of the Chicago Stake (district) and was formerly mission president in Chicago Stake.

He married June Dixon of Spanish Fork, Utah, and they have five children: Sharmon, Cheri, Lloyd, Dallin and TruAnn.



DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, Dean

The key administrator and planner in BYU's recent athletic growth is Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the College of Physical Education at BYU. A powerful force in the shaping of the Cougar sports program, "Milt" has also filled a number of key administrative assignments on the national level with the NCAA. . . . born Feb. 26, 1907 in Downey, Idaho . . . graduated from Downey High . . . attended Idaho State, obtained his B.S. degree from Utah State in 1930 . . . served as coach and teacher at Grace, Idaho (1930-36), then as principal at Grace (1936-44) . . . earned his M.Ed. at Utah State (1939) . . . superintendent of Grace schools (1948-52), then superintendent of Pocatello schools (1952-54) . . . obtained Ed.D. at UCLA in 1956 . . . was appointed dean at BYU in 1956 . . . also became BYU faculty adviser (1956-62), then faculty representative (1962-) . . . was chosen professor of the year at BYU (1963) . . . has completed numerous professional appointments in professional, civic and church organizations . . . former stake president of Bannock Stake in Grace, Idaho (1944-52) . . . was also a member of three NCAA committees . . . married Virgil Burrup Mar. 27, 1928, and they have four children: Mrs. Max (Lois) Morrill, Mrs. Ted (Bonnie) Simons, Richard and Kip.



STAN WATTS, Athletic Chairman

If anyone on the Provo campus deserves the athletic title of "Mr. BYU," it's Stan Watts, the Cougars' athletic chairman until two years ago when he elected to retire from coaching, Stan was a man wearing two hats . . . his basketball teams won back-to-back WAC championships (1971-72) before Watts decided to spend full time directing Cougar athletic affairs . . . although he has coached football, baseball, track and basketball in his 25 years at BYU, Stan is identified most with the cage game where he coached BYU teams for 23 years . . . he also served as assistant director of athletics and acting director of athletics, taking over the chairman duties in the summer of 1970 . . . born August 30, 1911 in Murray, Utah . . . son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Watts . . . attended Murray High (1928), was an all-around athlete at Weber State (class of '36), and won letters in several sports at BYU (class of '38) . . . began coaching career at Millard High (1938-41) where one of his top players was Clarence Robison, now BYU track coach . . . was A.D. and cage coach at Dixie College (1941-45) . . . coached three sports at Jordan High (1945-47) . . . joined the athletic staff at BYU in 1947, coaching baseball, track, and assisted in football and basketball . . . replaced Floyd Millet as head basketball coach (1949) . . . his teams have won two NIT titles ('51 and '66), eight conference championships . . . his overall basketball record is 431-260 . . . assistant director of athletics (1949) . . . former president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (1969-70) . . . member of NCAA rules committee . . . author of "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball" . . . married Emily Kelly August 21, 1939 . . . four children: Mrs. Dennis (Janice) Jones, Mrs. Richard (Susan) Coon, Judy and Howard Watts . . . phone 373-8156.

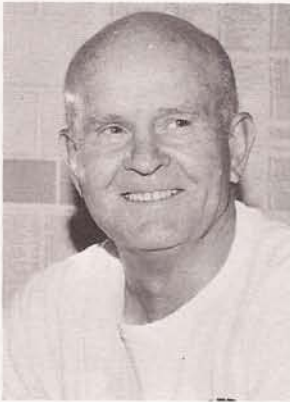
BEN SPEELMON, in his second year as athletic ticket manager. Half a million tickets is a lot for one year.

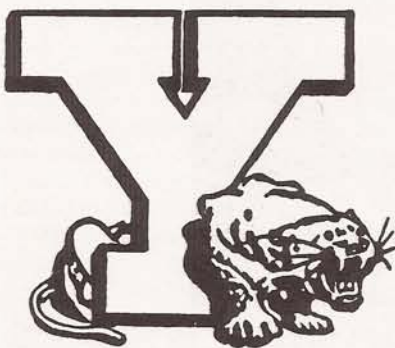

TOM BAACK, a graduate assistant for the basketballers. Comes to BYU from Nebraska where he was top scorer for several seasons.

