Season Outlook

If anyone knows what the 1993-94 season holds for the BYU Cougars, please let Coach Roger Reid know.

Reid, who has shared the Western Athletic Conference title three times in four years and won the league tournament the other year, knows for certain he will put another hard-nosed defensive team on the floor and continue to stress the teamwork concept after losing some excellent players and having sophomore-to-be Shawn Bradley go to the NBA as the number-two selection.

The "44 million dollar man" left a gaping hole in BYU's plans and forced the Cougars to scramble for a replacement.

With two-time All-WAC center Gary Trost, school three-point leader Nick Sanderson and rugged rebound specialist Jared Miller graduated, BYU lost its three leading scorers as well as the number-five scorer, versatile Kevin Nixon.

A dependable reserve, 6-9 David Astle, also was a senior. He lettered four seasons for the Cougars.

The top returnees are 6-10 Russell Larson and 6-2 guard Randy Reid. But there might be more talent than meets the eye.

Steady Mark Durrant (6-7) started nearly half the games a year ago. Shane Knight (6-9) was an occasional starter. And 6-8 Kenneth Roberts, the "other freshman" with Bradley, started every game in 90-91.

Kurt Christensen, who averaged 16 minutes per game off the bench during the WAC season, adds some experience to the guard line. Shawn Lindquist, a 6-5 forward who saw limited action last season, has moved to guard and could provide some valuable minutes off the bench.

The newcomers are 6-5 Craig Wilcox, recruited out of high school by the Cougars before playing at Utah Valley, and 6-1 Robbie Reid, one of the top high school guards ever in Utah.

Reid turned down a professional baseball contract to walk on with the Cougars after the final scholarship went to 7-0 Australian Cory Reader. Subsequently, the NCAA ruled Reader must sit out this season before playing his final two years.

Robbie Reid, Christensen and Randy Reid are interchangeable at point guard. Wilcox could replace Sanderson at the shooting guard spot but Randy Reid will see action there also. Reid improved throughout his freshman year and started all but one game (seniors started in the final home game).

Larson is the honors' candidate coming off seasons when he was WAC Freshman of the Year and when he set a school record with a .631 field goal percentage.

The smooth power forward has added 20 pounds and should improve on the 10.8 scoring average he had last year.

The much-talked-about center spot could go to Jay Thompson, a 6-8 leaper BYU recruited out of Hagerstown Junior College in Maryland after Bradley's decision to turn pro after a church mission.

Thompson average 12.3 points and 6.7 rebounds last year after an impressive background in Philadelphia. In addition to Thompson, 6-9 John Fish, a three-year letterman, is back.

Three other players add to a welcomed problem for Reid. Jeff Campbell, an excellent shooter at 6-9, played in 18 games as a freshman behind Roberts three years ago. He is back from a church mission, as is 6-8 Grant Berges, who was recruited out of high school but didn't enroll.

Another center prospect is 6-10 Bret Jepsen, who broke his wrist early in the fall but was able to do some conditioning prior to the start of practice.

Under Coach Reid, BYU has been to four straight NCAA Tournaments and won two WAC Tournament titles besides the three regular-season championships.

Last year's team was the first one of his four picked to win. The others were picked sixth, fifth and fourth but clawed their way to records of 11-5, 11-5 and 12-4 (last year was 15-3).

On paper, it looks like this season's version will be hard pressed to match last year's 25-9 team, which upset Oklahoma and Memphis State, and stayed with highly ranked Kansas until the final five minutes.

But Coach Reid has never gone by paper and is determined to prove his coaching prowess all over again considering the loss of Bradley.

In fact, the enthusiastic former BYU player stopped talking about that situation months ago.

He might even like the fact no one expects his team to challenge for league honors again.

The schedule, always a challenge in the hotly-contested WAC, includes three ESPN appearances, games with talented Arizona State and South Carolina, and a possible matchup with defending national champion North Carolina.

Best Time To Call Coach Reid: 11 a.m.

By the fifth year Roger Reid planned for his program to be flying high and vying for national honors with a 7-6 center.

