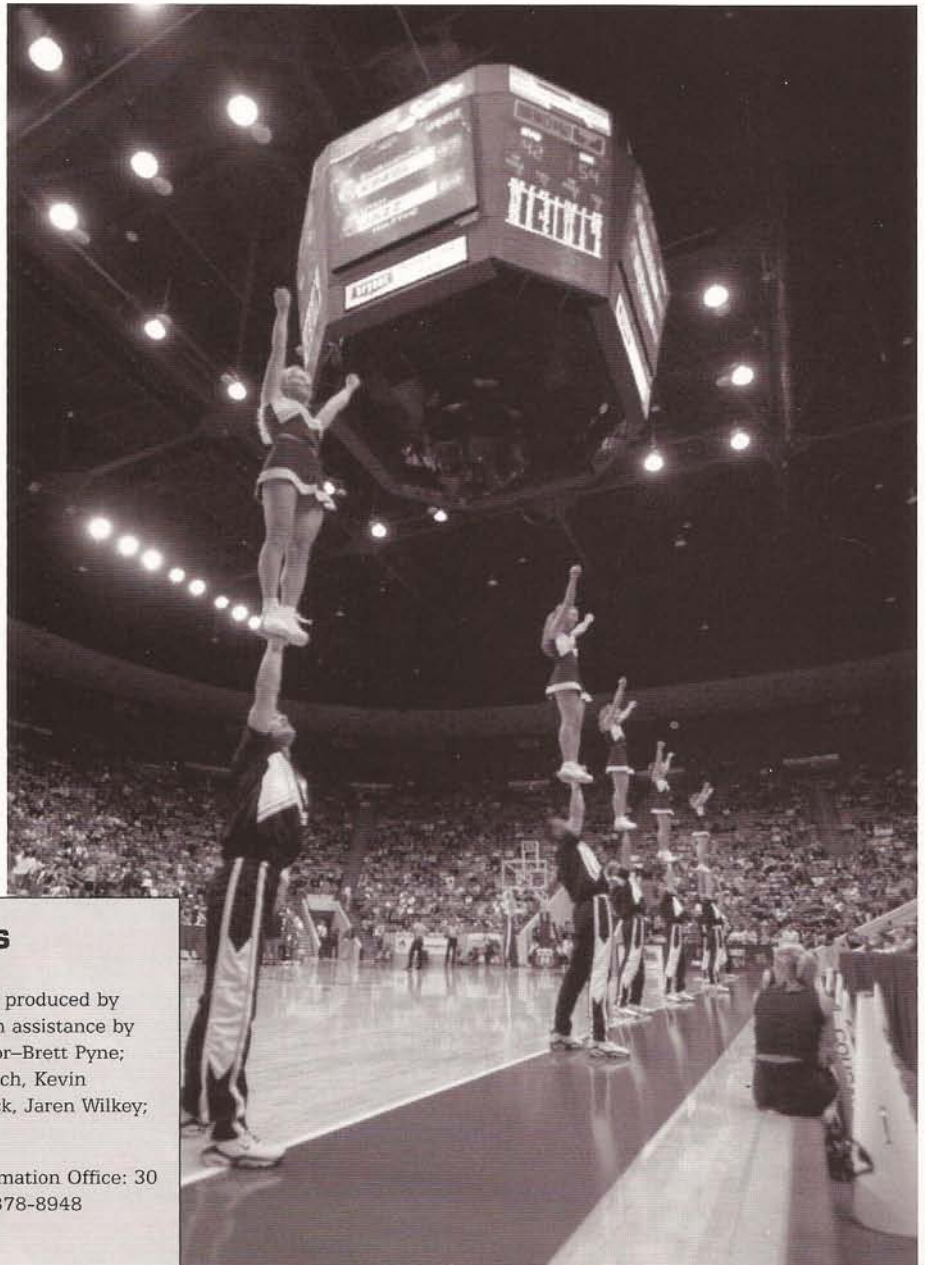

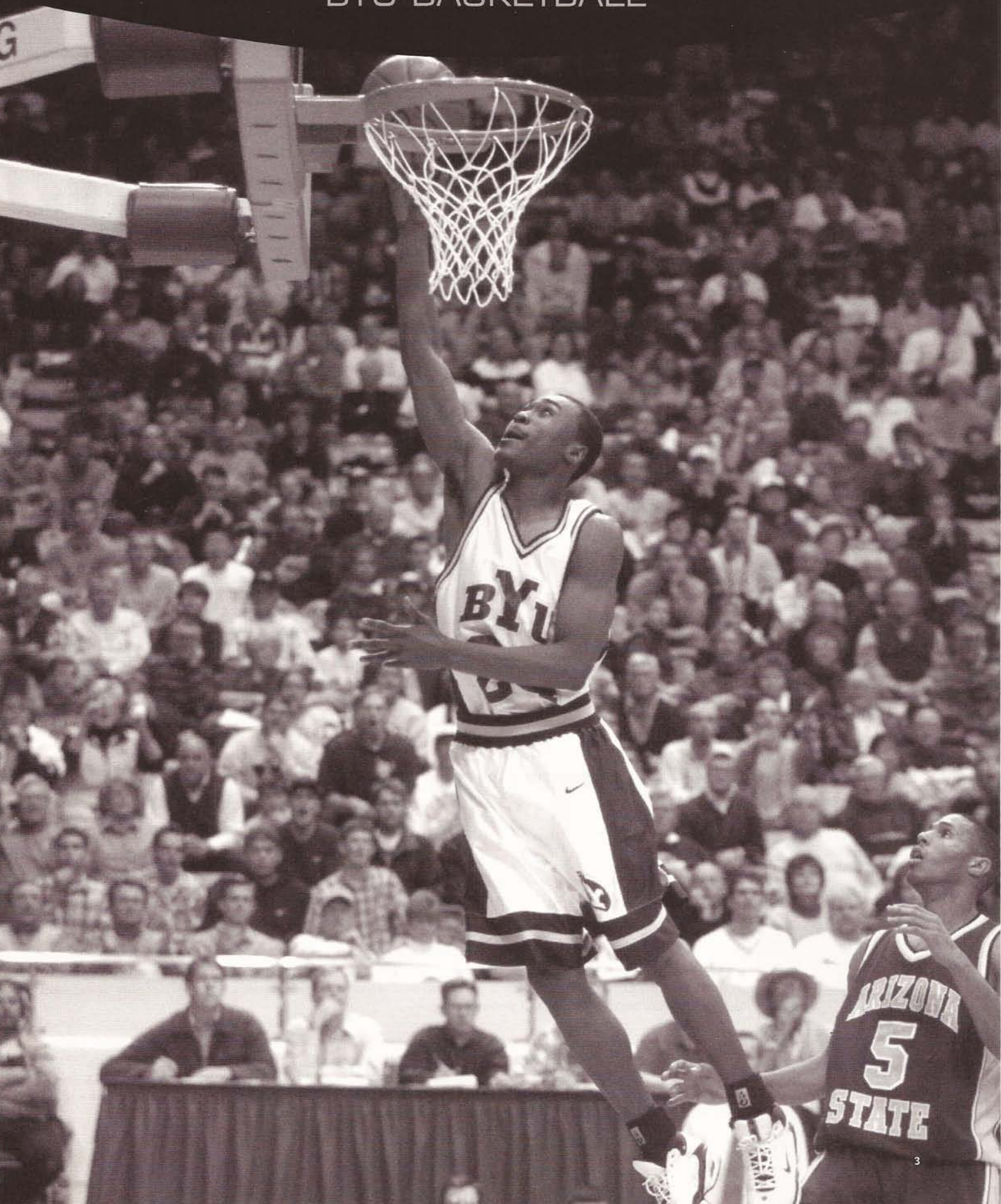

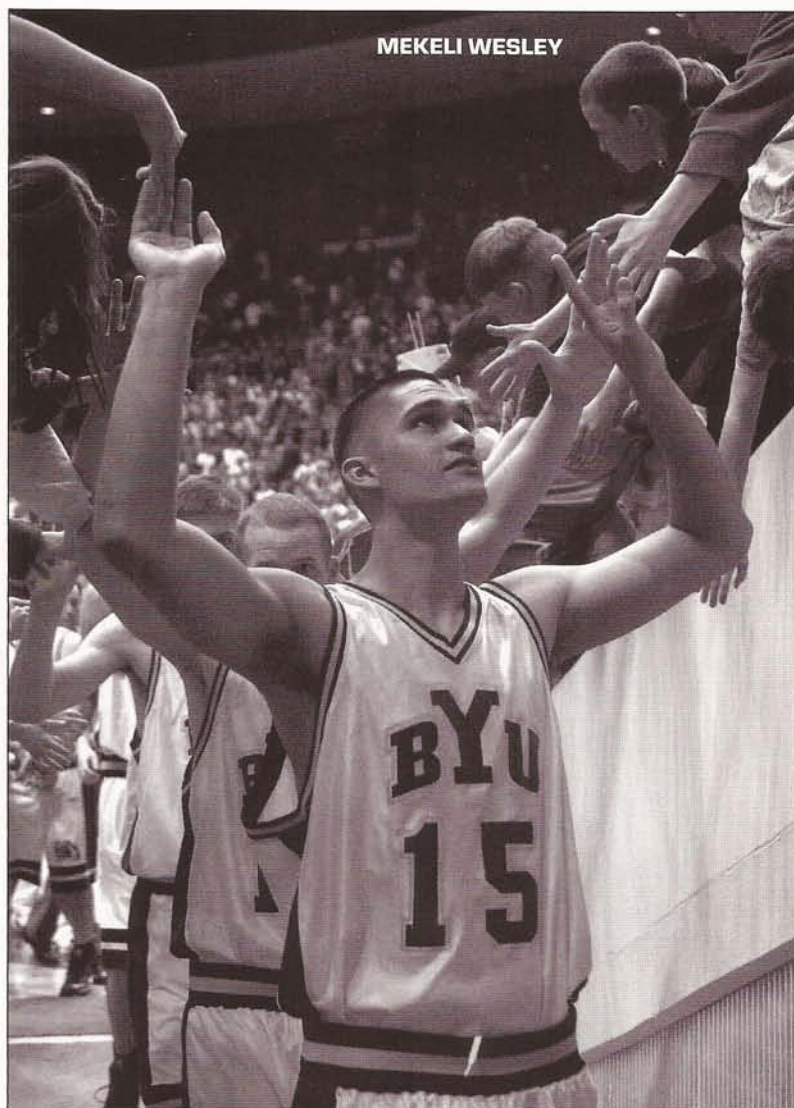
2000-01 SEASON

BYU BASKETBALL



With five key contributors returning from last year's 22-11 team and an influx of talented freshmen and transfers, the BYU basketball team is poised to make a run for its first NCAA tournament berth since 1995.

"Our goal will be the same every year – to qualify for the NCAA Tournament and win a Mountain West Conference championship," said BYU head coach Steve Cleveland, who enters his fourth year in Provo with a 43-48 record. "Those have to be our expectations.



T A K I N G I T T O T H E NEXT LEVEL

We don't want to talk about rebuilding any longer. We had a good year last year and turned some corners but we are anything but satisfied. The Mountain West Conference is going to be very tough this year but I think we have the potential to be one of the league's top teams. I look forward to coaching these fine young men."

BYU's roster in 2000-2001 includes depth at nearly every position for the first time in Cleveland's four-year tenure. With the exception of starting guard Michael Vranes, who will now miss the season due to a foot injury, BYU returns five other key contributors, including four starters, from last year's NIT quarterfinals team, headlined by seniors Mekeli Wesley and Terrell Lyday.

Lyday and Wesley averaged 17.1 and 16.8 points per game, respectively, last season and should again lead the Cougar effort in 2000-2001. Wesley and Lyday each scored in double figures in all but three games last season while accounting for 48.2 percent of the Cougars' total points and 51.6 percent of their conference points. Lyday had a string of 21 straight games in double digits and Wesley 18 consecutive. Wesley earned second-team All-Mountain West Conference honors and Lyday was named the MWC Newcomer of the Year.

But BYU's talented senior duo shouldn't have to carry the same load as last year. With four other players with starting experience returning as well as a top-20 recruiting class and several key transfers, BYU has the talent and depth to compete with a variety of lineups on the court. Inexperience will be the Cougars' biggest concern with many of its talented newcomers playing division I basketball for the first time.

A position-by-position look at this year's team reveals the players and potential combinations to anticipate on the court for BYU this season.

POINT GUARD

Vranes being out for the year with a foot injury complicates the point guard position for the Cougars, especially in the early going before transfer Trent Whiting joins the mix on Dec. 16th. Vranes, who averaged 8.0 points, 4.1 rebounds and 2.8 assists last year, started at point his freshman season and played both guard positions last year, starting the final eight games at point when the Cougars made their run with several big wins in the MWC and NIT tournaments. Vranes will also be missed because he became the Cougars' top perimeter

defender. Matt Montague returns and will play a role at the point, while junior college walk-on Ty Shippen could factor in and Lyday may see some time at the point instead of his usual shooting-guard spot.

Montague has two years of starting experience at BYU. He started all 26 games as a pre-missionary freshman in 1996-97 and returned to start in 19 of 33 games last year at the point. The 6-foot junior from Kentucky led BYU in assists last year with a 3.8 average, second in the MWC, while adding 3.0 points and 2.6 rebounds per game. A hard-nosed competitor and solid floor leader, Montague is fighting an achilles injury that hampered him part of last year.

Trent Whiting played five games at Utah last season before being slowed by an injury. He decided to transfer to BYU to complete his college career. At 6-foot-1, Whiting is an explosive athlete who can finish plays at the basket while also being a real threat from behind the arc. The Kuna, Idaho, native sees the floor well and has the athletic ability to be a solid defender on the perimeter. At Snow College, Whiting was a finalist for NJCAA Player of the

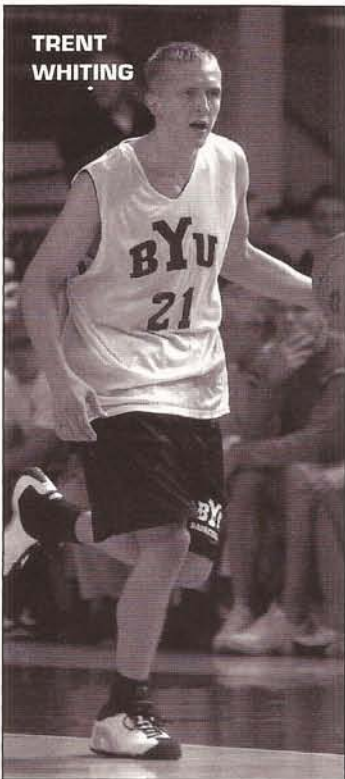
Year while averaging 18.4 points, 5.8 rebounds, 5.2 assists, 3.4 steals and shooting 50 percent from three-point range. Whiting could see time at both guard positions after he becomes eligible to compete for the Cougars on Dec. 16.

Shippen was named a Region 18 honorable mention player at Ricks College, where he was a two-year team captain and started every game. An intelligent player with a nice shot, Shippen made 95 percent of his free throws his sophomore year at Ricks.

SHOOTING GUARD

The 2-guard spot will be one of the Cougars' strengths this year with MWC Player of the Year candidate Lyday returning for his senior campaign. Other solid players will provide Lyday with time to catch his breath.