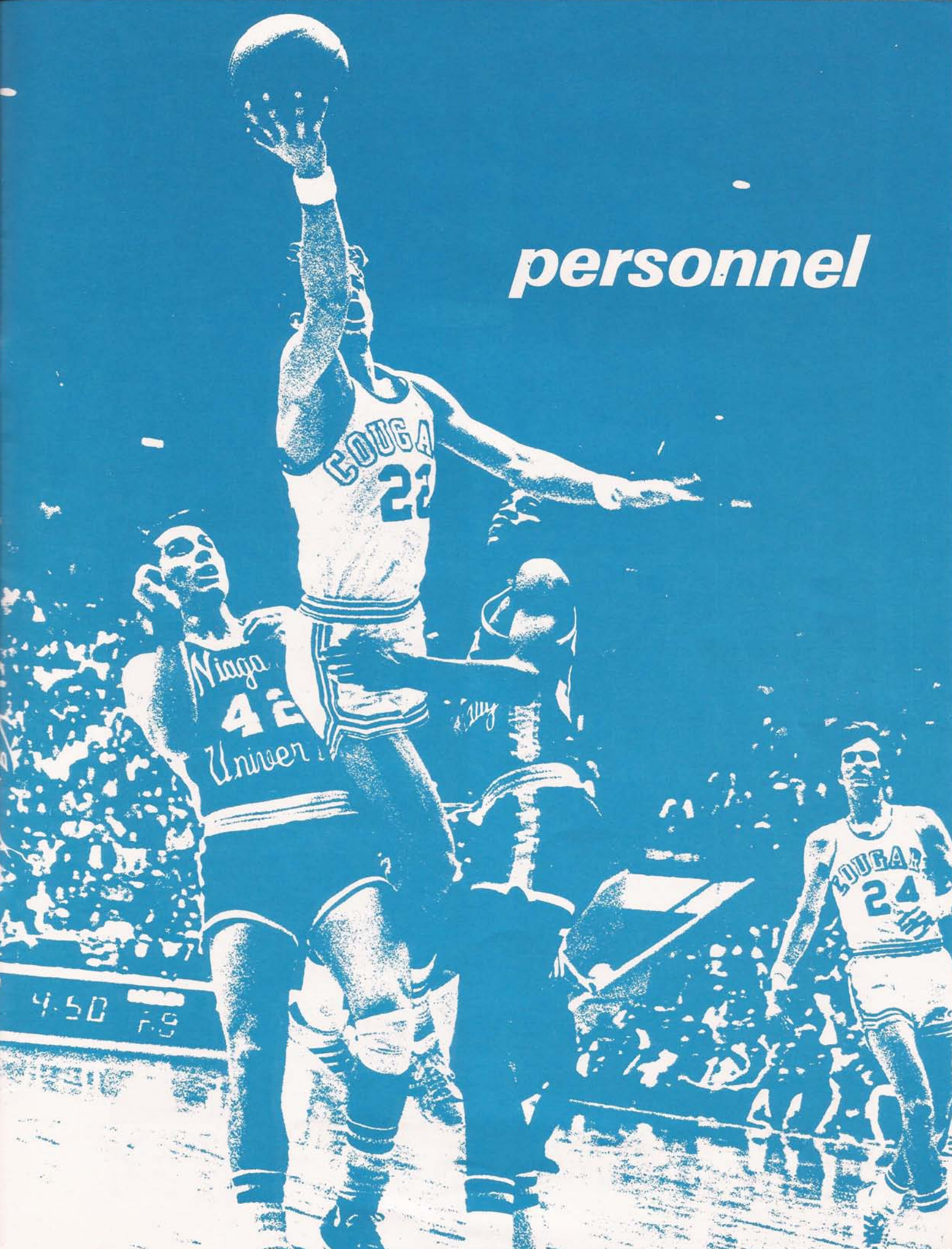


JON STANLEY, graduate assistant to Glen Potter. Former BYU basketball player and all-American volleyball player.

A player who fits into this class is Belmont (Bill) Anderson, whose ease, great body control and shooting techniques put him in a class by himself. When you see Anderson perform on the basketball court, you're not likely to forget it.

Then, too, this kind of player tends to be explosive. For example, there was last year's opening round of the All-College tournament in Oklahoma City. The Cougars found themselves in a very tight game with Texas A&M. Anderson broke loose for 26 points and 11 rebounds as BYU took a two-point decision, 83-81.

Coach Potter says of Anderson: "From a one-on-one standpoint, Bill is probably the most talented player on the team. He has the highest standing jump on the team, and consequently is an excellent rebounder. For the past two seasons he has been the best rebounding guard on the team."

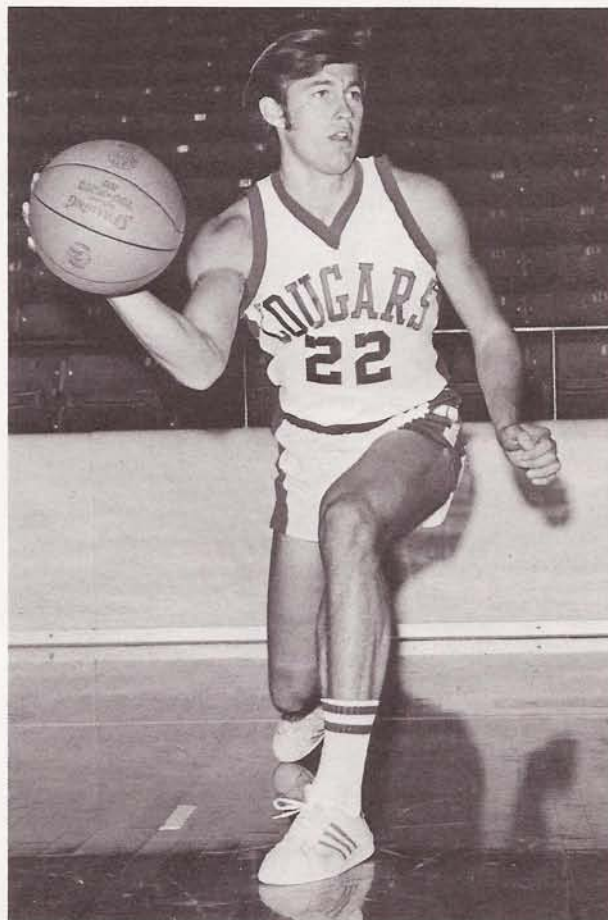
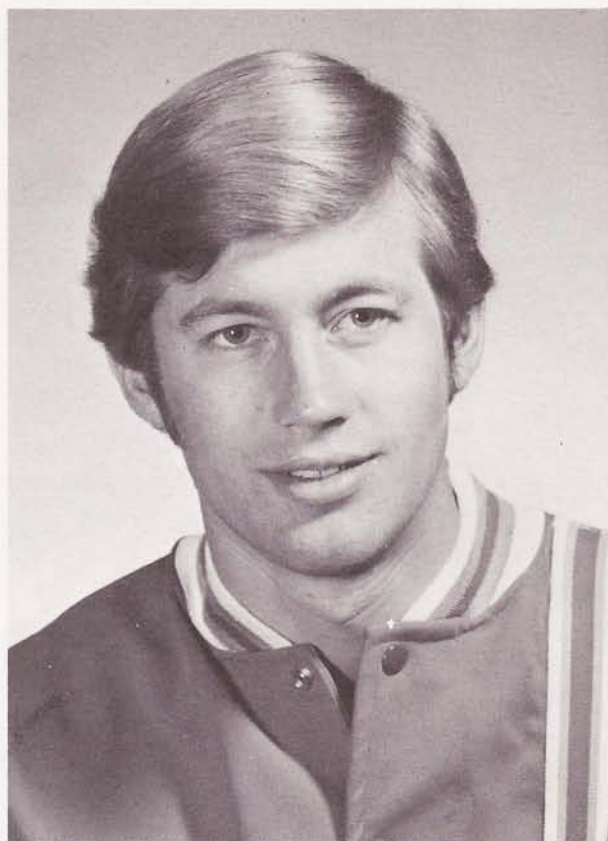
Fortunately for the Cougars, Anderson doesn't need to be confined to a guard position; he can play nearly anywhere. This year he will be part of the outside attack, where he can drive and fire away with physical abandon.