The first part of the plan has materialized with Coach Reid and his staff achieving a 92-38 record (.708) in four seasons which have included three Western Athletic Conference titles and two WAC Tournament championships.

But Reid, who went out and won 21 games his first year with a 6-7 center, will reload for 1993-94 now that the shock has worn off of losing Shawn Bradley, who passed up his final three years of eligibility to become the number-two selection in the National Basketball Association draft.

Time and victories have proven Reid will keep succeeding despite the name changes and players coming and going for missionary work.

Ironically, the only year the Cougars didn't win the WAC under Reid was in 1990-91 with Bradley playing. And, even then, BYU was runner-up.

The energetic, ultra-positive former pro baseball player became the 11th head coach in BYU history in March, 1989.

He tied for the Western Athletic Conference title (21-9) with a team picked sixth. He was WAC Coach of the Year and District Coach of the Year by both the coaches and media.

His team set a school record for three-point shooting and was eighth in the nation in that category. Home attendance averaged more than 19,000 to watch a 15-0 season.

His team had wins over NCAA participants Alabama-Birmingham, Texas-El Paso and Colorado State and victories over NIT participants Arizona State, Hawaii, New Mexico and Tulsa. Six of the nine losses were to teams in post-season action.

Only an errant alley-oop shot in the final sec-

onds kept the Cougars from upsetting heavily favored Clemson in the NCAA Tournament.

The 1991 team featured Bradley, who was named to the nation's All-Freshman Team and set a frosh record for blocked shots with 5.2. He was MVP of the WAC Tournament, which BYU won for the first time ever.

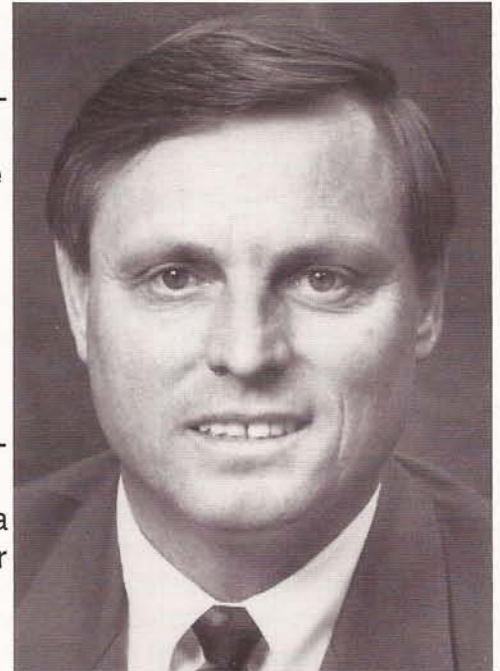
Coach Reid's team--picked fifth in the WAC--finished second and then defeated Virginia in the NCAA Tournament in going 21-13. The third year BYU was 25-7, tying for the regular season title and winning the tournament again. Last year's 25-9 included another tie for the WAC crown.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, arrived at BYU in 1978--when the Cougars were coming off five losing seasons. During his first year as an assistant BYU won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons as an assistant, BYU averaged 20 wins a year and won four WAC titles.

The 46-year-old Reid also had been coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts since he joined the staff. He worked under Frank Arnold as a graduate assistant for a few months and then was five seasons as an assistant coach.

In the six years with Ladell Andersen, Roger was responsible for BYU's defensive schemes as the assistant head coach.

He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics in Australia for three weeks.

Reid has been on the NABC committee to plan the national convention as well as on the Awards Committee. He is the WAC representative on a committee to interface with the national group.

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game.

Reid enrolled at BYU in 1964 and played freshman basketball and baseball. In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to Carbon College (now the College of Eastern Utah), where he was a standout in both sports. He was the team's MVP in baseball and named a Junior College All-American.

Reid moved to Weber State and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. He also was all-conference in baseball two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a short-stop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves farm systems, advancing to AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as the basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High. His basketball record was 50-26 in three seasons and his baseball teams were 35-11.

In 1974, he moved to Clearfield (Utah) High and took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years and was 60-24.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was 6-4.