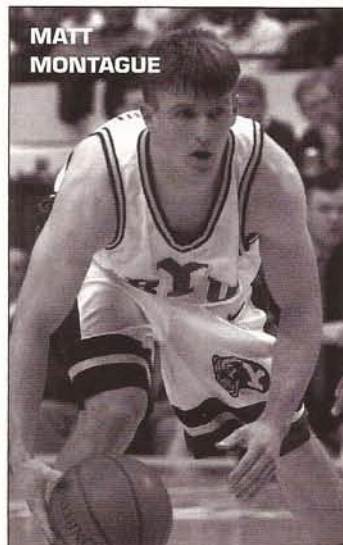
Lyday proved his was a Division I star-in-the-making last season after transferring from Fresno City College. Whether knifing to the basket or sinking a long-range jumper, the 6-foot-3 guard was an offensive threat any time he touched the ball. He led the Cougars in scoring at 17.1 points per game while adding 4.0 rebounds and setting a BYU record by making a three-pointer in 21 consecutive games. Named the MWC Newcomer of the Year, Lyday is also a strong defender who led the confer-

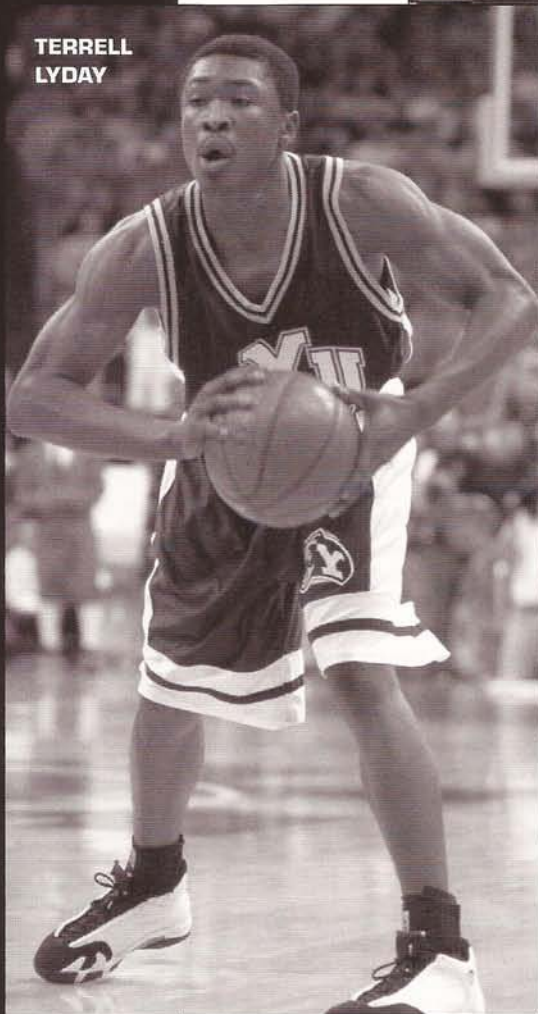

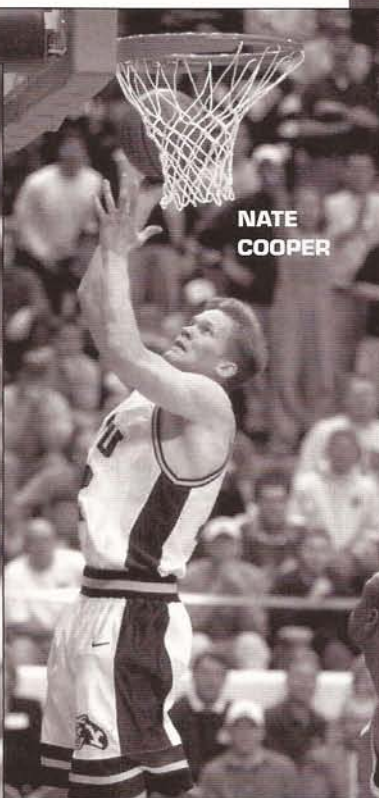

ence in steals. After a strong summer of basketball, Lyday returns in the best condition of his career and should again be an offensive and defensive leader on the court for BYU in 2000-2001.

Freshman Daniel Bobik will suit up for Cleveland for the first time despite being one of the first recruits to sign with BYU after Cleveland's arrival just over three years ago. Having returned this summer from a mission in the Dominican Republic, Bobik is a highly touted talent who could play both guard positions. At 6-6, Bobik could play some point and has worked hard since his return to condition and prepare for his Division I debut. He is an excellent shooter and good passer with good court awareness. As a senior at Newbury Park High School in California, Bobik averaged 20 points, 7 rebounds, 4 assists and 4 steals per game while being named first-team All-CIF and Ventura County MVP.

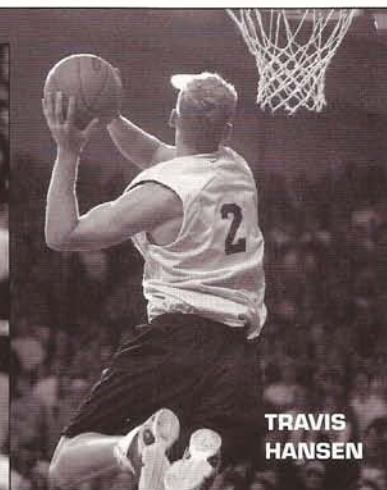
When Lyday needs a breather, Bobik, 6-foot-6 swingmen Travis Hansen and Nathan Cooper or 6-foot-4 red-shirt freshman Jordan Archibald could be called into action.

SMALL FORWARD

The 3-position may be one of the most intriguing for the Cougars in 2000-2001. An experienced senior and several newcomers will battle for time on the floor.

Cooper is one of six letterwinners returning this season. The 6-foot-6 senior played in all 33 games last year and started seven times during BYU's late-season run. The cagey veteran averaged 5.4 points and 3.4 rebounds in 20 minutes and was the Cougars' top free throw shooter (.778). A team captain, Cooper provides Cleveland with a solid, known commodity who will fight for rebounds and knock down the three-pointer.

After playing his freshman year at Utah Valley State College and returning from an LDS Church mission, Hansen transferred to BYU after sitting out last season. The 6-foot-6 sophomore is one of the most athletic players on the team and has a solid shooting touch from three-point range. His size and aggressive play have proven an effective combination during the summer leagues this

year where he averaged more than 30 points per contest. After not having played for three years, Hansen is anxious to get a chance to take the court and figures to be a key contributor for the Cougars.

Provo High's Jacob Chrisman is a two-sport athlete who signed with BYU to play both basketball and baseball. The 6-foot-8 freshman is a versatile player who may be hard to keep off the court. In the mold of former Cougar and NBA player Fred Roberts, Chrisman is a tough, slasher-type player with a good shooting touch and a nose for the ball. Whether on offense or defense, Chrisman finds a way to be part of nearly every play.

Junior Eric Nielsen, Bobik and freshmen Jesse Pinegar could also see time at the three position.

POWER FORWARD

All-MWC forward Mekeli Wesley anchors a much taller and talented front line in 2000-2001. Five different players could see time at the four position this year.

BYU's team leader for three years, the 6-foot-9 Wesley returns for his senior season with the deepest supporting cast of his BYU career. A second-team All-MWC selection last year, Wesley will play the four and five positions this year. He led BYU with 5.8 rebounds last year and was the Cougars' top scorer for most of the year. He finished with a 16.8 average and just nine total points less than team-leader Lyday. He has worked hard in the off-season and returns with a bulked up frame. Wesley is an excellent scorer with many post moves and a soft jumper that extends to

three-point range. He shot 48 percent from the floor, 37 percent on threes and 74 percent from the line last year.

Nielsen proved his potential when he came on strong at the end of last season to lead BYU to several upset wins. He started 28 of 33 games last year after returning from an LDS Church mission, averaging 5.8 points and 4.1 rebounds. Nielsen returns for his junior year having built upon the success of late last season. Physically much stronger, the 6-foot-9 forward has recovered from his missionary layoff and worked hard on his shooting. He should be a key contributor inside for BYU. An intelligent player with range to the three-point line, Nielsen is a good mid-range shooter and can cause trouble for bigger frontline opponents with his quickness.

Freshman Garner Meads brings McDonald's All-American credentials to BYU's frontline this season. A tough-minded 6-foot-8 banger, Meads also has a good mid-range game. He is a hard-working player who wasn't able to play this summer until late because of off-season knee surgery. He averaged 21 points, 8.5 rebounds and six assists at Brighton High School and became one of only four Utah high school players to ever be invited to play in the McDonald's All-America game. He should be a contributor on the front line for the Cougars this year.

Freshman Jesse Pinegar was the first of last year's top-20 recruit-

ing class to commit to BYU and has excited Cougar faithful with his shooting ability. While standing 6-foot-9-inches tall, the Brighton High School star is a strong threat from behind the arc and excels facing the basket. He played well during summer leagues this year after sitting out his senior season of high school because of shoulder surgery. He averaged 18 points and 12 rebounds and three blocks as a junior. He is a better fit as a four on the defensive end but could play the three, four or five positions.

Nate Knight is a 6-foot-10 transfer from Kentucky who will play his senior year at BYU. The brother of the NBA's Travis Knight and former Cougar Shane Knight, Nate played at Utah Valley State College before signing with Kentucky. He will give BYU an experienced and active post player with good size once he becomes eligible on Dec. 16.

CENTER

While Wesley will likely see significant time at the five position, the Cougars have two true centers who, while young, could be a significant part of the rotation. Several other frontline players could also see some action at the five spot.

Freshman Derek Dawes comes to BYU from Salt Lake City's Cottonwood High School. The 6-foot-11 center is an active player who runs the floor well and is a good free throw shooter. Possessing great timing for blocking shots, Dawes should be a strong defensive presence and with good potential on offense. He averaged 19 points, 14 rebounds and eight blocks last year as a high school senior.

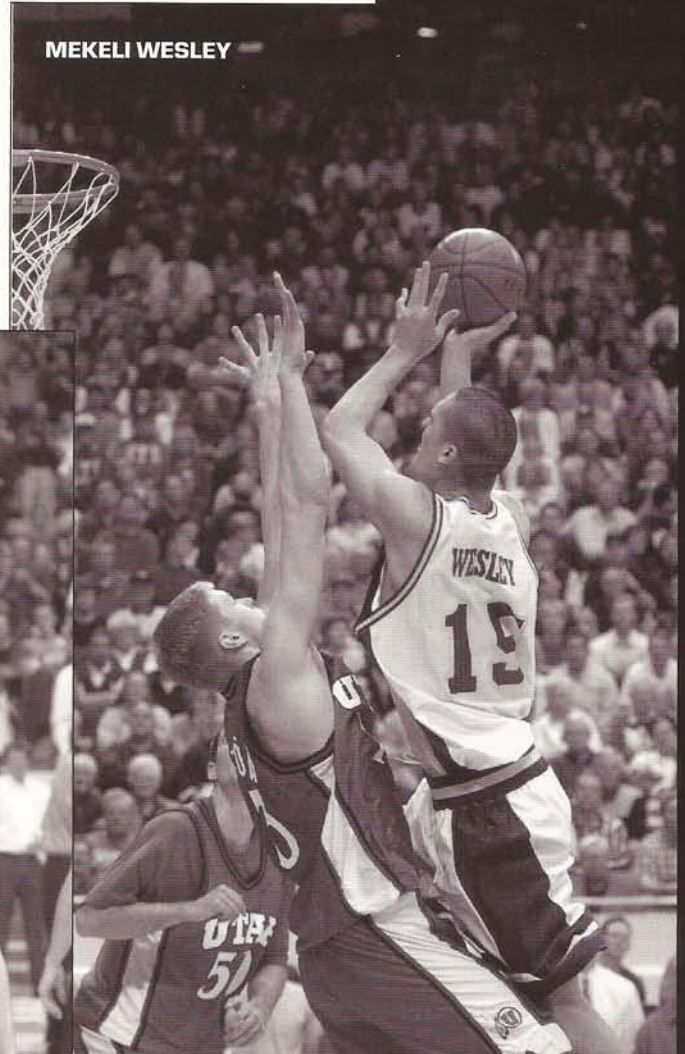
Dan Howard was forced to redshirt last year because of medical hardship. Knee surgery kept him from playing after getting into only four games and a total of 19 minutes last year. He averaged 1.5 points and 2.0 rebounds while making all three of his shots in 4.8 minutes per game. Standing 7-foot tall, Howard has a knack for the ball and could be a significant factor for the Cougars with his size inside. He worked hard during the summer on his strength and conditioning.

HEAD COACH

STEVE CLEVELAND



Steve Cleveland enters his fourth season at the helm of the Cougars in 2000-01 and has BYU in a position to challenge for an NCAA tournament bid and a Mountain West Conference championship. In his first three seasons, Cleveland has proven to be a first-rate recruiter, an excellent coach and player developer, and above all, a winner.

Cleveland has made significant strides in rebuilding a program that finished 1-25 before his arrival. After improving from 9-21 to 12-16 in his first two seasons, Cleveland coached the Cougars to a 22-11 record and an NIT quarter-final appearance last year—BYU's first 20-win season in five years. BYU was one of three Mountain West Conference schools to achieve 20 wins.

Not only was the season a success when looking at BYU's recent basketball history, it also proved to be one of the school's best years ever in terms of wins dating back to the Cougars' first season in 1902. In fact, only seven other BYU teams have ever recorded more wins than last year's 22-11 team and only four other teams have achieved multiple post-season tournament victories.

Cleveland and his staff's preparation for games helped BYU be competitive in all but one game all year. The Cougars defeated every conference team at least once last year. The Cougars have improved their conference record each year under Cleveland (4-10 first year; 6-8 second year; 7-7 third year). The Cougars also improved on the road, posting their highest away win total since 1994-95 with six victories last season.

Cleveland's teams have come on strong at the end of each season. Last year BYU won six of its last eight games, including two MWC tournament wins and two NIT victories. In Cleveland's first year, BYU completed a rare sweep of New Mexico and UTEP on the road to earn a WAC tournament berth. The road sweep of New Mexico and UTEP was the first for BYU since 1990-91 and the 83-62 upset of

No.15-ranked New Mexico in the Pit ended the Lobos' 41-game home winning streak. In Cleveland's second season the Cougars had a blowout win over UTEP before a 90-74 conference tournament upset victory over TCU to achieve BYU's first conference tournament win since 1994. During that year, BYU showed its improvement even in defeat, losing six games by four points or less, including one-point losses to California and Washington State and an overtime defeat to Arizona.

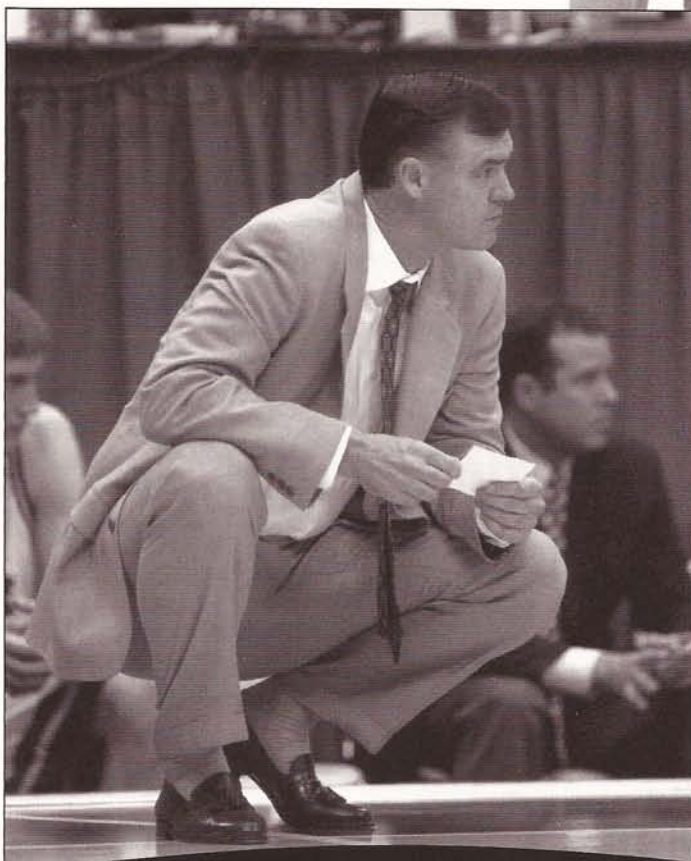
Cleveland has improved each year in post season as well. He guided last year's team to the 2000 Mountain West Conference Tournament finals. It was the first Cougar team to become a conference tournament finalist in six years. The Cougars also received their first post-season bid in five years and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NIT. Along the way, Cleveland coached BYU to its first post-season tournament victory since a 1994 NIT win over Arizona State. BYU's two NIT wins were the most post-season wins since 1986 (when BYU also went 2-1 in the NIT). It marked only the

fifth time in school history that BYU has achieved multiple post-season tournament victories (1950-51, 3-0 NIT; 1965-66, 3-0 NIT; 1980-81, 3-1 NCAA; 1985-86, 2-1 NIT; 1999-2000, 2-1 NIT).

As a recruiter, Cleveland has made a similar impact on BYU's program. Cleveland recruits have proven they are not only committed to Cleveland's vision but also are the kind of players to help make that vision a reality in Provo. Cleveland and his staff have brought in one of the conference's top players in each of his three seasons. Last year Terrell Lyday, who was the MWC Newcomer of the Year and was fourth in the league in scoring with a BYU-best 17.1 ppg, following in the footsteps of Mark Bigelow, who led the Cougars in scoring (15.0) and rebounding (6.3) while being named the Western Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year and second-team All-WAC before departing for a two-year LDS Church mission. Ron Selleaze transferred to BYU in Cleveland's first season and earned WAC Newcomer of the Year and second-team all-conference honors.

Last year's recruiting class may prove to be one of the best ever at BYU. Rated among the top-20 recruiting efforts nationally, six players signed to play for Cleveland, including McDonald's All-American Garner Meads (6-8 freshman forward), Jesse Pinegar (6-9 freshman forward), Derek Dawes (6-11 freshman center), Jacob Chrisman (6-9 freshman forward), Travis Hansen (6-6 sophomore transfer guard/forward) and Austin Ainge (6-1 freshman point guard). All but Ainge, the son of BYU and NBA great Danny Ainge, will join BYU this year. Ainge will enroll after returning from an LDS Church mission.

Before taking the helm at BYU on March 11, 1997, Cleveland compiled a 157-77 record at Fresno City College

in Fresno, Calif. Cleveland was named coach of the year two times while at FCC and led the Rams to post-season playoffs in each of his seven seasons in Fresno. Cleveland coached 10 years at Fresno's Clovis West High School, compiling a 180-70 record.