Since his first days as a sophomore, Belmont has played in all but two Cougar games. As a sophomore he led the team in percentage of field goals made, 54%. Last year he was the team's number three scorer, averaging 13.0 points and 5.2 rebounds per game.

In addition, Bill has more than held his own in the classroom. He has been selected on the official all-Western Athletic Conference All-Academic team for the past two years, and last year was named second-team academic All-America. He is a pre-dental major with a minor in psychology.

A high school product of Salt Lake City, Anderson came to BYU with outstanding credentials. He was all-state as a junior and senior, scoring 30.2 points per game as a junior, 32.0 as a senior at Skyline High in Salt Lake City. He won All-America recognition, too, in prep. His freshman year produced 300 points, an average of 17.7 per game.

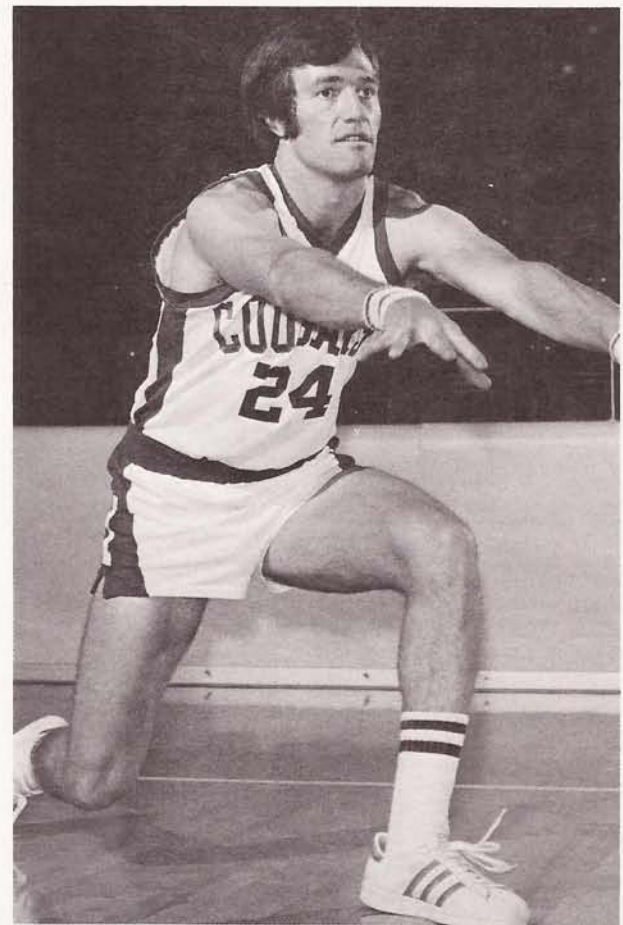
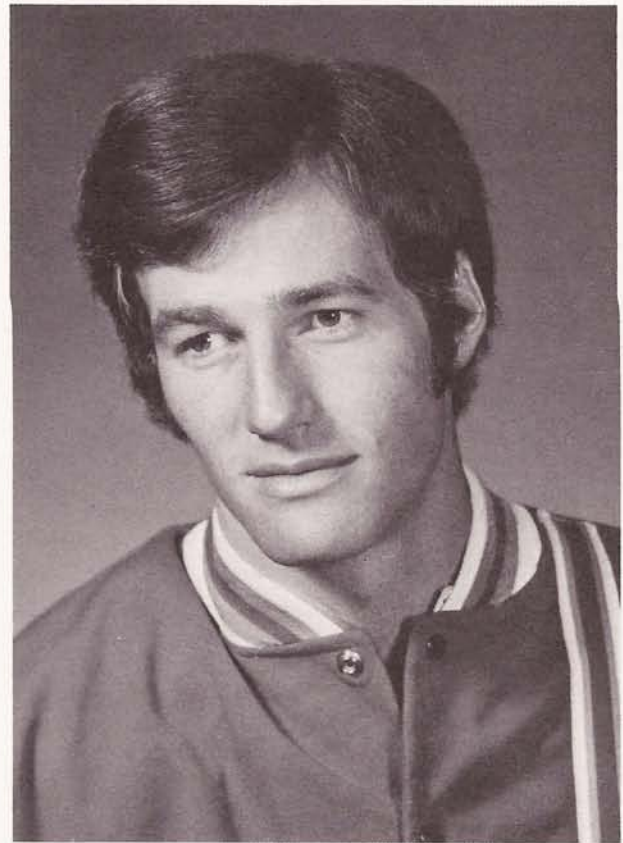
Doug is a member of a very athletic family, and is never wanting for parental or sibling support. One brother, Golden, set several NCAA records as a football player (split end and kick-return specialist), and is currently playing ball for the Dallas Cowboys. A younger brother, Sterling, is a split end on the Cougar varsity football team. Parents of these athletes are John and Gloria Richards of Salt Lake City, and they seldom miss a BYU event.