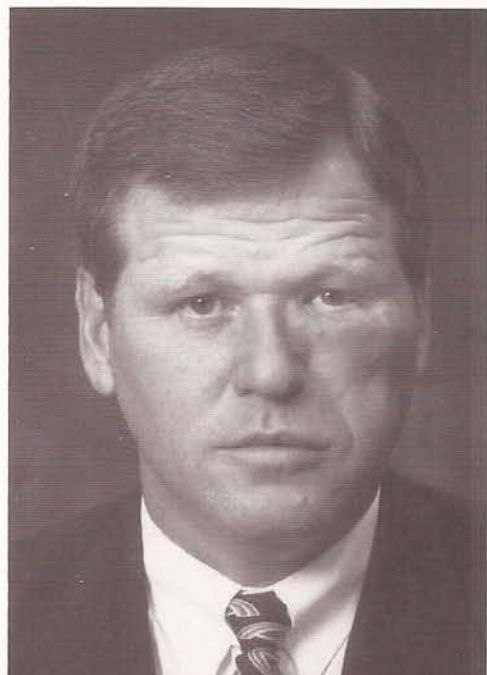
Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have three sons and a daughter: Randy, 23, who started for the Cougars last season as a freshman; Robbie, 19, a freshman member of this year's team; Darren, 13; and Kelli Ann, 11.

He has served as first counselor in an LDS Church bishopric and also functioned on a stake high council.

In April, 1990, he had both hips replaced.



Tony Ingle



Tony L. Ingle came to the Cougars in 1989 after a year at Alabama-Huntsville and says there is only one reason he gave up a head coaching job to be an assistant-- Roger Reid.

"There is nobody else I could be an

assistant coach for on the collegiate level. Roger and I have the same values. I understand where he's coming from and he understands where I am coming from. I really put a lot of faith in Roger and the BYU program."

Their friendship started in Atlanta at the NCAA Regional in 1981, when they met the day Danny Ainge made the winning basket against Notre Dame.

Ingle was born June 11, 1952, in Dalton, Georgia, and graduated from North Whitfield High School.

At Dalton Junior College he was student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards.

The 1971-72 team won 34 straight games and was ranked as high as second in the NJCAA polls. The 1972-73 team was ranked as high as fifth. In two years his teams had a 61-10 record.

Transferring to Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain two years. He received a degree in physical education (1976) with a minor in biology and earned a master's degree (P.E.-'80) at North Georgia.

He returned to his old high school in Dalton in 1976 as an assistant. By then it had been renamed Northwest Whitfield.

Ingle went to Southeast Whitfield for a year as head coach before moving to Cherokee High (Canton, Ga.), where he was 107-47 in seven seasons from 1978-85. He was the Atlanta Journal and Constitution AAAA Coach of the Year in 1982.

In three years (1985-88) as head coach at Gordon Junior College (Barnesville, Ga.), he was 60-33. His teams scored more than 100 points 23 times and made the state playoffs each year. After going 18-11, 21-10 and 21-12 and being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club JC Coach of the Year in 1988, he moved to Alabama-Huntsville.

His 10-18 first-year record was the school's most wins in five years and eight of the losses were to nationally ranked Division II schools or Division I teams.

Ingle has directed dozens of basketball camps and worked at the BYU camp several times prior to becoming a Cougar coach.

Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Elliott (18), Sunshine (15), Golden (12), Tony, Jr. (11), and Israel (9). They live in Orem.

The children have performed basketball dribbling and ball-handling routines as the "Little Nuggets" at halftime shows for a number of NBA games. They also have a half-hour video tape (Dribbling to Dreams) on basketball skills.

"The Little Nuggets have retired," Tony explains about his family's entertainment activities. "The demands of recruiting and of our schedule made it too hard to be flying around the country doing halftimes."

A comedian who could rival successful nightclub performers if he weren't so committed to coaching, Ingle jokes about a lot of things but he's serious about the Little Nuggets--and about BYU's recruiting.