PLAYING CAREER

Cleveland played college basketball at UC Irvine and was the Anteaters' MVP and leading scorer his senior season in 1975-76. Prior to attending UC Irvine, Cleveland was Fresno City College's Most Outstanding Player in 1973-74. Cleveland received a B.A. degree in social science from UC Irvine in 1976, and received a Master's in education administration from Fresno Pacific in 1979.

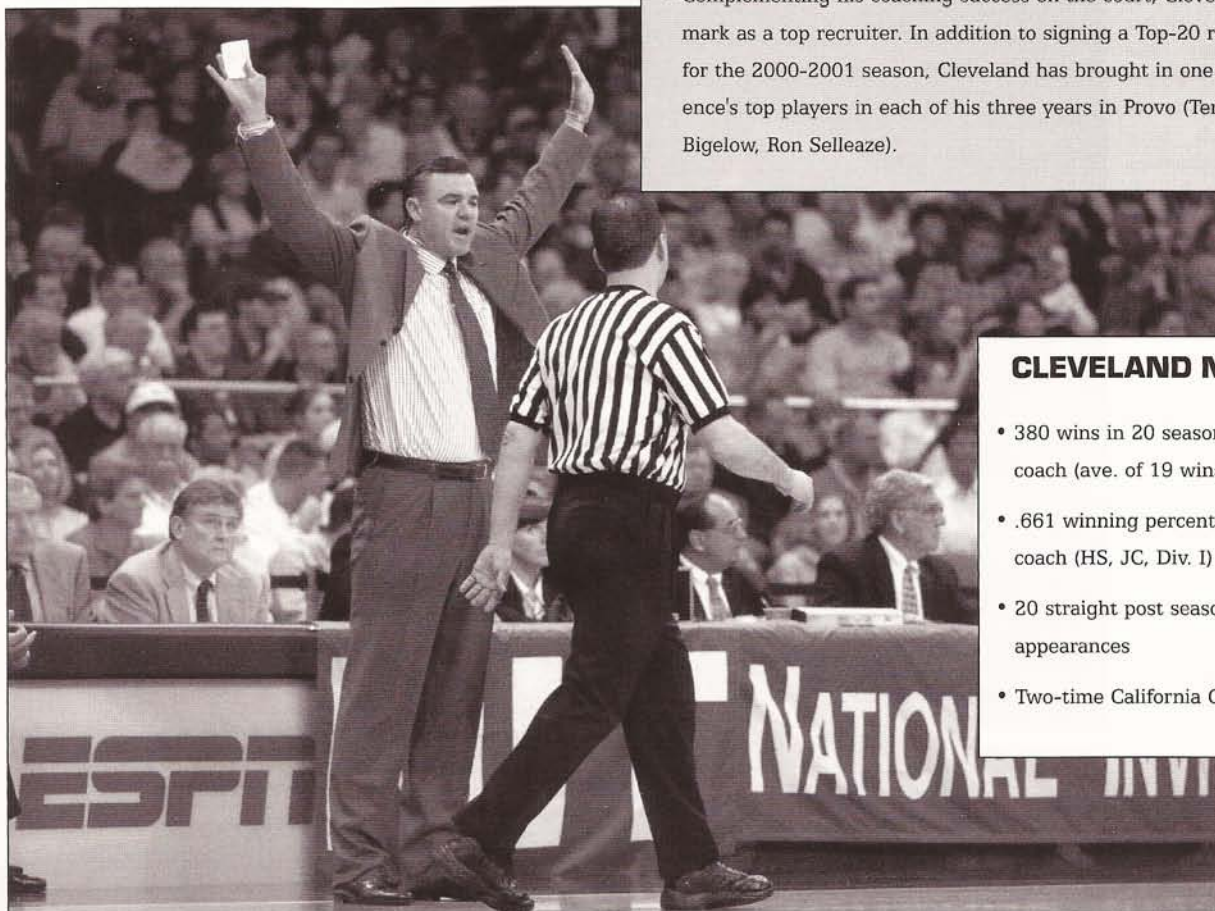
Cleveland, 48, was born in the Los Angeles area and spent most of his life in Fresno, Calif. He served an LDS Church mission to England from 1971-73. As surprising as it may seem, Cleveland is the first head basketball or football coach at BYU to have served a church mission. Cleveland and his wife Kip have three children: sons Casey (22) and Skyler (19) and daughter Katie (10).

- BYU's attendance has continued to improve in Cleveland's three seasons in Provo. Attendance at home conference games improved significantly last year, growing to 13,464 from 11,562 in 1998-99. BYU also had the NIT's top two attendance marks (16,949 vs. Southern Illinois and 10,010 vs. Bowling Green).
- Last year BYU defeated all four in-state schools in the same season for the first time in Cougar history. Cleveland guided BYU to victories over Utah, Utah State, Weber State and Southern Utah. BYU recorded its first win over rival Utah since the 1994-95 season with its 58-54 MWC tournament triumph.
- Complementing his coaching success on the court, Cleveland has made a mark as a top recruiter. In addition to signing a Top-20 recruiting class for the 2000-2001 season, Cleveland has brought in one of the conference's top players in each of his three years in Provo (Terrell Lyday, Mark Bigelow, Ron Selleaze).

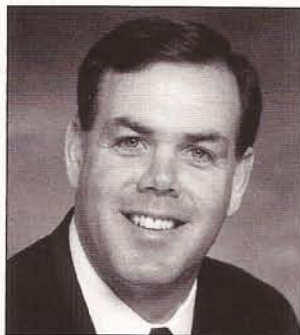

David Rose joined BYU's coaching staff with Steve Cleveland in the spring of 1997 and serves as associate head coach. Rose fulfills a variety of responsibilities under Cleveland and has played a significant role in the coaching staff's success on and off the court.

As the recruiting coordinator, he manages the staff's recruiting efforts, which have proven to be among the best in the country. Last year McDonald's All-American forward Garner Meads headlined six talented players to sign with the Cougars. One of the best recruiting classes to ever sign at BYU, last year's class was rated in the top 20 nationally and second among teams in the West.

Rose also serves as camp director and oversees scheduling for the Cougars. BYU has played many of the nation's top teams over the past several years and had the toughest schedule in the Mountain West Conference last season. Rose continues to develop and forge relationships with programs across the country to secure future games with quality teams and to involve the Cougars in competitive tournaments, such as this year's Pearl Harbor Invitational featuring No. 3-ranked Iowa State.

On the court, Rose coaches the team's post players and works with the defense along with defensive coordinator Heath Schroyer.

Prior to coming to BYU, Rose was head coach at Dixie College in St. George, Utah. In seven years, his teams compiled an overall record of 167-57 and won three conference championships. Six of his seven teams were nationally ranked in the Top 20 of the NJCAA polls. During his tenure as head coach at Dixie, 97 percent of his players graduated.

Before assuming the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as an assistant coach at Dixie under Ken Wagner. He coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View High Schools before joining the staff at Dixie.

Rose was a two-sport athlete at Dixie College before transferring to Houston, where he was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous

"Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983, his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished second in the NCAA tournament. At Houston, Rose played in 1980-81, redshirted in 1981-82, and played his final year in 1982-83.

At Dixie, Rose was first-team all-league in both basketball and baseball. Rose was also the Region 18 batting champion hitting .421 as a center fielder.

While playing basketball for Houston's Northbrook High School, he led the District 16AAAA in scoring, was first-team all district, All-Greater Houston and team MVP.

25-7 record, the WAC title and an NCAA tournament berth. He was named to the WAC's all-defensive team and set a BYU record for career games with 129.

Call had 204 assists in 1991-92 and 164 assists in 1990-91—the top two BYU season assist totals. Considered at the time as the most underrated player in the WAC, Call was a gritty point guard who routinely excelled with the toughest defensive assignments.

In 1992 at Colorado State, he drove the length of the court in the closing seconds of regulation to knot the game at 62-all. In overtime he scored six of his 23 points to lead BYU to victory. A couple of weeks later in Provo, Call again drove the length of the court against the University of Utah and dished off to Gary Trost for the winning layup. At Tulsa he scored a career-high 30 points and was named WAC Player of the Week.

Before playing at BYU, Call was a standout athlete at Capistrano High in California. He earned All-CIF honors in basketball, football, and baseball, and was named Southern California High School Athlete of the Year.

Call, 32, has a bachelor's degree in sports business management from BYU. After graduating from Capistrano High in California, he interrupted his career at BYU to serve a two-year LDS Church mission to La Paz, Bolivia.

Jeff Judkins is in his second year as the Director of Basketball Operations at BYU after working as an assistant coach at Utah for 10 years. This year he also enters his first year as an assistant coach for the BYU women's basketball team.

Judkins has been a valuable contributor since joining the Cougar staff in July 1999. He is the second Director of Basketball Operations at BYU, following former University of Utah head coach, the late Lynn Archibald.

Judkins' duties with the men's team include that of academic advisement, player relations, scheduling, on-campus recruiting, consulting and serving as a liaison to the Student Athlete Center. He has improved the academic opportunities for BYU players as the team's academic advisor, coordinating study table on the road, administering tests and assignments and forging a strong relationship between the team and the Student Athlete Center.

A good relationship builder with many local ties, Judkins has played a significant role in BYU's recruiting efforts while coordinating on-campus recruiting.

Judkins was an instrumental part of Utah's success during his 10 years with the program upon returning to the university in 1989 following his NBA career. While at Utah, he coached wing players, tutored players on the art of jump shooting and was a valuable recruiter. He worked with players such as Josh Grant, Keith Van Horn and Andre Miller.

PLAYING CAREER

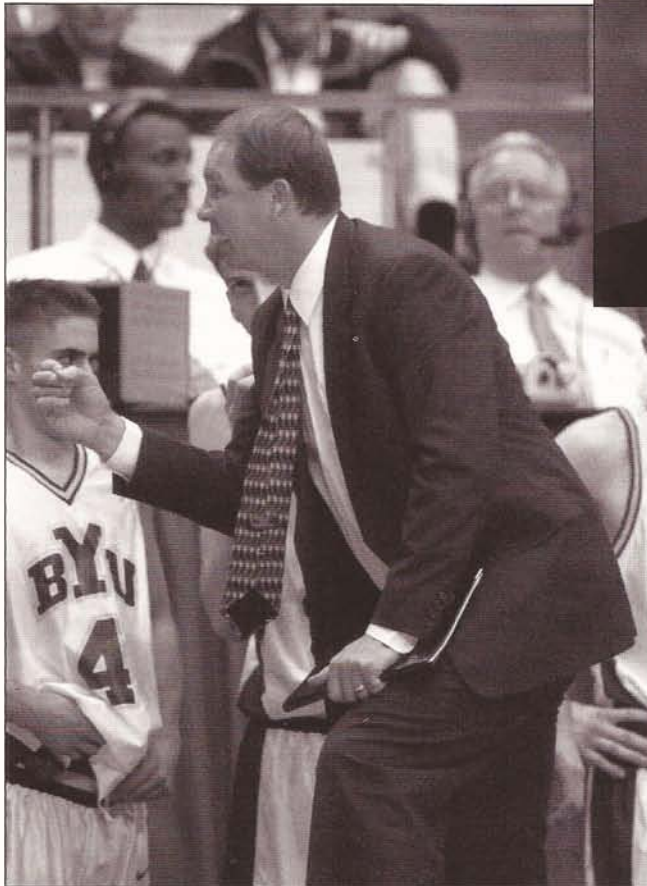
Judkins had a very successful playing career that dates back to his high school days at Highland High School in Salt Lake City. An all-state selection in basketball, football and baseball, Judkins went on to play for the University of Utah from 1974-78. During his career, he averaged 16.1 points per game, which still ranks six on Utah's career scoring list.

An excellent shooter, Judkins was also calm under pressure and made nearly 87 percent of his free throw attempts during his college career. While playing at Utah, Judkins helped lead the Utes to one conference championship and two berths in the NCAA Tournament. He was a second-team academic All-American and three-time first-team District VII academic selection. He also earned three first-team All-Western Athletic Conference honors and was a member of the 1977 United States World Games team that captured the gold medal.

Judkins went on to play five years in the National Basketball Association for the Boston Celtics, Portland Trailblazers, Detroit Pistons

In 1999, U.S. News and World Report ranked the J. Reuben Clark School 32nd among the top 50 law schools in the nation. In 1999 and 1998, Business Week ranked BYU's Marriott School of Management among the top 50 business schools in the nation. Other Marriott School programs receiving national rankings were the undergraduate and graduate accounting programs, which were ranked third and second in the nation in the Public Accounting Report's Annual Survey of Accounting Professors.

Brigham Young University was founded in 1875 and is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Competition for admission is stiff. In fall 2000, the average freshman admitted had a 3.76 GPA and a 27.6 composite score on the ACT. According to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, in its annual ranking of colleges and universities enrolling freshmen Merit Scholars named each year, BYU ranked 14th in the nation with its admittance of 130 freshmen Merit Scholars in 1999. The attention to academics doesn't end after admission to the university. BYU is one of the leaders in students who are awarded National Science Foundation fellowships - eight students received awards in 1999. BYU also claims six Rhodes scholars, two Mellon Fellows, several law clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court and a Marshall scholar.





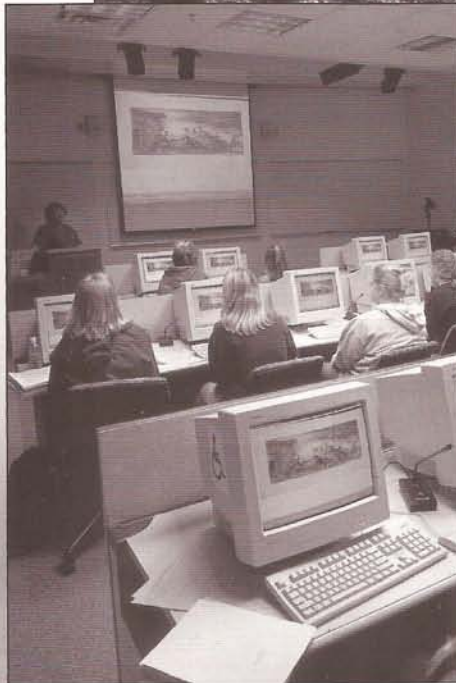

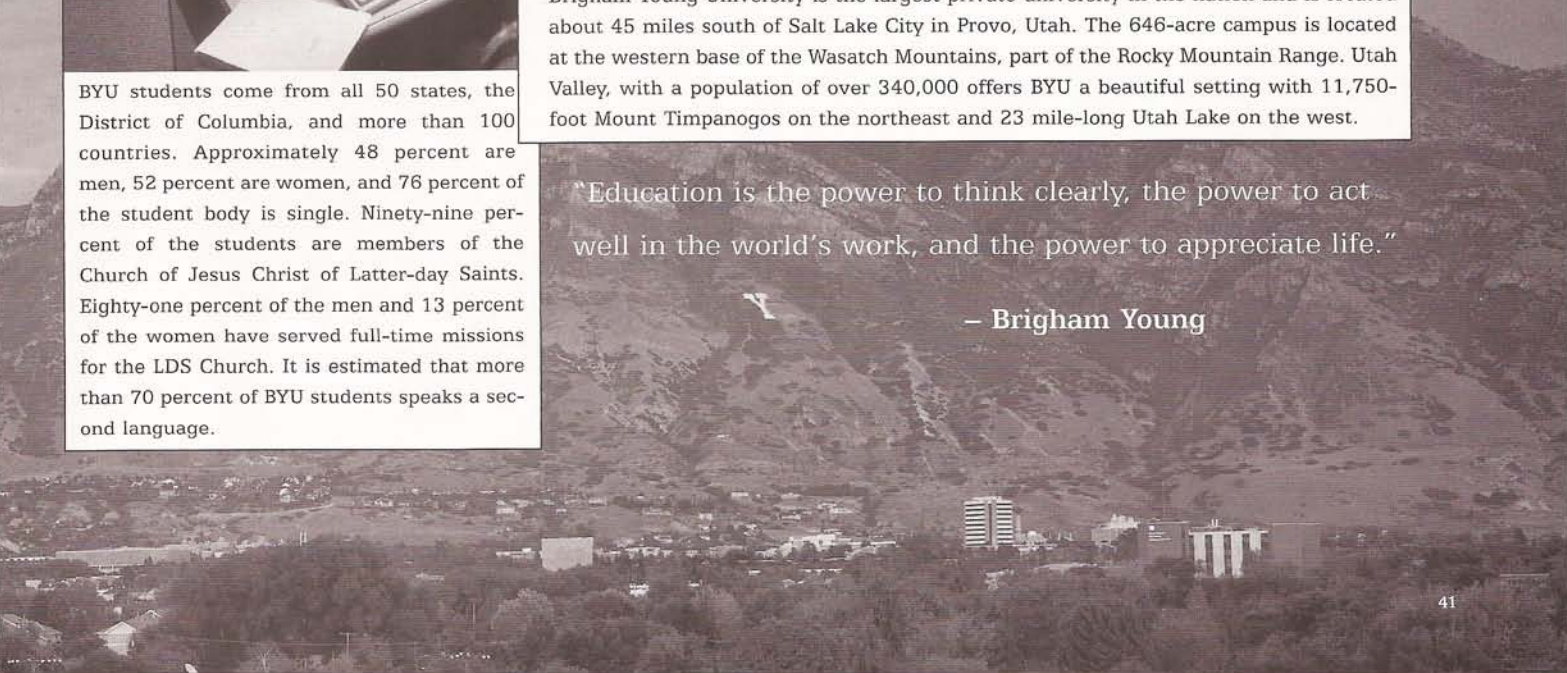
Brigham Young University is the largest private university in the nation and is located about 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah. The 646-acre campus is located at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. Utah Valley, with a population of over 340,000 offers BYU a beautiful setting with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the northeast and 23 mile-long Utah Lake on the west.