Doug began his career at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he was all-state in two sports, football and basketball. 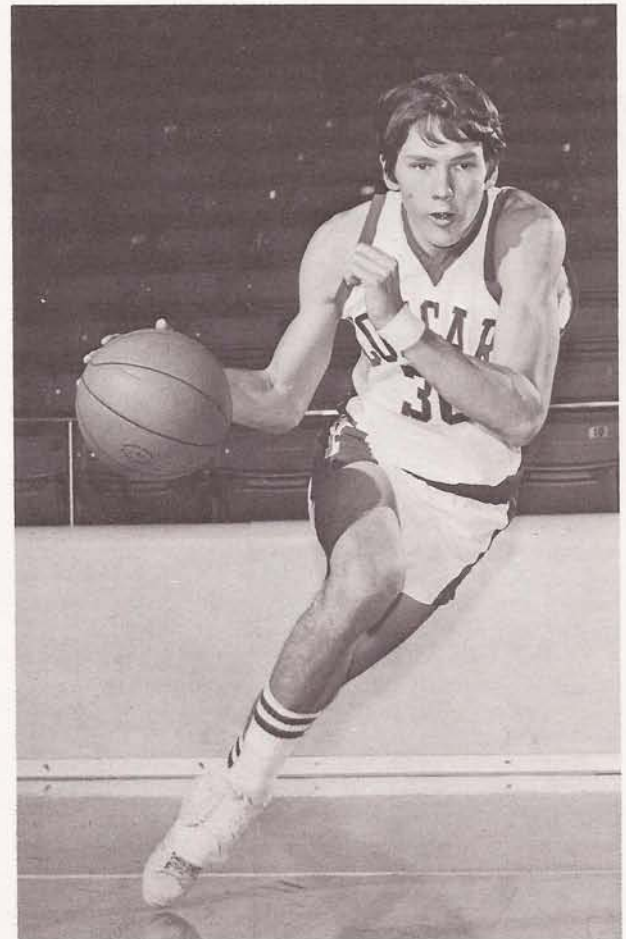
One doesn't have to look too far on Veryl Law's family tree to figure out where the 6-2, 175 lb. youngster gets his athletic ability.

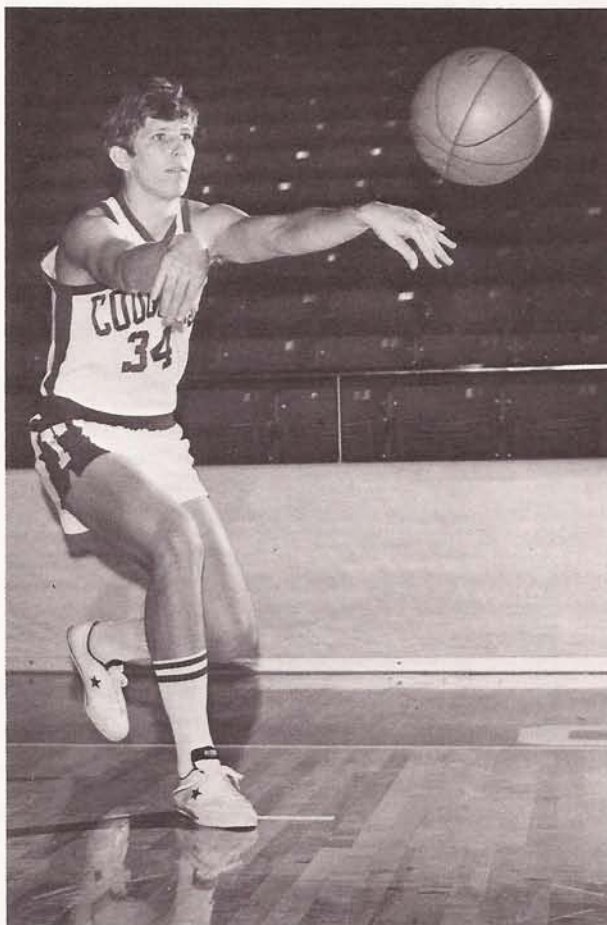

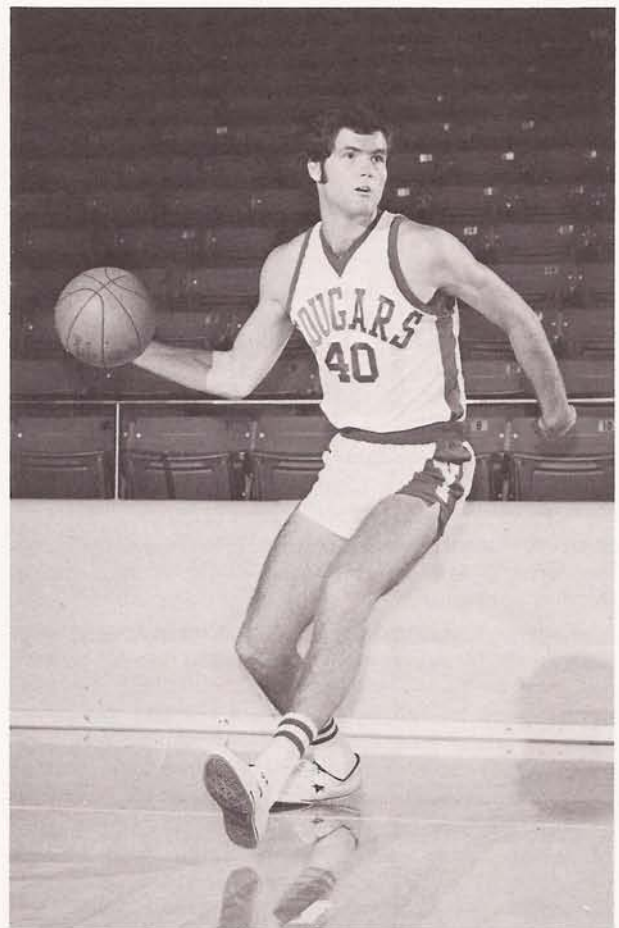

The third leading scorer from last year's junior varsity, sophomore Chris Williams could play a key role on the 1973-74 Cougar varsity.