Charles Bradley

It's no wonder Charles Bradley is such a hit at BYU. It was like he always had been a part of Cougar basketball.

Charles W. Bradley was born May 16, 1959, in Havre de Grace, Maryland, and graduated from Edgewood High in 1977.

The former first-round draft pick played two years with the Boston Celtics and one year with the Seattle SuperSonics. He played college ball four years at Wyoming (1977-81), coached one year for the Cowboys (1986-87) and coached two years at San Diego State (1987-89).

During his senior year at Wyoming in 1981 he earned All-America and Academic All-American honors. He was MVP at the Pizza Hut All-Star Game after earning All-WAC honors three times.

He was a four-year starter who averaged 17 points and shot 53 percent from the field.

Bradley earned a B.A. degree in elementary education in 1981 and received a teacher's cer-

tificate. He is currently working toward his master's degree in Education Leadership.

In 1986, Jim Brandenburg hired him as an assistant at Wyoming and the Cowboys the WAC Tournament with a 24-10 record. They defeated Virginia and UCLA before bowing to top-ranked Nevada-Las Vegas in NCAA regional action.

Bradley went to San Diego State with Brandenburg in 1987 and his recruits helped turn a 5-25 team to one which went 12-17 and upset nationally ranked BYU.

When Coach Reid was appointed, he contacted Bradley about becoming the first assistant ever to coach at three WAC schools.

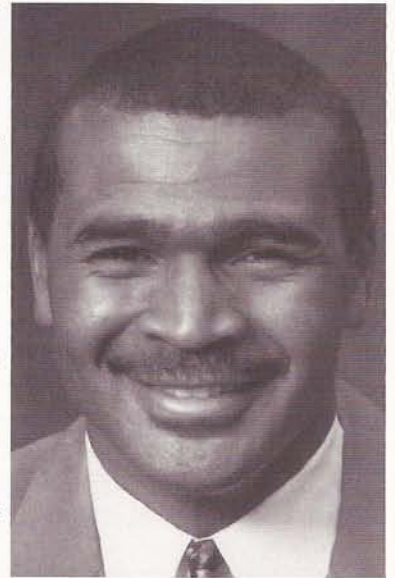
"We have one of the fine basketball coaches in the area in Charles Bradley," says Coach Roger Reid. "He's a great asset to our program and he understands what it takes. Charles is a great asset to Cougar basketball."

"I've always been impressed by the BYU players, fans and people in the community," says Bradley. "The University has a great basketball tradition and I enjoy working with Coach Reid and Coach (Tony) Ingle."

Charles and his wife, Suzanne, settled in Denver after their marriage in 1984. There he coached the freshman team at Mullen High School and was involved in sales and marketing for Pizza Hut.

The Bradleys have four daughters: Taryn, 7; Alexa, 5; Brynn, 3; and Kiah, born Oct. 27. They live in Orem.

Charles currently serves on the NABC Assistant Coaches' Committee. He also is an avid jogger and biker, and enjoys golf.



Cougar Assistants

Jeff Reinert, is in his third season as the part-time coach after two seasons as a graduate assistant at Nebraska.

A native of Bellingham, Wash., Jeff played two seasons at New Mexico (1980-82) before transferring to Gonzaga, where he was John Stockton's teammate.

Reinert, who married Trisha Laeger of Hemingford, Neb., in May, 1992, received a degree in physical education in 1985.

After playing and coaching two seasons in Australia, he was an assistant two years at Simpson College in Iowa and served at the intramural director and women's golf coach. He received a master's degree in educational administration from Drake in 1988. He is working towards a doctorate at BYU.

Head trainer George Curtis will be working with the men's basketball program this season.

Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a full accredited, internationally recognized university with a day-time enrollment of more than 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation.

The campus is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, in Provo, Utah, a city of 92,000 in a valley of 300,000 people. It is situated 4,560 feet above sea level at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range.

The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the northeast and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.

In addition to Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and at the Jerusalem Center in Israel.

Although 98 percent of the student body belongs to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from more than 25 other denominations and about 25 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Church in another country.