BYU students come from all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and more than 100 countries. Approximately 48 percent are men, 52 percent are women, and 76 percent of the student body is single. Ninety-nine percent of the students are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Eighty-one percent of the men and 13 percent of the women have served full-time missions for the LDS Church. It is estimated that more than 70 percent of BYU students speaks a second language.

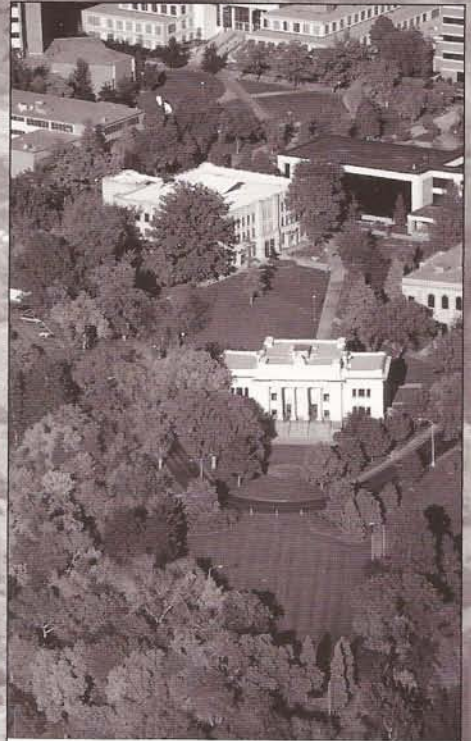

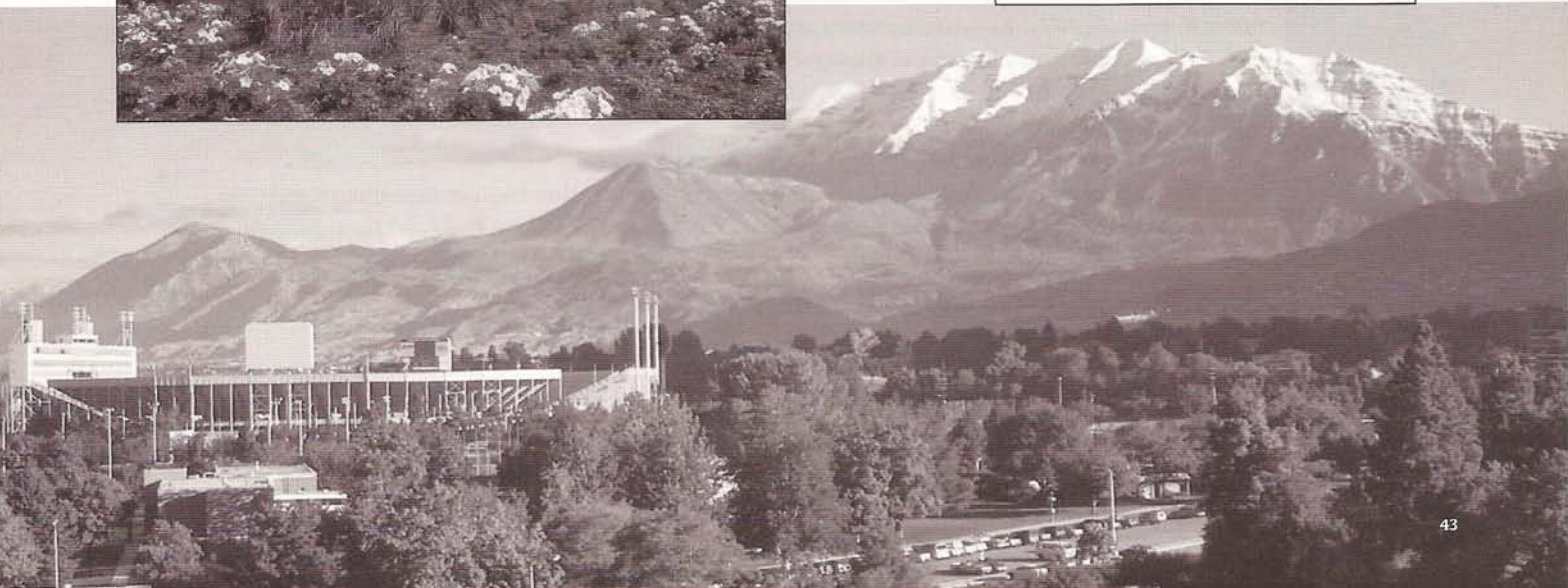
BYU has campuses in Hawaii, Jerusalem and Idaho. BYU's Hawaii campus is a respected four-year university with an enrollment of over 2,000 students from over 60 nations and is located on Hawaii's north shore. Adjacent to the campus is the Polynesian Cultural Center (PCC), one of Hawaii's top attractions. The PCC employs nearly 600 students. The BYU Jerusalem Center for Near-Eastern Studies was established

in 1987 and gives students an up-close look at sites of the Old and New Testament.

In 1999, a 234,000-square-foot underground addition was added to the Harold B. Lee Library. The five-floor library has two floors underground, provides seating for 4,000 and houses more than three million volumes, including an extensive collection of pamphlets and titles on microfilm as well as a genealogical library and a vast array of audio and visual materials.



Full-time enrollment for fall semester 2000 totalled 30,069 with another 2,495 part-time day students and 1,091 evening school students. Of the full-time day students, 28,257 are undergraduates and 1,812 are graduate students.

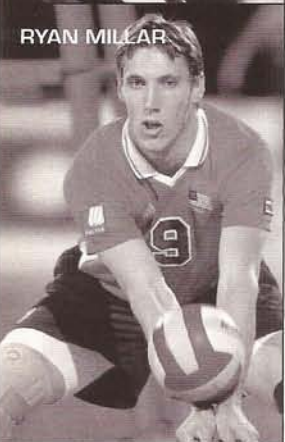

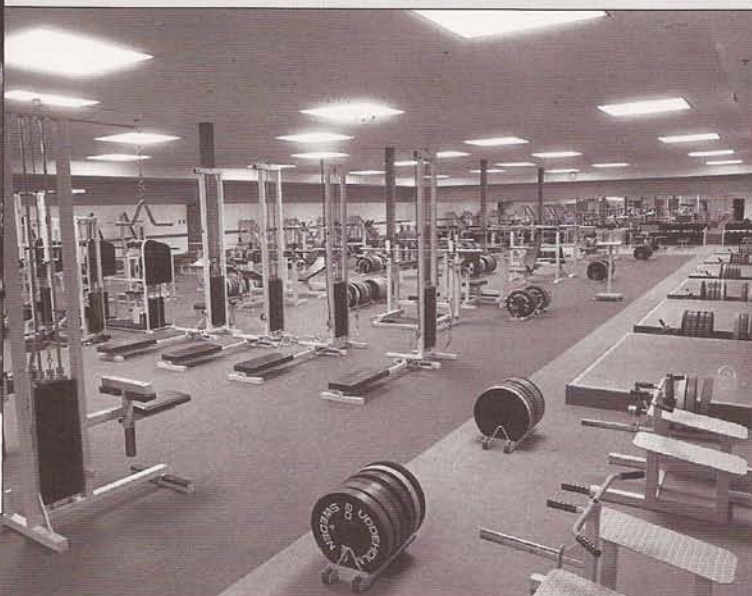
ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

There is no place quite like it in college basketball. Over the past 28 years, the Marriott Center has been home to the thrills and cheers of BYU basketball. With a history full of game-winning shots, slam dunks and sellout seasons, the Marriott Center's 22,700 seats have allowed BYU fans to see plenty of excitement since the facility's opening game on December 3, 1971.

The Center, named for successful Utah businessman J. Willard Marriott, has consistently ranked in the top 10 in ticket sales nationally and is the third largest on-campus arena in the country behind Syracuse's Carrier Dome (33,000) and Tennessee's Thompson-Boling Arena (24,525).

Almost every year since the Marriott Center was built, BYU led its conference in attendance. In 1994-95 BYU ranked fifth nationally in paid

attendance behind Syracuse, Kentucky, North Carolina and Arkansas. Some of the great games played in the Marriott Center include Danny Ainge and company's 19-point shellacking of No. 7 Utah in 1981 before the Cougars' run to the Elite Eight in the NCAA Tournament. Dec. 15, 1978 was another night to remember at the Marriott Center. BYU overcame Michael Brooks' 51 points to beat La Salle 108 to 106 in triple overtime.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, BYU hosted NCAA Regionals and also hosted the 1988 Western Athletic Conference Tournament in the Marriott Center.

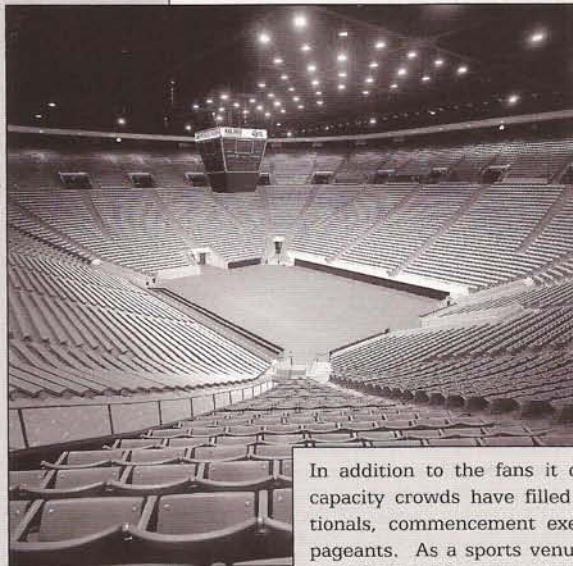


Since the Marriott Center opened 28 seasons ago, Cougar fans have watched BYU compile a record of 309-106, a .745 winning percentage.

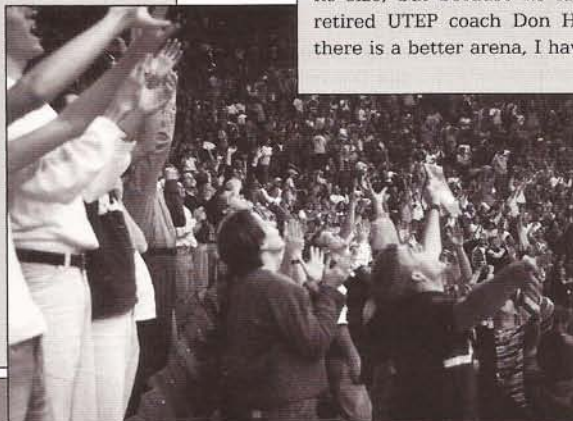

In addition to the fans it draws for basketball, capacity crowds have filled the arena for devotionals, commencement exercises, concerts and pageants. As a sports venue, it has also accommodated tennis, wrestling and volleyball matches and gymnastics meets.

"The Marriott Center is one of the top five places to play in the country, not just because of its size, but because its facilities are fantastic," retired UTEP coach Don Haskins has said. "If there is a better arena, I haven't seen it."

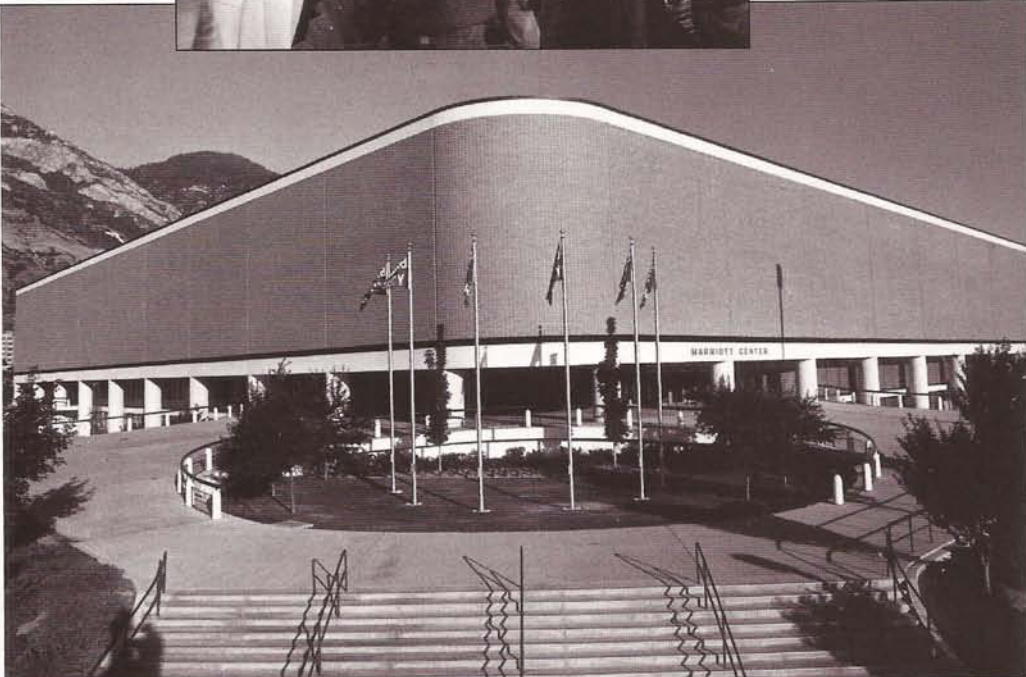


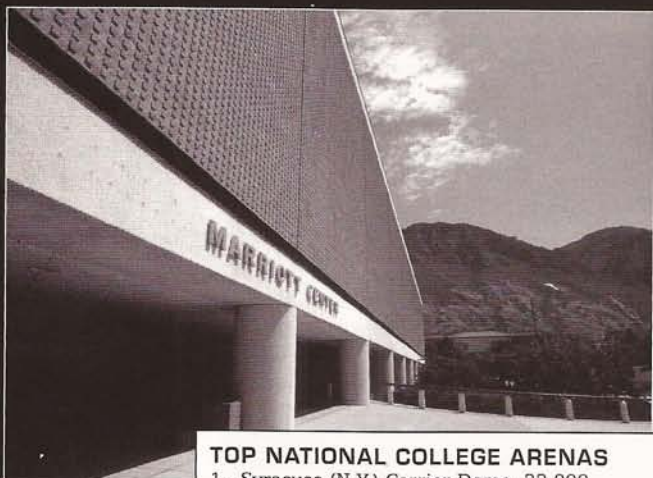
The Marriott Center covers three acres and encloses eight million cubic feet. There are approximately 10,100 chair seats with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse level. The distance around the concourse level is a quarter of a mile.

The roof, which is the size of two football fields placed side-by-side, is 10 stories high and has 50,000 bolts in it. The four-million pound roof was constructed first at ground level, then raised 38 feet.

"People are always remarking how new the Marriott Center looks compared to how old it is," said Special Events Director Larry Duffin.

There are seven locker rooms, a President's room, two reception rooms, a press and interview room, a team lounge, a weight room, a classroom and a training room.

STUDENT ATHLETE CENTER



BYU HAS LONG BEEN KNOWN FOR its ability to continually produce athletes who not only compete well on the athletic field, but also in the classroom.

To continue assisting with this legacy of student academic achievement, BYU recently created the Student Athlete Center.

The Student Athlete Center was established to provide additional resources for BYU athletes and offer support on academic, social and citizenship issues. The Center enables students to be successful in academic pursuits and personal development both on and off the field.

The purpose of the new athletic support facility is to help student-athletes succeed in the BYU environment. The Center is designed to foster the growth and maintenance of social networks consisting of friends and mentors that will help athletes throughout their college careers and beyond.

"In coming to BYU, many of our athletes leave behind a whole support system of family, friends and church leaders," said BYU Advancement Vice President Fred Skousen. "Our purpose in establishing this Center is to help our student-athletes, especially those not of the LDS (Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day-Saints) faith, to succeed in the BYU environment."

Former athlete and coach, Paul Warner, is the director for the new Student Athlete Center. Warner, who received a doctorate in educational administration from BYU and is also a former LDS seminary teacher, will serve as chaplain for non-LDS students. The support received from his efforts and the center is hoped to be comparatively similar to the kind of support LDS athletes obtain from their church leaders.