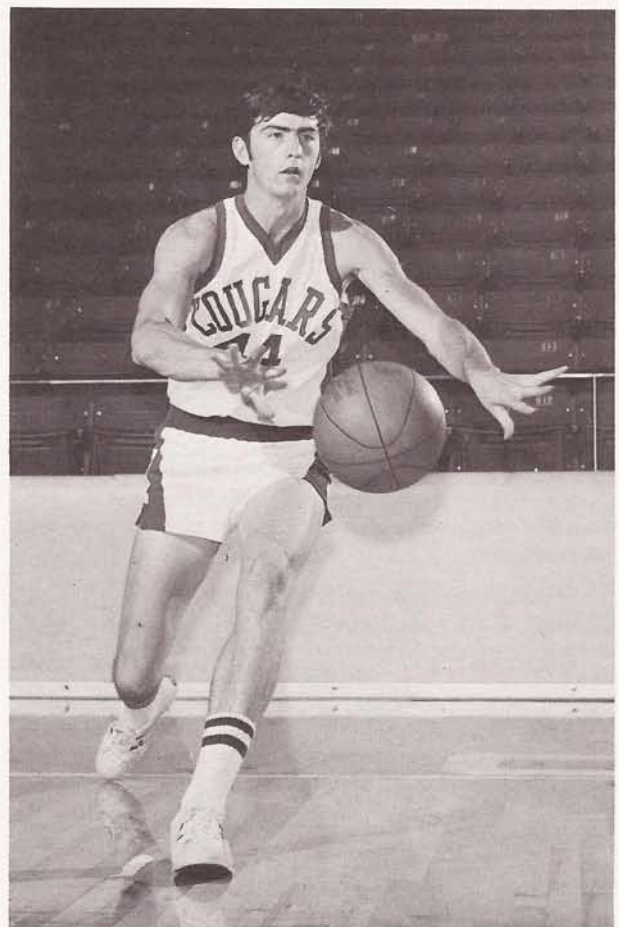

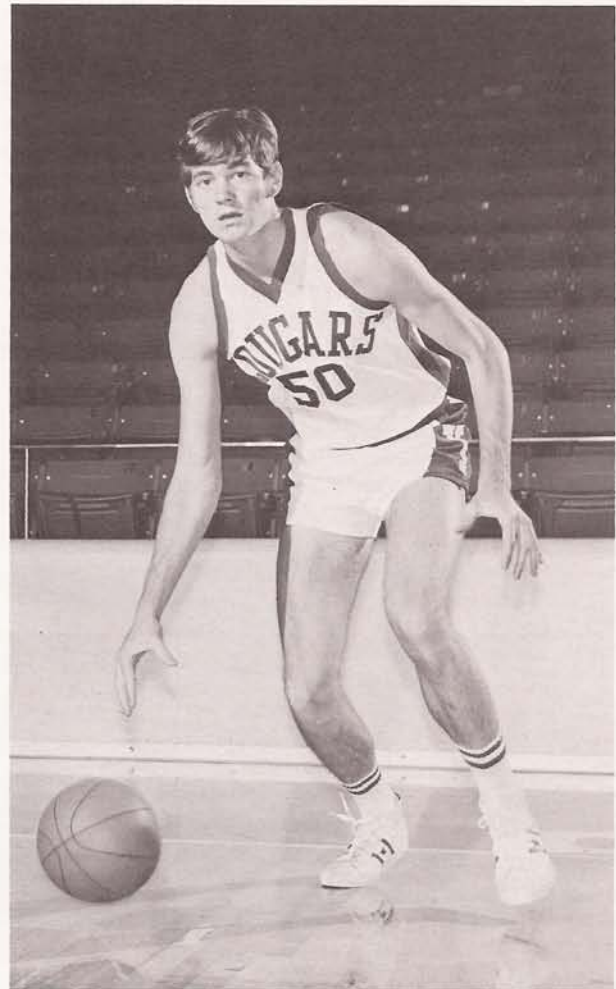
As far as the BYU coaching staff is concerned, it's only a matter of time before freshman Jay Cheesman works his way into the starting lineup for the Cougars.