A new museum of art opened this year and a science building is under construction. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theaters, nine pipe organs, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio.

Highly respected programs include the J. Reuben Clark Law School, the Marriott School of Management, the Ezra Taft Benson Institute (helping solve the world's food problems), the Lee Library with

more than two million volumes, and the computer-aided design and computer-aided manufacturing programs.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees and the university is accredited by more than 100 educational, business, professional and government organizations.



Admission standards continue to rise as competition increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is 27 and the average grade point for new students is 3.7.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four credit hours are spent in studying the Book of Mormon, a text regarded as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility which is unusually clean and well-kept.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many people point to the character of the students and faculty and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes.

Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste--all in accord with the tenets of the sponsoring church.

BYU became a university on Oct. 23, 1903. After two downtown locations, work began on the current campus in 1909.

Campus Leaders

President Rex E. Lee

Rex E. Lee, a former Solicitor General of the United States, has been BYU's president since 1989.

He currently chairs a special NCAA committee, which includes former Chief Justice Warren Burger, to review rules enforcement and the infractions process.

He has argued 60 cases before the U.S. Supreme Court in his private appellate practice and while a partner in the Washington, D.C., law firm of Sidley & Austin.

Lee, 58, is a 1960 graduate of BYU and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He also holds five honorary Doctor of Law degrees and has served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court.

He was born in Los Angeles on Feb. 27, 1935, to Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Pres. Lee was born and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway and moved to St. Johns, Arizona.

Lee was the first Eagle Scout in the town and later served a church mission in Mexico from 1955-58.

He is married to the former Janet Griffin and they are the parents of seven children and have six grandchildren. One of the sons, Mike, is BYU's student body president.

Pres. Lee was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU from 1971-75 and worked in the Department of Justice two years before being Solicitor General four years.

He has been the holder of the George Sutherland Chair of Law at BYU since returning in 1985.

Dr. R. J. Snow Student Life Vice President

Dr. R.J. Snow is in his fourth year at BYU after serving as a mission president in South Africa three years.

He was born in St. George, Utah, and attended elementary school there before moving to Washington, D.C. He returned to attend Dixie College, obtaining an associate degree in 1957.

After a church mission in France, he obtained bachelor's (1962) and master's degrees (1964) from the University of Utah.



Dr. Snow completed another master's degree and a doctoral degree (1967) at Northwestern and did post-doctoral work at Oregon and Harvard.

He taught political science at UC-Santa Barbara from 1967-73 and from 1973-84 taught at Utah, where he also was Director of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and then Vice President of University Relations and Student Affairs.

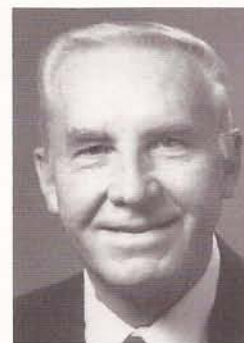
He was in private business three years before going to South Africa. Dr. Snow has been active in a variety of civic organizations and community service groups, including board member of the Utah Symphony, LDS Hospital, Salt Lake and Provo United Way, and the Provo-Orem Chamber of Commerce.

He is married to the former Marilyn Melville and they are the parents of four children, including two BYU students, and have a grandchild.

Dr. Clayne Jensen Athletic Director

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his first year as athletic director but in his third as Associate Student Life Vice President over men's and women's athletes.

He was the NCAA Faculty Representative 17 years and Dean of the College of Physical Education from 1973-91.

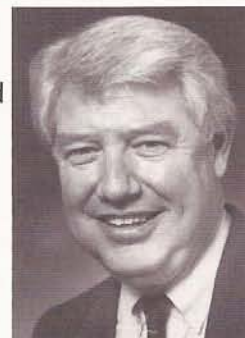


He was a member of the WAC Council 17 years, serving on a number of committees and was on the High Country Athletic Conference Council eight years. Dr. Jensen was a member of the NCAA Governing Council from 1985-89 and has been a member of seven NCAA committees.