"I am pleased to have this opportunity and look forward to working with our students in creating a home base where their needs can be met in a supportive environment," said Warner.

In efforts to help ease the transition into campus life, the Center is designed to work with athletes as soon as they commit to BYU. The facility will offer guidance on academic issues, housing, Honor Code compliance and other personal issues.

"If we can build connections early on, I am sure we can help ease the transition into campus life for our student athletes," said Warner.

The Student Athlete Center, which was created April 1, 1999, represents an expansion of the University's previous Academic Advisement Center. Although academic advisement is still included, a variety of other services have been added.

Some of the services provided by the Student Athlete Center are: individual counseling, special religious classes for non-LDS athletes, opportunities for community involvement and service, association with the advisory council (which consists of former BYU athletes), employment placement, meeting athletes on recruiting visits, and the NCAA approved CHAMPS/Life Skills program consisting in part of career education and development.

Warner said that one of the major focuses of the Center is to help network with other BYU departments and work in coordination with their existing services. BYU's counseling center, multi-cultural center, career advisement center, and BYUSA are among some of the departments mentioned.

The Student Athlete Center is located in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse.

Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities across America. Brigham Young University is one of the elite institutions that annually earns praise for its achievements in the classroom and on the field of play.

ACADEMIC ADVISEMENT

The Athletics Academic Advisement Office at BYU, located in the Student Athlete Center, was established to provide the student-athlete with solid academic counsel while participating in intercollegiate athletics.

PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVE

The single most important goal of this office is to ensure student-athletes who leave BYU obtain a bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study.

To achieve this goal, the Athletics Academic Advisement Office provides a comprehensive support program, which enables the student-athlete to make use of all the resources at the University to make academic progress and to graduate.

The role of the advisor includes close monitoring of academic problems, instituting and organizing educational programs, setting up the tutors as needed, and coordinating support services with other academic and non-academic units to insure and academic success of all the student-athletes.

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

Beginning fall 1998, the Athletic Department became a member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. CHAMPS is an acronym for "Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success." The CHAMPS/Life Skills program is designed to address the "total development" of the student-athlete. There are five vital components to the CHAMPS/Life Skills program including commitment to academics, athletics, personal development, service, and career.

RECOGNITION

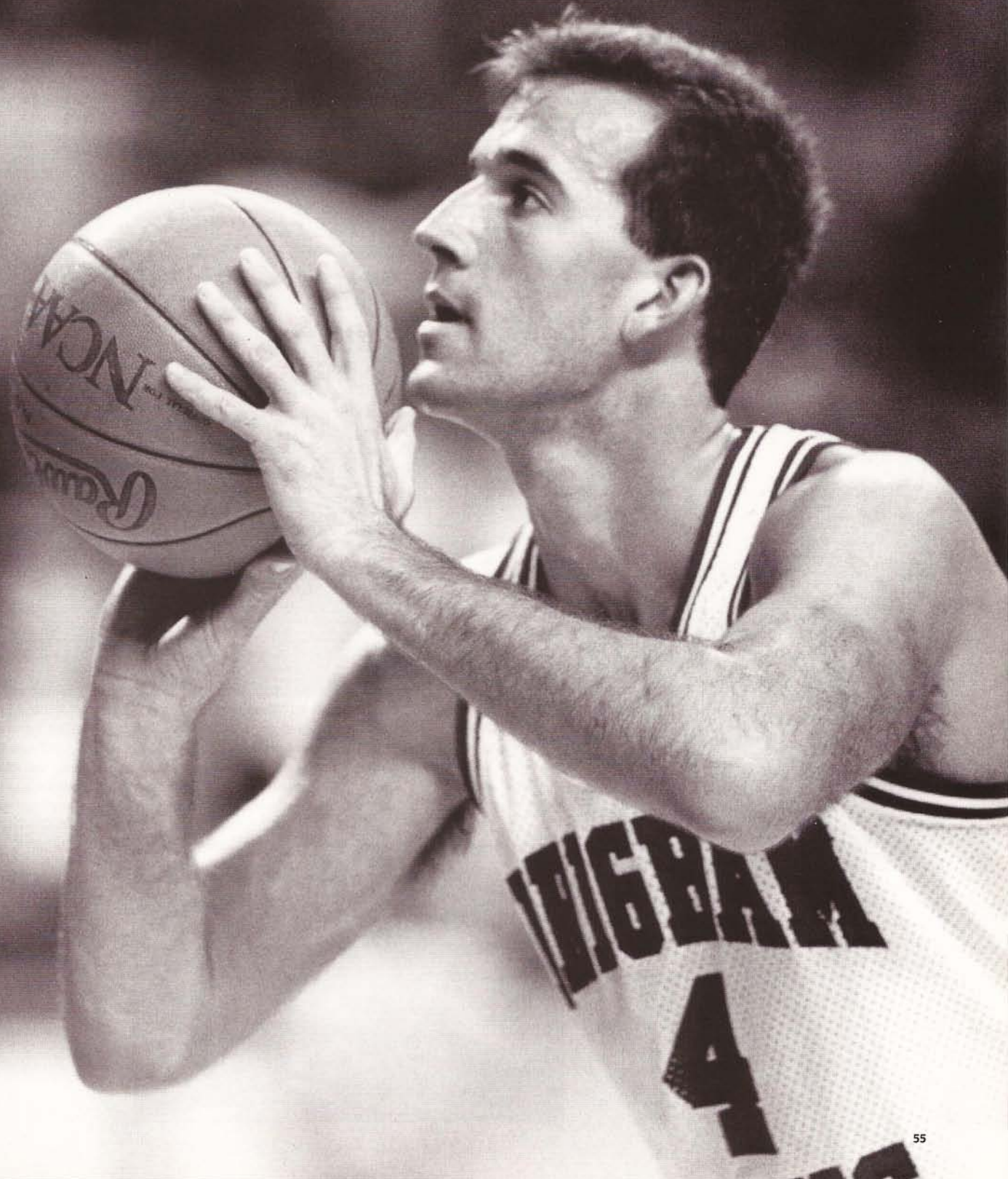
BYU athletes who achieve a 3.2 grade point average or higher during either fall or winter semester are honored at the Annual Athletics Academic Honor Banquet sponsored by the Cougar Club.

This past year, nearly 50 percent of BYU's student-athletes qualified as Academic Athletes.

The average GPA among this year's Academic Athletes was an impressive 3.53 - a reflection of the high academic achievement of BYU athletes. The cumulative GPA of all BYU student-athletes is over 3.0.

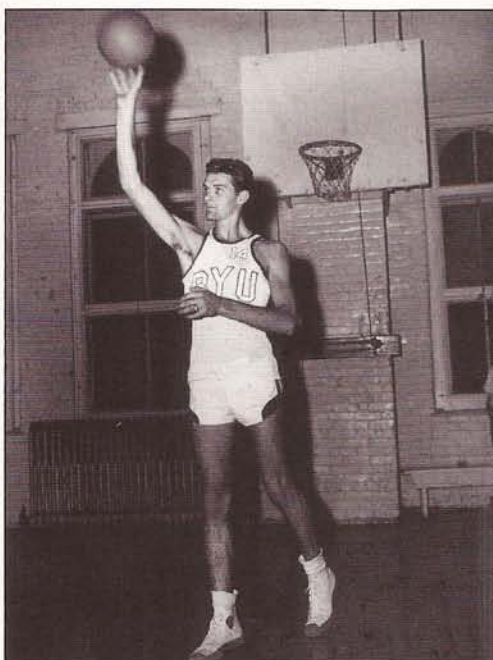

Stan Watts took over an improving basketball program in 1948 and with the help of players like Joe Richey, Harold Christensen, Dean Larsen, Terry Tebbs, Tom Steinke, John Fairchild, and Kresimir Cosic, he would win eight conference titles, and two NIT championships. He coached from 1948-72 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass. in 1986.



In 1950-51, Mel Hutchins became BYU's first basketball player to be named a first team All-American. Hutchins was the first player selected in the 1952 NBA Draft and was later named the NBA Rookie of the Year.



Doug Howard was a two-sport star who led the Cougars in scoring in 1969 and 1970.



Led by Watts and 6-0 forward Roland Minson, the Cougars defeated St. Louis, Seton Hall and Dayton for the 1951 NIT Championship. At that time winning the NIT was like winning the NCAA tournament today. By winning the championship, BYU was forever put on the map and received a lot of attention in the national media. One newspaper account read that the Cougars had "stolen away the hearts of the [Madison Square] Garden fans with their fight, sportsmanship and clean play."



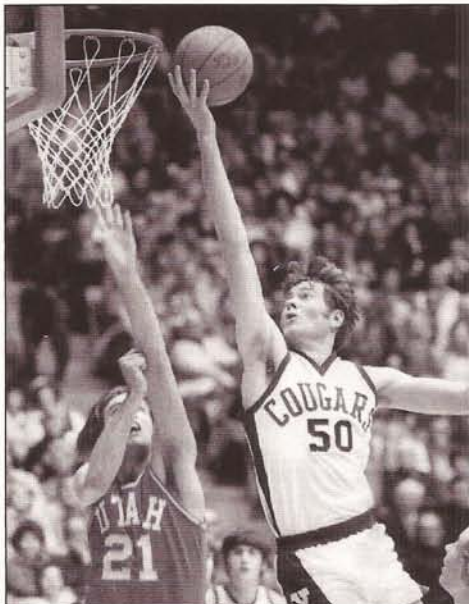
1951 NIT CHAMPIONS

In 1966, BYU had a record of 17-5 when it finished its regular season and headed to the NIT. "We played three games and we were the No. 1 seed," Former BYU assistant coach Pete Witbeck said. BYU beat Temple handily in the first game. In the second game, BYU squeezed by Army and its young coach Bobby Knight. The Championship game was against New York University.

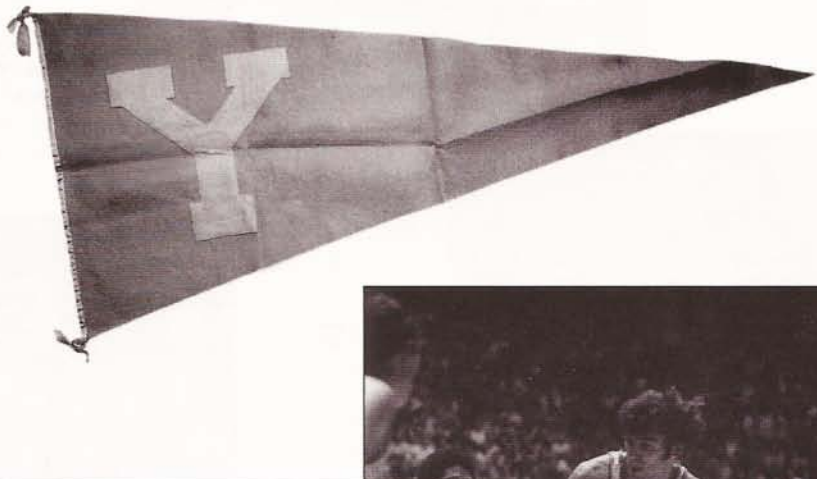

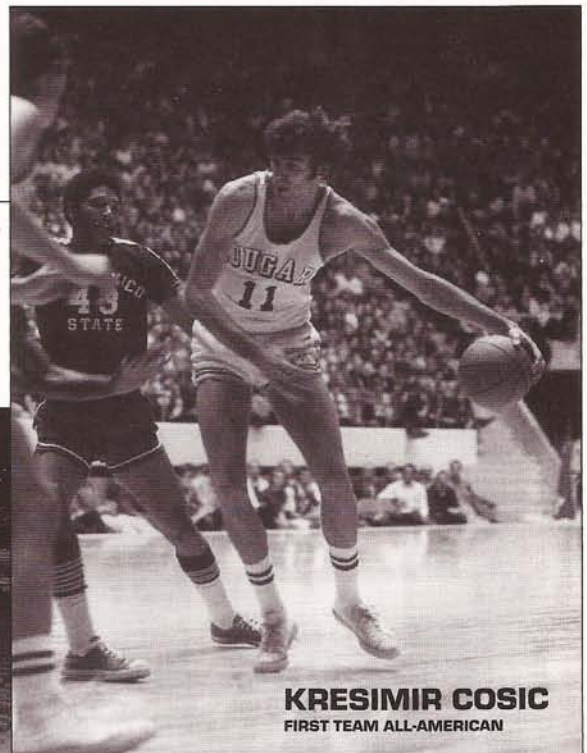
"They had two or three All-Americans," Witbeck said. "It was a classic game of fast-break basketball. Red Auerbach and Bob Cousy were scouting. The Who's Who of the basketball world was there. It was a wonderful win. They had a parade for us in Provo. It was like winning a national championship, which it was."



In the late 1970's Jay Cheesman was a two-time All-WAC performer leading the Cougars in scoring and rebounding the 1975-76 and 1976-77 seasons. Cheesman was later drafted by the Chicago Bulls in the sixth round of the 1977 NBA draft.



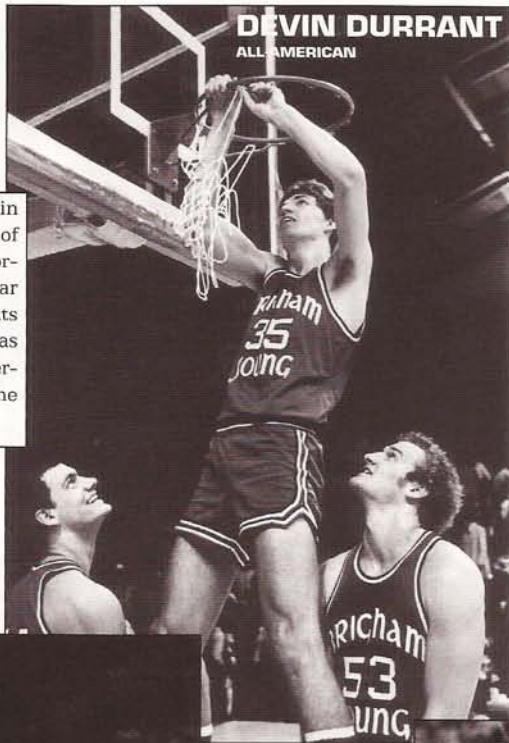
In 1971 BYU moved into the 22,700-seat Marriott Center—one of the largest on-campus facilities in the nation. In the first year it was open, there were some concerns about filling the large arena, but the Cougars posted a 12-0 home record and averaged 21,818 fans per game.

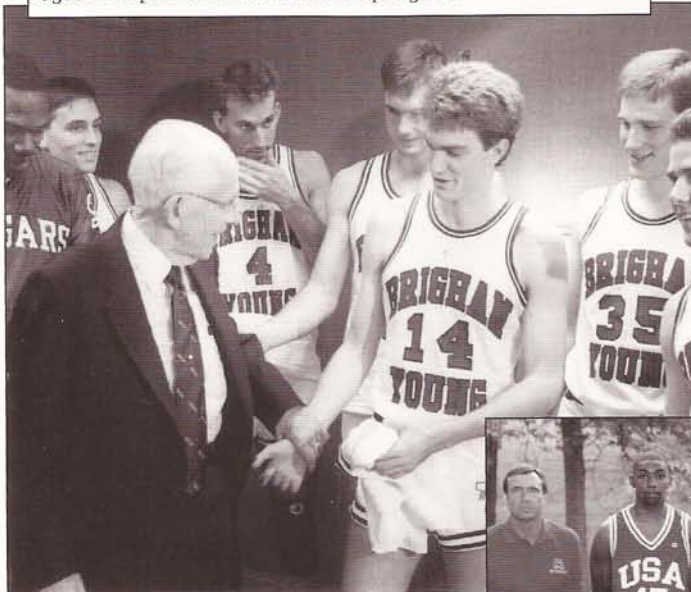
In 1981, after cruising past Princeton and 10th-ranked UCLA in the NCAA Tournament, Danny Ainge's last second heroics against Notre Dame lifted BYU into the "Elite Eight." With eight seconds left in the game and the Irish up by one point, Ainge took the ball and deftly dribbled the length of the court and softly laid the ball over the outstretched fingertips of Notre Dame center Orlando Woolridge. Before the stunned Irish players could inbound the ball, time had expired. Ainge's skillful drive was recently featured by ESPN and Sports Illustrated as one of the plays of the decade.



All-American Michael Smith's 1987-88 Cougars won 17 games in a row and were ranked as high as no. 2 in the national polls. The Cougars finished that season with a 26-6 record and Smith averaged 21.2 points and 7.8 rebounds per game.