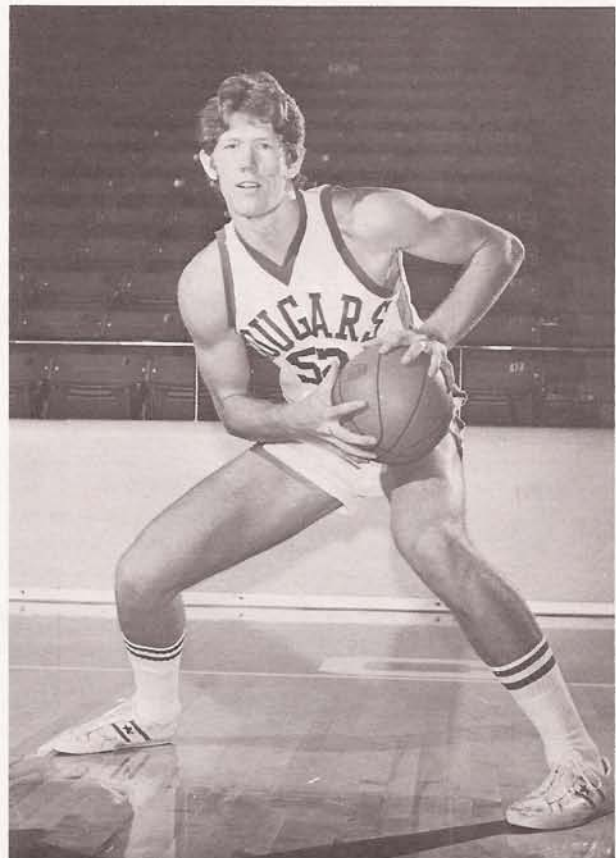

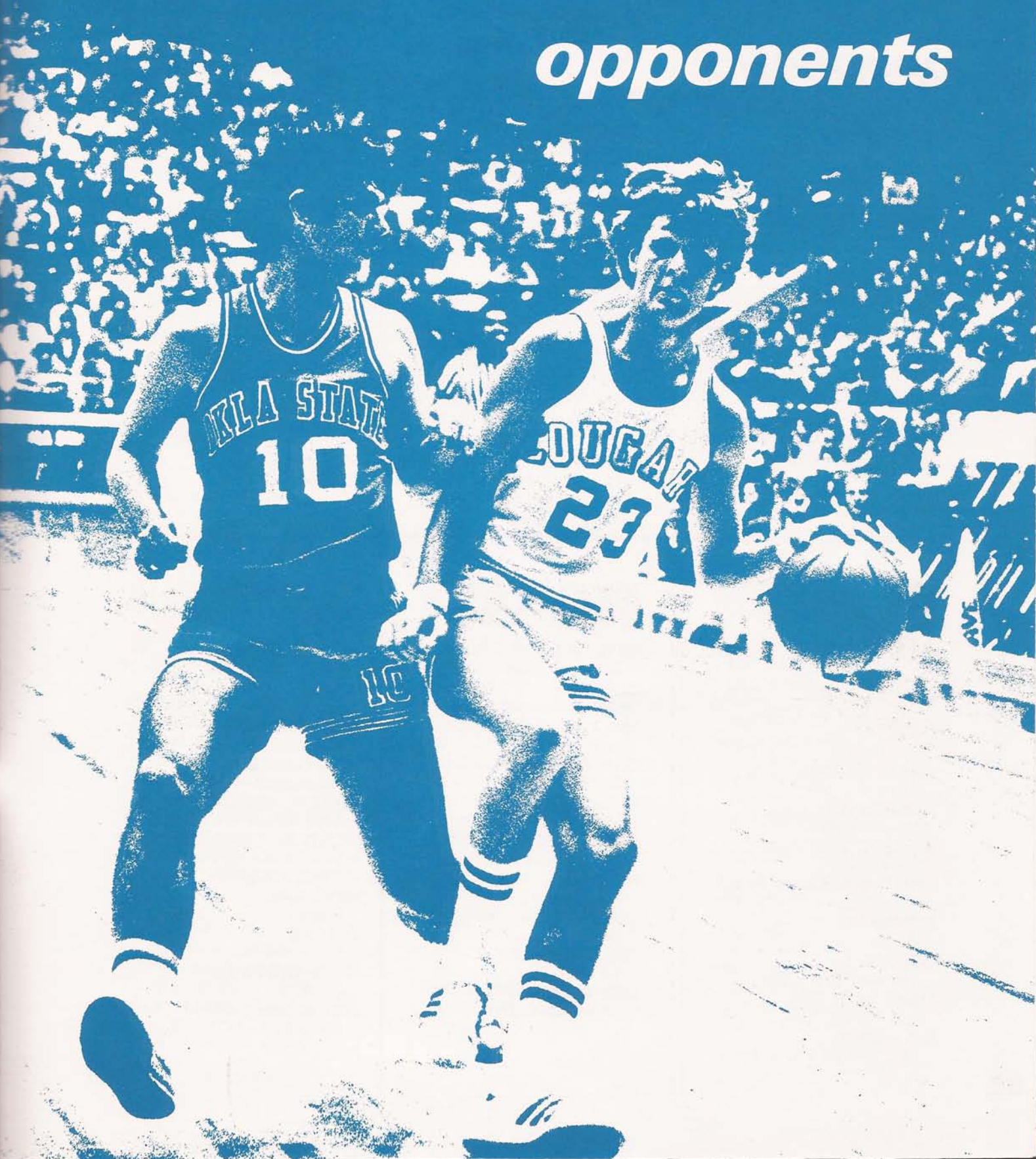

past records

1972-73 review

Ask any BYU basketball fan and he will tell you that there was a lot of could-have-been wrapped up in the 1973 season.

The Cougars weren't alone, however. There are four or five other teams in the Western Athletic Conference who are experiencing the same kind of reflections.

The WAC championship was within the grasp of four teams right up until the final basket of the final game on the schedule. Only Arizona State came up smiling.

When the dust had finally settled, the Cougars found themselves tied for second place with two other schools. And overall, BYU was 19-7 for the season, which is a respectable mark for any team.

For the Cougars, at least, the race down the stretch was marred by a ruling imposed by the NCAA tournament committee. Even if Coach Glenn Potter's team had won the title, the Cougars would have been a champion with no place to go.

The NCAA committee ruled that BYU would not be eligible for post-season participation in the regional playoffs because of an eligibility hassle involving All-American Kresimir Cosic, even though his eligibility had been cleared with the WAC.

Even as a second-place team, the National Invitational Tourney in New York was out for BYU. The championship game in that cage classic was scheduled for a Sunday.

Everything taken into consideration, however, the Cougars added a lot of spice to the hottest league race in the history of the WAC. In terms of excitement they were expected to provide, the Cougars gave full measure.

According to statistics compiled at the end of the season, the Cougars

- out-scored opponents by nearly five points per game (79.5 to 74.6)
- out-rebounded opponents by nearly nine rebounds per game (47.7 to 38.8)
- scored 72% compared to opponents' 65% from free throw line
- and outscored opponents 48% to 45% from the field.

Coach Glenn Potter's Cougars also hit a hot streak during the 1972-73 campaign, winning nine in a row in a mid-season stretch. The team's 9-4 record on the road was also a reflection of BYU's stability. And of the three defeats on the home court of the Marriott Center, two were very close; a two-pointer to Santa Clara, and an overtime loss to Colorado State.

A BALANCED ATTACK

While the Cougars may have fallen short of their expectations, there is no doubt they had strength in

balanced scoring. All five starters finished the season with averages in double figures; **Cosic** (20.2), **Richards** (15.9), **Anderson** (13.0), **Sarkalahti** (11.7), and **Ambrozich** (10.7). Moreover, six different players were high point for the Cougars at one time or other during the season. Rebounding honors were cornea by **Cosic**, **Sarkalahti**, **Ambrozich**, and **Bunker**.

The starters averaged 34 minutes per game during the season. **Doug Richards** had the highest average: 35 minutes per game. **Moni Sarkalahti** had the best shooting percentage from the field, 54%, and **Cosic** was the most consistent free throw shooter, 81%.

Cosic's 36 points against Arizona in the Marriott Center was a season high for BYU, and **Brian Ambrozich's** 22 rebounds against Mil. Wisconsin was tops for a Cougar player during the season.

OFFICIAL ALL-CONFERENCE

For the third year in row, **Kresimir Cosic** was named to the official all-WAC team. It marked only the fourth time in the 11-year history of the conference that a player made first-team as sophomore, junior, and senior.