A native of Gunnison, Utah, Jensen obtained bachelor's (1952) and master's degrees (1956) from the University of Utah and a doctorate (1963) from Indiana.

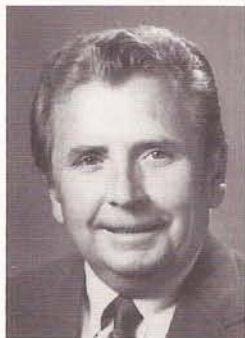
From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps and coached two All-Marine championship track teams. He taught at Utah State from 1956-64.

Athletic Personnel

Pete Witbeck, Asso. AD



Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics for 44 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. He acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the state of Utah.

As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980. After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant.

During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and was nationally ranked. He has been the right hand to the athletic director since 1972.

Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering. They have three children.

Mike King, Asst. to AD-Finance

Mike King has been the Cougars' business manager for 14 years and became an assistant AD in 1989. He had been controller and director of financial services at BYU-Hawaii.

King was athletic business manager at Idaho State from 1974-78 and managed the ISU Minidome from 1970-74.



He received a B.A. degree at Idaho State in 1970. Mike, an LDS bishop at BYU, is married to the former Jeannette Bertoch, and they have four children.

Val Hale, Asst. to AD-Public Relations



Val Hale is in his fifth year as assistant to the athletic director for media and public relations. He has the responsibility of overseeing the Sports Information operation and coordinating public relations, marketing and promotional efforts.

Hale has been assistant director of BYU Development, where he supervised and managed fund-raising efforts in several clubs and academic areas. He was promotions and publications coordinator for the Athletic Department from 1982 through 1987.

He was a cum laude graduate at BYU in 1981 and received his M.A. degree in communications in 1987. Val and his wife, the former Nancy Allred, have three children. He serves as an LDS bishop in Orem.

Ralph Zobell, Sports Information Dir.

Cougar Club

BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations. Its membership of more than 4,000 makes it twice as large as any other booster organization in the league.

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and pre-season basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at an annual banquet and with an Athletic Hall of Fame.

Other assistance includes providing tutorial help, purchasing special non-budgeted equipment, providing post eligibility scholarships, and sponsoring satellite broadcasts and television replays.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. In return, contributors receive passes for parking, football and basketball yearbooks, monthly newsletters and other benefits.

The executive director since 1975 has been Dale McCann, a business management graduate of BYU (1966). He attended West High in Salt Lake City and worked for General Dynamics and at Signetics prior to his current job. He is married to the former Andrea Schmidt and they have 10 children.

KSL-TV

KSL Television, the CBS affiliate in Salt Lake City, has televised a number of BYU basketball games in recent years.

Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of the University of Kansas, provides play-by-play for the fans.

Color commentary is provided by Jay Cheesman, who played center for the Cougars from 1974-77. He was All-WAC in 1976 and earned second team all-conference honors in 1977.

The sports director is Doug Miller.

KSL Radio

For more than 42 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The "Voice" of the Cougars is play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 43 years' experience. An Ogden High and Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio

and Television in July of 1965. This is his 29th season doing BYU games.

Paul Ruffner, BYU's center from 1968-70, provides the color commentary. He was second team All-WAC in 1969. The next season he had 37 points and 18 rebounds in a game against Georgia.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar basketball. Some away games are carried live and all home games are shown at 10:30 p.m. by Channel 11.

The play-by-play announcer is veteran Jay Mosen, BYU's electronic media coordinator for the athletic department, and commentary is provided by former BYU All-American Tom Steinke, now the athletic director at Westminster College.

Mosen graduated from BYU in 1957 and began a radio career at KSUB in Cedar City. He was at KSL in Salt Lake City prior to coming to BYU in 1972. He is in his 22nd year announcing BYU sports.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western U.S.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by ESPN, TBS, Prime Ticket, the Utah Jazz Network, USA Network, SportsChannel and local affiliates.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals for demanding standards.

Traveling with an expert of full-time engineers and technicians, the KBYU truck has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment with state-of-the-art cameras, long lenses, one-inch and 3/4-inch tape machines, video monitoring, special effects and Chyron graphics.