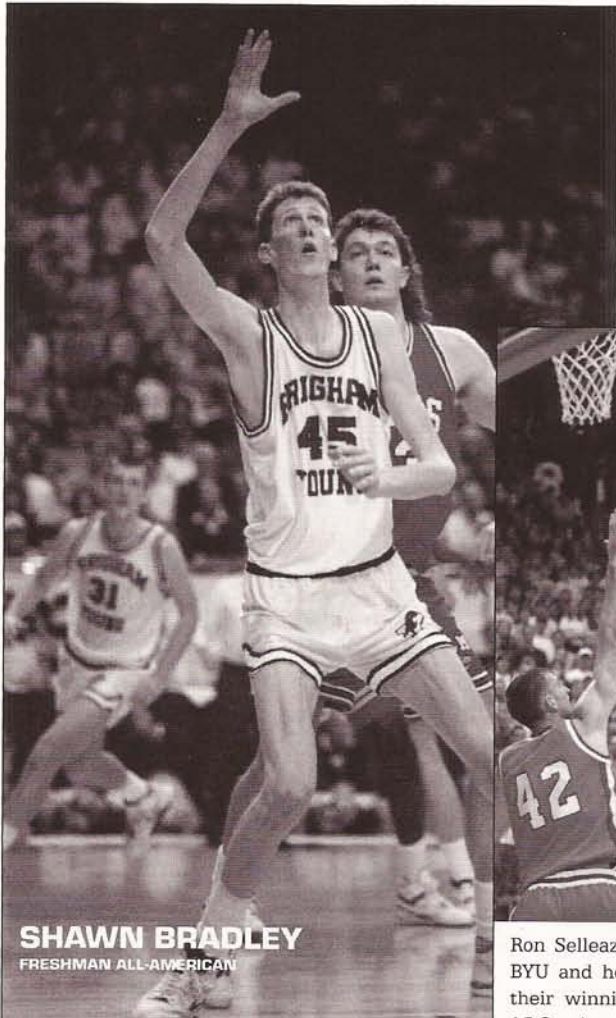

RIISING TO THE TOP

After its most successful season in five years, BYU's men's basketball program returns to the national spotlight with a schedule that includes five ESPN national or regional telecasts and an appearance in the Pearl Harbor Invitational.

"We are pleased to be a significant part of the ESPN television package this season," BYU coach Steve Cleveland said. "I think it reflects both last year's success and the excitement surrounding this year's team. Last season we had an incredible crowd for our late-night NIT start and we hope to have a similar environment for our 10 p.m. ESPN games in the Marriott Center this year."

The Cougars will appear on ESPN twice and on ESPN Regional Television (ERT) three times during the 2000-2001 season. BYU will make the first of its two ESPN "Big Monday" appearances Jan. 15 against UNLV in Provo before a second 10 p.m. ESPN start in the Marriott Center against rival Utah Jan. 29. The Cougars ERT games include San Diego State in Provo on Jan. 13, UNLV in Las Vegas on Feb. 10 and Utah in Salt Lake City on Feb. 24. ERT games are televised in Salt Lake City on KJZZ-TV - the Utah market's ESPN-Plus affiliate.

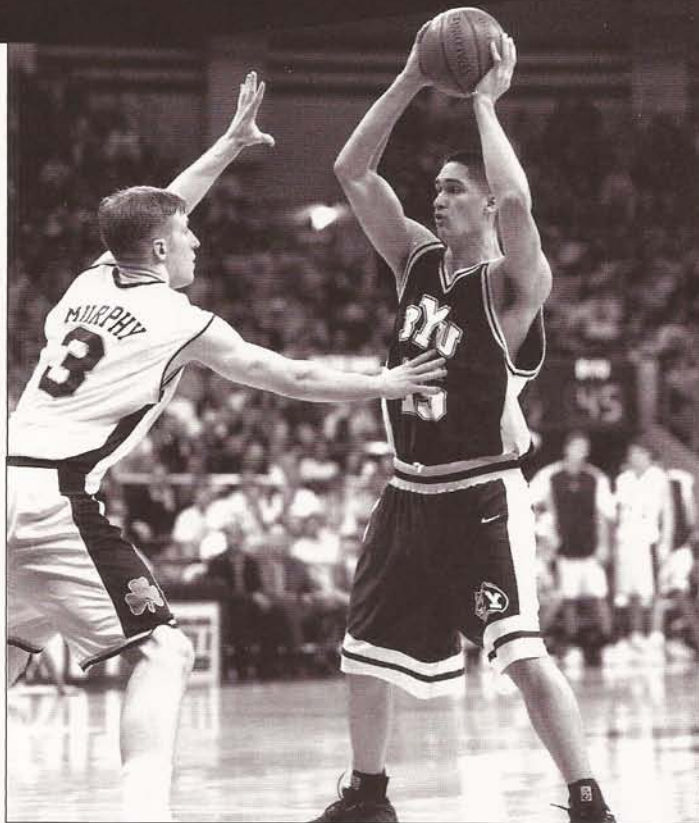
An anticipated 21 regular season Cougar games will be televised in all, with BYU tentatively scheduled to appear on SportsWest telecasts in eight additional Mountain West Conference contests, the Utah State game in Provo on Dec. 16 and three Pearl Harbor Invitational games. BYU also appears on Fox Sports Network versus Rice and Fox Sports Arizona against Arizona State.

Overall, the Cougars' 2000-2001 schedule includes eight games against opponents who qualified for a postseason tournament last year (five NCAA, three NIT), with the potential to face three other postseason teams, including NCAA Elite Eight participant Iowa State, in the Pearl Harbor Invitational in Laie, Hawaii, Dec. 21-23.

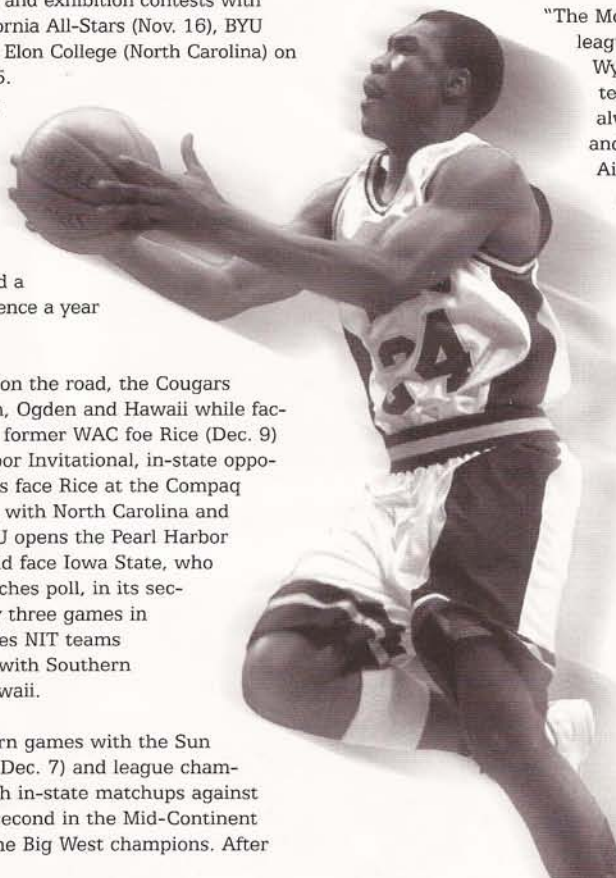
After the annual Varsity Preview (Nov. 8) and exhibition contests with Worldwide (Nov. 11) and EA Sports California All-Stars (Nov. 16), BYU opens its regular season at home against Elon College (North Carolina) on Nov. 21 and UC Santa Barbara on Nov. 25. Elon College finished tied for third in the Big South Conference last year while the Gauchos, completing a home-and-home with the Cougars, placed second in the Big West's West Division. The Cougars finish November on the road with a Nov. 30 meeting with the University of San Francisco, who recorded a 19-8 record in a good West Coast Conference a year ago.

Playing six of its 10 December contests on the road, the Cougars will make trips to Tempe, Ariz., Houston, Ogden and Hawaii while facing NIT qualifier Arizona State (Dec. 2), former WAC foe Rice (Dec. 9) and, after returning from the Pearl Harbor Invitational, in-state opponent Weber State (Dec. 28). The Cougars face Rice at the Compaq Center as part of a double-header event with North Carolina and Texas A&M playing the other game. BYU opens the Pearl Harbor Invitational against Boise State and could face Iowa State, who was ranked No. 3 in last year's final coaches poll, in its second-round matchup. In all BYU will play three games in Hawaii in a tournament that also includes NIT teams Mississippi and Southern Illinois, along with Southern California, Troy State, and host BYU-Hawaii.

December home contests include a return games with the Sun Belt Conference's Florida International (Dec. 7) and league champion South Alabama (Dec. 30) along with in-state matchups against Southern Utah (Dec. 14), who finished second in the Mid-Continent Conference, and Utah State (Dec. 16), the Big West champions. After



completing its nonconference schedule at home against Idaho (Jan. 2) and Texas A&M Corpus Christi (Jan. 6), BYU prepares to tip-off its MWC season at home against San Diego State and conference champion UNLV.



"The Mountain West is going to be very strong league this year," Cleveland said. "Utah, Wyoming and UNLV are all potential top-25 teams and New Mexico will be very good as always. San Diego State has really improved and Colorado State returns four starters and Air Force returns three (starters). There is no question that we will have a very difficult schedule in January and February. BYU fans are going to be able to come out and see some outstanding basketball this season."

While maintaining traditional travel partners, the MWC has altered its scheduling this year to include primarily Saturday-Monday games with some exceptions for Thursday-Saturday pairings. BYU will play two home games on Monday, both on ESPN, with the rest of its home schedule remaining on Thursday-Saturday. The Cougars will have two Monday night road games at Wyoming and San Diego State.

Including two exhibition contests, BYU has 31 games on its 2000-2001 schedule, including 17 in the Marriott Center. The MWC tournament will be played in Las Vegas, Mar. 8-10 at the Thomas & Mack Center, with all tournament games being televised on either ESPN or ERT.



The Mountain West Conference proved to be a strong basketball league in its first season. The MWC finished the 1999-2000 season with a 65-46 (.610) overall record vs. non-conference Division I opponents, playing teams from 29 other conferences.

Six of the eight Mountain West Conference teams had winning records in 1999-00, with three reaching the 20-win mark. UNLV went 23-8, Utah was 23-9, while BYU was 22-11. It was the Runnin' Rebels' third 20-win season during head coach Bill Bayno's five years at the helm. Utah captured its sixth straight 20-win season and ninth in head coach Rick Majerus' 10 full seasons. BYU had its first 20-win season since 1994-95 and has improved its win total under head coach Steve Cleveland each of the last three seasons.

UNLV and Utah each received at-large bids in the field of 64 and represented the Mountain West Conference in the NCAA Tournament. Regular season co-champion Utah earned the highest Mountain West position from the selection committee as the No. 8 seed, while fellow co-champion and conference tournament champion, UNLV, captured a No. 10 seed. Utah defeated No. 9-seed St. Louis (19-13), 48-45, in a first round game before falling, 73-61, to No. 1 and eventual national champion Michigan State. UNLV lost to No. 7-seed Tulsa in the first round. The Runnin' Rebels have been to the tournament 14 times and have advanced to the Final Four on four different occasions. UNLV won the 1990 national title with a 103-73 victory over Duke.

BYU and New Mexico were invited to the NIT last season. BYU made its eighth NIT appearance last season and is 11-6 all-time in the tournament.

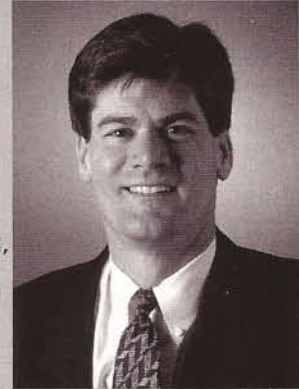

The Cougars defeated Bowling Green in the first round, 81-54, in Provo and cruised by Southern Illinois in the second round, 82-57, before falling at Notre Dame, 64-52, in the third round. The Cougars won the NIT title in 1951 (62-43 over Dayton) and 1966 (97-84 over NYU). New Mexico outlasted South Florida, 64-58, in The Pit before losing in the second round at Wake Forest, 72-65.

Among the league's departed players is Utah's Hanno Möttölä, who was drafted by the Atlanta Hawks as the 40th overall pick in the 2000 NBA Draft. This year the Mountain West Conference returns two first team all-conference performers for 2000-01 in senior center Kaspars Kambala of UNLV and junior forward Josh Davis of Wyoming. In addition to Kambala and Davis, second team All-MWC honorees Jarvis Croff of Air Force and Mekeli Wesley of BYU return along with MWC Newcomer of the Year Terrell Lyday of BYU, who averaged 17.1 ppg and 1.88 spg last season.

The Mountain West Conference was granted an automatic bid to the 2001 NCAA Basketball Tournament at the NCAA Board of Directors meeting April 27, 2000.

BYU's system relies on defensive pressure



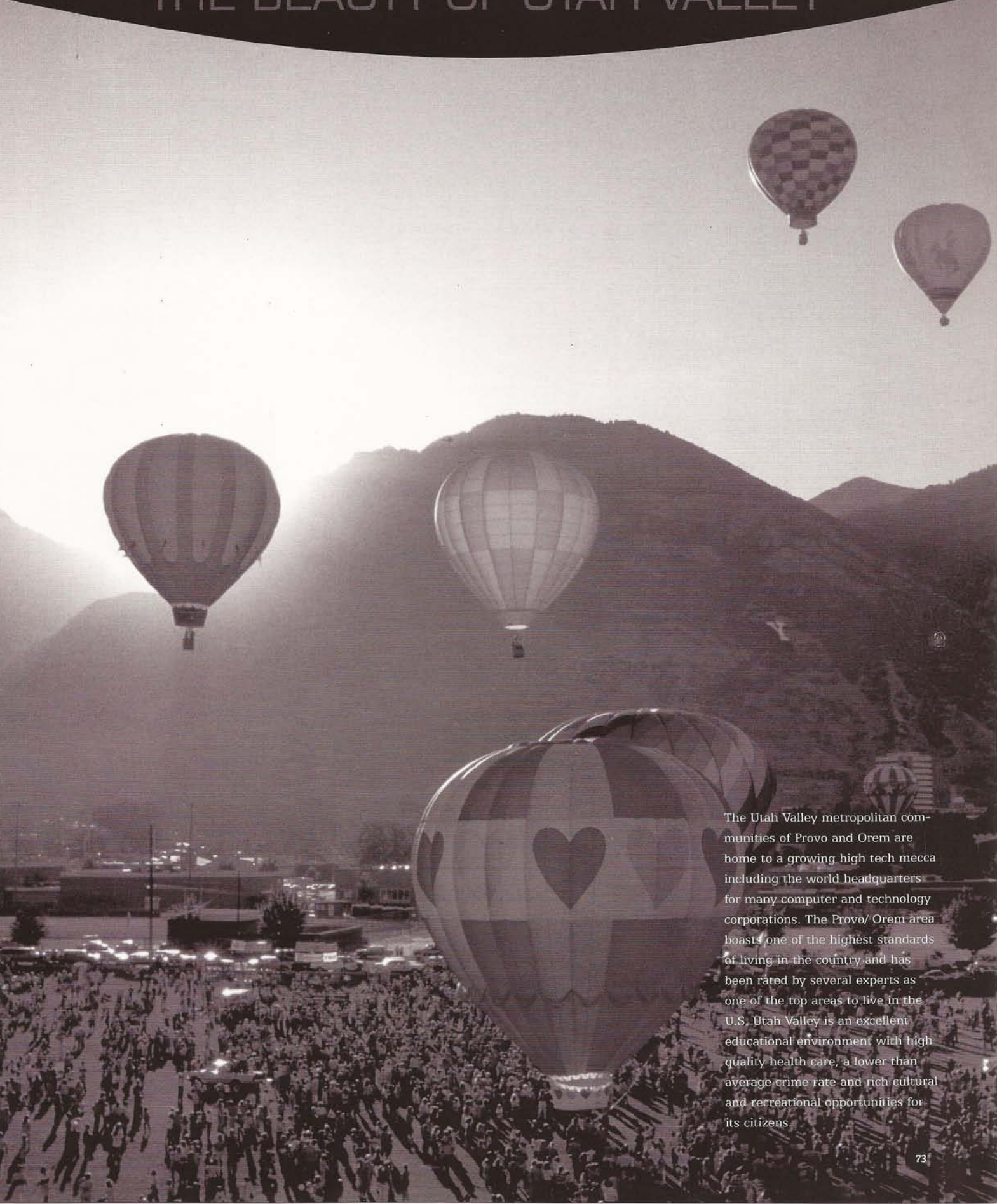
and on intelligently executed offense, based on strong post play and three-point shooting. BYU's motion offense allows its athletes the freedom to play and emphasizes going through the post.

MERRILL J. BATEMAN



UNIVERSITY
PRESIDENT

President Merrill J. Bateman, the 11th president of Brigham Young University, has had numerous academic, commercial, government, and church administrative roles throughout Asia, Africa, England, and the United States.

He officially began his BYU presidential duties on January 1, 1996. Bateman, 62, serves simultaneously as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He succeeded the late Rex E. Lee, who served as president for six years before his death in March 1996 after a long bout with cancer.