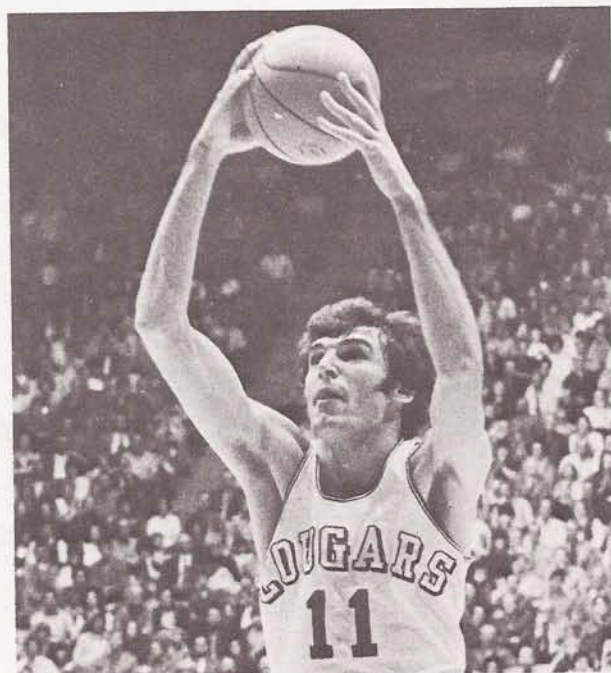
Junior guard **Doug Richards** was placed on the second team selected by the WAC basketball coaches, and **Brian Ambrozich** was honorable mention.

Two other members of the varsity, forward **Moni Sarkalahti** and guard **Belmont Anderson**, were first-team Academic all-conference.

ATTENDANCE

The attendance figure for the 1972-73 season was up on a total basis, but down on a per game basis. In all, the Cougars played before a total of 263,523 surpassing last year's home figures by about 2,000. But the home average of 18,823 was below the NCAA-record high set in the Marriott Center last season.

Interest in this year's club really warmed up during the heat of the WAC race, and a single game record was set during the Utah-BYU game in Provo, 22,987; just 13 short of 23,000.

wac basketball record: a byu success story

In the 11 years since the formation of the Western Athletic Conference, Brigham Young University has become the foremost basketball power in the league. The 11 year record of the WAC supports this position.

A comparison of the WAC basketball teams and records during this period brings out some interesting points: (a) the ups and downs of some teams, which is a somewhat natural consequence, and (b) the closeness of competition over the long haul, which is indicative of a well balanced basketball program within the conference.

CHAMPIONSHIPS WON

During the 11 years the WAC has been functioning, Brigham Young University has won or shared the championship five times. Starting in 1965, the Cougars have either won outright or shared the crown every other year; 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971, and 1972. In winning outright titles back to back in 1971 and 1972, the Cougars established a conference first. Arizona State has won two titles outright and shared one. New Mexico has won one and shared one. Wyoming has

shared the title twice, and Utah has one undisputed championship. Texas-El Paso won the title its first year as a member of the league (1970). Arizona and newcomer Colorado State are the only schools in the conference who haven't cracked the winner's circle.

OVERALL RECORDS

BYU also claims the best win-loss record during this period. Through the ins and outs the Cougars have been able to compile a 78-48 mark. A winning percentage of .614.

WAC HOME-ROAD RECORD

In the minds of many basketball buffs the real test of any team should be the home-road records over the 11 year pull. Here again the Cougars carry the edge among the six original members of the WAC. BYU has won more home games (55) and more road games (23) than any team in the league. Road wins have been notoriously hard to come by in the WAC, yet the Cougars have won over one-third of their road games in the conference play.

OFFENSE, SCORING MARGIN

The Cougars have also established themselves in the area of offense. BYU has led the WAC in scoring five different years (1963, 1964, 1965, 1967, and 1972). The Cougars hold the WAC season scoring average (92.4) and league field goal percentage mark (.49.1 in 1967). The single game records include BYU's 62 points in one half (against Utah in 1966) and 115 points in one game (Utah the same year).

A BACK TO BACK SEASON

In winning the 1972 Western Athletic Conference championship the Cougars turned in one of the best balanced performances in the history of the league. BYU led the conference in field goal percentage (.489), offensive average (81.0), free throw percentage (.723) and scoring margin (+9.3 per game). The Cougars also finished third in rebound percentage (.523) and third in team defense (71.7).

The Cougars' 12-2 league record in 1972 was also the most wins ever by a team in WAC play. They set additional record for most road wins in one season (5), most consecutive wins in one season (8) and most consecutive road wins over a two-year period (6).

COUGAR BASKETBALL POPULAR

1972 was the opening season for Cougar basketball in the mammoth Marriott Center (capacity approximately 22,700) and more people turned out to watch BYU play than ever before. In 12 home games the Cougars attracted a total of 261,815 fans for an average of 21,818 per game. In all, BYU played before a total of 357,287 spectators for an average of 14,434 per contest.