Blue & White Network

This year, basketball is being added to football telecasts, which already are syndicated to television viewers in 49 states, including more than 40 million households.

The network began in 1989 in partnership with the Air Force Academy. Owned and operated by KBYU in Provo, the Blue & White Sports Network includes cable systems and stations from Hawaii to Maine.

The Blue & White Sports Network is one of the largest university-owned syndication networks in the country.

Marriott Center

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball facilities.

Kentucky's Rupp Arena is a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington and located off the campus. Two other arenas--at Tennessee and North Carolina--also are in the 23,000-seat range.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, nearly six million fans have watched BYU basketball games. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,506--set during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked fourth nationally with an average of 20,471 per game. Only Syracuse (25,351), Kentucky (23,929), North

Carolina (20,952) and BYU averaged more than 20,000 per contest.

A new addition to the Marriott Center last season was an eight-sided 26-foot wide by 16-foot high scoreboard which features four large video walls designed to show live game action and instant replays. In addition, the scoreboard has four fully animated matrix boards.

The video screens are made up of 16 video cubes containing a projector and operated by a processor which creates a large number of special-effect capabilities.

In addition to men's and women's basketball games, the video display board is used for devotionals, forums, firesides and selected other activities in the Marriott Center.

The Marriott Center also has a lighting system capable of providing 250-foot candles of illumination.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs. It also has been used many times for state high school tournaments.

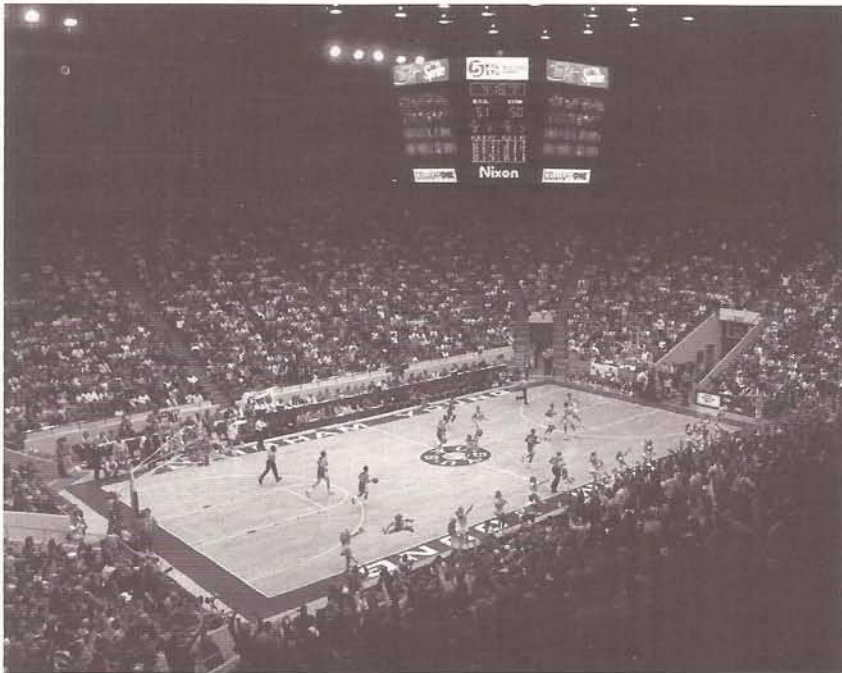
Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses eight million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides six locker rooms, the Marriott Center houses coaches' offices and the special events staff. It also serves as ticket headquarters for major campus events and includes a hospitality room, player's lounge, training room, weight room, video room and a Cougar Club room.