At his inauguration, President Gordon B. Hinckley described Bateman as "a man of large capacity and solid faith. His academic credentials are spotless. His experience in the real world...has been remarkable. His service [in the Church] has been constant and wonderful."

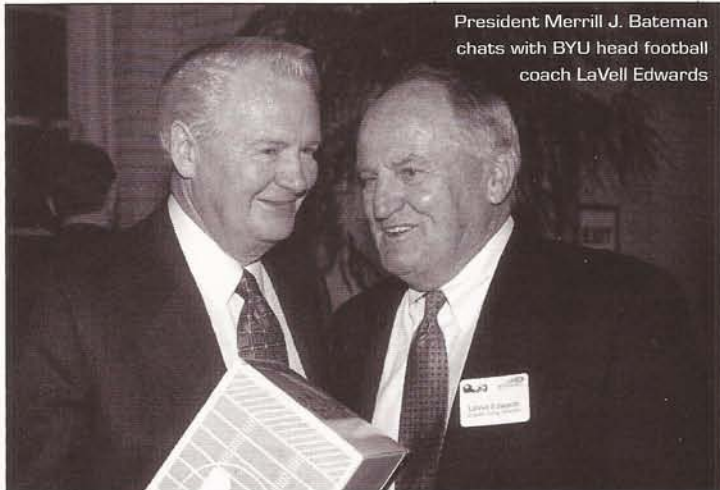
Before receiving his call to be a general authority, Bateman headed his own consulting and capital management companies. He was dean of the College of Business and the School of Management at BYU from 1975 to 1979. Before joining the BYU faculty, he was an executive with Mars, Inc. in England and the United States ('71-75).

Born in Lehi, Utah, and raised in neighboring American Fork, Bateman earned a bachelor's degree in economics at the University of Utah and went on to receive his doctorate in economics from MIT. He was inducted into the Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Beta Kappa Honor Societies in 1960 at the University of Utah. He was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow from 1960 to 1961 and a Danforth Fellow from 1960 to 1964.

Early in his career, Bateman was an assistant professor of economics at the U.S. Air Force Academy (1964 to 1967) and later an associate professor of economics at BYU (1967 to 1971). He was also a lecturer at the University of Ghana in 1963.

Bateman has served the Church as a missionary, bishop, stake high counselor, stake president, regional representative, and as Presiding Bishop he testified before the U.S. Senate Finance Committee. He also helped lay the foundation for the establishment of the Church in Ghana and Nigeria.

He is married to Marilyn Scholes (pronounced SKOLS) Bateman, and they are the parents of seven children - four boys and three girls. They also have 23 grandchildren.

DANNY AINGE 1981 NCAA PLAYER OF THE YEAR



Known for his feisty, hard-nosed playing style, Danny Ainge has become one of the most famous athletes to graduate from BYU.

During his four-year career as a Cougar, Ainge was a Consensus All-American, a two-time First Team Academic All-American, the WAC Player of the Year and a four-time All-WAC selection. He set an NCAA record with 112 consecutive games scoring in double digits and broke the BYU and WAC all-time scoring records with 2,467 points.

As a senior in 1981, Ainge led BYU to the 1981 Eastern Regionals. He concluded his senior season by winning the Eastman Award as well as the John Wooden Award — given annually to the top collegiate basketball player in the nation.

Ainge beat out Isiah Thomas (Indiana), Sam Bowie (Kentucky), Mark Aguirre (DePaul) Ralph Sampson (Virginia) and Steve Johnson (Oregon State) to win the Wooden Award. In doing so, he became the fifth winner of the award, joining Marques Johnson, Larry Bird, Phil Ford and Darrell Griffith.

As a two-sport star, Ainge was drafted by both the Toronto Blue Jays for baseball and the Boston Celtics for basketball. After playing four seasons with the Blue Jays, he chose to pursue an NBA career.

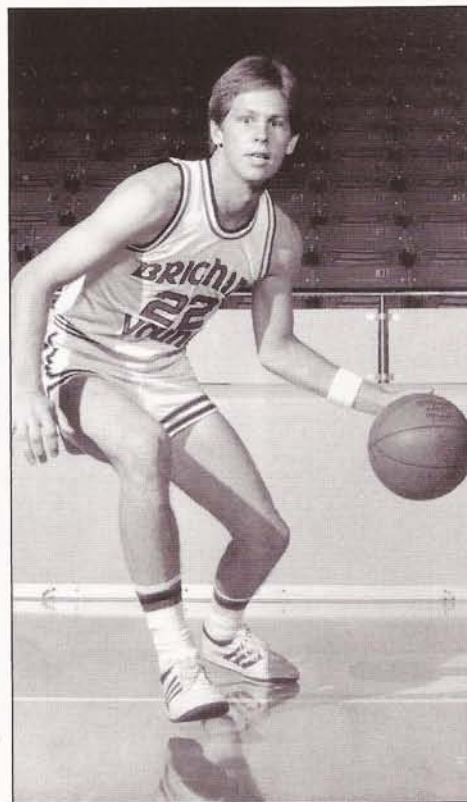
Ainge was a member of the Celtics' 1984 and 1986 Championship teams, and played in six NBA finals with three different teams (Boston, Portland and Phoenix). He also played for the Sacramento Kings. He became only the third player in NBA history to make 1,000 three-point field goals, finishing his 14-year career with 1,002.



Ainge played in 193 NBA playoff games, second all-time to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar who played in 237, and ahead of Magic Johnson, Robert Parrish, John Havlicek and Bill Russell to name a few.

After retiring in 1995, Ainge was an NBA basketball television analyst for Turner Broadcasting for one year. But the Phoenix Suns brought him back to the organization as the head coach in 1996. Realizing he wanted to spend more time with his family, Ainge resigned as head coach in 1999. In his three years as head coach of the Suns, Ainge had a mark of 123-83 (.597) with three NBA Playoff appearances.

Ainge is currently a member of the BYU Varsity Club. Last spring his son Austin signed a letter of intent to play basketball for BYU and is currently serving an LDS mission. Ainge was inducted into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame in May 2000.

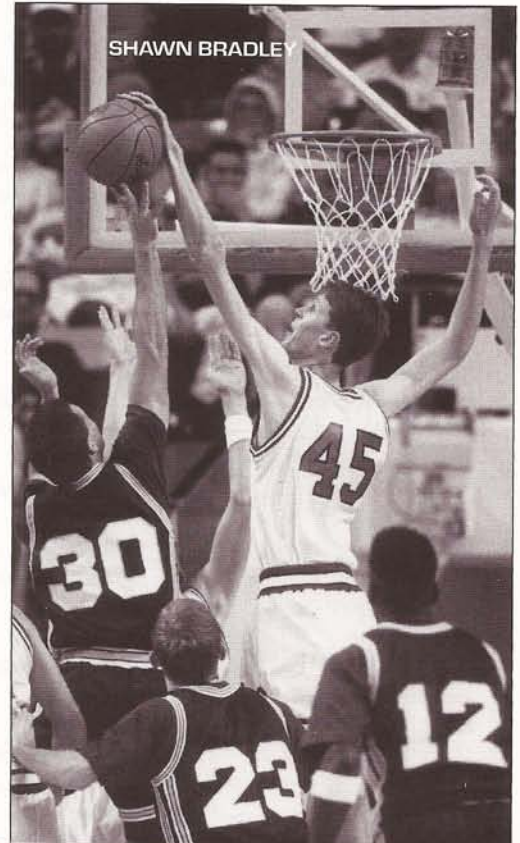




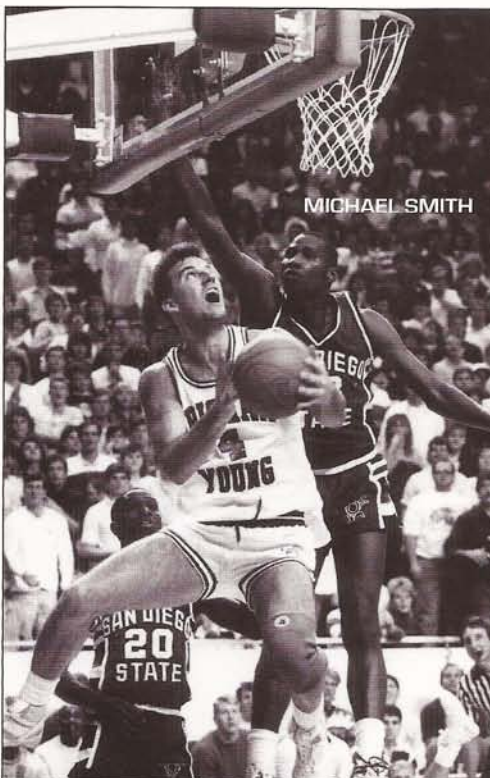

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

1964-65

The 1964-65 team won the first WAC championship for BYU and first conference title since 1957. The team finished the season with a 21-7 mark and were ranked sixth nationally in the final wire service poll of the season. BYU finished second to Miami (Fla.) in scoring offense. John Fairchild was named WAC Player of the Year and led the team with 21.5 points a game.

1966-67

The Cougars surprised many by winning a share of the WAC title and finishing 14-10. There were no real standouts on the team as eight players won game high honors during the season. BYU remained undefeated for the second straight year at home.

1968-69

BYU finished the season at 17-12 and had been picked in the preseason polls to finish third or lower. They won a first round berth in the NCAA tournament but lost to New Mexico State. Remarkably, six players ended the season with scoring averages in double figures.

1970-71

The 1970-71 team was picked to finish sixth in the WAC preseason polls. The Cougars finished 18-11 to grab the WAC title. They lost to the eventual NCAA champion UCLA in the NCAA Regionals. The team was led by Bernie Fryar, who averaged 19.2 points and Steve Kelly who scored 17.9 points per game.

1971-72

The 1971-72 season was Coach Stan Watts final year and one of the most exciting in Cougar history. The team finished with a 21-5 record and made it to the NCAA tournament. The year was the first that games were played in the Marriott Center. Kresimir Cosic was the teams leading scorer, averaging 22.3 points per game.

1978-79

One of the most exiting aspects of the 1978-79 season was the expectations that Cougar success would carry over into the next year. The Cougars were 20-8 and were led by Danny Ainge with 18.4 points per game. Ainge moved into the top 10 in BYU scoring history after just two seasons. The Cougars made it to the first round of the NCAA pay-offs.

1979-80

A record of 24-5 was the best yet for a BYU team. The Cougars had been ranked as high as sixth by sports writers. All the starters from the previous year returned to help defend the WAC title. Danny Ainge once again led the team with 19.1 points per game, and moved into first place on the BYU all-time scoring list. The team had four future NBA players; Ainge, Devin Durrant, Fred Roberts, and Greg Kite.



1991-92 TEAM

1982-83

Although the 1982-83 team finished in a three way tie for the WAC championship, it was the first time in the previous five years that the Cougars did not advance to post season play. The team's record was 15-14. Devin Durrant led BYU in scoring with 22.8 points per game. Greg Kite led the team in rebounding with 8.8 per game.

1987-88

In the 70-year history of BYU basketball, only the 1950-51 team had more victories than the 1987-88 team, and no team had a better winning percentage. The Cougars finished 26-6 in season play winning 17 games in a row to start the year, a BYU basketball record. The team was led by All-American Michael Smith who averaged 21.2 points and 7.8 rebounds per game.

1989-90

The Cougars went 21-9 and exceeded all expectations by winning the WAC title. The team was projected to finish sixth. They went on to lose a heart-breaker in the NCAA East Regional to Clemson 49-47. It was Roger Reid's first year as head coach. Marty Haws led the team in scoring with 18.5 points and 4.1 assists per game. Andy Toolson averaged 18.3 points per game.

1990-91

With a 21-13 record, BYU finished in second place during the regular season in the WAC but went on to win the WAC Tournament and then advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament. Freshman Shawn Bradley led the nation in blocked shots with 177 and averaged 14.8 points a game. Steve Schreiner scored 14.2 points per game.

1991-92

Few thought at the beginning of the season that BYU would finish the season 25-7 and win the WAC. The Cougars went on to defeat UTEP in dramatic fashion at the WAC Tournament thanks to a 54-foot buzzer-beater by Kevin Nixon. The Cougars ran into Shaq and LSU in the first round of the NCAA Tournament to end the season. Gary Trost led the team in scoring with 14.2 points per game.

1992-93

The Cougars posted a 25-9 record, including 15-1 in the WAC, which tied the conference record for most wins. Nick Sanderson set a school record in three-point attempts for a season with 209. Russell Larson set a new school record in field goal percentage at .631. Gary Trost led the team in scoring for the second straight year with 15.2 points per game. BYU lost to Kansas in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

STAN WATTS BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME



When considering the most influential individuals in BYU basketball history, Stan Watts has to be placed at the top of the list.

During his 23 years at the helm of the Cougar basketball program, Watts led his teams to two NIT National Championships (1951, 1966) and oversaw the construction of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse and Marriott Center.

His nationally recognized accomplishments led to his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on March 6, 1986, making him the first Cougar to

receive the prestigious honor.

Watts finished his career after the 1971-72 season with an overall record of 372-254 (.594).

He was a member of the NCAA's Rules Committee, served as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and chaired the U.S. Olympic Basketball Committee in 1976. Watts also served four years as BYU's athletic director and spent time on the Cougar football and baseball coaching staffs.

Even more impressive than his remarkable accomplishments as a coach is his impeccable character as a human being. He is respected by coaches, fans and players alike for his conduct both on and off the court.

"His won-loss record speaks very well for the kind of coach he was," said former player Harold Christensen, who played for Watts on the 1951 championship team. "His reputation among his fellow coaches suggests how much they respected him. He still has that and is still honored in the community in which he coached."

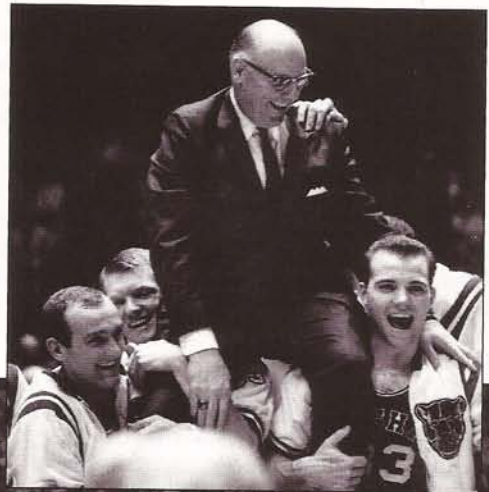
Always a fighter, Watts overcame a rare form of cancer in 1971—only the fourth-known case of this type of cancer in medical history. Despite the fact that the other three individuals died, Watts refused to give up. After 14-hours of surgery and a two-month stay in the hospital, Watts returned to coach his team to a WAC Championship the following year.

Known for his fast-break style of offense, Watts remains an avid Cougar fan. He once said, "It has always been our contention that the average basketball fan likes to see fast-scoring, speedy, exciting basketball."

By looking around the Marriott Center during a

Cougar game, there are hints that Watts has been there. The glass-encased exhibit in the halls outside the arena pays tribute to one of the greatest coaches and individuals ever to grace the sidelines of a BYU athletic contest — as do the two NIT Championship banners and the WAC title banners from 1965, 1967, 1969, 1971 and 1972.

"The greatest tribute I can pay to Stan Watts," said Senior Associate Athletic Director Pete Witbeck, BYU's NCAA compliance officer and former assistant to Watts for many years, "is he's truly a man of God. He's always been a gentleman and great man. You don't see that very often." Watt passed away April 6, 2000 at the age of 88.





BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME KRESIMIR COSIC

When it comes to describing Kresimir Cosic, where do you start?

Few players in BYU history have been able to capture the hearts of Cougar fans like Kresimir Cosic did from 1970-73. The 6-11 center from Zadar, Yugoslavia, entertained fans during his stellar career with his enthusiastic, guard-like play.

Whether it was leading the fastbreak, dribbling between his legs or shooting a sky-hook, Cosic's enthusiasm and on-court antics endeared him to almost everyone who saw him play.

During his career at BYU, Cosic used his versatile inside-outside game to lead the Cougars in scoring (23.3) and rebounding (13.0) as a junior and again as a senior (20.2 points per game). His unselfish attitude helped him to lead his team in assists.

He ranks second on BYU's all-time rebounding list with 919, an average of 11.6 per game. He was a three-time First Team All-WAC selection and an All-American his junior year. Behind the play of Cosic, the Cougars won two WAC titles and reached the NCAA Regional tournament in 1971 and 1972.

Cosic was a three-time first team All-WAC selection and earned All-American accolades following his junior season.

Upon graduation, Cosic became very much involved with basketball throughout Europe. He played on four Olympic teams with his native land of Yugoslavia, winning a gold medal in 1980 and two silver medals in 1968 and 1976.