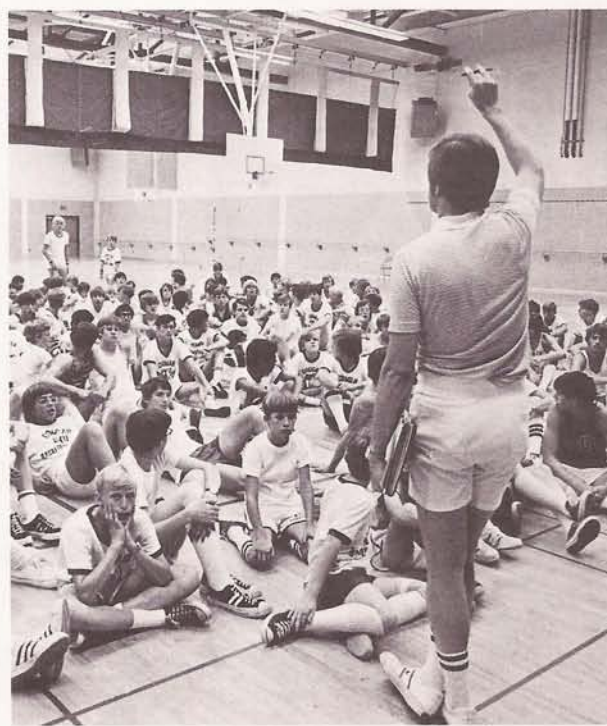
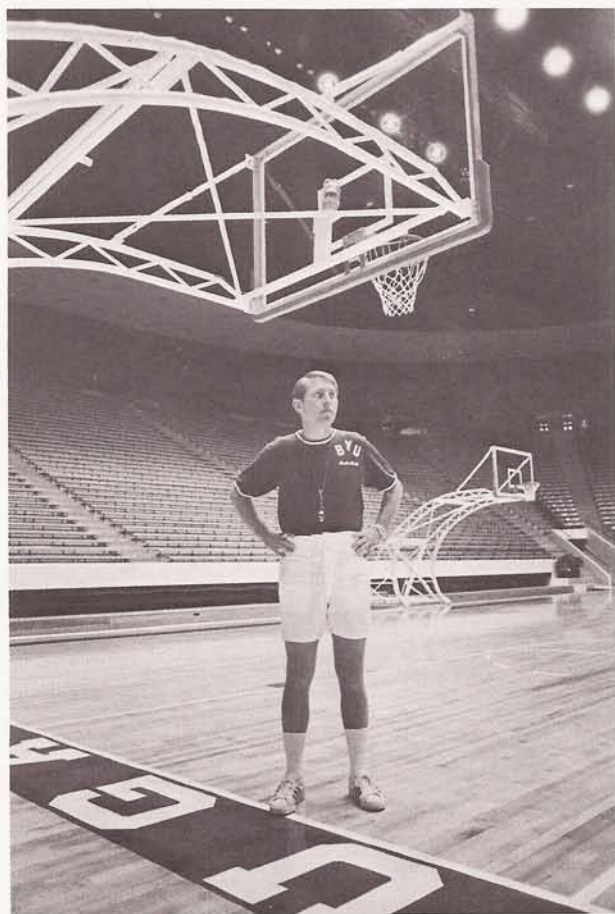
cougar basketball camp

The main press area is located on the west side of the stadium. The main press area is on the first (or lower) level with radio and scouts in the second level.

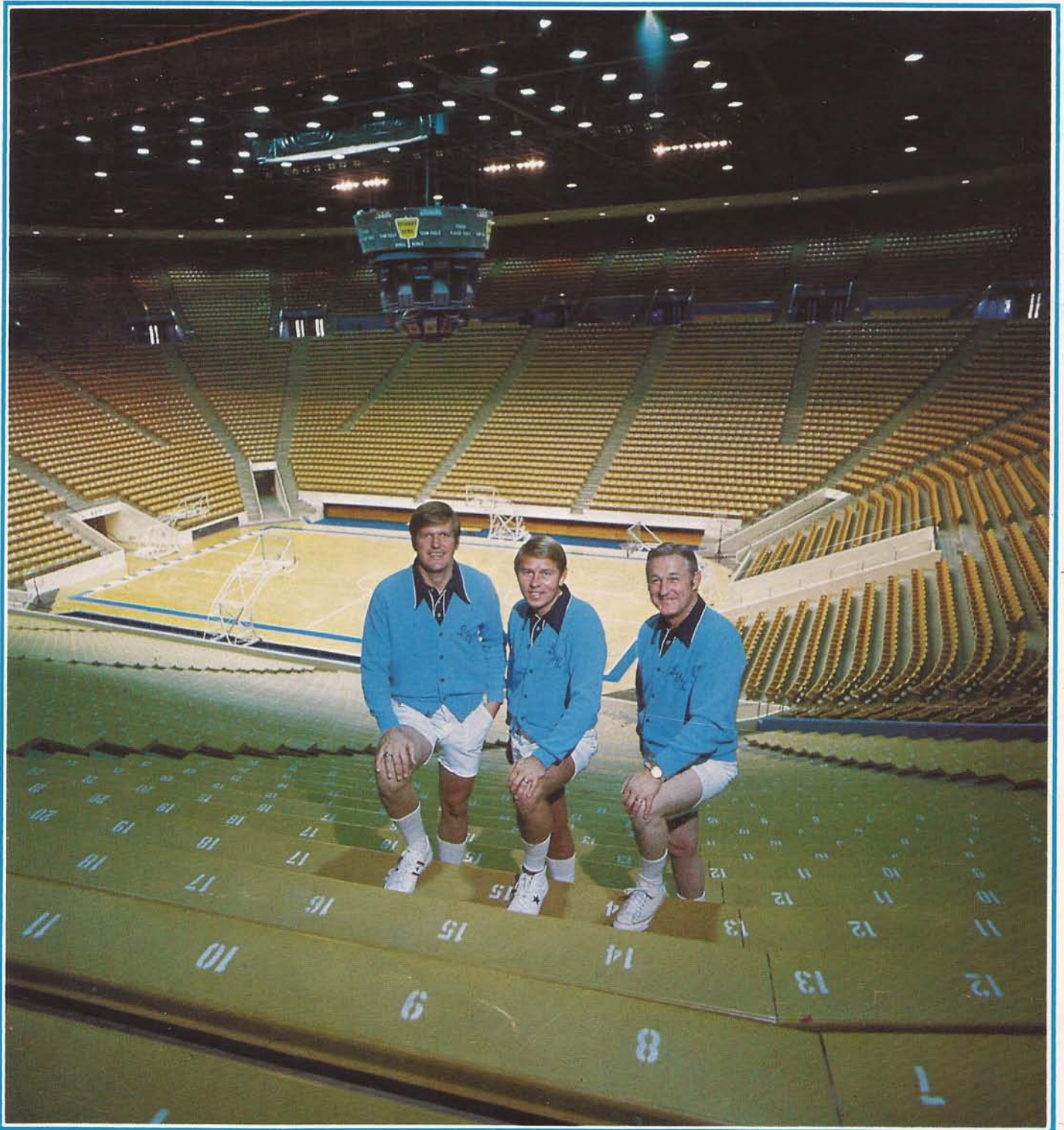