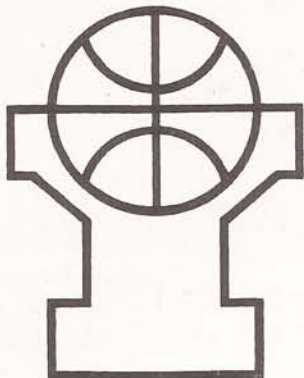
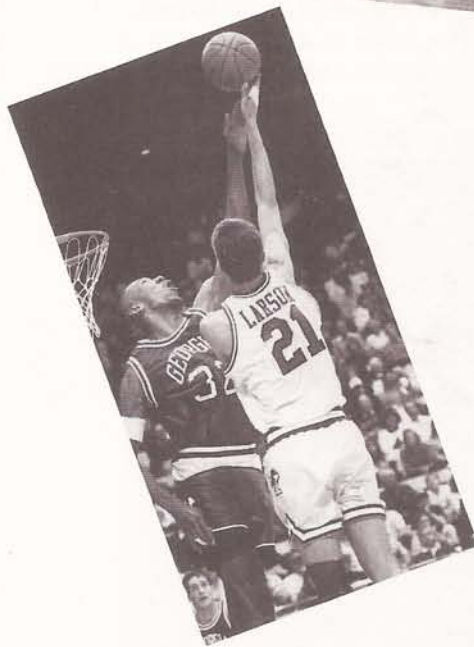

BYU finished at the top of the Western Athletic Conference for the third time in four years, won 25 games for the second straight year and appeared in its fourth straight NCAA Tournament during a 1992-93 season which saw the Cougars place in the top four in attendance.

An average of 20,471 fans saw the Cougars finish 25-9 with upsets over nationally ranked Oklahoma and Memphis State and go 15-3 in the WAC against ranked teams like New Mexico, Texas-El Paso and Utah.

BYU defeated Southwest Conference champ Southern Methodist in the NCAA Midwest first round before losing to Final Four participant Kansas.

With his three league titles, Coach Reid has won more WAC crowns than any coach except Don Haskins (7), Stan Watts (5) and Ned Wulk (4).

Gary Trost was the All-WAC center for the second straight season and was all-district and honorable mention All-America. He was on the all-tournament team at the Far West Classic.

Russell Larson set a school record for field goal percentage at .631 and Nick Sanderson set school records for three-point attempts in a season (209) and career (350). Both were honorable mention All-WAC along with Jared Miller.

Trost finished with the second-best field goal percentage in school history (.566) and Miller is now third (.556). Sanderson has the fourth-best free throw shooting at .826. He also was the MVP of the Cougar Classic. Randy Reid was on the all-tournament team.



Kurt Christensen became a steady reserve on the guard line.

BYU set a school record for scoring and a Marriott Center mark for scoring margin with a 128-78 win over Sacramento State. The Cougars' 13-game winning streak was the nation's second longest.

Hoop History

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached until 1925. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that would eliminate a jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating

capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site

for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

In 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a tempo-

rary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. Utah graciously offered its home floor--the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse. Non-league games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away. As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in New York City.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December of 1971 with a sellout crowd. The average attendance that year was more than 21,000.

Western Athletic Conference

Now in its 32nd year, the Western Athletic Conference is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of its member institutions.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's 10 members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features.

The WAC traditionally ranks in the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. Last year, BYU ranked fourth nationally in per-game attendance, New Mexico was seventh and Utah 25th.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But, on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year; the Air Force Academy entered in 1980; and Fresno State in 1992.

The WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney,

who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Margie McDonald, director of the High Country Athletic Conference until it became part of the WAC in 1991, is deputy commissioner. Jeff Hurd serves as associate commissioner while Dee Anne Menzies is assistant commissioner.

Dan Willis is associate director of communications and Vicki Boillot is assistant director in that area.

Bobby Dibler is the new supervisor of basketball officials. Dibler, a 1965 graduate of Texas-El Paso, succeeds Guy Gibbs, who retired following last season, his 10th since taking over from Irv Brown in 1983.

Dibler was a junior college All-American in Amarillo before playing at UTEP. He has officiated in six conferences and in 15 consecutive NCAA Tournaments. Dibler worked the championship games in 1982 and 1985.

The WAC is located at 14 West Dry Creek Circle, Littleton, Colorado 80120. It has been in the Denver area since the conference's beginning, with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66. The telephone number for the WAC office is (303) 795-1962.