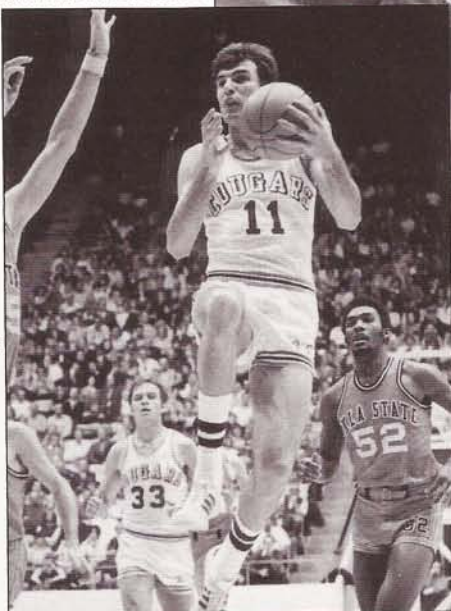
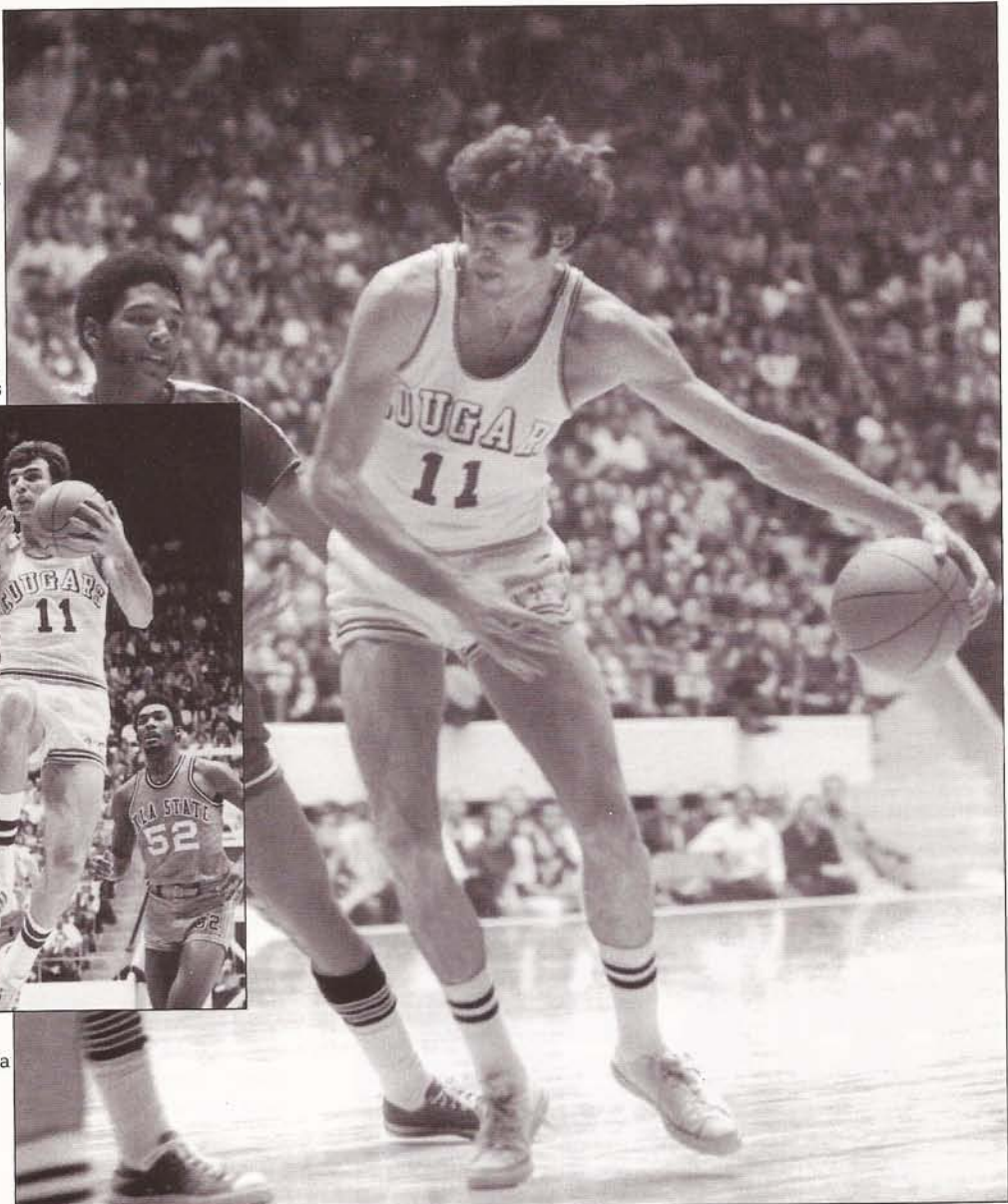
He ended his career as the all-time Croatian scoring leader, and went on to coach the Yugoslavian national team for many years.

His national and international accomplishments led to his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., on May 6, 1996, making Cosic the second Cougar to receive the prestigious honor.

In September of 1992, Cosic was appointed as deputy ambassador for Croatia to the United States. He and his family lived in Washington D.C where he performed his diplomatic duties in the same excellent manner in which he played bas-

ketball.

On May 25, 1995, Cosic lost his battle against the toughest opponent of his career—cancer. During his 46 years on earth, Cosic became one of the most influential and well-known of all European basketball players. He left behind the legacy and credit of being the individual that first introduced the American game of basketball to Europe.



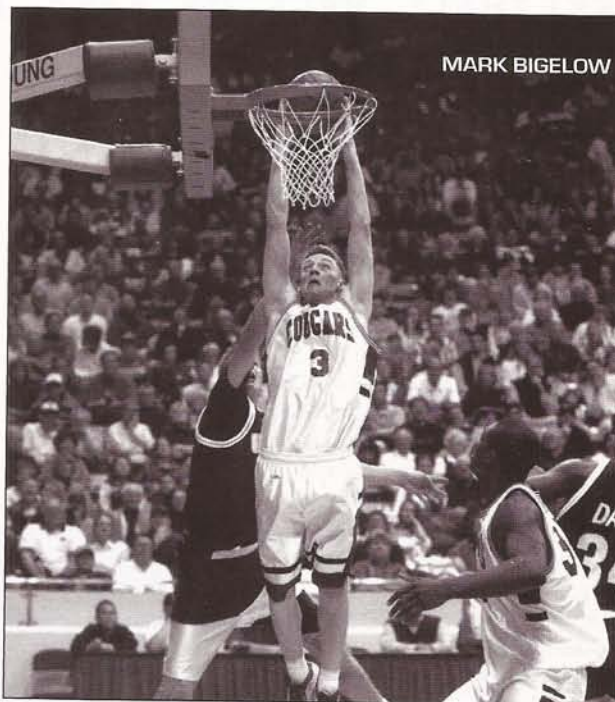

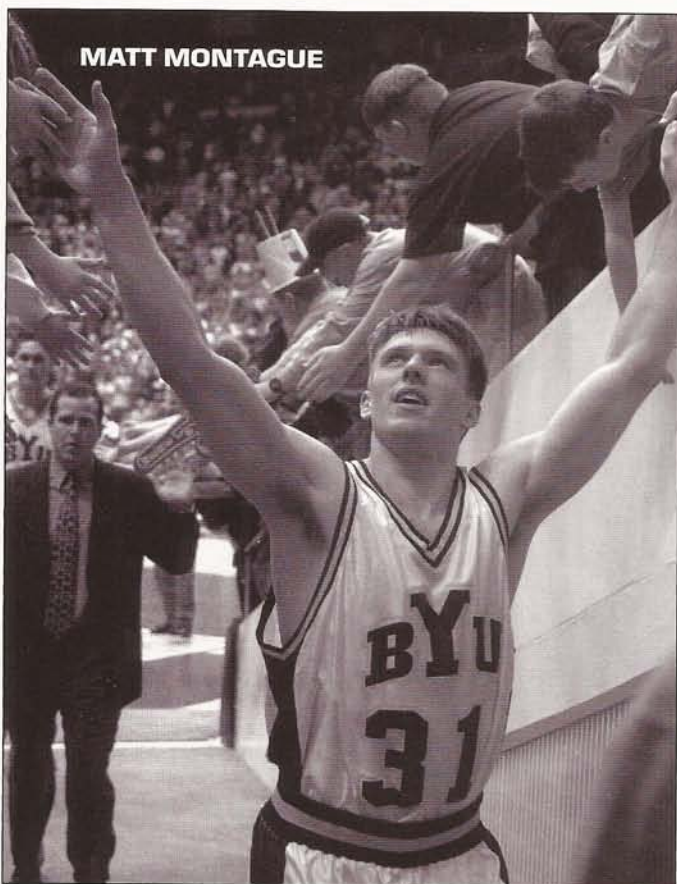
"THE MAGIC IS BACK."

A sign that appeared in the Marriott Center crowd toward the end of the 1999-2000 men's basketball season stated simply what so many BYU fans were already feeling. Three years after Steve Cleveland took over as head coach of a Cougar basketball team that finished 1-25 the season before his arrival, the "magic was back."

Cleveland led the Cougars to a 22-11 overall record, a National Invitation Tournament quarterfinal finish and an appearance in the inaugural Mountain West Conference championship game in Las Vegas. It was the most wins recorded by BYU since the 1994-1995 season when the Cougars finished 22-10 record and qualified for the NCAA Tournament.

Last year's success was accomplished against the toughest schedule of any MWC team and the 44th toughest schedule in the nation. BYU played 10 schools that qualified for the postseason and was 9-7 overall in those games, finishing 5-4 against teams in the NCAA Tournament.

The Cougars were sparked by a solid inside-outside combination. Power forward Mekeli Wesley and junior college transfer Terrell Lyday led the Cougars in scoring and also contributed to a stingy defense that led the MWC in field goal percentage defense, three-point field goal percentage defense and steals. BYU set a team season record for steals.

Wesley finished the year averaging 16.8 points per game and led the Cougars with 5.8 rebounds per game while earning second-team All-MWC honors. Lyday led the conference in steals and also led the Cougars in scoring, averaging 17.1 points per game, and was named the MWC Newcomer of the Year.

The team also had a strong supporting cast including sophomore forward Eric Nielsen and sophomore guard Matt Montague, each of whom played on the 1-25 team before serving two-year missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Nielsen finished the season strong by scoring a career-high 17 points and pulling down a team-high nine rebounds in the Cougar's 58-54 victory over in-state rival Utah in the MWC Tournament semifinals. Montague finished the season second in the conference in assists and third in assist/turnover ratio.

Sophomore Michael Vranes used his athleticism to finish third on the team in scoring (8.0 ppg) and was often called on to guard the top guards from the opposing teams. In the conference tournament he held Utah's Tony Harvey to two points and one assist. He also smothered New Mexico star Lamont Long in the opening game of the tournament to help BYU take the game from the Lobos.

Junior Nathan Cooper also contributed to the Cougars success. Cooper started seven games for the Cougars and they were 6-1 in those seven games. He led the team in free throw percentage with a .778 percentage and averaged 5.4 points and 3.4 rebounds.

The success of the 1999-2000 Cougars didn't go unnoticed. Cleveland and his staff also landed a top-20 recruiting class. They were able to land the top Utah players as well as the top LDS players in the country. The strong recruits, along with the loss of only one senior off of last year's team, should mean that a new sign might appear in the Marriott Center in 2000-01.

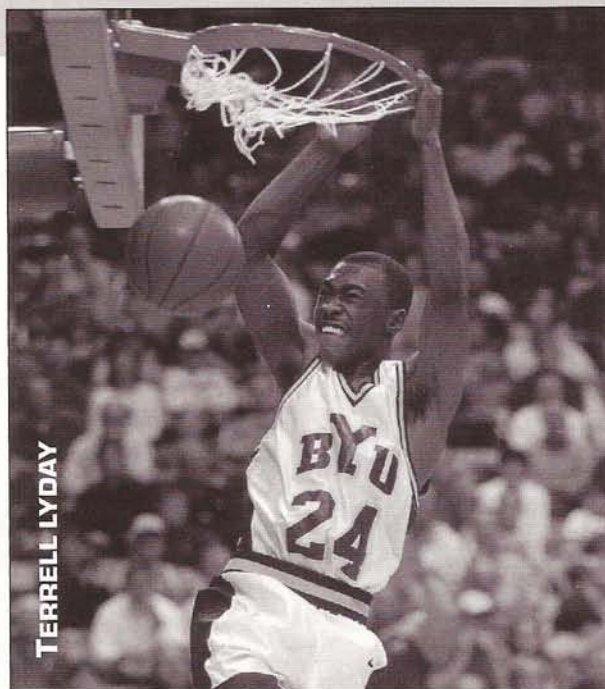

OTHER 1999-2000 NOTABLES

- After coming on strong at the end of each of Coach Steve Cleveland's first two seasons, BYU again finished strong this year winning six of its last eight games, including two MWC tournament wins and two NIT victories. Among the wins was BYU's first win over rival Utah since 1995.

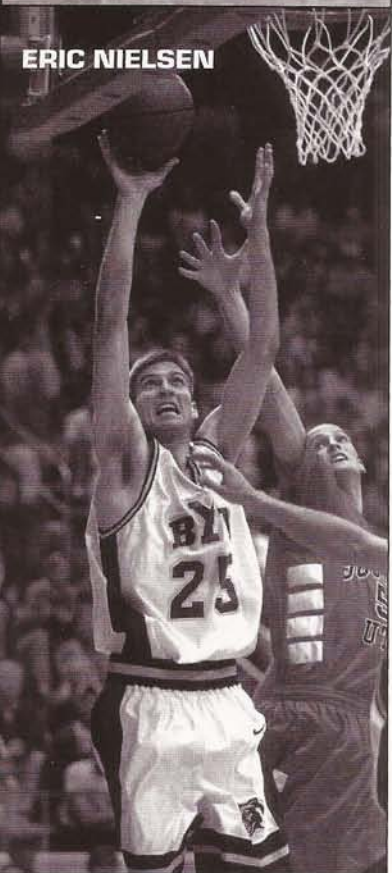

- Wesley had a team-leading 5.8 rebounds, followed by Rivers at 4.5, Eric Nielsen and Michael Vranes at 4.1 and Lyday at 4.0.
- BYU shot 46.1 percent from the floor, 37.3 on threes, and 69.6 from the line while scoring 70.5 points per game. BYU allowed 63.8 points and 39.7 FG% and 29.6 3FG%.

The longtime radio home of BYU Cougar Basketball is 50,000-watt KSL Newsradio 1160 in Salt Lake City.

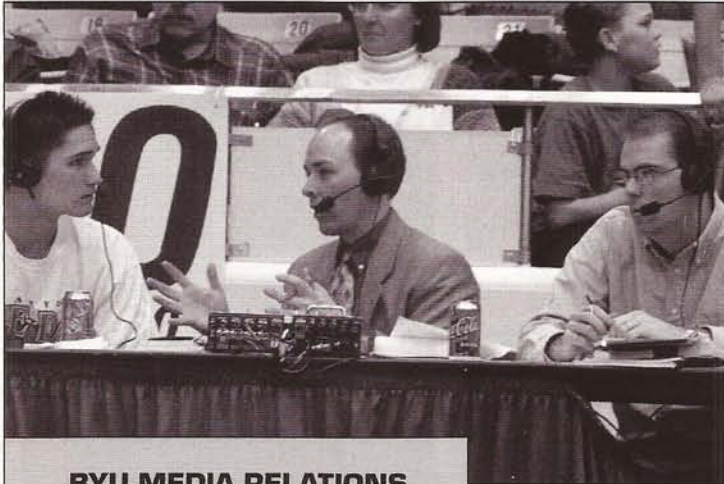

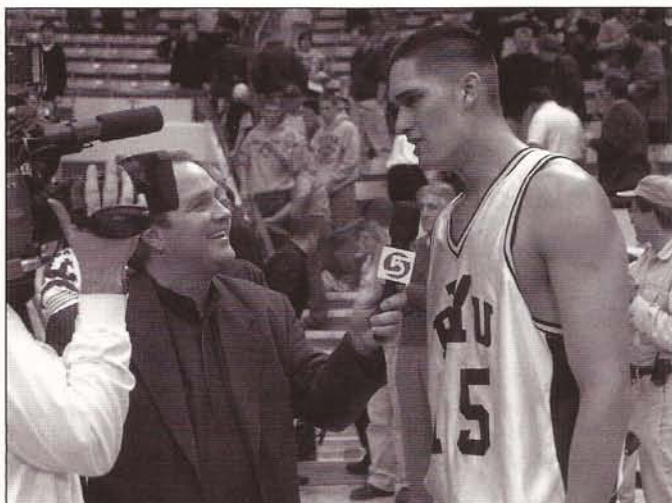

On Feb. 1, 1999, ESPN, Inc., signed a seven-year contract with the Mountain West Conference, giving ESPN exclusive national television rights to men's basketball and football beginning with the 1999-2000 academic year. BYU will play five ESPN or ESPN+ Plus regular season games this year. BYU will also appear on Fox Sports Net broadcasts and other regional Sports West telecasts.
